Seven Indians earn first-team honors

Kewaskum High collected plenty of gold and silver from the All-Eastern Wisconsin Conference football balloting that took place recently.

Undefeated conference champion Plymouth understandably had the most picks, four on the first-team offense and five on the defense while three more earned second team honors. Three Kewaskum players were picked on the first-team offense and four on the defense, with two others garnering second-team acclaim.

Leading the Indian award winners were junior running back, Brandon Thull, and junior lineman, Sam

Fechter, a unanimous pick at offensive tackle and defensive end.

Thull, a 175-pound speedster, wore No. 1 and was No. 1 in the league in rushing with 1,623 yards, including a 430-yard effort in the overtime win over Kiel. Thull, a unanimous selection, scored 22 touchdowns in league play.

"Very deserving. He had an outstanding season," KHS coach Jason Piittmann said, indicating Thull is "a very humble kid. He gives credit to the kids up front ... a good kid!"

Piittmann said what amazes people about Thull is "He's as strong as he is for his size."

And what was the different in Thull from last year to this? "Definite-

ly his vision," Piittmann said. "He sees the holes a lot better."

Fechter, a 6-2, 220-pound, opened the majority of the holes for Thull and was a main cog in the Indian defense.

"Neither Sam nor Garrett gave up any sacks," Piittmann said. "They gave him (quarterback Michael Prochnow) good protection most of the time."

Defensively, Fechter "just controlled his position very well," even against the double teams he often faced.

Fechter wound up with seven solo tackles and 26 assists, with six tackles for losses.

Garrett Butth trimmed down to 250 pounds for his senior season and that helped his quickness at offensive

guard, where he played next to Fechter. "He's always been good on his feet, but this year he really improved his mobility," the coach said.

On the other side of the ball, seniors Matt Elbe (unanimous pick) and Matt Hetebrueg were stellar in stopping opposing runners. Elbe, a 5-9, 250-pound tackle, was the Indians' immovable object, while Hetebrueg, a 6-0, 200-pound linebacker, had to read and react to what opposing teams were trying to do.

Elbe "had a great season. He really stepped up this year," Piittmann said. "He was a force in the middle," because of his size and strength. This

Chief's Corner

I am glad that I can finally say Main Street is open! It has been a LONG summer dealing with construction issues but we have persevered until the end. Unfortunately, when they closed the street last spring, the snow just melted and now that the road is open, the snow is just starting to fall. There truly are only two seasons in Wisconsin – winter and road construction.

Initially the traffic lights at Main Street and Fond du Lac Avenue were supposed to be set to flash red for three business days once the road was open per a Wisconsin DOT regulation. However, in a pleasant surprise Tuesday, the DOT decided to turn the lights on in their entirety. In a summer of not-so-pleasant surprises, this one was more than welcomed!

As the season turns cold once again it is important to remember that winter parking restrictions go in place beginning December 1st and end April 1st. There is no parking allowed on any

Village street from 2 a.m. to 6 a.m. during this time period. Parking is allowed in some Village parking lots if you need off street parking but you must purchase a permit at Village Hall. Failing to follow these parking restrictions will result in a \$20.00 parking citation being issued.

Along that same issue, the snow will soon begin falling and there are property ordinance issues associated with snow removal (see Municipal Ordinance 82-6). Snow and ice must be removed from sidewalks within 24 hours of a snow event. If this is not done, the Village will be forced to perform this task for you and you will be charged for the services rendered. Furthermore, you may not deposit snow from your driveway or sidewalk into the street. Doing so may result in a citation being issued.

Hopefully, we can all follow these winter regulations and before we know it I will be writing an article welcoming spring.

Volunteers get ready for Audubon Christmas Bird Count

The National Audubon Society invites volunteers across the western hemisphere to participate in the longest-running citizen science survey in the world, the annual Audubon Christmas Bird Count (CBC). Between December 14, 2014 and January 5, 2015 tens of thousands of participants will brave inclement weather to help scientists assess and guide significant conservation efforts at a scale they could not accomplish alone.

Each year, Audubon's Christmas Bird Count mobilizes over 70,000 volunteer observers in more than 2,400 locations. It produces the most comprehensive data set depicting the fluctuation, range and movement of bird populations across the continent. Scientists rely on this trend data to better understand how birds and the environment are faring and what needs to be done to protect them. Every local count is part of this vast volunteer network and continues a holiday tradition that stretches back over 100 years.

"The Audubon Christmas Bird Count harnesses volunteer power to gather knowledge that shapes conservation policy at enormous scales in this country. I couldn't be prouder of the volunteers who contribute each year," said Audubon President and CEO David Yarnold.

"Christmas Bird Count data is becoming increasingly important not only in documenting current climate change but in predicting the future effects of climate change on North American bird populations. If we know what to expect, we can start taking action now to do something about it."

Such precise documentation is what enabled Audubon scientists to predict how climate change will alter the geographical ranges of North American bird species in a recent groundbreaking study. Chief scientist Gary Langham and other Audubon ornithologists analyzed 30 years of North American climate data and tens of thousands of historical bird observations from the Audubon Christmas Bird Count and U.S. Geological Survey's North American Breeding Bird Survey to understand the links between where birds live and the climatic conditions that support them. Langham and his team have found that 314 of 588 species are at risk of being climate threatened, they face losing more than 50 percent of their range by 2080. CBC data is helping pinpoint priority areas for conservation; the "strongholds" where birds now live that are forecast to remain stable for multiple species in the future. Many decades of data not only

helps identify birds in need of conservation action, it also reveals success stories. The CBC helped document the comeback of the Bald Eagle, Peregrine Falcon and significant increases in waterfowl populations, all promising results of conservation efforts.

Last year's count shattered records. A total of 2,408 counts and 71,659 observers tallied over 66 million birds of 2,403 different species. Counts took place in all 50 states, all Canadian provinces and over 100 count circles in Latin America, the Caribbean, and the Pacific Islands.

One of the most significant avian incursions recorded during last year's CBC included the record flight of Snowy Owls in the East Coast and Great Lakes. It was the biggest influx ever documented on the CBC and continued through the winter season. Traditional counting of birds together with high-tech modeling and mapping data enabled researchers to make surprising discoveries that would not have been possible in earlier decades.

The Audubon Christmas Bird Count began in 1900 when Dr. Frank Chapman, founder of Bird-Lore - which evolved into Audubon magazine - suggested an alternative to the holiday "side hunt," in which teams

competed to see who could shoot the most birds. While the ultimate goal of participating in a count is tallying the representative sample of the birds on a count day, the natural competitive spirit of birders is what drives them to do the most thorough job possible. The CBC has become a treasured holiday tradition, a reunion with birding friends and a way for anyone to play a small part in a big conservation picture. The growing combined pool of contributed sightings helps researchers understand birds in a way that Chapman could never have conceived back in 1900.

The Audubon Christmas

Bird Count is a citizen science project organized by the National Audubon Society. There is no fee to participate and the quarterly report, American Birds, will be available online. Audubon Christmas Bird Count information is also available online in Spanish. Counts are open to birders of all skill levels. 




against him. But this trouble might be just what the town of Bomont needs to heal the wounds of a terrible accident that lingers over the entire town.



25 Years Ago

April 21, 1989

The Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Department is continuing its investigation of a fatal traffic accident which occurred Saturday night, claiming the life of a West Bend man. According to the Washington County Sheriff's Department, the incident occurred at approximately 9:11 p.m. As an off duty Washington County Sheriff's Department Deputy was traveling east on Highway 28, in the area of the Johnson Bus Company terminal, he struck a person lying in the eastbound lane of the road. Because a Washington County officer was involved, the Fond du Lac County Sheriff's department was called in to handle the investigation. According to witness reports, the victim was a passenger on a westbound motorcycle driven by a West Bend man. The victim, identified as Daryl D. Fettig, West Bend, apparently stood up on the cycle losing his balance, falling into the path of the eastbound pickup truck being driven by the off-duty officer. The driver of the motorcycle fled, however he was arrested early Sunday

morning by Fond du Lac officials, on information supplied by a witness and the officer who saw the license number.

A fourteen-year-old town of Barton girl became Washington County's eleventh traffic fatality Monday night. According to the Washington County Sheriff's Department, Debra Eisenbert, 14, was killed when an ATV she was riding was hit in the rear by a pickup truck. According to the preliminary report, an eastbound pickup truck hit the rear end of the ATV which was either moving very slowly or stopped in the eastbound lane off Schuster Lane. The incident is still under investigation.

After hearing a fact-finding report from Jerry Stollenwerk, who has experience in the area of computers and programming, the Kewaskum Village Board voted to approve the purchase of computer systems for the village hall and police department operations.

Two youths, aged fourteen and fifteen, were the cause of a grass fire in a marshy area along Highway 28, near Kettle Moraine Drive, in the town of Kewaskum. According to reports, the boys started a fire while they were fishing Friday afternoon in ponds south of Highway 28. The boys tried to put out the fire but it got away from them. They then called the Kewaskum Fire Department who arrived on scene about 5:45 p.m. The fire burned a sizeable portion along the pond shoreline and had begun to move up a hillside toward the state forest land. On Saturday, Kewaskum firefighters responded to another grass fire, this time near the intersection of Ridge Road and Highway B. Because of the extremely dry conditions, people are being cautioned to be careful.

The Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, do ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. Territory Annexed. In accordance with Sec. 66.0217 of the Wisconsin Statutes and the petition for direct annexation filed with the Village Clerk on the 23rd day of July, 2014, signed by all of the electors residing in the territory and the owners of all of the real property in assessed value in the territory, the following described territory in the Town of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, is annexed to the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin:

That part of the SW 1/4 of the NW 1/4 of Section 15, Town 12 North, Range 19 East, Town of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, which is bounded and described as follows:

Commencing at the west quarter corner of said section 15; thence N 00°18'41"E along the west line of said NW 1/4, 991.50 feet; thence N 87°48'41"E, 50.05 feet to a point in the easterly right-

of-way line of Prospect Drive; thence N 00°18'41"E along said easterly right-of-way line, 87.52 feet; thence N 60°53'41"E, 163.60 feet to a point in the westerly right-of-way line of U.S.H. "45"; thence S 30°56'19"E along said westerly right-of-way line, 184.20 feet; thence S 87°48'41"W, 238.29 feet to the point of beginning.

SECTION 2. Effect of Annexation. From and after the date of this ordinance the territory described in Section 1 shall be a part of the Village of Kewaskum for any and all purposes provided by law and all persons coming or residing within such territory shall be subject to all ordinances, rules and regulations governing the Village of Kewaskum.

SECTION 3. Temporary Zoning Classification. (a) Upon recommendation of the plan commission, the territory annexed to the Village of Kewaskum by this ordinance is temporarily zoned as follows, pursuant to Sec. 66.0217(8) (a) of the Wisconsin Statutes:

RS-2 Single-Family Residential District

(b) The plan commission is directed to prepare an amendment to the zoning ordinance setting forth permanent classifications

and regulations for the zoning of the annexed area and to submit its recommendations to the board not later than June 1, 2015.

SECTION 4. Ward Designation. The territory described in Section 1 of this ordinance is hereby made a part of the 7th Ward of the Village of Kewaskum, subject to the ordinances, rules and regulations of the Village of Kewaskum governing wards.

SECTION 5. Severability. If any provision of this ordinance is invalid or unconstitutional, or if the application of this ordinance to any person or circumstances is invalid or unconstitutional, such invalidity or unconstitutionality shall not affect the other provisions or applications of this ordinance which can be given effect without the invalid or unconstitutional provision or application.

SECTION 6. Payment to Town. Pursuant to Wisconsin Statute Section 66.0217(14), upon approval of the annexation ordinance, the Village is required to pay annually to the Town of Kewaskum for five (5) years, an amount equal to the amount of property taxes that the town levied on the annexed territory, as shown on the tax roll under Wis. Stat. Section 70.75, in the year

in which annexation is final. This amount is estimated to be \$485.16 annually or \$2,425.80 over five (5) years. The petitioners shall pay to the Village in one (1) payment, the amount required to satisfy this obligation (\$2,425.80 for all five (5) years) prior to the signing of this ordinance. Such payment being a condition to the enactment of this ordinance.

SECTION 7. Special Assessment. There is an outstanding deferred special assessment on the property to be annexed in the total amount of \$15,401.87. The Petitioners shall pay to the Village said amount in full prior to signing this ordinance. Such payment being a condition to the enactment of this ordinance.

SECTION 8. Effective Date: This ordinance shall take effect upon passage and posting or publication as provided by law.



Jim Hovland, representative for the Mid-Moraine reported on the October 8, 2014 Legislative meeting. The guest speakers were from Land Conservation and addressed the phosphorus regulations with the ability to purchase credits and other alternatives to meet the new guidelines.

Administrator Heiser reported on the RFP submitted by the City of West Bend and Independent Inspection Service to provide contracted inspection services. The Board discussed the cost options between the percentage of the permit fees and the annual cost of having a staff member on site. Motion by Kevin Scheunemann to accept the contract from the City of West Bend for a six month contract with the option for a percentage of permits and no personnel on site, second by Richard Knoebel. Voice vote, motion carried.

Fire Chief Mark Groeschel introduced the letter signed by every member of the fire department to change the status of the department from employee to volunteer. Motion by Richard Knoebel to accept the letter from the Kewaskum Fire Department membership, second by Kevin Scheunemann. Voice vote, motion carried. The next step would be to amend the original ordinance establishing the fire department.

Chief Groeschel requested to have the hours of part-time employees increased from 24 hours to 40 hours a week. This request would not qualify a part-time employee as full-time. Motion by Richard Knoebel to increase the part-time employee of hours worked per week to 40 hours, second by Kevin Scheunemann. Voice vote, motion carried.

Motion by Dave Zehren to approve the WE Energies easement by the fire department extending toward Parkview Drive for a gas service relocation along with the \$5,000 compensation and to request a power supply for the 9-11 Memorial, second by Kevin Scheunemann. Voice vote, motion carried.

Motion by Richard Knoebel to expend up to \$130,000 on the purchase of a used Jetter/Vac truck and a sewer camera with the request to contract with local municipalities to provide these services, second by Richard Laubach. Voice vote, motion carried.

Administrator Heiser introduced the 2015 Village of Kewaskum budget. After committee meetings were held the budget includes: A Jetter/Vac truck, a sewer camera, zero turn lawnmower, the emergency siren upgrade, the TIF shortfall, a upgrade to the GIS system, the SCADA system upgrade, a 1% wage increase for staff, two street projects, the funding from the LRIP grant, the Fire Chief wage increase to Grade 12, step 2. The levy amount at this time is preliminary. The levies from other taxing entities and the assessment on manufacturing has not been received. Direction from the Board was to direct excess funds to the fire department tanker and to street projects.

Motion by Jim Hovland, second by Kevin Scheunemann to approve the issuance of an operator's license for 2014/2015 as listed. Voice vote, motion carried.


No win but good numbers
