

KMS sixth grader's ticket design to be the face of IndyFest '15

And the winner is – Tony Marchello

Tony Marchello, 12, a Kewaskum Middle School sixth-grader, is making headlines among race car drivers and motor sports fans, as well as with relatives and acquaintances.

The son of Kewaskum residents, Amy and Mark Marchello, and brother of Gracie, 14; Sophie, 10; and Jack, 7, Tony is the winner of a ticket design contest, sponsored by Andretti Motorsports Marketing. The contest was open to children ages 12 and under, with 60 contestants entering. They were challenged with creating the ticket design for the 2015 ABC Supply Co. Inc. Wisconsin 250 IndyFest, slated for July 11 and 12, 2015, at The Milwaukee Mile in West Allis.

Ryan Hunter-Reay, winner of this year's Indianapolis 500 race, chose the winning design. Tony's col-

ored-pencil drawing contained the thematic sentence, "Who'll Be the Big Cheese?" His accompanying drawing contained four race-car drivers -- Hunter-Reay, Simon Pagenaud, Ed Carpenter and Will Power, along with the front portions of their cars.

Tony learned on Aug. 10, a week prior to IndyFest 2014, that he had won the contest. "I was very choked up and excited and very happy," he said. "Racing is my favorite sport, with football second. Being in the contest was a good experience.

"In the future, I want to be an IndyCar engineer, building engine blocks and designing IndyCars," he added.

Tony's dad Mark, a mechanical engineer at Mercury Marine, Fond du Lac, and a former go-kart, Miget, F2000, Formula Atlantic racer, noted that Hunter-Reay was very impressed

with Tony's design. "He liked the association of Wisconsin with cheese and with his car, an orange-colored Dallara, powered by a Honda V-8 engine," Mark said.

"We are very proud of Tony," he affirmed. "Our kids are so supportive of each other, and they are not jealous of one another's achievements."

"It was so appropriate that Tony won the contest, because of his passion for IndyCars and The Milwaukee Mile," Tony's mother Amy said.

The Marchello family attended IndyFest 2014 events on Aug. 15, 16 and 17, the day of the race. Tony received a reward bag containing, among other items, a baseball cap, commemorating the race, a poster for drivers to sign, two key chains and hospitality tickets for Saturday and Sunday for

Despite less than ideal conditions on Sunday, the 2014 gun deer season got off to a good start in parts of Washington and Fond du Lac Counties.

"We had 231 (registered) for the whole weekend," Jan Bartelt, an employee at the BP of Kewaskum registration site, said Monday, which compared favorably with last year's first weekend. "I think last year we had 239."

"Saturday was a good day," Bartelt went on. "It was down a bit Sunday because of the weather."

The breakdown showed 85 bucks were harvested,

along with 146 antlerless deer.

Among the 230 deer were several very nice bucks, according to Bartelt, who noted Joseph Riebe came in with a big 12-pointer.

Tim Otten bagged an 11-pointer, while Scott Sager registered a 10-pointer, and both Hunter Engelman and Craig Dolde each had 9-pointers.

While she didn't shoot a large deer, Cecilee Rodenkirch of Campbellsport was pretty excited about getting her first one, according to another employer at the station.

"There were a lot of nice deer ... Even the does were bigger," Bartelt said, indicating, "All together we have reg-

istered 567 deer," including those killed during the early bow season.

No accidents were reported in Kewaskum, and Bartelt said, "That's the nice part."

At Din's Mini-Mart in Dundee (Fond du Lac County), Kim Galligan said, "We had 290 total," which is down just 14 from the first weekend in 2013.

"Our biggest so far was a 13-pointer," Galligan went on, reporting it was shot by Wally


Seibel of Campbellsport. No weight was available for the big deer because "We don't weigh them," Galligan said, indicating the hunters were in pretty good spirits, but, "I think they would have been happier had it not rained."

The early bow season has

also been fairly successful, according to Galligan, who said 259 have been registered at the station for a total of 549.

The gun deer season ends Sunday at sundown, and the deer must be registered by Monday, December 1 at 5 p.m.

the family to attend the qualifying events the day before the race and grandstand tickets for the race, allowing them to get into the pit to meet the drivers. The family also attended a block party to meet the drivers, during which Tony spoke with Hunter-Reay.

Tony appeared on stage to receive his trophy the day before the race. Since then, he has appeared on the Racing Round-Up Show, on radio station 920 AM, he spoke of his ticket design and his love of IndyCars coupled by his passion for motor sports.

With some further exiting news, Whitney Brockway, account manager/event production lead for Andretti Motorsports Marketing, notified the Marchello family that IndyFest sponsors would have a launch of the IndyFest 15 tickets with Tony's design in January.

"Who'll Be the Big Cheese' is our tag line for 2015," Whitney Brockway said. "We would like to get a cheese company sponsor involved to help push the line for 2015 and run some fun promotions.

"This tag line will be placed on the show car trailer," she added. "We are looking for creative ideas to incorporate 'Who'll Be the Big Cheese' into contests, give-aways, driver appearances and partnerships."

Tony is thrilled with his spot in the limelight. His interest in racing jumpstarted when he was just a toddler. Mark noted that Tony has been drawing IndyCars since he was 3. "He watches IndyCar racing on TV every weekend he can," Mark said. "He did a school project on The Milwaukee Mile when he was in fourth grade."

For those unfamiliar with racing, IndyFest is a 250-mile race around a one-mile track, dubbed The Milwaukee Mile, the oldest operating motor speedway in the world. The race track is located on the grounds of Wisconsin State Fair Park in West Allis.

IndyFest, an IndyCar Series race, is sponsored by ABC Supply Co. Inc. Wisconsin and presented by the Metro Milwaukee Honda Dealers, an associate sponsor. Andretti Motorsports Marketing, organizes and promotes the event.

Free radon test kits now available

The Washington and Ozaukee County Health Departments are encouraging citizens to test their homes for radon this winter. January is National Radon Action Month, but homeowners are encouraged to test now. The Health Departments are offering free radon test kits (one per household) while supplies last. The Washington County office is open Monday through Friday between 8:00 AM and 4:30 PM and is located at 333 E Washington St., Suite 1100, West Bend. The Ozaukee County office is open Monday through Friday between 8:30 AM and 5:00 PM and is located at 121 W. Main St, Room #246, Port Washington. If you wish to have a kit mailed to you, send the health department a check for \$4 with your name and address and a kit will be mailed to your home.

You may be surprised to know that radon is the second leading cause of lung cancer, causing an estimated 20,000 lung cancer deaths per year in


the United States. By taking action now to prevent exposure to harmful radon gas, you can help assure your future health. Each building is unique, so testing is the only way to know if you have high levels of radon in your home. Paula Mugan, the Washington County Health Department Environmental Health Supervisor states that "Everyone should test their home for radon. If the radon level is high, a radon mitigation system should be installed by a certified radon mitigation contractor."



The vision becomes a reality *Bechtel - Gerhartz*

As we relaxed with our host the last evening of our stay outside Kitale, Kenya, the conversation turned to Peter Wanyoni's vision for the orphanage (ref. previous articles in *The Statesman*). We inquired about the steps required to see the vision become a reality. As Peter delineated the stages, I noted each one, including the cost: small plot of land - \$3,500; complete the well, including holding tank and pump - \$1,650; materials for building the buildings - \$2,500-\$3,000. This list did not include furnishings for the buildings or showers/toilets. Quite an undertaking, but Peter was trusting that the Lord would make a way to complete what He had inspired him to accomplish.

Upon my return home from Kenya in early September, a young man heard about the orphanage vision. This young man had come from a large family. He remembered that even though they didn't have much money, they always had food on the table, a roof over their heads, heat, running water and clothing. He compared his life to the lives of the children Peter stewards and recalled the scriptures he'd learned as a child about giving to the poor. Then, one day at the end of October, the Lord moved on the heart of that young man to send

a substantial sum of money to Peter to begin the process of constructing the orphanage.

The well that was being dug by hand on the church property was finished with those funds. A small 50' X 100' property with perfect soil adjacent to the church land was also purchased with that gift and handmade bricks were fashioned from the soil. In the meantime, a local woman in Kenya had offered Peter a stand of trees at a reasonable cost to construct the roof rafters for the new buildings. The church came together to cut the trees.

Brick by brick excitement grew - and it was contagious. The people in Peter's churches caught the vision by example and proximity. Peter worked diligently alongside everyone else to accomplish the tasks at hand, pursuing a vision from the Lord. Little by little, step by step, the vision became reality. Even while digging the well without knowing when the orphanage would become tangible substance, he did not despise the small beginnings the Lord had set before him. Two weeks later, in November, the Lord again instructed that same young man to send another sum to Kenya. Great rejoicing was 'heard' over the second gift. By the end of December the walls were up and the roofs partially on - this church did not waste any time accomplishing the task set before them as provision was poured out! Pictures came back of the progress and it was indeed impressive. Peter reported the high school girls were so excited about their new home coming into being that they were helping carry bricks and clean up the job site. They were taking ownership of their future.

Early January came along

and the young man began evaluating how the Lord had blessed him financially in 2013. When he'd seen the most recent pictures of the orphanage he noted there were no windows and doors on the buildings. He paid attention to the Lord's directive to send yet another check to Kenya to continue the commission he'd begun. He was confident he was sowing into the good ground of a trustworthy ministry to advance God's kingdom here on earth. The evidence is not only in the orphanage buildings and the children that will benefit, it is also demonstrated by the numbers of people coming to join the church and helping build the orphanage because they see the evidence of God at work there.

We're called to be agents of change; ordinary people doing extraordinary things at the leading of Holy Spirit. The Lord invites us to use our time, talents and treasures to build His kingdom - not our kingdom - here on earth. The church in Kitale, Kenya is using their time and talents and a young man from rural Kewaskum, Wisconsin has contributed his treasures to build this place of consolation - 'Faropha' in Swahili - for a small number of homeless orphans. Those children are the next generation of leaders in Kenya being raised up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord, learning godly principles for a lifestyle that will honor Him. Lord willing, the investment in them will help transform their nation. Anything is possible with God!


Kiwanis Students of the Month



After capturing the Wisconsin Collegiate conference titles in both volleyball and soccer, UW-Washington County (UW-WC) coaches, Debbie Butschlick (volleyball head coach) and James Miller (soccer head coach) were honored with the Wisconsin Collegiate Conference Coach of the Year award for their respective sports.

Butschlick who serves as both athletic director and volleyball coach, began coaching the UW-WC Wildcats volleyball team in 1985. Since then, the team has won the WCC Conference Championship seven times (1990, 1994, 2000, 2002, 2003, 2008, 2013, 2014), advanced to state competition eleven times, and earned the state title four times (1992, 2002, 2003, 2013). This year's season was a near perfect score, with only one loss early in the season to UW-Marathon. The team placed three players on a six-person WCC

all conference teams. This is the ninth time Butschlick has received the coach of the year honor.

Miller has been coaching the UW-WC Wildcats soccer team for the past eleven years. The team has earned the WCC championship four times (2004, 2005, 2013, 2014). This year's team divisional record was 7-0. The team clinched the WCC conference championship against UW-Fond du Lac (final score 2-0), but lost the state title to UW-Fox Valley.

This is the second time Miller received the coach of the year award.

April 28, 1989

Monday night's special meeting of the Kewaskum Board of Education proved to be a highly charged and emotional one as the audience, made up largely of 200 students and teachers, argued against the board's plan to consolidate high school classes and reduce staffing to try to trim the proposed school budget, up over 15%. What the group got for its efforts was not what it had hoped for. On a 4-3 vote, the board, under the guidance of newly elected president Neal Weare, decided to rescind its action taken on April 10. A motion from that meeting asked for consolidation of class sections along with the dropping of five classes including Agriculture which would be offered on an alternate year basis. In making that motion, board member Perry Ankerson had sought to reduce staffing by approximately three to five full time equivalent (FTE) teaching positions. What those people attending the meeting got in exchange, however, may prove to be even more upsetting, approval of a motion made by board member Ruth Schmitt to reduce staffing throughout the district by four teachers, including non-replacement of a high school position which will become vacant due to a retirement, plus the elimination of six overload sections. This could result in an even higher staff reduction of 6.1 FTE positions. The board, on a 5-2 vote, passed Schmitt's motion with Ronald Beimborn and John Schulte voting against it.

Bob Beisbier and Dave Nigh, owners of Kewaskum Frozen Foods and Sausage Plus of West Bend, continued their winning tradition this month by earning six top awards for their sausage products at a recent state meat show.

Barney's Tavern and Dance Hall has been a Wayne gathering place for almost 40 years, but come Monday morning, things just won't be the same. The building will still be there, but its name and the faces behind the bar will be different. Barney Strobel, after 40 years as a Wayne tavernkeeper, has decided to retire and enjoy the good life. This is the last week "behind the bar" for Barney, who came to Wayne in 1949. Barney's new owners, Chris and Cindy Canter of Wayne will take over on May 1.

At a special meeting Monday night, the Kewaskum Board of Education approved the issuance of preliminary layoff notices to six individuals as part of its continuing effort to reduce 1989-90 budget costs. The staffing cuts, as presented Monday, meet the goal of reducing staffing by approximately 6.1 full time equivalent positions as set by the board April 24.

After considerable discussion by the Kewaskum Village

Board and comments from the floor, the trustees Monday night, decided to table action on both a zoning request and conditional use permit for Wisconsin Elder Care Inc. The corporation is seeking the rezoning which would allow it to convert the property at 1139 Fond du Lac Avenue (Thee Avenue Restaurant) into a Community Based Residential Care Facility (CBRF) which would house up to eight individuals with a minimum age of 57. A CBRF is designed to provide who require assistance with daily needs such as meal preparation, personal care and can no longer live alone but yet they do not need the extensive services of a nursing home. Several trustees expressed varying concerns as to whether the property was suited for such a facility, including the question of lack of yard and recreational space. Because two trustees were absent from the meeting, trustee Ken Bonlender suggested action on the requests be tabled until a full board was present.

The Russell Thull era is officials underway as his Kewaskum High girls basketball team had non-conference games at Cedar Grove and West Bend West last week.

Actually it's Thull's second stint as head coach of the Lady Indians. He coached them back in 2009 before he decided to spend a year teaching abroad.

Thull, who graduated from KHS in 2000 and obtained his bachelor's degree from Carroll University, brings a wealth of experience coaching the sport, having directed UW-Washing-ton County men's and women's programs, serving as the freshman coach at West Bend East for several years and also heading a basketball program in Korea for one year.

Thull inherited seven letter winners from Kory Dogs, who took over the program midway in the 2013-14 season after Mike Kleinhans resigned abruptly.

The Lady Indians definitely struggled, going 3-19 during the regular season and losing in the opening round of the playoffs, but Thull is confident his team will be better this year. "I go with the philosophy of a balanced attack," he said, pointing out 5-foot-6-inch senior guard Marissa Stahl "is going to be a big part of our offense," but others are also expected to share the scoring load.

Stahl scored 131 points in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference games for a 9.4 points per game average last year and had a personal-high 23 in one game.

Sammie Wiskirchen, a 5-10 junior forward, was next in scoring with 75 points and a 5.4 ppg. average, while Mikayla Dogs, a 5-7 sophomore guard, scored

64 points for a 4.6 ppg. average. Dogs also led the team in assists with 30 (2.1 per game).

The top rebounders were Wiskirchen (89 and 6.4 rpg) and Hailey Taylor, a 6-0 senior (56, 4.0 rpg.), and Thull feels this two young ladies, along with Erin Matusinec, a 5-10 senior center, will become very proficient in rebounding. "We definitely have good height down low from Sammie, Hailey and Erin," he said.

In addition to Stahl, Wiskirchen, Dogs, Taylor and Matusinec, the other letter winners are 5-8 senior forward McKenzie Rosenthal and 5-9 guard Maddie Kreis. Both are coming off successful tennis campaigns and will provide depth for the team.

The others on the varsity team this year are juniors Autumn Flasch, a 5-3 guard, and Kaila Kirst, a 5-1 guard, who will share point guard duties with the very athletic Dogs, along with 5-7 sophomore forward Hailey Herriges, who played some on the JV team and some on the varsity last year.

Rounding out the team is German foreign exchange student Julia Zeppan.

Thull expects his girls will have more wins this year but does not want to point to a specific number. "Kind of my philosophy is to get better every day," he said. "My attitude with the kids is for games and practices get better every day."

Thull liked what he saw in the four-team scrimmage at Brown Deer recently. "We actually won all three ... the competition wasn't all that great, but we definitely took some big steps forward," he said.

When it comes to the Eastern Wisconsin Conference teams, Thull said, "I'm new

obviously to conference, but I know one of the (top) teams is Waupun, with Two Rivers and Plymouth, those three teams" are favored.

Thull is being assisted by Mike Hintz at the JV level, and

Mike Struebing will coach the freshmen. At the varsity level, Thull has Julie Schuessler, a fourth grade teacher at Farmington, helping him, along with Kelly Schaub, a student teacher in the district.

Currently there are 31 girls out for the three teams, and Thull said "My goal is to try to get 40" in the future.

Indians get stingy at the end

"Wow" was the first word uttered by coach Russ Thull after hearing his Kewaskum High girls basketball team allowed host West Bend West to score only one point in the final 5:11 last Thursday night in its 37-24 victory over the host Spartans.

The Lady Indians, now 1-1, were up 29-23 at that point, and they really put the clamps on West the rest of the way. West's lone point was a free throw by Becca Minz while Kewaskum stretched its lead on a layup by Erin Matusinec, a driving basket by Hailey Taylor, a short jumper by Marisa Stahl and finally, a pair of free throws by Maddie Kreis with 1:09 remaining.

"One of our emphases was to set the tone defensively," Thull went on. "We came with some intensity and passion on the defensive end."

Thull cited Sammie Wiskirchen, Matusinec, Taylor and Hailey Herriges for their rebounding and noted Kreis "was huge on the boards also."

McKenzie Rosenthal was credited with nine rebounds, while the others had seven, five, five and five, respectively.

Kewaskum has 11 varsity players this season and 10 of them played extensively, which,

Thull said, will be his plan for the entire year. He said rather than have first and second units based on scoring, he looks for the right combination to play together "so we can keep that balance throughout the game."

Concerning the good balance the Indians displayed, Thull said, "Love it."

As expected, Stahl is a key figure in the Indians' offensive plans. Even though she had to sit a good portion of the third quarter after picking up her third foul just 1:20 into the period, Stahl, who led KHS in the opener with 11 points, duplicated that effort vs. West, scoring three baskets, one a 3-pointer, and converting four of five free throws.

"She (Stahl) picked up a couple cheap ones," Thull said about the fouls, but luckily others picked up the slack. Wiskirchen had seven points, while Taylor and Matusinec both chipped in with six.

"Sammie is just a great kid. She works hard every day. She listens to everything I say ... such a great leader for a junior," Thull said.

Matusinec also drew praise. "Erin has been doing an excellent job in the post position," Thull went on, indicating, "She did a nice job asking for the ball."

Kewaskum had a much better start in the game than it did against Cedar Grove, scoring nine points in the opening quarter. West led just once in the contest after freshman Alex Rondorf opened with a successful 3-point shot. Rondorf led the Spartans with an even dozen.

Midway in the second quarter, West came in the quarter at 13-12, but Wiskirchen scored off a nifty pass from Mikayla Dogs, followed by a pair of free throws by Stahl and a layup by Taylor to moved out to a more comfortable 19-12 advantage.

The Indians open Eastern Wisconsin Conference play Dec. 2 at home vs. Plymouth.




