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## Local teacher hits the jackpot, wins Super Bowl package

Kewaskum High boys basketball coach Keith Traska was on an emotional roller coaster ride last Tuesday. It was disappointing watching his Indians come close to second-place Plymouth for the second time this season, but again they came up just short, this time in overtime.

As for the high, sometime during the day, Traska received an e-mail from officials at Papa Johns Pizza, concerning a Super Bowl package, and while he was skeptical at first, it turned out the news was legitimate.

"I won an all-expense paid trip from Papa John's Pizza to the Super Bowl," Traska, who lives in West Bend and teaches math at Kewaskum High School, said Monday as his players were wrapping up practice.

Traska questioned the e-mail because he didn't think he had entered any Super Bowl contests, but he had purchased some Papa John's pizzas

recently after ordering online, and when he did, his name was automatically entered in the contest.

"We get pizzas there a couple times a month," Traska said. "I really like Papa Johns Pizza."

Traska was one of only two winners nation-wide, and since finding out he was a winner, he has been making plans for the trip to see the defending champion Seattle Seahawks battle the New England Patriots in Super Bowl XLIX.

Luckily, the Indians are scheduled to play on Thursday rather than Friday this week, so he will be able to coach his team Thursday night, teach on Friday, then fly to Phoenix on Friday evening. He will fly back from Arizona on Monday and be back on the job Tuesday morning.

As for a babysitter for the Traska children, he said it just so happened his mother was flying to Wisconsin this coming Monday for a visit, and now she is coming a few days early to

help out.

Concerning who he would take along — the trip includes tickets, accommodations, meals and air fare for two — the choice was simple. "My wife (Kay)," Traska said. The two will be sitting in Section 403. "I already have the tickets in hand," he said.

And who will Traska, an avid Green Bay Packer fan, think will win the game? "If I was a betting man, I'd say the Patriots, but I'll be cheering for the Seahawks, only because I like Russell Wilson ... the Wisconsin connection. I think somehow the Patriots are going to pull it out, but I really want the Seahawks to win."

"It's definitely going to be a real neat experience," Traska went on, looking at the fact he and his wife get to escape Wisconsin's frigid weather in favor of warm and sunny Phoenix, and they get to enjoy the Super Bowl atmosphere, featuring the game and the halftime show featuring Katy Perry.

## New leader will emerge after election in Kewaskum

Candidates have filed their papers in local elections and await election day, Tuesday, April 7. The Kewaskum political landscape will have two new faces in leadership positions as Village President Andy Pesch and Town Chairman Daniel Schmidt will not run for re-election.

Pesch, who has served on the board as a trustee and president for well over a decade, filed for non-candidacy.

Taking Pesch's seat as president will be Trustee Kevin Scheunemann who ran unsuccessfully against Pesch two years ago. Scheunemann's trustee seat will be vacant.

Trustees James Hovland and David Spenner will run for re-election. This will be Hovland's third term. This will be the first time Spenner will face village voters. He was appointed to the board in January of 2014.

Village resident James Wright will challenge the pair of incumbents with a write-in campaign.


In the town of Kewaskum, all local officials are up for re-election. All town officials serve a two-year term.

Supervisor Scott Wollner has stepped up to run for Town Chairman after Schmidt filed for non-candidacy. Wollner will run unopposed.

Supervisor Mike Otten will run for a second term. Mark Herges, who will run for Wollner's seat, will join him.




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## Conservation Stewardship Program Sign-Up Announced

The USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) is accepting new applications for the Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP). Farm and forest landowners may apply by February 27 for possible 2015 funding. CSP encourages agricultural producers to maintain existing conservation activities and adopt additional ones on their operations.

Applications can be made at any time at all USDA Service Centers, but only applications received by February 27 will be ranked for funding in 2015. The program is open to all farmers, regardless of size or type of operation.

In 2014, 450 Wisconsin farmers and forestland owners enrolled in CSP, with an average payment of \$6,900 per

contract. Over \$3.2 million in payments will be made to those farm families this year, and over \$16 million over the course of the five-year contract.

"For many farmers, CSP offers reward and recognition for the conservation they are already doing, plus a little extra incentive to try a few more or new practices," according to Kathy Eggers, District Conservationist, for Washington and Ozaukee counties. Kathy encourages interested farmers to apply now to be considered for funding.

Eligible lands include cropland, pastureland, non-industrial private forestland, and tribal agricultural lands.

For the 2014 sign up, average payments in Wisconsin

were \$21 per acre for cropland, \$14 per acre for pasture, and \$4 per acre for woodland. Payments are made annually for each of the five years of the contract. CSP is open to small and large operations, with farms already enrolled ranging from just a couple of acres to over 4,000 acres of cropland.

Farmers will need to document their current and proposed conservation practices which will be used to rank applications and determine payments. NRCS field staff will also conduct on-site field verifications of applicants' information.

## Showing of 'God's Not Dead' February 8

How far would you go...to defend your belief in God? At some point every believer will have to take a stand for their faith, answer questions from a skeptic or stand up for what they know is right.

"God's Not Dead" follows college freshman Josh Wheaton into an unexpected test of his faith and a challenging journey to defend it. His quest—and the stories of the lives interwoven—deals with themes of belief, courage, purpose, pain, hope, worldview and faith in action.

Wheaton (Shane Harper) finds his faith challenged on his first day of Philosophy class by the infamous and dictatorial Professor Radisson (Kevin Sorbo). Radisson begins class by informing students that they must disavow the existence of God, in writing, or face a failing grade. As other students begin scribbling "God is dead," Josh faces a crossroads of having to choose between his faith and his future.

Josh offers a nervous refusal, and Radisson smugly

strikes a bargain and assigns him a daunting task. If Josh will not admit that "God is dead," he must prove God's existence by engaging Radisson in a head-to-head debate in front of the class. If Josh fails to convince his classmates of God's existence, he will fail the course and hinder his lofty academic goals. With almost no one in his corner, Josh wonders if he can really fight for what he believes. Can he actually prove the existence of God?

"God's Not Dead" weaves together multiple stories of faith, doubt and disbelief. Mark (Dean Cain) is self absorbed. He doesn't care when he learns his girlfriend has cancer and he ignores his elderly mother who has dementia and is in a nursing home. Willie and Korie Robertson from Duck Dynasty appear as themselves. They answer questions about including prayer to Jesus in their show.

The box office hit "God's Not Dead" will be shown at Campbellsport Alliance Church on Sunday, Febru-





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

### Sweet and Salty Popcorn Party Mix

Yield: 14 cups

- 10 cups popped popcorn
- 2 cups miniature pretzel twists (or another small pretzel shape)
- 1 cup pecans
- 1 cup peanuts
- 2 cups rice, wheat or corn cereal squares
- 1/2 cup butter (1 stick)
- 1/2 cup packed brown sugar
- 1/4 cup corn syrup
- 1/2 teaspoon baking soda

Preheat oven to 300°F. Place popcorn, pretzels, pecans, peanuts and cereal in very large bowl; set aside.

Heat butter, brown sugar and corn syrup in medium saucepan. Stir mixture over medium heat until it begins to boil. Boil 3 minutes without stirring. Remove from heat and stir in baking soda (mixture will foam).

Pour syrup over popcorn mixture in bowl and stir until evenly coated. Pour mixture onto large, rimmed baking sheet or roasting pan. Bake 30 minutes, stirring twice during baking time. Stir mixture a few times as it cools on baking sheet. Store in airtight container.

### Asian Popcorn Medley

Yield: 8 cups

- 6 cups popped popcorn
- 2 cups Oriental rice cracker mix
- 3 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 1 tablespoon soy sauce
- 1/2–1 teaspoon ground ginger (may vary to taste)
- 1/4–1/2 teaspoon sesame oil (may vary to taste)


Preheat oven to 300°F. Mix popcorn and rice cracker mix together in large bowl.

In small microwave-safe bowl, microwave butter on high until melted, about 20 seconds. Stir in soy sauce, ginger and oil. Drizzle over popcorn mixture; toss.







### Cinnamon Chocolate Popcorn

Yield: 3 quarts

- 3 quarts popped popcorn
- Butter-flavored cooking spray
- 9 tablespoons powdered cocoa mix (cocoa sweetened with sugar or sugar substitute)
- 3 teaspoons cinnamon

Put popcorn in large bowl and lightly spray with cooking spray.

Sprinkle cocoa mix and cinnamon on popcorn. Toss to coat evenly.

Spray and toss again until mixture is well coated. Serve immediately.

### Blazing Buffalo Ranch Popcorn

Yield: 6 quarts, plus leftover seasoning mix

- 1 tablespoon ranch dressing or dip mix (from 1-ounce package)
- 1 tablespoon seafood spice mix (or celery salt)
- 1 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1 teaspoon powdered sugar (or sugar)
- 1/8 teaspoon cayenne pepper
- 1/4 teaspoon vegetable oil
- 6 quarts popped popcorn
- Cooking spray, optional

In small bowl, blend ranch dressing mix, spice mix, garlic powder, powdered sugar and cayenne pepper. Sprinkle with vegetable oil and blend until well incorporated.

Place popcorn in serving bowl and spray lightly with cooking spray. Sprinkle seasoning mix over popcorn to taste and toss. Store leftover seasoning mix in airtight container for future use.

### Coconut-Ginger Popcorn Truffles

Yield: 3 dozen truffles

- 5 cups air-popped popcorn
- 2 cups miniature marshmallows
- 1 tablespoon coconut oil or butter
- 1/2 cup shredded coconut
- 3 tablespoons candied ginger, minced
- Cooking spray
- 4 ounces semi-sweet chocolate
- 1 teaspoon coconut oil or butter

Place popcorn in large bowl.

Place marshmallows and 1 tablespoon coconut oil or butter in medium saucepan over medium-low heat. Stir until melted; remove from heat.

Stir in shredded coconut and candied ginger. Mix well.

Spray hands with cooking spray, then scoop up 1 tablespoon of popcorn mixture.

Roll mixture with hands to form ball. Place ball on baking sheet lined with parchment paper or foil. Repeat to make 36 balls.

Place chocolate in small, microwave safe bowl. Heat in microwave on high for one minute, until melted. If not completely melted, microwave for another 15 seconds and stir again.

Stir 1 teaspoon coconut oil into melted chocolate.

Place chocolate in zipper-style plastic bag and seal. Snip off tiny corner of bag.

Pipe chocolate on popcorn balls in decorative pattern.

Garnish with extra shredded coconut and extra minced candied ginger, if desired.

Place truffles in cool place until chocolate is set.

## Indians hit a road block

## Current season is providing Hendricks with great memories

If you see Stacy Hendricks any time soon at King Pin Lanes in Campbellsport, you'll probably notice an extra spring in her step. Excuse the pun, but Hendricks is on a roll!

Currently, Hendricks, who grew up in Kewaskum, is sporting an average just over 200, and there is the 300 game, her first ever, and one of only a handful by a woman in King Pin's history, that came in late November.

The memory of the 300 is still very vivid and it certainly was not expected, according to the 30-year-old Hendricks, who started bowling at the age of seven or eight.

On Friday nights, Hendricks bowls in the men's league at King Pin. "They let a few women in it," she said of the league, which is fairly competitive. That particular night Hendricks said, "I wasn't feeling the greatest. I started a sore throat the night before," and she wasn't very sharp during the warmup period. All that quickly turned around as she started to throw strikes in her first game, and the strikes just kept coming.

"I started thinking about it (300) about the fifth frame," Hendricks said. "I felt kinda' good ... thought just keep it going."

Two close calls came early when Hendricks said she crossed over and threw a couple "Brooklyn's." After that, the intensity started building, and Hendricks started the support of her fellow bowlers, who were excited they might be witnessing a historic event.

"I was incredibly nervous," Hendricks said. "Before the last ball, my legs were shaking" to the point she wondered if she could remain standing.

Staying with her same pre-roll routine, Hendricks took a deep breath and let the final ball go. Ten pins flew, and Hendricks said, "I threw my arms up in air, and everyone started cheering. The whole bowling alley had pretty much stopped in the 10th frame."

Cary Serwe, proprietor of KP, told Hendricks she is just the third woman ever to bowl a perfect game there.

Hendricks had difficulty staying focused for Games 2 and 3 but still wound up with a 685 series, seven pins lower than her 692, which stands as the top series by a woman at KP this season. Since that night, however, Hendricks has improved her season average by 10 pins. "At that point, I was averaging 190. Right now my average is 200," she said.

Hendricks credits her parents, Chuck and Diane Muckerheide, with encouraging her to get involved in the sport, and good coaching from King Pin Lanes for helping her improve. "They have a good youth program," she said. For bowling a 300, she received a 300 Club jacket from King Pin Lanes and will be getting a ring from the United States Bowling Congress.

Hendricks, whose husband Jim is also a bowler, works at Dairyland Seed in Kewaskum in marketing. She graduated from Kewaskum High School and is happy to see how bowling has developed as a sport at the high school level.

## Short on regulars; short on points

The injury bug continues to plague the Kewaskum High wrestling team. Last Thursday, with four regulars watching from the bench, the Indians dropped a 46-24 decision to Oostburg in non-conference action.

It was Senior Night for Kewaskum, but only one of the three seniors honored, Jake Keller, was able to wrestle. Keller had an impressive outing, pinning Connor Gasbarro in just 1:22.

"He's on fire right now," KHS coach Scott Rhoads said about Keller (who also won his match vs. Plymouth earlier in the week). "He's starting to see the end of his senior year and really cranking it up ... looking real tough." Keller's record is currently 6-15.

One of the other seniors, 285-pound Garrett Buth, is still nursing a dislocated shoulder, and Rhoads said it looks now like he might be out for the season.

There was good news on Max Hardy, however. "Max will be back next week," Rhoads said, and that will help because the Indians have been forfeiting at his weight, 145.

In addition to Keller, other KHS wrestlers posting pins were Ben Watzig at 195 Cole Rahlf at 132. Watzig took a quick 5-0 lead — he had a takedown in 20 seconds — and pinned his opponent, Joe Meyer, in 3:19. With the win, Watzig improved to 18-6, the best record on the

team.

Rahlf (10-8) is turning into a "Spladle" specialist. Once again, he used this move for his pin, a 34-second effort vs. Cody Horswal. "Good for him," Rhoads said, indicating Horswal "looked pretty strong."

Rhoads was also pleased with freshman Adam Bruss (7-8), a 7-5 winner over Chase Lombardi. "I was real impressed with Adam Bruss. He's looking good."

Sophomore Jacob Heberer (15-7) missed the meet with a "tailbone injury," according to Rhoads who said another KHS student, not involved in athletics, kneed him in the back. "He (Heberer) made the decision to sit out tonight because we have some big conference matches coming up next week," Rhoads said.

Two Rivers girls basketball teams have dominated Kewaskum in the 35-year history of the Eastern Wisconsin Conference, but this year's Lady Indians can now enjoy the satisfaction of knowing they beat the Raiders in their final regular-season meeting.

Behind a stifling defense, balanced scoring and clutch free throw shooting, Kewaskum turned back the Raiders, 35-24, last Friday night. This was Kewaskum's ninth ever victory over Two Rivers, which earned 62 wins over the Indians since the conference was formed in 1980. Kewaskum moves to the Eastern Central Conference while Two Rivers will go with another group.

"It's a big win for us!" an excited coach Russ Thull said a few minutes after the game ended. "They just knocked off Waupun and Kiel. They're one of the best teams in the conference."

About the defense, Thull said, "It was just a great defensive effort," singling out 5-foot 6 inch sophomore Hailey Herriges for her play on

Alexi Welsh. "Hailey just shut down No. 20 (Welsh). She had scored 20 points against us in our first game. Hailey held her to 14, (tonight) and she had to work hard for every one of those points."

"Maddie (Kreis), Marisa (Stahl) and Erin (Matusinec) helped us out offensively," Thull went on, with Stahl hitting a team-high nine, and the other two chipping in with eight apiece. "Erin had eight big points in the post. That's her high."

Herriges also helped out with her seven points.

The Indians scored 11 points the first quarter to lead by four, then outscored the visitors 12-9 the next two quarters for a 23-16 advantage with eight minutes to play. Now the question remained, could they stay in the lead or fall victim to the Raiders' full-court pressure?

A big rebound and put-back basket by Erin Matusinec gave KHS a 28-20 lead with 3:04 to play, and then 30 seconds later, she muscled in for an offensive rebound after Makayla Dogs missed the front end of a bonus and swished an eight-footer to put

the Indians ahead 32-21.

Kreis hit both of her free throws with 1:08 left to pretty well ice the game.

"Gosh this feels good," Thull said, indicating, "We were on a three-game losing streak, and still the attitude never changed. These girls come to work every single day ... Gosh, I'm so proud of them."

The girls were also excited, especially Stahl, who has been on the varsity three years and never beat Two Rivers before. "Our defense was really alive tonight," she said. "We just really wanted to win."

Kreis, who is a two-year varsity player, said she thought what helped in the victory was, "Free throws at the end. We had to make them."

And junior Sami Wiskerchen, who came up with a couple key rebounds down the stretch and had seven total, was excited to be part of the victory. "Oh my God, I'm so happy," she said.

The Indians wound up with 34 rebounds and made just seven turnovers on the night.

The win puts Kewaskum's EWC record at 2-5 and its

overall mark at 7-7. Currently, Plymouth and Kiel are leading the league with 6-2 records, while Sheboygan Falls and Waupun are next at 5-3. KHS is sixth at 2-5.
