Five are still alive

He went "solo" in the finals of the Eastern Wisconsin Conference Tournament, but Kewaskum's Ben Watzig will have company at Saturday's Division 2 sectional competition hosted by Milwaukee Lutheran High School.

A total of five Indians finished first or second at the Lomira regional last Saturday and are still in the running for bids at the WIAA State Wrestling Tournament which will be held February 26-28.

Watzig (182 pounds), Jacob Heberer (113) and Travis Trudeau (120) all finished first in the meet, while Alex Vogt (126) and Cole Rahlf (132) advance via their runner-up finishes.

Lomira won the team title, piling up 265 points. The Lions thus earned the right to wrestle in the Team Sectional, which was scheduled to take place on February 17 at North Fond du Lac.

Kewaskum finished a distant second with 169 points, followed by Waupun, 154; Grafton, 130; Mayville, 113.5; and Kettle Moraine Lutheran, 18. Several of the weight classes had just two or three competitors.

"It went well, having five go through," KHS coach Scott Rhoads said, admitting the tournament "was a little thin" at the lighter weights where there were just three and even two wrestlers in a class.

Watzig, who is 27-10 on the year, started off the day with a bye, and in the semifinals made quick work of John Grams of Grafton, pinning him in 2:30.

Through the other side of the bracket came Waupun's Brandon Morrissey for a rematch of last week's EWC tourney final. Watzig won that match 2-1 in double overtime, and while this one was also close, the powerhouse junior was up 3-1 when the final buzzer sounded, meaning there was no need for an overtime.

"I told him one good takedown was going to win it," Rhoads said about Watzig's match. Watzig attacked in the first half, getting Morrissey's leg but "didn't finish." Then in the second period, he scored a takedown and wrestled smart the rest of the way.

Heberer (22-8) barely worked up a sweat capturing his first regional title. He and Lomira's Mason Neuman were the only athletes at 113 pounds, and Heberer had the upper hand over Neuman, winning a 5-2 decision in the finals.

Neuman was scrappy, according to Rhoads, who said the two got into some scramble positions, "and J.J. came out on top every time."

Trudeau's tangle route started with a match vs. Brendon Fugate of Grafton in the semis, and it was over in the second period (3:07) when he got the pin. In the finals, Trudeau posted an impressive 9-6 victory over Lomira's

Jack Coulter.

The title by Trudeau was a bit of icing on the cake for the Indians, especially considering he came into the tournament with a mark of 13-18.

"Travis kind of came out of nowhere Saturday," Rhoads said, praising the junior athlete for his improvement over the year. "He's a real aggressive kid."

Vogt (20-11) finished 2-1 to claim the runner-up spot at 126. He first won a 6-4 decision over Mayville's Joe Wiedmeyer, then was pinned by the eventual champion, Chase Parr of Lomira, in 3:55 but rebounded in the wrestleback with a 4:32 pin over Jonathan Duran of Grafton.

"I was nervous about that one," Rhoads said, noting Vogt needed to win or his season was done. It turns out there was no need to worry because "He handled that kid really well."

Rahlf, who has been coming on strong in recent weeks, received a bye in the first round, then pinned Justin Schlender of Mayville in 2:56 but lost in the finals via an 11-2 major decision to Lomira's Erik Danner.

With Schlender eventually taking third, Rahlf, now 17-13 automatically received second place. "He had a good tournament, too," Rhoads said.

There will be eight wrestlers at each weight class at Milwaukee Lutheran, with the top three earning

Stroebel wins Senate primary



Former Assemblyman for the 60th district DUEY STROEBEL has won the primary held Tuesday and will now likely take the seat vacated by now Congressman Glenn Grothman.

Stroebel clearly defeated Ozauckee County Board Chairman Lee Schlenvogt; and Tiffany Koehler, a military veteran from Slinger.

Stroebel challenged Grothman last year in a run for Congress. Stroebel, served in the Assembly for 2 1/2 years, is virtually assured of claiming the Senate seat in the April 7 spring election as there is no Democrat challenger running.

With all the votes counted around 10 p.m. Tuesday evening, Stroebel ended the day receiving 9,307 votes while Schlenvogt received 3,313 and Koehler had 1,141.

Fire destroys home kills pets in Kewaskum

A Kewaskum family was able to escape injury after a residential structure fire Wednesday, Feb. 11. However two family pets perished in the blaze.

The Washington County Sheriff's Office was notified of the fire at 8210 Kettleview Dr. in the town of Kewaskum shortly before 5 a.m. Wednesday.

Sheriff's deputies as well as firefighters from Kewaskum, Boltonville and West Bend responded and were on scene for approximately three hours. According to a press release there were no known injuries to the two occupants who were home and fled the fire or to personnel

Chief's Corner

Living in Wisconsin creates abundant opportunities to enjoy outdoor activities; such as boating, camping, ATV use, snowmobiling, and the like. Owning these types of equipment can not only get expensive, but storage can be an issue as well. It is important to consider storage options prior to purchasing these items because, if you live in the Village, we have specific ordinances regulating the parking and storage of recreational vehicles and equipment.

Municipal Ordinance 95-65 defines these regulations. In summary, property owners may only store up to two recreational vehicles outside of a fully enclosed structure. These "vehicles" (which are defined as boats, campers of any kind, ATVs, snowmobiles, any type of trailers, etc) are not allowed to be stored in the front yard of a residence; they must be stored in the side or back yards. The front yard, as defined in ordinance, does extend the entire width of the lot and corner properties actually have two front, or "street" yards. The one exception that allows for recreational vehicles to be stored in the front, or street yard is when stored on the driveway serving the residence. Furthermore, any recreational vehicle being stored can not be located closer than three feet to any lot line, must be in good working order (or it may be considered junk under our storage of junk ordinance), and must be properly licensed

if licensing is required for the vehicle. If the vehicle is stored on grass, the area around and under the vehicle must be properly maintained or the Village may order the removal of such vehicle or equipment, or the placement of an improved surface. And finally, the vehicle must be stored as inconspicuously as possible.

As I patrol the Village I have seen several folks with campers, trailers and boats in violation of this ordinance. As the snow melts and the weather warms up, I will be sending out letters to property owners in violation of this ordinance compelling them to become in compliance. If you are one of the property owners currently in violation, please take the necessary steps to rectify the situation to avoid any interaction with our department. This ordinance is in place with the objective of keeping our Village aesthetically pleasing; which I am confident is something we all support.

New DMV online Driver License Guide walks through eligibility and forms

Is it time to renew your driver license? What paperwork do you need to take get your license? There's now an app for that. The Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT) Division of Motor Vehicles (DMV) offers a new online, interactive Driver License Guide to help customers get information on their driver license eligibility and status, get a checklist of the documents they'll need to take to DMV customer service centers, and it even fills in the application form.

"Since obtaining and renewing a license requires an in-person visit to a DMV customer service center, having all the paperwork ready and complete could save the customer time or even an extra trip," said Deborah Godt, Driver Services chief. "The Driver License Guide tailors information based on the customer's specific situation."

DMV customers can use the site 24/7 to conveniently get information specific to their Wisconsin driver license record or browse anonymously and learn what is involved with the license process.

The Driver License Guide self-serve online application is at the DMV website (www.wisconsin.gov) or linked through <https://DLGuide.wisconsin.gov>. Customers easily access information on their current driving record, obtain or renew a license, get a duplicate license, and other personalized options.

Godt said the DMV expects the most popular features will be the customized checklist of documents that need to be

bought to the DMV and the pre-populated application form (MV3001).

In addition to the new Driver License Guide, WisDOT offers many other online tools and services to improve customer service and to help prepare safer drivers for Wisconsin roads. The teen driver portal offers a one-stop tool kit to help teens learn to be safer drivers. It includes the new Practice Driver's Test mobile app, tips for parents and sponsors of teen drivers, and the award-winning Parent's Supervised Driving Program (www.theparentssupervisedrivingprogram.com). Other online services include getting crash reports, finding local DMV service centers and hours, renewing license plates and more.

When accessing transportation-related forms, only the website www.wisconsin.gov (note extension .gov) is the official state website. Others with .org and .com are not official and may have extra charges for forms or list information that is dated or incorrect.







Comeback effort falls short College Sports Notes

While the record doesn't show it, the Kewaskum High boys basketball team is getting closer to the upper echelon in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference.

In their first meeting, the Indians lost to Waupun by a single point, and last Friday with the conference title on the line for the unbeaten Warriors (12-0), the Indians came up nine points short, 55-46.

"We just did not play well," KHS coach Keith Traska said, especially in the first two quarters when they were limited to single-digit scoring.

Mini runs helped the Warriors gain the victory. Midway in the second quarter, Colton Homan, who led Waupun with 19 points, scored a 3-point play following a 3-point basket by Jordan McGinnis. Those six points put the Warriors up 21-12 and in the final 1:24 of the half, Waupun outscored Kewaskum 7 to 3 for a 28-17 advantage. The three KHS points came on a base line swisher from the baseline by Michael Prochnow, his second of the night. Prochnow would end up with personal best 16 points on four long-range bombs.

"Probably the player who played the best was Mike Prochnow. He really stepped up," Traska said, and he needed to since KHS' high scorer, Charlie Witek, was limited to just nine points, 10 below his season average. (Witek is cur-

rently fifth among EWC scoring leaders.)

"We knew they were going to try to take away Charlie, just like we took away Domask," the EWC's leading scorer who is sporting a 25.7-point average and only scored 12 in this game.

Prochnow credited his teammates with setting him up. "Everybody else gave me some nice passes. I had a lot of open shots."

All four of his 3-pointers came from at least 16 feet down the baseline, but that was no problem for Prochnow, who said, "Baseline is where I shoot most of my shots."

Senior reserve Dean Schlice also had a nice game, chipping in with seven points.

Traska was proud of the comeback the Indians made in the fourth quarter. Down by 15, he urged his players to cut the lead in half, then he would take a timeout to regroup, so they would have the energy to cut the margin in half again.

First the Indians climbed to within nine, and then five, but the Indians may have run out of steam because in the last few minutes, "We really made some bad decisions." With the loss, KHS is 3-9 in the EWC and 7-11 overall.

On February 10, the Indians used the 1-2 punches of Witek and Jason Hanson to deliver a knockout to visiting Cedar Grove. Kewaskum scored a season-high 76 points, while holding the visitors from the Central Lakeshore Conference to 56.

Witek torched the nets for a personal high 39, while Hanson chipped in with 20. Witek's totals for the night included 17 field goals, and 5x6 free throws. He also hauled down a team-high 10 rebounds, had one assist and a couple of blocked shots. Hanson had seven buckets and went six of six at the line.

Prochnow also had a good night, chipping in with nine points, nine rebonds, an impressive six assists, three steals and two blocks.

"That was the best game we played all year. The pieces were coming together," Traska said, referring to shooting rebounding, passing, while limiting turnovers. "That was fun. We should have more games like that. If we play like that, we will surprise some teams in the regional."

Kewaskum is at New Holstein Friday night.

A couple of former Kewaskum High School wrestlers made some noise on the mats recently.

Brett Scoles finished fifth in the Don Parker Open in Eau Claire on February 5, while Bo Seibel and Joey Seitz placed second and fifth, respectively in the WIAC (Wisconsin Intercollegiate Athletic Conference) Tournament held at UW-Oshkosh this past Sunday.

Wrestling for UW-Parkside at 174 pounds, Brett Scoles went 3-1 to secure a fifth place finish at the Parker Open. Brett lost his quarterfinal match, but then won the next match by decision, 10-3. Scoles won his final match by pinning his opponent in the first round at 2:18.

For the year, Scoles is 8-11.

While UW-Parkside had a tough time winning matches vs. UW-Whitewater in a dual meet held February 4, Scoles left the mat with a win by major decision.

The Rangers lost their final home meet, 24-14, with Scoles helping end the meet on a high note, defeating George Gonzales, 14-4 at 174.

Scoles, who holds Kewaskum's record for all-time wins, is a red-shirt sophomore. A year ago, he finished 6-7, competing mostly in open meets.

Parkside finished the season with a 4-3 dual meet record, while UW-Whitewater, currently ranked No. 2 in NCAA 3 competition, is 15-1.

At the Pete Willson Invitational in Wheaton, Illinois, Scoles went 1-2. He lost his opening match, a 3-1 decision to Brennen Kelly of Hei-

delberg, then defeated Emmet McGovern of Elmhurst 7-2 in the first round of the wrestlebacks before being eliminated after getting pinned by Nick Lees of Case Western Reserve in 3:36.

Seibel concluded his football career at UW-Stevens Point in November and decided to wrestle for the Pointers after a four-year absence from the sport. It took him a while to touch up his mat skills but came up with a big effort in the WIAC Tournament, taking second at 285 pounds.

Seibel opened the 10-man bracket with a 4-0 decision over Brandon Boyle, and in the semis posted a 12-7 victory over Zach Tooley of UW-La Crosse. Top-seeded Anthony Edgren from UW-Whitewater, was the better man in the finals, however, defeating Seibel by major decision, 9-0.

Seitz was one of six athletes wrestling at 142 pounds. He finished 2-2 on the day, starting with an 8-3 loss to UW-Oshkosh's Craig Mason.

In the loser's bracket, Seitz posted a 14-0 shutout over Jacob Somann of UW-Platteville before being defeated by Whitewater's Matt Adcock 19-5. In the battle for the fifth spot, Seitz pinned Jeremy Peterson of UW-Platteville in 1:12.

There are just six teams in WIAC that still offer wrestling. UW-Whitewater was the class of this year's tournament, piling up 162.5 points, 24 ahead of UW-La Crosse. Seitz followed by Platteville, 59; Oshkosh, 45; and Eau Claire, 40.5.

Local skiers compete in state test

Kewaskum's Kyle McElhatton finished among the top 50 skiers in the 40th annual Wisconsin High School Alpine Championships held Monday at Mt. La Cross.

The host La Crosse Central/Logan team dominated the meet, winning with an impressive 52 points, 100 ahead of runner-up Arrowhead.

Competing for the com-

bined West Bend/Kewaskum/Port Washington team, McElhatton finished 45th (out of 137) in the opening event, the Slalom, with a time of 53.16 seconds for his run. Next he placed 72nd in the Giant Slalom, with a time of 31.20, and in the final event, the Super G, he placed 73rd after covering the course in 39.94.

Derrek Brock, another KHS student, competing for West Bend, did well in two

events but unfortunately was disqualified in the first one, the Slalom, which hurt his chances of a top-50 finish. Brock placed 62nd overall in the Giant Slalom with a time of 30.28, and he wound up with a sizzling 37.92 in the Super G, which was good for 39th in the field.

The combined West Bend/Kewaskum/Port team finished 19th out of 21 teams, with 1,294 points.

Cool shooting a problem

The effort is still there, but the Kewaskum High Lady Indians haven't been able to get the basketball to drop in their last two games, resulting in a 44-18 home loss to Waupun and a 32-34 defeat at Sheboygan Falls.

"Overall, we played pretty well," coach Russ Thull said after Friday's Parents Night loss to Waupun, one of three teams currently sharing the Eastern Wisconsin Conference lead at 10-3. "To hold an offense like that to 44 points ... and playing without our point guard (Mikayla Dogs) ..." Dogs sprained her ankle on Monday and missed both contests, which definitely hurt the Indians.

"Last time, we gave 'em sixty," so holding them to forty four "was a plus for us," Thull said.

"I think we had nine turnovers for the game," the coach went on about bright spots, adding, "I thought our zone was pretty effective."

The game was close after the first quarter, with the Indians trailing by just a single point, 5-4, then the Warriors exploded for 18 points to start taking control, and they shuttled players in an out, keeping them fresh for the stretch run.

KHS battled to reach 20 but fell short, missing four of five shots in the final eight minutes

while also going 1x4 at the free throw line.

Marisa Stahl led the Indians with eight points and from there the scoring dropped off to three by Erin Matusinec and Amber Flasch, who hit a bulls eye three-pointer early in the fourth quarter.

The Indians shot just 22 percent, hitting eight of 35 shots on the night. The Warriors' height may have been responsible for some of the misses, as four of their front liners are 5-foot, 10-inches or taller.

Thull knew it would be a stiff challenge to stay with the Warriors. "They're a great team. They've got height, a lot of versatility and balanced scoring. They have eight girls who score about five points a game ... "You can't key on one player."

Thull cited Flasch for her good effort in the game and in practice. "She doesn't always get a lot of opportunities. You saw her positive attitude in the fourth quarter. That's how she is every day in practice."

"They haven't quit," Thull said about the Indians, who are currently 3-9 in EWC action and 8-12 overall. "We are not done. We want more" in the remaining two regular season games and the D-3 tournament.

At Sheboygan Falls on February 10, the Indians stayed close until the fourth quarter when the Falcons outscored them 14 to 8.

In this game, Stahl and Matusinec were the high scorers with 10 and nine points, respectively. Stahl struggled shooting from the floor where she was just two of 12, but she was perfect at the free throw line, converting on six of six attempts. Matusinec took just eight shots in the game and made four of them.

The rebounding leaders were Hailey Herriges, Matusinec and Sammie Wiskirchen, who hauled down seven, four and four, respectively.

The Indians concluded the EWC season tonight (Thursday), hosting New Holstein for Senior Night.

"We didn't get the seed we wanted," Thull said Sunday night after the coaches meeting to determine a D-3 bracket. "We got the fifth seed, and we play at Ripon (February 24 at 7 p.m.) even though we beat them and have a better record." Ripon is currently 5-10 while the Indians












