## Winter Sports in the Washington County Park System

With the winter season upon us and with free entrance to the Washington County Parks visitors should take every opportunity to enjoy this Wisconsin winter at one of our Washington County Parks. Various county parks provide sites for popular winter sports such as cross country skiing, sledding, ice skating, snowshoeing, and ice fishing.

Snowmobile and ATV users should call the Washington County Association of Snowmobile Clubs hotline at 1-262-334-6061 or check their website at [www.wcasc.org](http://www.wcasc.org) to make sure the trails are open for ATV's or snowmobiles before venturing out.

The lighted sled hill at Glacier Hills County Park located at 1664 Friess Lake Road in the Village of Richfield will gain in popularity this year. It features a 35' drop for a fast ride before leveling out. A plowed parking lot, flush rest rooms and a warming house are also available for your use.

There are two other light-

ed sled hills in the park system, located in Ridge Run County Park in West Bend and in Homestead Hollow County Park on Freistadt Road in Germantown. These sites also include plowed lots and heated flush rest rooms. All sled hills are open to the public at no charge. Please do not build jumps on these hills because of the increased potential for injury.

Lake access and parking for ice fishing is available at Ridge Run and Henschke Hillside County Parks in West Bend, Leonard J. Yahr County Park in the Town of Farmington, Glacier Hills County Park and at Ackerman's Grove County Park on Highway Z in the Town of Polk.

All fishermen are strongly urged to use common sense in judging proper ice conditions.

Cross country skiers and snowshoe enthusiasts are encouraged to try Sandy Knoll County Park located just north of West Bend at Trenton Road and Wallace Lake Road. This park has a unique three-loop

trail system for short, medium, and longer trips. The trails here are gently sloped and very scenic.

Residents are also urged to try Homestead Hollow County Park for another easy to moderate, but very scenic trail. Skiers and "snowshoers" looking for more demanding trails should check out Glacier Hills County Park. Trails at Glacier Hills are rated moderate to difficult. The heated warming room and flush toilets in the park are available for use by all winter visitors.

None of the trails in the County Park System are groomed at this time.

In talking with Bob, it was found to be true as Bob is a very giving person with a very big heart. Bob, also known as "Mr. Bob under the Bridge" is very passionate about collecting and donating to the homeless.

After doing more research, Dodie Sargent, Administrator of the Little Folks School House decided that they could show their appreciation to Bob by starting a donation drive for Bob's project and called it "Have-A-Heart". ## More scoring help needed

Wanted: One more basketball player to score 12-14 points per game to support Charlie Witek's 18-point average and help the Kewaskum Indians win close games in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference.

"Charlie's doing all he can right now, but I am still looking for someone else to step up," KHS coach Keith Traska said after the Indians suffered a tough, 59-56 loss at Kiel on January 29.

Witek scored 25 points in the contest, which included a determined comeback by the Indians, who were down 12-6 at the end of the first quarter.

"We got off to a rough start.

In the first four minutes, he had four turnovers and just one shot," Traska went on. "It was not the start we wanted."

Kewaskum did rally to within two just before half, but for the second time in the contest, the Raiders closed the period with a last-second basket, putting the score at 28-24.

The Indians outscored Kiel in the third period to tie the game, and from then on, "It was just a battle back and forth," Traska said, reporting, "Mike Prochnow had a big three for us," cutting a six-point deficit down to three.

In the final minute, Kiel led by one, and Kewaskum had to foul. The Raiders converted both free throws, and

Kewaskum still had one chance to tie the game. Traska said Brady Hanson had a good look at a 3-point shot at the buzzer, and, "It just rolled out."

After Witek, Jason Hanson chipped in with 10 points and Brady Hanson and Josh Baker each added seven.

One of the highlights for the Indians was the fact they made five, threes in the game, including two by Witek and one each by Prochnow, Baker and Brady Hanson.

Traska was not pleased with the rebounding effort, however. "We struggled rebounding the ball," he said. "We were outrebounded 25-22, and we were much taller ... That shouldn't happen." Prochnow

led the team with five rebounds.

With the loss, Kewaskum falls to 2-8 in EWC play and 5-9 overall. Kiel was led by Trenton Nickel's 23 points. Carter Voelker and Austin Goehring combined for 25, to put Kiel at 5-5 in the EWC and 9-7 overall.

## A rough stretch for Lady Indians

Great strides have been made by the Kewaskum High girls basketball team this year, but the Indians still have some work to do before they are on a par with Eastern Wisconsin Conference co-leaders, Plymouth and Kiel, which unfortunately came back to back in last week's schedule.

Kewaskum battled hard vs. the host Panthers (8-2) on January 27, losing 53-34. Three days later, the Indians hosted Kiel (8-2), one of the tallest teams in the league, and wound up on the short end of a 53-29 score.

"Both games were 10-point games in the third quarter," KHS first-year coach Russ Thull said about the way his girls battled. "We had stretches where we played well," but, "Offensive rebounding hurt us in both games."

In their makeup game against New Holstein, the Indians played a good second half but could not catch up to the Huskies, who had taken a 35-23 lead in the first.


Kreis and Stahl were co-leaders in scoring. Both hit 14, while Herriges was next with 11.


