## Candidates lining up for Grothman's senate seat

Wisconsin Congressman-elect Glenn Grothman (R-Campbellsport) hasn't even resigned and candidates are already pounding the pavement for his 20th district state senate seat. Grothman won a seat vacated by retiring congressman Tom Petri this fall.

This week Slinger native Tiffany Koehler announced she would run for the seat. Former State Representative Duey Stroebel was the first to announce his candidacy on Nov. 10. Grothman defeated him in a primary for Congress this summer as Calumet County Supervisor Ralph Prescott lost

an assembly primary. The two join Koehler and Ozaukee County Board Chairman Lee Schlenvogt.

The special election for Grothman's seat will be held early in 2015 and will be dependent upon Grothman's resignation that is expected in January. With the number of candidates entering the race, a primary is expected.

According to the Milwaukee Journal Sentinel, Governor Scott Walker will need to call the special election. But the special election could not be held before the seat becomes vacant.

If the special election is to occur after Feb. 1, it must coincide with the regular spring election on April 7 or be held sometime after that. In that case, primaries for both the special election and regular spring elections would be on Feb. 17.

Under another scenario, the election could occur as early as Jan. 20, with a primary on Dec. 23. While the special election cannot occur until after the resignation, a primary could occur before then.

## Dziecio sole admin at WES

The Kewaskum School District announced Tuesday morning an elementary administrative shift in leadership as Administrative and Kewaskum Elementary.

As WES is successfully transitioning into a multi-age learning environment and the Board of Education has given tentative approval to convert WES into a charter school next year. Joel Dziecio will transition into being the sole administrator at WES.

The restructuring allows for Tom Fischer who assisted Dziecio at Wayne to work in tandem with KES Principal Jody Heipp supporting KES in several administrative areas, in addition to his continued leadership at FES.

Superintendent of Schools Jim Smasal stated, "As our elementary enrollment increases, and in an effort to continue to best meet the needs of all students, this tandem approach to our KES leadership is a win for everyone. Mr. Fischer will be available to KES approximately twice a week, or as needed. This transition will gradually take place as we move through December."

Fischer originally began his administrative duties as Associate Principal at Kewaskum High School. Upon the resignation of Keith Kriewaldt to become Erin School District's Superintendent, Fischer filled Kriewaldt's principal position. A few years ago Fischer left KES to become principal at KHS but then later became principal at FES.

Dziecio started with the Kewaskum School District at KMS where he was a math teacher. For the last four years he has been an administrator in the district at KHS and WES. Heipp has been principal at KES since 2010.



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## Chief's Corner

I have never used this platform to speak out on topics such as this; however since the grand jury ruling in Ferguson, Missouri I have been asked by many residents how I feel about this entire event. The answer is simple – frustrated and disappointed.

As an officer, I have been called numerous derogatory names by subjects I have dealt with regarding my physical appearance, my age, gender, and of course I have been called a racist on more than one occasion - with no factual basis. To do this job officers need to have thick skin and allow these types of insults to roll off our backs.

There is one insult that I am having a hard time letting "roll off my back"; the insult law enforcement received from two of the top leaders of our country. President Obama and Attorney General Holder both decided to take sides in the Ferguson case without knowing any of the forensic evidence. They, along with a large portion of the media, immediately decided that Darrin Wilson, along with all law enforcement, discriminate based on race. I don't know Darrin Wilson, but I do know a lot of officers and deputies, and I don't know any that are prejudicial based on the color of one's skin. I know a lot of officers who are prejudice against crime and disorder, but not race.

This year alone, 108 officers have been killed in the line of duty along with another 20 K-9 officers (ODMP, 2014). President Obama sent White House officials to attend Michael Brown's funeral. How many officials has he sent to honor the men and women who were killed while trying to defend and keep order in our communities. . . . ZERO. That is very frustrating and disappointing.

The President had an opportunity to use this event as a catapult for discussing the true issues that reside in the urban

minority communities, which is not racist cops arresting and shooting unarmed "teenagers". The underlying problems and frustrations in the urban minority community revolve around high unemployment, failing schools, lack of respect for others, and the unfortunate absence of the two parent household. These issues are what lead to criminal activity; thereby leading to more interactions with police and creating a perceived notion of racial bias. If we start fixing these core problems first, I am confident the other issues will resolve themselves.

Everyday I put on my uniform and gun belt, kiss my children and wife goodbye completely understanding the risks associated with my chosen profession. I fully understand and expect that on any given day I will be hated by some, disrespected by many, thanked by few and yet needed by all. However, I not only expect, but demand that the President and Attorney General of the United States of America (the highest ranking law enforcement official in the country) would, in the event that I am required to use deadly force, allow for the legal and investigative processes that law enforcement utilizes to acquire and examine all the evidence of a situation be completed prior to passing judgment. I also expect that they hold law enforcement officers with the same legal and just standards that we apply to any other citizen - that one is innocent until proven guilty.

And then, when our criminal justice system concludes that deadly force was used in a prudent and justified manner, instead of vilifying police, they should stand up for all police officers for doing what we do on a daily basis. The fact that our President and Attorney General chose not to do that is, in my opinion, frustrating and disappointing.

## Drunken drivers find themselves in weekend crashes uninjured

Drunken driving saw two men arrested this weekend in separate crashes. The first, a village of Lomira man and a few hours later, a village of Kewaskum man were found by deputies after crashing their vehicles.

Washington County Sheriff's deputies responded shortly before 11 p.m. on Saturday, December 6 in the town of Wayne on County Road W near Sunset Dr. after a southbound truck lost control and drove through four farmer's fences before coming to rest up against a neighbor's tractor. A passenger fled as officers were arriving at the scene.

A 25-year-old village of Lomira man was detained and arrested for second offense OWI after admitting to driving. Witnesses said neither party was hurt and both occupants were on cell phones calling people so authorities believe the passenger got picked up. The driver would not acknowledge who his passenger was.

While looking for the passenger, deputies were alerted to a 43-year-old male subject walking down State Highway 28 near US Highway 41. He was located and said he was walking from Fond du Lac to Kewaskum.

Deputies realized he was not dressed for the walk and questioned the man who admitted he put his truck in a ditch. The truck was located in a farm field about 300 yards off road south on Highway 28, near Mullen Dr.

Deputies say the driver went off the road right on Highway 28 and crashed through a farmer's fence. He then drove around the field trying to find an exit. He drove to the back of the field where he crossed a bridge that was intended for ATVs and drove around the woods before coming back over the bridge. When crossing the bridge for the second time the ½-ton truck partially broke through the decking and came to rest on the perpendicular supports.

**Wings Over Wisconsin**  
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Peppermint Hot Chocolate Ugly Sweater Cake

**Peppermint Hot Chocolate Ugly Sweater Cake**

Servings: 10-12

- 1 package (16.25 ounces) Devil's Food cake mix
- 1/4 cup hot cocoa mix
- 3 eggs
- 2/3 cup water
- 1/3 cup vegetable oil
- 1/2 teaspoon peppermint extract
- Buttercream icing
- Red Decorator Preferred Rolled Fondant
- White Decorator Preferred Rolled Fondant
- Primary Colored Fondant Multipack
- Piping Gel
- String licorice
- Sprinkles: Sugar Pearls, Trees, Yellow Colored Sugar

Preheat oven to 325°F. Spray Ugly Sweater Cake Pan with vegetable pan spray.

In large bowl, beat cake mix, hot cocoa mix, eggs, water, vegetable oil and peppermint extract with electric mixer at low speed 30 seconds. Scrape bottom and sides of bowl; beat at medium speed 2 minutes.

Pour batter into prepared pan, spreading to even thickness. Bake minutes 44-47 minutes or until toothpick inserted into center of cake comes out clean. Cool in pan on cooling grid 10 minutes. Remove from pan; cool completely on grid.

With spatula, lightly ice cooled cake. Roll out red fondant 1/8 inch thick; cover cake. Knead small amount of white fondant into remaining red fondant, white with small amount of yellow fondant, small amount of yellow fondant with green fondant. Roll out all colors of fondant separately, 1/16 inch thick. Using holiday cutters, patterns or cut free-form, to make collar, ornaments and sweater neckline, cuffs and bottom band. Use piping gel to attach licorice ornament hangers, sprinkles and sugars.

**Eggnog Ugly Sweater Cake**

Servings: 10-12

- 1 package (16.5 ounces) yellow cake mix
- 2/3 cup eggnog
- 1/3 cup vegetable oil
- 3 eggs
- 1/8 teaspoon ground nutmeg
- Buttercream Icing
- Icing Colors: Juniper Green, Christmas Red
- Holly Mix and Candy Cane Sprinkles

Preheat oven to 325°F. Spray Ugly Sweater Cake Pan with vegetable pan spray.

In large bowl, beat cake mix, eggnog, oil, eggs and nutmeg with electric mixer at low speed 30 seconds. Scrape bottom and sides of bowl; beat at medium speed 2 minutes. Pour batter into prepared pan, spreading to even thickness.

Bake 39-42 minutes or until toothpick inserted into center of cake comes out clean. Cool in pan on cooling grid 10 minutes. Remove from pan; cool completely on grid.

With spatula, ice cooled cake. Using tip 233 and green icing, pipe tree on cake. Using tip 46 and red icing, pipe outline neckline, sleeve cuffs and bottom sweater band. Attach sprinkles.



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

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## Kiel spoils Indians' home opener

One long scoring drought, foul trouble and poor free throw shooting plagued the Kewaskum High boys basketball team (1-1) last Thursday

night, leading to a 55-40 loss to Kiel in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference opener for both teams.

The Indians didn't have a single basket in the third quarter and went scoreless until the

last 1:10 when Dean Schlice finally got a pair of free throws to drop after Kiel moved out to a 41-26 advantage.

"In the third quarter we were two of eight at the free throw line," a disappointed

coach Keith Traska said afterward. "We weren't able to fight back the way we needed to."

All this after the Indians had staged a nice little run the final 3:44 to the second quarter, cutting Kiel's eight-point lead (25-17) down to just two at 28-26.

It wasn't a situation where the Indians were far off the mark during the drought. Several of the free throws, along with some inside shots Kewaskum had, rolled up and out of the basket after seemingly hitting the mark.

When asked whether he thought there was a lid on the basket during that period, Traska said, "We talked about that on the bench," with the coaches wondering why the Indians weren't getting favorable rolls in their home basket. "We couldn't buy a basket," he said.

While the lack of offense was disappointing, so was the foul situation and the inability of the Indians to execute its game plan vs. the much-shorter Raiders, who played a very tough man-to-man defense against the Indians.

"We were in foul trouble across the board ... the whole game," Traska said, looking at the fact Charlie Witek picked up two fouls in the first 1:42 of the game and Brady Hanson had a pair before the buzzer ending the quarter sounded. His third came late in the second quarter, and his older brother, Jason, the team's 6-foot-7 center joined him on the bench a minute later when he picked up No. 3.

Traska said he was proud of the way the reserves picked up the slack and cut into Kiel's

lead. Cory Stern made three of four free throws in the final 1:06 and along with Michael Prochnow's fadeaway jumper at the buzzer, the Indians were right back in the ball game.

Coming out of the break, Kewaskum had a three-shot possession without success, and Witek picked up fouls numbers three and four within 32 seconds. Then the Raiders started to pull away, using 3-point baskets by Trent Nickel and Carter Voelker, a drive by Nickel and finally a steal and layup by Voelker to stretch their lead to 15 points at 41-26.

Voelker lead the Raiders with 16 points, while Nick Walsh added 14.

For the Indians, it was Jason Hanson scoring 12 and Witek next at 10.

Kewaskum made just nine of 24 free throws, and Traska said, "We stunk outside the 3-point line," with Schlice coming up with the only 3-pointer of the game.

Traska said he had film on Kiel, so there weren't any big surprises in what the Raiders were doing. It was more a question of execution, and he said, "As a coach, I take that personally," but, "You have to go back and get ready for the next opponent, which is Plymouth on Tuesday (Dec. 9).

When asked if Kiel is one of the EWC contenders, Traska said, "I think there will be a lot of teams in the middle, knocking each other off. Kiel ... tonight, they looked good."

Imagine being around 5-feet, 6-inches tall and trying to get off a shot against NBA standout LeBron James. That's probably how the members of the Kewaskum High girls basketball team (2-3) felt last Friday night when they struggled shooting against undefeated Kiel (5-0) in a 39-25 defeat.

"Kiel has three six-foot kids (Cassie Schweitzer, Tasha Riebe, Sierra Schobert) inside. Their defense made it hard for us," Coach Russ Thull said, indicating no inside shot attempt by the Indians went unchallenged. The result was the Indians' lowest shooting effort of the season, with just five baskets in 30 attempts for a 16 percent clip and just one of six successful 3-point tries.

Still, the Indians were in the game right until the final minutes and led on their home court midway in the second quarter.

"We were actually up 9-2 with three minutes left in the second quarter" but ended up with some foul trouble, allowing the Raiders to finish the half

on an 8-0 run.

Kewaskum was outscored by five in the third quarter but stayed with the Raiders until "one of their kids hit a three," according to Thull, who said several missed 1-and-1 free throw chances also hurt down the stretch.

None of the Indians scored in double figures. Marisa Stahl led the team with seven points, and Sammie Wiskirchen chipped in with six. Guard Maddie Kreis was the rebounding leader with six.

Thull reported the Indians had their lowest turnover total, 15, "so we did OK there."

After reviewing the film, Thull said, "The girls played hard," adding, "I still think we are doing some good things and making progress."

Kewaskum, currently 0-2 in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference, is at Two Rivers Friday.

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# Heberer is lone champion; Indians place sixth

Six of Kewaskum's nine entrants won at two matches or more in Saturday's annual Gunslinger Invitational hosted by Slinger High School.

Led by Jacob Heberer's first-place finish at 113, the Indians placed sixth in the field of 12, scoring 106.75 points. Burlington won the team title with 265, while Cedarburg was second at 254.5 and Oshkosh North third with 199.5.

"It was kind of a wishy-washy tournament," KHS coach Scott Rhoads said afterward, noting some weight classes were pretty weak and others were really stacked.

Heberer, wrestling at 113, went 5-0 on the day, including a pin in 3:17 over Kewaskum freshman Adam Bruss (who was competing unattached to fill the pool bracket), a 12-0 major decision over Miller, unattached, and a forfeit win over a wrestler from Burlington.

That put him in the seven-man finals bracket where he made quick work of Ray Brewer of Oshkosh North, pin-

ning him in 1:52, then topped West Bend East's Gunner Boettcher in a high-scoring 12-8 championship match.

"He had a great day. He's wrestling real well, and he's in good position," Rhoads said about the young Heberer, who is currently 6-0.

"He got caught on his back in the finals. That had me really worried," the coach said, noting he fought hard to get back to his base.

The Indians also posted one third place, two fourths and a pair of fifths.

Junior Zach Heberer went 3-1 on the day to take third at 126. He started with a bye and next pinned Jacob Laach of Martin Luther in 1:34 to advance out of the pool and into the eight-man finals. In the semis, Heberer won a major decision over Gage Wuttke of Delavan-Darien, 11-1 before getting pinned in the first period (:51) of the semis by Kyle Schwartz of North.

Heberer rebounded with a 9-3 decision over Robert Elsbury of Burlington.

Fourths were taken by Alex Vogt at 132 and Eric Doll at 220.

Vogt, a sophomore wrestling at 132, went 2-0 in his pool with a major decision and a pin, then in the finals round, he pinned Jalen Haase of Oshkosh North in 1:18 before losing to Adam Becker of Johnson Creek by fall in 1:45, and in the battle for third place, lost to Cedarburg's Joshua Hickey by technical fall.

"Alex had a good tournament. His weight class was tough," Rhoads said.

Doll (4-2) started out with three pins, all in under two minutes, before getting pinned by Hegeman Tiedt of Burlington in 2:32 and in the battle for third place, he lost a major decision (17-5) to Noah Belschner of Cedarburg.

Ben Watzig at 195 and Garrett Buth at 285 wound up in two of the tougher brackets and had to settle for fourth and fifth, respectively. Watzig went 1-3 on the day with one pin in a class with just five wrestlers, while Buth finished 4-1 with three pins and a bye. In the battle for fifth, he pinned Bernard Smith of Oshkosh North in :48.

Travis Trudeau at 120,


