

## Indians have big plans for the spring

If the Kewaskum High girls fast-pitch team could finish 16-9 without any seniors a year ago, it might be a good bet the Indians could have a 20-win season and challenge for the Eastern Wisconsin Conference title this spring.

The Indians are off to a good start, winning three of the four games they have played thus far and currently 1-0 in the EWC after a convincing 6-2 win over Sheboygan Falls on April 7.

In that game, sophomore letter winner Breana Trepes moved down 16 Falcons on strikes while walking four and giving us just two hits, which both came in the last inning.

"She pitched a great game," coach Jeff Gosse said about his ace.

The margin of victory could have been even better, according to Gosse, who said, "We left a ton of runners on base ... We just can't seem to get that clutch hit."

Trepes, an all-EWC selection last year, helped her own cause with a pair of hits.

On April 11, the Lady Indians traveled to Horicon for a tournament, finishing 1-1 with a solid 14-4 win over Kettle Moraine Lutheran, then losing a heartbreaking eight-inning, 2-1 loss to the host team.

"We scored pretty much every inning on them (KML)," Gosse said, reporting his team scored two runs in the first, two in the second, one in the third, five in the fourth and another four in the bottom of the fifth to end the game via the 10-run mercy rule.

Amanda Plachinski and Rebecca Strigenz are the latest recipients of the J.O. Reigle Scholarships awarded annually by Regal Ware, Inc. The scholarship program was established in 1963 in honor of Regal Ware's founder, the late J.O. Reigle. and Vickie Plachinski of Kewaskum, will attend UW-Platteville this fall to study Mechanical Engineering. She is a member of the National Honor Society, Executive Board Member of Student Government, and co-captain of the Cross Country Team. Other school activities include Track, Peers-4-Peers, and KEY Club. Amanda has helped the less fortunate in Champaign, IL and Twin Cities, MN through her participation in Catholic Heart Workcamp for the past three years. At the same time, she has been working as a cashier at Giedels' Piggly Wiggly, a Kitchen Worker at Paul's Auction Company, and a summer/substitute janitor for the Kewaskum School District. Her leisure time interests include running and painting.

Rebecca is the daughter of Deborah Strigenz of Kewaskum. She will major in Biology or Biomedical Sci-

ences and has narrowed her school choices to Marquette University, Creighton University, or the University of Wisconsin-Madison. Rebecca has served in leadership roles in National Honor Society, Peers-4-Peers, Spanish Club, Student Government Tennis, Soccer, and Badger Girls State. She has also been active in KEY Club. Her volunteer activities include service at the food pantry and the KEYS Walk/Run. Rebecca has worked as a beach attendant at the Kewaskum Kiwanis Park Pond, and has both officiated and taught soccer through the Kewaskum Youth Soccer Organization. Her hobbies include reading, tennis, soccer, and knitting.

Each student will receive \$4,500 per year for each of her four-year college programs.

## Chief's Corner

Spring has finally arrived! The days are getting longer, the sun is shining brighter, the birds are chirping louder and the sound of children playing outside is heard once again. As spring comes into full bloom, we begin to see the light at the end of the tunnel that is the 2014-2015 school year. One event that will occur before this school year is over is prom.

Prom is a great experience for our kids to enjoy and is sure to create some life long memories. As a law enforcement officer, parent, former high school student and prom attendee, it is also a time that I worry about our students making poor decisions that could lead to tragic outcomes. All too often, prom night is not only about going to a formal event, it is also about partying with friends after the dance. This will often include drinking, drug use and sexual encounters. I am urging all parents to have a serious talk with your teenager about these topics to ensure that they understand the risks and concerns associated. I also encourage you to promote having your teen attend Kewaskum High School's Post Prom - which is held at the West Bend YMCA following prom starting at 11:00pm and ending at 1:45am. This is a safe alternative where teens can hang out after prom, have fun and win prizes.

Speaking of a safe environment, many of our teens attending prom will be driving themselves and their dates or friends to the prom and back. It is important to make sure our young drivers understand the seriousness of driving an automobile. Traffic accidents are the leading cause of death for teens and young adults nationwide. Year in and year out, teens are overrepresented in traffic accidents. In fact, only 6% of all drivers are ages 16-19, but they account for 16% of all drivers involved in a crash. On average, a motorist 19 years of age and under is killed or injured in a traffic crash every 1.6 hours IN WISCONSIN ALONE!! (Wisconsin DOT, 2013).

For the most part, we all understand the dangers associated

with drinking and driving; however distracted driving has become a leading cause for traffic accidents. Wisconsin has placed some laws in place to try and counter these startling crash statistics involving teenage drivers. Most people are aware that it is illegal to text while driving, however another law is Wisconsin State Statute 349.89(4) which states that "...no person who holds a probationary license... or an instruction permit... may drive... any motor vehicle while using a cellular or other wireless telephone, except to report an emergency." This statute means that it is illegal for any driver who is still on a probationary license to use their cell phone while operating a motor vehicle, for any reason, except to report an emergency.

Wisconsin also implemented graduated licensing a number of years ago. Graduated licensing is in effect for the first 9 months after issuance of a probationary license. With a GDL, a new driver can only have one other person in the vehicle with them (not including immediate family) and can not operate a motor vehicle between 12:00 am and 5:00 am (except if going to school or work, or with a parent) [Wis. Stats 343.085(2)(m)].

Studies have shown that graduated drivers licensing has been a positive contributor in lowering the number of teens involved in fatal traffic crashes, and hopefully eliminating cell phone use by probationary drivers will decrease these numbers even more. We will continue to diligently enforce these laws until our teens are no longer tragically killed on our roadways.

Please take the time to talk to your teen about the dangers of driving, the laws in place and the alternative available after prom. Hopefully all of our teens will make positive choices and create good, lifelong memories for themselves as well as their families.

the Friends of the Kettle Moraine to help make the Scenic Drive truly scenic for the hundreds of thousands of annual forest visitors.





## KHS juniors attend college and career fair




On March 19, over 1,000 high school juniors from schools across Washington County attended the first ever Washington County College and Career Fair at the Washington County Fair Park & Conference Center.


## Michlig to serve as percussion instructor



No one was able to challenge Kiel, but the Kewaskum High School boys track team started the outdoor season with a solid third place finish at the 12-team, Dutchman Invitational in Oostburg last Friday.

Kiel won the meet with 151 points, 55 points in front of St. Mary's Springs (96) and 71 ahead of Kewaskum and Cedar Grove/Belgium, which both came in with 74.

The Indians had three first places, including a double win by sophomore Derrek Brock in the 110-meter high hurdles and the 300 intermediate hurdles. For two decades the hurdle events have been a liability

for the Indians, but Brock has changed all that, winning the high hurdles in 16 and .81 seconds (16.81) and the rugged intermediates in 42.5, both best times for him.

Kewaskum's other win came from junior Jason Hanson, who cleared 6 feet (6-0) in the high jump. Hanson, who qualified for the D-2 state meet last spring, also ran the 300 hurdles, finishing third in 44.47.

All-state football player, Brandon Thull, contributed two places to the Indian effort, taking second in the 100 meter dash with an 11.90 clocking and second in the long jump (19-11).

Another notable effort was the third place by the 4x200-meter relay where

sophomore Jake Hrica teamed up with freshmen Tony Steger, John May and Cade Peterson for a third place. Their time was 1:41.71.

Kiel also captured the girls' title, amassing 157.5 points. Kewaskum finished seventh with 42.5 points.

Junior Ellie Debelak led the charge for the Lady Indians, winning the long jump with a leap of 16-0.5, finishing third in the 100 (13.55) and fourth in the 200 (28.07).

"The outdoor season is now officially underway, and it was good to see everyone compete hard when conditions were less than ideal," new head coach Jason Meinen said.





After getting thumped in their first two games by a couple pretty good D-2 teams, Slinger (a 0-9 loss on March 31) and West Bend East (1-7 loss on April 7), the Kewaskum High girls soccer team exploded for 10 goals in an impressive 10-0 victory over host Random Lake.

"The girls played hard, communicated well and played as a team. They stayed focused the entire game and played two very good halves of soccer," coach Luke Piwoni, who is starting his fifth year as head coach, said, convinced the other two games "served as good learning experiences for us."

The Lady Indians scored four goals in the first half — halves are now 45 minutes, five minutes longer than previous years — with four different girls getting into the act. At 21 minutes, Lizzy Bauer scored on an assist by Molly

Schulteis, and three minutes later Jeray Riffel fed Becca Strigenz for the second goal.

Riffel then scored twice before intermission, the first an unassisted goal (40:50) and the second off a corner kick (44:00).

In the second half, the scoring went as follows: Schulteis, unassisted (46:50); Schulteis, assist by Strigenz, (50:00); Bauer, unassisted (51:30); Abby Hardy, unassisted (65:00); Kaila Kirst, unassisted (77:00) and Schulteis, assist by Ana Gerhartz (88:00).

Piwoni has a wealth of offense returning for the 2015 campaign, starting with Riffel, the junior midfielder who scored an impressive 19 goals and had nine assists a year ago.

Senior returnees, along with their statistics from 2014, include: Emily Kohler, goalkeeper who had 81 saves; Strigenz, who came up with seven goals and four assists; Brooke Enright, defender; Gerhartz, midfielder, three goals; Heath-

er May, defender.

Kirst, a junior, lettered last year as a defender, and two talented sophomores return - Bauer, who scored seven goals and had four assists; and Schulteis, who chipped in with seven goals and eight assists.

As far as promising newcomers, Piwoni is glad to have senior defender Caley McClyman on board "to step up and fill the void on defense." He also reports he has four good sophomores, including Hardy, a forward; Courtney Aker, a goalie and midfielder, who provides depth at both positions; Jensen Kapla, a midfielder "who will be a nice

complement to Jeray in the middle" and Leigh Tamayo, a midfielder/forward.

"The strength of the team, I believe, will be our ability to score goals, we are returning almost all of our goal scoring from last season ... The girls work well together and will continue to improve with addition time together," Piwoni

said, indicating he also has a nice core group of returnees on defense.

As far as the Eastern Wisconsin Conference race, Piwoni said, "Plymouth won the conference last season. They are always a solid team and compete for the conference title every season."
