



Driven to Better Health Night a huge success

The Kewaskum community came out in large numbers to attend the first ever Driven To Better Health Night held at Kewaskum High School on March 12. The purpose of the evening was to help raise awareness about how important it is to challenge kids to make healthy eating and physical activity a part of their daily life. The Kewaskum School District has already made a positive impact on the kids in the community by committing to many programs such as the nutrition program, wellness program, Fuel Up to Play 60 program, and most recently the Donald Driver Driven to Better Health program. This night was one of the many activities the schools are doing to help win a potential future visit from Donald Driver, former Green Bay Packer. Driver believes, "It's our job to help kids develop healthy lifestyle habits they can use their entire lives."

The first part of the evening was a cook off contest featuring the school's and Geidel's Piggly Wiggly's "veggie of the month", broccoli. Six teams competed. The Fuel Up To Play 60 KMS team made a Packer tropical smoothie. The KHS/KCA Hero team made broccoli and cheese smasher potatoes. Thrice Baked, a team of school district employees, created a zesty chicken and broccoli dish with orange sauce. Regal Ware Rocks made up of a Kewaskum Middle School FACE class and Joe Swanson and Tracy Pearson from Regal Ware presented their broccoli mac and cheese. There were two winners selected during the evening. All those in attendance were able to pick the "People's Choice Award". That went to the Kewaskum Boys and Girls Club and Wellspring Educational Center team who made veggie kabobs with dipping sauce.

Success on the mats for KIWC

Ten members of the Kewaskum Indians Wrestling Club took first places and another six finished second in the annual Kewaskum Youth Wrestling Tournament held on March 7.

Leading the parade of Kewaskum champions was young Eli Ogi, who pinned all four of his opponents on the way to taking the title for 50-55 pound athletes who were born from 2008-2010. Ogi's fastest pin came in his final match when he put Canton Oelke's (Campbellsport Wrestling Club) shoulders to the mat in a mere 14 seconds (:14).

Justin Rhoads, one of the coaches

for Kewaskum, said the tournament went well, except that "It got a little long" because this year the upper grades wrestled on just three mats instead of four. "Other than that we had a good tournament," Rhoads said, reporting the event drew 270 athletes from Kewaskum, West Bend, Slinger, Port Washington, Germantown, Campbellsport and as far away as Wabeno.

Kewaskum had five champions in the class for wrestlers born from 2000 to 2001. Winners included: Nathan Droese, 3-0 in the 89-92-pound class; Tanner Goeman, 4-0 at 114-124; Eric Bauer, 4-0 at 118-130; Sam Larson, 3-0 at 136-152; and Alex Deheck, 4-1 115-124.

Other champions from Kewaskum were: 2002-'03 — Mason Pomeroy, 3-0 at 95-100; 2006-'07 — Brent Krejcarek, 4-0 at 50-53; Mitchell Becker, 4-0 at 63-68; 2008-'10 — James Racer, 3-0 at 50-55.

Those taking seconds were: 2002-'03 — Nick Larson, 62-70; Kannon Muckerheide, 72-79; 2006-'07 — Elijah McChain, 51-56; 2008-'10 — Alex Jacobson, 54-58; and Xane Kleinke, 65-68.

The West Bend Wildcats won the team title, according to Rhoads, who said the host team doesn't usually participate in the team competition.






Both Marquette and St. John's University accepted her, and she was offered scholarships as well. Being accepted to top ranked colleges had been her goal since 7th grade. However, this was not easily accomplished. As a child, she had struggles growing up, but these struggles seemed to have awakened her and pushed her to set higher goals. Now she dreams are becoming a reality and how she made this happen could be inspirational for all of us.

Hastings attended Kewaskum High School as a freshman. She was a great student with excellent grades, and loved playing on the volleyball team; just being a kid. At this point, she hoped volleyball might even help her get into college. Then her knees started to cause her excruciating pain and she could no longer play volleyball. Soon, the pain kept her from being able to sit in a desk all day at school or even ride the bus.

Due to her knee problems, she transferred to the Kewaskum Career Academy (KCA). KCA just started to open new doors for her, when she received the news from her doctor that she would need an operation in order for her knees to get better. Unfortunately, the first operation didn't help much, but almost a year later, the doctors tried something different, which gave Imogen more mobility and freedom from the pain.

During those years, Hastings was given new hope at KCA. She was able to explore classes that were more relevant to her future major. She took all of the mathematics classes that were offered at the KCA; such as Algebra, Geometry, Algebra 2, Pre Calculus, Calculus, and is currently taking Intro. to College Algebra and is further strengthening her education and prepare her for placement tests. She also took Street Law and Anatomy and Physiology, which ignited her passion for these fields and accelerated her hard work and motivation. Currently, she is still undecided about her major, but is considering criminal justice or possibly the medical field.

Toward the end of her sophomore year, she began searching for colleges based on location

Soon, St. John's University sent word that the admissions letters would arrive in about four weeks; for Hastings the wait was unbearable. At the two week mark, she started checking the mailbox every day to see if she received the letter. When she finally received her letter, it was right before Christmas. Talk about a good Christmas present!

Hastings knew college was an important part of her future, and a respected education at a highly regarded university would help her get a successful job. She is definitely going to need a good job so she can afford that penthouse suite somewhere in a big city, like she wants. She quotes, "I made it my mission to look up this information," meaning that she looked up the information on colleges and her future, so that she can stand on her own two feet for the rest of her productive life. 



Warden happened to step out of the mill some two hundred feet away, heard screams and rushed to the dam where he discovered the girls' plight.

He leaped into the water and managed after a hard strug-

gle to bring the two Brayman girls to shore. The Drews girl had sunk the third time when Warden dove for her, bringing her to the shore where she was revived.



Watzig was Indians' main man

After winning the Eastern Wisconsin Conference title at 195 pounds, placing first in the D-2 regional hosted by Lomira and finishing 11th in the rugged Oshkosh Lourdes On the Waters Tournament, junior Ben Watzig was an obvious choice as the MVP of this year's Kewaskum High wrestling team.

Watzig, who finished with a record of 28-11, and 12 other regulars were honored recently at the annual Awards Program.

"Ben was the big award winner. He had the most take-downs (45) and was our MVP," KHS coach Scott Rhoads said recently, indicating Watzig reached most of his goals except earning a spot in the D-2 state tournament after losing his first match in the Milwaukee Lutheran sectional and not placing.

Rhoads was pleased with Watzig's improvement but said, "He knows now he has to concentrate on his moves and position" to earn that trip to Madison.

Other individual awards presented included: Most Improved — Seth Bartelt and Dalton Espitia; Pinner's Award — Mike Bryngelson; Rookie of the Year — Travis Trudeau; and Tri-Captains — Jake Keller, Trudeau and Watzig.

About Bartelt and Espitia, Rhoads said, "They're both brand new wrestlers, but they both busted their butts more than any wrestlers I had."

Rhoads said Trudeau, a junior, moved to Kewaskum from Rhinelander where he wres-

ted for one year. He improved greatly from December to the tournament season where he was a regional champion and ended up at 16-19.

Watzig and Trudeau were also selected by their teammates to serve as captains for the 2015-'16 season.

Bryngelson had 15 pins on the year. "We counted the JV pins, too," Rhoads said.

Letters were presented to the following: seniors — Keller (10-23), Max Hardy (7-6) and Garrett Buth (7-3); juniors — Watzig, Trudeau, Eric Doll (19-14), Cole Rahlf (17-16), and Danny Seitz (12-20); sophomores — Jacob Heberer (22-9), Alex Vogt (20-13), Espitia (6-9), Bryngelson (8-6), and freshman Adam Bruss (15-11).

Rhoads said injuries to Hardy and Buth kept them from having successful seasons. Both deserved letters, according to the second-year head coach, who said, "I was going with 10 victories for the other kids."

Kewaskum finished a disappointing fourth (4-3) in the EWC and finished with an overall record of 9-9. The Indians also struggled at the major invitations, like the Marty Loy in Fond du Lac, where they came up with just nine points and the On The Waters, where only Watzig advanced to the second day.

Rhoads indicated he wants to participate in more team dual tournaments next season. They will return to the Slinger Gunslinger meet but will add a team tournament the following weekend. "The really big change will be we're not returning to the On The Waters,

but will be going to the Northern Exposure in Merrill. We're guaranteed eight team matches in two days."

"We want our kids to get their record numbers up where they should be," Rhoads said, indicating many wrestlers in the state end up with 50 matches, while Kewaskum's are in the 30s.

The change in conference, from the EWC to the Eastern Central Conference, will mean the loss of Two Rivers and Sheboygan Falls, the top two EWC teams, along with Kiel and New Holstein, which will be replaced by Ripon, Berlin, Winneconne and Kettle Moraine Lutheran.

"Our new conference ... some of our teams are quite the opposite (of Two Rivers and Sheboygan Falls). Kettle Moraine Lutheran only had four wrestlers," Rhoads said, adding, "We still have Campbellsport, which is good."

Rhoads said at the banquet, he focused on the fact five wrestlers who competed in the sectional will be returning, and, "We're going to get about 10 eighth graders. We should have a full team and a pretty solid lineup."

Ripon, Berlin and Winneconne are coming from the Eastern Valley Conference, which did not have a conference wrestling tournament in recent years. That will be changed in the new conference, according to Kewaskum High Athletic Director Jason Piittmann, who said recently, "We will be having a tournament. The ADs at those schools are excited at the prospect of being in one again."

With three players, Waupun's Mason Domask, Ethan Wilman of Two Rivers and Kiel's Carter Voelker, all unanimous picks on the Eastern Wisconsin Conference boys basketball team, there were only two other spots open in the balloting that took place recently.

Domask led the EWC in scoring with a 25.7 points per game (ppg.) average, while Wilman and Voelker finished 2-3 at 23.2 and 19.8, respectively.

Kewaskum's 6-foot-3 Charlie Witek had the credentials to fill one of those spots — he was fourth in scoring at 18.5 — but he just missed making the first team as he was edged out by the league's No. 5 scorer, Jordan Dreikosan of Campbellsport and Devin Strupp of New Holstein, the only sophomore on the team. Voelker is a junior and the others are seniors.

Unique as it may seem, all five are listed as guards.

Kewaskum coach Keith Traska pushed hard for Witek to be on the first team, citing the fact, "Head to head, he out-scored eight of the top ten." The lone exceptions were Wilman and Zach Cain of Plymouth. His highest output in EWC play came early when he hit 38

points vs. Waupun, the eventual EWC champion.

Domask also was the league's top rebounder, with a mark of 8.9, while in this category, Witek was 10th with a 5.5 average, according to Traska, who said, He averaged 2.5 steals, which put him third in the conference."

While most basketball fans concentrate on offensive scoring, Traska emphasized, "From last year to this year, he (Witek) improved his defense as well."

Traska fully expects Witek and others on his team will be even better next season. "Oh yeah, he can keep building on what he's done this year," Traska said of Witek, adding, "The players around him will also improve."

Joining Witek on the second unit were Cain, who is also an excellent baseball player for the Panthers, a pair from Kiel, guard Trenton Nickel and forward Austin Goehring, and Brayden Peterson, Two Rivers' point guard.

Six others were given honorable mention, including another Kiel player, meaning the Raiders had four of their players selected among the top 16 players but somehow managed to finish in a tie for third place with an 8-6 record.

Conversely, Waupun,

which won the title with a 13-1 mark, only had Domask voted in to the three all-conference squads.

The varsity squad recently held a season-ending gathering. At that time, Traska announced he lettered all nine varsity players, including seniors Corey Stern and Dean Schlice; juniors Witek, Michael Prochnow, Jason Hanson, Josh Baker, Devyn Zillmer and Trent Griesemer; and sophomore Brady Hanson, who had several good games at the end of the year.

Witek was the team's leading scorer and 3-point shooter with 406 points and 26, while Jason Hanson had 174 points and 131 rebounds. Prochnow was third in scoring with 142, followed by Brady Hanson and Baker at 113 and 105. Then came Schlice at 74.

The team finished at 3-11 in the EWC and 8-15 overall, several wins below the goal set at the start of the season. The most wins Kewaskum has had in the last 25+ year was 11 back in 1983, according to Traska, who said, "Our goal was to have 11 wins, but we lost seven games by three points (or less) or in overtime ... We couldn't get over the close games."

UW-WC students named to All Conference Team

Three UW-Washington County student athletes were named to the Wisconsin Collegiate Conference (WCC) Team in basketball. Selected to First-team All-conference was Evan Rathke; Second team was Tim Pridemore and Honorable mention was Katelyn Laatsch.

This is the second year that Rathke was selected for the WCC first team — all conference. Last season, he also was named the WCC Player of the Year. He will be transferring to UW-Platteville in the fall and playing for their team next season. Team captain while at Random Lake High School and at UW-WC, Rathke "is an absolutely amazing human being and an excellent student with tremendous character" according to UW-WC basketball coach Steve Murphy. "Though soft spoken, he is always very positive and is highly respected by teammates and opponents alike for his work ethic and demeanor." Rathke was the all-time leading shot blocker in high school, and he averaged nearly 2 per game this season for UW-WC. Conference stats: (9 games played): 46% FG, 55% FT, 13.7 PPG, 5.8 RPG, 13 assists, 32 blocked shots, 20 steals, and 1 turnover per game.

A graduate of Hartford Union High School, Tim Pridemore, "is a highly versatile athlete that can play any position but he excels at point guard and shooting guard" according to coaching Murphy. A very hard worker, Tim "gives every ounce of effort he has in

every game - willing to sacrifice his body by driving hard to the hoop and sometimes gets knocked to the floor, but he always gets right back up quickly and immediately gets himself back into the action." Conference stats: (all 10 games): 45% FG, 75% FT, 14.4 PPG, 6.9 RPG, 23 assists, 8 blocked shots, 22 steals, 14 3-pointers

A graduate of Hartford Union High School, this was Katelyn Laatsch's first year playing for UW-WC. According to basketball coach Angela Rintelman, she is the "type of player every coach dreams of - displaying hard work and high effort - both on and off the court." A nursing major, Laatsch made the Dean's list with High Honors this past fall. She also led her team in many different categories. Out of the nine games played, she had a total of 166 points for an average of 18.4/game. Kate had a total of 128 rebounds, giving her an average of 14.2/game. She also had 24 blocked shots. Voted co-captain of the team, Kate's presence on the court was known. When Kate has completed her prerequisites courses at UW-WC, she plans on transferring to either UW-Madison or The University of Minnesota - Twin Cities and continue her education by completing a Bachelor of Science in Nursing Degree.




