

Reflections on more than 50 years of Kewaskum fireworks Kewaskum fireworks are on Tammy's mind

Toward the end of June, Tammy Love, 47, of Wauwatosa has one thought in mind -- heading to Kewaskum to meet other family members for the village-sponsored fireworks display. She along with many others more than double Kewaskum's population each and every July 3.

After all, this has been a family tradition for nearly five decades. Tammy's grandmother, the late Dorothy Diedrich, lived in Kewaskum near Riverhill Park. Tammy's parents, Theresa (Vorpahl) and Jerry Brockman, were also Kewaskum residents but moved to Milwaukee before Tammy was born.

However, her parents enjoyed Kewaskum's fireworks so much that they returned each July 3 to Riverhill Park with Tammy and her brother Tim

Brockman.

This year, the contingent headed for the fireworks includes: Tammy and her husband Joe and their sons, Anthony, 25 and Alex 16; Tammy's parents and her brother Tim with his wife Annie and their daughter Erin, 13.

They meet at the park between 6 and 6:30 p.m., then head for the firemen's food and beverage stands. "Mom loves the hamburgers with the fried onions," Tammy said. "So we get those and some drinks."

Tammy's brother seconded the motion. "My favorite part of the fireworks are the hamburgers," he said. "My record is six burgers. Quite often my eyes are bigger than my stomach, but the hamburgers are mouth-watering."

The family usually sat up on the hill. "But Mom can't walk up the hill any more, so we adapt. We sit in the

field near the church," Tammy said.

"We love Kewaskum's fireworks," she said regarding the display which members of the Kewaskum Fire Department ignite. "The fireworks are awesome!"

Her mother agreed. "It's been a family tradition," Theresa said. "We have come down there over 50 years. And we enjoy the fireworks. For a small town, the display they put on is just wonderful. We look forward every year to coming down there. We hope the fireworks continue for many, many more years."

In the 46 years Tammy has attended, the fireworks were rained out just once. She admits to being smitten with the event and related an incident to prove her passion.

"My kids have gone with us from little on," she said. "Alex was born on

SB approves administrative contracts

The Kewaskum Board of Education has approved administrative contracts for some new and not so new district employees at their June meeting.

Joel Dzedzic has been promoted to Director of Next Generation Learning. This new position with the district will have the Dzedzic investigating e-learning programs for the district as well as overseeing day to day operations at Wayne Elementary School and the multi-age classrooms. Additionally he will oversee the Charter School Planning Grant if the District is successful in receiving this competitive grant. His contract is for 220 working days with the district and will be paid \$73,334.

High school physical education teacher and Athletic Director Jason Piittmann will move from the classroom to the high school office to become the Dean of Student, serving both middle and high school students. He will continue his role as Athletic Director and will work 220 days for a combined salary of \$70,000. He will also continue as head football coach and receive the stipend he has in the past. The district is hoping Piittmann's new role will allow him to give mentorship and guidance to coaches in other sports in the district. He will also handle student disciplinary issues freeing up time for KMS principal Julie Skelton, KHS Associate Principal Kris Dreher, and KHS Principal Bill Loss to work on the teacher effectiveness project currently taking place.

Terri Miller, after running a successful food service department again in the district was awarded a contract

Off Shalom Drive in the town of Farmington, lays a winding, tree-lined driveway leading up to a quaint retreat anyone would enjoy to get away for a relaxing weekend close to home. Hidden Serenity Bed and Breakfast opened in October 2013 and offers visitors a variety of amenities and activities.

Sally and Chris Cochran built the home from scratch 17 years ago, but after an eight monthlong overseas trip, decided to pursue an old idea of opening a B&B. Farmington residents themselves, they desired to be more involved in their community.

"It's been fun seeing guests come through, and we get them to local businesses," Chris Cochran said. Visitors have come from all over including Missouri, Illinois, Maryland and Minnesota. "Bringing business to Kewaskum is one of our main focuses."

Sally explains guests have loved visiting places like The Candy Tree in Kewaskum and

Call of the Wild in St. Michaels.

The amount of visitors has been consistent and described as "not expected, but pleasantly surprised."

Visitors have commented that they love the trails, the simple decorating style, the relaxing atmosphere, the beds, the breakfast, and bathroom features like heated floors.

The house is very green. The wood floors and woodings are from trees from the property; all lighting is LED. Throughout the home are reclaimed items like fireplace mantles and lighting fixtures.

The Cochrans are proud that they used local contractors in making Hidden Serenity what it is today. Mike Nigh, a woods craftsman, provided high-end wood accents. Peter Herriges performed all the electrical work while Bob Ogi did much of the carpentry work. Tim Cochran, a relative, did all the tile work. Sinks and decorative tiles came from Silver Creek Pottery.

Large, tropical wood, hand-carved doors welcome guests into a large great room watched

over by a large giraffe statue that has also received it's fair share of comments. Inside guests have a billiard room, a quaint breakfast room with family wedding photos, and a vast library of books and DVDs.

Sally prepares a hot, home-style breakfast each morning for their guests. A Keurig coffee machine is available at all times for coffee, tea and cocoa.

Outside, the B&B offers guests access to 24 shared acres of peaceful private walking/snowshoeing trails, bird watching, tennis courts, hoop shooting, porches and a deck. The Cochrans also sell trail passes for those wishing to take advantage of the many state trails in the area.

"We love the Kettle Moraine, and we want to share this with other people, and bring people here," Sally Cochran said.

Complimentary Wi-Fi is available. Tastefully hidden televisions are in each room if a guest chooses to use them. "It's important to us to keep it simple, yet provide the creature comforts," Chris Cochran said.

Krystal Cochran, one of their four children home for a visit from Australia, jokingly talked about the unique items in the home. "That is what I find interesting," she said. "Everything has a story, about a person who had it, where it was, or the miracle of finding it."

Four rooms, all with private bathrooms are available and one suite has a Jacuzzi. There is also a spa room with two massage tables used for couple's treatments. Packages for spa treatments and anniversaries are available as well as a moun-

tain biking adventure. The Cochrans employ a local masseuse for their guests.

In the future, the couple is looking to hosting special events such as weddings, family gatherings and corporate retreats.

the 23rd of June. As soon as he was born, I asked the doctor, "Can we take him to the fireworks in Kewaskum?"

The doctor gave them permission. "We took Anthony and our daughter [the late] Ashleigh and Alex, but we had to leave early," Tammy said. "Alex was just 10 days old and was startled by the noise."

Tammy experiences nostalgia as she reflects upon the years gone by, recalling certain family members who were once part of the group but who have passed on. "It was so nice when we were with my grandma," she said. "But things change."

This year when Tammy learned of the construction underway along Main Street in the Village, she was concerned about how to access the fireworks display. So, she sent an email to The Statesman and was assured the fireworks would go on.

Due to construction this

year, attendees are being urged to park somewhere on State Highway 45 and walk the path to the park near the fire station and westbury bank. Another suggestion, posted on the Village of Kewaskum's website, recommends parking in the downtown area and walking up to the park.

The Kewaskum Fire Department will be selling food and refreshments, starting at 5 p.m., and music will be provided by "Itch." Popcorn, ice cream, soda, and water will be sold by the Kewaskum Kiwanis Club on top of the hill in the stand. Glow novelties including flashing necklaces, flashing swords and glow necklaces will for sale at the bottom of the hill by 6 p.m.

Tammy and crew are gearing up for another evening at the fireworks, enjoying the display and their hamburgers and making new memories.

Teen pop sensation Justin Bieber premiered his song "Baby" in 2010. Featuring a guest rap by Ludacris, "Baby" was Youtube's first smash-hit. It was the most viewed video in the online streaming service's six-year history (until being topped by the bizarre Korean import "Gangnam Style" in 2012). Bieber's song reached number one status in France and the UK.

As a single, it went triple-platinum in the United States, and sold tens of thousands of copies worldwide. For those who don't know, triple-platinum means it sold over 3,000,000 copies. This includes all legal purchases in physical format (compact disc) and digitally, as well as online streaming. On June 26, 2014, Bieber's song was downloaded the song illegally using the wireless Internet at the Kewaskum Public Library.

I know this because I received a copyright infringement notice from the Recording Industry Association of America (RIAA). This notice was forwarded to me from Charter, who we pay to provide access to high-speed Internet. In the email from the RIAA, I was reminded that the library is responsible for anything anyone does on our network. I was also reminded that repeat copyright infringement could result in "termination of service." I'd like to avoid this, since we provide free wireless service to over 500 users every month.

Libraries have a long and tangled relationship with copyright law. When photocopy machines became affordable and widely used, many predicted the end of publishing. Everyone could just copy any book they wanted. When audio and videotape dubbing became prominent, the same war cry was sounded. Digital files are even easier to copy than videos, and media providers fear that computer users will get so accustomed to sharing files that they will put artists (and the corporations who produce and distribute the art) out of business. For the longest time, this fear meant that publishers would not allow libraries to loan eBooks to our patrons.

Things have changed, of course. But they've also stayed the same. Justin Bieber sold over 4 million copies of the single "Baby". Because he is listed as a co-writer of the tune, every time it is played on the radio he also receives royalties. In spite of this, one person downloading one copy of the song from a small town in Wisconsin was enough to send in the industry lawyers with their threats. Regardless of how we feel about the Digital Millennium Copyright Act, or how little we know about it, that piece of legislation gave artists the right to demand remuneration from consumers who download files of their work.

Parents, please share this with your children—if you didn't purchase that book, game, music file, or video, no matter where you got it online, you most likely stole it. Even if you didn't mean to steal it. Even if you don't sell it or share it with anyone else. Even if you already own a copy that you bought. No

one is arguing that Justin Bieber will go hungry because someone in Kewaskum downloaded his song, but the law is the law. Don't ruin a public good for the sake of a 3MB pop song. Baby.





Fire destroys barn in Barton

Lightning may be to blame for a town of Barton barn fire early Monday morning, June 30, at 12:54 a.m. A barn and two outbuildings were completely destroyed in a calamity.

The Washington County Sheriff's Office as well as the West Bend Fire Department were dispatched to 3745 Beaver Dam Road. Upon the arrival of deputies, it was discovered a large wood barn was completely ablaze with the fire rapidly intensifying and spreading to two additional adjacent outbuildings.

The West Bend Fire Department requested assistance from the Fillmore, Jackson, Slinger, Kewaskum, Allenton, and Newburg Fire Departments to aid at the scene. The barn contained hay, tools, and several pieces of old farm machinery.

The fires did not affect the residence at the property. Beaver Dam Road between Wildwood Road and Kettle View Drive was closed for approximately four hours to facilitate firefighting operations.

The fire is being investigated by the Washington County

Sheriff's Office. The cause of fire is not known at this time however a neighbor witnessed a lightning strike in the general area. The barn, its contents and the two smaller outbuildings are considered a total loss, but no dollar estimates were available at press time. There were no injuries reported as a result of the incident.





Weather plays havoc with KHS baseball schedule

Thanks to the rain and wet field conditions, what was scheduled to be a three-game week turned out to be a one-game week for the Indians baseball team.

Kewaskum did get in their Friday (June 27) night's game at Sheboygan Falls and what a game it was, according to coach Doug Gonring.

"We played our best game of the year. It was a ballgame!" Gonring said Saturday while helping at the brat fry sponsored by the KHS baseball program.

No, Kewaskum did not beat Falls, but the Indians held the offensive-minded Falcons scoreless for the first four innings before falling 4-0. After this game, Kewaskum is currently 3-7 against EWC opponents and is 3-12 on the year.

"Michael Prochnow pitched very well," Gonring said about the sophomore right-hander, who had been out of action since June 12 when he sprained his thumb.

Prochnow put the side down in order in the bottom of the first and got the first two Falcon hitters to ground out in the bottom of the second when he later allowed a single and a walk before getting the third out on a pop out to short.

Prochnow faced just four

Falcons in the third, thanks to a 6 to 4 to 3 double play, and he was perfect in the fourth, getting three ground outs.

The situation looked bright in the fifth as Joe Van Engen and Ross Krist grounded out, then Prochnow got into a jam. Peterson and gave up a single to the number nine hitter, J. Roster, putting runners at first and second.

The top of Falls' order has been potent, and they were again in this situation with lead-off man, Nate Heili doubling home one run and Jake Wiesenthal following with an RBI single. Then another run scored on an error and cleanup man, Eric Klemme, singled home Wiesenthal for the fourth run.

Feeling Prochnow may be getting tired, Gonring called on Dylan May to pitch the sixth. "Dylan May did a nice job," Gonring said, noting the freshman right-hander got Bonner to strike out, issued a four-pitch walk to Van Engen but got Krist into a double play.

The problem for the Indians was getting base runners, specifically hits off starter and eventual winner, Nick Peterson, who struck out nine, walked three and only gave up one base hit, a single to Matt Hetebrueg, who hit a liner to right field, sending Brett Boegel (who walked) to second base.

The inning ended three pitches later when Peterson got

Dean Schlice to go down swinging.

No other Indians players reached second base the rest of the way as Peterson faced just 16 of the Indians players in the final five innings.

The June 24 game at New Holstein is re-scheduled for July 10, and the game versus Brookfield East will not be re-scheduled, Gonring said.

On Monday night, the Indians exploded for six runs in the first inning and four more in the fourth en route to a 12-1, five-inning victory over visiting Two Rivers. With the win, KHS improved to 4-7 and 4-12, while TR is 0-13 in EWC action.

Two-run doubles by Dean Schlice and May propelled the six-run rally in the first. Both young men ended up with two hits, while Hetebrueg stayed hot, going 3x3 with singles in the first, second and third frames. The Indians had 11 hits in the contest.

While the offense was being very productive, Devyn Zillmer was holding the Raiders at bay, limiting them to two hits and one more than four innings. Zillmer struck out three.

Sam Schlosser came in to finish up the fifth and gave up no runs and no hits.

The two teams had been scheduled to play a doubleheader, but the second game was postponed because of the weather.
