## Eight departments respond to town of Wayne house fire

A town of Wayne fire caused an estimated \$300,000.00 in damages Saturday, March 7 to a single family ranch style home on Commercial Drive.

Authorities were called by the homeowner at 11:23 a.m. when she noticed smoke in the finished basement of the home. She reported she and her dog were leaving the structure as she observed the fire spreading from the area of the wall near the wood burning stove to the adjoining areas.

Authorities believe the wood burner which was in use, to be the possible cause of the fire.

Fire departments that responded to the scene included Kohlsville, Allenton, Kewaskum, St. Lawrence, Campbellsport, Lomira, Theresa and Knowles.

There were no reported injuries to the homeowner or any fire personnel. Firefighters were on scene for over five hours including a partial tear down of the home to fully extinguish the fire.

## Village police handle tactical situation on Wildlife Dr

Kewaskum police officers were dispatched to the 1800 block of Wildlife Drive, Tuesday, March 3, at approximately 10:42 p.m., for an intoxicated suicidal subject in possession of a rifle.

According to Police Chief Tom Bishop, the subject was uncooperative with responding officers; thus a tactical situation ensued. After approximately one hour, the 21-year-old Kewaskum man was brought into custody without further incident. The subject is currently

being evaluated for the suicidal statements that were made. Due to this, no further information will be release regarding this incident.

Charges have been requested through the Washington County District Attorney's Office for Disorderly Conduct - Domestic Abuse Related, and Endangering Safety by use of a Weapon. Our agency was assisted by the Washington County Sheriff's Department and the Wisconsin State Patrol.

## Chief's Corner

March is that wonderful month where we finally start to transition from winter to spring, and I for one cannot wait for warmer temperatures to fall upon us. As we transition from winter to spring, we begin to prepare for different issues we may be faced with various times of the year. As the Village of Kewaskum Emergency Government Director my focus turns towards severe weather such as tornados.

Kewaskum does have a tornado warning system (sirens) that we have traditionally tested on the first Thursday of each month from April through November, along with a "growl" test on Saturday's at noon. A "growl" test is a very quick test just to make sure that the software and the towers are communicating properly which typically sounds similar to a growl. Currently, in the event of a server weather incident where a tornado warning was issued by the National Weather Service, the sirens would be set off by the police officer on duty. We are able to set the sirens off from the squad car or by returning to the office and manually setting off the alert.

After becoming Police Chief, and subsequently the Emergency Government Director, I had concerns about the processes that were in place to alert the public of a tornado. Once a warning was issued by the National Weather Service for an area of Washington County including the Village of Kewaskum, our dispatch center (the Washington County Sheriff's Office) would send the alert out via our squad radio. Once the warning was received by our officer on duty, he would then set the tornado sirens off either in the squad or by responding back to the police department. This process can take a couple of minutes to complete from start to finish, and in the event of a tornado warning those couple of minutes may be critical. Another concern I had with the current procedure was the fact that it relied on the concept that the officer on duty would be available to act in response to the warning. If on a call in town, the officer may be able to quickly run out to the squad and set off the alert, but if the officer is out of the Village at the hospital or jail, or on a critical incident where he would be unable to leave the scene, he would be unable to sound the alert; thus leaving residents

without proper warning.

To be clear, the process that was in place worked well for years without issue; however our call volumes are continuously increasing which increases the likelihood that our officer would be unable to alert the public when necessary.

So in an effort to improve our warning system, this month we will be updating our current warning system software to streamline the processes that are in place and eliminate gaps that currently exist. The new software will automatically sound the alert sirens as soon as the National Weather Service issues a tornado warning for an area including Kewaskum. This will eliminate the need for any involvement by our officers and should increase the alert time with precious minutes needed to seek adequate shelter.

Another change residents will experience will be the testing procedures for our warning sirens. As I stated before, we currently only test the first Thursday of the month. I have found this to be inadequate because in the event we are experiencing issues with the system, we are unable to address those issues until next months testing. Therefore beginning in April we will be performing a daily growl test at noon, Monday through Friday. On Saturdays at noon, the sirens will perform a full test. There will be no testing done on Sundays. This will allow us to be confident that all of the components are working properly in the event of an actual tornado warning.

I am aware that some residents prefer not to have the sirens tested this often; however it is in the best interest of our community that we change the current testing procedure to one that ensures that the entire system is working properly at all times. There have been some communities that have explored the concept of eliminating sirens all together. This is not a concept I subscribe to. I believe the warning sirens are still a valuable tool that people rely upon in the event of a tornado warning, and due to that, it is imperative that we have an efficient, working system in place.


Annex building. I have been told by the owner of the Coffee Shop that no one can park in their parking spaces if they are not customers and no over night parking.

## NOTICE TO ALL WASHINGTON COUNTY DOG OWNERS

Pursuant to Section 174.052, Wisconsin Statutes, notice is hereby given to all owners of dogs in Washington County that dog licenses and rabies vaccinations are required.

Vaccination by a licensed veterinarian against rabies is required of all dogs (Section 95.21(2)) within 30 days after the dog reaches 4 months of age and revaccinated within one year after the initial vaccination. The owner of a dog shall have the dog revaccinated against rabies by a veterinarian when the certificate expires or within three (3) years of previous vaccination. The certificate of rabies vaccination must be presented to the collecting official before a dog license may be issued.

All dogs five (5) months of age or older require a license. The minimum license fee for neutered males or spayed females is \$3.00, upon presentation of evidence attesting to the same, and \$8.00 for the unneutered male or unspayed female dog or one-half of these amounts if the dog became five (5) months of age after July 1, of the license year. The governing body of any town, village, or city may raise the minimum dog license tax. Any person who keeps multiple dogs or operates a kennel may apply for a multiple dog license. The fee is \$35.00 for twelve (12) dogs or less and additional \$3.00 for each dog in excess of twelve (12).

Dog licenses may be obtained from your local town, village or city treasurer or designee during the course of any given year. Dog owners should notify their treasurer if their dog is given away or has died, so that you will not be considered delinquent. An affidavit of death is available.

### PENALTY

Every owner of a dog 5 months of age or older who fails to obtain a license by April 1, will be assessed a late fee of \$5.00.

The Kewaskum Village Board, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First Street.

President Andy Pesch presided and called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. Board members present were Richard Laubach, Richard Knoebel, Dave Zehren, Andy Pesch, Dave Spenner, Kevin Scheunemann and Jim Hovland. Staff members present were Matt Heiser, Thomas Bishop, Dennis Aupperle and Stephanie Justmann. Members from the community were also present.

Notice of the meeting had been posted at the PNC Bank, Kewaskum Post Office and at the Municipal Building on February 12, 2015. Notice was also forwarded to the Village Board, Village Attorney, Village Engineer and the News Media.

The meeting was opened with a Moment of Silence and Pledge of Allegiance.

Motion by Dave Zehren to approve the minutes from the February 2, 2015 meeting with corrections, second by Richard Laubach. Voice vote, motion carried.

## Turned back by a spirited three-point barrage

The Kewaskum High boys basketball season ended its season with back-to-back overtime losses, but the 68-65 Division 3 regional defeat to Campbellsport on March 3 was a lot more painful than the one against Sheboygan Falls because the Indians held a 15-point lead with 6:00 to go.

"My heart is just broken," KHS coach Keith Traska said afterward pointing to missed free throws as a major reason the Indians lost the game and going so far as to say they were the bane of many of the team's losses.

"Free throws cost us a lot of games this year," Traska went on. "This was our seventh loss by one possession," a statistic that shows Kewaskum was close to having a 15-8 record instead of its actual 8-15.

Especially disappointing was the fact Kewaskum was up 60-57 with just four seconds to play after Josh Baker connected on a pair of free throws. Traska took a time out and told the players to foul before Campbellsport had the chance to put up another 3-point shot. Even with two free throws made by the Cougars, Kewaskum would still have been ahead by a point.

"We had a game plan in place to foul them," Traska said, "but two of our guys didn't hear the game plan."

CHS' Tanner Ramthun

took the inbound pass and dribbled the ball into the front court. When he got bottled up, he dished off to Koy Walsh, who swished a 3-point baseline jumper as time expired. Walsh's basket, only his eighth 3-pointer this season, tied the game at 60-all.

In the OT, Walsh continued his heroics by putting the Cougars up 62-60 and Ty Schmidt hit a big three, the 14th of the game,

Kewaskum's Charlie Witek, who scored a game-high 30 points and added at least a dozen rebounds, had a look at tying the game in the final seconds, but the shot was off the mark and the raucous Campbellsport fans began to celebrate.

"He has been leading us all year. We wanted the ball in his hands," Traska said of Witek. "I'm proud of him. I'm proud of the development he's made this year" both as a player and a person.

Mike (Prochnow), Charlie, Josh and Brady (Hanson) played really well," Traska said, noting Hanson "was a great threat around the basket," while Baker chipped in with nine points and was tough defensively.

Prochnow's effort also was key as he hit some clutch threes toward his 13 points and contributed some big assists, including two long passes to Witek near the end of regulation, which resulted in easy baskets.

"I'm proud of the physical effort, but the mental effort wasn't there," Traska said.

Ramthun led the Cougars with 20 points on the strength of 10 points in the fourth quarter and five, 3-pointers on the night. Jordan Dreikosen, another of the CHS sharpshooters, added 17 points.

"They had 14 threes and most of them were contested," Traska said. While he was well aware of Dreikosen, Ramthun and Schmidt, Trenton Buerger, a senior who just played one game this year before the regional, and Walsh had several shots not many people could have expected. The latter two chipped in with seven points apiece.

On Friday night, Campbellsport was routed by No. 1 seed, Ripon, by a score of 62-32. Dreikosen was the only Cougar in double figures. He had 14 points.

## Seventh place finish is OK with Kewaskum bowling coach

Try as they might, members of the Kewaskum High bowling team were unable to successfully defend their Wisconsin High School Bowling Club D-II state champion this past weekend. Still, the Indians did finish among the top 10 teams, taking seventh with a total of 2,933 pins in the Baker Format competition held in Madison and Sun Prairie.

"That's not what we were aiming for," Coach Art Marquardt said Monday, reporting, "We bowled well, but we didn't score well."

Consistency was a problem for the Kewaskum bowlers, who struggled in a couple games and right on target in others. In the third round, the Indians started with a 246, which was the ninth best total in the entire tournament and than never reached 200 again in the remaining four games.

Marquardt said after the second game in that round, "We lost our contact with the pocket. It was a struggle" and as a result, the Indians were unable to ad-

vance to Sunday's ladder finals for the top five teams.

Representing Kewaskum were varsity bowlers, including Hunter Demmon, Kenny Ellis, Jake Neuenfeld, Michael Krahn, Max Heiser, Austin Grichtmeier and Blake Lorenz. Lorenz is a sophomore, and all the others are seniors.

Freshmen Jack Taylor, Cody Marks and Robbie Walls also went to Madison with the team.

Marquardt, who is assisted by Kyle Wesenberg, thought his bowlers "seemed pretty well focused coming in," and he was proud of their efforts, saying, "They did an outstanding job. The seniors went out on a good note."

In addition to bowling with the team, Ellis had qualified as an individual but had an off day, bowling a 489 series, which was good for 89th in the field.

"His shot didn't match up with the conditions he bowled in," Marquardt said, indicating some of the problem for Ellis was the way the lanes were oiled.

The KHS girls placed 10th out of 13 teams in their competition, which was won by Wit-

tenberg-Birnamwood, which came in with a sizzling 2,871 pins.

Kewaskum had 2,455 pins, including a team-high 236 in Game 13, which was the second highest game in the tournament, second only to Wittenberg-Birnamwood's 245.

Team members included Samantha Janesch, Rosa Rudzitis, Alexis Phillips, Breanna Mielkie, Abbey Hardy, Mikayla Bigelow and Allison Thill.

Coach Janesch said the sophomore Hardy came in with the highest individual percentage, 76 percent, on the team, meaning "Seventy six percent of the time she had either a strike or a spare." Next high was the senior Rudzitis with 75 percent and Phillips, a junior, finished at 70 percent.

"We averaged 163 (pins per game) for the weekend, which is higher than what we had during the regular season," Janesch said.

Kewaskum did not have any girls who qualified for the state individual competition this year.


