Bridge rebuild moving along



A rainy week may slow progress on the Highway 28/Main Street project, which Department of Transportation officials had estimated to be two weeks ahead of schedule. A business outreach meeting will be held at 11 a.m. Wednesday, June 25 in the Kewaskum Village Hall, 204 First Street. Residents interested in learning more about the project are encouraged to attend. Roadwork at the Fond du Lac Ave and Main Street intersection was completed June 6. Abutments on the north side of the bridge over the Milwaukee River have been poured. Decking of the north side of the bridge was scheduled to begin June 16 and a deck pour was scheduled after that date. Rough grading and base course placement west of the Milwaukee River was scheduled for completion June 13. Curb and gutter west of the Milwaukee River was started this week, with curb placement east of Milwaukee River to follow next week. It is estimated that WE Energies will install conduit for light poles after the curb is installed between June 19 and 27. Shown above, construction crews work on the bridge deck on Main St.

Global education certificate available for KHS students

In spring, The Kewaskum School District applied and became certified to offer students a chance to earn a Global Education Achievement Certificate (GEAC). The certificate endorses students as global scholars on their transcripts to aid in their success for college and career plans.

The program for the GEAC is new for the 2014/15 school year and designed to help educate and train students with the aid of a global focused curriculum. There is no additional cost for the program.

"They're doing a lot of this stuff already," Troy Parnitzke, Spanish ed-

ucator and coordinator, stated. "We have kids taking four years of foreign language in our district and also have kids who participate in Spanish Club, and they're going to many different events."

Taking foreign language for four years and attending global focused events such as Spanish Club were two requirements by the Wisconsin Department of Instruction (DPI).

Additionally, Kewaskum School District needed to add globally focused community service opportunities for students. By working with West Bend based Casa Guadalupe Educational Center (a community outreach facility for Hispanics) and Brick by Brick for Tanzania (a nonprofit

organization building schools in Tanzania), as well as designating current courses at KHS offering a perspective on the whole world, they are ready for students to begin this opportunity to further their global education.

Such courses currently include eastern and western civilizations, micro and macro economics, world cultures and perspectives of WWII. "There will be other classes," Parnitzke stated.

The program will be shared with KHS staff to possibly add other courses to the list or determine if some courses need adjustments to include a world perspective.

"The goal of the DPI is to get

Drunken driver flees from crash

The Washington County Sheriff's Department has arrested a 30-year-old Kewaskum man after a drunk driving hit and run crash Sunday.

The Sheriff's Office was alerted to the situation after the man rear-ended an eastbound car that was turning from County Highway H to Sandy Ridge Road. Three town of Barton residents, a 21-year-old male, 16-year-old female and an 18-year-old female occupied the eastbound car.

According to the Sheriff's Office, the 30-year-old then fled the scene and ended up stashing his pick-up truck in a barn at a friend's house on the 8000 block of Kettle Moraine Road. A witness followed the suspect to the address and the suspect was arrested.

Deputies approached the barn with caution, as a witness believed he saw a subject near the suspect vehicle with a long gun, however this was not confirmed. After some talking, the suspect admitted to driving and admitted to hitting the car. He also admitted to stashing the truck in the barn.

The suspect consented to a blood test and was booked into the jail and since has bailed out. The Sheriff's Office is now waiting for the blood test results, medical records from the injured, all the reports to be completed and all of the witnesses to be spoken to. There could be additional charges pending.

All suffered injuries ranging from minor cuts to whiplash and were transported to St Joseph's Hospital in West Bend for treatment.

District hires curriculum coordinator Staffin will replace Mueller on Board

The Kewaskum Board of Education met in a special session Tuesday to hire a curriculum coordinator and appoint a new board member to replace Grace Mueller who resigned last month.

Superintendent of Schools Jim Smasal said there were a total of five individuals interviewed for the curriculum coordinator position and the interview team had consensus for one candidate, Mark Bazata who is currently employed by the Oshkosh School District as an instructional support teacher.

"He was very impressive," stated Board Clerk Mary Miller who was a part of the interview team.

Board member Jim Leister asked why Bazata was leaving Oshkosh. Smasal stated Ba-

zata was looking to leave the city of Oshkosh and move to a more rural community to live. Smasal added that Bazata had a job offer in another district, but turned it down to come to Kewaskum.

The board unanimously approved hiring Bazata. Board member Jay Fisher was absent.

The board also approved contracts for a reading specialist, Gabrielle Moroder, who replaces Ann Pagel. Lisa Hencsik was hired to replace special education teacher Katie Butler.

Three residents applied for the open Board of Education seat. Kewaskum resident, Tammy Butz and town of Wayne resident Craig Staffin met with the board and were interviewed. Former board member Bill Kesting of the town of Farmington also indicated interest, but was not in attendance.

The board appointed Craig Staffin to the Board. He was sworn in at the end of the meeting.

Staffin has worked for Information Technology consulting firms for the past 10 years working with schools. He moved to the town of Wayne from West Bend. He has a five year-old daughter and three year-old son.

Work on WIS 33 in county to begin

The Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT) will begin a resurfacing project of WIS 33 (Washington St.) from Trenton Rd. to just east of Oak Rd. in the city of West Bend, Washington County. The work is scheduled to begin Monday June 16th and to be completed the end of July, weather permitting.

The work on this project will include a mill and overlay of the asphalt pavement and a replacement of cross culverts. At the Oak Road intersection, WisDOT will also construct a bypass lane on the eastbound lane and a right turn lane on the westbound lane of WIS 33.

The project will be divided in to three stages.

- Replace culvert pipes and resurfacing WIS 33.
- Construct the eastbound bypass lane at the Oak Rd. intersection.

- Construct the westbound right turn lane at the Oak Rd. intersection.

WIS 33 will remain open to traffic at all times; however; occasionally the road will be restricted to one lane of traffic with moving flagging operation. Access to side roads and driveways will be maintained at all times. Please use caution in driving through the work zone.

For the 2013-14 school year, Kewaskum Middle School language arts teacher Scott Rhoads found a creative way to showcase his middle school students' writing assignments. On display at the Kewaskum Public Library are 40 magazines written, organized and published by students.

Students, as part of their language arts instruction, were asked to write three papers on a topic of their choice that were argumentative, informative and narrative. These papers became the topic of the magazines. Some magazines have one topic, some multiple and some co-authored.

"We thought of trying to bring all their work together as one," Rhoads said about the idea he and fellow teacher Nick Brettingen had brainstormed. The idea was to have students take ownership of their work with the knowledge it will be displayed for the purpose of people reading their writings.

"We're really trying to flow with ownership. They know when it gets displayed, somebody will pick this book up and that it is their job to make that person want to read it," Rhoads said.

"I have always wanted to have books made by kids," Steev Baker, library director, said. "I love to see how smart and creative kids are."

Students followed the writ-

ing process from rough drafts to editing both self and peer. Full-size magazines were used as examples for formatting, such as columns and pictures, page numbers and table of contents. Eric Joslin, graphics teacher at KHS, printed the color covers.

The students choose their topics that included depression, bullying and cancer.

"I was really surprised with some of the challenging topics," Rhoads said. "I had some students' show they were really capable of really high levels of research and topics that would be tough for young adults to understand."

The students' initial reaction resulted in mixed feelings. Some students did not want their magazines seen by others, so that option was available. Other students were very excited.

Formatting in Microsoft Word turned out to be an obstacle Rhoads didn't expect.

"The formatting techniques become like a computer class. It was a process to teach them each item," Rhoads said.

After the time at the library, the magazines will be displayed at the KMS library for students and other teachers to use as writing examples.

"I think the whole project, as a whole, got them to think of writing a whole different way," Rhoads said.

The magazines will be on display through August unless additional time is requested.

"If other teachers wanted to do something like this, I would display them," Baker said.

teachers to start adjusting the curriculum to make sure it provides a world perspective," Parnitzke said. "As we do this, the list will grow, but our list is actually pretty high."

A passing grade of B or higher would be needed for both foreign language and other global-focused courses. Students would also need to write eight reflections on international media with at least four books. Global events will also require student reflections.

Within the Eastern Wisconsin Conference, Plymouth is the only other school to participate in the program. Statewide, Kewaskum is one of only 22 districts offering the certificate op-

portunity.

Such a certificate identifies students as those who not only examined the world around them, but applied that knowledge to helping others in the world.

Incoming freshman will be advised of the new opportunity by Parnitzke during Jump Start, while current high school students could still receive the certificate if requirements are completed by graduation. An informative pamphlet about the GEAC and program will be available by the beginning of the school year.

"We're excited," Parnitzke said. "We think it is a great thing for the community."



What does 38, 32 and 29 add up to? Just a year shy of a century of dedicated service three retirees, Gerald Gosa, Christine Dehler and Jan Uhlman, provided for thousands of students in the Kewaskum School District.

The three were honored recently by their colleagues at a special luncheon as they head into a more relaxed lifestyle. All reflected on their careers for *The Statesman*.

Gosa, a native of Waukesha, came to Kewaskum in 1976, fresh out of the University of Wisconsin where he was a scholarship football player. He stayed for the next 38 years, teaching chemistry, coaching three different sports and being very instrumental in the development of the K.E.Y.S. (Kewaskum Youth Scholarship) program.

Gosa's dad played a huge role in his life, helping him become a successful, three-sport high school athlete and suggesting he had the skills needed to become a productive teacher.

"It was neat. I went to the high school where my dad went," Gosa said. "My senior year we won the football crown just like my dad did. We won the basketball title just like my dad did. We didn't lose a game until we got to the sectional."

Gosa's dad also recommended teaching as a career choice after he saw how good Jerry was with children in a summer swimming program. He headed in that direction and later, "I practice taught at Waukesha North with the same teacher who taught me chemistry," he said.

The rest is history, a history that includes hundreds of extra hours working on the now very successful scholarship program which began in 1985 and has grown to the point where more than \$1 million has been given to KHS graduates. "We gave out over \$100,000 this year," Gosa said.

Back in 1985 Diane Buechel had been elected as the president of K.E.Y.S., but several months later her husband was transferred and Gosa was drafted to take over the post. "The first year, Pete Ayer offered to do a Christmas Concert to help get us started," Gosa went on. The

concert brought in \$500, which was given out that year.

Gosa is very proud of the work the K.E.Y.S. organization has done but credits community support as the big reason it has been so successful.

"How fortunate we are to have a community where people who have lost loved ones give these scholarships," he said. "The community has embraced K.E.Y.S. that much."

While numbers have decreased in recent years, the track program continues to produce successful athletes because of the hard work Gosa and his staff demand. Charlie Sparks, who went to the NCAA Track and Field competition from Indiana State in 2006, comes to mind. One other highlight for Gosa was the 2001 boys' team that won the Eastern Wisconsin Conference title with his father in attendance.

As far as the future, Gosa said he plans to stay with K.E.Y.S.

"I'm going to continue coaching for a while." Other than that, he hopes to spend more time with his eight grandchildren and "spend more time with my wife" after being away from home so much coaching and working in his classroom two or three nights a week.

"I will miss the kids," Gosa said, indicating when one of his friends from one of his last classes, "They actually felt pretty special. They asked me to sign their yearbooks and I signed their yearbooks."

One might say that Dehler's career, which included a couple of years at St. Matthew Catholic School in Campbellsport,

a year at Beechwood Elementary School and the last 29 at Farmington Elementary, has gone full circle, not once but twice.

"I started with a Tom and an ending with a Tom," Dehler said, referring to the fact the late Tom Larsen was the principal at Farmington when she started there in 1986 and Tom Fischer is currently the principal.

Also, when Dehler started full time teaching several years off to raise her five daughters, her mother volunteered to baby-sit for the girls. Now it will be Dehler who is doing the volunteering two days a week to watch several of her grandchildren who live in Kewaskum.

On the days she will not be busy being grandma, Dehler said, "I like to garden and read, and I want to take time to do things at a slower pace."

When asked what has changed in the 32 total years she has been in education, Dehler said, "I can tell you what hasn't changed." She went on, "Concepts have changed. There are computers and the Internet ... but the joy children have in learning new things, that hasn't changed."

Dehler, who attended UW-Washington County, got her bachelor's degree from UW-Milwaukee and a master's degree from Cardinal Stritch University, had high praise for the Farmington School and its staff.

"They're (teachers and support staff) the best. I know I am going to miss them. They're like family," she said.

Dehler still remembers her first mentor, Kathy Wagner, who helped her ease into back into the classroom and becoming a

second-grade teacher.

"I've been in second grade ever since."

Living close to the school has also been nice for Dehler. "We only live two miles away. It wasn't a long commute," she said, indicating working at Farmington turned into a family affair about 10 years ago when her husband, Joe became the custodian there.

Farmington was also a short commute for Dehler even before she became a teacher.

"I was a girl scout leader before I taught there," Dehler said, noting "All of our five daughters went there," and now several of her grandchildren are in Kewaskum schools, including one who will be a freshman at KHS, another starting at KMS and two in KES.

"It's been a good run. I must have enjoyed it or I wouldn't have stayed with it that long," Dehler concluded.

Uhlman is also concluding a long and illustrious career with the district to enjoy life,

spending time with her grandchildren and more time on a hobby she enjoys — basket weaving.

Uhlman grew up in West Bend and after attending the Dodge County Teachers College for two years she was ready for the classroom.

"I started teaching when I was 19," she said, indicating she spent one year at Holy Angels in West Bend, a couple of years in Horicon, and then came to the Kewaskum district, first at Beechwood Elementary and, after a break to raise her two adopted children, Heather and Matthew, the final 24 years at the Kewaskum Middle School.

Uhlman finished her undergraduate degree at UW-Oshkosh, going to night classes and summer school.

At KMS, "I taught English and social studies and a little math here and there," she said, explaining until several years ago, the school used the House Plan for much of her career, and, "This year and next year,




Those Jean leaves behind to cherish her memory include her loving husband, Donald; three children, Kenny, Joseph and Mary Beth, other relatives and friends.



Special Village Board Meeting May 20, 2014 8 P.M.

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in Special Session in the Community Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First Street.

President Andy Pesch presided and called the meeting to order at 8:05 a.m. Board members present were Richard Laubach, Richard Knoebel, Dave Zehren, Andy Pesch, Dave Spenner, Kevin Scheunemann (arrived at 8:10 a.m.) and Jim Hovland. Staff members present were Matt Heiser, Mark Groeschel, Thomas Bishop, Chad Cook, Janet Knops and Stephanie Justmann. Members from the community were also present.

Notice of the meeting had been posted at the PNC Bank, Kewaskum Post Office, and at the Municipal Building on May 15, 2014. Notice was also forwarded to the Village Board, Village Attorney, Village Engineer and the News Media.

Administrator Heiser lead the discussion on the Visioning Session starting with planning street improvements. The five year plan for street improvements includes Main Street, Knights Avenue, Moraine Court, Brooklane Drive and Edgewood Road. This plan is just a projection and should be altered according to needs. This last winter there were numerous

water main breaks on Meadow Lane, Fond du Lac Avenue and Roseland Drive. These issues may need to be addressed within the five year street improvement plan. The street plan may have to extent out seven to eight years to obtain a more accurate picture. Funding for street projects and the LRIP grant was discussed.

Continuity in government and a succession plan for the various departments was reviewed. The back-up for the Administrator day to day functions should be handled by having each department head covering their department and to report to the elected Village President with issues that need to be addressed. The Administrator should establish a folder for each of the departments documenting projects and information pertinent to that department so projects can be carried out in the absence of the Administrator. If the Village President cannot handle the interim-administrator role the duties should fall to the Chairman of the Administrative Committee. The Building Inspectors succession should be handled by contracting privately with an inspection service.

Administrator Heiser reviewed

the individual department goals. The fire department goals include updating policies, the facilities and equipment. It was suggested to report annually the training level of each of the department members. The issue for the fire department is if the members are employees or volunteers. Chief Groeschel will bring a proposal to the Village Board at the first meeting in July to solve the issue of employee vs. volunteer within the department. The DPW goals include safety training, obtaining the water license and the Main Street project. The Administrator goals include: improving communication with residents, working on improving the TIF financial pressures and developing a folder for each department for the succession plan.

The last item discussed was the open meeting law. Information on the various stipulations of open meetings was distributed. It was discussed what is considered a

meeting: the numbers test and the purpose test. If there is a quorum and the discussion is village business it is considered a meeting. Educational opportunity will be distributed to the Village Board as they become available.

Items for the next Visioning session included obtaining a list of distressed properties within the Village from the Building Inspector, addressing the impact fee vs. a utility user fee and establish a liability waiver for the ball diamonds.

Motion by Richard Knoebel to adjourn at 10:05 a.m., second by Kevin Scheunemann and carried by roll call vote. Laubach-aye, Knoebel-aye, Zehren-aye, Pesch-aye, Spenner-aye, Scheunemann-aye, Hovland-aye. (7-0-0)





Indians lose another pitcher, three games

After its win over Campbellsport June 9 the Indians baseball team suffered a three-game drought, losing to New Holstein 12-9, to Pewaukee 11-3 and then to Sheboygan Falls 12-1.

But wait a minute, the umpires calling the game against New Holstein have admitted they made an error and KHS coach Doug Gonring wants to pursue the situation even though he said the WIAA has already indicated when the umpires say a game has concluded and leave the field that game is over.

"All I did was re-enter my same player (Sam Schlosser). There was no illegal substitution," Gonring said Sunday night. "Why should we let it sit?" and, "How difficult is it to get things right?"

Kewaskum had the bases loaded with two outs when the umpires thought Schlosser had come back in the game illegally and said the game was over.

At this point Gonring doesn't know how to proceed since there are no protests in high school baseball, but he is convinced the situation should be rectified.

"That might have been the momentum changer of our season," he said.

The Statesman will continue to follow the situation, which may have already affected the Indians who "came out flat" two nights later against Pewaukee. Then Michael Prochnow dislocated his thumb in the first inning, Gonring said. So now the Indians' number one and two pitchers, Brett Boegel and

Prochnow, are sidelined.

Prochnow was the likely starter for Friday's Eastern Wisconsin Conference game against Sheboygan Falls. Instead Demmon got the start and pitched well for four innings (only 52 pitches, one walk, three Ks), according to Gonring, who said soon after that, "We dropped fly balls and had too many errors."

Kewaskum had just three hits off winning pitcher Nick Peterson, including a single by Dean Schlice in the first and a single by Schlosser in the third and a single to deep short by Demmon.

Nate Heili, Mike Roeder and Jake Wiesenthal led the winners offensively, combining for seven hits and three runs batted in (RBIs). Heili went 3x3 with a pair of singles and a triple.

This was the second time the Falcons have beaten the Indians this season.

Kewaskum tried three different pitchers at Pewaukee (9-2) in the June 12 makeup game and none of them could tame the Pirates' quartet of Garrett Shibilski, Chet Tredwell, Zach Brennan and Shawn Campbell, who combined for seven hits and five RBIs in the 11-3 win.

Derek Schulz started and struggled with control, giving up five walks and three hits that produced four Pirate runs. He took the loss.

Dylan May came on in relief in the second, giving up four runs on four hits and three walks in two innings and Bille Lehmann finished up the final three innings, giving up three runs, all unearned, on two hits, three walks and a couple errors. He fanned three.

Kewaskum scored two of its three runs in the first off starter and winner, Patrick Tomfohede, who struck out seven, walked four and gave up two hits in

Prochnow and Matt Hetebrueg each singled in the first, with Sam Schlosser (who walked) scoring on an error by

the left fielder and Prochnow scoring on a wild pitch.

Pewaukee answered with two runs in the first and another four in the second.

The Indians scored their third run in the fifth on an RBI single by May.

The Indians had six hits but left 15 runners stranded.

"We just aren't getting the clutch hits," Gonring said.

On Tuesday, the Indians were down 12-9 to visiting New Holstein when the umpires called the game.

Schlice started and was rocked for 10 runs, all earned in 2 2/3s innings. The Huskies sent 12 to the plate in the top of the third when they scored six runs, making the score 10-0.

Devyn Zillmer was called on to throw the next 2 1/3 frames, giving up no runs and four hits. Zach Heberer pitched the last two innings and he gave up a pair of runs, only one of which was earned.

Down 12-7 going into the seventh, Kewaskum rallied for three runs on RBI singles by Dylan May and Schlosser and a bases-loaded walk to Bille Lehmann and Demmon up when the umpires made an incorrect call and signaled the game was over.

The freshman May was the offensive leader, going 3x5, with two RBIs. No other Indians team members had more than one hit.

Kewaskum, currently 2-3 in the EWC and 2-7 overall, had three games scheduled for this week.

Lots of positives in win over Cougars

Campbellsport had the upper hand over Kewaskum in football and basketball this year, but the evening of Monday June 9, the Indians won the first of three baseball games they will play against their rival Cougars.

Behind a solid pitching performance by Michael Prochnow, the clutch hitting of Devyn Zillmer, Dean Schlice and Prochnow and stellar defensive plays by Andy Pryor and Matt Ringwell, Kewaskum topped Campbellsport 8-3.

"We did some good things and we missed a few things," KHS coach Doug Gonring said afterward, looking for more consistency but pleased with improvement.

About the sophomore Prochnow, who gave up single runs in the first, fourth and sixth frames, and reliever Hunter Demmon, who finished the final 1 2/3s innings without any damage, Gonring said, "The pitching has kept us in most games this year," and he is confident that will continue.

Zillmer's bases-loaded single in the bottom of the first gave the Indians a lead they would not relinquish. Gonring credited Prochnow who collected a pair of runs batted in (RBIs) in the bottom of the sixth to put

the game out of reach.

Schlice also came through for the Indians in the third, delivering a triple to the gap in right-center, scoring Prochnow and Matt Hetebrueg, who hit back-to-back singles.

Prochnow appeared to be tiring in the sixth when he gave up singles to Al Zommers and Taylor Ramthun and walked Bennett Krueger to load the bases with one out. Gonring said he had been thinking he would take Prochnow out in the fifth, and "Then he had just six pitches in the fifth," so he let him start the sixth.

With Campbellsport threatening, Gonring brought in Hunter Demmon who got the next man, Jordan Muche, to line to Pryor at third. After snaring the ball, Pryor dove toward third, crawling part of the way, to double off Ramthun.

"That was a heads-up play," Gonring said. "His crawling antics were theatrical."

And then there was the catcher Ringwell, who threw out runners attempting to steal in the third and fourth innings and made one catch of a high pop up after it bounced off his glove not once but twice.

"Matty did a good job behind the plate again," Gonring said. "That has allowed us to put Deano (Schlice) in the outfield and it makes us stronger."

Prochnow got the win, giving up four hits and four walks with three strikeouts. Jordan Dreikosen took the loss, giving up eight hits while striking out 11 and walking six.

The win evens the Indians' record in the EWC at 2-2. Overall Kewaskum is 2-5. Campbellsport is 3-2 in EWC action.

One again the team was missing senior Brett Boegel, one of its best pitchers and hitters.

"He has elbow issues," Gonring said, indicating Boegel had a cortisone shot Friday and may be out for several weeks.

Writer's note: While Gonring was enjoying Monday's win, he was thinking back 21 years to the night when he had to miss the Kewaskum-Campbellsport game because his wife Karen was in labor. Gonring said he put Dave Donath in charge of the game, which was held at the old field behind the elementary school.

With no cell phones in those days, Gonring kept calling the (Scott) Thelens, who lived across the street, to find out how the game was going.

Karen Gonring safely gave birth to the couple's son, Tony and about the game?

"He (Donath) lost the game for us, 5-4," Gonring said kiddingly.
