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Kewaskum woman facing multiple drug charges

A 38-year-old Village of Kewaskum is being charged with five counts of Delivery of a Schedule 2 Narcotic and one count of Possession with Intent to Deliver a schedule 2 narcotic.

The Washington County District Attorney's Office filed charges against Lisa Winkels on October 16. She will make her initial appearance before judge Todd Martens on November 3.

According to a report from the Washington County Sheriff's Office, Winkels was involved in a August 18, 2014 traffic stop was made by the Washington County Sheriff's K-9 unit. The stop was the result of an ongoing investigation by the Washington County Multi-Jurisdictional Drug Enforcement

Group (Drug Unit) into the distribution of Oxycodone by the suspect who was believed to be involved in the distribution of Oxycodone in the Village of Kewaskum, as well as West Bend and other areas in Washington County.

On five separate occasions the woman sold a total of 97 Oxycodone pills with a street value of \$1,985 to an undercover officer and at the time of her arrest was found to be in possession of an additional 44 Oxycodone pills and \$648 in various denominations.


The drug investigation was started when the Kewaskum Police Department provided information and requested an investigation into Winkels' activities. The KPD had received anonymous information that she was believed to be distributing illegal drugs from her

residence in the 400 block of Braatz Drive in the Village of Kewaskum.

"The opiate problem in our community is of utmost importance to our department, as well as all area law enforcement. The arrest of someone who was dealing drugs at this level is paramount in our efforts to eradicate this problem," Kewaskum Chief of Police Tom Bishop stated.

The Drug Unit is primarily staffed by, supervised by, and headquartered at the Washington County Sheriff's Office with officers provided or other departments in Washington County. The Drug Unit's current top priority is enforcement related to opiates at the delivery level.

Nearly a decade had passed since Kewaskum's Don Goeden drove a race car for a full season, but this summer, piloting the flashy red No. 10W car at the Sheboygan County Fairgrounds, he certainly proved he still has the skills to be a consistent winner.

On September 6, with one race still to go, Goeden already had piled up enough points to claim the Plymouth Dirt Track 360 Sprint Car title. Goeden finished the year with 1,360 points, 133 more than runner-up, Jim

Melis (1,227).

"We were running good, winning races and leading in points, and (car owner) Bob (Hood) said, "We're going to run for points (championship) and see how it goes," Goeden said Sunday, recalling how he started the year as a backup but moved into the seat as the regular driver early in the season.

What a good decision that was! "In 15 of 17 shows, we were top five (in the feature). Five of 'em we won," Goeden said about the season, going on that he never had to run the B-main because he always had enough points from the heat races to get into the A

feature.

When asked if there was one night that really stood out from the year, Goeden said that would be difficult because there were five nights when he won the heat race and the feature.

Goeden's only DNF (did not finish) came on the final night of the season when he was cart-wheeled by fellow driver, Shane Wenninger, on the last lap as he was weaving through lapped traffic.



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Improved student learning, focus of Teacher Effectiveness Project

Kewaskum School District Superintendent, Jim Smasal, commended his staff and administrators for fully implementing the Teacher Effectiveness Project in the 2013-14 school year -- a year ahead of what was mandated by the state, and just one year after piloting the project.

"We have competent, committed, caring and concerned professionals," Smasal said. "I am very proud of our district. We have embraced this project from its inception. We are meeting the expectations of the Educator Effectiveness System.

"I feel really good about the effort our staff put in over the past two years, he added. "We feel really prepared, much more so than other districts we have been in contact with, so we are proud of what Kewaskum has done."

The Teacher Effectiveness Project is a newly designed evaluation system for teachers and administrators -- principals, curriculum coordinator, pupil services director, etc. The system provides a performance-based evaluation that leads to improved student learning by supporting the continuous improvement of educator practices.

In 2010, Wisconsin State Superintendent, Tony Evers, convened a design team to create an Educator Effectiveness System. The design team determined key principles of the system, including that educator effectiveness:

- Guide effective educational practice, aligned with student learning and development.
- Document evidence of effective educator practices.
- Document evidence of

student learning.

- Inform professional development.
- Inform educator preparation programs.
- Support a full range of human-resource decisions.
- Be credible, reliable and comparable across the state's 424 public school districts.

The Educator Effectiveness System was later endorsed through legislation in Wisconsin Act 166 and the ESEA Waiver. Throughout its development, the system has engaged teachers and school leaders in two years of pilot stages of development, while gathering feedback directly from system users, for continued refinement.

Smasal noted that the Teacher Effectiveness Project has two components -- research-based and standards-based. Teachers are evaluated on students' learning outcomes, and principals, on the school's learning outcomes.

The district's 133 teachers are evaluated by their principals. "A teacher who has been in the Kewaskum School District for three years or less, has a minimum of two formal evaluations per year," Smasal said.

"The other teachers have up to six walk-throughs [short visits] per year by their principals. Our principals are in classrooms almost on a daily basis."

Teachers are evaluated on their professional knowledge, instructional planning, instructional delivery, assessment of learning, professionalism and learning environment.

In addition to their classroom observations, students complete surveys of their teachers. Educators record their self-reflections about

their performance and complete a portfolio -- a compilation of their progress.

Smasal evaluates the district's eight administrators based upon: leadership for student learning, school climate, human-resources leadership, organizational management, communication and community relations and professionalism.

Wisconsin's public school districts have a choice of two models in implementing the Teacher Effectiveness Project -- the state model or the CESA (Cooperative Educational Service Agency) model. Wisconsin has 12 CESAs, which are regional venues for schools and other agencies that serve students. The Kewaskum School District is part of CESA 6, and school district officials decided to follow the CESA 6 model. CESA 6 is headquartered in Oshkosh.

The Kewaskum School District sent two of its officials to Oshkosh for training in the Teacher Effectiveness System -- Curriculum Director, Mark Bazata and Kewaskum Middle School Principal, Julie Skeltion.

As for feedback from Kewaskum staff members, "This system is a lot more rigorous, with more time spent in classrooms and more paperwork for documentation," Smasal admitted.

"Overall, it is getting used to this extra time and effort. But the teachers feel they get a truer evaluation of their performance."

Straub joins an elite group at UW-Whitewater

October 4 was very special for Kewaskum High alum, Rich Straub. It was the day he was inducted into the UW-Whitewater Hall of Fame, and ironically, it might never have happened except for two unexpected occurrences.

At first, Straub looked destined to be a basketball player, but when he was in eighth grade, the middle school scheduled its basketball season at a different time than wrestling, so he decided to give the other winter sport a try.

Fast forward to 1987 for the second part of the scenario, and Straub is 21-1 in the sport he has become very proficient in. In the semifinals of the Class-2 regionals, Straub is a heavy favorite to win the 138-pound title but loses to Campbellsport's Scott Gurrath. He rebounded to take third place but did not get a wrestleback because Gurrath lost in the finals.

The loss meant no sectional, no state, except as a spectator, a scenario that would lead to quitting for many modern-day athletes.

Not Straub, who said recently in a phone interview from Colorado, "I figured I had some unfinished business to take care of," and finish it he did, helping to lead the Warhawks to three straight WIAC (Wisconsin Intercollegiate Ath-

letic Conference) titles in 1989, 1990 and 1991, winning NCAA D-3 All American honors his senior season and still holding one Whitewater wrestling record and maintaining top-three places in two other categories.

Straub, currently a guidance counselor at Arvada West High School in Arvada, Colorado, recalls well his first season of wrestling. He had eight matches and won them all.

After that, "My brother Steve said to me 'When you get to high school, you go out for wrestling.' That was it," Straub said, but unlike today when athletes specialize and compete in the sport year-round, "I didn't step on the mat until the next year" after the 8-0 start.

Straub made great strides in the sport, finishing second in conference his junior year when he had the misfortune of three returning state qualifiers in his weight class at regionals. He was focused on qualifying for state as a senior, until the match vs. Gurrath. "I had beaten him handily in a triangular early in the season," he said.

This was a major disappointment for Straub, especially when he went to Madison and saw two wrestlers he had beaten (one via pin and the other 9-0) take third and sixth at state.

Still, several college coaches were aware of Straub's talent on the mat, and Whitewater's Willie Myers was among them.

What led Straub to choose Whitewater was the fact "Willie actually came to Kewaskum to visit me."

Straub was red-shirted as a freshman, and after using it as a learning year, he was ready to go. He wrestled in three different weight classes throughout his career, compiling a record of 116-44-1, including 59 wins by fall. His 44 wins (44-9) in 1992 are the most by a Warhawk wrestler in a season in the history of the program.

As a freshman in 1989, Straub took third in the WIAC at 142 pounds. The following year, Straub dropped a weight class and captured the WSUC title at 134 pounds.

His senior season, Straub battled back after losing his first bout of the regional to pin four of his next six opponents and finish second. In the NCAA Division III Championships, Straub, the eighth seed, won his first two bouts before falling to the top seed. He worked his way through the wrestleback and finished fifth, ending his career with a pin of Ithaca's Lenny Bruehwiler in 2:30 to garner All-America honors.

Currently, Straub is second in career wins (116), second — thanks to a devastating head throw — in career pins (59), fourth for pins in a season (21 in 1992), eighth for most career points (422.75) in the UW-Whitewater record book.

While Straub's athletic accomplishments were impressive, he said proudly, "A lot of my recognition was from what I did in the classroom." He was a two-time National Wrestling Coaches Association Academic All-American in 1991 and 1992, the league's Max Sparger Scholar Athlete of the Year recipient in 1992 and a Chancellor Scholar-Athlete.

After graduating from Whitewater, Straub spent four years working as an assistant wrestling coach at both Adams State University, where he got his masters degree, and Colorado School of Mines, and then he went on to teach and coach wrestling at the high school level for five years.

While he was successful in coaching, family obligations prompted Straub to leave coaching.

"I've got two daughters and at the time they were getting involved in athletics and extra curriculums, I had to make a decision," he said, so he stepped down from coaching.

"I'm a very good fan of my girls' sports," Straub said, noting Ashley, a senior in college, participated in swimming, cross country, track and lacrosse, while Kerissa, a junior in high

school, competes in cross country, track and mountain biking, which is a sport in Colorado.

Straub was the 23rd wrestler to be named to the Whitewater Hall of Fame, which was started 50 years ago. He and the other eight recipients were introduced at the Whitewater-La Crosse football game and honored at a ceremony and dinner.

"It was a real nice weekend, and a nice ceremony ... it was nice to have my family there, my college coach and my high school coach," he said, indicating he still stays in contact with John Nell, his high school coach.

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

velopment. With a great deal of change coming into Kewaskum's Club, the mission has remained the same. To offer a safe environment for children to learn and have fun.


