Kohn's Citgo expansion underway

Piggly Wiggly expansion approved

Geidel's Piggly Wiggly is set to expand after receiving approval for a nearly 9,000 square foot expansion to their grocery store. Construction could begin as soon as September.

Owner Mike Geidel came before the Village of Kewaskum's plan commission Tuesday and announced plans for the north side of his store. The addition will see each department in the store expanded. The biggest change will be the bakery moving to the new portion of the store, next to the liquor department. This will allow the deli and produce departments to expand and take over the space once occupied by the bakery.

The expansion will also see additional coolers and a larger customer service area that will have two express checkout lanes and a third checkout area.

The expansion will match the current color scheme and facade of the building. Geidel said future expansion was planned when the store was originally built so it would fit together well.

Geidel stated he wanted to start construction in September so the exterior could be closed in by winter. He expected work on the interior to begin after holidays to allow for completion by Easter 2015.

Geidel is the fourth generation of the Marx/Geidel family to own and operate a grocery store in Kewaskum. The current store was built in 2000. The Marx family opened their grocery store in 1876 on Main Street in what is

Electors fail to pass tax levy at annual meeting

The Kewaskum Theatre was nearly packed for Monday evening's annual meeting for the Kewaskum School District. For the first time in more than 20 years electors did not approve the proposed tax levy.

The audience of more than 116 residents was nearly evenly split between residents against Common Core Standards, adopted by the state in 2010, and those on the other side of the fence.

Electors selected Board of Education President Troy Hanson as chairman of the meeting.

Superintendent of Schools Jim Smasal gave his annual state of the district. In his third year he highlight-

ed, the district's involvement in the national Fuel up to Play 60 program in which the district played a huge role this year. He explained Kewaskum Middle School student Andrew Carlson, was selected as the state ambassador and KMS was the set of a commercial airing statewide.

He announced the district was able to opt out of the expensive co-op insurance program by partnering with teachers, the board and community members who sought bids and ultimately found a better, less expensive program with Humana.

In the last month, the district settled a 2010 lawsuit with one of their former employees. Smasal stated the lawsuit was settled without the use of fund balance.

Last year the district piloted a bus driver initiative where district leadership met with drivers, had luncheons and breakfasts explaining the important roles they play in transporting students to and from school. Smasal explained this outreach has been helpful in opening dialog between the drivers and the district.

Smasal credited working with the community and clergy on their respect initiative to raise awareness regarding bullying.

Review of the district's policies has been outsourced to NEOLA, a company that specializes in making sure policies are aligned to state policies and codes with oversight by the



district's Policy Committee and staff.

Smasal said the district has worked through budgetary issues and are pleased to announce the district again stayed under budget and add that surplus to fund balance.

A \$150,000 planning grant to start a charter school in the district was received and the district was also awarded an additional \$50,000.

"We want to be a comprehensive school district to teach all our students," Smasal stated. The charter school is expected to be based out of Wayne Elementary in the 2015/16 school year.

Smasal reported the district has worked on a teacher effectiveness model and will implement the program this year. It is believed this will help evaluate teachers and show how students are learning.

Smasal announced results from the community survey sent to residents this past spring. He explained in regards to a survey like the one completed by residents a return rate of 25 percent is considered very accurate data. Kewaskum had a return rate of 34 percent.

Opinions in the survey revealed residents want the district to:

- Prepare students for life after high school
- Increase achievement in math and literacy/reading
- Recruit and retain high-quality staff
- Maintain/strengthen opportunities in the career and technical education classes
- Have better communication

Smasal stated the district would be partnering with The Washington County Workforce Alliance Group. The group is anticipating a short-

age of future workers and are partnering with high schools in an attempt to prepare students for manufacturing jobs.

In October students, parents and teachers will be invited to tour area businesses to get an understanding of jobs that will be available to students after graduating from high school.

Looking to the future Smasal stated the district's leadership team has written a strategic plan that was revealed at the school board retreat in July. The plan will be shared at the September Board of Education meeting. The board and staff will continue working on a compensation schedule for teachers.

The leadership team with the Board will continue to highlight what they call the "Kewaskum Difference" which Smasal believed will keep Kewaskum viable in the ever-changing world of education.

"We need the same opportunities as what they have in Slinger, West Bend and Hartford," he said.

Reverting back to the planning of the charter school will be a challenge but also an opportunity. The district's leadership team is working on an 18 month timeline which includes updating the budget so the district is eligible for an additional \$50,000 grant. A governance board to oversee the school must also be created. Progress on the charter school planning will take place monthly at the board meeting.

The contentious topic of Common Core Standards, implemented by the State of Wisconsin in 2010 for language arts and Math continue to ignite passion in the district from those not in favor of implementing the standards. Smasal explained the district

has tried to do everything possible to educate people. He encouraged residents who have questions or would like to view materials related to the standards to contact the district's curriculum coordinator Mark Bozata.

Julie Thoreson, the district's business manager gave an overview of finances for the previous budget cycle and the 2014/15 cycle that began July 1.

Thoreson said the district ended their fiscal year with a \$388,870 surplus in the general fund. That surplus is now added to the district's fund balance, which sits at \$3,434,316. For the 2014-15 budget cycle the district will have 17.7 percent of their operating budget in fund balance. Board policy states a minimum of 10 percent is required to be in fund balance.

Thoreson explained the district currently has a little more than \$2 million in debt for various smaller capital projects. The long-term debt for the elementary school is currently at \$4.75 million and set to be paid in full in 2019.

The food service fund also ran a surplus of \$8,366. That department has a \$90,691 fund balance. The community service fund showed a \$16,000 surplus and has a \$9,776 fund balance.

Thoreson moved the discussion to the 2014-15 budget and revealed the district receives the bulk of it's revenue from two sources, state aid and the tax levy. She added the district received an increase of state aid by means of an additional \$75 per pupil.

The district expects the revenue limit for the 2014-15 budget to be \$18,050,547, a decrease of \$292,999. The decrease is attributed to declining enrollment. This year's enrollment is expected to be 1,909 students, a decline of 19 students. At its peak in 2009, the district had 2,079 students, its lowest in recent years was 1998 when there was 1,873.

The general fund was decreased by \$143,052, leaving the general fund at \$19,360,615.

Thoreson stated she projected the tax levy to be \$11,174,781. The tax rate is expected to be around \$9.69, a decrease from last year of 50¢. She cautioned that this was only an estimate because the district would not get firm numbers from the state until October.

Thoreson added the budget is the smallest budget in 10 years.

After the budget presentation the electorate approved the various resolutions including setting salaries for the Board of Education. Salaries will remain the same \$3,150 annually on a vote of 61-2.

Also approved on a 63-2 vote was allowing board members to be reimbursed for actual and necessary expenses when traveling in performance of duties not to exceed \$125 per day when duties require the board member to be absent from regular employment.

Electors also gave permission to dispose of obsolete equipment and purchase and maintain vehicles on behalf of the district.

The tax levy was not approved after a 52-58 vote.

The date for 2015 meeting will be Monday, Aug. 24, at 7 p.m. after a 61-26 vote.

now Grand Larsons. In 1911 they move next door in what is now Player's Sports Bar. In 1962 they moved across the street into what is now the downtown parking lot. In 1982 they opened in the Kewaskum Mall until 2000.

Plans were unanimously approved.

Letter to the Editor

To The Statesman-

I went to Fleet Farm recently and the teller asked me if my purchase was for farm use. I said no, and had to pay taxes. Why is that? Why do I have to pay sales tax but not farmers?

How many people realize that crop insurance is subsidized 60 percent by taxpayers? Sometimes farmers are paid to not plant crops. Why? How much money do we pay for farm subsidies? Look it up on EWG database. They're right in our backyard.

When I was younger I spent time helping out an uncle on a farm. I have family members that own farms. I respect farmers, however many farmers today are no longer your small family farm. These are multi-million dollar big business operations. I never thought I would see farmers with Cadillac Escalades.

Does anybody look closely at their cell phone bill? Like many of us I have cut off my land line and went with cell phones and as a parent it's a safety factor with kids. But the cost is becoming fairly outrageous.

It certainly doesn't help with the monopolization of telecom businesses. It certainly won't be any consumer protection any time soon with corporate lobbyists controlling our state and federal government. But at closer inspection I see many charges and fees and taxes (police and fire protection, etc.) both state and federal.

All added up it comes close to \$30 a month. Multiply that by 12 and we're talking over \$300 a year just on a phone bill. Why is that? That's about double the income tax break I got back from Walker.

On a side issue I have seen many people expressing their displeasure with Common Core Standards. These letters for me are just not specific enough. I need more specifics about what exactly (perhaps the specific standard, English, math, history, or whatever) you don't agree with.

I am not an educator and

not an expert on Common Core Standards. Seems to me the teachers are the ones that would have the most knowledge on this. But don't expect any of them to be coming out with any constructive criticism any time soon. Since Act 10 any public sector worker will say little if anything for fear of losing their job. They have lost any kind of job protection.

There are some things I have been made aware of though with Common Core Standards. It is not some federal takeover and some sort of liberal indoctrination, as some would have you believe. State governors, educators and others set it up across the country. This is about setting up national standards.

In my own line of work I have worked with people from all over the country. Do you think a person with an A average from Mississippi is educated the same as an A student from Wisconsin? If you were hiring these people who would you choose?

According to Kathleen Porter-Magee of the conservative think tank Fordham Foundation, she states Wisconsin's old standards "failed". She states that the Common Core Standards have much more rigorous standards.

There are some older podcasts from WPR that you could listen to with both points of view. The majority of the more than 400 districts are moving forward on this and the majority of educators are in favor of this. In fact, a group I don't very often agree with, the WMC has come out and favored this for the exact reason I have stated in regards to hiring qualified educated people.


Kewaskum Fire Dept. takes on 'Ice Bucket Challenge'






The first Village Board meeting in September was rescheduled to Tuesday, September 2, 2014 because of the Labor Day Holiday.

Indians kick off season with win over West Bend East

Mike Prochnow didn't show any first-game jitters as the starting quarterback for the Indians Friday night at home. He engineered five scoring drives to lead the Indians to a 36-7 nonconference win over visiting West Bend East, Aug. 22, in the season opener for both teams.

The junior, in his first varsity regular season start, threw for 140 yards on 19 attempts, completing 11 passes. The Indians' offense also got 143 yards and two touchdowns from junior running back Brandon Thull on 23 carries, 55 yards and two TDs from junior receiver Charlie Witek and 150 all-purpose yards from junior running back Steven Nurkala.

"The mindset was just to be calm and do what we did all practice for the past three weeks," Prochnow said. "We

wanted to put in a good performance since football started and we came through and executed (the offense)."

Kewaskum (1-0) scored on their second and third drives of the game. They had good field position from a short punt by the Suns and went 55 yards in five plays, which was capped by a 15-yard TD run by Thull. A two-point conversion pass to Thull gave seven minutes six seconds remaining in the first quarter. After a three-and-out by East (0-1), Thull scored again on a five-yard run with 2:37 left, ending a seven-play, 58-yard drive. Kewaskum took a 14-0 lead into the second quarter.

Prochnow needed only 2:36 to march 68 yards in seven plays to score the Indians' third touchdown late in the half. He connected with Witek for a 9-yard score with 1:02 left. The green and white led at the half 21-0.

"The offense came out

strong," Witek said. "Last year was last year and we didn't come out strong. This is going to be a learning experience for (Port Washington) and we hope that our offense will come out strong as we did (this game)."

East scored their only touchdown on their first drive in the third quarter on a four-yard run by senior quarterback Seth Schrank to cut the Kewaskum lead to 21-7, which included a PAT kick by senior Rachael Stapelfel at the 8:36 mark. The Indians struck back. Prochnow threw to the left corner of the end zone to Witek on their first drive of the second half. Witek caught the 15-yard scoring pass over two East defenders to increase the Kewaskum lead to 27-7 with 6:14 left.

In the fourth quarter, a fumble by junior running back Sam Garrison of East at their 6 rolled backward and out of the end zone for a Kewaskum safety. Nurkala closed the scoring for both teams on a 36-yard touchdown run with 6:18 left.

Prochnow got the stamp of approval in running the offense to jumpstart the 2014 season.

"He played very well," Kewaskum coach Jason Piittmann said. "He had good control of the offense. He made some good audibles to take us out of some spots, not necessarily bad spots, but he put us in a better spot most of the time. He did an excellent job. He had great composure and poise back there. I'm really impressed with him. He has to keep developing."

Added Witek, "Proc is great with the ball. He will put the ball where it needs to be, whether it's keeping the ball, handing it off, whatever (in the option game). We need the ball in his hands to be who we are."

Prochnow credited his incredible passing performance to the offensive line. "If the linemen didn't block and I got sacked, there's no pass thrown," he said.

Senior linebacker Matt Hetebrueg and junior linebacker Benjamin Watzig led

the Indians' defense with six tackles each. Seniors Dylan Thull and Collin McCarthy each had five tackles. Dylan Thull recorded two of the team's six sacks. McCarthy, Adam Ratliff, Matt Elbe and Derek Voight each had one. Brady Hanson, Cole Rahlf and Josh Baker had one interception apiece.

The Indians will try to make it 2-0 in another nonconference game at Port Washington Friday. Piittmann got his 97th career win at Kewaskum and needs three more to reach the century mark.

Leitzke's mission: Make the Indians netters more competitive

Laine Leitzke had his work cut out when he accepted the job as the Indians' head volleyball coach in July. He's taking on the challenge of bringing the program back to respectability and creating a winning attitude.

It will take some time to develop team chemistry. Five of the returning members from the 2013 team are back. The three seniors, including three-year starter Marissa Stahl, Jess Fieweger and Tabitha Schicker, are expected to provide leadership and mentor the six newcomers on the 12-person varsity roster.

"Me and Jess will have to be leaders and cheer everybody up if they're down and pump everyone up," Stahl said.

The focus of this year's team is winning games and changing that "happy to be out on the court" moment.

"Our last coach (Joe Moser) was just like (saying), 'Yeah, it's volleyball, let's have fun.' Our new coach really wants to win. He wants to put the best people out on the floor, but he thinks that we will win," Stahl said.

This isn't the first time around the block for Leitzke. He spent six years at Horicon, including five as the varsity

coach. Last season, Leitzke stepped away from coaching to get married and referee games.

"I was one of those people that got yelled at all the time (by spectators)," he said.

Leitzke oversees more than 600 members around the state as an assistant director of a volleyball club with its main location in Green Bay. His experience in volleyball and as a coach of a club team that went to nationals last year will go a long way in teaching the young women at Kewaskum how to become winners.

"My experience is not with this conference (Eastern Wisconsin Conference), but I'm used to the Midwest (Wisconsin) area," he said.

The players met their new coach last week when they officially began preseason practice and they were put on notice that more is expected of them.

"We're learning a lot of new things," Fieweger, a second year varsity senior, said. "It's for the better because our passing is better since the first day of practice."

You can't criticize the 67-55 overall record that previous coach Joe Moser posted and a conference title in 2011. You also can't replace the 376 kills, 344 digs, 89 service points and 64 assists that all-conference player Steph Henk had in

2013. It will take a total team effort and some luck this year to pull off some miracles.

Some of that effort will have to come from the five sophomores and two juniors that have little or no varsity experience. The Indians will be exposed on the front line in the blocking defense game with only one player more than six feet tall in junior Sam Wiskirchen. Erin Matusinec would have been an asset and a great compliment to help Wiskirchen block some of those kill attempts by opponents, but she decided not to play volleyball as a senior.

Wiskirchen, who split time between the varsity and JV in 2013, will use her athleticism and height to defend and score points.

"I'll just try my best," she said. "I'll just have to work super hard and try to get those blocks down. I've been working my butt off already and we'll see how it goes."

Getting back on the winning track won't be easy coming out of the gate.

"There's going to be growing pains throughout the whole program from top to bottom," Leitzke said. "From what I saw, they ran a rotational defense last year and I'm more of a perimeter-read defense. So they have to learn my defense and I have to teach them because I didn't

get to have my contact days, I lost those hours in the gym in the summer."

The Indians want to be more aggressive on offense.

"I want to put the other team in a bind as much as possible," Leitzke said. "If we're free-balling over, we're doing ourselves a disservice, especially in that quality conference with Waupun, Plymouth and Sheboygan Falls. They're not going to be taking those free balls and sending them back as a free ball. If we give them a free ball, they're going to hit back at us. So we need to be aggressive and put them out as much as we can."

The two areas that Kewaskum needs to focus on is communication and court awareness. Sometimes they gave up points by standing around and not reacting on defense quick enough and there was some talking on the court but not enough.

"Court presence and communication makes a difference in a lot of games be-

tween getting an aggressive swing and having to pass that ball over," Leitzke said. "We want to be aggressive."
