Farmington Elementary Destination Imagination Team is State Bound

Bauer, Maertz bring home medals

It wasn't easy, but Kewaskum's Eric Bauer and Braden Maertz showed a lot of resolve at the Wisconsin Wrestling Federation Folkstyle Championship held over the weekend in Madison. Both came home with third place medals.

"It was a good time," Justin Rhoads, one of the co-coaches of the KIWC (Kewaskum Indians Wrestling Club), said Sunday night. "We've got some dedicated wrestlers."

Bauer and Maertz took different paths to reach the victory stand.

Bauer started off with back-to-back wins over Ryan Applebee of the Tri-County Wrestling Club and Noah Dakouras of the Askren Wrestling Academy.

Applebee was leading 2-0 at the end of two periods, thanks to a reversal in the second, but Bauer roared back to pin him in 4:05.

Against Dakouras, Bauer was in control most of the way, winning a 7-0 decision.

In the semis, Bauer was defeated by Stratford's Derek Marten, the eventual champion, who used a reversal early in the second period and a penalty point late in the third toward a 3-0 shutout victory.

"They called clasped hands behind the back," Rhoads said, indicating, Bauer "was pretty upset at that point."

Bauer, an eighth grader, wrestling at 120 pounds, was able to regroup and win his next two matches, starting with a 6-2 win over Garrett Jeanquart of Luxemburg-Casco and then defeating Andy Poetzi of Medford by a score of 5-3.

"He was real strong in that (final) match ... used some good crab riding," Rhoads said.

Maertz, wrestling at 110 pounds for those born in 2002-03 '03, went 5-1 in the two day-event, and his road to third stated with a 1-0 loss to Cold

Destination Imagination is growing in the Kewaskum School District. This year, seven teams took to the challenge of using their imagination to solve problems and competed in the regional tournament in Germantown.

The Farmington Fighters chose the technical challenge "Creature Feature". At the tournament there is also an Instant Challenge which requires the team to engage in quick, creative and critical thinking on the spot and produce a solution in about five-eight minutes.

After seeing many of the other team's creatures and scenery, their hopes were dashed for going to state. In fact, they did not even expect to place. They had eight teams competing at the challenge and they only announce third second and first place.

When they said, "in third place is Farmington Fighters", students almost fell off the bleachers. The kids jumped up and ran to the stage and got their medals put on. They took third place of eight teams. The group had the second highest instant challenge score. It did not seem to faze them one bit that they were not going to state. The fact they placed was really amazing.

Nikki Maramonte led the second FES team, "Silver Bucks". They choose the Fine Arts challenge called "Feary Tales". There were 12 or 13 teams competing in this challenge. They did not perform their solution until later in the afternoon, therefore, it was a long day of waiting. Their scenery was a bit challenging - but the must have judges found it quite unique. As with Farmington Fighters they did not expect the team to place or go to state.

Also, during their Instant Challenge all seven of their team members participated - which is quite unusual. The appraiser actually complemented them on their team work after they completed their Instant Challenge. As the announcers read who took third place in their challenge, the kids put all their hands together in a circle. It was not them, as they expected. Then they announced, "second-place Silver Bucks" and the kids jumped up and screamed.

Team Silver Bucks is advancing to the state competition in mid-April.

The teams brought two trophies back to Farmington Elementary School as part of Destination Imagination 2015.

Four vie for three seats in school board election

The Kewaskum Board of Education could change or stay the same depending on how voters feel at the polls Tuesday. Even if it stays the same many of the incumbents might be new to voters after two were appointed to the board after resignations that occurred after last spring's election.

Currently open are three seats on the board. Incumbents Craig Staffin, Mark Sette and Jim Leister are receiving a challenge from Bradley Petersen. Staffin and Sette were the only candidates to respond to requests for information on their candidacy.

Craig Staffin, 30, an Information Technologies Consultant from the town of Wayne is seeking his first elected term on the board. He replaced Grace Mueller who resigned her term last year.

Staffin stated he felt the primary responsibility of the school board is to provide strategic guidance to the administration of the district. The board should not be involved in the daily operations of a district. Rather they should be the active conduit between the community and their wishes and how to implement those within the school district.

Staffin's plans for the future focus around technology and its ability to give our children the same opportunities or better than a child who goes to a considerably larger

district.

"For instance what if we would be able to offer the ability for our Spanish speaking students to actually be taught by a teacher who lives in Spain once a week? Or allow our English teacher to co-teach an English class in a foreign country once a week. These are just some of the possibilities that will allow our children to have the widest opportunities possible before they leave our school system," he stated.

Mark Sette, 46, of Kewaskum is a Detective with the Washington County Sheriff's Office. This is also his first time meeting voters as he was appointed after the resignation of Heather Oelhafen.

Sette says his goal in being a member of the board is to help continue moving the district in a positive direction.

"The current board has a unified vision for the future of our schools. We are all working towards making our schools a premier learning environment for all students. We continue to promote our schools and our students and we will keep working to make our district even better than it is today," he explained.

He feels the board is being

fiscally responsible during this period of tight budgets and funding cuts all while continuing a high level of quality education.

"We are currently running on a balanced budget due to the diligence of the board and our positive working relationship with district administration. As we move into the coming school year we will face additional challenges as a result of the Governor's proposed cuts to school aid. I am confident we will work through those challenges and continue to provide an excellent learning environment for our children," he concluded.

Jim Leister, 49, from the Town of Wayne is employed with Ingersol-Rand. He had previously served on the board from 2005-2011. He came back on the board in 2012.

Bradley Petersen, 18 of the Town of Scott is a student at Kewaskum High School.

Please note- information about candidates Leister and Petersen were taken from a prior interview and social media.

Wisniewski of LAW (La Crosse Area Wrestling).

From then on Maertz was perfect, winning five times in a row and never giving up a single point. He defeated Jaden Salmieri of Whitewater, 8-0, Easton Schraepfer of Pectonica/Argyle 7-0, Brayden Richardson of Marshfield, 4-0, and then ended up having to wrestle Wisniewski again and beat him 3-0.

In the battle for third, it was Maertz topping Preston Morgan of the Berlin Wrestling Club, 1-0.

"He should have been in the finals," Rhoads said of Maertz, noting he was "a little flat-footed" in the first match vs. Wisniewski, then came back to manhandle him later in the tournament.

Alex Deheck, wrestling at 115 pounds, had a good start on Friday night, topping Jamar Wertjes of Necedah, 9-5 in the opening round before losing to the eventual runner-up, Kevin Meicher of the Middleton Area Wrestling Team.

Deheck suffered a cut lip in the first match, and Rhoads said, indicating the medical staff talked about him needing stitches before getting they were able to get the bleeding stopped so he was able to continue.

Deheck posted his second win in the wrestleback, outscoring Maguire Fitzgerald of the Boscobel Wrestling Club, 6-4, but he lost his next match against Leonard Kiser of KWA Bulldogs, 7-1 and was eliminated from the competition.

Kewaskum's fourth state representative was Kyle Bath (2,000-'01), wrestled at 135 pounds and lost his first two matches. Bath was pinned by Chase Beinform of Boscobel in 4:30 and then lost a 7-2 decision to Drew Torres of Montello.

"We had a solid team of about 30 to 35 wrestlers," Rhoads said, reporting the KIWC will hold its annual banquet on Saturday, April 11.

The Cross is Drawing You

Keepers of statistics tell us that Easter is the most attended church service of the entire year. Churches are overflowing with people decked out in their new clothes to reflect the new life Jesus Christ purchased for each one of us.

We were slaves, but He bought our lives from the destructive master who controlled our every movement. That slave master caused us to do every evil thing imaginable, including wrong things that didn't seem so evil. Jesus held liberty out to us. He made the way for our emancipation and the opportunity for turnaround. All we have to do to receive the gift He offers is believe.

There is no payback; no debt to be cancelled. Jesus paid that debt for our lives the day He gave His life on the Cross. It has been called "The Great Exchange" - His life for all of ours. Even though it seems like a pretty uneven exchange, Jesus willingly participated. His followers tried to talk Him out of it, but He was destined from before His birth for this transaction. It had already been planned; just like your life had been planned before your birth. (If you want to look that promise up, you can find it in Jeremiah 29:11 or Psalm 139:16.)

It was not just for you or me, but for everyone who will believe. Jesus allowed Himself to be sacrificed on the Cross at Calvary even for those who do not yet believe. The event of the Cross continues to draw upon the hearts of all those who hear about it: How could this be that someone would give His life for

mine? Of what value am I that Jesus would die in my place? How can all the awful things I've done in my life be erased by the death of one man?

It wasn't merely the physical death of a man on a cross which took place. In the gospel account, we are told that following Jesus' last breath on the Cross the barrier between God and man was ripped apart. There was that much power in the sacrifice of His life! No longer would the High Priest be required to take our sins to God once a year with the blood of goats and bulls on the Day of Atonement. Now we could come to God ourselves to confess our sins and be washed clean with the Blood of the Lamb of God, who is Jesus Christ, the Son of God. It was a onetime exchange for all time and all people.

During the three days Jesus' body lay in the grave after His death, He went to obliterate our enemy's power over us. No longer would we have to fear death because Jesus' sacrifice (called atonement or propitiation) bought our freedom from sin and death. Once that was accomplished, God the Father raised Jesus from death.

Every Easter we commemorate Jesus' resurrection - He was dead and now He is alive! You will often see Him portrayed wearing shining garments following His resurrection. He is a radiant brilliance that draws us to Himself like a moth to a flame. We celebrate His overcoming the grave and His gift of freedom to us. We desire to draw closer to Him in order to learn more of His promises about how to live the new life He purchased for us.

When we read in Genesis 1:26 that we were created in the image and likeness of God, that does not merely refer to the outside form; it also includes inside - the heart. According to Merriam-Webster's dictionary, heart can be defined as the innermost character, feelings or inclinations of a person; the emotional or moral nature of a person.

As we draw closer, He is drawing us - coloring in the places that were vacant. He cements shut the fissures where we leaked, smoothes out the rough and dull spots, and refines all the impurities out of us. Every time we allow Him to draw us unto Himself, He is occupying more and more of the space within us that was created for Him. As we become more like Him, we begin to understand the power in that one day's event when Jesus gave His life in exchange for ours.

He died, but He rose again like a trailblazer going before us, hacking a path through the wickedness of this world for the rest of us to follow. Our ultimate destination is eternal life. Believe in this gift Jesus is offering you! Allow the experience of the Cross to draw a new portrait of you. Authorize the Cross, the emblem of Christ, to draw out of you more and more of what you were destined to become. The Cross is drawing you.



NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that at an election to be held in the several towns, villages, wards, and election districts of the State of Wisconsin, on Tuesday, April 7, 2015, the following question will be submitted to a vote of the people pursuant to law:

2015 ENROLLED JOINT RESOLUTION 2

To amend section 4 (2) of article VII of the constitution; relating to: election of chief justice (second consideration).

Whereas, the 2013 legislature in regular session considered a proposed amendment to the constitution in 2013 Senate Joint Resolution 57, which became 2013 Enrolled Joint Resolution 16, and agreed to it by a majority of the members elected to each of the two houses, which proposed amendment reads as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 4 (2) of article VII of the constitution is amended to read:

[Article VII] Section 4 (2) The chief justice of the supreme court shall be elected for a term of 2 years by a majority of the justices then serving on the court. The justice so designated as chief justice may, irrevocably, decline to serve as chief justice or resign as chief justice but continue to serve as a justice of the supreme court.

Now, therefore, be it resolved by the senate, the assembly concurring, That the foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution is agreed to by the 2015 legislature; and, be it further

Resolved, That the foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution be submitted to a vote of the people at the election to be held on the first Tuesday in April 2015; and, be it further

Resolved, That the question concerning ratification of the foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution be stated on the ballot as follows:

QUESTION 1: "Election of chief justice. Shall section 4 (2) of article VII of the constitution be amended to direct that a chief justice of the supreme court shall be elected for a two-year term by a majority of the justices then serving on the court?"

EXPLANATION

The Wisconsin constitution currently provides that the chief justice of the Wisconsin Supreme Court is its longest-serving member. The proposed constitutional amendment would instead select the chief justice through an election by a majority of the justices then serving on the Court.

A "yes" vote on this question would mean that the chief justice shall be elected for a term of two years by a majority of the justices then serving on the Wisconsin Supreme Court. The justice who is elected may decline to serve as chief justice or resign the position, but still continue to serve as a justice of the Wisconsin Supreme Court.

A "no" vote would mean that the longest-serving member of the Wisconsin Supreme Court serves as chief justice of the Court. The justice designated as chief justice may decline to serve as chief justice or resign the position, but still continue to serve as a justice of the Wisconsin Supreme Court.

Notice is hereby given of a spring election to be held in Washington County and a special partisan election to be held in the 20th State Senate District which is comprised of the Towns of Addison, Barton, Farmington, Hartford, Jackson, Kewaskum, Polk, Trenton, Wayne and West Bend; the Villages of Jackson, Kewaskum, Newburg and Slinger; the City of West Bend; and portions of the Village of Richfield and the City of Hartford in Washington County, on April 7, 2015, at which the officers named below shall be chosen. The names of the candidates for each office, whose nominations have been certified to or filed in this office, are given under the title of the office, each in its proper column, together with the questions submitted to a vote for a referendum, in the sample ballot below.

INFORMATION TO ELECTORS

Upon entering the polling place, an elector shall state his or her name and address and sign the poll book before being permitted to vote. If an elector is not registered to vote, an elector may register to vote at the polling place serving his or her residence, if the elector presents proof of residence in a form specified by law. Where ballots are distributed to electors, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot. Upon being permitted to vote, the elector shall retire alone to a voting booth and cast his or her ballot except that an elector who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the elector's minor child or minor ward. An election official may inform the elector of the proper manner for casting a vote, but the official may not in any manner advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

Where **optical scan** voting is used, the elector shall fill in the oval next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the elector shall write in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided and fill in the oval on the write-in line. On referendum questions, the elector shall fill in the oval next to "yes" if in favor of the question, or the elector shall fill in the oval next to "no" if opposed to the question.

Where **touch screen** voting is used, the elector shall touch the screen next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the elector shall type in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote. On referendum questions, the elector shall touch the screen next to "yes" if in favor of the question, or the elector shall touch the screen next to "no" if opposed to the question.

The vote should not be cast in any other manner. Not more than five minutes time shall be allowed inside a voting booth or machine. Sample ballots or other materials to assist the elector in casting his or her vote may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

If the elector spoils an optical scan ballot, he or she shall return

it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one elector. If the ballot has not been initialed by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the elector shall return it to the election official, who shall issue a proper ballot in its place. After casting his or her vote, the elector shall leave the voting booth, properly deposit the ballot and promptly leave the polling place. The elector may spoil a touch screen ballot at the voting station before the ballot is cast.

After an official **optical scan ballot** is marked, it shall be inserted in the security sleeve so the marks do not show. After casting his or her vote, the elector shall leave the booth, insert the ballot in the voting device and discard the sleeve, or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. The elector shall leave the polling place promptly. After an official **touch screen ballot** is cast, the elector shall leave the polling place promptly.

An elector may select an individual to assist in casting his or her vote if the elector declares to the presiding official that he or she is unable to read, has difficulty reading, writing or understanding English or that due to disability is unable to cast his or her ballot. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the elector's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the elector.


