A return trip to state

Art Marquardt and his merry and very talented band of Kewaskum High bowlers are heading back to the Wisconsin High School Bowling Club's state meet where they hope to successfully defend the Division 2 title they won a year ago.

Also, adding to the excitement, Kenny Ellis qualified for state as an individual.

"We picked it up at the end when it really mattered," Hunter Demmon, one of the team's leaders, said Sunday night about the competition at the sectional meet which had been held at the King Pin Lanes in West Bend earlier in the day. Other team members included Kenny Ellis, Austin Grichtmeier, Max Heiser, Michael Krahn, Jake Nuenfeld and Blake Lorenz. Lorenz is a sophomore, while all the others are seniors.

Demmon said he and the other regulars didn't know their best but did

enough to advance to Madison the weekend of March 6-7-8.

"We ended up making the cut after the first 15 games," Demmon said, explaining the top eight teams in total pins, advanced to the ladder tournament.

"I knew we were in when we qualified top eight," Marquardt said. After struggling early, "They bowled really well in the last four or five games." Kewaskum's total was 2,625 pins.

Kewaskum was sitting in fifth place, starting the ladder competition with a match against Hartford, which the Indians lost by 19 pins.

"Next we faced Sheboygan South, and we beat them," Demmon said, reporting the team wound up losing its last match to Port Washington.

South had been the No. 1 team (2,797 pins) going into the ladder competition, but Kewaskum beat them by 22 pins, 398-376. Next the Indians lost to Port Washington, 348-329.

"We stayed in fifth (overall) but ended third among the Division 2 teams," Demmon said, indicating the top three teams advance to the D-1 state competition, while four go to D-2. The total field is divided in two to determine D-1 and D-2 and that many of the schools in the competition are larger than Kewaskum.

Five of the KHS bowlers attempted to qualify as individuals, but only Ellis advances. "He finished third in qualifying," Marquardt said, reporting Ellis had a 1,763 totals for six games, an average of 193 per game. He will bowl on Friday night, March 6, and the team competition begins the following day. The meet is being hosted by Bowl-A-Vard Lanes in Madison and Prairie Lanes in Sun Prairie.

Concerning the possibility of repeating as state champs, Marquardt said, "Of the nine kids to took (to state) last year, I have seven back ... I like my chances."

Watzig EWC king at 182 pounds

WAUPUN — Somewhat sadly, the curtain came down on Eastern Wisconsin Conference wrestling here Saturday, with an elated group of Two Rivers Raiders leaving the mats with their fourth straight tournament championship in the final event featuring the eight current teams.

Led by returning Division 2 state champions, Paul Bianchi (120) and Chris Yauch (145), Two Rivers, advanced 12 to the finals and piled up 245.5 points, 76.5 more than runner-up Sheboygan Falls. Campbellsport was third with 118, 11.5 ahead of the host Warriors, and the lower division included Kewaskum in fifth place with 94, followed by New Holstein, 83; Plymouth, 50; and Kiel, 45.

Concerning individual champions, Two Rivers and Sheboygan Falls topped the field with six and four, respectively, with Kewaskum, Campbellsport, New Holstein and Kiel each claiming one title.

Kewaskum High junior Ben Watzig went 3-0 on the day, starting out with a bye and then posting back-to-back decisions to claim the title at 182 pounds. This was the first individual title by a Kewaskum wrestler since 2012 when Brett Scoles and Austin Goeden were winners.

First, Watzig took care of Jacob Kaiser of New Holstein with a 6-4 decision. The finals were a lot closer as Watzig and Waupun's Brandon Morrissey were deadlocked at 4-4 at the end of regulation.

Neither managed to score in the







Special Republican primary Tuesday for 20th Senate seat

Electors on Tuesday will choose a replacement for Congressman Glenn Grothman who resigned from his senate seat during a special primary election. The winner of that race will move on the Spring election and will likely win the seat.

Grothman, a Campbellsport Republican, was elected to Congress in the November general election, succeeding long-time U.S. Representative Tom Petri. The primary winner's term will run through January 2, 2017.

Small businessman and former member of the Assembly Duey Stroebel served in the Wisconsin State Assembly, representing District 60. He won

a special election in 2011 to replace Mark Gottlieb (R) who resigned to serve as Transportation Secretary. He did not seek re-election to the Wisconsin State Assembly in 2014.

Stroebel was a 2014 Republican candidate seeking election to the U.S. House to represent the 6th Congressional District of Wisconsin. He was defeated by Grothman in the Republican primary.

Stroebel and his wife Laura have eight children.

Ozaukee County Board Chairman Lee Schlenvogt is a fourth generation dairy farmer. He has 25 years of government leadership experience.

Schlenvogt lives in Port

Washington with his wife Pam and two daughters, Megan and Melissa.

Veteran and non-profit consultant Tiffany Koehler, of Slinger, states she has a strong background in giving back to the community demonstrated by her career of consulting not for profits as well as her service in the United States Army sets her apart as a candidate for the people of the 20th Senate District.

Koehler ran unsuccessfully for District 58 of the Wisconsin State Assembly in 2014.

The 20th State Senate District includes parts of Fond du Lac, Dodge, Sheboygan, Ozaukee and Washington counties.

Taking the game plan to heart

Kewaskum High boys basketball coach Keith Traska talks about 55 miles per hour after a win, and he was nearing the freeway speed limit last Friday night after the Indians powered their way to a 52-39 victory over arch rival Campbellsport.

"This is my first win over Campbellsport," the third-year coach said excitedly after the victory. "I wanted to get that monkey off my back. It was a good win!"

Holding down the Cougars' ace shooter Jordan Dreikosen was a huge part of the deal, along with being successful at the free throw line. The Indians did both. Dreikosen, after torching Kewaskum with 29 points in their earlier meeting this season, was held to 16 points, and Kewaskum went to the line 11 times in the final eight minutes, hitting 16 of 22 (73 percent) to hold off the Cougars.

"That was the game plan," Traska said about wanting to slow down Dreikosen and "make them turn the ball over and us take care of the ball."

There were anxious moments early, especially after Dreikosen, Ty Schmidt and Tanner Ramthun nailed back-to-back threes for a 9-2 Campbellsport advantage.

Kewaskum struggled a bit offensively, with a pair of turnovers and 3x8 shooting the first eight minutes. Better shooting was ahead for KHS, which went on a 6-0 run, on a layup by Charlie Witek and two baskets by Jason Hanson to draw even with the Cougars at 18-all,

and Witek came up with a huge three at the buzzer for a 23-21 advantage.

"We got down early," Traska said. "That banked three at the buzzer to give us our first lead was huge." How right he was ... the momentum had shifted, and the Indians came out much more confident in the second half, using an early 6-0 run to start taking over. Rainbow jumpers by Koy Walsh and Ramthun cut the CHS deficit to two points, 31-29, but an unconventional 3-point play — on a Mike Prochnow free throw and a rebound basket by Hanson — gave the Indians some breathing room again.

Kewaskum aggressively went to the basket in the fourth quarter, drawing foul after foul, and the Indians were certainly on target at the free throw line.

"Each guy shot about 200 free throws last night at practice," Traska said, indicating another part of the success story was scoring baskets on in-bound plays, with 6-foot-7 Hanson scoring several times on feeds from Prochnow and Josh Baker. "We've been working on those, too," Traska said. "We have a size advantage, and we've got to take advantage of it."

Witek, who led the Indians with 22, was 10x12 at the line in the fourth quarter. Hanson wound up with 14 points.

In addition to being excited about the win, which gave the Indians a 3-8 mark in the EWC and a 6-10 overall mark, Traska tipped his hat to the fans at the game who contributed over \$300 to the Coaches vs. Cancer 80-second collection. "That was phenomenal."

Traska also was excited to see senior Corey Stern being with the team on the bench for the second half after he had spent several days in the hospital. "We miss him. We miss his senior leadership," Traska said. His coming back to be with us "meant a lot to our guys and their spirits."

After a game vs. Cedar Grove-Belgium, Kewaskum is at Waupun tonight to face the first place Warriors. KHS has three conference games remaining, and Traska feels all are winnable. "We've got to put some games together now," and execution is the key.

Rep. Kremer circulates bill to eliminate 48 hour rule

Recently legislation to eliminate the 48 hour waiting period for handgun purchases was circulated for co-sponsorship by Senators Wanggaard (R-Racine) and Tiffany (R-Hazellhurst), and Representatives Kremer (R-Kewaskum), Quinn (R-Rice Lake), Thiesfeldt (R-Fond du Lac) and Czaja (R-Irma).

The current 48 hour waiting period was added to state law in 1976, prior to the implementation of statutory background checks. This antiquated, two day waiting period amounts to a time tax on Wisconsin businesses and consumers, forcing wasted time and money when background checks are often completed within an hour.

"I understand that opponents of this legislation will argue that the two day period

is an essential 'cooling off' period; However, I do not consider this a viable argument. If someone is intent on committing the crime of murder, they will find a way to do it — be it with a bat, knife or an illegally purchased weapon," states Rep. Kremer. "In speaking with local businesses, the elimination of this waiting period will be a huge benefit

to them and their customers, while still keeping the necessary checks in place to help prevent guns from falling into the hands of criminals."

Rep. Kremer represents the 59th Assembly District which includes Southern Calumet, Western Sheboygan, Northern Washington and Eastern Fond du Lac Counties.





Where ballots are distributed to electors, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot. Upon being permitted to vote, the elector shall retire alone to a voting booth and cast his or her ballot except that an elector who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the elector's minor child or minor ward. An election official may inform the elector of the proper manner for casting a vote, but the official may not in any manner advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

At the partisan primary the elector shall select the party of his or her choice.

Where optical scan voting is used, the elector shall fill in the oval next to the party primary of his or her choice. The elector shall then fill in the oval next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice under the party primary chosen. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the elector shall write in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote, and fill in the oval on the write-in line.

Where touch screen voting systems are used, the elector shall touch the screen next to the party primary of his or her choice. The elector shall then touch the screen next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the elector shall type in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote.

SPRING PRIMARY
Where optical scan voting is used, the elector shall fill in the oval next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the elector shall write in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided, and fill in the oval on the write-in line.

Where touch screen voting systems are used, the elector shall touch the screen by the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the elector shall type in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote.

The vote should not be cast in any other manner. Not more than five minutes' time shall be allowed inside a voting booth. Sample ballots or other materials to assist the elector in casting his or her vote may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

If the elector spoils an optical scan ballot, he or she shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one elector. If the ballot has not been initialed by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the elector shall return it to the election official, who shall issue a proper ballot in its place. After casting his or her vote, the elector shall leave the voting booth, properly deposit the ballot and promptly leave the polling place.

The elector may spoil a touch screen ballot at the voting station before the ballot is cast.

After an official optical scan ballot is marked, it shall be inserted in the security sleeve so the marks do not show. After casting his or her vote, the elector shall leave the booth, insert the ballot in the voting device and discard the sleeve, or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. The elector shall leave the polling place promptly.

After an official touch screen ballot is cast, the elector shall leave the polling place promptly.

An elector may select an individual to assist in casting his or her vote if the elector declares to the presiding official that he or she is unable to read, has difficulty reading, writing or understanding English or that due to disability is unable to cast his or her ballot. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the elector's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the elector.



first extra period, then the match came down to a pair of :30 overtimes. Morrisey won the flip and chose down for the first extra period, and he was unable to get away from Watzig, who had a vice-like tight waist grip on him much of the time.

Now it was Watzig's turn, and he didn't waste time twisting away from his Warrior opponent and taking control for a 2-point reversal with 21 seconds left. Morrisey escaped with :05 on the clock and still had a chance to score a takedown, but Watzig would have no part of it and held on for the 4-4, 2-1 OT win.

"I'm happy for Ben," Indians coach Scott Rhoads said, recalling how Watzig came out for wrestling late during his

freshman season and quickly made an impact. What helped was "his athleticism," according to Rhoads who said, "He was so strong already. That played out for him right away. He beat the No. 1 seed in the regional (that year)."

"Tough match," Watzig said, indicating this was the first time he had faced Morrisey. "I cut down to 182 (from 195 pounds) for the tournaments," Watzig said. "Hopefully it will all work out."

When asked about his tough ride in OT, Watzig said, "I just tried to ride him hard and create my chance (in the second overtime)."

What Rhoads liked was how he defended the Grambie Roll late in the match after Mor-

risey used it to tie the score at 4-4 with :05 left in regulation.

With his three wins from Saturday, Watzig, who finished third at 195 in the 2014 EWC meet, is 25-10 on the year.

Kewaskum also had three third places, from sophomore Jacob "J.J." Heberer at 113, Alex Vogt at 126 and freshman Adam Bruss at 106.

Bruss (15-10) has come on like gang busters since making weight and becoming a regular. On Saturday, he opened with a 4-2 victory over New Holstein's Anthony Delano, lost in the semis to Dylan Bublitz of Campbellsport 4-0 before bouncing back to dominate Parker Schamburek of Sheboygan Falls 7-0.

Vogt (18-10) also had a good outing, starting with a pin in 2:44 over Waupun's Chris Ehltz, losing to the eventual champion, Ryan McGinnes of

SF, 14-8, then finishing the day with a solid 10-4 victory over Plymouth's Keagan Gustin.

"He did well even against McGinnes," Rhoads said of Vogt. "He's making gains on him. He got a couple of reversals and a takedown (against him) but not enough."

At 113 pounds, there were just three wrestlers, so Heberer was guaranteed third before the wrestling started, but seeing as how he shut out Anthony Xiong of Sheboygan Falls 6-0 a little over a week ago, it looked like getting second was a good bet because Campbellsport's Alex Costello was the odds on favorite to win another title.

Xiong was the best wrestler on this day, however, as he used an early takedown in the first period, another in the second and a reversal in the third to lock up a 6-2 semifinal victory over Heberer, now 20-8.

Kewaskum wrestlers taking fourths included: Travis Trudeau (13-18) at 120, Eric Doll (19-13) at 170, and Dalton Espitia (6-8) at 285. Cole Rahlf (15-13), Danny Seitz (12-19) and Michael Bryngelson (7-4) placed fifth at 132, 160 and 220.

Max Hardy was unable to wrestle at 145 Saturday. Hardy said he recently had a concussion, and soon after, "I tried to practice, but I just couldn't do it." Hardy finished the year with a 7-6 record.

Also missing the action with injuries were Zach Heberer and Garrett Buth. Still, both were at the meet to help cheer on their teammates.

Kewaskum is at Lomira Saturday for the D-2 regional.

Back on track for the home stretch

CAMPBELLSPORT— They really wanted this one!

Members of the Kewaskum High girls basketball team wanted to break their three-game losing streak. They wanted to secure the season sweep over Campbellsport, and they wanted the victory to help in the upcoming seeding for the Division 3 basketball tournament.

How did they accomplish their goal with a 33-26 victory (on February 5)? Tough defense, for one. The Cougars had hands in their faces every time they turned toward the basket.

Not panicking on offense was the other, according to coach Russ Thull who said, "(We had) Patience on offense, which we needed to do. We didn't shoot all that well, but we found a way to squeak one out."

After a close battle for most of the first quarter, the Indians surged into a 16-14 halftime lead on a timely 3-point goal by Mikayla Dogs and two free throws by Maddie Kreis with six seconds left on the clock.

Kewaskum kept up the defensive pressure in the third quarter, forcing the Cougars

into misses and turnovers. "Holding them to one point. That was a huge turning point," Thull said, referring to the fact the Cougars managed just one free throw in eight minutes, that coming on a free throw by Abigail Gierach with 5:50 remaining.

The Indians were more successful, scoring eight points. First came a base line jumper by Marisa Stahl, then two free throws by Dogs, and a flurry of four points in the final minute on a steal and layup by Kreis and a rebound basket by Hailey Herriges with :02 to go.

A 24-15 lead might have seemed comfortable, but the Cougars weren't raising any white flags, hitting back-to-back buckets, including a try by Ashley Emmer, and very quickly the margin was just two, 26-24, with 3:53 to play.

Kewaskum regained its composure, however, outscoring the hosts, 7 to 1 down the stretch.

One of the prettiest plays of the night came on a layup by Herriges off a nifty bounce pass from Dogs with 2:15 to go. Also, the Indians converted five of six free throws in the final minute, two by Kreis, one by Stahl and a pair by Herriges.

Herriges led the Indians with 10 points, then came Kreis with eight, Sammie Wiskirchen with six and Dogs with five, prompting Thull to comment, "We had a multitude of people chip in." Herriges was tough on the boards, hauling down five on defense and two on the offense, while Stahl, although suffering through a cold 1x10 shooting night, grabbed a team high nine and had two assists and one steal.

The coach really liked the effort he got from the junior southpaw, Dogs. "I thought Mikayla did an excellent job attacking the defense," he said.

Also not to be lost was the play of McKenzie Rosenthal, who made an important contribution. "That girl (Rosenthal) plays with a lot of heart," Thull said. "She's a very smart player. She brings a lot of energy off the bench. Rosenthal's effort included an assist, a rebound and a steal.

Another reserve who received mention was 6-foot senior Hailey Taylor, who, "came off the bench and gave us some big minutes defensively."

"This was a big win for the regional seeding. They (Cougars) are in our regional ... It was a really big win for us," Thull

said.
