



## Delcore joins Vietnam veterans honored with overdue thanks

For Campbellsport resident Henry Delcore, Friday, Aug. 1 was a day punctuated with "ah-ha" moments.

A Vietnam War veteran, Delcore and 99 fellow Vietnam War veterans participated in the second annual Yellow Ribbon Honor Flight, sponsored by Old Glory Honor Flight, American Airlines and the EAA (Experimental Aircraft Association).

Old Glory Honor Flight Inc., founded in 2009 and headquartered in Appleton, is one of 110 Honor Flight hubs nationwide. The organization is dedicated to transporting World War II veterans and, more recently, veter-

ans of other armed conflicts, to Washington, D.C., to visit memorials built in their honor.

The mission of Old Glory Honor Flight, Northeast Wisconsin's hub of the Honor Flight Network, is to provide the veterans a memorable, safe and rewarding tour of honor to the nation's capital -- a whirlwind tour happening in one day and free of charge to veterans -- to thank them for their service and sacrifices to their country. The flight is paid through donations and fundraising.

The Yellow Ribbon Honor Flight is a one-time opportunity designed specifically for Vietnam War veterans -- many of them accompanied by guardians who pay \$500 for their par-

ticipation.

The August 1 flight, the American Airlines 737 Yellow Ribbon Aircraft Flagship Liberty, departed from Witman Regional Airport at the EAA Air-Venture grounds in Oshkosh, at 6 a.m. and flew to Ronald Reagan Washington National Airport in Arlington, Vir., 3 miles south of Washington, D.C. The veterans visited the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Wall and other memorials, the Smithsonian American History Museum, and Arlington National Cemetery.

Delcore was drafted into the U.S. Army in December 1967. He served

The Washington County Injury Prevention Coalition and the Safe Kids Southeast Wisconsin Coalition along with the Washington County Health Department will be conducting a program called "Walk This Way - Walk Your Child To school Day" on October 8 at all West Bend and Kewaskum Elementary Schools and Lincoln Elementary School in Hartford.

KES students will meet at the Kewaskum Fire Department on Fond du Lac Ave. at 8 a.m. to start walking at 8:20 a.m.

Nationwide, pedestrian injuries are the second cause of accidental death among children ages five to 14. Each year in the United States, approximately 650 children are killed and 43,000 treated in emergency rooms as a result of pedestrian injuries.

Practical, skills-based training has been demonstrated to improve child pedestrian behavior. Take the time to teach your children to:

Look left, right and left again before crossing the street. Cross when the street is clear, and keep looking both ways while crossing. Walk - don't run.

Understand and obey traffic signals and signs.



## Prescription drug collection box now available at police department



The Kewaskum Police Department announced, Monday, a new prescription drug collection box has been placed in the main lobby area of the their office adjacent to the Village Hall - the goal of which is to give area residents a safe place to dispose of prescription drugs.

Police Chief Tom Bishop explained residents are encouraged to bring any unused or expired prescription drugs to the department and deposit them into the red box. You do not need to identify yourself or explain what you are placing into the box, simply come in and drop items off. In addition to unused or unwanted prescriptions, over the counter medication along with vitamins are

also accepted. Needles or any other sharps are not accepted. Bishop stated he hopes the drop box will keep area youth safe by keeping drugs out of their hands. Prescriptions sitting in medicine cabinets can be tempting to youth.

"I would like to publicly thank CVS Pharmacy for donating the collection box to us. This is just another way our department can try and assist our community in the fight against drug abuse," Bishop said.

The police department lobby is not open 24 hours so please plan accordingly. Generally, the office is open from 7 a.m. - 4 p.m. Monday through Friday - but hours do vary at times.



## Community invited to Fire Prevention Week open house

The community is invited to visit the Kewaskum Fire Department on October 9, during an open house, to celebrate Fire Prevention Week taking place Oct. 5-11.

The fire department encourages family, friends and neighbors to gather for an evening of fun, learning and fire prevention materials for all ages. The open house will take place from 6:30 until 9 p.m.

For ages eight and under, volunteer firefighters will host pretend fire drills. Children will pretend to sleep in bed and we will sound a real smoke detector. The lights will be out and we will simulate smoke with blankets overhead. Children will then be taught the proper way to crawl, check doors for heat and find their way out. Next they will be taught to dial 911 and talk to a dispatcher to call for help. Firefighters will also have gym mats out to practice stop, drop and roll. If that is not enough fun attendees can practice handling a small fire hose while putting out a pretend fire or watch fire prevention videos on the big screen.

Did you know your smoke alarm expires? For ages 8 and up firefighters will teach how to inspect a smoke alarm, carbon monoxide detector and fire extinguishers. Everyone will have

a chance to meet firefighters in gear, get guided station tours and inspect the station and the equipment inside. EMS staff will also be available to assess blood pressure for visitors.

As always, the department is always on the lookout for more volunteers. Whether you are interested in being an EMT, Firefighter or just visiting, experienced staff will be available to answer your questions. Those looking to volunteer with the department but are unable to attend the open house can call 626-2411 during normal business hours.

## Check for invasive species when removing equipment from water

Summer is giving way to autumn and lake residents and lake service providers are starting to remove boats, docks, and piers from the water. This presents an annual opportunity to see if any Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS) have stuck to your submerged equipment! Little extra effort is required to check for aquatic invasive species. Typical AIS found in Washington County lakes include Eurasian Water-milfoil, Curly-leaf pondweed, and Zebra Mussels. If you see something new or unfamiliar on the bottom of your pier or boat, you can be the first to report it!

To protect the rest of Washington County's lakes and rivers, Bradley Steckart, Washington County AIS Coordinator is asking landowners and contractors to carefully examine piers, boats, boatlifts, rafts and any other equipment that has been in the water for a prolonged period of time for signs of zebra mussels or other unfamiliar species during removal.

"The clean equipment that gets installed every year provides an excellent home for aquatic invasive species, like zebra mussels, to colonize," explains Steckart. "Although it's often difficult to thoroughly inspect a structure while it is in the water, during removal anyone involved with the process can easily monitor for invasive species."

AIS are non-native plants and animals that threaten Wisconsin's waters by causing environmental and economic harm. One example is zebra mussels which can encrust piers, boats and motors, and their sharp shells can cut the feet of swimmers.

"In Washington County, Zebra Mussels are present in our most popular bodies of water," Steckart said, "likely because recreational boaters or anglers traveled to different water bodies without cleaning

their equipment. It is a common misconception that they are in all of our bodies of water because you hear about them so often, but in reality, they have been reported in only 7 of our County lakes and less than 5% of Wisconsin lakes. This means preventing the spread of zebra mussels is important."

In addition to a visual inspection, citizens/contractors are encouraged to feel smooth surfaces of equipment to check for juvenile zebra mussels as they may have a "sand-paper like" feel and are often invisible to the human eye. If zebra mussels or other new invasive species are found:

- Check that the invasive species has not been previously found in your waterbody by visiting <http://dnr.wi.gov/lakes/invasives/AISLists.aspx?species=ZM>

- If the invasive species has already been found in your waterbody, clean off your equipment and DO NOT move to any other waterbody without taking appropriate measures

- If the invasive species has not been found in your waterbody, note the exact location where the animal was found

- Take a digital photo of the animal in the setting where it was found (if possible). Then collect up to five specimens of varying sizes. Place in a jar with water; put on ice and place in your refrigerator

- Contact Bradley Steckart, AIS Coordinator at (262) 335-4806 and deliver specimens

"Responding quickly to new AIS detections is critical to help slow the spread into other waterbodies," says Tim Campbell, AIS Communications Specialist for UW-Extension and the Wisconsin DNR. "It can also help control AIS within a body of water. Efforts

of citizens statewide can help us achieve that."

There are also specific laws lake property owners and contractors must follow to prevent the spread of AIS. Prior to transporting any equipment Wisconsin law requires you to:

- INSPECT boats, trailers, boat lifts, piers, rafts and equipment.
- REMOVE all attached aquatic plants and animals.
- DRAIN all water from boats, vehicles, and equipment.

Cross at corners, using traffic signals and crosswalks when available. Do not enter the street from between parked cars or behind bushes or shrubs.

Stop at the curb at the edge of the road if there is no sidewalk, before crossing the street. Never run into a street without stopping - even for a ball, pet or any other reason. Darting into the street accounts for the

majority of child pedestrian fatalities.

Walk across traffic, on sidewalks or paths. Walk as far to the left as possible if there are no sidewalks.

Watch for cars that are turning or backing up.



two years, one of them as a radio operator in Pleiku, a city in central Vietnam, which was the center of defense for the entire highland region of the Republic of Vietnam. He held the rank of sergeant at the time of his honorable discharge.

Delcore and his wife Nancy have two children -- Randy Delcore and Lora Yaggie. The couple have two grandsons -- Wes and Matty and a granddaughter Alivia. Now retired, Delcore was employed as assistant vice president of B.C. Ziegler and Co., a wealth management firm, formerly of West Bend and now located in Chicago, and as an account executive for Dixon MRD & Co., a printing business in West Bend.

Regarding the memorials he visited Aug. 1, "I had seen the Vietnam Wall before, back in the 1990s, while I was on a business trip to Washington, D.C.," he noted. But this time, there was an added benefit for him. The veterans were given materials to etch the names of those listed on the Wall with whom they are familiar. "I etched the names of two men -- Glenn Dean, who was in the Army, and Thomas Crook, who was in the Marine Corps," Delcore said. "I went to West Bend High School with them."

A native of Pound, near Oconto Falls, Delcore said he was truly amazed at the hundreds of people visiting the memorials.

A particularly memorable event of the day was that of observing the Changing of the Guard at Arlington National Cemetery, a first-time experience.

"The guards are so disciplined," he said. "I was im-

pressed by the respect and reverence the visitors had. You could have heard a pin drop."

A visit to the Vietnam Memorial at the Smithsonian American History Museum brought back memories for Delcore -- especially upon observing an original helicopter used in the Vietnam War.

Despite the fact that 58,000 members of the military lost their lives in the Vietnam War, "Those who returned did not get recognized for their service," Delcore said.

However, lack of recognition for the veterans was not a factor on the Yellow Ribbon Honor Flight. Veterans' names were announced for mail call during the return flight to Wittman Regional Airport.

"That was very exciting," Delcore recalled. "I received some very touching, thank-you letters from family members and friends. It was kind of emotional and pretty classy."

Hundreds of well-wishers greeted the returning veterans, at 7 p.m. that evening. "My family was there and many friends too," he said. "My 18-month-old granddaughter Alivia was waving a flag. It was a very nice reception for the veterans. I did not expect that. Some of them got really emotional."

The welcome-home ceremony, including speeches, was followed by a concert by Big Bad Voodoo Daddy, sponsored by the Disabled American Veterans and EAA Warbirds of America.

Participants on the Yellow Ribbon Honor Flight applied for the whirlwind, one-day tour between May 30 and June 23. The 100 par-

ticipants were selected in a random drawing.

Delcore advises other Vietnam veterans applying for future Yellow Ribbon Honor Flights, "Go for it! Try to forget what happened in Vietnam. Let's turn the page, and go on with life -- a wonderful gift."

The Honor Flight organization originated for transporting World War II veterans to Washington, D.C. to visit the memorial built in their honor in 2004. According to the Old Glory Honor Flight website, about 900 World War II veterans pass away daily. Thus, the Honor Flight organization recently began to include Korean War and Vietnam War veterans on some of its flights.

Thank you's to Vietnam War veterans and those of other armed conflicts will continue to be extended through future Old Glory Honor Flight journeys. Drew MacDonald, president of Old Glory Honor Flight, expressed that message on the Yellow Ribbon Honor Flight website.

"Old Glory Honor Flight is very proud of its strong working relationship with the EAA and is most humbled by the opportunity to once again partner with American Airlines at AirVenture to show our unwavering gratitude to these true American heroes," he said.

## No summer off for KCA student

Do you want to know what I did with my summer vacation? I went to school every day... Yeah, that sounds pretty horrible, doesn't it? Surprisingly, I actually had loads of fun coming around every day.

Next question, "Why did I go to school every day?" I was in charge of the greenhouse; making sure it was running properly each day and to tend to the garden daily to make sure all plant life was growing strong and healthy.

The first thing I did as soon as I got to the school was check on the greenhouse and aquaponics system. First, I would check and mark down the temperature outside and get a brief summary of the weather. Next, I checked the temperature inside the greenhouse and compared it to the outside temperature. Afterwards, I would take the temperature of the water in the tank of the aquaponics system and feed the fish.

Once a week after taking the temperature I would test the water and monitor the PH levels and the parts per million (PPM) of Nitrates, Nitrites, and Ammonia. Lastly, I checked the plumbing (pump, tubes, pipes) and made sure everything was running smoothly so the fish would be properly

oxygenated. Every once and a while I had to clean it out a bit to ensure optimal flow

After I was done with the greenhouse I would move onto the garden. During the school year I spent hours each day prepping the garden for the plants by rototilling the dirt and weeding the planting area. During the summer I would first walk the garden and check for ripe produce, if there was anything ready for harvest, I would pick it. Next, I would check for weeds growing in the midst of the plants and remove them. After weeding, I would thoroughly water the garden and make my way to the side of the building and water the sunflowers. Lastly, before I left, I always grabbed a handful of ripe raspberries to munch on; shhhh let's keep that part between you and me; our own little secret.

By the end of the summer I harvested more than twenty pounds of lettuce from the greenhouse, a few hundred tomatoes and about 20 cucumbers. Now that's a lot of produce, I bet you're wondering what I did with all of it aren't you? Every last pound of lettuce, every tomato, and cucumber was washed off, bunched together, and walked over to the Kewaskum Food Pantry where it was donated to help the community.

What did I do with my

summer vacation you ask? I learned about gardening. I learned how to maintain an aquaponics system. I helped out my community and got a good workout walking to school and working in the garden every day. Most of all, I was given a responsibility, managed it well, and gained a life experience that I, not only enjoyed, but will remember for the rest of my life.



## VOTING BY ABSENTEE BALLOT

Any qualified elector who is unable or unwilling to appear at the polling place on Election Day may request to vote an absentee ballot. A qualified elector is any U.S. citizen, who will be 18 years of age or older on Election Day, who has resided in the ward or municipality where he or she wishes to vote for at least 28 consecutive days before the election. It's more than a job, It's a calling

## Eighth graders maintain perfect status

A caravan of cars traveled to Cedar Grove Saturday for Gridiron games against Cedar Grove-Belgium, easily the smallest school remaining in the All American Youth Football League after the departure of Fredonia and Random Lake.

Kewaskum came out 3-1, highlighted by a hard-fought win by the unbeaten eighth grades and the thrilling first win of the season by the sixth grade.

**Eighth Grade** - Kewaskum 21, Cedar Grove-Belgium 16.

No question about it. Coach Chad Piwoni said this was "by far, our toughest game to date." Each time the Indians, now 4-0, scored, the Broncos would come fighting back.

Kewaskum scored on its first play from scrimmage when Cameron Dodge zigged and zagged his way for a 55-yard touchdown run. With Hunter

Grady's 2-point kick, the Indians were quickly up 8-0.

In the second quarter, the Indians added a 1-yard blast by Eduardo Padilla to go up 14-0, but CG-B got on the board via a TD pass, and after a successful kick, it was 14-8 at half.

The Broncos were driving for a potential tying or go-ahead score in the third quarter when Alex Sette came up with the biggest play of the game. "He made a fantastic leaping interception," according to Piwoni, who said his team marched down and field and scored on a 9-yard run by Padilla (Danny Breuer run for PAT) for a 21-8 advantage.

Cedar Grove-Belgium added a late TD with about a minute left that made the final 21-16.

"I was proud of the kids with the composure that they showed in the first real close game that we have had this season," the coach said.

**Fifth Grade** - Kewaskum 26, Cedar Grove-Belgium 0.

Kewaskum used a strong running game to dominate the Broncos 26-0 and improve to 3-1 on the year.

The Indians had three runs of 22 yards or better, starting with Isaac Schmidt's 30-yard scamper in the first quarter (Ben Butler PAT run). Luke Baumann's 12-yard TD run gave Kewaskum a 13-0 lead at the break, then Butler took over, scoring on a 35-yard run in the third quarter and a 22-yarder in the fourth. QB Jackson Fleischman was successful on a sneak for the other extra point.

When asked if his team had more than 200 yards rushing, coach Jeff Logan said, "I'm sure we did," praising his entire offensive line.

"Holden Serwe, for the defense, had a fumble recovery," according to Logan, who said, "We had our first really good, complete game."

**Sixth Grade** - Kewaskum 7, Cedar Grove-Belgium 6.

This was a battle of two winless teams, and the extra point scored by the Indians on a run by quarterback Nathan Droese was the difference in the game after he had scored a touchdown in the first quarter.

CG-B also scored in the first period but was stopped short of the goal line on the PAT try.

"The real story of the game was the defense," coach Paul Anderson said, citing Nathan Heberer and Kannon Muckerheide for "key stops."

## Kettle Moraine Bowl Trophy returns to Kewaskum, Indians win 42-7 against rival Cougars

CAMPBELLSPORT - Last year, the Kewaskum football team lost the traveling Kettle Moraine Bowl trophy for the first time in eight years. This year, they got it back and also qualified for the playoffs with a 42-7 road win, last Friday, at Dan O'Brien Field.

The Indians wasted no time getting on the scoreboard in the first quarter. They went three plays and 62 yards in 53 seconds, without running the ball. Junior quarterback Mike Prochnow hit junior receiver Charlie Witek twice for 27 yards total and threw to junior running back Steven Nurkala, who ran the final 35 yards to the end zone with 11 minutes 2 seconds left. It was 7-0 after the extra point kick.

Kewaskum (6-0 overall, 4-0 conference) scored three other times in the first quarter. Prochnow's QB sneak from one yard, junior running back Brandon Thull's 3-yard run and Prochnow's 15-yard pass to Witek gave the Indians a 28-0 lead heading into the second quarter.

With 1:16 in the first half, Thull scored the second of his three rushing TDs from four yards for a 35-0 advantage. The Cougars (4-2, 2-2) put together a late drive, but it ended on an attempted pass from senior quarterback Shaun Beisbier to senior receiver Ty Schmidt that was intercepted in the end zone by junior defensive back Josh Baker.

The second half was played with a running clock, per WIAA rules, because Kewaskum led by 35 points. Thull's TD from two yards made it 42-0. Campbellsport scored late in the third quarter to cut the lead to 42-7, but the clock ran through the fourth quarter because Kewaskum still led by the same margin.

Max Hardy was the bright spot for the Indians, making every extra point kick. The senior, who also plays soccer, splits his time between the two sports and is a welcome presence in the kicking game. "I was feeling a little nervous," he said. "It was the first time kicking a football in a game ever. I'm grateful that they asked me and I was happy to come out here and support my team and just give them what they needed."

Thull ran for 229 yards on 21 carries and three TDs. Prochnow was 7-of-10 for 117 yards and two TDs and Witek caught five passes for 55 yards and a TD.

Concerning who played the best, Holsen pointed to the athletic Jerary Riffel at No. 2 singles, who, "changed her strate-


gy throughout the match so she could outlast her opponent (Gabby Weier). That's how she wins."

## KHS kickers have a tough week

"We looked especially sharp the first part of the game," but then there was a period when the Indians failed to do much passing, a problem that is costly for most every soccer team. "They have to play as a team," Kenworthy said.

Joe Sanborn scored Kewaskum's lone goal on a pass from Noel Bindrach, and Nathan Heniadis "played a very solid game defensively," according to Kenworthy.

With the tie and the two losses, the Indians are 1-6 in EWC and 3-12-1 overall, with three games and a tournament on the schedule from Sept. 29-Oct. 4.
