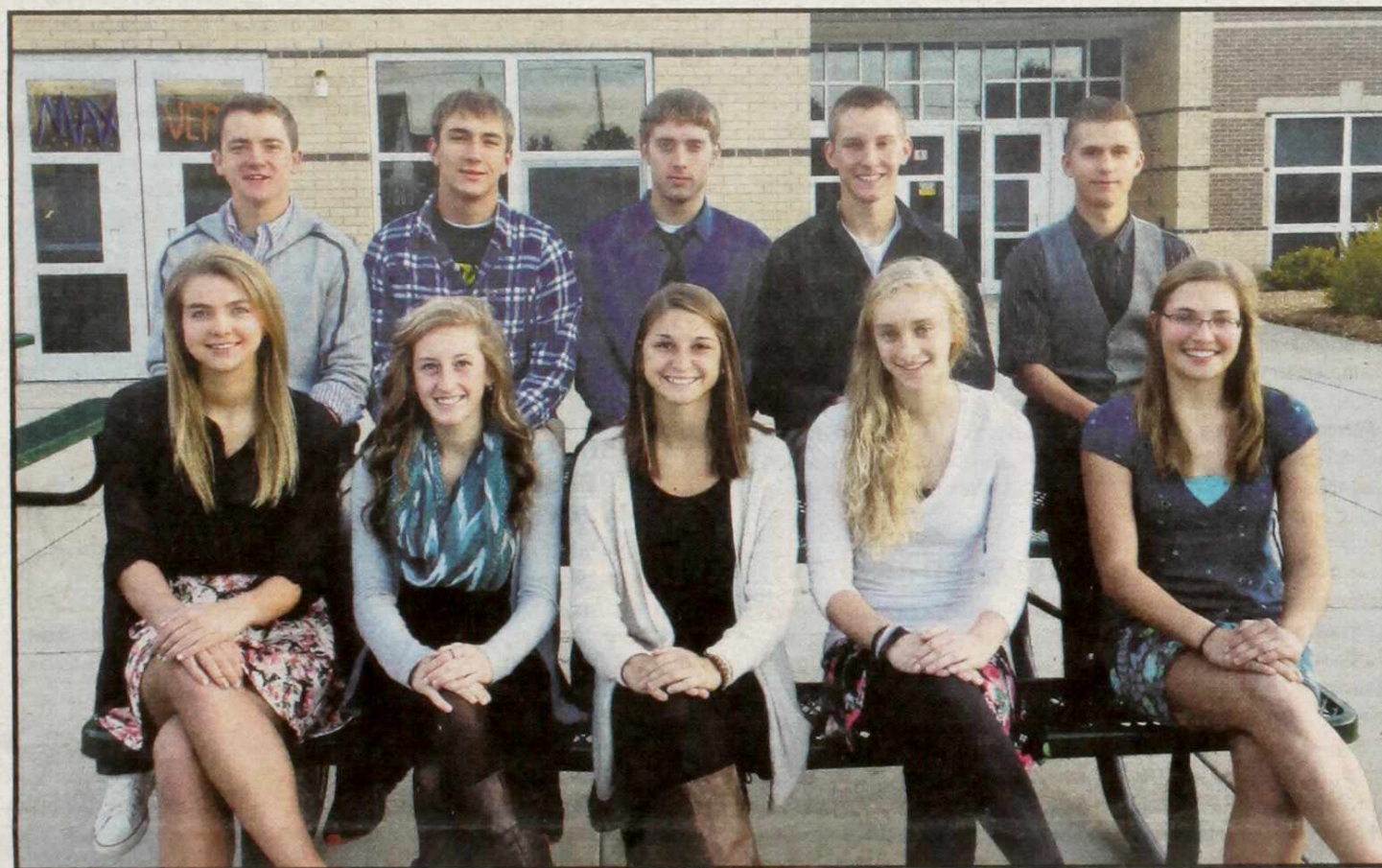

New WI Voter Photo ID Rules – Major Changes

Washington County Clerk Brenda Jaszewski urges voters to plan now to make sure they have the acceptable photo ID to vote beginning with the November 4, 2014 Election.

On September 12, 2014, the 7th Circuit Court of Appeals reinstated the photo ID law that has been enjoined by the courts since March, 2012. Most voters already have one of the types of photo ID required to vote.

Election Day

On Election Day, voters must provide one of the following photo IDs before they can cast a ballot: Wisconsin Driver's License, Wisconsin State ID Card, Military ID Card or a U.S. Passport

The above IDs are still valid if expired after the date of the most recent general election which was November 6, 2012.

The following forms of photo ID are also acceptable, but must be unexpired:

- A Certificate of Naturalization
- Driver's License Receipt issued by the WI DOT -ID issued by a federally recognized Wisconsin Indian Tribe

- A photo ID issued by a Wisconsin accredited university or college (please contact your Local Clerk, the Wisconsin Government Accountability Board or your college or university for specifications)

An acceptable photo ID is not required to include a current address.

If you do not have a valid WI Driver's License or WI State ID you can receive a free WI State ID from your local DMV if you specifically request a free ID for voting purposes. Please contact your local DVM or your Local

Clerk for more information.

Absentee Voting

During in-person absentee voting, voters must present photo ID just like on Election Day. In-person absentee voting can begin the third Monday before the election, and must end at 5 p.m. or the close of business, whichever is later, the Friday before the election. Please contact your local municipal clerk for the in-person voting hours for your municipality.

When voters request an absentee ballot by mail, they must include a photocopy of their photo ID with the request, or the ballot cannot be mailed. Voters who are "indefinitely confined" because of age, illness, infirmity or disability, and voters in care facilities may have their absentee

Wilde moves on to sectional after a sizzling 80

Leah Wilde's performance in the Division 1 golf regional hosted by Oshkosh North (at Westhaven Golf Course) will be a heavy favorite to go down as the top individual honor by a Kewaskum High School female athlete during the fall season.

Wilde, the lone KHS representative in the October 1 competition, fired a sizzling 10-over-par 40-40—80 to finish third overall and earn a spot in next week's sectional.

That's right, Wilde was competing against Division 1 athletes from the Fox Valley Association, the Fox River Classic and the Wisconsin Little Ten and came out third in what coach Amy Uhlig called "a huge accomplishment and a stepping stone for Leah."

Kewaskum had applied for a co-op golf team with Campbellsport two years ago and even though no CHS girls ever came out for the team it bumped the Indians up from D-2 to D-1.

That didn't phase Wilde, who advanced to the sectional last fall with a 97 and now this year. The 80, was a career low, according to Uhlig, who said, "She started out with a seven on the first hole, but after that she really put it together and played some phenomenal golf for the day."

What boosted Wilde's game at Oshkosh was her ability to keep her drives in the fairway. "She hit many greens in regulation, which set her up nicely for some tap-in pars," Uhlig said, adding, "She also had two birdies on the day."

"I was proud to experience this day with her," Uhlig said. "She's a kid who absolutely loves golf and she works hard at it. It's days like these

'Climbing for Hospice' campaign in full swing

Andy Land, 52, a registered nurse and director of Hospice & Palliative Care Services, Agnesian Health Care, Fond du Lac, is raising awareness about the benefits of hospice care, by challenging the power of his human potential.

Next spring, over a three-month period, this avid mountaineer and husband of Mary Sue, also a registered nurse, and father of sons -- Sam, 20; Ben, 19 and Matthew, 16 -- will attempt to reach the summit of Mount Everest, the world's tallest mountain, 29,029 feet, located in the Himalayan Mountains, on the border of Nepal and Tibet, China, and containing 240 peaks. Only five Wisconsin residents have accomplished this feat to date.

According to the Himalayan database, there have been 6,864 summits by 4,046 climbers, meaning that some of the climbers, mainly Sherpas -- Tibetans, living in the Himalayas, who act as porters in carrying climbers' gear -- have made multiple summits. Of the total ascents, 673 have been completed by 516 Americans.

A Mount Everest website notes that a few hundred climbers have died in their attempts to reach the summit. Conditions are so difficult that most of the corpses are left where they fall.

"Helicopters can't get up that high," Land said. "It's so high that there is not a lot of room for error. I could twist an ankle and then not be able to get down. Climbers also face altitude sickness, fierce winds and avalanches."

Since 1992, when he took up mountain climbing, the Battle Creek, Mich. native has reached the peaks of several mountains in North and South America, including Mount McKinley in Alaska and Mount Whitney in California. His greatest achievement to date has been reaching the summit of Mount Aconcagua at 22,841 feet, located in

the Andes Mountain range in Argentina, South America, in 2011.

A Fond du Lac resident, he is a consultant for the Wisconsin Department of Corrections in developing palliative care services -- medical care that relieves pain, symptoms and stress, caused by serious illnesses to improve patients' quality of life -- for inmates in the state's prisons. He is also past president and a current member of the HOPE (Hospice Organization and Palliative Experts) of Wisconsin with 76 hospice members. A local resident, Tina Thull, town of Farmington resident and co-owner of Serenity Hospice, Germantown, also serves on that board and is a strong advocate of Land's upcoming venture.

Having cared for hundreds of hospice patients over the past 14 years, Land believes that climbing the world's tallest mountain entails the dignity and determination that describe the courage of the more than 26,000 patients and their families served by hospice in Wisconsin.

Hospice is compassionate care provided for clients with a terminal illness in their own homes, assisted living facilities, nursing homes, veterans' facilities, group homes, prisons and places of residence. A terminal illness includes: cancer, congestive-heart failure, end-stage renal disease or end-stage Alzheimer's disease, Parkinson's disease or any disease with a prognosis of six months or less for a client, no longer seeking active treatment of his or her illness. To qualify for hospice care, one must have a life expectancy of six months or less. Hospice care focuses on the quality of the end of one's life in a holistic approach that addresses the patient's physical, emotional, spiritual and psycho-social (family) issues.

"I see how much climbing is a metaphor for life," Land affirmed. "All of us are climbing our own Mount Everests in some way. And the patients

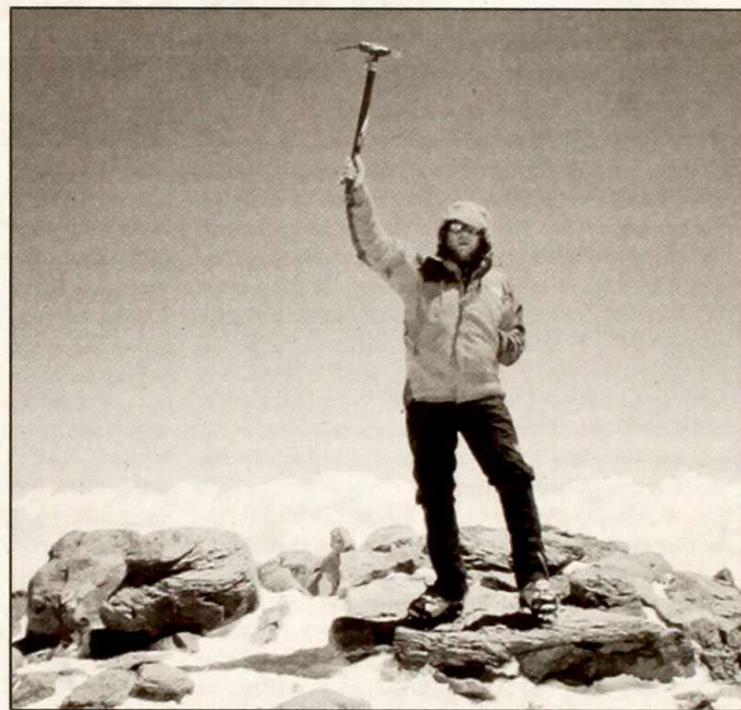
I have cared for are climbing mountains far higher and more intimidating than anything I have seen.

"Yet many of them are able to find levels of courage, strength and mental clarity far beyond what they even know they are capable of," he added. "Witnessing their ability to transcend their own suffering, I find I am capable of far more than I realize." He wrote an essay, titled "Why Climb Mountains?" admitting that the sport entails hardship, suffering and risk. "As I have matured, the mental and physical challenges of climbing are what appeal to me most," he wrote. "Standing on a summit often requires me to push beyond what I thought were my limits--moments of high intensity -- demanding complete focus, courage and self-control. For me, there are few things as satisfying as reaching the summit I have dreamed about."

Land began dreaming about the Mount Everest summit last year. He is fully aware of the dangers he faces. He said the daunting climb he faces from mid March through May 2015 has two major concerns for him.

"First, I am faced with the daily hardships associated with being on the mountain for several weeks," he said, noting that the summit of Mount Everest is subject to extremely high winds, up to 150 mph, and has a frigid temperature of about minus 50 degrees.

"There is a lot of misery in mountain climbing," he said. "I could be in a tent for up to four days. With the fierce winds, that can blow climbers down, we must build big snowball walls around the tent. We also have to be able to withstand unpleasant odors, as we are unable to

shower for weeks.

"My second concern in climbing Mount Everest is getting through the Khumbu Icefall," Land said. "It is a very dangerous section, just above base camp on Mount Everest, and I will have to go through it several times."

This icefall is located at the head of the Khumbu Glacier, at 17,999 feet up the slopes, southwest of the summit. The glacier that forms the icefall moves at such a high speed that large crevasses open with little warning, and large towers of ice, ranging in size from cars to large houses, can collapse suddenly.

But Land is not intimidated by these challenges. He has his goal of raising funds for the non-profit HOPE of Wisconsin, for increasing hospice aware-

ness, clearly in mind.

He is undergoing rigorous training sessions, mainly for strengthening his legs and endurance. He begins his regimen at 4:30 a.m. daily, with weight lifting and stretching. Later in the day, he works out for two hours with a trainer at the Fond du Lac YMCA, working his core, stomach, back and hips. He then completes an hour of stair climbing on a machine. Then too, he drags a tire up and down a toboggan hill at a nearby park. On his expedition, Land will wear a full-body, goose-down suit with a trap door. There are no bathroom facilities on the mountain, so climbers must brave the elements and remove their body wastes.

Chief's Corner

The month of October is a popular month for numerous causes. When watching football games this month, we see players and coaches wearing pink clothing to bring attention to Breast Cancer Awareness. October is also Domestic Violence Awareness month which will bring awareness to domestic violence via 5K runs and other events similar to that. Fire Prevention week is always in October and happens to be this week – so stop down at the fire department and thank those men and women who serve our community! All of these awareness campaigns are vitally important, and all deserve their own monthly article to be written in order to bring awareness to them; however for this particular edition of the “Chief’s Corner” I am going to focus on another serious issue our society faces, which also has an awareness campaign this month, Bullying Awareness Month.

According to StopBullying.com, bullying is defined as “unwanted, aggressive behavior among school aged children that involve a real or perceived power imbalance. The behavior is repeated, or has the potential to be repeated, over time. Bullying includes actions such as making threats, spreading rumors, attacking someone physically or verbally, and excluding someone from a group on purpose”. Bullying is an issue that mainly affects, although is not limited to, school aged children. Bullying can affect everyone involved – those who are bullied, those who bully, and

those who witness the bullying – and the affects have many negative outcomes including mental health issues, substance abuse and even suicide.

As a society, we need to be concerned with the well being of our young people; therefore take some time to research some of the signs associated with someone who is being bullied. If you have school aged children, talk to them about bullying and make sure they understand that they can turn to a teacher, counselor, or police officer to help them in these situations. Encourage them to talk to someone that they are comfortable with.

The children in our community should not have to be afraid to go to school or feel as though they can’t participate in activities because they will be bullied or picked on. The phrase “we were all bullied as kids and we turned out alright” is unacceptable. Today we are better equipped to address these issues and we have an obligation to our youth to make the world a better place than when we were young; just as they will bear that responsibility some day as well.

So during this month of October, wear pink, run in a 5k, test your smoke detector, and talk about bullying – doing so may just save a life.

From the Editor: Statesman will operate officeless

Earlier this year we started an experiment, closing our office on Main Street due to the road reconstruction project. That experiment brings us to the reality that some things in business change over the course of 119 years.

More than 119 years ago, in a small little office, Charles Krahn began publishing a weekly newspaper for the newly incorporated Village of Kewaskum. Since that time a lot has changed. Changes have included the way the paper is printed, where the paper is printed, what is used to print the paper, the use of photographs, posting news on the Internet, the use of color and doing pre-press completely digital.

Oftentimes we were the first in the area to implement change and starting Oct. 1, we made another radical change as we decided to close our office permanently. We will continue to publish the newspaper, we will just use a mobile approach to where we work.

When we toyed with the idea of closing the office earlier this year, we found a newspaper in England that had went completely officeless. While we read headlines daily about the failures and cutbacks of U.S. newspapers and how publishers need to adapt to the changing marketplace, we couldn’t find one article about how to cut the largest expense from our operation, the brick and mortar office.

We read countless articles on how publishers must go digital, how we need to use social media to attract younger readers and then we found the Hemel Hempstead Gazette. They shut up shop in January due to their city buying the building as part of a downtown revitalization project.

I contacted their Editor and he went through the steps that brought them to the decision to not relocate their office. I found, we were already doing what they were doing so why couldn’t we try it; the road construction

project was the perfect opportunity for a test run.

As I stated at that time, we use cloud-based file storage. Each file we generate is saved on all of our MacBooks, iPads and iPhones and more often than not, one of those is with us every moment of everyday. We do not have any staff writers or photographers, everyone already works from home. As far as collaboration, we again use shared notebooks in a program called Evernote where data and notes from each governmental meeting is stored so that no matter which reporter covers a topic, the history is in a notebook that can be accessed by keyword searches online. Our phone rings to a mobile phone and our faxes go to our email addresses.

One problem we encountered was storage of more than 100 years worth of newspapers. Kewaskum Public Library Director Steev Baker quickly solved that problem. Archives, though not all of them are accessible by the public at this time from 1895 to 1955 are available at the Library.

So what happens when you need to give us something or want to meet with us? We encourage you to call us to find out what method works best in any given situation. We are

currently working on upgrading our website to be more easy to use for those who are tech savvy, but for those who are not connected to the Internet, we’ll come to you.

Checking back in with our Editor friend in England, the company who owns his newspaper has now closed four of their other offices because of the success found in operating officeless. Another media company there has also embarked on the officeless newspaper for one of their newspapers. Publishers in England are doing what we should be doing in the United States, investing our money in journalism, not bricks and mortar. 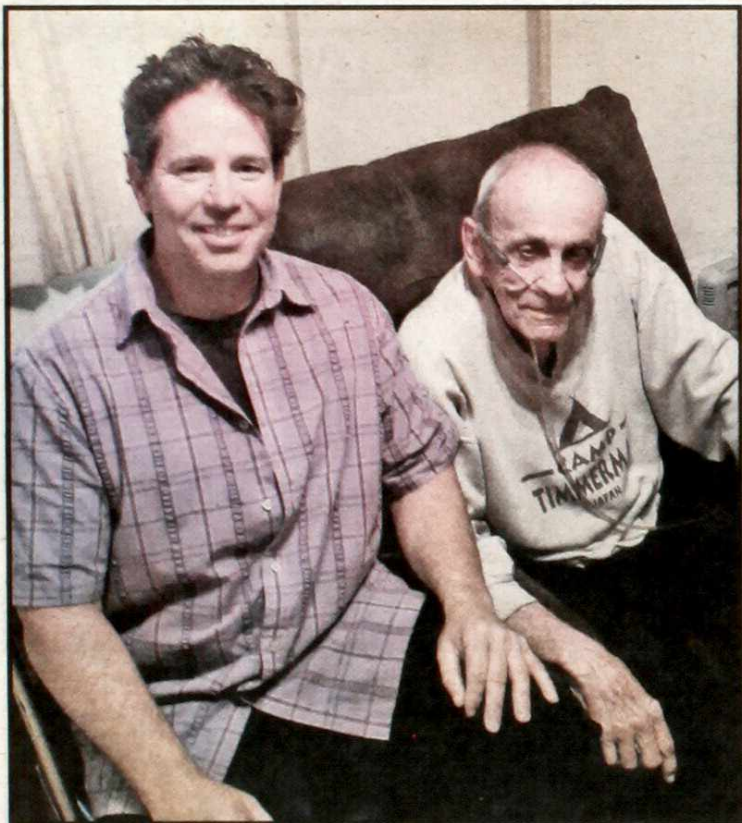

Ushering patients into the next world, with dignity

While avid mountain climber, Andy Land, Director of Hospice and Palliative Care Services, Agnesian Health Care, Fond du Lac, will be required to use bottled oxygen upon reaching 25,000 feet on his trek up Mount Everest next spring, attempting to reach the mountain's 29,029-foot summit, town of Farmington resident Herbert Timmerman, 81, must use oxygen 24 hours a day.

Timmerman, a smoker for 60 years, has end-stage chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD). He also has diabetes and asthma and is under hospice care in the home he shares with his wife Donna. Their daughter Tina Thull, a registered nurse, who worked in hospice care for 20 years, co-owns Kettle Moraine Gardens, Kewaskum, and Serenity Hospice Care in

Germantown, which has been providing hospice services to her father, since June 2013. She resides next door to her parents and checks on her dad regularly.

However, "While I've done hospice care for many years, it's different when a family member is a hospice client," Thull admitted. "I have to step back and be the daughter."

She, like Land, a fellow board member on HOPE (Hospice Organization and Palliative Experts) of Wisconsin, wants to build awareness about the benefits of hospice care.

"People near the end of their lives should be respected and pain-free and allowed to have a peaceful death," Thull said.

Her father's hospice services include home visits by registered nurses for assistance with personal-care needs. "The nurses come in once a day," Timmerman

said. "They check my vitals. Because I have diabetes, they check my feet and rub them down."

Hospice provides medications for pain and symptom control. "The nurses take care of the medications I need and order them from a New Berlin pharmacy," Timmerman said. "My medications are delivered to my doorstep."

He has monthly visits from a chaplain, who brings him communion, discusses biblical passages and converses with him. He also has occasional visits from a social worker to assist the family with end-of-life issues.

In addition, "I have Serenity's phone number," Timmerman said. "If I need something, I call."

Because Timmerman, a Port Washington native, is Medicare-eligible, there are no co-pays or deductibles for his hospice care, which provides medical equipment and supplies. (However, for hospice client residing in facilities such as nursing homes, the clients receive those same benefits but must pay for their room and board).

As for Timmerman, who resides in his home, "I have a porta-potty, a hospital bed, a walker, oxygen machine, large tanks of oxygen, a Life Line and a DNR (Do not Resuscitate) bracelet," he said.

Hospice services also provide bereavement follow-up for up to 13 months, following a client's death.

The father of four adult children, Timmerman has 16 grandchildren and 14 great-grandchildren. He said he is fortunate to have many visits from family members. "I also have a nice cozy room here," he said.

"Hospice is a very good service," he affirmed. "I don't have to worry about anything. They take good care of me."

Land noted that Mount Everest's base camp is like a small town during climbing season, with Internet access and hot showers available. Higher up on the mountain, climbers can use radios or satellite phones to communicate with base camp and the outside world.

The public can watch Land makes way up the mountain and back, through Facebook, Twitter and by accessing the web site www.mountainguides.com

From 1965-70, Timmerman was employed as an attendant at Cedar Lake Home (now Cedar Community), West Bend. "I always thought back then that if I got sick, I'd like to stay at home," he said. "So when I was diagnosed with COPD, I chose to remain at home."

His hospice staff has made that possible. As Thull explained, all of these experts on the hospice staff interact with one another, working toward the same goal -- that of providing relief from the physical and emotional pain that often accompany a terminal illness -- affirming life, emphasizing living one's remaining days as fully as possible and neither hastening nor postponing death.

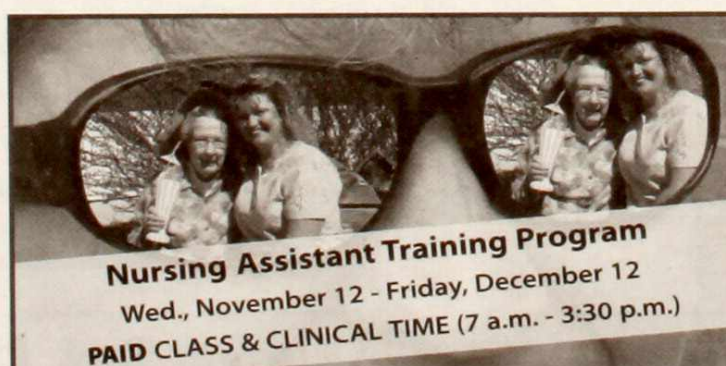

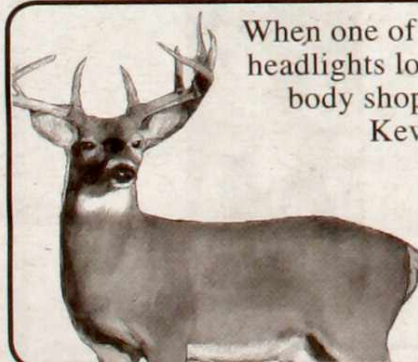
