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## After big win, Indians look ahead to Catholic Memorial

After using the passing game to take an early 14-0 advantage, the Kewaskum High football team gave the ball to its star halfback Brandon Thull, and within seven minutes in the third quarter, he pretty well put the game out of reach against Pius XI Friday night in a Level 1 game in Division 3.

"We kind of changed up a little in the third quarter," KHS coach Jason Piittmann said. "Brandon had a great third quarter, and we started putting the game away." Behind three Thull TD runs of 1, 8, and 38 yards, plus a safety by Alex Fechter, the Indians were up 37-0 and had the clock running continuously.

Pius scored twice in the fourth quarter, putting the final score at 37-

14, giving the Indians the opportunity to move into a Level 2 game against Waukesha Catholic Memorial which will be played Friday night at 7 p.m. at Schneider Stadium in Waukesha on the Carroll College campus.

After Thull had scored his second TD, and the Indians got the ball back,

## School Board approves 77¢ decrease in tax rate after spending cuts

Spending is down in the Kewaskum School District according to the budget unanimously approved by the Board of Education at a special meeting held Monday. After the cuts in spending, district residents will reap the reward of a 77¢ decrease in the tax rate for 2014.

According to the District's Business Manager, Julie Thoreson the district cut spending by \$187,136 from the previous year. The total 2014-15 budget is \$24.5 million. The district will have a tax levy of \$11 million, a 6.1 percent decrease from last year. The approved levy will require an equalized tax rate of \$9.41 per \$1,000 of property value, a drop of seventy-seven cents per \$1,000 from last year.

The district's state aid increased slightly, from \$7,668,363 in 2013-14 to \$8,024,084 in 2014-15. Similarly, after two years of declines, the district's equalized property valuation — a key figure used in calculating the levy rate — rose by 1.7%, to \$1.17 billion.

The district stated they are pleased that taxpayers will see a significant decrease in the school levy, they are more and more concerned about the continued decrease in the budget and their ability to continue to operate with less funds.

## Kewaskum, Campbellsport HS in the limelight

Kewaskum High School's and Campbellsport High School's 2013-14 junior classes, now seniors, have made it possible for their schools to be designated Blue Star Schools.

They did so by having 75 percent or more students pass a standardized financial literacy certification (CFL) exam, through the WISE (Working in Support of Education) program. In addition, to achieve this rating, the school had to have students who took the test achieve an average score of 80 percent or higher.

Another requirement was that the school had to have at least 10 students take the test, and retakes were not

included in the calculation. Schools achieving the Blue Star rating are recognized at the MoneyPOWER conference for Financial Literacy in November, in New York City.

KHS Business education instructors, Tim Rohlinger and Casey Scheel, who teach the required personal finance, semester class for juniors, administered the test on Jan. 17, 2014 to the first semester class and June 5, 2014, for second semester classes.

The test consisted of 50 multiple choice questions in four subject areas: money management, personal financial planning, banks and banking and credit.

Rohlinger received the good news about the Blue Star rating via

an email last month. Katie Peterson, Campbellsport Middle and High School business education teacher, did likewise.

Rohlinger noted that in his first semester class last year, 49 out of 69 students passed the test, with the highest score being 96 percent. In his second semester class, 33 of the 40 students passed, with the high score being 98 percent.

He noted the test is not easy. "The questions on bonds and stocks are very technical," he said. "So I feel especially good about receiving this rating. Our society is in need of financial training. Students take these skills

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## A new chapter for St. John Evangelical



You can see the stately steeple on the hill rising above the tree line less than a mile south of Kohlsville on County Highway WW. St. John's is a historic church, already existing at the time my grandfather was born in 1900. The traditional white clapboard and stained glass edifice has more recent updates designed to facilitate fellowship, all of which were in place before the size of the congregation began to diminish, both by mortality and dispersal.

The organist has been there scores of years. She can tell you about the Sunday School puppet shows she coordinated, the hand bells now silent for lack of ringers, the youngsters that regularly made the effort to walk to church even though their parents wouldn't come, the service projects the children chose to perform. She yearns for the day these opportunities can be revived.

A small dedicated core kept the church going, even though they had to meet off-site in winter due to a dearth of funds to heat the church. There came a time when there was a drought of committed shepherds to come minister on a consistent basis and a perceived lack of support from the overseeing body. The small flock prayed for the Lord to breathe new life into St. John's and He did just that in a most novel fashion.

One day in the middle of winter a neighbor of St. John's contacted an Elder to inquire about using the church to hold a weekly Bible study for residents from the area. Arrangements were made to use the offsite facility for an evening Bible study and some of St. John's members began to attend. Before too long the decision was made to invite Pastor Terrie Beede, who led the Bible study, to provide interim pastoral services for St. John's for a number of months. The congregation grew to respect this shepherd for his caring ways and his focus on what the Bible says in a manner they had never experienced in the past. They began to learn from this shepherd what it means to live like Jesus. Following that interim chapter of St. John's recent history, both the congregation and Pastor Beede agreed to continue



their relationship long term and discover together what the Lord has planned for St. John's.

With the core congregation and the original Bible study attendees, St. John's Evangelical has begun to be resurrected in an unconventional manner. A West Bend man had been praying for the church every day for five years as he drove past on the way to and from his job. He decided it was time to attend a Sunday service and see what he'd been praying for. He liked what he heard, and felt the presence of the Lord in this congregation was worthy of supporting, and his family has joined the fellowship. Bit by bit the church is uniquely growing, but it's still a small country church where everyone knows and cares about everyone else.

Worship is a unique blend of organ-accompanied hymns and guitar-led more modern compositions, creating a comfortable atmosphere for all.

St. John's Evangelical's sign welcomes everyone. The congregation lives what the sign proclaims. You can check out Sunday service at 10 a.m. (9 a.m. in summer), or Thursday's Bible study at 6 p.m., at 5696 Beaver Dam Road, at the intersection with Hwy WW at the top of the hill just south of Kohlsville.

There you may find church you've remembered, coupled with church you have longed for, and you may decide to come back again and again because the Lord Himself is drawing you there.

## Constitutional amendment to be on November 4 ballot

On November 4, Wisconsinites will head to the polls to express their preference for governor and many other political offices. They will also be asked to vote on constitutionally protecting the transportation fund.

The state of Wisconsin collects fees from users of the transportation system – primarily the gas tax and vehicle registration fee – for the purpose of maintaining the transportation system. If passed, this constitutional amendment will require that gas tax and registration fee dollars remain in the transportation fund to be used to pay for the transportation system.

The question on the November 4th ballot will read:

Question 1: Creation of a Transportation Fund.

Shall section 9 (2) of article IV and section 11 of article VIII of the constitution be created to require that revenues generated by use of the state transportation system be deposited into a transportation fund ad-

ministered by a department of transportation for the exclusive purpose of funding Wisconsin's transportation systems and to prohibit any transfers or lapses from this fund?

Constitutionally protecting transportation user fees is not a new idea. Most other states, including our neighbors in Minnesota, Iowa, Michigan and Ohio, already have such language in their state constitutions.

"We are naturally reluctant to solve problems by amending the constitution. That is a healthy reflex. This issue, however, truly belongs in the constitution as legislative solutions have not worked," said Craig Thompson, treasurer of Vote YES for Transportation and executive director of the Transportation Development Association. "As I have traveled the state talking to people about this issue, they say this is a common sense safeguard that will keep transportation user fees dedicated for their intended

purpose."

Vote YES for Transportation, the group advocating for this amendment, began in 2009 as the Finding Forward coalition. The coalition was not interested in past battles or assigning blame for diversions of transportation revenue. The group simply wanted Wisconsin to "find forward."

The coalition of over 50 organizations includes groups such as the Wisconsin Towns Association, the Dairy Business Association, the Great Lakes Timber Professionals Association and the Wisconsin Association of Convention & Visitors Bureaus.

The Wisconsin Legislature passed a joint resolution in two consecutive sessions to place this item before the voters. Both times, the item passed by an overwhelming margin and with bipartisan support.

As most of you know there is a John Doe probe going on in regards to Walker and campaign funds. This is the second probe.

The first one indicted six people with ties to Walker when he was Milwaukee County Executive running for Governor. The second one has disclosed a secret campaign donation by Gogebic Mining of \$700,000 to Cub for Growth to be funneled in issue ads for Walker. Shortly after Walker and Republicans passed a law for the mining company (written by the mining co.).

After an investigation was under way Scott Fitzgerald who was named in the investigation introduced a bill (SB 654) that would change the law regarding money and issue ads. Also a recent article in the Milwaukee Journal Sentinel shows how an attorney for Walker's campaign (Chris Wisemuller) illegally destroyed files because of the investigation. It was up to Waukesha District Attorney Brad Schimel to prosecute and he did not. Schimel is now running for Attorney General.

In regards to the ongoing ALEC bill being pushed through many states, the voter ID bill. I noticed that if it were to go through that one acceptable ID was the US passport. I happened to look at mine and nowhere in there does it verify where you live. Only that you are a legal US citizen.

I also saw an article from the Chicago Sun Times about a woman named Kathy Myalls running for Illinois State Representative voted for Walker in the recall and numerous times voted both in Wisconsin and Illinois. She actually has a picture on her Facebook page of Walker and herself.

In some urban areas the wait time to cast a vote will be an hour long without showing voter id. Showing voter id could jump the wait time to two hrs. How many poor people really care enough to stand in line for two hours?

Other ALEC bills passed (a group of influential, corporate attorneys) almost immediately in 2010 were tort reform (limits on economic damages awards caused by wrongful negligence on behalf of corporations i.e.; insurance companies, nursing homes, medical personnel, etc.) money in their pockets but bad for consumers.

A great article involving the effects on nursing homes can be found on [Wis.watch.org](http://Wis.watch.org) or disability rights Wisconsin. The law passed, bars families from using state health investigation records in state and civil suits filed against nursing homes and hospices.

There has been a lot of articles lately involving WE Energies and utilities and rates being imposed. There have been public hearings on this. There was also a farmer from the town of Mitchell recently aired on TMJ4 showing how he produces enough electricity in a year (wind energy) for five homes but still must pay a monthly utility bill.

Walker appointed Phil Montgomery a former member of the board of directors of ALEC to chair the Wisconsin Public Service Commission. Do you think there will be consumer protection? Take a look at all the ALEC bills on [prwatch.org](http://prwatch.org).

with them, and this helps our economy as a whole."

Students passing the exam receive the designation Certified as Financially Literate (CFL).

About 50 percent of Wisconsin's high schools require students to take a personal finance class, which provides practical financial education for students' futures. Topics studied among others, include: credit, insurance, funding for education beyond high school, purchasing an auto, banking services and investing.

"We tie these topics in with real life," Rohlinger said.

Other Wisconsin-based Blue Star Schools for 2013-14 are: Ellsworth, Nicolet, Oshkosh West, Peshtigo, Big Foot, Hamilton, Potosi and Wauzeka-Steuben High Schools. Peterson is also elated that her students brought honor to their school.

"I am extremely proud of our students who took the test and received the certification," she said. "Financial literacy is a very important skill for everyone

to have. This news gives me the confidence that Campbellsport High School graduates are leaving high school financially literate and will continue to make smart financial decisions as they move forward beyond high school."

Gold Star ratings for teachers are also awarded through the WISE financial literacy program. A Gold Star Teacher is one who has 90 percent of his or her class pass the WISE Financial Literacy test. The class must consist of 10 or more students, and retakes are not included in the calculation. Gold Star Teachers are recognized at the MoneyPOWER Conference for Financial Literacy in November, in New York City.

Rohlinger, Scheel and Peterson are convinced of the benefits of the WISE program -- an educational non-profit -- dedicated to providing educational support services nationwide. The program builds financial literacy, fosters business and social entrepreneurship and prepares students for college and the global workplace.



Piittmann and his assistants had decided maybe they would give him the rest of the night off. When the play was sent in, a message went along with it. The message was this: "Tell Brandon this is going to be his last play," and he ends up going 38 for the score," Piittmann said.

Thull ended the game with another 100-yard + running game. He carried the ball 18 times for 139 yards (a 7.7 yard average), and he also returned the opening kickoff 34 yards, giving the Indians good field position right from the start.

Perhaps the Popes weren't looking for a pass on the first play, but they got one, with QB Michael Prochnow hooking up with Charlie Witek for a 65-yard scoring strike before all the fans had settled in their seats. The PAT by Max Hardy gave Kewaskum a 7-0 advantage just 20 seconds into the contest.

Was Piittmann looking to pass to Witek early? Yes, he was, and it worked perfectly. "We thought that would be open," Piittmann said, indicating it was something he saw in the Pius film.

The safety shifted over even more on the play, and despite his attempt to tackle Witek, "He wasn't able to wrap up, and from then it was a race to the end zone."

Pius picked up one first down on its first possession, then the Indians held and forced the Popes to punt, and Prochnow and Witek went back to work again, this time on a 27-yard aerial.

Witek, who ended the game with three catches for 95 yards and the two TDs, didn't just play a key role on offense. Defensively, he came up with a big interception of a Tylen Rhodes pass in the end zone, stopping the Popes on their second possession.

There was no scoring in the second quarter, but plenty

of it in the third, starting with the short run by Thull with 7:57 remaining. "We stopped them and scored," Piittmann said.

Then fifty seconds later, Fechter put a wallop on Rhodes in the end zone for the 2-point safety. Piittmann beamed about the 220-pound junior's play. "Sam had a great night" which included seven solo tackles and nine assists, including four sacks. "He had good pressure on the quarterback."

Following the ensuing punt by Pius, Kewaskum needed just a little over a minute for Thull to find the end zone again, and he got the trifecta in the closing seconds of the period.

Pius got its two touchdowns in the fourth period, both via the air, as Rhodes hit James Arnold for a 7-yard strike and then Luis Saafir for one covering 32-yards.

Rhodes finished the night throwing for 327 yards, hitting 23 of 40 attempts. The Popes' running game managed -5 yards in 29 attempts.

Prochnow finished the contest with 140 yards passing, going 9x19 with no interceptions. "He started well and finished well," Piittman said of his junior quarterback.

With his 139 yards, Thull is at 2,066 for the year, setting a season record that had been held by Eric Perkins. Obviously, the offensive line deserves credit for much of his success, and Piittmann said he has Fechter and Garrett Buth line up on one side for blocking, with Brad Peterson and Dalton Espitia at the other guard and tackle, and he said center Josh Limbach has improved at center in every game.

Defensively, Ben Watzig was cited for excellent play from his linebacking spot. He was credited with five solo tackles and 11 assists, and Piittmann added, "Zach Thull

played well defensively, too."

## Kewaskum School District holds college and career readiness day

## 25 Years Ago

March 24, 1989

St. Matthias Mission, the small Catholic church located on Highway S, in the town of Auburn, celebrated its 125th Anniversary on Sunday, September 11, 1988. The church was originally built in 1861 by German immigrants, starting with 24 families. This rural country church was approved by the State Historical Society and added to the list of State Historic Sites in September and on October 13, 1988, it was recognized by the National Historical Society. German immigrants from the Eifel region, built the church in 1861 on land donated by Mathias Sausen and Johann Pesch. Records show the ladies of the parish sold their hair to raise funds for the needed items: lace for the altar cloth and crucifix. It was consecrated in June 1863 by Bishop Henni, and the collection totaled 98 cents.

St. Matthias had a Catholic school from 1883 to 1926. This was a log building where classes were taught by nuns, but in later years, ladies of the parish did the teaching. Classes were in German. The cemetery, located on a rise northeast of the church, contains the graves of early settlers, Pesch, Schladweiler, Fellenz, Klein, Sausen and the earliest grave there is that of Margaretha Fellenz (nee Altenhofen) who died June 13, 1862, at the age of 21. The mother church to the mission of St. Matthias was Immaculate Conception of Barton.

Regal Ware Inc. of Kewaskum has awarded the 1989 J.O. Reigle Scholarships to Chad and Kristopher Follmann, both seniors at Kewaskum High School. The \$6,000 scholarships are offered annually and now provide \$1,500 a year for a four-year college program.

According to company officials, the Virginia Beach facility is being closed to streamline its operations, a move necessary to remain competitive in a rapidly changing worldwide marketplace. Production will cease some time in fall, but equipment and tooling will be transferred here gradually beginning May 1. Manufacturing processes have become efficient and less space is required to produce the same number of products. This facility has the floor space readily available.

One of the largest agendas in recent memory was addressed by the Kewaskum Plan Commission Tuesday night. It contained three petitions for re-zoning, review of a fourth project and approval of a final plat map for a fifth project. Coming before the Commission was the final plat map for the Creekview Estates project of James Wessing of Kewaskum. On a unanimous vote, the commission agreed to pass the plat on to the Village Board and state for final approval.

A request for the rezoning of a 1.93 acre parcel of land located north of the Kewaskum Mall on Timblin Drive will be passed on to the board for action. Tom Timblin is seeking a zoning change from R-1 single family, to R-4 multi-family residential for the purpose of constructing a 24-unit apartment building. A request hearing on that request has been set for April 17.

The commission also reviewed a certified survey map and request for rezoning of a 1.28 parcel of land adjacent to 127 Elm Street. Mr. and Mrs. Norman Heberer are requesting a zoning change for the property from R-3 duplex to R-4 multi-family residence. That request will also be passed on to the Board with a public hearing scheduled for April 17.

A third request for both rezoning and a conditional use permit for the property at 1139 Fond du Lac Avenue drew more lengthy discussion, as it was being proposed to convert the building into an Elderly Community Based Residential Family (CBRF) unit. Discussion was centered around setback requirements and another upcoming proposal for CBRF housing. A public hearing was set for May 1.

As forecast, Tuesday's Spring Election did not bring record numbers of voters. For area municipalities, counts ran about average. For village trustee, incumbents Mary Krueger and Kenneth Bonlender were reelected with Vincent Groh winning the seat vacated by incumbent Charles Boegel who did not seek reelection.

In the school district board election, unofficial totals for the Kewaskum Board of Education race show John Schulte winning with 1,164 votes followed by Paul Seymour with 993 and Clara Trapp losing with 595 votes. The town of Farmington cast 434 votes with incumbent chairman John Theusch receiving 352 votes and incumbent clerk Joanne Oneska received 361 votes. Incumbent Farmington treasurer Kurt Schmidt defeated challenger Nancy Rodenkirch, 211 to 183. Incumbent supervisor Richard Mayer and challenger Richard Schneider win with votes of 221 and 183, while challenger James Degnitz and incumbent supervisor Joseph Sekeres lost with 172 and 170 votes. The town of Kewaskum cast 167 votes. Incumbents chairman George Allmann received 151, clerk Barbara Hinz 154, treasurer Dolores Prost 154, supervisors David Dorn 140 and Daniel Stoffel 121. In the town of Scott a complete election report was not available. The town of Wayne cast 248 votes. Incumbents chairman Carl Hohlweck 213, clerk Orville Kern 216, treasurer Gerald Schulz 218, supervisors Mark Strobel 201 and Leonard Peter 185.

## 75 Years Ago

April 11, 1914

B.H. Rosenheimer, "The Boy Alderman," succeeds in defeating his opponent, Louis Brandt, by eleven votes. The election passed over very quietly in the village last Tuesday. The only opposition being for trustee with four candidates being on the ticket, three of whom were to be elected. The regular nominees were namely, John Brunner, Theodore Eisentraut, and B.H. 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

Notice is hereby given of a general election to be held in the several wards in Washington County, on the 4th of November, 2014, at which the officers named below shall be chosen. The names of the candidates for each office to be voted for, whose nominations have been certified to or filed in this office, are given under the title of the office and under the appropriate party or other designation, each in its proper column, together with the questions submitted to a vote, in the sample ballot below.

### INFORMATION TO VOTERS

Upon entering the polling place, a voter shall state his or her name and address and sign the poll book before being permitted to vote. If a voter is not registered to vote, a voter may register to vote at the polling place serving his or her residence if the voter provides proof of residence.

Where ballots are distributed to voters, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot. Upon being permitted to vote, the voter shall retire alone to a voting booth or machine and cast his or her ballot except that a voter who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the voter's minor child or minor ward. An election official may inform the voter of the proper manner for casting a vote, but the official may not in any manner advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

Where an optical scan voting system is used, the voter shall fill in the oval next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall write in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote, and fill in the oval on the write-in line. On referendum questions, the voter shall fill in the oval next to "yes" if in favor of the question, or the voter shall fill in the oval next to "no" if opposed to the question.

Where touch screen voting systems are used, the voter shall touch the screen next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote.

To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall type in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote. On referendum questions, the voter touch the screen next to "yes" if in favor of the question or the voter shall touch the screen next to "no" if opposed to the question.

Note: A voter must vote for Governor and Lieutenant Governor jointly on one ticket. A voter for Governor is also a vote for Lieutenant Governor. To vote for persons whose names do not appear on the ballot, write the names of individuals for both offices on the lines provided.

The vote should not be cast in any other manner. Not more than five minutes' time shall be allowed inside a voting booth. Sample ballots or other materials to assist the voter in marking his or her ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

If a voter spoils an optical scan ballot, he or she shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one voter. If the ballot has not been initiated by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the voter shall return it to the election official who shall issue a proper ballot in its place. The elector may spoil a touch screen ballot at the voting station before the ballot is cast.

After casting his or her vote, the voter shall leave the voting booth, properly deposit the ballot, and promptly leave the polling place.

After an official optical scan ballot is marked, it shall be inserted in the security sleeve so the marks do not show. The voter shall then insert the ballot in the voting device and discard the sleeve, or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. The voter shall leave the polling place promptly.

A voter may select an individual to assist in casting his or her vote if the voter declares to the presiding official that he or she is unable to read, has difficulty reading, writing, or understanding English, or that due to disability is unable to cast his or her ballot. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the voter's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the voter.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that at an election to be held in the several towns, villages, wards, and election districts of the State of Wisconsin, on Tuesday, November 4, 2014, the following question will be submitted to a vote of the people pursuant to law:

#### 2013 ENROLLED JOINT RESOLUTION 1

To renumber section 9 of article IV; and to create section 9 (2) of article IV and section 11 of article VIII of the constitution; relating to: creation of a department of transportation, creation of a transportation fund, and deposit of funds into the transportation fund (second consideration).

Whereas, the 2011 legislature in regular session considered a proposed amendment to the constitution in 2011 Senate Joint Resolution 23, which became 2011 Enrolled Joint Resolution 4, and agreed to it by a majority of the members elected to each of the two houses, which proposed amendment reads as follows:

**SECTION 1.** Section 9 of article IV of the constitution is renumbered section 9 (1) of article IV.

**SECTION 2.** Section 9 (2) of article IV of the constitution is created to read: [Article IV] Section 9 (2) The legislature shall provide by law for the establishment of a department of transportation and a transportation fund.

**SECTION 3.** Section 11 of article VIII of the constitution is

created to read: [Article VIII] Section 11. All funds collected by the state from any taxes or fees levied or imposed for the licensing of motor vehicle operators, for the titling, licensing, or registration of motor vehicles, for motor vehicle fuel, or for the use of roadways, highways, or bridges, and from taxes and fees levied or imposed for aircraft, airline property, or aviation fuel or for railroads or railroad property shall be deposited only into the transportation fund or with a trustee for the benefit of the department of transportation or the holders of transportation-related revenue bonds, except for collections from taxes or fees in existence on December 31, 2010, that were not being deposited in the transportation fund on that date. None of the funds collected or received by the state from any source and deposited into the transportation fund shall be lapsed, further transferred, or appropriated to any program that is not directly administered by the department of transportation in furtherance of the department's responsibility for the planning, promotion, and protection of all transportation systems in the state except for programs for which there was an appropriation from the transportation fund on December 31, 2010. In this section, the term "motor vehicle" does not include any all-terrain vehicles, snowmobiles, or watercraft.

#### SECTION 4. Numbering of new provision.

If another constitutional amendment ratified by the people creates the number of any provision created in this joint resolution, the chief of the legislative reference bureau shall determine the sequencing and the numbering of the provisions whose numbers conflict.

Now, therefore, be it resolved by the assembly, the senate concurring, That the foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution is agreed to by the 2013 legislature; and, be it further

Resolved, That the foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution be submitted to a vote of the people at the election to be held on the Tuesday after the first Monday in November 2014; and, be it further

Resolved, That the question concerning ratification of the foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution be stated on the ballot as follows:

**QUESTION 1: "Creation of a Transportation Fund."** Shall section 9 (2) of article IV and section 11 of article VIII of the constitution be created to require that revenues generated by use of the state transportation system be deposited into a transportation fund administered by a department of transportation for the exclusive purpose of funding Wisconsin's transportation systems and to prohibit any transfers or lapses from this fund?"

#### EXPLANATION

In general, funds collected in fees and taxes may be appropriated for any public purpose determined by the Legislature. Wisconsin's transportation fund, which currently exists under statute, is designed to be the source of funding for all modes of transportation in the state. Wisconsin law requires that specific revenue streams such as taxes or fees related to motor vehicles, aircraft, and railroads be deposited into the transportation fund.

At times, the Legislature has transferred moneys initially deposited into the transportation fund to programs with non-transportation-related purposes. Such transfers have typically been to general revenue funds, which are used for state programs such

The combination of a new coach and a small senior class contributed to the Kewaskum High girls volleyball team's sub-par performance this season.

## Good runs highlight final CC meet of the year

Considering the competition they were up against, the Kewaskum High cross country runners did OK in the D-2 sectional held at McCarty Park in West Allis on Friday.

Shorewood and host Wisconsin Lutheran dominated the girls' portion of the meet, and well they should with plenty of quality, quantity and tradition. The Greyhounds had four in the top 10 toward an impressive team score of 34, six ahead of the Knights. Shorewood and Wisconsin Lutheran finished 4-5 at state a year ago.

Led by junior Emily Krier, Kewaskum placed ninth out of 12 with 213 points.

"After a month of injuries and lows, we finished on a high note," KHS coach Randy Backhaus said, referring to the fact most of the girls came in with good times after missing some recent competitions.

Krier, recovering from tendonitis in her Achilles, finished the 5,000-meters in 22:14.01, good for 27th place. (There were 14 Wisco and Shorewood runners ahead of her.) Her time was 20 seconds faster than what she

ran in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference meet a week ago.

"If she (Krier) wouldn't have been injured, she would have done a lot better," Backhaus said, going on that Ellie Debelak used her sprinting experience to overtake another runner down the stretch to finish in 38th place in 23:03.10, much better than her performance in the EWC when she ran on a tender ankle.

The other KHS counters were: Caley McClyman, 40th in 23:16.90; Melissa Schneider, 56th in 24:19.33; and Haley Plachinski, 61st in 24:37.67.

"Caley was near to where she had been" before she injured her foot," Backhaus said.

Backhaus is excited because all of his top five except McClyman will return next year.

On the boys' side, freshman Justin Reck finished 60th in 19:33.87 and ran "really well," according to Backhaus, who said, "He's been improving all the time."

Senior Jake Keller, a first-year runner, placed 69th with a time of 20:48.92. Backhaus said while Keller came out more to get in shape for wrestling, "He's a competitor, and I was happy to have him."

as education, health care, and shared revenue. The Wisconsin Supreme Court has suggested that these transfers are permissible under current law.

In essence, the proposed amendment would change the Wisconsin Constitution to require that revenues generated by specified uses of the state transportation system be deposited into a transportation fund and expended only for transportation-related purposes.

A "yes" vote on this question would establish a department of transportation and a transportation fund in the state constitution. The current Department of Transportation and transportation fund exist only under statute. A "yes" vote would mean that all funds collected from taxes or fees in existence after December 31, 2010 for the licensing of motor vehicle operators, for the titling, licensing, or registration of motor vehicles, for motor vehicle fuel, or for the use of roadways, highways, or bridges, and from taxes and fees levied or imposed for aircraft, airline property, or aviation fuel or for railroads or railroad property would be deposited in the trans-

portation fund or with certain authorized parties, such as a trustee for the benefit of the department of transportation. Funds in the transportation fund may not be lapsed, further transferred, or used for any program that is not directly administered by the department of transportation in furtherance of the department's responsibility for the planning, promotion, and protection of all transportation systems in the state (except for programs with an appropriation from the statutory transportation fund as of December 31, 2010). The proposed amendment does not define "transportation systems."

A "no" vote would mean that the Department of Transportation continues to be a statutory agency. It also would mean that monies collected from motor vehicle, aircraft, and railroad fees and taxes could be appropriated by the Legislature for transportation systems or for other programs as determined by the Legislature.


Others who stood out defensively were Matt Ehmer, Matt Gliniecki and Peyton Donath.
