Letter to the Editor

To The Statesman-

I have lived in Kewaskum for nine years now. I appreciate it as a welcoming community, and as a great place to raise a family. You have entrusted your children's education to me as a principal, and I have never taken that responsibility lightly. We all do not agree on everything, but I have always seen us work together for our children.

Recently though, I feel a divide happening regarding the Common Core State Standards (CCSS), and for reasons I feel are politically motivated. This is unfortunate as we have always remained united for the youth of our community, and have at times had to respectfully agree to disagree.

The Common Core is simply standards of learning for our students. They have been in place for three years, and it is easy to see as an educator they are more rigorous than the previous standards, and they are simply solid standards. There is no reason to create new standards. All organizations have standards to have consistency and quality, and aim above those standards as well. That is what the Kewaskum School District is doing.

Examples of CCSS:

English Language Arts Standards » Writing » Grade 2 » Write opinion pieces in which they introduce the topic or book they are writing about, state an opinion, supply reasons that support the opinion, use linking words (e.g., because, and, also) to connect opinion and reasons, and provide a concluding statement or section.

Grade 5 » Operations & Algebraic Thinking » Analyze patterns and relationships. Generate two numerical patterns using two given rules. Identify apparent relationships between corresponding terms. Form ordered pairs consisting of corresponding terms from the two patterns, and graph the ordered pairs on a coordinate plane.

Grade 8 » Statistics & Prob-

ability » Investigate patterns of association in bivariate data. Use the equation of a linear model to solve problems in the context of bivariate measurement data, interpreting the slope and intercept.

That's it. Nothing to be afraid of at all. Outside of this, all other educational decisions are made on the local level. As an educator in this school district, as a parent of children who attend the school district, and as a village taxpayer I have no issues with the CCSS.

As I work with the CCSS as a principal, which are only for Math and Language Arts at this time, these are considerably more challenging than the previous standards. No question about it.

I wonder for all those who are criticizing the CCSS if they have seen the standards? When some realize the standards are fine, most people quickly move to question or criticize the Smarter Balanced Assessment that will assess these standards.

Some people are afraid they are sharing personal information with the Federal Government. If that is being shared, it is not connected to any student name. The Federal Government may get information from the Smarter Balanced Assessment as a whole that may contain race, gender, and the assessment score. The state requires us to assess using Smarter Balanced.

Nothing to fear there either, but someone or a very small group is telling parents this assessment asks very personal questions and are sharing personal information with the Federal Government. That is just not true. Nor is any type of "biometric" tests tied to the CCSS, which some people have been led to believe.

The nation's governors and education commissioners, through their representative organizations, the National Governors Association Center for Best Practices (NGA) and the Council of Chief State School

Officers (CCSSO), led the development of the Common Core State Standards and continue to lead the initiative. The Federal Government did not develop these.

The connection is that the government may, have, or will connect Federal Grants to the CCSS. The Federal Government and State Government have been doing these types of incentives for many, many years in the civic and educational realm.

This fear of government heavy handedness in this case is simply that... a fear. Which is why I have found this so disturbing. Some people are putting politics in front of our students' education. Your children, mine, and our neighbors. That is unacceptable to me as a taxpayer, educator, and parent of KSD students. I completely respect those who are passionate about this no matter which side they are on, but the misleading information being shared is not acceptable.

Again, good parents and community members are being driven by fear and political agendas, which is very unfortunate. Someone at the annual meeting who was speaking against Common Core was concerned about the teachers. If you want to see our teachers stressed out and disheartened... change the standards. This is not what our teachers want as that would mean an unimaginable workload to create and adjust our curriculum to another set of standards after adapting to the CCSS.

I have listened for months to people speak about the Common Core, and it is easy to see how good people, my neighbors, and parents of students in the school district, have been misled by people who are

more concerned with politics than the education of your children and mine. I hope we can work together for the good of our children.

While I respect those and their concerns on the other side of this argument, I support the KSD in implementing the

CCSS as an educator, as a taxpayer, and mostly as a parent. I hope to see parents, community members, and staff at the Sept. 8th school board meeting to show your support of our students and staff.







Kewaskum Historical Society to host Early Farm Days September 7

The year was 1849. James K. Polk was just completing his term as President of the United States and Zachary Taylor was elected as his successor. Wisconsin was just created as a state and the University of Wisconsin opened a 1 room school house with 20 students. That same year a group of Washington County Supervisors changed the name of the area known as North Bend to the Town of Kewaskum. It was named after Chief Kewaskum, a member of the Potawatomi tribe who settled in the area during the early to middle 1800s.

Fast forward to 1895. The Town of Kewaskum was growing with agriculture being the primary consideration for settlement. Businesses such as Myers Mill, Backhaus Saw Mill, Rimmel Manufacturing, Nic. Marx Groceries and Saloon, Miller Drug Store and Koch Store were established and flourishing. The Rosenheimer family was also running numerous businesses including a malt house, bank, mercantile store and implement dealership. Then

on May 7th, 1895 the Town of Kewaskum was incorporated into the Village of Kewaskum.

Through the years the village continued to grow with companies like Miller's Furniture Store, Regal Ware and Honeck Cheverolet building their roots in Kewaskum. It was then in 1975 that a group of citizens decided it was time to preserve the past by forming the Kewaskum Historical Society.

The Kewaskum Historical Society (KHS) was founded and held their first Early Farm Days in 1975. The KHS opened their museum in 1976 preserving local artifacts, historical photos and documents.

In 1982 the KHS completed the moving and reconstruction of the 1800s log cabin donated by the Reysen family of Beechwood. It was placed near the museum on the banks of the Milwaukee River. The log cabin offers a look into the past for its visitors complete with period furniture, household items and clothing. Through the years the organization has continued to expand their collection

with additional display space and remodeling performed by the club members.

Each spring the KHS offers an opportunity for area fourth graders to experience the past by participating in Pioneer Days. The museum and log cabin are also available for tours on Sundays during the summer or by appointment. The KHS wraps up the season by holding Early Farm Days the first Sunday after Labor Day.

This year Early Farm Days will be held September 7th. The theme for the event is "Welcome to Grader Kewaskum". Hosting a variety of local steam and gas engines, threshing and farm equipment and antique graders there is something for everyone.

The museum, log cabin and grounds are also open and available for viewing. The day would not be complete without a visit to the food and beverage stand which includes brats, burgers, home made pie and ice cream. Also make sure to visit the farm animals and clothes washing stand for the kids. Finish the afternoon with a horse carriage ride through downtown Kewaskum and live music.

The KHS is located at 1202 Parkview Dr in Kewaskum just off the Hwy 28 bridge. The event is accessible during construction by following First Street east to Railroad St. or Parkview Dr. off of Hwy 45. Free parking and admission.







went 55 yards on 8 plays to score the first points of the game, 3 minutes 22 seconds into the contest, on a quarterback keeper by senior Ben Schueller at the 8:31 mark of the first quarter to lead 7-0.

The Indians started their second drive of the game with 4 minutes remaining in the quarter and took 3:43 off the clock to go 60 yards on nine plays, getting three first downs along the way. Junior quarterback Mike Prochnow converted a big third-down play on a 10-yard pass to junior tight end Eric Doll to keep the drive alive. He went to Doll again on the next play for 11 more yards and another first down. After Prochnow ran for seven on a second down at the Port 25, he gave the ball to junior Brandon Thull, who raced the final 18 yards to the end zone with 17 seconds left to tie the game at 7-7.

Late in the first half, Thull's interception with 1:53 left turned into a quick score for the offense. A Prochnow to Witek connection from 9 yards put the Indians ahead by a touchdown going into the half. What hurt the green and white offense was the mental mistakes such as penalties and dropped passes.

Kewaskum received the ball in the second half, and before some of the spectators returned to their seats, Thull saw an opening in the middle

of the field that parted like the Red Sea and created by the trap blocks by the offensive line. He ran 61 yards to the house untouched to pad the lead to 20-7. But the ensuing kickoff to Port almost took the Senior wingback Ben Fleischmann ran 76 yards down the left side and was 3 yards short of the end zone, thanks to a touchdown-saving run-down tackle by Kewaskum's Ben Watzig. Senior fullback Alec Masters scored on the next play for the Pirates to cut the lead to 20-14.

"Special teams are hurting us right now," Kewaskum coach Jason Piittmann said. "We got to shore that up somehow, somehow. I'm not sure what I got to do with that, but I got to start finding the guys that can get the job done out there on that."

The bright spot on the special team side in the Port game was the kicker-by-committee by a position player to kick extra points because the Indians may not make every two-point conversion they attempt after a TD. Witek practiced kicking last week and made both PAT kicks.

"(Charlie) did a nice job," Piittmann said. "We gave him a shot in practice. He looked pretty good and so, hey, he hit two." For Witek, it was like learning to drive a car again. "They said, 'Charlie, keep kicking.' I was a kicker in the

eighth grade, and I somehow got the job done," he said. "I have to see who's in that spot this week and see what we can do with it." Witek scored eight of the team's 20 points (TD, two extra points).

The team as a whole has a lot of work to do leading up to conference. The Indians play Sheboygan Falls this Friday at home and at Waupun, Sept. 12.
