## Public to review master plan for Northern Kettle Moraine

An open house meeting is set so the public can learn about and comment on the draft master plan for the nine wildlife, fishery and natural area properties in the Northern Kettle Moraine Region.

The West Bend meeting includes a live, interactive internet presentation that gives online viewers the option to submit questions to DNR staff.

The draft contains DNR recommendations for habitat and recreation goals and objectives for the nine properties in the DNR's Northern Kettle Moraine Region Wildlife, Fishery and Natural Area planning group.

Informational displays and maps will be available and staff from the different programs will be present for one-on-one questions and discussion.

An open house will be held to receive public comments and answer questions on Thursday, Sept. 25, 5-7:30 p.m., at the Washington County Public Agency Center, 333 E. Washington St., West Bend, in room

113A/B. This open house will focus on Theresa, Allenton and Jackson Marsh wildlife areas and Cedarburg Bog State natural area.

Informational displays will be available and staff will be present for one-on-one questions and discussion. A formal DNR presentation takes place at 6 p.m. providing an overview of the master planning process. From 6:30 to 7:30 the open house meeting will continue for more one-on-one questions and discussion.

During Thursday's meeting in West Bend, DNR will broadcast the presentation from 6-6:30 online and will take questions from the online audience. The presentation can be found online at: <http://dnrmedia.wi.gov/main/Play/28c6d61f-0fe644eea2e6308ba602e94f1d>

The draft master plan is also available for public review during public hours at the DNR Plymouth office, 1155 Pilgrim Road, and at the Natural Resources building at 101 S. Webster Street in Madison where visitors can

ask for the facilities and lands program.

A copy of the draft master plan will also be provided to the following public libraries: Campbellsport Public Library, Cedarburg Public Library, Kiel Public Library, Mayville Public Library, Plymouth Public Library, Port Washington - W.J. Niederkorn Library, Sheboygan - Mead Public Library, West Bend Community Memorial Library and Lakeview Community Library in Random Lake

Comments on the draft master plan may be submitted at the open houses public meetings, by phone, mail, email or online through October 10, 2014.

## Letters to the Editor

To The Statesman:

One of the great contradictions of modern politics is that although we champion free market capitalism to ensure freedom and prosperity it always seems to be the elected politicians who have responsibility for the economy. Thus I find myself somewhat uneasy with the recent column by Kewaskum Police Chief Tom Bishop about the police effort to enforce property maintenance ordinances with the goal of achieving economic growth.

First, as someone who has traveled far and wide I can testify that people in Wisconsin need very little prompting from government to keep their property well ordered.

Second, active surveillance of the community, instead of responding to complaints, risks becoming overly intrusive into the lives of private citizens. Conservative values tell us to place faith in private property and the community and not to accept government intrusion for light reasons.

Third, we should consider that such active enforcement risks placing disproportionate burden on low-income people. After receiving an official letter about my unregistered car I was fortunate to be able to move the car into my garage. Not everyone has a garage. I can imagine a scenario in which a family without a garage, that cannot afford car repairs, is ticketed in effect for their lack of money.

Fourth, it seems unlikely that government effort to clean up private lives will actually result in economic growth. It's more likely that growth results

from good schools, affordable water, and economic policy at the state and federal level.

Instead of such an actively punitive policy regarding private property I endorse the part of Chief Bishop's column that focused on encouragement and active expression of shared values of orderliness rather than the heavy hand of government. Let the police focus on public safety.

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## Community invited to join the 'Fight for Schneiss'

For several months, Campbellsport resident Joel Schneiss, 42, has been battling a rare form of stomach cancer, which at the onset, attacks the appendix.

The cancer is known as pseudomyxoma peritonei (PMP). Over time, the slow-growing tumor in the appendix swells and can break through the wall of the appendix and spread tumor cells into the lining of the stomach. Unlike other cancers, PMP rarely spreads via the lymphatic system or the bloodstream. It usually remains inside the stomach area, spreading along its internal surface.

A 1991 graduate of Kettle Moraine Lutheran High School and an employee of Weasler Engineering, Kewaskum, Schneiss underwent cytoreductive surgery, on August 11, at Froedtert Hospital in Milwaukee. In the

procedure, a heated chemotherapy drug was placed in his stomach for 90 minutes, aiming to kill any remaining tumor cells. He now faces an extensive healing period.

Schneiss, his wife, Brenda (Kufahl) Schneiss, a cosmetologist at Exhale Salon, West Bend and their children, Paige, 13, and Marshall, 10, are faced with escalating medical bills. A father, husband, coach and sports enthusiast, who plays softball and other sports, Schneiss has many supporters -- family members, friends, community members and strangers, who are rallying to his cause, with Herb Justman leading the initiative.

They will sponsor a "Fight for Schneiss" benefit, from 10 a.m. to midnight, Saturday, September 27, at the Campbellsport Firemen's Park. The event includes a variety of activities. There will be two competitions, a softball tourna-

ment and a washer-toss tournament. Games and bouncy houses will be offered for children.

Three types of auctions will be held, a silent auction, super silent auction and a live auction with Justman as auctioneer.

A 50/50 cash raffle will be held, with 50 percent of the cash awarded to the winner and the other 50 percent added to the benefit proceeds, which will be awarded to the Schneiss family to help offset their medical bills. Food and beverages will be served throughout the event. The Big Noise band will perform from 7:30 - 11:30 p.m.

Benefit organizers are currently seeking donations for sponsorship for the event, auction items and raffle prizes.



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

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# Thull wins by a nose for Indians in Raider contest

A bad call during a crucial game in overtime tipped the scales Kewaskum's way. Without the benefit of instant replay in high school, the side judge ruled that junior running back Brandon Thull stretched the nose of the football across the end zone in a two-point conversion for the deciding score in a 44-43 win by the Indians, last Friday, at home.

After visiting Kiel scored in overtime on their first try to break a 36-36 tie in regulation, Kewaskum reached the end zone on Thull's 10-yard run to make it 43-42, Kiel. When three Kiel defenders appeared to stop Thull inches from the goal line, they celebrated until the official raised his hands in the air to signal that the conversion was good. They drew an unsportsmanlike conduct for their anger, but the call stood after a brief discussion with the other officials.

It was a tough loss for Kiel (3-2 overall, 1-2 conference), but the football gods looked down at Kewaskum (5-0, 3-0) because they got the break that they needed in the end but caught a bad one right after the opening kickoff.

About 13 seconds into the game, Kiel senior quarterback Jack Meunier raced 58 yards for a touchdown and a 7-0 lead at the 11 minute 36 second mark that stunned the home crowd.

"I was on the other side of the field," junior linebacker Zach Thull said. "I just thought that he got way outside and nobody was containing him. That play broke down the defense, so that happens."

The Indians answered with a 17-yard TD run by junior running back Berat Elmazi with 2:22 left in the first quarter, but a failed two-point pass made the score 7-6. Meunier scored again from 7 yards at the end of the quarter for a 14-6 advantage.

Thull scored two of his game-high five TDs in the second quarter, one from 8 yards and the other from 4 yards and both two-point conversions were good. Kiel also scored in the quarter. Kewaskum led 22-21 at the half.

Both teams got TDs in the third quarter with Kiel making a two-point conversion and Kewaskum kicking a PAT to tie the game at 29-all, entering the final quarter of regulation.

The Indians rode the back of Thull, who rushed for a career high of 430 yards on 51 carries. His go-ahead TD from 5 yards gave the green and white a 36-29 lead with 8:14 left. Kiel senior receiver Bryce Gannigan burned Kewaskum junior defensive back Josh Baker in man coverage for a 20-yard TD from Meunier with 1:58 left to tie it at 36 and send the game into overtime.

"The last (Kiel drive), we bit up on the under route,"

Kewaskum coach Jason Piitmann said. "We have to stay with the deep guy. We drilled it all week."

Brandon Thull wore down the Raiders' defense with his hard-nosed running. "I always feel stronger when I carry the ball and I can trust my O-line," he said. When it was crunch time, the Indians relied on him to pull off the win to stay undefeated overall and in conference. "We were shocked and excited at the same time," Zach Thull said of Brandon's game-winning run. "(Brandon's) my family and he's trained for it and I wanted (the win) so bad."
