

KHS wrestlers turn back Huskies

Each team had seven victories, but by forfeit Kewaskum edged host New Holsteins by a single point in Friday's Eastern Wisconsin Conference dual meet, 36-35.

"It was a good one," KHS coach Scott Rhoads said about the victory, which puts the Indians' EWC record at 2-2. "In all honesty, I'm not sure what to expect with the shortage of wrestlers on the varsity right now."

Rhoads had to do a little line-up shuffling for the Indians to erase a 20-9 deficit and come away with a win. The Indians came into the meet minus their regular 285 Garrett Buth, starting 126 Zach Heberer, and senior 145 Max Hardy, who is still slowed by a rib injury he suffered early in the season. Then, "Adam Bruss didn't make weight. We didn't plan on that," the coach said.

Rhoads moved Bruss up to 113 (5-8), and he won by decision, and Jacob Heberer (14-7) and Travis Trudeau (8-11), who normally wrestle at 113 and 120, both posted pins at 120 and 126, respectively.

By winning a 9-4 decision over Jacob Kaiser at 195, Ben Watzig ran his EWC record to 4-0 (and is 16-6) for the year. Eric Doll (13-8) was going for EWC win No. 4, but ran into a buzz saw in Husky Jordan Wagner, who



The Kewaskum Public Library will be holding their annual magazine sale at the library on Friday, January 30.



In the past, the Kewaskum Public Library has been happy to provide you with paper tax forms for state and federal income taxes. Over the last 5 years, however, both the state and federal governments have been trying to move all tax forms onto the internet and cut the cost of printing (and shredding) millions of pages of paper documents. This year, unfortunately, the only federal tax forms we will be able to provide are the basic 1040, 1040A, and 1040EZ forms. No schedules. No instructions. No supplementary forms. Only those three forms. Everything else is available online at no cost to you from your home computer. If you do not want to print the forms, you are able to file electronically.

We understand that not

everyone has access to a computer or wants to file electronically. Our staff is available during open hours to find forms and instructions for you online and print them here for .10 per page. We have been moving toward this moment for many years and federal budget cuts have nudged us this much further toward paperless filing. PLEASE stop in and talk to a staff member if you need forms or instructions. We are happy to help.

State tax forms and instructions will be available in February, in limited quantities.

AARP offers free tax assistance

Free tax assistance is being offered by trained AARP volunteers. Interested parties should bring along required photo identification, documentation showing Social Security number, last year's form, all 1099 forms from banks, Social Security, or annuities; W-2 forms from any employers, monthly Social Security amount, and original rent certificate or copy of property tax bill.

For those not on Medicare, must have employer sponsored or ACA form (Affordable Care Act). The ACA form can be obtained from the Marketplace and shows how much was paid and what the credit was.

If you would like direct deposit, bring a check with your account number and routing number. Forms can be obtained at local libraries or post office, etc. Contact these locations ahead to confirm availability. If you have questions, please call the Aging & Disability Resource Center of Washington County at (262) 335-4497.


Kiwanis Students of the Month



Over 100,000 permits issued for spring turkey hunt

The 2015 spring turkey permit drawing has ended, and 134,257 successful applicants will receive spring wild turkey permits.

A total of 237,768 permits have been made available for the spring 2015 turkey season - remaining permits will be available through over-the-counter sales beginning March 23.

Postcard notifications have been sent to successful applicants, and should arrive within the next few weeks. Hunters can check permit application status online through the Department of Natural Resource's Online Licensing Center, or by calling the DNR Customer Call Center from 7 a.m. through 10 p.m., seven days a week, at 1-888-WDNRINFo (1-888-936-7463).

The 103,516 remaining permits for the 2015 spring turkey hunting season will be sold on a first-come, first-served basis starting Monday, March 23 at 10 a.m. Leftover permits will be first issued for sale by zone, one zone per day - each zone will have a designated sales date.

Hunters are encouraged to use the turkey zone map and turkey permit availability pages to see if permits are available for the period and zone in

which they wish to hunt.

The following zones have leftover permits, and scheduled sales dates are as follows:

Zone 1 - Monday, March 23;

Zone 2 - Tuesday, March 24;

Zone 3 - Wednesday, March 25;

Zone 4 - Thursday, March 26;


Zones 5, 6 and 7 - Friday, March 27.

After zone-only sales, all remaining turkey tags will be available for purchase Saturday, March 28. Extra tags may be purchased at a rate of one per day until the zone and time period sells out or the season ends.

The fee for leftover turkey

permits is \$10 for residents and \$15 for non-residents, and each will have equal opportunity to purchase over-the-counter permits. All hunters will be required to purchase a spring turkey license and 2015 Wild Turkey Stamp, unless they have previously purchased the license and stamp or a 2015 Conservation Patron License. Purchasing permits will not affect preference point status for future spring or fall turkey permit drawings.



By finding the open man and being more balanced paid big dividends, according to Traska, who said he had talked with his starters about other players stepping up to help leading scorer, Charlie Witek, so, "They (Falcons) couldn't focus on stopping one guy."

Taking the message to heart were juniors Michael Prochnow and Josh Baker, who scored 14 and nine points, respectively,

right behind Witek's 16.

Prochnow, scoreless vs. Winneconne, also chipped in with five rebounds, giving the Indians 38 for the night.

"Mike Prochnow was the one who hit a couple of free throws in the last minute and a half," Traska said, indicating the Indians were able to hold on to their lead down the stretch, something they have had difficulty doing in a couple other games. "If was definitely close the whole game. There was never a time when we felt comfortable."

About Baker, Traska said, "He had three, threes. That was real big for us!" and he also contributed four assists and four rebounds.

Sophomore Brady Hanson also had a good game with his team-high 13 rebounds and seven points.

"The other player who made a huge contribution was Devyn Zillmer, one of the smallest guys on our team. He had

nine rebounds, and I believe four of them were offensive rebounds," Traska said. "He gave us that big boost when we needed it."

Zillmer scored just four points, but that doesn't bother Traska, who said, "He's adapted to his role, and that's a large factor for our team."

"Charlie (Witek) also had four assists," Traska went on, pointing out how the 6-3 forward did what he had to so the team could win.

This was the second straight game when 6-7 Jason Hanson did not play. Traska said one of the games Hanson was sick, and the other was "a coach's decision."

With the win, the Indians improved to 2-5 in Eastern Wisconsin Conference action and 4-6 overall.


