## School tax rate projected to drop 50¢

Although final numbers aren't in, the Kewaskum School District budget is shaping up to be favorable for taxpayers.

While final numbers will not be available for several weeks, the school board approved a working budget at Monday's meeting.

There are still funds and funding to be added before the the August 25 budget hearing, but the overall working budget shows a decrease of about 1.2 percent, to \$22.865 million.

Equalized aid was more than expected, reducing the tax levy by 4.9 percent, or \$575,000, Business Manager Julie Thoreson said.

Kewaskum District Administrator

James Smasal said this was the first increase in equalized aid for the district in the past five years. That, combined with four years of budget reductions, should reduce the tax levy by nearly \$600,000.

The tax rate - not the mill rate - would be reduced from \$10.19 to \$9.69, District Business Manager Julie Thoreson said.

"That's good news," District President Troy Hanson said.

Better news yet - while the books are not closed on the 2013-14 budget, it appears the district will find itself with a surplus of \$200,000 to \$300,000, Smasal said.

It will still be another four to six weeks before numbers for that budget will be finalized.

Estimates of revenue limits and

equalized aid will be revised in October. Current budget estimates assume there will be no charter school or changes in open enrollment, equalized property valuation or change in membership.

Smasal said if the school does not receive a charter school grant for this year, it has been recommended the district put off launching the charter for a year and reapply for the grant. News on that grant should be received by the end of July.

Softening the blow of declining enrollment, revenue limits would be increased to \$75 per pupil, resulting in a \$143,000 decrease in revenue.

Smasal reminded the board that the number of school age children is declining, not only in Washington County, but statewide.



## Downtown to be light again

In a few weeks the lights on Main Street will shine again.

In April the primary power feed to the lights along the project route was accidentally cut, according to a notice posted on Kewaskum's village web site. Because of safety concerns the line needed to be de-energized. The line was a dedicated power source for the lights and the outage did not affect businesses or homes, Village Administrator Matt Heiser said.

Conduit and anchors for decorative and standard lighting on the north side of the Main Street project have been installed and it is expected that side of the roadway will be lit in the next few weeks, Heiser said.

Standard lighting will be installed east of the bridge and decorative lighting west of the bridge.

Once lights are assembled and energized on the north side, lighting will be installed on the south side of street.

There is no anticipated date for illumination of the south side of the road.



## Common core to be on Aug. agenda

Several community members voiced their opinions on Common Core during the public comment portion of the July 14 Kewaskum School District Board meeting.

"We all want what is best for our kids," said Nancy Harmon, a teacher who retired in 2007. "but I'm afraid our public schools are going to go down in flames."

She expressed concerns about the federal component that drives teacher evaluations.

Common Core has been defined as a set of federally defined standards that students need to master each year to be prepared for the next grade and ultimately, college or work.

Those that oppose the standards have said it is a federal takeover of education that is costly, intrusive and unconstitutional.

Former school board member Grace Mueller said she was disturbed by Common Core's intrusion into family rights where they pertain to education and the invasion of student privacy.

"We can adopt things from Common Core that are necessary," said Tanya Curtin, who urged the board to take "considerable action" against Common Core.

Karen Fehlhaber worried about the financial impact Common Core would have on the district, saying that federal support for the program will be gone by the end of 2014.

"They will be passing that cost on to us as state taxpayers," said Fehlhaber.

Although noted on the agenda, Board President Troy Hansen said Common Core will be discussed further at the August 11 school board meeting.

## School year to be four days shorter

Kewaskum students will find themselves attending fewer classes in 2014-15 due to new state legislation that prompted Kewaskum School Board members to adjust the school calendar at Monday's meeting.


The school year will end on June 5 instead of June 9, 2015. District Administrator James Smasal said the school year still has adequate hours for snow days without designating February 16 as a snow day as previously done and April 7, the Monday after Easter, will be a day off for students but may be used as a professional development day

for teachers.

The legislation altered the length of the school year from a required 180 days to hourly requirements - 1,050 hours for grades Kindergarten through sixth, 1,137 hours for grades seven to twelve and 1,127 hours for middle school students.

Smasal said student hours already exceed those numbers in all three categories, due in part to an adjustment made years ago, when students had early release times on Wednesdays. When that was done away with, it added hours to the school year without making adjustments to the 180-day requirement.

# Riffel is rewarded for a big soccer year

Slowly but surely, the Kewaskum's girls' soccer team is gaining ground on the perennial powers of the Eastern Wisconsin Conference.

The Indians finished the EWC campaign with a 5-5-2 mark, good for fourth place, and the goal margin versus the top three was better this year.

"We tied Falls this year. That was a first," coach Luke Piwoni said. "That was a nice step" after nine years of attempts.

The EWC coaches acknowledged the skill on the current team, selecting sophomore Jeray Riffel to the all-conference first team and the awarding honorable mention status to four others, junior Becca Strigenz, sophomores Madisyn Longdin and Kaila Kirst and freshman Molly Schultz.

Riffel was a marked woman after she started the season with a big scoring spree and ended with 19 goals and nine assists from her midfielder position.

"From day one as a freshman, she was a starter. She made second team last year," Piwoni said of Riffel. "It was good to see her take that step."

Riffel also earned an all-state nomination by virtue of her being one of the top three vote getters in the All-EWC selections.

The second half of the season, "She was the focus" of the other teams, according to Piwoni, who said Riffel shifted gears and was content to set up her teammates for scoring opportunities.

The Indians missed Riffel in the second half of their regional game against Campbellsport. An ankle injury sidelined her, and KHS wound up losing the game and thus ending their season.

Piwoni expects Riffel will get better and better in the next two years because his girls "were competing with their (other teams') seniors every day."

Longdin's performance improved this spring as she became a full time starter at forward, scoring eight goals for the Indians.

"She came up with some huge goals for us," Piwoni said, pointing to one versus Kiel "which propelled us to the win," and another against Campbellsport, leading to a victory.

About Strigenz, a midfielder, Piwoni said, "She was always in the right place at the right time ... She was always crashing hard on the goal."

Strigenz scored seven goals and added four assists.

"She played outside (forward), typically not a position where you get a lot of goals," Piwoni said.

Only a freshman, Schulteis moved into a starting role and played like a veteran in the mid-field, scoring seven goals and chipping in with eight assists.

"She has a strong leg, and she knows how to set up teammates," Piwoni said. "She's a

difference maker out there and the coaches realize that."

Kirst was the lone defender to obtain any recognition. From her sweeper position, "She's played almost every minute the last two seasons ... She's real tough," Piwoni said.

Knowing that you are the last defender puts a good deal of pressure on a sweeper and Piwoni said, "She's handled it exceptionally well. It was good to see her get recognized. She gives everyone else confidence."

The Indians moved up one spot in the standings from the 2013 season and finished 11-9-2 overall.

"I believe we took a step in the right direction," Piwoni said.

Champion Plymouth wound up with four girls on the first team and three on the second while EWC runner-up and Division 4 state runner-up New Holstein had three on each team.

**Moscato Meatball Skewers**

Prep time: 15 minutes  
Cook time: 30 minutes  
Servings: 32 meatballs

- 2 pounds bulk spicy Italian sausage
- 1/2 cup Gallo Family Vineyards Red Moscato
- 1 cup plain Greek yogurt
- 1/4 cup extra virgin olive oil

- 1 pound ripe strawberries, hulled
- 1 pinch of fine sea salt
- 8 fluid ounces Gallo Family Pink Moscato

**Creamy layer:**

- 1 can (14 ounce) sweetened condensed milk
- 1 1/2 cups half and half
- 1 cup heavy cream
- 1 tablespoon orange blossom water
- 1 pinch of fine sea salt

To make fruity layer, combine sugar and water in small saucepan. Heat over low, stirring until sugar dissolves. Remove from heat and let cool completely.

Add cooled syrup, strawberries and salt to jar of blender and puree until almost smooth, leaving bit of texture. Stir in pink moscato.

To make creamy layer, place everything into a 4-cup capacity measuring cup with a spout and whisk together until well combined.



To freeze, fill ice pop molds about one-fifth of way with either mixture (layers can be any size or amount you choose). Put in freezer until first layer is set enough to hold another layer, 60–90 minutes. Store mixtures in fridge between layers.

Remove and fill another one-fifth with opposite mixture. Return to freezer until layer is set. Repeat until molds are filled to top, adding ice pop sticks in once third layer is added (adjust to type of ice pop mold).

After final layer is added, freeze at least another 6–8 hours before serving. To serve, run bottom of molds under hot water for few seconds, or until able to pull ice pop free from mold. (If using paper cup, just peel cup away.)

**Note:** If you don't want layers, whisk mixtures together. You can also make each layer into its own ice pop, if you choose.



## Prochnow's 2-hitter highlights long week for Indians

The final week of the regular season produced enough wins for the Kewaskum Indians baseball team (8-16) to climb into fourth place in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference.

Back-to-back wins - Two Rivers (8-1) and New Holstein (2-0) gave the Indians a final 8-10 mark in EWC play. The victories came after a 6-1 loss to conference champion Plymouth and an 11-7 defeat at the hands of Campbellsport, which finished third in the conference at 12-5.

Four games is more than enough for a team to play in one week, but Kewaskum (8-16) had a fifth last Friday (July 11), a game that featured a valiant comeback by the Indians in the seventh inning only to fall short by a single run, 7-6, to nonconference foe Port Washington.

"We're there, but we're not," KHS coach Doug Gonring said about his team, which is still a bit inconsistent at times.

"Friday was Senior Night and I started all the seniors," Gonring said, but unfortunately his team got started on the wrong foot, giving up five runs in the first via a triple by Kiley Prellwitz, three singles and an error. The Indians certainly made the game very interesting in the seventh, when they sent 10 to the plate. They scored four runs, starting with a solo homer by Matt Hetebrueg before Pirate reliever Adian Woiciehowski got Hetebrueg to hit into a fielder's choice to end the game.

RBI singles by Hunter Demmon and Sam Schlosser had closed the gap to

just a single run after Hetebrueg led off the frame with his four-bagger over the fence in left field, the Indians' second home run of the season.

"We clawed back, and we clawed back. We did a lot of things right but we didn't finish it off," Gonring said.

Sean Haley got the win for the Pirates. He allowed five runs more than six innings, giving up seven hits, including two by Demmon who wielded a hot bat all week long. He was 8x15 with five runs scored in the five games.

"Has he improved," Gonring said of Demmon, who leads the Indians with 22 hits.

Demmon started and took the loss, lasting just two innings while allowing five runs.

Kewaskum scored its first two runs in the bottom of the third when Dean Schlice doubled in a pair of teammates.

Haley's double produced runs nos. six and seven for the Pirates in the sixth.

After Demmon left the mound, Devyn Zillmer pitched two scoreless innings and Schlosser didn't allow any runs when he took the mound for the fifth.

Gonring called on Zach Heberer to pitch the sixth but he lasted just one-third of an inning, giving up a one run on one hit, then Schlice went the rest of the way and gave up a single run.

Michael Prochnow turned in a pitching gem versus New Holstein, helping the Indians to finally get a victory over the Huskies this year. He gave up just two hits in seven innings, struck out three and walked one.

Prochnow never faced more than four batters in any inning, putting the side down in order in the first, fourth

and fifth frames and only one Husky, Nolan Beine, reached third after doubling in the fourth and going to third on a ground out.

Kewaskum had nine hits but managed just single runs in the fourth and seventh innings off Dominic Probst.

In the fourth, Schlice doubled in Demmon who led off the inning with a single.

Matt Ringwell smashed a one-out double in the seventh and sprinted home when Zillmer slapped a single up the middle.

"He threw real well that day," Gonring said of Prochnow, who had also thrown a two-hitter a week ago but lost the game.

When asked what was working for him, Prochnow said, "Just the location of pitches. I tried to keep the ball away from the middle of the plate ... and force ground balls and fly balls for my teammates. They had my back the whole game."

Prochnow, who threw 93 pitches, added, "It's my first seven-inning complete game of my high school career."

And was it satisfying to beat New Holstein? "Yeah, seeing we lost to them twice this year ... It felt good," Prochnow said.

### Kewaskum 8, Two Rivers 1 July 9

Gonring gave Heberer his first start, and he pitched four shutout innings to get the win. Heberer limited the Raiders to three hits. He walked one. Sawyer Schmidt and May also saw action in the decision.

The Indians notched 10 hits, including doubles by Ringwell, Prochnow, Brett Boegel and Ken Adamo. Derek

Schultz had an excellent night at the plate, going 2x4 with three runs batted in (RBIs).

### Kewaskum 7, Campbellsport 11 July 8

The visiting Cougars had one big inning to put themselves in the driver's seat. They scored six in the second and added three insurance runs in the seventh for the win.

The Indians came up with seven hits, including two by Boegel and two by Prochnow.

Kewaskum pushed four runs across the plate in the fourth to close the gap to 9-7 but went scoreless in the final three frames Jordan Dreikosen took over for starter and winner, Ty Schmidt and held the Indians to two hits in the final two innings.

Dylan May started for Kewaskum and did okay in the first inning, but the roof caved in on him in the second as he was tagged for six earned runs before giving way to Zillmer, who pitched one inning, giving up two hits and two runs. Demmon finished the final five and held the Cougars scoreless until the seventh when CHS scored three earned runs.

### Kewaskum 1, Plymouth 6 July 7

The Indians struggled just two hits off Zach Cain, who struck out seven and walked a pair in six innings of work. Clay Henning and Jake Richards finished up the final inning.

Demmon had both hits, singles in the first and sixth. Kewaskum got its run in the seventh on consecutive walks to Prochnow, Adamo and Schlice and an infield out by Zillmer.

Prochnow took the loss, giving up five runs, only three of them earned.
