Dogs' lamb marks record high \$20 per pound

Livestock auction brings in nearly \$250,000

Bidders at the Washington County Fair Livestock Sale July 24 brought in a record amount - roughly \$249,000 in total gross dollars.

"I don't know why we got the prices we did. The economy is not up where it's supposed to be and the cost of feed is up, but we had an exceptional sale," sale committee chair Jim Hawig said.

Contributing to the difference was that there were five more beef animals in this year's sale and the average price moved up from \$2.37 to \$2.80 per pound, according to University of Wisconsin - Extension Farm

Business Educator Alan Linnebur.

In the beef category, a top price of \$5.50 was paid for Wayne Crusader Mitchell Weir's blue ribbon animal, which was bought by Prime Resins.

Thursday morning's judging for grand champion dairy beef steer came down to Cody Oelhafen and Wayne Crusaders 4H member Emily Kluever.

For the second time in two years, Oelhafen, a member of Kewaskum FFA came out on top and Kluever's steer earned the title of reserve champion.

Oelhafen said the money his animal raised will go toward his college fund.

Oelhafen, who joined the FFA

last year, will enter Kewaskum High School as a freshman this year. He started in 4H with the Wayne Crusaders and has been in the 4H beef project since he was 9 years old.

While lamb prices averaged \$6.08 per pound, Mikayla Dogs' champion lamb brought in a record high price - \$20 per pound from Jonco Industries. Dogs is a member of the Kewaskum 4H Club.

Brittany Wenzlaff, a member of the Kewaskum FFA and Wayne Crusaders had two market lambs in the sale.

Showing under the Crusaders banner earlier in the day, her lambs earned white and pink ribbons and

Kewaskum Theatre goes Big this summer

Final rehearsals are now underway for The Kewaskum Theatre Company's production of "BIG! The Musical."

The production will be presented Friday, Aug. 1, Saturday, Aug. 2 and Sunday, Aug. 3 in the Kewaskum Theatre. Directed with exuberance and style by LoraJo Christie Schneider, Lindsay and Andrew Dahlberg, "BIG! The Musical" is a lively musical version of the 1987 film comedy that starred Tom Hanks.

"BIG! The Musical" tells the fast-paced tale of what happens when 13-year-old Josh Baskin (portrayed by a central figure in the Kewaskum Theatre, Alek Gerhartz) wishes that he was big. All manner of chaos breaks loose the next morning when he awakens to find that his wish has indeed come true.

Feeling like a child but looking like an adult, big Josh (as embodied with boundless energy and humor by Zack Janz) attempts to make his way through the staid adult world as a wunderkind employee of Macmillan Toys, teaching the buttoned-down employees and Mr. Macmillan himself (played with knowing charm by Dan Gerhartz) how to enjoy life and to actually have fun while doing so.

Along the way, big-Josh encounters the myriad challenges of the adult world during the colorful 1980s - including being swept off his now-grown-up feet by a lovely fellow employee, Susan Lawrence (Valerie Paulus in a triumphant return to the Kewaskum musical stage) who finds Josh's childlike antics to be as endearing as they are perplexing - much to the chagrin of her boyfriend, Paul (played with erudite menace by Brad Fechter.)

"BIG! The Musical" is filled with memorable featured performances including Washington County favorite Danielle Werner as Josh's peripatetic



West Bend Police are investigating bomb threats made to two businesses in the city. Both threats were unfounded.

According to a release from the West Bend Police Department, officers responded Friday, July 25, about 4:00 p.m., to Walgreens at 1720 W. Washington St. after a store clerk received a threatening phone call indicating that an explosive device was placed in the store. The caller said there was another explosive device across the street in the Fleet Farm Store, 1637 W. Washington St.

Both Walgreens and Fleet Farm were evacuated and searched but no devices were found. Both stores re-opened for business about 30 minutes later.

The Plymouth Police Department is investigating a similar incident at a Walgreens in their city, which occurred about 30 minutes prior to the call to the West Bend Walgreens. West Bend Police are working with the Plymouth Police Department and continuing their investigation to identify the source of this threat.


The winner will be chosen by a panel of judges that includes UW-WC faculty, staff and Foundation members.





Dressed in his best, Tyler Hetebrueg led Dustin Melius' cow around the show ring during the Dairy Futurity competition at Washington County Fair Park Saturday night, earning first place.

In a few years the Kewaskum FFA member is hoping to take the prize home with his own cow.

While fans in t-shirts and jeans listened to Blood, Sweat and Tears, there was a touch of glamour in the dairy barn, where formally dressed handlers readied for the show.

In his rented white tux, Mark Schaefer, West Bend, took home the best-dressed award.

"I told my mom 'you might as well buy it - its white and it will be all dirty after tonight,'" Schaefer said.

This was the last year of junior showing for Hetebrueg, who is studying dairy science at the University of Wisconsin - River Falls.

Hetebrueg has won awards for herdsmanship for the past five years and his cow Dixie came in second for purebred calf - the only dairy calf from the Kewaskum area shown at this year's fair.

When the cow became

skittish, Hetebrueg was masterful in his control of the animal.

He explained that entering a calf in the futurity is a two-year process.

"I had one signed up in the past but this is my first time showing (in the Futurity)," Hetebrueg said.

Carl Schwendimann, a member of the Dairy Futurity Committee for Washington, Ozaukee and Waukesha counties said 45 animals were registered in 2012. Of that, 17 were shown Saturday.

"You're playing a guessing game," Hetebrueg said.

Mike Schoessow, Mequon, said "promise and pedi-

gree," were two factors he considered in his choice of calf.

"You look at how they're growing," said Schaefer, who was showing an animal from his family's Running Creek Farm.

Melanie Hoffmann, who also showed for Melius Farms in Jackson, picked out her cow as a calf two years ago, paying special attention that the hock and hip bones were level that


the animal's legs tended toward being straight, looking for a well-formed udder and an animal that was "not too fat or too thin."

"It's usually about appearance," Hoffmann said.

"A lot of those things won't change much when they're a cow," said Brandon Strupp, a Hi Lite Happy Worker 4H member from the town of Hartford.



for showmanship, Wenzlaff got a red ribbon.

Wenzlaff, who has been showing for the past five years and will be going into eighth grade at Kewaskum Middle School, said she learns something new during fair competition every year, but this year she credits her red ribbon to her attendance at show camp at Wisconsin State Fair Park.

"While I was in the ring, I remembered how they taught me to set up my lamb," Wenzlaff said.

Wenzlaff said most of the

ican Metal and Paper.


Swine judging was missing one component this year - rate of gain (ROG) awards for swine.

"We did not want to bring the animals together and then have them go back home," Linnebur said.


Swine that were shown this year were also sent directly from the fair to processors.



Boegel, Demmon named to second all-conference team

The baseball coaches in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference were certainly impressed with many of the players on the Plymouth High team ... enough to select six of them to the all-conference first team, five of them unanimously.

In the balloting that took place recently, catcher Luke Held, infielders Clay Henning and Jake Richards, outfielder Tyler Willeford and utility player Zac Cain were all unanimous picks.

Cain also shared Player of the Year honors with Nate Heili of Sheboygan Falls, a unanimous choice in the infield. Cain batted a sparkling .782 (30 hits in 55 trips to the plate with 33 RBIs), while Heili batted .643 (26x56, with 17 runs scored and 14 RBIs). Cain also finished with a perfect 7-0 pitching record and posted an impressive 0.36 earned run average (ERA).

The Panthers won the EWC title this summer with a 17-1 mark. Their try for perfection ended July 1 when they lost to Sheboygan Falls 5-1.

For the first time in at least seven years, Kewaskum did not have a single player on the first team. Senior Brett Boegel, who missed a couple of weeks of action early in the season with an elbow injury, was selected to the second team as an infielder. In 2013 he was a first team pick as the utility player.

Joining Boegel on the second unit was junior Hunter Demmon. Demmon pitched and played the infield for the Indians and was selected for the honor as an infielder.

Boegel, a four-year letter winner, "was on some really, really good teams his first two years," KHS coach Doug Gonring said. "He struggled early with the injury, but he came back strong."

In 13 conference games, Boegel batted .375 in the conference, going 13x40 with a pair of doubles and six RBIs.

"He really solidified the

middle (of the defense) with Sammy (Schlosser, second baseman)," Gonring said about Boegel's play at shortstop.

"We missed his arm on the mound. He would have really helped us," Gonring went on, referring to the elbow problem that prevented Boegel from being in the pitching rotation this season. Boegel pitched just once and took the loss.

"He came on really strong. He stroked the ball really well," Gonring said of Demmon, who batted .397 in 18 EWC games, with 19 hits in 58 plate appearances. He had one double, one run home run and nine RBIs.

Early in the year he played several positions, then settled in at third base when he wasn't pitching.

"It was nice for Hunter to get that recognition," Gonring said. "We'll be looking for a lot from Hunter next year."

Gonring also challenged his younger players to dedicate themselves in the off season.

"They've got to dream and imagine and work hard," he said, indicating he hopes those who will be returning will see what happened this year and work to move forward.

Thirteen players were selected to the first team, including two pitchers, four outfielders and five infielders. After Plymouth's six on the first team — the Panthers also has one more on the second — runner-up Sheboygan Falls had five honored, three on the first team and two on the second. Campbellsport, which placed third, landed junior pitcher Jordan Dreikosen and freshman outfielder Austin Narges on the first team and senior infielder Taylor Ramthun and senior outfielder Sean Mossberg on the second.

75 Years Ago

IGA 10 ounce can of tomato soup was priced at 2 for 9¢; 13 ounce box of corn flakes was 9¢; a three pound bag of Red A Coffee was priced at 39¢ (that one hurts!), and a five pound pail of Broadway corn syrup was 29¢.

January 20, 1939

Friday the thirteenth was an unlucky day for two truck drivers last Friday. At about 3:30 p.m. that day a truck owned by the Kays Wholesale Distributors of Stevens Point ran off Highway 45-55 and tipped over in the swamp about two and one-half miles south of Kewaskum, known as the Kewaskum Techtmann swamp. The accident occurred when the driver lost control of the truck. Enroute from Milwaukee to Stevens Point with a load of beer, much of the beer was destroyed in the accident. The bottled and keg beer from the Schlitz Brewery, Milwaukee, with which the truck was loaded, was dumped into the water in the ditch along the road at the scene and bottles were scattered all about the place. Most of the beer was recovered by people on the scene who had free beer for the afternoon and took more along home in their cars (who has not dreamt of this?), so that there

was little left to be taken to the final destination.

Mrs. Barton Fink of Fond du Lac, and Charles Seefeld of Eden, among the oldest twins in the country, who are former residents of Kewaskum, entertained at a family dinner Monday evening, January 9 at the Fink home in celebration of their 82nd birthday anniversary.

The St. Lucas Congregation, Kewaskum, observed a unique celebration, the 25th anniversary of the Conrad Bier as president of the congregation. A special service was conducted to honor Mr. Bier.

John A. Wetzig, age 63, a popular and one of the most respected residents of this village, passed away January 18 at St. Elizabeth's Hospital in Appleton. John went to the hospital last week and underwent major surgery. Mr. Wetzig rallied and was well on the road to recovery when death resulted from another cause, uremic poisoning. A lifelong resident of Kewaskum, Mr. Wetzig never married. Mr. Wetzig was one of the oldest employees of the L. Rosenheimer Store in Kewaskum which firm he had served for nearly 50 years.

100 Years Ago

December 27, 1913

Tom Andrews, aged 23 years, a pipe layer, was crushed to death at Horicon last Friday when a cave in occurred while he was laying pipe down a depth of 19 feet. It required several hours of hard labor to recover the body, several tons of ground having fallen on him.



3. The installation of the Village utilities and Hwy 45 intersection are completed for the Main Street project. The next step in the project is curb and gutter and then the underground wiring.

4. Reported the public hearing to extend the impact fee moratorium is scheduled for July 7, 2014. Direction was to have Attorney Tim Fenner talk about establishing connection fees at the June 23, 2014 Special Board Meeting.

5. Direction from the Board was to introduce an ordinance for property maintenance. The ordinance should shorten the number of days to comply from 10 to 5 days, allow citations to be issued and require debris from long grass to be removed.

SPECIAL VILLAGE BOARD MEETING JUNE 23, 2014 7:00 P.M.

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, met in Special Session in the Council Room of

the Municipal Building, 204 First Street.

President Andy Pesch presided and called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. Board members present were Richard Laubach, Richard Knoebel, Dave Zehren, Andy Pesch, Dave Spenner, Kevin Scheunemann and Jim Hovland. Staff members present were Matt Heiser, Chad Cook, Stephanie Justmann, Attorney Timothy Fenner from Axley Brynelson, LLP and Jim Mann from Ehlers Associates. Members from the community were also present.

Notice of the meeting had been posted at the PNC Bank, Kewaskum Post Office, and at the Municipal Building on June 19, 2014. Notice was also forwarded to the Village Board, Village Attorney, Village Engineer and the News Media.

Administrator Heiser reported on the request to establish connection fees for water and sewer accounts and eliminate impact fees. A public hearing is scheduled for July 7, 2014 to possibly extend the impact fee moratorium for another year and in the meantime period review the idea of establishing connection fees. Attorney Tim Fenner reported sewer connection fees can be created but he did not recommend creating a water connection fee. The connection fees need to be reasonable and capricious and not arbitrary. The connection fee can be established by using the cost of the Waste Water Treatment Plant upgrade divided by the number of extended users or can be established by excess debt capacity. Park fees can be established either by park land dedication according to §236 of the Wisconsin State Statutes or a fee in lieu of land dedication.

Jim Mann from Ehlers Associates reported on the new options for creating Utility District #3 and Utility District #4. Creating a utility district is a way to generate revenue to cover the debt repayment for the TID#2 instead of it being paid by the tax levy.

Currently - the Status Quo is the general levy supporting the TID #2 shortfall at 100%: a vacant lot in UD#3 contributes \$17.93, a \$200,000 home in the village contributes \$119.54 and the UD#4 pays \$17.93.

Option 1 - creates a UD#3 to cover the short-fall in the TID#2 less \$68,500 to be covered by the levy and the levy would cover the non-TID storm water: a vacant lot in UD#3 contributes \$423.11, \$200,000 home in the village contributes \$72.18 and the UD#4 contributes \$10.83.

Option 2 - creates a UD#3 to cover the shortfall less \$68,500 of levy support and create UD#4 to cover undeveloped lots for non-TID storm water with the remaining non-TID storm water to be paid by the tax levy: vacant lot in UD#3 contributes \$423.11, \$200,000 home in the village contributes \$62.29 and the UD#4 contributes \$430.54.

These figures are for the first year and increase according to the TID#2 debt repayment schedule. Consensus of the board was to offset the general fund first with the additional increment from the TID #2. Adoption of the preliminary resolution will schedule the date for a public hearing and then the final resolution would need to be adopted.






