School district awarded \$150,000 grant for charter school

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The Kewaskum School District has received a \$150,000 grant to get their i4Learning charter school running for the 2015-'16 school year. Plans call for Wayne Elementary to house the new school but the district is keeping their options open.

Kewaskum applied for a \$150,000 grant in April. Last week the district found out they were awarded the grant and were offered another \$50,000. The extra \$50,000 may come if the district amends their budget for the next school year and submits it to

the Department of Instruction by Oct. 1.

State Superintendent of Schools Tony Evers stated the grants would support 50 other charter schools. Funding for the charter school awards is provided through a federal grant Wisconsin won in 2009 worth \$86 million.

The district's plan is to open the i4Learning Charter School at Wayne Elementary for the 2015-2016 school year. The district would give Wayne students the option to attend the charter school or be shuttled to Farmington or Kewaskum Elementa-

ry. A charter school is an independently run public school that grants greater operation flexibility in return for greater accountability for performance. Instead of the Board of Education having control over the school, a governance board operates it. The charter establishing each school is a performance contract that details the school's mission, program, students served, performance goals and methods of assessment.

In previous meetings, Superintendent of Schools Jim Smasal has

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Kremer, Brooks win assembly primary

For the first time in village history, Kewaskum will send one of their own to the Wisconsin Assembly to represent the 59th District after Jesse Kremer won Tuesday's Primary Election. Robert Brooks will fill a seat vacated by Duey Stroebel who lost his congressional race Tuesday.

A low turn-out, as expected by many clerks across the area, has all but decided two races for the Wisconsin Assembly for the fall election as Kremer and Brooks face no democratic opposition.

Kremer wins after the non-candidacy notice of Daniel Lemahieu, R-Cascade. The 59th Assembly District covers the eastern portion of Fond du Lac County and parts of Calumet and Washington counties.

At press time, exact results for Kremer's race could not be obtained due to a mix-up in Sheboygan County. The Statesman will publish results in next week's newspaper.

Robert Brooks of Saukville received 4,791 (58 percent) votes while his opponent Jean Opitz received 3,455 (42 percent) votes.

Village of Kewaskum voters totaled 569 with Kremer being the top vote-getter with 199 votes, Timothy Ramthun followed with 139, Ralph Prescott with 39 and Bill Savage with 20.

Town of Farmington Clerk Chris Schellinger said things were generally slow, but poll workers were busier than expected as 485 voters cast their ballots. Brooks received the highest number of votes totaling 197 while Jean Opitz garnered 179. Farmington has 2,405 registered voters.

Clerk Nancy Boden and her poll workers in the town of Kewaskum had a very slow day after only 28 percent came out to cast their votes. Kremer

Little Free Library opens near library



The Kewaskum Public Library has some competition and it's coming from just outside their front window but Library Director Steev Baker isn't too worried. Recently, Howard Zemlicka and Emil Radeztsky installed Kewaskum's own Little Free Library as Howard's wife Connie, a Kewaskum Library Board member and retired teacher supervised. The Little Free Library is situated on land purchased by the Kewaskum Library Foundation and will remain there until plans to expand the Kewaskum Public Library move forward. Howard Zemlicka stated he constructed the 36" high by 42" wide by 14" deep library more than two months ago. It took him more than 20 hours. Connie Zemlicka painted the interior and exterior to complete the project. After a feature in the Milwaukee Journal Sentinel a few weeks ago the pair thought it was time to get the little library to the big library. Anyone in the community is welcome to use the Little Free Library, which will feature all genres. People are encouraged to bring a book when they take a book. There are no due dates or fines for being late and the Little Library is open 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Little Free Library, now a large nonprofit organization, was founded in Hudson Wis. in 2009.

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
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Work continues on Hwy. 28



Workers apply the binder course of asphalt to Main Street earlier this month at the intersection of Main Street and Parkview Drive. Village Administrator Matt Heiser stated this week work on the project is going well, "Progress is apparent in the Village with the installation of curb and gutter, sidewalks, street lights and the base layers of asphalt. However, there is still work that needs to be done." He says although things may appear quiet in the village there is a substantial amount of work to be done as the bridge needs to be completed before other work can continue. Those involved in the project are asking drivers to continue treating Main Street as under construction as it is closed to all traffic. Heiser affirmed that drivers should continue using First Street as an alternate route. Traffic is allowed to business destinations in the construction area but drivers are asked to use the public lot behind the Municipal Building Annex and Peace United Church of Christ lot as much as possible. Kewaskum man killed in bike-deer crash

A well-known Kewaskum man was killed Friday evening after a motorcycle crash in Fond du Lac County.

The Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Office responded to a motorcycle versus deer crash August 8 at approximately 10:33 p.m., on County Highway G, south of State Highway 67 in the town of Osceola.

The lone occupant and

operator of the motorcycle, was James M. Skomski, 41, of Kewaskum. He was pronounced deceased on scene. No other vehicles were involved.

Responding with Fond du Lac County Sheriff's deputies were DNR park rangers, Campbellsport Fire Department and Campbellsport Ambulance.

touted the charter school as an innovative way to teach children with different learning styles, which he hopes would be attractive to families.

The charter school has freedom from certain state requirements such as the traditional school calendar, attendance and instructional hours. This means a student may get credit for working or getting instruction in a non-traditional manner.

Kewaskum's next step will be establishing the governance board. The board will be made up of parents, business partners and community members. Those on the board will need to attend board trainings.

The first action for the governance board will be preparing a charter contract by November 2014. Upon completion, the charter school will register as a non-stock corporation by Dec. 1. Students will be accepted during the open enrollment period beginning in February 2015. The school would then open Sept. 1, 2015.

Joel Dzedzic, the district's Director of Next Generation Learning, says the

school will be student driven with personalized learning plans for students. They will incorporate badge and project based learning. It is hoped through this the end result will be a student who is an autonomous, life-long learner.

While all planning takes place during the 2014-'15 school year, Wayne Elementary will operate much like it did last year with the exception of multi-age classrooms. Dzedzic said the multi-age learning fits well with the district's current charter school plans.

Dzedzic informed the board that he would report back each month with a progress report.

The School District can apply for additional grants over a period of three years, worth a total of \$450,000. It's all designed to help Kewaskum take the necessary steps to plan for and the implementation of a charter school.

The grant awards are broken into five different categories designed to assist charter schools at differing stages of their operations. Kewaskum was one of eight schools that shared \$1.2 million in plan-

ning grants,

In 1993, Wisconsin became one of the first states to authorize the creation of charter schools and has continually ranked in the top 10 states nationwide for the number of charter schools. 242 charter schools operated during the 2013-14 school year, serving 45,078 students.

Under state law, school districts can authorize an unlimited number of charter schools. Additionally, the City of Milwaukee, the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, Milwaukee Area Technical College, and the University of Wisconsin-Parkside, have authority to charter schools. Charter schools authorized by these entities are often referred to as non-district, independent or 2R charter schools. Charter schools are public schools and are accountable to the locally elected school board or authorizing agency that approved their charter contract. Charter schools must employ licensed teachers, involve parents, administer statewide tests, and comply with federal regulations that govern all public schools.

My guess is there are a lot of Republican voters around here that watch Fox news and listen to talk radio, or should I say Republican radio. Well here's something you will not hear on Fox News.

In 1996 a woman by the name of Jane Akre and her husband Steve Wilson were hired by Fox News as part of the Fox investigators team in Tampa Fla. In 1997 they began work on a story about bovine growth hormones [BGH] a substance manufactured by Monsanto Corp.

After months of investigations they found that there were a lot of risks associated with the use of BGH. In fact very little testing had happened and very little if any oversight by the FDA. They were excited about airing their findings that had accurate representation from both sides of the story.

Fox News after being threatened by one of their large advertisers, Monsanto, demanded they either halt altogether their story or edit it completely. This story can be seen on the Internet at www.YouTube.com. These journalists refused to back down and eventually were fired.

They filed a lawsuit for wrongful termination under Fla.'s whistleblower law. On August 18, 2000, a Florida jury unanimously decided that Akre was wrongfully fired by Fox Television when she refused to broadcast (in the jury's words) "a false, distorted or slanted story" about the widespread use of BGH in dairy cows. They were awarded a \$425,000 settlement.

In 2003, Fox appealed and won in an appellate court. During their appeal, Fox asserted that there are no written rules against distorting news in the media. They argued that, under the First Amendment, broadcasters have the right to lie or deliberately distort news reports on public airwaves.

Fox attorneys did not dispute Akre's claim that they pressured her to broadcast a false story; they simply maintained that it was their right to do so. And even more disturbing is the

other five major media outlets [Fox and Friends] owned by Fox and billionaire Rupert Murdoch that filed briefs supporting Fox's position.

People should read more about this, it's very simple to look up. BGH from Monsanto is banned in Canada. I have to laugh every time I see a bumper sticker that reads, "I don't believe the liberal media." Fact is most of the media in this country is owned by only six multi-billion dollar profit driven corporations. Profit is their only concern and profit comes from corporate advertisers.

Every human being on the planet has a right to live. No one deserves to endure long hours, multiple jobs, and tiring stress only to barely scrape by. That is why we must raise the minimum wage to a reasonable, livable number.

The current national minimum wage of \$7.25 was set in 2009. When measured in 2013 dollars, minimum wage has remained relatively the same since 1990. What hasn't remained stagnant are the price of goods and services- the basic cost of living. If the minimum wage rose proportionally to inflation it would be at \$11. If it had kept pace with worker productivity it would be about \$21. We're not even asking for a number that high.

Contrary to popular belief, 79% of workers on minimum wage are 20+ years old- many working multiple jobs. Besides, perhaps more money for the 21% of teens on minimum wage could help them pay for college without massive student loan debts.

Australia, the only developed country not hit by the recession of 2008, has a minimum wage of US\$15.96. Unemployment is 5.9% and cost of living in Australia is between 28-31% higher than America's. However this is more than made up for with a minimum wage more than double our own. Cities in America, especially on the west

coast, are increasing their minimum wages in order to combat rising costs of living. It has already helped cities like San Francisco.

This stagnation of minimum wage and simultaneous inflation of the price of goods has only helped those who benefit from the high prices- the wealthy, and corporations. Coupled with unfair tax rates, this has greatly increased the gap between the impoverished and the rich.

We liberals are harassed for "hating the rich" and "hating hard work." Many Americans have this mentality that the poor are just not working or trying hard enough- that hard work trumps human rights. These are people suffering from their own environmental predispositions, struggles, and historical setbacks beyond their control. This isn't to say others haven't had their own struggles, merely to point out the fact that a large population of people in this country are suffering at largely disproportionate rates- minorities and urban populations. We liberals value hard work just as much as conservatives, however we don't value it when it exploits the poor and only seeks greed.

Conservatives also hold on to a sense of nostalgia. Then they should certainly support a return to a time like the '40s, '50s, and '60s when wage and price were proportionate and the wealthy were taxed fairly. I personally believe that many strict conservatives lack simple human empathy- an understanding that we are all just humans trying to live and to be happy.

Unfortunately, our current system and wage do not allow this for many people. We need a higher minimum wage. We need a fair tax system and less breaks for those benefiting at the expense of others. We need an overhaul of our economic system.

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


Plight of the Magnificent Monarch Butterflies

Join in on Saturday, August 23, as the Kettle Moraine State Forest - Northern Unit's Summer Saturday Evening Events continues with, "Plight of the Magnificent Monarch Butterflies."

The program starts at 7 p.m. and lasts until about 8:30 p.m. at the Henry S. Reuss Ice Age Visitor Center. The Ice Age Visitor Center is located off Hwy 67 half mile west of Dundee. Through the generous support of the Friends of the Kettle Moraine, this program is free, but donations are always gratefully accepted.

Each spring monarch butterflies return to Wisconsin representing the third or fourth generation of butterflies that fluttered all the way to Mexico in the autumn. Adult monarchs sip nectar from a variety of flowers, but their caterpillars, only feed on plants in the milkweed family. Their migration and specific caterpillar food requirement makes them susceptible to environmental changes. Recently, these magnificent butterfly populations have shown a decline in numbers.

Join Judy Kesser from the Wild Ones, a native landscaping organization, as she shares this butterfly's incredible life history, reasons for their population decline, and ways people can help monarchs survive. Weather permitting

the program begins outdoors with a search for the life stages of monarchs and possible tagging demonstration.

The Statesman will publish additional information on the Fall election in the coming weeks.



He was preceded in death by his mother, Annie; his maternal and paternal grandparents and his uncles.





January 31, 1914

William Batzler, aged 42 years, a resident of St. Kilian and who resides about seven miles west of this village, was instantly killed last Tuesday evening at about 6:45 p.m. at a crossing about a mile from Theresa Station. Batzler had gone to Theresa with a load of barley earlier in the day and was returning with a load of shingles. It was very foggy and the steep grade at the crossing very likely disenabled Mr. Batzler to notice the swiftly approaching southbound Soo train. Although nobody witnessed the accident, it is clear to state that the wagon, horses and all were struck for the horses were also killed and the wagon badly demolished. The train crew noticing that something dreadful had happened, stopped and picked up the body and took it to Theresa Station where it was placed in an undertaking parlor. 

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Young Indians head into last year of EWC

One thing the Kewaskum Indians football team needs to do is grow up in a hurry. They have to establish some team identity and make their last year in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference count.

A stinging defeat to rival Campbellsport in 2013 on their home field after winning their previous eight against the Cougars and a humbling 35-0 shut-out loss to Wisconsin Lutheran in the first round of the playoffs

indicated that the Indians must step up to the plate in 2014. And if that wasn't enough for the returning players to think about in the offseason, they must seek new leaders to replace the 10 seniors who graduated from last year's 5-5 season.

"We need a whole lot of guys to step up and be leaders," Indians coach Jason Piittmann said. "We are still on the young side because of the number of sophomores that we played last year. We still need guys to step up and every position group needs to step up and be the

leaders for us."

Two of those sophomores from last season are now juniors and both are ready for the challenge. The Indians return second team all EWC running back Brandon Thull and his 97.4 yards per game average from a year ago and Mike Prochnow, who is the starting quarterback.

"Proc" was thrown into the fire of baptism late in the third quarter of the last home game against Plymouth after senior quarterback Brett Boegel was driven to the ground and suffered a concussion. When Boe-

gel wasn't medically cleared for the playoff game, Prochnow started. He took his first course in QB 101 against Wisco that night and now knows what the expectations are for the position.

"It's a big step up from the JV but it's something that everybody has to go through," Prochnow said. "You just play your cards and do the best that you can do."

Piittmann needs Prochnow to put on the big boy pants and lead the varsity offense, putting it on his shoulders to produce on the field.

"He's got to step up," Piittmann said. "We saw him last year. He had a chance in that playoff game. It put him in a rough spot coming in and also having to be the varsity quarterback in week 10 of the season. He played varsity basketball and varsity baseball. He was a key part of those teams. He developed maturity and leadership over the last school year. We really need him to bring it forth and show it. He'll be respected now as the leader of our offense."

Prochnow can count on Thull in the backfield to get the yards necessary to move the chains. At times last season, "BT" outran his blocking and gained some of his 974 yards on his own. The speedy back has to remember one word to save his body from being a marked man in the open field: patience.

"I'm trying hard during practice just to take a slow approach to the line and wait until they make a good block," Thull said.

"I hope this team finishes in the top three or four in conference," Piittmann said.

He said that Plymouth

should be one of four teams in the race for the conference title. "They [Two Rivers] have a sound program and always a contender," according to Piittmann, has some "really good young kids coming up." He noted that Campbellsport made the playoffs last year and won a game and that New Holstein had a good run to finish the season.

Knock on wood, the team has been healthy through pre-season practice other than the bumps and bruises and Piittmann hopes it stays that way so he doesn't have to worry about rearranging the deck chairs before their season home opener Aug. 22 against West Bend East. Piittmann should expect a water or Gatorade shower sometime this season when he reaches a very important coaching milestone.

"That will be a big accomplishment to have Coach with 100 wins in Kewaskum," Prochnow said.

With the league title on the line, the Kewaskum Athletics came up with three big Rock River wins this past week, including a 3-2 thriller over the Hustisford Astros August 6, a 4-3, 10-inning decision over Rubicon August 9 and a convincing 14-4 (in 10 innings) victory over Ashippun Sunday.

With these wins, Kewaskum improved to 15-3 in the RRL and 29-12 overall.

Austin Sarauer was swinging a red-hot bat for the A's in the 10-run victory. His grand slam homer in the six-run third put the A's in a commanding 11-0 lead. Sarauer also chipped in with an RBI single in the first when they scored twice — Jordan Kuczynski also had RBI singles — for a 2-0 advantage over the Mudcats, and he had a two-run homer later in the game.

For the game, Sarauer went 3x5, with two homers, a double and seven runs batted in (RBIs). Kurt Zagzebski helped out with a three-run round-tripper in the third.

The A's pounded out 18 hits on the day. Adam Sarauer was a perfect 4x4 (two 2Bs and an

RBI), Kaczynski added three hits.

Brad Young picked up the complete-game win, scattering six hits, while striking out five.

The stage has now been set for the Rock River playoffs that get underway this coming weekend (August 16 and 17). The A's will host the defending league champion Hartford Hawks Saturday at 1:30 p.m. at Kiwanis Park. Win or lose, the A's will host a second playoff game Sunday at 1:30 p.m. as well (against either the winner/loser of the Brownsville/Rubicon game).

The A's used Austin Sarauer's RBI single in the tenth for a dramatic 4-3 win over Rubicon. The win clinched a share of the RRL title for the fourth year in a row and gave them the No. 1 seed for the upcoming RR-North playoffs.

Rubicon scored first off a Kewaskum error in the top of the fifth, but the A's came back to tie the game with a two-out, RBI single by Jake Spaeth.

The A's took a brief 2-1 lead in the sixth with a two-out RBI single from Adam Sarauer, but another defensive miscue in the seventh led to another Rubicon run, tying the score at two

apiece. The A's bounced right back again though as this time Kurt Zagzebski delivered with a two-out RBI single giving the A's a 3-2 lead.

The score remained here until the ninth, when Rubicon came through with a one-out RBI single off A's starting pitcher Jim Ziegler to tie the score at 3-3.

In the A's half of the tenth, Young worked a walk to lead off the inning and advanced to second on a wild pitch. A strikeout and an intentional walk followed, setting the table for Austin Sarauer who proceeded to smash a base hit to right to score the winning run and giving the A's their second consecutive walk-off win.

Ziegler (10IP, 2ER, 7 Hits, 3K's) picked up the complete game win on the mound, while Jake Spaeth and Zagzebski led the A's at the plate with two hits and a RBI each.

The A's beat Hustisford Wednesday night, rallying from a 2-0 deficit late in the game and eventually winning 3-2 on a walk-off double in the twelfth.
