

Kewaskum Community Pantry celebrates five years

On December 17, 2009 the Kewaskum Community Pantry officially opened its doors housed in the Kewaskum Municipal Building Annex. From its meager beginnings in a closet, roughly just 200 square feet, it has now become a full-service food pantry.

The pantry got its start when the assistance and perseverance of former Kewaskum School District (KSD) Superintendent Michael Krumm, local clergy, community members and students from Kewaskum High School were able to turn an idea into reality that five years later now supports nearly triple the number of families monthly.

The original pantry was started in order to serve families in the Kewaskum School District. It was managed by Tom and Barb Knorr and Emil and Sandi Radetsky. The first night only two families were

served, but it continued to grow from there. By the end of the third month, 157 families had been provided with non-perishable food items. It was realized almost immediately that there was a need for a larger, permanent location.

Rental properties were explored and deemed unfeasible. Eventually, the KSD offered space to build a permanent building to house the pantry. Plans were drawn up for a 2,300 square foot facility at a cost of roughly \$50,000. The pantry broke ground on September 12, 2010 being built by KHS Construction Skills class members, with supervision by tech education instructors Kevin Hein and Bryan Puls. It was successfully completed in March of 2011.

Moving from a 200 square foot space to a 2,300 square foot building allowed the pantry to expand, supporting more than just non-per-

ishables. Donations from community members included freezers and refrigerators. Geidel's Piggly Wiggly donated fifty feet of shelving and store fixtures to complete the building. With the support of numerous community programs and donations throughout the year the pantry now is able to provide families with canned goods, fresh produce, meat, dairy and frozen foods.

The running of the pantry is made possible by eight volunteers who work rotating days throughout the week, led by the Knorrs. However, it doesn't stop there, numerous drivers help to pick up baked goods at Pick n' Save and Sendiks in West Bend. Students from KHS also volunteer on Wednesdays straightening

A big win at the wire

Keith Traska got excited just talking about the thrilling, 64-63 comeback win his Kewaskum High boys basketball team posted at Mayville on November 25.

"We won on a last-second shot," the third-year coach stated about the season-opener. "He (Caleb Martin) hit a 3-pointer with nine seconds to go, giving Mayville a 63-62 lead, "then Charlie (Witek) drove the length of the court and put it in to give us the win."

Witek wound up scoring 15 points, and the game-winner was the only basket he had in the fourth quarter.

Two other Indians, 6-7 junior Jason Hanson and 6-0 senior guard Dean Schlice, also finished in double figures. Hanson wound up with a team-high 21 points, with seven baskets and seven of 10 free throw shooting. He scored 11 of his points in the fourth quarter.

Schlice gave the Indians a boost in the third period with a pair of rainbow 3-point jumpers, and he finished with an even dozen.

After suffering through a disappointing campaign a year ago, it was important for the Indians to get off to a good start and for the first half it didn't look like that was going to happen.

"It was a tale of two halves," Traska said, referring to the fact the Indians managed just 10 points in each of the first two quarters while the host Cardinals were on fire in the early going, pouring in 25 points in the first eight minutes and adding 10 the next to take a 35-20 lead at the break. "They started off going bananas, and then they calmed down a bit."

"We definitely made some good adjustments at half and took care of business," Traska said, pointing out the Indians scored 42 points after intermission. "Not only did we play better defensively, but we fixed our

Wayne home found ablaze on Thanksgiving

The Washington County Sheriff's Office was notified of structure fire at 4:26 p.m. on Thursday, Nov. 27. Kohlsville Fire Department and Washington County Sheriff's deputies were dispatched to the home at 8736 Fairview Dr.

Upon the arrival of deputies the rear of the home was fully engulfed and the fire was spreading to the rest of the home.

The Kohlsville Fire Department was able to extinguish the fire with the assistance of firefighters from Kewaskum, Campbellsport, St. Lawrence, Allenton, Theresa and Lomira. Lifestar Ambulance and the Town of Wayne Highway Department also assisted at the scene.

None of the residents or firefighters suffered injuries from the fire, however, the family did lose their cat in the fire.

The entire home suffered severe damage and is believed to be a complete loss. Damage estimates to the home are \$180,000.

The cause of the fire remains under investigation by the Kohlsville Fire Department and the Washington County Sheriff's Office.





Herriges leads Indians past Ripon

The Kewaskum High girls basketball team went ice cold in the fourth quarter but still managed to hold on to beat Ripon 29-27 in its home opener on November 25.

The visiting Tigers outscored KHS 8-1 in the final eight minutes to make the game very exciting right to the final buzzer.

"We made it close. We had some good looks but didn't hit some of our shots," KHS coach Russ Thull said. "We did run a lot of clock. That was a good thing."

For the girls who have been on the varsity team, this was a very big milestone, according to Thull who said, "This was the first win ever by the varsity players here (at home)."

The game was close throughout the first half, then the Indians exploded for 15 points in the third quarter to go up to what was thought to be a comfortable 28-19 advantage.

Ripon, which will be in the new conference with Kewaskum beginning next

September, battled back as Kewaskum only scored one point, a free throw by Hailey Herriges, down the stretch.

Thull, said with 1:30 remaining his team led 29-27 when "We ran a minute off the clock, then got called for traveling with :25 left, and they had a last shot but missed."

KHS shot just 26 percent on 2-point baskets, converting 10x38 tries. Leading the Indians in scoring was 5-foot, 6-inch sophomore guard/forward Herriges, who scored 14 points on six of 11 shooting (54 percent), including five of seven from 2-point range.

"She hit some big shots. She hit a big three in the third quarter," Thull said about Herriges, who also played a great game on the defensive end of the court.

Marisa Stahl, the leading scorer in the team's first two games, was limited to six points, going 2x10 on the night, with a pair of 3-point goals. While she had an off night shooting, Stahl did contribute five steals, one assist, three blocked shots and

four rebounds.

"She had a lot of big steals down the stretch," Thull said of Stahl.

The leading Indians team member rebounder was Erin Matusinec, a 5-10 senior forward. She had seven.

Marissa Bunge was Ripon's top scorer. She had 13 points.

Kewaskum, 2-1, was slated to open Eastern Wisconsin Conference play December 1, hosting Plymouth, which is picked to challenge for the title this year. "This will be a good opportunity for us to see how we stack up with the good teams ... see where we're at," Thull said, indicating being at home "should be a comfortable feeling."

Top grid awards go to Thull, Fechter, Hardy and Peterson

No big surprise concerning who was the Offensive MVP on the Kewaskum High football team this fall.

At the team's recent awards night, Brandon Thull completed the trifecta, after being a unanimous first-team running back pick in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference balloting and earning a spot on the WFC (Wisconsin Football Coaches Association) all-state team.

Thull, who finished fifth in Wisconsin in rushing this fall with 2,136 yards and tied for sixth in touchdowns with 30, joined Ryan Borton of Muskego, Dom Conway of West DePere, Noach Diaz of Sun Prairie, Mitch Gerharts of Hortonville, Tyler Glass of Lancaster, Troy Laufenberg of Waunakee, Josh Owns of Cambridge, Max Praschak of Summerset, and Demaris Purifoy of Wauwatosa West of offensive backs on the coaches' first team.

KHS coach Jason Piittmann concurred with the pick and is delighted he will have

Thull back next season.

"Brandon has some special gifts in his combination of speed, strength and agility," Piittmann said, adding, "Along with those special gifts, Brandon also has humility. He knows that he has more to work on and more to accomplish. I am hoping that his refusal to rest on his laurels translates to the rest of the boys in competing in winter, spring and summer sports - as well as in their workouts."

The other special awards — voted on by the players — went to the following: Defensive MVP, Sam Fechter; Special Teams MVP, Max Hardy; Lineman of the Year, Garrett Buth; and Indian Award, for leadership and team spirit, went to Bradley Peterson.

There were several contenders, interior lineman Matt Hetebrueg, linebacker Matt Elbe and halfback Josh Baker, for the defensive award, with the nod going to Fechter, who fought off many double teams to make tackles and was a consistent visitor in opponents' backfields.

Hardy, a defender on the boys' soccer team, was coaxed

into kicking for the Indians after the first six games. He wound up going 19X21 in PAT (points after touchdown) tries, a 90 percent success clip.

About the season, Piittmann said, "Our only two losses came to quality football teams. Those were two great high school football games ... We had our chances in both."

What was especially satisfying to Piittmann was, "We could see the confidence in our team build throughout the season. To some degree, this team reminded me of our 2005 team," referring to the fact both "finally clicked" late in those seasons to reach their potential.

Looking ahead to the 2015 campaign, Piittmann said, "The new conference will be a challenge. We have familiar foes in Campbellsport, Plymouth, and Waupun - and their

coaching staffs. There is always a challenge in prepping for new opponents and we will have four of those."

He went on, "Add in the fact that Winneconne's coach recently resigned, and I also heard that Ripon's coach may have resigned, and that makes any off-season prep work more complicated as we won't know if what they share on film will be similar to what they will be doing next fall."
