## World Trade Center steel arrives in Kewaskum



A steel portion and an I-beam from the World Trade Center has arrived in Kewaskum. The Kewaskum Area Arts Council is currently working on collection donations to construct a memorial in honor of 9/11.

Quietly Sunday morning, August 2, a portion of an I-beam from the north tower of the World Trade Center arrived in Kewaskum. The lonely piece of steel is a memorail for the community to remember one of their own fallen in the attacks of September 11, 2001.

Andrea Lyn Haberman, daughter of Gordon and Kathy Haberman of Farmington and a 1994 Kewaskum High School graduate, was in the north tower. She was attending a business meeting for her employer at the World Trade Center when the building fell under attack.

The Kewaskum Area Arts Council began the process of obtaining a piece of the World Trade Center in

2010. Three years later, Larry Ammel, president of the organization and a former teacher of Andrea's, was notified that an I-beam from one of the load bearing portions of the structure would be given as part of a memorial to the Haberman family.

The steel was picked up in Ohio by Gordon Haberman and Jerry Gosa last weekend and brought to Kewaskum. Officer Mark Steiner of the Kewaskum Police Department was on patrol and met Haberman and Gosa at the village limits and escorted the steel to it's present home in front of the Kewaskum Fire Department.

Ammel says the steel will remain on the ground in front of the fire station until arrangements can be made

for a permanent display. Plans are underway to erect a memorial where the steel is located. The Arts Council is seeking donations for such a memorial.

Haberman said seeing the steel is very moving.

"I'm glad it's in Kewaskum, I've seen some designs (for the memorial) and I hope the community embraces the planned memorial, once it's picked out."

## "Sweep" helps Goeden add to his points lead

If he is dreaming, Donny Goeden doesn't want to wake up, at least not until mid-September when the dirt-track racing season has concluded in Plymouth and he has the 360 Sprint Car title for 2014 safely in his pocket.

Goeden is currently leading the 360 standings. He surpassed the 1,000-point mark (1,011) last Saturday night when he posted his second clean sweep of the season and captured his fifth feature victory of 2014, also going back-to-back for the second time.

Along with his five wins, Goeden finished second twice and his other two finishes are a fourth and a seventh. One second could have easily been a sixth win as Goeden made a bold move on the final lap of the July 5 main event, only to lose some of his acceleration in the final turn because a stone, which flew into the car, stuck under his gas pedal.

"We have a good year going," Goeden said Monday night, indicating the initial plan for the year was for him to share a ride with Scott Neitzel in the No. 10W Hood Motorsports car, but owners Bob and Dawn Hood decided early they wanted Goeden in the car full time.

The Hoods have not been disappointed, but the crew and Goeden still know they have work to do in the six remaining races.

"We end up Sept. 13, two weeks after the (Sheboygan County) fair," Goeden said. "We're feeling good (about the year), but we just want to keep finishing races ... top five is our goal every night."

About the competition this past Saturday, Goeden started off with a victory in the fourth heat race, finishing ahead of Jim Melis, who is currently in second place, more than 100 points behind him, and Shane Weninger, another Kewaskum driver. Melis had flipped his car in the July 26

## Numerous candidates vying for votes in primary August 12

Candidates for the 59th and 60th state Assembly are nearing the end of their campaigns before the August 12 partisan primary.

Republicans Bill Savage, Hartford, Ralph Prescott, Chilton, Timothy Ramthun, Campbellsport and Jesse Kremer, Kewaskum are vying for the 59th state Assembly seat left open when Daniel LeMahieu filed non candidacy papers.

Duey Stroebel is retiring from the 60th State Assembly District to run for Wisconsin's 6th United States Congressional District, opening the state to Republicans Jean Opitz, Port Washington and Robert Brooks, Saukville.

Savage opposes Common Core, preferring to see schools controlled on a local level. Savage would also like to see a more equitable school funding formula.

"We are overfunding some areas of the state while other areas struggle," Savage said.

While Prescott's comments were not available as of press time, on his website, it states that the educational, "one size fits all approach isn't working." A Kremer press release states that federal standards and social experiments are designed not by teachers, but bureaucrats and that "Common Core" standards include cookie cutter teaching methods, teaching to pass tests, and intrusive data collection from children and families.

"It may seem innocent right now," said Kremer, "but New York and Florida are years ahead of us...and New York is screaming to opt out."

When it comes to the state

economy and taxes, Savage favors fostering a stable economic environment with low taxes as opposed to a one-time tax reduction and is against raising the minimum wage, which he says will cost Wisconsin jobs. On Prescott's web site, it states that he believes that a smaller government is a more prosperous government.

Ramthun, Kremer and Savage expressed their views on entitlement/social welfare programs.

Kremer would like to see the state perform an oversight study to potentially set up state owned food pantries - the only locations that would accept food stamps.

"Expanding elements of these current programs through additional government purchases, private company involvement, and creating food pantries lacks detail, ignores historic problems, and if it works like other government-run privatized ventures (i.e., post office), it will cost taxpayers more, yet will not resolve the issues," Ramthun said in a July 28 press release.

"I believe that our extensive welfare benefit system has removed the incentive to work. We should provide temporary assistance to those who have experienced a setback, but the permanent lifestyle of living off the government has to stop," Savage said.

Savage also favors drug testing for welfare recipients.

"Most truck drivers, many office and factory workers and now even some high school athletes are subject to drug testing. Getting off welfare starts by getting off drugs," Savage said. Although his comments were

not received by press time, Prescott's web site states he is pro life and Kremer would like to see a ban taxpayer funding of abortions on state employee insurance plans.

In the 60th Assembly District, Opitz' priorities include making Wisconsin more livable and affordable by reducing the state income tax, reducing the size of government by reducing regulations on small business and encouraging job creation by matching the investment in technical schools and four-year colleges with the job needs of businesses.

Although he could not be reached before press time, Brooks' website lists his views on making state government operate efficiently:

"I believe we need to streamline state government by eliminating agency rules and state laws which prevent, or even in some cases prohibit, elected officials from running government in the most cost effective manner possible. Act 10 has provided local officials with the necessary tools to better manage public sector employees while at the same time providing the organizational flexibility to make the decisions necessary to provide better services."

Even with all the controversy surrounding the Common Core Standards (CCSS) and Governor Walker asking for repeal, the Kewaskum School District is still planning to implement it in our schools this year.

What are some facts that are controversial?

Lower than many standards already in place. Children that were considered "average" are now falling below, especially due to the math standards. The standards will not prepare kids for college and STEM careers (limited access to Advanced Placement Courses). They limit local control of the education our children receive (CCSS are copyrighted and can only be changed by up to 15 percent). US Department of Education changed FERPA laws to release personal information to anyone. They collect data on the children and family without permission. The tests include inappropriate questions to the kids. Personal information is being sold to testing companies for profit.

On August 11, at the monthly School Board meeting they will have Kewaskum Administrators discuss CCSS, and they promised a question and answer period after.

On August 25, it is the annual budget meeting for the upcoming 2014-15 Budget. One item they need to fund is Common Core, including text books, testing, software, etc.. We can prevent this, by being present at that meeting and voting on the budget item. CRITICAL: You must be present to vote, and we must have the majority.

I asked Mr. Hanson for the following motion to be added to the Budget Meeting Agenda for the citizens of the Kewaskum School District to vote on.

That motion/authorization being: The Kewaskum School District provide funds for any federally-aligned standards, curriculum aligned to those standards, or tests aligned to those standards for the 2014-15 school year.

## National School Lunch And Breakfast Programs, Special Milk Program

The Kewaskum School District today announced its policy for pricing of meals to pay the full price of meals served under the National School Lunch Program and School Breakfast Program. Each school office and the central office has a copy of the policy, which may be reviewed by any interested party.

The following household size and income criteria will be used for determining eligibility. Children from families whose annual income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free and reduced price meals, or free milk if a split-session student does not have access to the school lunch or breakfast service.

Application forms are being sent to all homes with a notice to parents or guardians. To apply for free or reduced price meals, households must fill out the application and return it to the school (unless notified at the start of the school year that children are eligible through direct certification). Additional copies are available at the office in each school. The information provided on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and may be verified at any time during the school year by agency or other program officials. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

To obtain free or reduced price meals for children in a household where one or more household members receive FoodShare, FDIPIR, or Wisconsin Works (W-2) cash benefits, list the household member and the FoodShare, FDIPIR or W-2 case number, list the names of all school children, sign the application, and return it to the school office.

For the school officials to determine eligibility for free or reduced price meals of households not receiving FoodShare, FDIPIR or W-2 cash benefits, the household must provide the following information requested on the application: names of all household members and the adult signing the application should also list the last four digits of his or her Social Security Number or mark the "I do not have a Social Security Number"

box. Also, the income received by each household member must be provided by amount and source (wages, welfare, child support, etc.).

Under the provisions of the free and reduced price meal and free milk policy, Becky Ehmer, Nutrition Services Secretary, (262)626-8427 x4151 will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent or guardian is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official, he/she may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis. If the parent/guardian wishes to make a formal appeal, he/she may make a request either orally or in writing to: Julie Thoreson, 1675 Reigle Dr, Kewaskum, WI 53040; (262)626-8427 x8004; jthoreson@kewaskumschools.org.

If a hearing is needed to appeal the decision, the policy contains the outline of the hearing procedure.

If a household member becomes unemployed or if the household size changes, the family should contact the school. Such changes may make the household eligible for reduced price meals or free meals or free milk if the household income falls at or below the levels shown above, and they may reapply at that time. Children formally placed in foster care are also eligible for free meal benefits. Foster children may be certified as eligible without a household application. Households with foster children and non-foster children may choose to include the foster child as a household member, as well as any personal income available to the foster child, on the same application that includes their non-foster children.

The information provided by the household on the application is confidential. Public Law 103-448 limits the release of student free and reduced price school meal eligibility status to persons directly connected with the administration and enforcement of federal or state enforcement programs. Consent of the parent/guardian is need for other purposes such as waiver of text book fees.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture prohibits discrimination against its customers, employees, and applicants for employment on the bases of race, color, national origin, age, disability, sex, gender identity, religion, reprisal, and where applicable, political beliefs, marital status, familial or parental status, sexual orientation, or all or part of an individual's income is derived from any public assistance program, or protected genetic information in employment or in any program or activity conducted or funded by the Department. (Not all prohibited bases will apply to all programs and/or employment

activities.)




She is preceded in death by her daughter, Marilyn Breit; sister, Esther (Bill) Breitag; and son-in-law, Warren "Chuck" Blohm.

**75 Years Ago****January 27, 1939**

Fire destroyed an implement and machine shed on the Alvin Faber farm, located two miles west of Wayne last Sunday at about 12 o'clock. About 75 chickens, a corn binder, plow and automobile were destroyed in the blaze. The fire is believed to have been caused by faulty wiring.

In a ceremony performed on January 21 at St. Matthews Church in Campbellsport, Miss Dorothy Majerus of Campbellsport, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Majerus, became the bride of Roland E. Comins, also of that village. Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Enfelt of Campbellsport, brother-in-law and sister of the bride were attendants.

Playing at Port Washington last Sunday evening, Kewaskum's basketball team took its most decisive beating of the

season from the Ozaukee Muslims, league leaders in the Land O' Lakes circuit. The score was 39 to 4, and Kewaskum never had a chance after the first quarter.

The Land O' Lakes boxing tournament announced to take place at the stock pavilion at Waukesha has caused boys from all over Washington, Ozaukee, Dodge, Jefferson and Waukesha counties to become interested in the manly art of fisticuffs. Up to this time, Kewaskum has one entry in the tournament who is Lloyd Backhaus, according to Martin C. Weber, director of Land O' Lakes athletics.

Mike Klein of Wheat Basin, Montana, arrived at the home of his brother, Hubert P. Klein, at St. Bridgets, Route 3, Kewaskum, last Saturday for a short visit after being gone from Wisconsin for the past 29 years. The brothers failed to see each other during all these years and the visit provided a happy reunion. After visiting his kinfolk and friends he expects to return to his ranch in Montana.

An extreme change in weather conditions was noted here. On Saturday the temperature was 40 degrees above zero and on Sunday, accompanied by a fierce gale, the mercury dropped to two degrees above zero.

**February 10, 1939**

At the February 7, 1939 meeting of the Village Board of Kewaskum, the matter of a snow plow was again brought up and after discussing the matter thoroughly, a motion was made by Trustee Martin and seconded by Trustee Seil that the board purchase a Drott snow plow (nine foot blade) for the sum of \$265 installed at Milwaukee. Motion passed.

Thirteen hundred boxing fans filled the stock pavilion at Waukesha to capacity Monday night for the opening of the Land 'O Lakes tournament. Clarence "Clark" Werner was Kewaskum's only representative in the meet. He participated in the light-heavy-weight class and was pitted against Frank Goodwin, who represented the Waukesha Legion. Werner was unattached.

Just as we were going to press, we were notified of the death of John F. Schaefer, age 53, prominent and widely-known resident of the Village of Kewaskum, which occurred at his home this afternoon, February 10, as a result of a heart stroke.

Nicholas Hammes, 74, well known farm resident of East Valley, in the Town of Auburn and a native of the Town of Kewaskum, passed away February 9, following a lingering illness of one year's duration. He had been a resident of the same farm for 59 years.

Otto Backhaus, Kewaskum's ice dealer, employed a crew of 15 local men the past week, cutting the annual ice supply on the Milwaukee River adjoining his large ice house. Because of the mild winter so far, the ice is not as thick as usual but measures 13 inches and is good and clear.

Myron Belger of this village, who was employed at the McLaughlin Meat Market, left early for Toledo, Ohio, where he has enrolled in a six weeks' course

at the National Meat Cutting School.

About 40 neighbors gathered at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Moritz Weasler at four corners in the Town of Auburn, February 1, to help them celebrate their 35th Anniversary.

Congratulations are in order to Mr. and Mrs. George Koerble of this village, happy parents of a six and three-quarter pound girl born February 7 at St. Agnes Hospital, Fond du Lac.

**100 Years Ago****January 10, 1914**

Charles Haessly, residing about four miles west of Campbellsport, last Friday afternoon lost a thumb while operating a circle saw on his brother's farm which was close by to his. The injury was very painful and it was lucky Mr. Haessly's entire hand was not severed. A physician was called and the injured member amputated.

Reports were circulated on Tuesday that Jacob Honeck of the Town of Kewaskum had been found unconscious on the road near Allenton that morning and that his team of horses had run away and were not found. Mr. Honeck, along with his son, Kilian, delivered some grain to Allenton on Monday. Upon returning home, Kilian went in advance and did not pay any attention to his father in the rear and arrived home unaware of the accident. North-east of Allenton, the tugs of

the harness on the team which the senior Honeck was driving in some manner became unhooked and the wagon tongue dropped out of the neck yoke, frightening the team which became unmanageable and ran away throwing Mr. Honeck off the wagon. With special effort he was able to crawl to a nearby farmer, Peter Moritz, who assisted him and summoned medical aid. Upon examination it was found Mr. Honeck suffered from two broken ribs and other internal injuries.

John Miller, a carpet weaver of Batavia, passed away December 30, death being due to dropsy of the heart. Mr. Miller was 61 and survived by his wife and two children. Mr. Miller was long a resident of the Town of Kewaskum and moved to Batavia about 15 years ago. Mr. Miller is the brother of August Miller of the Town of Kewaskum.

The Village of Campbellsport was started by the sound of the fire bell at noon on Tuesday and in further investigation the fire was discovered to be on John Braun's farm about one mile to the west of the village. Braun was having his clover threshed and in some manner the sparks from the engine fell on the hay and caused a fire. However, it was quickly extinguished and not much damage was done. The fire department went out to the farm but their assistance was not needed.



"We're having a good season. We have a good car, good team, good setup and a fast track," Goeden said, eager to see what the team can do in the remaining races.



The Kewaskum Village Board, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First Street.

The meeting was opened with a Moment of Silence and Pledge of Allegiance.

Motion by Richard Knoebel to approve the minutes from the June 16, 2014 and June 23, 2014 meetings, second by Dave Spenner. Voice vote, motion

carried. A public hearing was conducted to temporarily suspend collection of Impact fees under the Village of Kewaskum Code Section 86.14. The temporary suspension of Impact Fee collection will be for the period July 10, 2014 through July 9, 2015. The Village shall not collect impact fees that would be required to be paid under the Village of Kewaskum Code Section 86.14 in connection with applications for building permits for industrial, commercial and residential construction. Public comments included: Tom Zernia, Boss Realty LLC, stated he has 21 parcels for sale and was able to sell 5 lots because of no impacts fees being charged. He also stated this makes commercial lots very attractive and is a good way to have people build in Kewaskum instead of an adjoining municipality.

Motion by Richard Knoebel to close the Public Hearing, second by Kevin Scheunemann and carried by roll call vote. Laubach-aye, Knoebel-aye, Zehren-aye, Pesch-aye, Spenner-aye, Scheunemann-aye, Hovland-aye (7-0-0)

Dave Arnott from Ruekert & Mielke and Matt Bednarski from GRAEF were on hand to propose a coordination effort with participating municipalities and counties. The partnership will address the pending Total Maximum Daily Load (TMDL) regulations and existing phosphorus rule (NR 217) regulations. The advantages would be cost savings through grants and the ability for municipalities to share information, collaborate and work together in addressing these regulations as opposed to approaching these issues independently. The approximate cost would not exceed \$2500. Motion by Richard Knoebel to accept the contract from Ruekert & Mielke for coordination with other municipalities to address the phosphorus rule and Total Maximum Daily Load issue, second by Jim Hovland and carried by voice vote. Laubach-aye, Knoebel-aye, Zehren-aye, Pesch-aye, Spenner-aye, Scheunemann-aye, Hovland-aye (5-2-0).

Administrator Heiser reported:

1. The Main Street project is progressing and the bridge is half completed. Main Street was prepared to handle the crowd for the July 3rd Fireworks.

2. A succession document was prepared and shared with department heads. This document is stored on the network drive and only require one file to keep up to date rather than multiple folders for each department. The document will be updated and reviewed on an ongoing basis.

3. The budget timeline will include: internal review from Mid-August to Mid-September, committee review the end of September and Village Board review starting the first meeting in October.

Richard Knoebel, Chairperson for the Administrative Committee, reported the bills were recommended for payment as presented. Motion by Jim Hovland to approve the bills

as recommended, second by Andy Pesch. Voice vote, motion carried.



Notice is hereby given of a partisan primary to be held in Washington County on the 12th day of August, 2014, at which the nominees for the offices named below shall be chosen. The names of the candidates for each office, whose nominations have been certified to or filed in this office, are given under the title of the office under the appropriate party or other designation, each in its proper column, together with the questions submitted to a vote, if any, in the sample ballot below.

**INFORMATION TO ELECTORS**  
Upon entering the polling place, an elector shall state his or her name and address and sign the poll book before being permitted to vote. If an elector is not registered to vote, an elector may register to vote at the polling place serving his or her residence if the elector provides proof of residence. Where ballots are distributed to electors, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot. Upon being permitted to vote, the elector shall retire alone to a voting booth and cast his or her ballot except that an elector who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the elector's minor child or minor ward. An election official may inform the elector of the proper manner for casting a vote, but the official may not in any manner advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

**At the partisan primary the elector shall select the party of his or her choice.** Voting for candidates of more than one party may invalidate the ballot. You must cast a vote for individual candidates.

### Where Optical Scan Voting Systems are used

If a party preference is designated, and votes are cast for ballot candidates of another party or write-in votes are cast in another party, only votes cast in the designated party will count.

If a party preference is not designated, and votes are cast for candidates (or write-in votes are cast) in more than one party, no votes will be counted.

The elector shall then fill in the oval next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote under the party of his or her choice. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the elector shall write in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote, and fill in the oval on the write-in line.

### Where Touch Screen Voting Systems are Used

The elector shall touch the screen next to the party of his or her choice. The elector shall then touch the screen next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the elector shall type in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote.

The vote should not be cast in any other manner. Not more than five minutes time shall be allowed inside a voting booth. Sample ballots or other materials to assist the elector in marking his or her vote may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

If an elector spoils an optical

scan ballot, he or she shall return it to an election official who shall issue an election ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one elector. If the ballot has not been initiated by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the elector shall return it to the election official, who shall issue a proper ballot in its place. The elector may touch the screen ballot at the voting station before the ballot is cast.

After casting his or her vote, the elector shall leave the voting booth and properly deposit the ballot.

### After Voting the Ballot

After an official optical scan ballot is marked, it shall be inserted in the security sleeve so the marks do not show. The elector shall then insert the ballot in the voting device and discard the sleeve, or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit.

After an official touch screen ballot is marked, the elector shall leave the polling place promptly.

An elector may select an

individual to assist in casting his or her vote if the elector declares to the presiding official that he or she is unable to read, has difficulty reading, writing or understanding English or that due to disability is unable to cast his or her ballot. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the elector's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the elector.






