All Kewaskum Schools improve their Wisconsin school report card

The Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction (DPI) has released their annual school report cards. Every school in the Kewaskum School District improved from their 2013 scores and the district as a whole exceeds expectations set forth by DPI.

Report cards for Wisconsin schools and school districts show that the majority meet or exceed expectations for student achievement and academic engagement in the 2013-14 school year. As a district Kewaskum improved by 3.59 percent over last year's reports.

Curriculum Director Mark Bazata stated, "We are thrilled by the growth that our students in every school have exhibited over the past year as indicated by the 2014 school report cards. This only confirms our beliefs that Kewaskum has amazing teachers in

every one of our schools. We will continue to raise our expectations of our students as we strive to prepare them for their future."

Superintendent Jim Smasal said, "The results of the Wisconsin report cards endorses the mission of the Kewaskum School District. Every Child. Every Day. We give our students the opportunities of larger district while still having the personalization of a small town district."

Exceeding expectations by the state report card standards were Wayne Elementary (82.7), Farmington Elementary (81.0) Kewaskum Elementary (77.3) and Kewaskum High School (76.2). Kewaskum Middle School was the only school in the district to only meet expectations.

For the past three years, KMS has improved their results. In 2011-'12

they were at 68, in 2021-'13 their score was 68.5.

Regional results showed Campbellsport, West Bend, Hartford and Waupun districts only met expectations while Kewaskum and Slinger exceeded expectations.

This is the second year the DPI has issued district report cards and the third year for school report cards. Both evaluate schools and districts in four priority areas: student achievement in reading and mathematics on statewide assessments; student growth in those assessed areas; closing gaps for reading and mathematics achievement and graduation, based on student subgroups; and postsec

Tennis team enjoying wins

A mix of seasoned seniors and talented underclassmen is helping to produce wins for this year's Kewaskum High School tennis team.

Last week was a busy one for the Lady Indians, who finished 2-1 in the Brown Deer Tournament Saturday and topped Plymouth in a 4-3 thriller Thursday, two days after being outclassed by Sheboygan Falls, one of the leaders in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference.

About the Plymouth match, coach Caroline Holsen said McKenzie Rosenthal was the hero, posting a win at No. 4 singles in the final match to clinch the team victory, Rosenthal defeated Mary Addy, 6-3, 6-3.

"McKenzie is doing pretty well. She came over from volleyball (this year)," Holsen said, reporting the other wins came from Becca Strigenz and Jeray Riffel at Nos. 1 and 2 singles and Gabrielle Wade and Maddie Kreis at No. 1 doubles.

Strigenz overwhelmed Cassandra Nicholson 6-1, 6-0, while Riffel was a 6-3, 6-1 winner over Scarlet Simenz. The KHS Wade/Kreis doubles team breezed through their match versus Paige Stoney and Michaela Kelly in straight sets, 6-2, 6-2.

"They are pretty steady for us," Holsen said about Strigenz and Riffel, pointing out her No. 1 player is pretty good at all facets of the game, while Riffel "is more of a power player."

The Brown Deer Tournament was scheduled to be a two-day event, but rain wiped out Friday's matches, which included Kewaskum facing Dominican. On Saturday, the Lady Indians defeated Brown Deer 6-1, lost to Grafton 3-4 and edged Milwaukee Rufus King 4-3.

On the day, Riffel went 3-0 with a 6-0, 6-1 win over Brown Deer, a 6-2, 6-1 victory over Goleen Roder of Grafton and finished the day with a hard-fought 7-6, 6-1 win over Madi Griffith of King.

Rosenthal also had a perfect 3-0 day. Her toughest match came against Grafton when she outlasted Izzy Teich 6-3, 2-6 and 10-8.

secondary readiness, which uses several measures as predictors of college and career readiness.

Although Kewaskum is improving steadily, there is still work to be done. "We still have much work to do when it comes to giving our student the best opportunities for success. We need to continue to emphasize the importance of literacy and numeracy with our students, and prepare them to be successful citizens," said Bazata. "Even though we have made tremendous gains in student learning, we can't stop now. We need the support of our parent and community to make Kewaskum a destination district."

Accountability scores are calculated on a scale of zero to 100, which is a score and not a percentage tied to a letter grade. District report cards are calculated for the district as a whole, essentially treating the district as a large school. Along the report card's five accountability ratings, 9 districts significantly exceed expectations, 159 exceed expectations and 247 meet expectations. On report card measures of student engagement — test participation of 95 percent, absenteeism below 13 percent, and a drop-out rate of less than 6 percent — six districts had deductions from their overall scores for

missing these goals.

"I can't stress the importance of parental involvement in our students' success," said Bazata. "It is only with the continued support of our parents and community that we will be able to prepare students to be college and career ready."



Gridiron teams have successful outing

After opening the season on the road, the Kewaskum Gridiron teams were happy to play at home this past Saturday, and the results were quite positive, two convincing wins and one hard-fought victory out of the four games.

8th grade — Kewaskum 28, Slinger Red 8: Big plays highlighted the eighth graders (2-0) second win of 2014, starting with an 85-yard punt return by Cameron Dodge, after the Indians' defense held Slinger to a three-and-out on its first series.

Hunter Grady kicked the PAT, making the score 8-0.

Dodge added a 58-yard scamper later in the first half, and coach Chad Piwoni said the play was made possible by "some great lead blocks by the fullback Eduardo Padilla and pulling guard Jon Leister."

To start the second half, Kewaskum went with a no-huddle offense and quickly moved the ball down the field, capping the drive with a 10-yard TD pass from Danny Breuer to Evan DeValk. The Indians quarterback also found wide receiver Alex Sette open for a 54-yard touchdown.

About the defense, Piwoni said, "We played very disciplined assignment football on defense, anchored by a wonderful effort by our defensive

linemen, specifically Hunter Grady, Jon Leister and Colten Miller."

7th grade — Kewaskum 13, Slinger Red 7: The defense saved the day for the seventh graders (2-0), according to coach Tom Kudek, who reported his team came up with three key turnovers.

The first TD was set up by a Mason Pomeroy interception in the second quarter. The pickoff came at about the 50-yard line, and one play later J.J. Thull broke free for a long TD run. The PAT try was successful, with Ty Cook passing the ball to Thull.

In the third quarter, Jay Horning recovered a fumble, and the Indians took advantage of it, with Jed Ermer running for a TD.

Braeden Maertz's interception was also big. It came in the fourth quarter after Slinger had scored to close the gap to six points. "That sealed the game for us," Kudek said, adding, "Our defense played real well. We were evenly matched ... I think Slinger made more mistakes than we did."

5th grade — Kewaskum 33, Slinger 8 Red: Coach Jeff Logan's young Indians (1-1) bounced back after their opening loss to score five touchdowns for a convincing victory over the Owls.

A first-quarter march was capped by a 4-yard quarterback

sneak by Jackson Fleischman, giving the Indians a lead they would not relinquish. Isaac Schmidt ran in the PAT.

In the second quarter, Schmidt added a TD on a short run, so Kewaskum was up 13-0 at the break.

In the second half, Luke Baumann was the offensive leader. First he scored on a run and later, after the Owls' lone TD, he came back with an exciting 70-yard kickoff return for TD No. 2, and the PAT was good on a Fleischman Taylor pass.

Schmidt scored his second touchdown late in the contest.

Logan said, "Everything went well." The coach was also pleased with the way his offensive linemen "stayed with their blocks so we could get our running game going."

6th grade — Muskego 35, Kewaskum 0: We didn't have a good day," coach Paul Anderson said, indicating, "Everyone else got Slinger and we got a D-1 school ... for the second week in a row."

Not to worry, Anderson went on, "We'll see if we can get things turned around."



Piittmann finds 100th win in New Holstein

NEW HOLSTEIN - Without a ground attack to cover the costly mistakes, a coaching milestone would've been postponed by at least a week. Brandon Thull eased the misery, running for 247 yards and two touchdowns in a 22-12 Eastern Wisconsin Conference win over New Holstein, Sept. 12, to give Kewaskum coach Jason Piittmann his 100th career win.

The junior running back fumbled a punt in the second quarter that was recovered by New Holstein senior linebacker Aaron Schaefer at the Kewaskum 26, but the Indians' defense stood their ground on fourth-and-goal at the 2 with the Huskies knocking on the door.

Both teams struggled in a downpour that produced a slick field and a wet ball contributed to the fumbles and interceptions in a sloppy first half of action and an 8-6 halftime lead by Kewaskum, which came on a 4-yard connection from junior quarterback Mike Prochnow to junior Charlie Witek and a two-point conversion run by Thull with 29 seconds left in the first quarter. Schaefer scored from a yard out with 37 seconds in the

half.

In the second half, Thull, with 75 first half yards, carried the team - and New Holstein defenders - on his back, gaining 172 yards and scoring two TDs to give Kewaskum (4-0 overall, 2-0 conference) some breathing room and kept New Holstein (1-3 0-2) at arms' length.

Two big plays downfield by the Huskies, a 49-yarder from junior quarterback Justin Weber to senior receiver Colton Davis that led to Schaefer's score and a 74-yard TD reception by sophomore running back Devin Strupp in the fourth, could've changed the game if not for Thull's big 63-yard run in the third quarter and his TD from 5 yards in the final period.

"We had some issues the first half," Piittmann said. "Weather conditions were terrible. That interception (in the first half), Michael didn't step into his throws and they were short and that happens. The defense played lights out all night long other than two plays and those two lightning bolts ended up making it interesting. Offensively, in the second half, we came out and we pounded the rock and we got the scores that we needed to put it away."

Thull, with 652 yards rush-

ing through four games, shook off his mistake and trusted his offensive line to open the holes for him. "The first punt . . . It was a mistake. It won't happen again," he said. "We turned it up in the second half and got it done. I give 100 percent credit to my O-line and also my receivers for making some awesome blocks (down the field). Touchdowns wouldn't be touchdowns (without the blocking)," he said.

The water bucket that was dumped on Piittmann's head, he said, felt warmer than the cold rain that fell all night, but there may not be time right now to reflect on the milestone with the heavy-hitters in the EWC still ahead. "The schedule only gets tougher as it goes this season," he said.

Mama said there would be days like this. The growing pains continue for Kewaskum's volleyball team in their first season under coach Laine Leitzke. In every game, the team is learning a valuable lesson as the losses pile up.

At Kiel, Sept. 11, Kewaskum lost in a four-set game, 23-25, 6-25, 25-16 and 13-25. After last weekend, they were 1-9 overall and 0-5 in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference.

The Indians lost focus in the second game after trailing 8-2. They scored only four more points in their 25-6 defeat to give the Raiders a 2-0 lead. In the third game, the green and white displayed the fire and determination that Leitzke knew they could bring out.

"We took the third and played exceptionally well," he said. "We pushed that entire set. We made (Kiel) play de-

Bright spots for the offense were limited to the 2x4 plate efforts of Adam Sarauer and Austin Sarauer.


Jim Ziegler, the A's ace, picked up the loss, while Jake Panzer tossed three innings of scoreless relief to keep the game close.
