Steiner promoted to Lieutenant

A familiar face greeted the Kewaskum Village Board last Monday during their meeting as Kewaskum Police Chief Tom Bishop introduced the department's new lieutenant.

Mark Steiner, who has been with the department since 1994, received his new badge after a promotion that started January 1. The Kewaskum Village Board approved the new position early in 2014 at the urging of Trustee David Spenner who saw the need for succession planning in all village departments.

Bishop stated that adding the position was one of his goals after becoming chief, partly due to the situation that followed former Chief Richard Knoebel's retirement without a second in command during April of 2011. Steiner at that time was named officer-in-charge, however a long search and personnel matters

brought Knoebel back as interim chief in August of that year for a few months. They ultimately hired from within and Bishop was appointed Chief in February 2012.

"I'm confident Lieutenant Steiner will do a fantastic job. This is positive growth for our department and I believe the community will receive a higher level of service," Bishop said.

Steiner's schedule will not change much according to Bishop who said Steiner will still cover patrol at least two days a week and then will handle other administrative duties to assist the Chief of Police during the other days of his rotation.

Steiner will no longer be a member of the police union due to being an administrator in the department. He will receive a salary of \$63,300. Being an administrative employee, he is not eligible for overtime pay.

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K.A.A. the driving force behind park activities

It's not an accident the sports programs at Kewaskum Kiwanis Park are successful and facilities continually updated.

Behind that success is a network of enthusiastic volunteers, who are willing to contribute time and efforts to make certain the five youth programs and adult softball and volleyball programs run smoothly. These are the members of the Kewaskum Athletic Association (K.A.A.).

Even now, four months before the first pitch is thrown in the park, K.A.A. members are busy planning to make 2015 bigger and better than 2014 when 452 youth were involved in programs, along with the members of the 23 adult teams in slow-pitch and volleyball.

A meeting was held January 5 at the Kewaskum Municipal Building Annex in order to start working on plans for the coming year and continue working on some physical improvements in the park.

"We had a decent turnout," Nathan Scheel, the current treasurer of K.A.A., said last week, noting the organization is excited about a couple new programs that will be added this year, including coed youth slow pitch softball leagues for boys and girls 9-12 years of age.

Scheel said while the boys hardball and girls' fast-pitch leagues are popular and successful, there are still others who would like to get involved in slow-pitch.

"We've already heard from people whose kids don't participate (in hardball or fast-pitch), and plan on doing it," Scheel said, reporting, "This is going to be a Kewaskum thing," meaning there will be no traveling involved.

"My goal would be to get 50 kids," he went on, indicating there could be four of five

teams that will play a round robin format against each other.

This league could push the total number of summer participants to over 500. A year ago there were 74 youth in T-ball, 46 in Rubberball, five Midget baseball teams, three Little League teams, three Pony teams, along with one Rookie Fast-pitch team, two Minors teams and one Major team in girls' fast-pitch.

Add to those programs, flag football, which drew 81, the 16 men's softball and seven coed volleyball teams.

When it comes to improvements for '15, Scheel explained the baseball diamond to the west of the concession stand is going to have its infield raised so it will be even with first and third bases and home plate. Currently, three of the bases are 18 inches lower than second base, and by raising the infield, there will be less runoff of the materials in the infield.

Another project was started last fall on the newer diamond. "We had a drainage problem ... We've finished that," Scheel said, indicating top soil was brought in, and the area around the backstop was re-seeded. "We were fortunate enough to be able to use the impact fees for the work," he said.

Future plans call for the construction of dugouts for both diamonds, batting cages, some new fencing, planting shrubs and trees near the new field and installing a new rollup door for the concession stand.

"We're utilizing the park from May to near Halloween in October. There's constantly something going on there," Scheel said. "If we could have a third field, that would be awesome."

K.A.A. is constantly looking for umpires, both beginning and experienced. Anyone interested can contact Scheel, other board members or write to kewaskumathletics@gmail.com

for information.

In addition to Scheel, Chad Cook is the current vice president and Michele Ellefson secretary of K.A.A. Chairpersons for the various leagues for 2015 include: Pony League — Scott Donath; Little League — Keith Herman; Midget League — Kevin Stautz; Majors — Brad Preder; Minors — Matt Schlosser; Rookies — Brian Leitheiser; T-Ball — Jason Buslaff; Rubberball — Kevin Parish and Andy Rettler; Youth Coed softball — Ellefson and Scheel; Youth Volleyball — Bonnie Herman; Men's Softball and Co-ed Volleyball — Scheel; Flag Football — Cook; Umpires — Traci Lawrenz; Concession Stand — Carmen Fox; Field Maintenance — Scheel; Apparel/Uniforms — Pam May; Tournament — Jason Fox; Website chairperson — Mary Lynn Ellis; Raffle Fundraising — Lawrenz and Keith Herman.

Currently there is no one to replace outgoing President Keith Herman, who did not seek re-election.

"Hopefully someone that is on the board or part of the association will step up," Scheel said, indicating the president's duties included running the monthly K.A.A. meetings, work with the secretary to develop agendas, and overseeing all association activities.

Registration for this year's activities will take place on Thursday, Jan. 29 from 6:00-8:30 p.m. and Monday, Feb. 2 from 6:30-8:30 p.m. at the Annex Building. Please watch the KAA web-site, www.kewaskumathletics.com, for registration forms.

The KAA meets the first Monday of the month at 7:00 at the Annex Building in Kewaskum through May and then the schedule changes to the first Sunday of the month starting in June. The meetings are held at the Kiwanis Park in the summer. All meetings are open to the public.

The Ozaukee County office is open Monday through Friday between 8:30 a.m. and 5 p.m. and is located at 121 W. Main

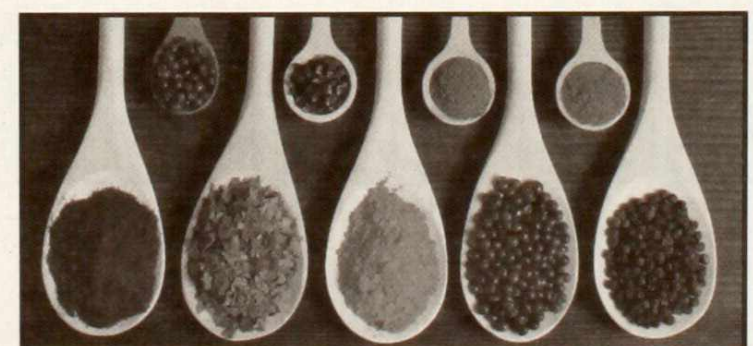
St, Room #246, Port Washington, 53074.

If you wish to have a kit mailed to you, send the health department a check for \$4 with your name and address and a kit will be mailed to your home.

Chief's Corner

The week of January 12 through January 16 is Wisconsin's Adult Crossing Guard Recognition week, and there isn't a better month to recognize these individuals for the dedication and commitment they show our community. Wisconsin's winters are unforgiving, yet our crossing guards still come to work in the mornings and afternoons to ensure our children's safe passage to school.

Many people may not realize that our crossing guards are overseen by the police department and are an essential extension of our department. The Kewaskum Police Department employs five crossing guards that work at three locations in the Village — Hwy H at Fond du Lac Avenue, Fond du Lac Avenue and Main Street, and Fond du Lac Avenue and Second Street. The guards perform two crossings every morning and afternoon during the school year when school is in session. They openly communicate with our officers on traffic violations that occur while they are on duty to have enforcement action taken. I would like to remind drivers that laws require them to not only stop as children cross, but to remain stopped until the guard has returned to the curb.

Last week I filled in for the morning crossing at one of our locations. The temperature, without wind chill, was -12 degrees; arctic conditions would be an understatement. Luckily, I

didn't cross any children that morning. My fear was there would still be children forced to walk to school in those conditions. However, regardless of the weather conditions when school is in session our crossing guards need to be in their assigned locations in the event a child does walk to school. Our officers have filled in for crossing guard duty many times over the last few years, but standing in such frigid conditions allowed me to appreciate our guards even more than I already had before.

Our crossing guards quietly come and go every day during the school year to little fanfare. 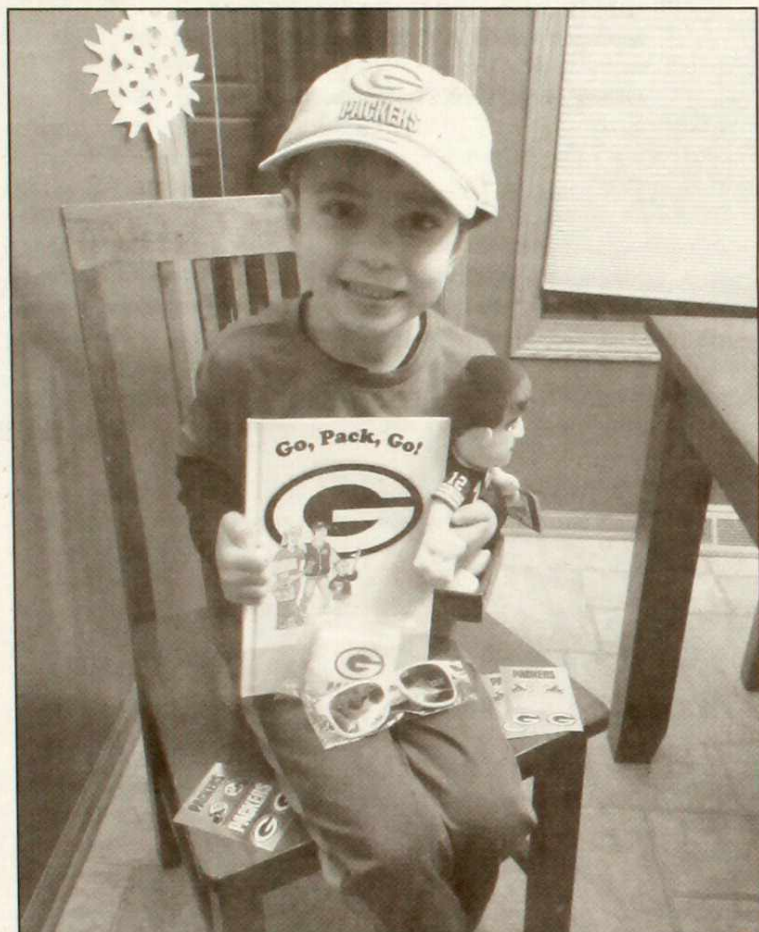

The Bonlenders annual family Christmas was held the Saturday before Christmas, and part of the tradition for the 10 grandchildren — one isn't old enough to participate yet — is to spend time coloring together.

She ended the letter with information about the family Christmas and how Mason wanted to give his coloring to the Packers.

That was it ... no request for an autograph or any kind of gift, Sandy said.

Obviously someone in the Packers' office read the letter and was moved to respond, because there was a big box on the Braatz's porch on January 8.

"I didn't think I had ordered anything," Sarah Braatz, Mason's mother recalled when she first saw the package. When she got closer, she saw the green and gold tape on the package and thought, "I wonder if it's for Mason" and it was. "He was super excited," she said.

Mason, who was glued to the TV set Sunday for the Packer-Cowboy game, received a greeting and gifts. "I got an Aaron Rodgers' doll, a book called Go Pack Go ... I have Packer sunglasses, a Packer hat, a sweatband," he said. There was also an Aaron Rodgers card, and, "He signed the card in pen," Mason said.

And how did Mason assess the Packers' performance Sunday in their win over Dallas? Mason said, "Eddie Lacy was a beast" running the football, and about Rodgers and his injured calf, commented, "(He did) pretty good. He did much better on his leg."

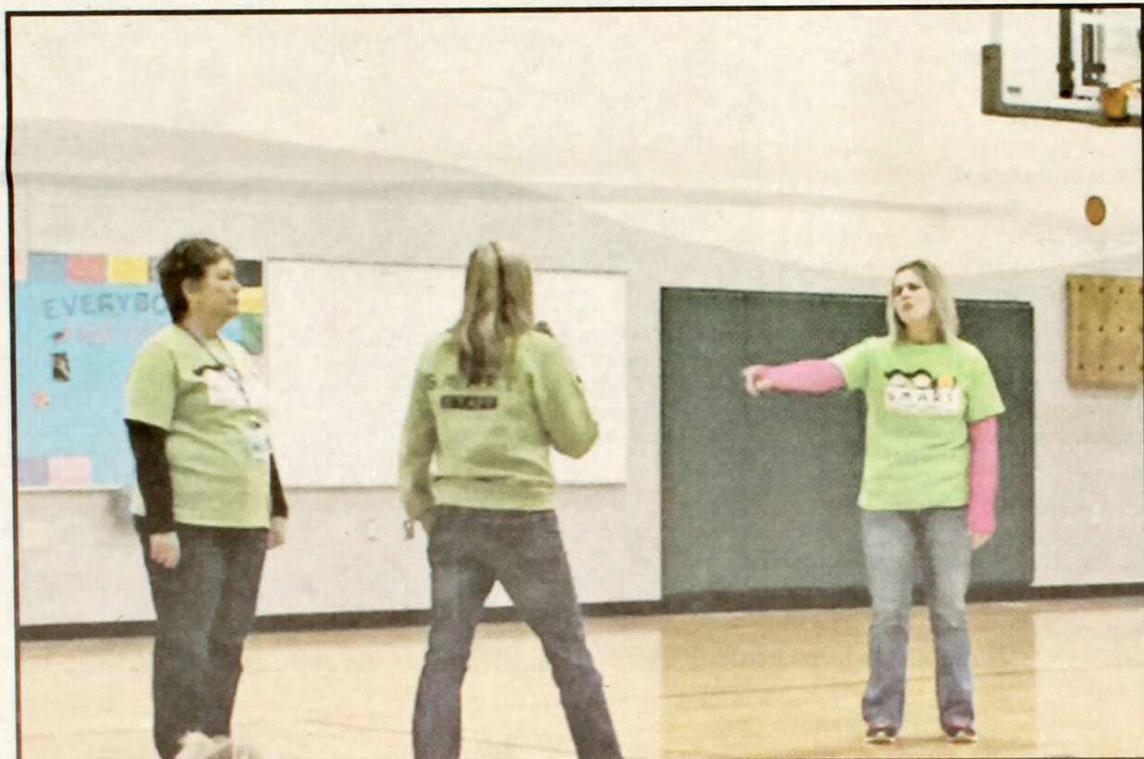

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Indian wrestlers come up with a strong finish

By winning their final two matches over Marquette University High School (51-18) and Milwaukee Hamilton (51-15), the Kewaskum High wrestlers placed fifth at the annual Travis Wichlacz Tournament hosted by the two West Bend High Schools on January 10.

The Indians, already without their 285-pounder, Garrett Buth (who dislocated his elbow at the On the Water Tournament in Oshkosh), lost another starter in the first match of pool competition. A 52-24 defeat to Germantown. This was followed by a 55-18 loss to Waterford, the eventual runner-up, and a 45-34 loss to West Bend East. Two other KHS wrestlers were at a Show Choir competition and missed the meet.

One of Saturday's highlights was the 5-0 performance of 195-pound junior Ben Watzig, who boosted his season record to 15-6 after a

1-3 start on the season in the rugged Gunslinger Meet at Slinger.

Watzig pinned Devin Hart of Germantown in 3:13 and followed that up with a quick pin in 1:26 over Ben Michalski of Waterford. From then on, Watzig turned into a cheerleader for the rest of his teammates as West, Marquette and Hamilton did not have athletes at his weight.

"Really good," was how KHS coach Scott Rhoads summed up Watzig's performances in the two matches he did get to wrestle. "Ben's really focused right now ... He's learning a lot."

"A lot of the teams we wrestled didn't have a lot of big guys. West Bend East didn't have anyone over 160," Rhoads said.

Three other Indians finished with four wins, including 113-pound Jacob Heberer, Eric Doll at 185 and newcomer Mike Bryngelson at 220.

Heberer (13-7), a sopho-

more, came up with three pins and a decision, and the pins were pretty impressive. Heberer needed just 21 seconds to put Ben Spano's (of Marquette) shoulders to the mat, and he barely worked up a sweat vs. Demetrius Nelson of Hamilton, winning in :28. His only loss came via a first-period pin to Waterford's Miles Preifer.

Doll (13-7) continues to improve as a wrestler, and Saturday's effort included a win by major decision, a decision, and two forfeits. His only loss came in the match vs. Waterford.

Bryngelson (4-1) was pinned in his opening match, then came back with a pair of forfeits, followed by pins over opponents from Marquette and Hamilton.

All those who won five or four of their matches were awarded medals.

Senior Max Hardy (3-3) returned to action after suffering a rib injury several weeks

ago, and he finished 3-2 on the day with two pins and a decision. Hardy still didn't look 100 percent, "He's still holding his ribs a lot ... the same injury," Rhoads said, indicating some days he goes through a practice with no problem, but at other times, he has pain in the area.

Buth came to the meet with his arm in a sling, but there has been some optimistic news on his situation. "He actually had an appointment yesterday. He (the doctor) said three to four weeks. We're crossing our fingers. That would take us right up to the regional," Rhoads said.

Kewaskum lost junior Zach Heberer (7-7) for the day when he sustained an injury in the Germantown match. "He just landed right on his head," Rhoads said, reporting Heberer's opponent had his

arm trapped and he had no way to block his fall.

The other KHS wrestlers finished as follows: Adam Bruss, 2-3 at 106 with two pins; Travis Trudeau at 120, 2-3 with a pin and a decision; Cole Rahlf at 132, 2-3 with two pins; Jake Keller at 152, 1-4, with one pin; Dan Seitz at 160, 2-3 with two forfeits; Faton Elmazi, 0-1; and Dalton Espitia at 220, 3-1 with three forfeits.

West Bend won the meet, going 5-0, including a 43-39 victory over Waterford in the finals.

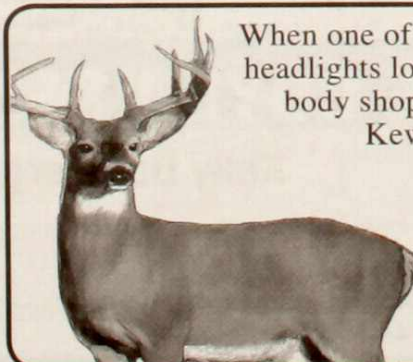

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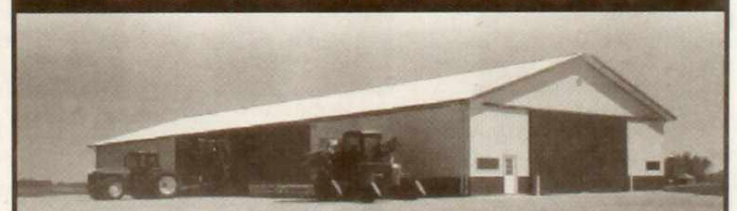

Indians are close but don't come up with the 'Ws'

A key basket in the fourth quarter last Friday night, and perhaps the outcome would have been different for the Kewaskum High boys basketball team, which suffered its second disappointing loss in three days, this one a 51-43 defeat to visiting New Holstein (4-2), which is currently in third place in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference.

"We couldn't hit a big basket in the last three minutes," KHS coach Keith Traska said, adding, "It's tough to win games when you have three starters on the bench."

With the loss, Kewaskum fell to 1-5 in EWC play.

Twice the Indians were within four points, and with 1:34 remaining, the deficit was just three points, 42-39, after Jason Hanson's put-back bas-

ket.

Each time the Huskies responded with one or two free throws, which were their saving grace in the fourth eight minutes when they made just one basket, a layup after a steal by Devin Strupp for the first points of the quarter.

New Holstein converted on 11 of 18 tries from the charity stripe as Traska was joined on the bench by three of his starters, Charlie Witek, Brady Hanson and Josh Baker, who all fouled out in the final minutes.

Witek had scored 13 points in the first half, to keep the Indians in the game, while New Holstein's ace, 6-foot, 3-inch forward Josh Burg, did even better, tallying 16 of his 22 points.

Witek cooled off a bit after the break, but the sophomore Brady Hanson came alive in

the third quarter, giving the Indians a boost with his six of his 10 points, so Kewaskum was able to stay close. Also helping was an effective 2-3 zone defense that held Burg to six points.

Traska felt pretty good about his team's chances as the fourth quarter began with the score at 37-33, but after Strupp's basket, the Huskies were content to slow the game down and run some clock. When the Indians did get the ball, they had difficulty making shots — they went 4x11 the final eight minutes — and could not tie or take the lead.

New Holstein connected on six of eight free throws the final minute to secure the victory.

While the two losses were disappointing, Traska is encouraged the Indians are gaining on the league-leading

teams. We've lost the last three games by 11 points, and we've had eight foul out," Traska said. "We're right there with the leaders ... we have to find a way to get over the hump."
