## Village approves 2015 budget with slight increase

**KEWASKUM-** Village residents will see a four-cent increase in their tax rate for 2015 however overall the tax rate will drop from 2014's rate after the village receives the amount from the state lottery credit.

Less than 10 village residents turned out for the public hearing where they had an opportunity to ask questions about village finances. None of them commented during the hearing and it was quickly closed.

Village administrator Matt Heiser

stated the levy went up \$16,893. This was primarily due to covering a shortfall owed for infrastructure to the TIF district. Village taxpayers will be liable for \$218,000 in the 2014 budget.

Heiser also stated the budget includes two street projects. Moraine Court and the cul de sac on Knights Avenue will be resurfaced. The total of those projects is \$160,000, half of which is being covered by a state grant. There is also an additional \$11,000 set aside for future projects in 2016.

Other items in the budget include

a \$5,000 update to the village's geographic information system, a new zero turn lawn mower for the DPW and a portion of a new vac truck to be shared by the water and sewer utility.

In a memo to taxpayers the village states there will be no anticipated sewer or water increases in 2015. Due to the water and sewer work done on Main Street rates could go up in 2016.

Taxpayers should expect their tax statements during the second week of December.

## Oelhafen resigns from Board

Kewaskum Board of Education member Heather Oelhafen has resigned her position on the Board. Her resignation became effective on Saturday, November 15.

Oelhafen stated in her resignation letter she desired to become a member of the Charter School 14 Learning Governance Board. To be a member of that board, she was required to resign from the Board of Education.

Oelhafen was in the middle of her first term on the board. She was elected in April 2013.

Anyone interested in fulfilling the final four months of her term can send a letter of interest and any other materials they feel would be of value to their candidacy to the School District Office, Attention Tracie Sette by December 3, 2014. The final year of her three-year term will be on the April ballot.

Board members will review the applications and may interview any applicants who they feel would be best qualified to fulfill Board member duties.

As road signs were being removed to allow traffic on the recently completed Main Street project, volunteers from the Kewaskum Area Chamber of Commerce and the Department of Public Works installed new downtown Christmas decorations for the street's opening.

November is National Caregivers Month. The Aging and Disability Resource Center of Washington County salutes all family caregivers for the valuable service they provide to their loved ones. In recognition of the complex and important work that Family Caregivers do, that National Caregiver's Action Network has as its 2014 theme, "Care Comes Home." Family, friends and neighbors provide 80% of the care for persons who age in their homes. According to the Wisconsin Department of Health Services, there are approximately 18,000 family caregivers in Washington County.

Two out of every five adults are family caregivers, 39% of all adult Americans are caring for a loved one who is sick, disabled or living with the infirmities of old age. Being a family caregiver takes planning, knowledge and skill. Almost one half of all family caregivers provide wound care, operating specialized medical equipment, and managing medications. The ADRC assists families in their roles as caregiver with educational programs, options counseling, and information and assistance in locating respite and home care services. The stress of caregiving at home can take its toll.

This month, the ADRC conducted a six week class titled "Powerful Tools for Caregivers." This class helps caregivers develop good communication skills, cope with stress, and understand the resources that may be able to help them on their journey as caregivers. Local West Bend businesses supported this education program by providing supper each week for those who attend the class.



## BBB tips to reduce home heating costs and avoid furnace maintenance scams

Winterizing your home is important and doesn't have to be expensive, according to The BBB Serving Wisconsin.

While the installation of energy-efficient windows and doors, and adding insulation can significantly bring down heat loss during cold months, there are also small fixes that can help reduce energy consumption.

A common winterizing checklist includes:

- Changing air filters
- Installing or re-installing storm windows in the attic to stop warm air from leaking
- Clearing gutters to remove debris that could cause rainwater to freeze and damage them
- Cleaning ridge vents to allow your house to "breathe"
- Putting insulation film over windows to reduce drafts
- Inspecting weather stripping for cracks and peeling
- Installing a tight-fitting fireplace door or cover to stop the loss of heat through the chimney

Consumers may need and choose to pre-purchase heating oil to prevent being subjected to market fluctuations. The cost of heating oil may drop during a mild winter, however, heating oil prices typically rise at this time of year as demand increases. BBB recommends consumers research heating oil suppliers in advance, to ensure they are dealing with a reputable business with an established track record.

### Furnace Maintenance

A dirty furnace is less efficient, so an annual inspection and cleaning is recommended. This can also help spot potential problems that can end up leaving your family in the cold if your heating system breaks down.

However, if you are told

you need a new furnace, get a second opinion. Some unscrupulous operators attempt to deceive customers by telling them that there are potentially dangerous problems with their furnace and that it is unsafe to use.

Nonetheless, a damaged or dirty furnace can emit dangerous fumes. Signs of failure include soot on countertops and vents, and inefficient heating. Fumes also may cause watery eyes, a runny nose and headaches. In such cases, it is best to turn off the furnace and consult an expert.

BBB recommends the following to winterize your home:

**Plug holes** - The average American home may have many small air leaks. Though they may not be large, they have a cumulative effect on home heating costs. Make sure windows close tightly. Check for leaks around them and use caulking to plug the leaks.

**Consider insulating heating ducts:** The U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) estimates that a centrally-heated home can lose as much as 60 percent of warmed air before it reaches vents if the duct work is poorly connected or not insulated, or if it travels through unheated spaces.

**Get a chimney checkup:** Before lighting the first fire of the season, your chimney should be checked for animals, nests, leaves and other debris, as well as for any necessary repairs. Select a reputable business or professional, rather than responding to solicitations.

This is also a good time for homeowners to test smoke and carbon monoxide detectors to make sure they work, and install fresh batteries as needed. Detector units should be replaced every 10 years.

## Wisconsin's technical colleges win three-year, \$20 million federal grant

Wisconsin's health care employers and workers will benefit from a \$20 million investment by the U.S. Department of Labor, which recently announced a grant to Wisconsin's technical colleges to address emerging needs in the health care sector.

The successful grant application comes under the fourth installment of a multi-year, nearly \$2 billion federal community college initiative designed to increase credential attainment in high-priority economic sectors. In previous rounds, Wisconsin's technical colleges won grants to expand innovative programs that produce high-skilled workers in information technology (\$23.1 million in 2013) and manufacturing (\$18.3 million in 2012).

The most recent three-year grant, dubbed "ACT for Health Care" (Advancing Careers and Training for Healthcare), provides \$15 million to a consortium of the state's technical colleges to deliver training and support services for eligible workers, veterans, and other adults, preparing them for high-growth careers in the health care sector. Moraine Park Technical College, with campuses in Beaver Dam, Fond du Lac and West Bend, received \$641,776 to enhance and expand their Medical Assistant program including creating an accelerated for-

mat, which will allow additional students to get off of the waitlists and to complete the program in less than a year. The College will also develop and implement credit-for-prior-learning assessments for the Medical Assistant program courses.

This round also includes a \$5 million, three-year grant to the Wisconsin Technical College System (WTCS) to oversee technical assistance, professional development, and shared learning that advances career pathways across sectors and regions in Wisconsin. Career pathways organize curriculum and services around flexible, "stackable" modules that progressively build over the course of a career.

"These one-time federal funds allow us to advance a more robust initiative in support of our health care sector than would be possible otherwise," said WTCS President Morna Foy. "In the past three years, the Department of Labor has provided a strong complement to our core state and local funding."

Wisconsin's technical colleges received the largest single award and the collaborative is one of the few applicants to successfully receive grants in each of the past three years. Work under the latest grant officially began October 1.


won dressed as characters from Mary Poppins.





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

**Turkey Croissant**

Servings: 12  
Prep time: 20 minutes  
Total time: 25 minutes

- 1 pound (approximately 2 cups) of leftover HoneySuckle White whole turkey, cut into 1/2-inch cubes
- 1 cup toasted pine nuts
- 1 cup diced celery
- 6 tablespoons chopped fresh chives
- 6 tablespoons diced red bell pepper

- 1/2 white onion, diced
- 1/2 red bell pepper, diced
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 1.25 pounds (approximately 3 cups) of leftover HoneySuckle White whole turkey, cut into bite-size pieces
- 1 package (10 ounces) frozen spinach, thawed and well-drained
- 3 eggs
- 1/2 cup low-fat milk
- 1/2 teaspoon salt

Bake approximately 50 minutes, or until center is set.



**Cozy Turkey Soup**

Servings: 6  
Prep time: 20 minutes  
Total time: 1 hour, 15 minutes

- 1 white onion, minced (reserve 2 tablespoons)
- 3 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil
- 1.4 cups (approximately 3 cups) of leftover HoneySuckle White turkey, chopped
- 1/8 teaspoon salt
- 1/8 teaspoon coarse ground pepper
- 1 cup diced celery
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 5 yellow peppers, seeded and diced
- 2 medium potatoes, peeled and diced
- 1 can (15 ounces) chicken stock
- 1 tablespoon salt
- Bread bowls (optional)
- 2 tablespoons grated Parmesan cheese

Cool for 10 minutes, then transfer back to pot to keep warm.

Add turkey and onion mixture to soup.

Ladle soup into bowls and garnish with grated Parmesan cheese.

**Quality Starts on the Farm**

Darrell Glaser, a sixth-generation farmer from Texas, along with his mother, Jeannette, and wife, Shannon, started raising turkeys more than 20 years ago. Today, his four sons also help on the family's farm.

Glaser, who has raised nearly 14 million turkeys, says this starts with keeping the birds healthy and comfortable.

Glaser says if turkeys are happy and comfortable, they are generally healthy, which reduces the need to prescribe medicine, like antibiotics.

Glaser and his family are one of more than 700 independent farm families who are raising turkeys for HoneySuckle White without using growth-promoting antibiotics.

"We feed America and want to provide a quality food source for our customers," Glaser said. "With consumers more concerned about their food, if we can produce wholesome turkey without growth-promoting antibiotics, then we should."



## Nuernberg leads Pointers to victory

Looking more like a veteran than a quarterback in just his third collegiate start, Kewaskum grad Cody Nuernberg led the UW-Stevens Point to a thrilling, season-ending 31-24 win over UW-Stout on Senior Day Saturday in Stevens Point.

Nuernberg went 22x35 for 237 yards and three touchdowns in the effort and maintained his poise as he led the Pointers on a six-play, 58 drive in the final minute, with De-Juan Wright scoring the go-ahead touchdown with 53 seconds remaining.

Nuernberg threw a pair of TD passes in the first quarter, the first to Alex Wallace, covering eight yards, and the other a 7-yarder to Jake Menzel three minutes later.

In the final drive, Nuernberg was 2x2 passing for 15 yards before the Pointer coaching staff called upon Wright to run the ball on consecutive plays for nine and 16 yards before also giving him the ball from the 2-yard line for the touchdown.

As has been the case all season, linebacker Bo Seibel was one of the team leaders

on defense. Seibel came up with four solo tackles, five assists, one quarterback sack and an interception in the first quarter which he returned to the Stout 25-yard line, setting up the Pointers' second TD.

With the win, the Pointers concluded their season with

a 4-3 record, good for fourth place in the WIAC (Wisconsin Intercollegiate Athletic Conference), and 7-3 overall. UW-Whitewater captured the title with a perfect 7-0 mark, despite a struggle vs. UW-River Falls that ended with a 28-25 victory.


