Boegel will take his pitching skills to Murray State

Kewaskum High School ... Maple Woods Junior College ... Murray State University in Murray, Kentucky ... to be determined.

Brad Boegel, a 2012 graduate of Kewaskum High School, will soon begin the third leg of a journey he hopes will end with a shot at a major league baseball career.

Boegel recently accepted a full ride scholarship to pitch for NCAA-Division I Murray State University, after a successful run at Maple Woods Junior College in Kansas City, MO.

"I got calls right after the season. I was holding off for the best opportunity for me to play ... just the right fit for me," Boegel said Sunday evening

after watching a Pony League game in Kewaskum's Kiwanis Park.

Calls came in from the University of Pittsburg and Elan University in North Carolina.

"There were a lot of D-2 schools that called me," but the Murray State offer was the most appealing because of the opportunity to play at the D-1 level and to play under a head coach who is a pitching specialist.

"They (MS Racers) struggled this year," Boegel said. They just got a new coach (Kevin Moulder.) He was the pitching coach at St. Louis University."

The assistant coach at Maple Wood had contacted Moulder about Boegel.

"They also came to watch me in the regionals. They saw me and they liked me," Boegel said.

Maple Wood just missed advancing to the championship game of the regional after finishing just under .500 this spring, according to Boegel, who said he posted a 7-2 record and an earned run average (ERA) of 2.95. The 7-2 record was the best by any of the Maple Wood pitchers.

"I was the ace," Boegel said.

Moving from high school baseball — Boegel was a four-year letter winner and a three-time Eastern Wisconsin Conference MVP — to the college ranks was an adjustment, especially going from a small community like Beechwood to a metropolis like Kansas City.

"It was a challenge," Boegel said, but, "There were a good group of

Roger & Dan's enters new generation of ownership

A mainstay at what was once the village's most southern limits is marking a year under another generation of ownership as Dan Espen Jr. purchased the business from his father last July. Dan Jr. is the third owner of the business that began as Len & Rog Shell Service, 56 years ago.

The business began in the late 1950s. Roger Strack, now 82, of Kewaskum and the late Len Zuehlke were employed as auto technicians from 1956-58, at the former Vincent Motors Inc., located in Kewaskum. In 1958, Vincent declared bankruptcy.

Due to the bankruptcy, "Len and I were out of work and went looking around," Roger recalled. "There was a Shell Station open in Kewaskum on the corner of East Main Street and River View Drive."

Henry Dillinger, Jr. had operated the station from 1957-58, dealing in Shell products and offering auto service and repairs.

On May 5, 1958, Len and Roger leased the station and named their business -- a service station and auto repair shop -- Len and Rog Shell Service.

In 1963, Len and Roger, desiring more space for their business, purchased the former Lawrence Bohn Garage building, at 891 Fond du Lac Ave., Kewaskum, from the Bank of Kewaskum. Henry Timblin had formerly owned the building and used it to house the Timblin Milk Transport trucks. When Len and Roger purchased the building, Timblin moved his trucks into the building, which he purchased from Lawrence Galabinske, across the highway.

As for the Shell station that Len

and Roger vacated, Raynor Herriges, owner of Herriges Oil Co., took that over. Herriges Oil still operates in second-generation family ownership.

Len and Roger installed gas pumps on their newly acquired property, continued to handle Shell gas and products and offered a 24-hour towing service. In 1971, Len, then 52, contracted a cerebral hemorrhage and died.

"After that, I ran the business myself with my wife Cordell and changed the name to Roger's Service," Roger said. "It was getting harder to find good employees, and I was looking."

Roger met and hired his eventual business partner Dan Espen, Sr., now 61, and a West Bend resident while he was working for Lochen Ford in Newburg. A tool salesman introduced Dan Sr. to Roger, because the salesman knew Roger wanted to employ a new auto technician.

In 1978, Dan Sr. purchased ½ the business from Roger, and they changed the name to Roger & Dan's Auto Service Inc. A few years later, Dan Sr. purchased the other ½, and Roger continued working for him until his retirement March 6, 1990. Gas pumps were removed in 1985. Dan Sr., sold the business to his

son, Dan Espen, Jr., July 1, 2013. The business offers complete repair service, except for air conditioners, on both domestic and foreign vehicles.

Towing service is still offered, but only during business hours, which are 7 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday.

Dan Sr. continues to work part-time but will retire in October. He said he enjoyed dealing with customers and being his own boss. In his retirement, he plans to travel and to work on his classic cars.

Dan Jr., has no immediate plans to change the name of the business. Quinn Mueller, an auto technician at Roger & Dan's continues to provide his trademark honest approach in explaining required auto repairs to customers.

Dan Jr. is a 2004 West Bend West High School graduate, he earned an Associate of Arts degree as an auto technician from Moraine Park Technical College in Fond du Lac.

He began working at Roger & Dan's Auto Service in his

senior year of high school, doing safety inspections and light work. Dan Jr. currently completes ongoing seminars in his line of work.

Keeping up with the latest technology is a challenge, he admitted, and equipment is expensive. "A scan tool for on-board diagnostics [OBD tool] costs between \$3,000 and \$4,000," he said.

He believes what makes the business unique is this. "It has been locally owned and operated since 1958," Dan Jr. said. "It

would not have lasted this long, if the owners were not doing things right."

Dan Jr. is looking forward to a milestone in his life. In January 2015, he will be married to Caitlin Van Wormer, an Adell resident and 2007 Kewaskum High School graduate.

Dan Sr.'s passion for cars remained steadfast since then. He currently owns 16 classic automobiles.

guys there. I made friends quickly."

The first year at Maple Wood Boegel not only pitched but also was a position player because in high school, he was a power hitter. Sophomore year that changed when he decided to specialize because his best opportunity is pitching.

Concerning which of his pitches improved the most in his two years of junior college, Boegel said, "I would say my off speed pitches. Both my change-up and curveball have developed."

Boegel is 6-feet, 5 inches and currently weighs 225 pounds.

"I've been lifting and trying to get my weight up," he said, and of course, he is playing a lot of baseball this summer for the Kewaskum Athletics in the Rock River - North and Tri County Nite Leagues.

Boegel was not certain Sunday when he is to report to Murray State.

"The coach is calling me to-

morrow with more details," he said.

What he does know is his scholarship is worth \$20,000 per year for out-of-state tuition and another \$1,000 for room and board, books and supplies.

Murray State competes in the Ohio Valley Conference, with schools like Eastern Illinois, Tennessee State, Tennessee Tech, Eastern Kentucky and Austin Peay State University so Boegel will obviously get to see more of the United States over the next two years.

Boegel also has the assurance he will be competing for a spot on the Racer's starting rotation.

"Fall (practice) is to see if you play in spring, but they're bringing me in to be a starter on the pitching staff," he said, indicating his goals for 2015, which will be his junior season, are to make the starting rotation and, "to win more than five games is probably a goal."

Having Mulder as his coach is a plus, according to Boegel, who said, "He's gotten a lot of guys drafted out of St. Louis."

Boegel, who is majoring in business marketing, with a minor in education, started playing baseball when he was

four or five years old. He played Little League with Beechwood, then played Pony League ball in Kewaskum before going to high school where he was coached by Doug Gonring, who is understandably excited about seeing one of his players go to a D-1 school.

"Now he's got to work hard. He's got 730 days to work hard and make a name for himself," Gonring said.

The KHS head coach went on to reveal he doesn't know much about Murray State, but said, "They play D-1, and they wanted him. It's a good move for Brad."

While Boegel is fairly well convinced he just wants to pitch, Gonring said, "I hope they give him a chance to hit. He reminds me a lot of Mike Mueller (West Bend East standout) who could pitch and help the offense with his bat."

"In his time he's the best guy we had (at Kewaskum)," Gonring said. "When we had him, he was a very special ball player."

Writer's note: Boegel may be the first Kewaskum High School athlete to receive a D-1 baseball scholarship.

Library program keeps kids reading over summer

Kids who read for fun during the summer come back to school in the fall more prepared to learn than kids who do not read. Test scores are higher, their concentration is better, and they have an easier time adjusting back to the school environment.

The Kewaskum Public Library has been promoting summer reading for decades, helping generations of kids find great books that keep their brains exercised during the summer months.

The fun starts in May when librarians visit area schools to talk about the upcoming program. In June, children can sign up and receive a reading folder to keep track of the number of pages they read. Each week, if the children read 100 pages, they can bring their folder in and get a unique prize (and a chance to dig around in the treasure box for something fun).

Prizes are donated by different organizations from Pizza Hut to the Milwaukee Public Museum to Old World Wisconsin. These generous incentives are supplemented with prizes purchased by the library with funds donated by local service groups like the Kewaskum Women's Club. In addition to the weekly prize giveaways, the library hosts events until the end of July.

This year, more than 200

kids signed up for the summer program and events were attended by dozens of kids and families each week.

On July 25 the program ends with a picnic at Kiwanis Park. Everyone is invited, but attendees must sign up at the library.

"We'll also be drawing names for a chance to win four

free Brewers tickets and a family pass to Discovery World Museum," Library Director Steev Baker said.

January 31, 1964

The Kewaskum Fire Department was called to the Johnson Tool and Engineering Company plant on the Kewaskum hill at 11:40 am Tuesday to extinguish a blaze. The fire is believed to have been caused by an overheated motor on the stroker in the plant and ignited paper and rubbish around the furnace. This is the first fire call for the local department since last November 9, a period of over 2-1/2 months. This is a very good record for the community especially in the winter heating months.

Mrs. Jack Tessar of Kewaskum, National Flag Bearer Ladies Auxiliary to the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the U.S., will be in Washington D.C. February 3-5 to take part in the 1964 Women's Forum on National Security.

Building permits issued during the past few months by the village included three for new homes in Kewaskum and one for a \$250,000 addition

to the Kewaskum Elementary School. Permits issued for new buildings were as follows: September 5 - Gustav Werner, new home; October 18 and November 15 - Marvin Kuehl, new homes in Roseland Hills.





Indians miss golden opportunity, lose to Sheboygan Falls

SHEBOYGAN FALLS — If certainly could qualify as an “if only” game.

If only Kewaskum could have capitalized on its bases-loaded start in the first inning and if only Michael Prochnow would have pitched like he did in his last outing against Sheboygan Falls.

Unfortunately neither happened Friday, July 18 for the Indians, who were shut out until the seventh inning and ended up losing to the number two-seeded Falcons, 7-2. The loss ended their season at 9-17.

The situation in second-round tournament action certainly looked promising early, as leadoff man Brett Boegel stroked a single against SF pitcher, Nick Peterson.

Hunter Demmon fouled off three straight pitches, then took three balls and fouled off two more before drawing a walk and when Eric Klemme booted a ball hit to third by Prochnow, the bases were loaded with no outs.

Peterson got out of the jam by getting Matt Hetebrueg to hit into a fielder’s choice, erasing Boegel at home and striking out the next two Indians batters, Dean Schlice and Dylan May.

“That’s about the fifth time this year,” KHS coach Doug Gonring said about having the bases loaded and not scoring. “All we had to do was put the ball in play.”

The Falcons also started fast and capitalized on the opportunity, scoring four runs in their half of the first. Prochnow hit Nate Heili, then Jake Wiesenthal reached on a bunt that was bobbled by Prochnow, allowing both runners to reach safely. Joe Van Engen followed with a single to left, which got by Deyvn Zillmer, allowing two runs to score. Klemme followed with an RBI triple, and he scored on a ground out.

“You can’t give up four runs in the first inning,” Gonring said about falling behind early.

Kewaskum needed runs quickly to get back in the game but Peterson would have none of it, facing just four batters in the second and four in the third when he struck out the side, two after Prochnow reached on an infield single.

The Falcons added single runs in the second, third and fourth frames, the run in the second was unearned and the Indians helped Prochnow out with a 1-to-6-to-3 double play to end the inning.

After Mike Bonner doubled and

Peterson blooped a single to left in the third, Prochnow walked two, forcing in a run, and Gonring decided it was time for a change. Zillmer came in to pitch and got Josh Roster to hit into a double play, which Boegel started by stepping on second and then throwing to first to end the inning.

Zillmer gave up a single run in the third, then Gonring had Sammy Schlosser pitch the fifth and Zach Heberer the sixth after Schlosser gave up back-to-back singles.

“I pitched all sophomores. The future looks bright for the team going forward,” Gonring said.

Gonring started moving in his reserves in the latter innings and they helped produce the two Kewaskum runs. Eric Limberg’s single up the middle drove in Matt Ringwell, who had doubled to right and after a Falcon error in the outfield, Demmon’s single to right brought Limberg in.

The difference in the game, according to Gonring, was execution and mental toughness.

“They executed, and we didn’t,” he said. “It comes down to execution in the game of baseball and we didn’t.”

“We’ve just got to get a little stronger (mentally),” Gonring went on, pointing to a statement recently made by Yankee great Derek Jeter that baseball players don’t necessarily need outstanding physical talent but they do need to play intelligently.

Sheboygan Falls, 21-6, was scheduled to play Campbellsport in sectional action July 21, while Plymouth drew Howards Grove, which nipped New Holstein 1-0. The winners of those games were to play to determine which would advance to the WIAA State Tournament July 25.

Wednesday’s game against Cedar Grove-Belgium was a pitchers’ duel for the first four innings between Demmon and Justin Obbink.

The Rockets broke the 0-0 tie with a run in the fourth on a two-out, RBI single by Justin Thuene.

The Indians got a critical second out when Dean Schlice fired a bullet to Boegel at second to pick off Brett Michaels just before Thuene’s hit. Demmon struck out Brett Simmelink.

Time was running out on the Indians and they came to life in the fifth,

scoring a pair of runs on a walk to Ringwell, who was moved to second on a bunt and scored on a double by the junior Bille Lehmann, who came home on a triple to deep center by Boegel.

Boegel came through again in the bottom of the sixth when he singled in two runs for a 6-1 advantage. Earlier in the frame Ringwell’s bases-loaded up the middle had pushed the score to 4-1.

Gonring called on Schlosser to pitch the seventh and he made quick work of the Rockets, striking out the first hitter and then got the last two outs on fly balls to Prochnow in right, including a fine running catch for the last out.

Gonring called Demmon’s mound effort “fabulous,” especially considering he went to the three-ball count just once in the game and he praised his seniors for coming through at the end.

Boegel, who went 2x3 with three RBI, said he certainly did not want to see the season end, so when he saw the fastball from Obbink in the fifth, he smashed it.

“It felt good to actually hit the ball hard,” Boegel said. “If felt good to get a solid victory, too.”
