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

## Kreis, seniors come up big in home finale

The Kewaskum High girls' basketball team closed out the regular season in grand style with back-to-back victories over Ozaukee (47-38) and New Holstein (42-37).

"A great way to march into the playoffs," KHS coach Russ Thull said earlier this week. "We played two pretty solid games," enabling the Indians to hit the 10-win mark for the season.

The home victory over New Holstein on February 19 was especially satisfying because it came on Senior Night and gave the Indians a season split with the Huskies.

"They beat us by 13 at their place. There we gave them 63 points," Thull went on, praising the latest Indians' defensive effort.

Offensively, this game was the Maddie Kreis show. "Maddie Kreis had a huge game for us," Thull said, pointing to her 18-point effort. Kreis was getting open looks, and, "She kept knocking them down."

Kreis hit six of 10 shots from 2-point range and was on target with

two of three tries for the 18. She was also a beast on the boards with eight rebounds and added one assist and one steal. Her 18 points was a season-high.

As a whole, the Indians shot well, hitting 11x33 shots and connecting on three of nine from 3-point land.

Marisa Stahl also put on a good show in her final home appearance, contributing nine points with five rebounds and six steals. Stahl was right on target at the free throw line, making five of six attempts.

Since Mikayla Dogs went down with an ankle injury, Stahl has moved to point guard, and, "She's been our catalyst from the point."

Sophomore Hailey Herriges was another key with her seven points and four rebounds.

Thull was ecstatic to see the seniors, Kreis, Stahl, Hailey Taylor, McKenzie Rosenthal and Erin Matusinec, get a win in their final game in Kewaskum.

Kewaskum led most of the way, according to Thull, who said, "It was like eight or nine points down the

stretch, then we pulled the seniors out to honor them," and the Huskies got a few late baskets.

"These seniors have put in a lot of work. I'm so proud of them," Thull said of the five who helped turn last year's 3-19 record into what is currently 10-12. "They came to practice every day and worked hard ... They set the tone for the future."

Herriges led the attack with 14 points and got plenty of help from Matusinec and Stahl, who chipped in with 12 and 11, respectively. Herriges also gobbled up eight rebounds, with Matusinec and Wiskirchen next with four each.

## Household and agricultural hazardous waste collection May 9

The Washington County Full Service Clean Sweep is an opportunity for county residents to properly dispose or recycle unwanted hazardous chemicals, electronic goods, pharmaceutical medication, and used tires.

This is the sixth consecutive year for the Full Service Clean Sweep Program which has been coordinated by the Land and Water Conservation Division of the Planning and Parks Department; while partnering with the County's Health Department, Sheriff's Department and the Highway Department.

The drive-through collection makes this program simple and efficient for participants. A \$10.00 pre-registration fee is required for the hazardous waste and electronic goods; participation is limited to 250 vehicles per event.

The Pharmaceutical Collection does not require anyone to pre-register and participation is unlimited.

Used Tire Collection participation is also unlimited; a maximum of 20 tires will be accepted per participant and disposal fees apply at the time of collection.

The 2015 Full Service Clean Sweep event will be held on Saturday, May 9th, 2015. Collection will be from 8 a.m.-12 p.m. at the Washington County Slinger Highway Shop, 314 West Washington St., in Slinger.

The following materials will NOT be accepted during the Clean Sweeps: TV's, appliances, latex paint, oil, batteries, needles/sharps, radioactive items, smoke detectors, propane tanks and cylinders.



### Peanut Butter Snickerdoodle Tart with Cinnamon Peanut Crust

Prep time: 30 minutes  
Cook time: 8 minutes  
Refrigerate: 1 hour

Servings: 8 (1/2 tart) servings

- 1 1/2 cups lightly salted roasted peanuts, lightly crushed
- 3 tablespoons packed brown sugar
- 3 tablespoons butter, melted
- 1 teaspoon McCormick Ground Cinnamon, divided
- 3 tablespoons chocolate milk
- 4 ounces semi-sweet chocolate, coarsely chopped
- 1/2 cup creamy peanut butter

- 2 tablespoons sweetened condensed milk
- 1 teaspoon McCormick Pure Vanilla Extract
- 1/2 cup heavy cream

Mix peanuts, sugar, butter and 1/2 teaspoon of the cinnamon in medium bowl. Remove 1/4 cup and spread on small baking sheet. Divide remaining peanut mixture among 4 (4-inch) tart pans with removable bottoms. Press firmly onto bottom and up sides of each tart pan.

Bake tart crusts and peanut crumble mixture together in preheated 350°F oven 8 minutes. Cool on wire racks.

Meanwhile, microwave chocolate milk in medium microwavable bowl on high 45 seconds.

Add chocolate; stir until chocolate is completely melted and mixture is smooth. Set aside.

Beat peanut butter, sweetened condensed milk, vanilla and remaining 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon in large bowl with electric mixer on medium speed until smooth. Add heavy cream; beat until soft peaks form. Spread in prepared tart crusts. Spread chocolate mixture over top.

Refrigerate at least 1 hour or until ready to serve. Cut each tart in half. Sprinkle with toasted peanut crumble. Serve immediately.

**Note:** To crush peanuts, place peanuts in large resealable plastic bag. Pound with a rolling pin, mallet or heavy skillet until lightly crushed.

### Chocolate Chip Cookie Biscotti with White Chocolate Dipping Sauce

Prep time: 20 minutes  
Cook time: 45 minutes

Servings: 16 servings (2 cookies and 2 1/2 tablespoons sauce each)

#### Biscotti:

- 2 1/2 cups flour
- 1 cup firmly packed brown sugar
- 1/4 cup instant nonfat dry milk
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 3 eggs
- 1 teaspoon McCormick Extra Rich Pure Vanilla Extract
- 1 cup miniature chocolate chips

#### White Chocolate Dipping Sauce:

- 2 cups half-and-half
- 8 ounces white chocolate chips
- 1/4 cup Irish cream liqueur
- 2 teaspoons McCormick Extra Rich Pure Vanilla Extract


For the biscotti, mix flour, sugar, dry milk, baking powder and salt in large bowl with electric mixer on low speed until well blended. Mix eggs and vanilla in medium bowl until well blended. Gradually add to flour mixture, beating on low speed until well mixed. Stir in chocolate chips.

Divide dough in half. Shape each half into a 12-inch long log. Transfer logs to parchment paper-lined baking sheet. Flatten logs to 1-inch thickness.

Bake in preheated 350°F oven 20 to 25 minutes or until slightly risen and firm to touch. Cool logs on wire rack 10 minutes or until cool enough to handle. Transfer to cutting board. Using a sharp serrated knife, cut logs diagonally into 3/4-inch thick slices. Place slices, cut sides down, in single layer on parchment paper-lined baking sheets.

Bake 10 to 15 minutes or until crisp and golden, turning biscotti over halfway through cook time. Transfer biscotti to wire racks; cool completely.

For the dipping sauce, place all ingredients in medium saucepan on medium heat. Simmer 5 minutes or until heated through, stirring constantly. Serve with biscotti.



## KMS Students learn the art of cross country skiing







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# Cold stretches hamper Indians' efforts

NEW HOLSTEIN — Hot-shooting New Holstein simply overpowered the Kewaskum boys basketball team last Friday night, using a 47-point first half to catapult into a 76-60 Eastern Wisconsin Conference victory.

The Indians scored just nine points in the first period, digging a hole that was a little too deep to escape and fell to 3-10 in the EWC with one game remaining.

"They didn't miss a shot during that time span. They were on fire," KHS coach Keith Traska said, about the Huskies' 26-point explosion in the final five minutes of the first quarter after the two teams were deadlocked at 2-2.

Devon Johnson, a 5-foot, 11-inch senior was a real thorn in KHS' side during that stretch, hitting three, 3-pointers.

"We just did not play well enough to stop them," Traska said, adding, "We did not play well enough offensively to stay

with them either."

Understandably, the Huskies, who are in third place in the EWC, put their defensive emphasis on junior forward Charlie Witek, the Indians' leading scorer, and while he was bottled up early in the game, none of the other Indians stepped up and took over the scoring load.

The Indians did show a lot of resolve with their second-half effort when they outscored New Holstein 37 to 27. Steadily Kewaskum chipped away at the Huskies' lead until Brady Hanson's two free throws made the score 63-53 with 4:50 to play.

Eleven seconds later Witek was whistled for his fourth foul, and Josh Berg successfully hit two free throws for a 65-53 advantage.

After a KHS miss, Traska called for full court pressure, which forced a New Holstein turnover, and that started a flurry of steals, which ended with Nolan Beime going to the line for a one-and-one free throw situation. Beime missed

the first, and the Indians raced down the court and scored on a Hanson layup off a feed from Michael Prochnow.

The score was now 65-55, and KHS got the ball back on a steal by Josh Baker, who turned the ball right back to the Huskies. New Holstein could not take advantage in its next possession, and Kewaskum scored again (65-57) at 2:23 when Witek drove to the hoop after taking a pass from Hanson.

Kewaskum fans were still hopeful the Indians could pull off the comeback, but Witek was whistled for his fifth foul with 2:10 remaining, and the rest of the way the Indians only managed three points on a long baseline jumper by Prochnow.

New Holstein iced the win, converting nine of 12 free throws during that same stretch. While the Indians had to foul in certain instances, several were questionable according to the KHS fans, some of whom started a chant "five on seven," indicating they were not happy with the inconsistencies

of the calls.

Witek wound up scoring 23 points, and next high were Brady Hanson and Prochnow, who both had 11 points.

"Charlie played well again," Traska said, also tipping his hat to Jared Chesak, who was making his varsity debut and chipped in with five points on a 3-point basket and 2x2 free throw shooting. He was in the game with Witek, Brady Hanson, Baker, and Prochnow during the fourth-quarter comeback.

Kewaskum played the game without a single senior. Corey Stern was already out because of illness, and Dean Schlice missed the game with an injury. "Dean should be back Thursday night (tonight) for Senior Night or at least for regionals," Traska said.

# Sturgeon season ends safely with high harvest

Having braved some of the most brutal weather conditions in memory, sturgeon fishermen closed out the 2015 spearing season today with a harvest of 2,158 fish, the sixth highest harvest on record.

Conservation wardens with the state Department of Natural Resources said the more than 13,100 licensed fishermen pulled off a safe season with no reported injuries and generally excellent compliance with regulations.

The total harvest includes 1,870 fish speared on Lake Winnebago, where the season ended Saturday, and 288 from the upriver lakes of Butte des Morts, Winneconne and Poygan, where the season ended Wednesday.

DNR sturgeon biologist Ryan Koenigs said sturgeon fishermen are experts at dealing with conditions many people would consider life threatening. They are also a patient lot, he said, often waiting inside their darkened shacks hour after hour, day after day and season after season before opportunity suddenly arrives, to be followed by seconds of sheer pandemonium.

"Sturgeon spearing is an exercise in patience, persistence and perseverance," Koenigs said. "I think most people were happy this year. Anytime they can fish in clear water they know they have a better chance of seeing fish and being successful. The big thing is that people were able to get out and pursue their passion, and they did it safely."

The sturgeon spearing season is largely a family affair on Lake Winnebago - home to one of the largest native populations of lake sturgeon in the world - where the pastime has been passed down through the generations and new stories are added to family lore with each new season.

Today, on the eighth and final day of the season, a father and son from Oshkosh registered their fish together. Derek Drexler, 12, in his first season of eligibility, was fishing out of the same shack with his father, Robert, 44. Derek speared a 70-inch fish that weighed 76 pounds. A half hour later, the father threw his spear and landed a 50-inch sturgeon weighing 24 pounds. They were photographed together, creating a family heir-

loom.

The largest fish of the season - 81.3 inches long and 137.5 pounds - was speared Tuesday by Chad Cherney and registered at Payne's Point.

While there were more fish speared on Lake Winnebago this year than last, the weights of the fish were down. A drop in the shad population - a fatty food source - meant the sturgeon were a bit "skinny" this year, with heads that were bigger around than their bodies. Cherney's fish, for instance, when compared with the top 11 heaviest sturgeon ever registered, was longer than 9 of those behemoths.

Koenigs said this year's sturgeon weight loss is not a concern for their long-term viability. Shad populations will rebound quickly when conditions are favorable and the sturgeon will pack on the pounds.

"The decrease in shad has nothing to do with the numbers of sturgeon," Koenigs said. "And this isn't going to be any real detriment to the sturgeon. The fish just aren't quite as heavy this year."

The season on Lake Winnebago lasted eight days this

year. The closure was set for today after the harvest of adult female sturgeon reached the "90 percent trigger" Friday. The cap was set at 878. In the end, 911 adult female sturgeon were speared. Koenigs said exceeding the cap by 33 fish was not a problem. There are many years, he said, when the cap is not reached, often because cloudy water limits visibility. This year, spearkers enjoyed good water clarity.

"The system is set up so we can keep the harvest at or very close to 5 percent of the adult population annually," Koenigs said. "This was a sustainable harvest."

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## Season comes to a disappointing end

There wasn't much to cheer about for the Kewaskum High wrestling team at the Division 2 sectional held Saturday at Milwaukee Lutheran High School.

None of the five Indians who competed will be advancing to the WIAA state tournament this weekend as they all lost opening-round matches. The two who did get wrestlebacks by virtue of their losses to eventual finalists, were beaten in consolation matches.

This is the first time in at least 15 years that Kewaskum has not sent at least one wrestler to state, dating back to the 1990s. (Individual records compiled by the WIAA only go back to the year 2000.)

"We went 0-for-7 with the five guys we had," KHS coach Scott Rhoads, the school's lone two-time state champion, said Monday. Rhoads was optimistic going into the meet and had no real answers why the Indians didn't do well.

Sophomore Jacob Heberer looked like he was in the better of the two brackets leading to the finals of the 113-pound weight class, but he was shut out by freshman Max Ward of Elkhart-Lake-Glenbeulah/Howards Grove. Ward eventually wound up third at 113.

"He was right in there until the guy put in a leg ride and turned him a couple times" in the second period, Rhoads said of Heberer's 9-0 loss. He finished the year at 22-9.

At 120, junior Travis Trudeau was pinned by Adam Gonwa of Cedar Grove-Belgum in 5:29. Gonwa lost his second match, so Trudeau's season was over. He finished up at 16-19.

Alex Vogt had wrestled pretty well in recent matches, so Rhoads had hoped he might win a match or two. The sophomore Vogt had a tough, first-round draw, however, facing the eventual 126-pound champion, Wisconsin Lutheran's Tera Wright, who is 42-1 and the defending D-2 120-pound state champion. Vogt was pinned by Wright in 1:05.

Vogt had another challenge in the consolation round, facing

Ryan McGinnis of Sheboygan Falls, and he was pinned by McGinnis in 4:51. He finished up at 20-13.

Cole Rahlf also drew an excellent wrestler in the first round, Tanner Woepse of Kiel, a senior and a defending state qualifier. Rahlf was pinned in 5:02, and in his wrestleback, he was outscored by Oostburg's Brandon Burmesch, 10-2.

"Cole came out really well and wrestled good (vs. Woepse). It was 0-0 after the first period," Rhoads said. "It kind of drifted away as time went on."

Rahlf finished one win above the .500 mark at 17-16.

That left 182-pound Ben Watzig to carry Kewaskum's banner, but he lost an 8-7 heartbreaker to Nick Miller of Elkhart Lake-Glenbeulah/Howards Grove, 8-7.

And how did that match go?

Rhoads said, "He (Watzig) got the first takedown. From then on, it went back and fourth, with escapes and takedowns. Ben was coming back in the third period" down by four when he would take Miller down and let him go in an effort to catch up. At the end, he couldn't come up with the winning takedown as Miller "started stalling."

Watzig did not get another chance to wrestle and ended his junior campaign at 28-11. Miller finished third in the competition.

Injuries plagued Kewaskum this year, with the loss of three

starters, including two seniors. Rhoads is already looking forward to next season, saying, "All five of these kids are back next year, and we have a phenomenal group of eighth graders coming in. It's going to be good."

The wrestling team will hold its award banquet on Tuesday, March 3 in the high school cafeteria. Special individual awards will be announced at that time.

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


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
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
