Kewaskum High School to implement new Laude class rank system for class of 2017

Students in Kewaskum High School's class of 2017 and those in years to follow will no longer be ranked according to their cumulative grade-point averages (GPA). Instead, their achievement will be based upon the Laude System.

The Laude System takes not only a student's GPA into consideration, but also his or her effort put in through choosing more challenging classes. It will be implemented in the 2015-16 school year.

At their Oct. 13 meeting, Kewaskum School Board members,

on a vote of 7-0 approved implementing the Laude System.

Class rank, based upon a student's cumulative GPA, has been used up to the present time. The GPA is a norm-referenced process that compares a student's performance to that of their fellow classmates. Basing class rank on a GPA has become an issue for students who enroll in more challenging classes and end up having a lower GPA than students who take less rigorous classes and have a higher GPA.

By contrast, the Laude System awards one point per semester for honors courses, such as pre-calculus, Welding II or stained glass design II.

(See accompanying chart of course listings). A student's GPA is then calculated at the end of the first semester of their senior year.

The amount of honors points he or she has earned is then multiplied by his or her cumulative GPA, giving the student a laude-point ranking. For example, a student who has a 3.8 GPA and nine honor points would have 34.2 laude points as a graduating senior.

Other reasons for KHS changing its ranking system are as follows:

- Class rank is based upon the assumption that all students are taking

Indians kickers pass first post season test

There's nothing a coach likes better than seeing his team successfully scoring on a play it had recently worked on during a practice session.

That being said, Kewaskum soccer coach John Kenworthy was grinning from ear to ear after watching his team score on two corner kicks in the first half of Saturday's Division 3 opening round matchup against the combined North Fond du Lac/St. Mary's Springs/Oakfield team.

Just four minutes and five seconds (4:05) into the contest, Hayden Koralewski launched a beautiful corner kick in front of North Fondy's goal, and Joe Sanborn headed it right into the back of the net. Later in the first half (at 30:47), the Indians added a second goal on a rebound shot by Noah Bindrich, again set up by a corner kick, then the defense took over to secure the 2-0 shutout victory.

"It was just about the good pass Hayden put in. I just tried to make contact with it," Sanborn, the Indians' leading scorer, said about his goal. "We had practiced it last night. It really helped us for today's game."

"That's huge," Kenworthy said about getting the early goal. "It's always good to get a goal early."

In this case, it appeared the visitors started losing their composure after falling behind. "You could see they started yelling at each other," while the Indians "kept the positives going the whole game."

"We worked extensively on corner kicks in practice at last night's practice," Kenworthy went on, mainly because of the difficulty the Indians have had scoring goals. "For eight



Sun shines on annual KEYS event

Madison's Grant Mickesh was able to successfully defend his Men's title but did not set a record in Sunday's 21st annual K.E.Y.S. (Kewaskum Youth Scholarship) Run/Walk.

Sunshine greeted the participants, and Mickesh won the 5-kilometer event with a time of 16 minutes and 14 seconds (16:14), just five seconds off the mark he set a year ago.

Mickesh had a 24-second lead on former Campbellsport High and UW-Oshkosh Little All-American, Matt Thull, who finished the race with a time of 16:38, while Stephan Kattar of Hartford was third overall with a time of 17:37.

For the women, it was Allenton's Jocelyn Ritger crossing the finish line first, and ironically a young girl, who is in her first year at Kewaskum Middle School, pushed her. Eleven-year old Alyssa Butz finished third overall. "She (Butz) ran it in 21:48," Jenny Gerhartz, co-chair of the run, said Monday morning. In second place was Amy Grotenhuis of Slinger, who toured the course in 20:01.

In the end, what is really important is the fact many Kewaskum High School students and student-athletes will benefit from this annual KEYS fundraiser, which goes toward scholarships. This past year, K.E.Y.S. awarded \$100,000 in scholarships to KHS seniors.

Concerning the number of participants, Gerhartz said, "Those who actually were there came to 441," which is

"pretty close to what we had last year. We're running neck and neck to last year."

The same is true with the total money raised, according to Gerhartz, who estimates the event will hit the \$20,000 mark like it did a year ago.

New groups were instrumental in the success of the run. Gerhartz said Finish Line Training brought in a group of 35. "They did a great job promoting the race," she said, indicating Dairyland Seed also brought a big team and did some additional fundraising to promote the new Sarah Boettcher Scholarship in memory of the 2013 Kewaskum High School graduate, who died unexpectedly during her first month at UW-River Falls.

The Wayne and Farmington Elementary Schools, under the direction of physical education teacher Russ Thull, sponsored their own events to promote K.E.Y.S.

"The team captains at the schools are coming up with neat, creative ideas to raise money," Gerhartz said, indicating these events help involve the students who are not


able to come on race day.

Westbury Bank also came up with a creative plan to help out, according to Gerhartz, who said "They had T-shirt and Jeans Day, which helped raise funds for KEYS.

Gerhartz and her committee, consisting of KEYS President Jerry Gosa, Sharron Miller, Connie Zemlicka, Mike McElhatton, Matt Fehlhaber, Kurt Gosdeck and Cheryl Ammel, were also appreciative of the help provided by volunteers and the Kewaskum Police Department.

"We had 25 kids and 35 adults (helping)," Gerhartz said. "We were glad for the kids who came on homecoming weekend. Hats off to them."

With First Street being re-surfaced, there was a concern about the entire route being safe, but the police had extra auxiliary members working and, "They were very cooperative and helpful," Gerhartz said. "Our community continues to be very supportive."

the same courses, taught by the same teacher. This is untrue. Thus, using the class rank in this system can result in inequities.

- Cumulative GPA's may include courses from other accredited educational organizations or high schools, whose grading policies are not in alignment with those of KHS. Including these courses in the calculation of class rank is unfair.

- Without having a report of class ranking, college admissions officials are forced to review more important factors, such as rigor of the student's curriculum, test scores, co-curricular activities and accomplishments.

- Many schools that changed to the Laude System report higher standardized test scores (ACT/SAT). Students on the Laude System are being accepted to high-profile colleges.

KHS Principal Bill Loss is the brainchild behind implementing the Laude System at KHS. He learned about it in 2011, in a breakout session he attended at a principals' convention, sponsored by the Association of Wisconsin School Administrators (AWSA). He was the principal of Baraboo High School at the time and was instrumental in having the Baraboo School Board vote to

implement the Laude System at Baraboo High School as of the 2012-13 school year.

Some other Wisconsin high schools using the Laude System include: Kohler, River Valley, Edgewood, Homestead, Waunakee, Fennimore, Verona, Neenah, Greendale, Arrowhead, Oregon, Whitefish Bay, Madison West, Shorewood, Cedarburg, Marshall, Middleton, Brookfield and Fond du Lac.

As an advocate of the Laude System, Loss discussed it with the Kewaskum School Board at its July 20, 2014 meeting.

"I believe students should be encouraged to engage in challenging academic programs, and those who do well should be appropriately distinguished," said Loss in a phone interview.

"I also believe students can be gifted in a variety of unique ways and should be recognized accordingly," he added. "For example, I consider myself intelligent, but I am unable to weld. Students who have this talent and take a course, such as Welding II should be rewarded. The Laude System provides students greater ownership by allowing students to work toward a pre-established standard, instead of competing against one another."

Following his presentation to the school board, a listening session for parents and community members was held Monday, Sept. 22 in the KHS library.

"There was great support for the Laude System," Loss said. "Parents liked the fact that students would know up front what they needed in order to obtain recognition at each of the three levels -- cum laude [with honors], magna cum laude [with high honors] and summa cum laude [with highest honors,] Loss said.

To qualify for Cum Laude status, a student must have a cumulative GPA of 3.0 or higher and have earned 24-39 honor points; for Magna Cum Laude, 40-55 honor points and Summa Cum Laude, 56 or more honor points.

Another change for Kewaskum High School, once the Laude System is implemented, is that there will no longer be a valedictorian or salutatorian in the senior class. Class rank will not routinely be provided to colleges for admission purposes. The student's transcript will report his or her cumulative GPA with an accompanying Laude point score and distinction. A cover letter will be provided to colleges, explaining the Laude System.



The SHARE catalog used by the Kewaskum Public Library will soon be making way for a new "Trio" catalog. The change is expected to take place Thursday, Nov. 20.

Library Director Steev Baker says this is more than a name change.

"Trio is an upgrade to our existing catalog and staff software. When this process is finished, the library will have a cleaner, easier, more friendly online catalog experience to share with our patrons," Baker explained.

He added that prior to the Trio Catalog going live, the library would be required to make some behind the scenes changes. The first change taking place next week, Tuesday, Oct. 21, will find users being unable to place holds in the online catalog. All holds currently placed on items will be suspended and reactivated when Trio comes online.

From Nov. 9 through the 20th, the library will not be able to add new items to their collection. On Nov. 13, they will lose the ability to check items in, to fill holds, to make new cards, and to search the catalog at all. All computer, Internet and Wi-Fi will be working.

Baker stated that even though that will be a challenging week, the library will not close during the changeover, but services will be limited.

Once the new catalog is live Nov. 20, the messy process of getting things checked in, getting delivery started up again, and processing new items will begin.

Cook will depart from Village, head to County

The Village of Kewaskum will be short one employee wearing three hats come Friday. Chad Cook who has served as Zoning Administrator, Building Inspector and most recently Department of Public Works Director will head to Washington County's Planning and Parks Department.

Cook began his career with the village in July 2007, hired by then Village Administrator Jay Shambeau. Shambeau will become his boss again after becoming Director of Planning and Parks in April of this year.

Village Administrator Matt Heiser stated Tuesday that he will propose to the village board Monday to not fill Cook's position. As part of his 10-year financial plan for the village in

July 2013 Heiser proposed decreasing staff by four employees by Jan. 1, 2015. Not filling Cook's position achieves this without laying off any staff.

Heiser said he would take over Cook's duties with the DPW and partially handle some of the zoning administration much like previous Administrator Dan Schmidt did more than a decade ago. Heiser said the village's engineer, Ruckert-Mielke of Waukesha, would handle more complicated zoning matters.

Where building inspection matters are concerned, Heiser said he has received two proposals. Independent Inspections, who is utilized by the Town of Kewaskum has offered their services as well as the City of West Bend.



Clerk Stephanie Justmann reported on the August 14, 2014 Streetscaping meeting. Fundraising events will take place over the winter month. A RFP is being drafted for the \$14,400 Main Street project plan. The RFP will be reviewed in February and will be sent out to selected vendors.

Richard Laubach, Chairperson for the Public Works and Public Services reported the next meeting is scheduled for September 16, 2014 at 8:00 a.m.

Jim Hovland, representa-

tive for the Plan Commission announced the September 30, 2014 meeting has been cancelled.

Dave Zehren, representative for the Park and Recreation Committee announced the next meeting is scheduled for September 16, 2014 at 10:00 a.m.

Dave Spenner, representative on the Library Board reported on the September 8, 2014 meeting. The City of Beaver Dam has dropped from the Federated Library System. A new search engine has been implemented for the library inventory of books. Circulation is down from other years but is in line with other libraries. On September 20, 2014 the lot to the north of Municipal Building will be cleaned and landscaped.

Jim Hovland, representative for the Mid-Moraine reported on the September 10, 2014 Legislative meeting. Dave Arnott, from Ruckert/Mielke, was the guest speaker and talked about the current phosphorus regulations.

The October Village Board meeting dates will remain as scheduled.



Hawks swoop in on young Indians

Germantown Gold teams played spoiler at Kewaskum Parents Night Saturday as the Hawks won three of the four games. Only coach Jeff Logan's fifth graders came out on top, winning 26-18 in their final regular game of the season.

All four teams are involved in the playoffs, which pit first place teams in the Northeast Group I versus first place teams in the Northeast Group II, second place teams versus second place teams and thirds versus thirds.

The Indians teams will host Germantown Hawks Blue in Saturday's first round, with the eighth grade game starting at 9 a.m., the seventh grade at 10:30; the sixth at noon; and the fifth at 1:30 p.m.

5th grade, Kewaskum 26, Germantown 18: The fifth graders used two touchdowns in each half toward a win, giving them a 4-1-1 record.

Isaac Schmidt tallied in the opening quarter for the young Indians on a 45-yard run, and he tacked on the PAT via a run, then Ben Butler got in the act, scoring on a 10-yard TD, with Schmidt adding a successful PAT run.

The half ended with the Indians holding a 14-12 lead, and the defense helped them widen the gap in the third quarter when Connor Griesemer intercepted a Hawk pass, setting up a successful drive, capped by Schmidt's 55-yard scamper.

Butler scored a second time in the final quarter on a 10-yard run, then Keegen Abrahmsen stopped a Hawk drive with an interception, and the Indians ran out the clock.

"It was a great (regular) sea-

son. I was happy for the boys," coach Jeff Logan said, adding, "A shoutout to the coaches, Keith Herman, Marty Schulteis, Ralph Raether and Brandon Zolp."

8th grade, Germantown 34, Kewaskum 14: After a close first half between the two unbeaten teams, the Hawks started to pull away from the Indians, scoring on a long pass on the first play of the break and continuing to stretch their lead.

"It was two very evenly-matched teams that on this particular day some big plays that went Germantown's way made the difference," coach Chad Piwoni said.

The Indians had the ball first and took nearly six minutes off the clock, moving the ball into the Red Zone before stalling.

Kewaskum's defense forced a quick three-and-out by Germantown, and the Indians' second drive was successful with Cameron Dodge punching the ball in from the 5 and Hunter Grady kicking the 2-point conversion.

Germantown used a big kickoff return toward a successful scoring drive, and although the Hawks missed the PAT, they were able to score again for a 12-8 lead at half.

After the break, Kewaskum (5-1) managed one TD, with Dodge breaking a nifty 45-yard scoring run, making the score 19-14 going into the fourth quarter. Germantown scored twice in the final quarter to ice the win.

"I was extremely proud of the whole team with the effort and toughness they showed, and the way they battled after that shock of the first play of the second half going for a

touchdown," Piwoni said.

7th grade, Germantown 25, Kewaskum 13: In this game, the Indians (3-3) fell behind early and could not recover.

"We played another half of football again this week," coach Tom Kudek said, reporting his team got the ball first but a backward pass was recovered by the Hawks, who marched quickly for a first score.

Germantown scored another TD on its second drive, then J.J. Thull returned the kickoff for a touchdown to narrow the gap, but the Hawks returned the ensuing kickoff for a 19-6 advantage at the end of the first quarter.

In the second quarter, Thull scored on a 45-yard run, and the Indians added the PAT on a Ty Cook to Thull pass, and Germantown answered again with a score in the final minute.

There was no scoring in the second half, according to Kudek, who reported, "both defenses played well," and Sam Melzer came up with an interception.

6th grade, Germantown 25, Kewaskum 0: For one quarter, coach Paul Anderson moved Bret Fahrenkrug to quarterback and his regular starter, Nathan Droese to wide receiver. "That was working," Anderson said of the new passing combination, but penalties plagued the Indians (1-5), who reached the Hawks' 30-yard line only once.

"On the defensive side, the story was Kannon Muckerheide, who always comes out to play ... and Nathan Heberer," Anderson said, also citing the efforts of Sam Amerling.




