## Former KHS teacher made 36-year career in Kewaskum schools Esser is added to state FFA Hall of Fame

Even 24 years after he retired from Kewaskum High School and nearly seven years after his death, Roy Esser is still respected by those involved in the field of agriculture.

Just recently, Esser was posthumously inducted into the Wisconsin National FFA Organization Hall of Fame, an award created in 1995 to honor those individuals who made significant contributions to advance agriculture education and the FFA during their careers.

A committee made up of current Hall of Fame members, State FFA officers and the state staff selects Hall of

Fame inductees. Esser's wife, Dorothy, was notified of the award in April but was unable to attend the induction ceremony at the Alliant Energy Center in Madison because of health issues. Her family was represented by two of Esser's sisters, Jane Gurno and Carol Murphy.

The letter to Dorothy stated, "This recognition is the highest tribute the Wisconsin FFA Association can offer and is very well deserved. The tribute is given for many miles traveled, lives touched, hours provided, plus energy expended for the young people in FFA. Because of Roy's personal dedication, his influence has impacted the lives of numerous FFAers and agricultural educators at the state and

national levels."

"Hopefully I can make it next year," Dorothy Esser said, indicating the plaque with her husband's name and picture will remain on display in the main Agriculture building at UW-Madison.

"I couldn't believe it when they called me," Dorothy Esser said. "It's too bad he couldn't be here to see it."

Roy Esser would have been proud to receive the award. He would be very proud of his granddaughter, Erika, who works on a big farm in Crivitz. "She's all into farming. She followed in Roy's footsteps," Dorothy Esser said, indicating she will take Erika

## Changes coming for police dept

The leadership structure of the Kewaskum Police Department will soon change as the Village Board approved adding a Lieutenant position within the department. Last month, the board approved a measure to hire additional part-time officers to assist the department.

Police Chief Tom Bishop stated this is a new, non-union administrative position, not an addition to the department. The lieutenant would be second in command of the department and be appointed by and report to the Chief of Police. The candidate for the position would also need approval from the Police and Fire Commission.

The lieutenant would be chosen from a pool of candidates within the department. The candidate would be expected to spend equal administrative and patrol time. The candidate is expected to maintain an active on-call status and subject to calls for service anytime.

The candidate would be required to live within 15 miles of the village. The desired candidate would have a bachelor's degree from a four-year college or university with experience within the police department.

The salary for the position is \$62,058.88. Health insurance and retirement benefits are also included however the position is a salaried position, not eligible for overtime. The position will include standard vacation time and paid floating holidays.

Bishop states that he would have preferred to add a full-time position to the department to create this second in command position, and with the increase in drug and other issues

## WIAA takes a stand on contact in football practices

Beginning this year, full contact during football practices will be limited in the pre-season and the regular season, undoubtedly in an effort to minimize concussion injuries.

The WIAA Board of Controls took this giant step June 26 with the support of the Wisconsin Football Coaches Association, the Sports Medical Advisory Committee and the Executive Staff.

"It's not a surprise," Kewaskum football coach Jason Piittmann said last week about the move. "It's not going to dramatically alter what we do."

What was upsetting to Piittmann, however, was a lack of communication on the issue from the Coaches Association. "I was not happy our district rep did not keep us in the loop," he said, indicating he found out the matter was coming before the Board of Controls reading a story on his computer.

Since then, Piittmann said he has been in contact with his assistant coaches and coaches in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference on ideas for the implementation of the new rule.

In the past, players practiced the first three days in shorts and T-shirts and helmets and were allowed to wear shoulder pads the next couple of days. The new rule states during week one of practice,

only drill contact air, bags and wrap is allowed, and it is unlimited.

"Air" is defined as players running unopposed without bags or any opposition. "Bags" is an activity executed against a bag, a shield, or pad to allow for a soft-contact surface, with or without the resistance of a teammate or coach standing behind the bag, and wrap is drills run at full speed until contact, which is above the waist with the players remaining on their feet.

"Competition/full contact," defined as football drills or live game simulation where live action occurs — game speed where players execute full tackles at competitive pace, taking players to the ground, is not allowed the first week.

The second week it is allowed for 75 minutes, excluding the team's scrimmage and the third week and beyond, it will be limited to 60 minutes per week, excluding games.

"So we only get the opportunity for full pad contact four days before the scrimmage," Piittmann said.

When asked if he thought the new rule would affect tackling efficiency, Piittmann said, "I think it might early on," and continued it might have more of an impact on the younger programs where the players are just learning the fundamentals of tackling.

Concerning a drop in the

numbers going out for football at the high school level, Piittmann said, "I can't say exactly what it's been," going on that the Gridiron 5-8 program sees concussions as a reason players do not return to the sport, "but it's not one of the top two reasons."

Looking at the different divisions of football in the state, Piittmann said the new rules will have less of an impact on the larger schools who have large enough numbers they are able to two-platoon, play just offense or defense. "In the small schools, you need practice on both sides of the ball," he said.

While he did not have any specifics available, Piittmann said, "We get a handful (of concussions) each year. Fortunately, we haven't had many that were serious."

Players are given base-line concussion tests each year, and there is monitoring for those who do sustain concussions.

Concerning the question of monitoring the full contact drill time, Piittmann said, "It's going to be up to the schools to be honest," and he went on he plans to document in a more detailed manner the amount of time for full contact drills each day.

Kewaskum will open practice Aug. 5, a day after equipment is issued. The team opens its season at home with a non-conference game versus West Bend East.

## Changes underway at Kewaskum Public Library

Starting this summer, when you log into your Kewaskum Public Library account to place holds and search the catalog, you will see a number of changes.

After nearly eight years of collaboration, the Mid-Wisconsin Federated Library System (MWFLS) and the Lakeshores Library System are going their separate ways, and the SHARE catalog is disappearing along with their partnership.

The 27 libraries of Dodge, Jefferson, and Washington counties will continue to work together under the name TRIO. The new catalog will debut in November and will have the same excellent service and accessibility, but with a different look.

During the week of July 21, all Lakeshores Library items will become invisible to MWFLS customers. All holds currently placed on items will be honored, but no new holds will be allowed. Then, in October and November, the MWFLS libraries will migrate all of their information to a new platform. For Kewaskum users, this change will mean a smoother, more customized web catalog as well as easier access to digital books, audios, and streaming video.

he could use the additional officer; however with the current financial state of the village he has opted to wait a year or two to seek that approval

The department has started advertising for the position and hopes to have the candidate start in September.

The position received unanimous approval after a motion for adoption by Trustees Kevin Scheunemann and Dick Knoebel.

### Additional part-time officer to be hired

The board in June authorized Chief Bishop to hire one additional part-time officer to assist in covering patrol when only one officer is on duty. Additional part-time officers would be utilized when full-time officers are on vacation or extra patrol is needed.

Adding another officer would create three part-time officers in the department.

Bishop stated he would like to see the officer start with a minimum of 15 hours per month. Other part-time officers will also be required to work at least 15 hours per month to stay acclimated with things in the village. He believed the maximum for all three part-time officers would be 550 hours annually.

The budget for part-time officer help is and has been under budget the last few years. According to Bishop's figures, in 2013 \$10,900 was budgeted and \$5,124.15 was actually spent. He figured adding the third part-time officer would cost

\$9,080.50, \$2,459.50 still under the 2014 budget.

Adding the new officer would however incur one-time startup costs for the department of \$1,855.

"Right now part-timers only work to cover shifts, we're getting busier, calls are more complex lately and they take people off the road. We need more coverage on the road," Bishop said.

Knoebel stated while he

was chief, at one point there were seven part-time officers on the department

The measure was unanimously approved with Knoebel motioning for adoption and Jim Hovland seconding.

The part-time officer along with a replacement for full-time officer Chris Janich is expected to also start in September.

with her to next year's convention and induction.

"I had no idea it was so prestigious," Jane Gurno said of her brother's honor, explaining only three were inducted this year.

"It was wonderful. They treated us like royalty," Gurno went on, indicating there was a dinner for the recipients and their families, and then, the induction ceremony was held with 2,000 FFA students and advisors looking on.

Several others who knew Esser well or were colleagues of his echoed praise for the man who came to Kewaskum High School in 1960 after graduating from UW-River Falls in 1952 and spending several years teaching in Crivitz. He spent 29 years teaching and seven more in administration.

At KHS, he and the local FFA chapter completed much of the landscaping around the school grounds and established an outdoor classroom with a pond and wildlife habitat.

Esser also made lasting contributions to agriculture education, including his involvement in WAVAI (Wisconsin Association of Vocational Agri-

culture Institutions), the group that preceded the current state agriculture association.

"I had heard Roy was on the list this year," Dave Rizzardi said, indicating, "It's (Hall of Fame) a pretty respected group. They only take a few a year."

Rizzardi took Esser's place as head of the Agriculture Department several years after he moved into the position of vice principal at KHS.

"There were a few Ag teachers (right after Esser), but they didn't stay long," Rizzardi said, referring to Paul Redig, who moved on to take a similar position elsewhere and Gordon Darmody, who returned to full-time farming. Rizzardi and Darmody worked together for one year (1978-79), and when Darmody left, Rizzardi took the reins of the program, which he directed for the next 32 years.

"He (Esser) acted a lot like my mentor," Rizzardi said, adding, "He was trying to groom me like himself."

The late Jim Oelhafen was one of Esser's students and they remained lifelong friends. Jim Oelhafen also served as one of Esser's pallbearers, along with several of his former

students and past FFA presidents, including Ken Ramthun, Ken Pesch, Joe Enright, Dean Schmidt and Duke Schneider.

Carol Oelhafen said, "Jim's take on Roy was that he was very down to earth ... a very fair man" and "the type of guy who demanded respect."

"He was very proud of his boys," Carol Oelhafen went on. "Back then, there were no girls in Ag classes."

Carol Oelhafen recalls how Esser would offer an agriculture class for the area farmers. Her father-in-law, John, attended the classes, along with others like Howard Proeber and Harry Ramthun. She said the class offered instruction for the farmers along with a bit of socialization.

Former KHS principal Clark Pearson was Esser's boss, and then his colleague after Esser became the school's vice principal.

"Roy truly loved kids and education, and in particular, agriculture," Pearson, who worked with Esser approximately 20 years, said. "He always had the best interest of the students at the top of his list," Pearson went on. "His true love was FFA and Ag."



### Chili Lime Popcorn Snack Mix


Yield: 1 quart

### Blueberry & Pomegranate Power Bars

Yield: 12 bars

- 8 cups popped popcorn
- 1 1/2 cups old-fashioned rolled oats
- 1 cup dried blueberries
- 1/2 cup pomegranate seeds
- 1/2 cup toasted and coarsely chopped whole natural almonds
- 2/3 cup honey
- 2/3 cup light brown sugar
- 2 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 6 ounces melted bittersweet chocolate

Line 13-by-9-inch pan with foil; spray with cooking spray.

Combine popcorn, oats, blueberries, pomegranate seeds and almonds in large bowl.

Combine honey, brown sugar and butter in small saucepan. Cook over low heat to boiling; boil two minutes. Pour over popcorn mixture and mix thoroughly.

Using damp hands, press mixture firmly into prepared pan. Refrigerate until firm, about two hours. Cut into 12 bars.

Dip bottoms of bars into melted chocolate. Place on wax paper-lined pan. Store in tight covered container in refrigerator until ready to serve.

### Popcorn Trail Mix

Yield: 5 cups

- 1 quart popped popcorn (air popped)
- 6 ounces diced, dried fruit (apricots, apples, etc.)
- 8 ounces raisins

Place freshly popped popcorn in large bowl. Add diced fruit and raisins. Toss popcorn and fruit until combined thoroughly.

**Note:** Add whatever fixings your family enjoys: dried fruits, seeds, nuts, etc.

### Popcorn S'mores

Yield: 20 pieces

- 1 cup firmly packed light brown sugar
- 1/2 cup (1 stick) butter or margarine
- 1/2 cup corn syrup
- 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
- 10 cups freshly popped popcorn
- 1 package (10 1/2 ounces) miniature marshmallows
- 2 cups mini graham cookies (teddy bears)
- 1 cup chocolate chips

Combine brown sugar, butter and corn syrup in medium saucepan. Cook over high heat for five minutes; remove from heat and stir in baking soda.

Combine popcorn and marshmallows in large bowl. Pour sugar mixture over popcorn to coat.

Gently stir in graham cookies and chocolate chips.

Spread mixture evenly into greased 15-by-10-inch pan. Let cool completely, then break into pieces. Store in airtight container.







## Indians' win streak halted by New Holstein

When the number of hits in a baseball game are equal, miscues often decide which team leaves the field with the victory. That was the case last Thursday night when Kewaskum lost a 2-0 Eastern Wisconsin Conference game at New Holstein.

The Indians were stymied by the crest of a three-game win streak, hopeful it would stretch to four, when a wild pitch and two passed balls gave the hosts two runs, which was all Michael Voelker needed to post the win.

Voelker went all seven innings for the Huskies, striking out nine and giving up just two hits, a single to Bille Lehmann in the third and a single to Hunter Demmon in the fifth.

KHS sophomore Michael Prochnow matched the hit number, allowing just two hits, but in the second after a single and a walk, Prochnow let one pitch get away and catcher Dean Schlice had a pair of passed balls, giving New Holstein its two runs.

The Indians threatened in the second inning when Matt Heteburg and Schlice drew walks and Dylan May reached on an error to load the bases.

After Matt Ringwell struck out, Hetebrueg was thrown out attempting to steal home, and Voelker got Sam Schlosser to fly out to right for the third out.

With the win, New Holstein improved to 6-7 in league play while the Indians dropped to 6-8 in the EWC and 6-13 overall.

On July 1, the Indians swept a twin bill over visiting Kiel in

two contrasting games, a 2-1 pitchers' duel and a convincing 11-1 decision.

The wins moved the Indians ahead of Kiel in the EWC standings and into a tie for fourth place with New Holstein.

"It's going in the right direction," coach Doug Gonring said about the Indians' three-game win streak.

In game one, the freshman May went six innings, limited the Raiders to just one hit and picked up the win.

"Dylan May threw a real nice ballgame," Gonring said. "He gave up one (unearned) run in the top of the seventh ... Runs were hard to come by."

One of Kewaskum's runs was a homer by Demmon in the third. "It went right down the left field line, about 306 and one-half feet," Gonring said.

"Actually I didn't know it was over until I heard Doug and the crowd start cheering," Demmon said, indicating he wasn't watching the flight of the ball.

When asked how many homers KHS has this year, Demmon said, "That's the only one this year, so far."

Kewaskum got its second run in the fifth when Brett Boegel doubled home Schlosser, who had walked, stole second and advanced to third on a ground out.

Demmon started the second game for Kewaskum and unlike some of his other appearances, he got some early run support from his teammates, who scored five runs in the first two innings.

"He's been so unlucky," Gonring said about Demmon,

who pitched four innings, giving up just one hit, while striking out three and walking just one.

In the first, the Indians used a wild pitch, an error, a walk to Hetebrueg and a single by Ringwell to take a 4-0 lead.

"They threw the ball around a little more in the second game. They gave us some extra bases, and when you get extra bases, you can do more things," Gonring said, adding it was nice to see (Eric) Limberg come back from his Europe trip and get the game-winning hit. He put a good stroke on the ball."

Boegel went 2x2, with singles in the fourth and fifth frames. Demmon also had two hits in the victory.

Schlice pitched the final inning for the Indians, giving up the lone Raider run.

On July 2, Two Rivers drove to Kewaskum to try to get in the second game of its doubleheader, which had been rained out two days earlier. The rains came again, forcing a postponement of the contest to July 9.

The Indians were scheduled to play every night this week (July 7-11), ending the regular-season with a game at New Holstein this evening (July 10) and a nonconference home game versus Port Washington tomorrow.

At a recent coaches meeting, Kewaskum was awarded the seventh seed and will host number 10 Cedar Grove-Belgium Tuesday, July 15 at 5:30 p.m. The winner advances to play number two Sheboygan Falls Friday, July 18

## Long weekend of baseball provides a runner-up finish for A's

After winning five games in a row, including several come-from-behind victories, the Kewaskum Athletics could not win the championship of the SPAMtown tournament June 29, falling 4-2 to the Chaska (MN) Cubs in eight innings.

The A's scratched across a single run in the first inning on a two-out RBI single by Jason Strobel, and Brad Young, pitching in his second game of the day, made this lead hold up well into the sixth inning.

Young actually took a perfect game to the sixth, but a leadoff walk ended that. He still had the no-hitter intact with a runner on third and two outs, but a bunt single broke up the no-no. The following batter ripped a ball down the right-field line to tie the game at one apiece.
