Local manufacturers tour Kewaskum Schools



Members of the manufacturing community of Washington County toured the technology education area of Kewaskum High School recently.

Washington County manufacturers toured the Kewaskum School District as part of an initiative to improve career-readiness for students.

The initiative is a collaboration between the Washington County Workforce Alliance and Washington County school districts. In October, Kewaskum teachers visited five different manufacturing facilities in Washington County as the first phase of the initiative.

Superintendent Jim Smasal said, "One key aspect of the Kewaskum strategic plan is to enhance our students' educational experiences by creating opportunities with businesses and organizations in our community. We were able to strengthen the

connections that we made earlier this year by having local businesses see what is happening in our schools."

The fourteen visitors toured Kewaskum Elementary School, Kewaskum Middle School, and Kewaskum High School. They represented the Washington County Workforce Alliance and five manufacturers, including Serigraph Inc., Signicast Investment Castings, Triton Trailers LLC, Broan-NuTone LLC, and Mays-teel LLC.

Curriculum Director Mark Bazata said, "The tours were a great opportunity for local business to see how education has changed recently. Beyond the basics of just reading and math, we are asking students to problem

solve, think critically, work collaboratively, and communicate effectively."

The tours included three of the five Kewaskum schools. At Kewaskum Elementary School visitors heard from students how they were learning financial literacy skills through the Junior Achievement program and raising money for the local food pantry through creating, marketing, and selling pins and magnets in art class.

At Kewaskum Middle School and Kewaskum High School, the manufacturing representatives toured the technical education classrooms and saw a variety of courses including

Sette appointed to School Board

A detective with the Washington County Sheriff's Office has been appointed to the Kewaskum Board of Education to the term of Heather Oelhafen who resigned last month.

The Board interviewed and ultimately approved Mark Sette at their December 8 meeting. Board members James Leister and Craig Staffin voted against the appointment during a roll call vote requested by Leister.

During the interview, Leister asked Sette about a potential conflict of interest, given his wife is the administrative assistant to Superintendent of Schools Jim Smasal. Sette explained he initially shared that concern and asked Smasal and his direct superior, Sheriff Dale Schmidt who assured him that there isn't a problem with him being on the board.

Smasal stated later that similar to other board members that are currently seated on the board, there may be times where he will have to abstain from a vote. In Sette's case, these would be very minimal. Smasal alluded to other situations in the district saying currently Leister's daughter works for the buildings and grounds department for which he is the committee chairman. Previously Mary Miller's husband was a teacher in the district.

Sette has been active as a law enforcement professional in Washington County for more than 20 years. He will finish Oelhafen's term that expires in April of 2015.

Oelhafen submitted her resignation in mid-November after expressing interest in being a part of the governance board for the district's charter school that is forming.



Health officials recommending immediate vaccinations to protect loved ones

As families plan holiday events, public health officials are reminding residents that getting a flu shot is still the best way to protect everyone in the family - from infants to grandparents - against getting the flu (influenza) and potential complications.

The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) is urging immediate vaccination for anyone still unvaccinated this season, as well as prompt treatment with antiviral drugs for high-risk people who develop flu symptoms.

Flu symptoms can include fever, headache, dry cough, sore throat, nasal congestion, body aches, chills and fatigue.

"This is the time of year when families get together for holiday events. By getting a flu shot, you are protecting your loved ones as well as yourself," according to Joni Whitehouse, Interim Director of the Washington County Health Department. "It is especially critical for infants six months or younger not to be around unvaccinated people."

"People receiving the vaccine need about two weeks to receive their maximum protection from the vaccine, but any protections is better than none at all," Whitehouse said. If someone does get the flu after being vaccinated, it is more likely to be a milder case.

The CDC released a study last week showing that flu vaccination prevented an estimated 7.2 million influenza-associated illnesses and 90,000 flu hospitalizations in the United States during the 2013-14 flu season.

According to the CDC, people in the high risk category

include children younger than five years (especially those younger than two years), adults 65 and older, pregnant women and people with certain chronic health conditions such as asthma, diabetes and heart, lung or kidney disease.

Whitehouse also recommended taking precautions to ward off common "colds" that have some of the same symptoms as influenza. Those recommendations include frequent hand washing, covering coughs and sneezes, disposing of tissues, cleaning frequently-touched surfaces, not shar-

ing drinking cups and straws, getting plenty of rest, eating nutritious meals and avoiding cigarette smoke.

Flu is unpredictable and every season is different. Since December 1, the Washington County Health Department received seven reports of influenza-associated hospitalizations from different areas of the county, with patients ranging from 35 to 90 years of age. Last year no cases were reported by mid-December according to Whitehouse.

95th Birthday




On December 13, a 95th birthday celebration was held for Johanna Fischer (nee Gruber), shown at right, at the Legion Hall in Kewaskum.

June 2, 1989

While last Wednesday's rain was more than welcome, the storms which brought the rain were not. Luckily the destruction, which is estimated to run close to one million dollars throughout, was limited to property only. There were no injuries or loss of life in Washington County. Hardest hit in our area was a stretch which ran along Highway H, from northwest of Highway 41, through the Town of Wayne, southeast to Kewaskum. Nine barns and at least one machine shed were destroyed or suffered major damage alone, with lesser damage to homes and trees throughout the area. Although it was not officially listed as a tornado, those who experienced the fury Wednesday, said it was more than high winds. Barns on the farms of Tom Limberg, Highway H, Jerry Herman, Highway W, Robert Rauch, Sunset Drive, and Bill Butzlaff on Ledger Road, were among those leveled in the storm which went through about 11:40 pm. A silo on the Rauch farm was broken off like a snapped match stick, sending the rings flying into fields.

100 Years Ago

May 23, 1914

While returning home from this village last Saturday evening where he had been to meet his cousin who came on the 8:28 train, Charley Koepke had a very exciting experience with a team of colts which he was driving. An automobile, in trying to pass Mr. Koepke, frightened the horses who started to run and overturned the rig, throwing the occupants out. Mr. Koepke was picked up and taken home. A physician found he was only bruised and jarred up considerably. His companion in the rig was only slightly bruised.

This community was shocked to hear of the sudden and unexpected death of Elmer Strobel, 12, youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Strobel of St. Kilian, which occurred at the

office of Dr. Connell at Fond du Lac, at which place he had been taken for an operation on his nose. Death occurred after the operation was performed and was due to heart failure.

Henry Finke, a well known farmer living a short distance from Mayville was killed by lightning during a thunderstorm Monday. Mr. Finke had returned from Mayville and as he entered the barn with his horses, a bolt of lightning struck the building killing him instantly. For the third time in the last two years, last Thursday, burglars entered the general store of Knickel and Straub at Campbellsport by forcing the rear door of the place. They took \$1.50 in change from the register and also stole several hats. Owing to the rain the night before, the burglars' tracks could be easily seen. They were trailed for some distance before the tracks became indistinct. A laborer was arrested Friday on the charge of entering the general store.

The old Methodist church on the east side of this village is being torn down by owner Valentine Dreher. This edifice which was erected in 1864, was the second building built in this village.



The barn dance held in Joseph Ketter's new barn at New Prospect Saturday night was very largely attended. Joe Honeck furnished the music.


The Methodist Church in the Town of Barton was struck by lightning last Monday evening and was completely destroyed.

Campbellsport's Jordan Dreikosen almost single-handedly ruined Kewaskum's bid to stretch its win streak to three last Thursday night in a game played at Campbellsport.
