## Area fire departments respond to town of Farmington chimney fire



The Boltonville Fire Department and Washington County Sheriff's Department were dispatched to a chimney fire in the Town of Farmington late Tuesday afternoon. At approximately 4:22 p.m., the owner of a home located at 8468 Wesley Ct. reported a possible chimney fire in the residence. Upon their arrival, emergency responders observed a working chimney fire that appeared to have spread into the home's attic. The Boltonville Fire Department was assisted at the scene by the Fillmore, Kewaskum, Newburg, and West Bend Fire Departments. The exact cause of the fire is not known at this time and the matter remains under investigation by deputies and fire officials.

## Four move on to Madison

Four young athletes will be representing the Kewaskum Indian Wrestling Club at the annual WWF (Wisconsin Wrestling Federation) Kids Folkstyle State Tournament that will be held this Friday and Saturday, March 27-28 at the Alliant Energy Center in Madison.

Making return trips are champions Eric Bauer and Alex Deheck, both eighth graders at the Kewaskum Middle School. Joining them are classmates Kyle Bath and Braden Maertz. To qualify for state, wrestlers were required to place first or second in their weight classes at one of the eight regionals. The Kewaskum contingent participated at Lakeland College near Howards Grove.

"As far as the bigger kids, all of them had a chance," Justin Rhoads, one of the co-coaches for the club, said Sunday.

Bauer, who has qualified for state since he was old enough to wrestle in it, had a rather easy road to winning the title at 120 pounds for athletes born in 2000-'01. There were just five wrestlers in his bracket, and the top two advance.

Still, Bauer had an impressive outing, pinning all three of his opponents, including Horicon's Bradan Zamorano in the finals. He pinned Zamorano in 3:48.

"I just saw parts of some of his matches," Rhoads said, adding, "I think he's been in the finals the last three years and lost all three."

Deheck showed plenty of grit as he was one of 14 wrestlers in the

## Village of Kewaskum prepares for summer fun

2015 swim passes will be on sale at the Municipal Building from March 1 through May 31 during regular office hours. Season passes will be sold for a 15% discount off the regular price.

From June 1 thru June 3, season passes will be sold at the Kiwanis Bath House at a 10% discount between the hours of 11 a.m. and 3 p.m.

From June 4 through June 7 season passes will be sold at the Kiwanis Bath House at a 5% discount during the hours of 11 a.m. and 3 p.m.

### Swim Lessons

A special discount will be given to all persons signing up for swim lessons during the week of June 8 through June 13. Registration will be held from 11 a.m. through 3 p.m. at the Kiwanis Bath House on each day, June 8 through June 13.

In order to sign up for swimming lessons, all participants must have a season pass, either individual or included with a family pass. A season pass receipt will need to be shown at the time of registration.

There will be one five-week session beginning Monday, July 13 and ending Friday, August 14.

Swim lessons will be held Monday, Wednesday and Friday. Make-up days will be held Tuesday and Thursday.

Swim lessons are offered only to season pass holders. In addition, resident season pass holders will pay a fee of \$12 per child for swim lessons and non-resident season pass holders will pay a fee of \$20 per child.

### Opening of the pool

The Kiwanis Community Park Pool's regular hours will begin Sunday, June 14. Limited hours of operation will begin Saturday, June 6 - Saturday, June 13. Limited hours on these dates will depend on the weather.

In the Memories column this week, an artist's rendition of the L. Rosenheimer Malt and Grain buildings was featured. When they were built in the 1880s by Rosenheimer Brothers, there must have been an added sense of job security for the residents of Kewaskum as the facility pictured was quite large. The business was incorporated in 1891 and that is when the name L. Rosenheimer Malt and Grain was adopted. The brothers chose the name to honor their father, the first L. Rosenheimer. The group of buildings included a large elevator, the malt house, kilns, and three large storage tanks were used for storing malt. In September of 1911, the elevator burned to the ground with some damage to the malt house. The elevator was rebuilt to the south of its

original location. At the time of this printing 25 years ago, Glacier Processing occupied the building. The building has since been razed.

Maertz, who also represents Domination Wrestling, received a bye, then posted successive 9-0 and 6-0 decisions before losing a tough 1-0 decision to Berlin's Preston Morgan. Because he had already defeated Tristan Hammen of Ram Wrestling, Maertz got second place.

While those three experience elation, there was heartbreak for another of the eighth

graders, Sam Larson who finished third at 145 pounds. Larson started out with a pair of wins by decision to reach the finals where he lost a 14-3 decision, and in the wrestleback, he was edged out 8-6.

Another KIWC member, Nick Deheck (born in 2004-'05) suffered the same fate, taking third at 72 pounds. Deheck won his first three matches, two by pin, before losing 6-0 in the finals and 7-3 in the wrestleback for second place.

Other participants in the competition at Lakeland included: Nathan Droese, Clayton Pomeroy, Nick Larson, Jadon Rhoads, Mason Pomeroy, Kannon Muckerheide, Nick Stautz, Stone Pomeroy, Brent Carek, Elijah McChain, and Jayce Rhoads.

One girl, Brielle Scoles, represented KIWC, competing at 75 pounds where she won a match by a score of 11-3, then forfeited her other two matches. Rhoads said the girls wrestled in a different gym, so he had no idea what happened to her.



## Family has to come first, outgoing coach says

Citing the need to spend more time with his children, Keith Traska has resigned his position as head boys basketball coach at Kewaskum High School.

Traska, who held the position for three years after coming from West Bend West, submitted his letter to administration last Thursday.

"I want to be very clear about why I am not returning. I am not returning to coach because I need more time with my family. My kids are three, five and eight years old. I want to spend more time with my kids, while they still want to spend time with me," Traska said in a letter to the athletic department and the community, indicating the basketball season is "incredibly long and includes many late nights, due to games, practices, scouting and other obligations. This past season there were 42 days I didn't see my kids awake. Those days were the toughest."

One night while he was home, Traska said his daughter asked him when he would be home for dinner again. "This was heartbreaking for

me," he said.

Traska said there was no question he enjoyed coaching at Kewaskum, calling it "a challenging and life changing opportunity. I appreciate being trusted to run the program and do everything I could to help make our team competitive in our conference, but more importantly, to help our players learn important life lessons."

Traska's Indians won seven games each of his first two years, and this past season they won eight, just missing a double-digit win season after losing their final two games, including one in overtime.

Researching KHS basketball for the past nearly three decades, Traska found that the most wins in a season by a boys team was 11 back in 1983. "Our goal was to beat 11 games," Traska said, but the Indians came up short in many close games. "We had seven losses by three points or less or in overtime," he said.

Kewaskum finished the year with a 8-15 mark, including a 3-11 record in the tough Eastern Wisconsin Conference team where they were tied with Campbellsport for

seventh place. Traska points at the 76-56 decision over Cedar Grove-Belgium as the Indians' best game of the year. The toughest losses included the 68-65 overtime loss to Campbellsport and the one point 65-64 loss to Waupun on a tip-in at the buzzer in the Indians' second EWC game of the season. Waupun went on to win the EWC title.

"Working with the players in our program has been great. I really enjoyed getting to know the players and parents in the program and community. It has been a lot of fun running camps, practices and open gyms. The future of Kewaskum basketball is bright and has a lot of potential. We will be returning seven varsity players with a lot of playing experience. The freshman team had a solid year, and there are a couple of JV players ready to move up," Traska said, noting the 6th-8th grade teams have been showing a lot of promise.

Concerning what Kewaskum players must improve on to become more competitive in conference play, which next year will include powers such as Ripon and Kettle Moraine Lutheran,

Traska said, "I would like to encourage all of our aspiring basketball players and coaches at all levels to focus on a few things: shooting form, with one hand only, use the other only as a guide; dribbling with either hand and keeping the eyes up to see the court, help side defense, and boxing out. These four things have been our biggest struggle and what

has kept us from becoming a great team in terms of wins and losses."

Traska plans to remain at the high school where he teaches advanced mathematics.


