## Fundraising begins for future library expansion

The muddy lot on the corner of First and School Street is still empty, but the Kewaskum Public Library Foundation has quietly started the fundraising process for a future library expansion. The Foundation, a non-profit organization barely two years old, formed as part of a community-led effort to purchase the house adjacent to the library. Since then, the foundation has razed the house and hired an architect to produce some drawings that show what a possible future library could look like.

On March 5, the Foundation hosted a community meeting to introduce themselves. At that meeting, library director Steev Baker presented a brief history of the library as well as an update on current library space needs.

"In the last 10 years, our circula-

tion has doubled," said Baker, "But we're finding that people are getting their media in different ways now."

Since the popularity of the iPad and digital services like Netflix, library circulation of physical items has started to decline, while use of facilities and computers continues to grow. "It's a trend not only in libraries," Baker continued, "Theaters, bookstores, record stores have all seen a decline in sales. Fortunately, a library is not just a place for stuff, it's a place for ideas. The public still wants libraries, but the shift is moving away from circulating objects to hosting space, leading programs, and providing access to technology."

A prospective new library design by Plunkett Raysich Architects includes study rooms, computer work

areas, updated bathrooms, a modern community room, and lots of space for children's programs. It will also give the library the ability to maintain, and even grow, its collections, adding more than 5000 square feet to the building.

Mugs McFadden, Foundation board member, is excited about where the project is headed. "[The Foundation Board] has worked diligently on these first few steps toward a new library. We look forward to working with the village board and community in the coming months as we come up with a plan for funding the growth of our library."

## Panthers tame KHS pitcher

This is starting to have the look of a very special season for the Kewaskum High shelled Plymouth's Erica Helmer for 15 hits, played flawless ball in the field and got another solid pitching effort from sophomore Breana Trepas, leading to a 10-0 shutout over the host Panthers on April 14.

The win gives the Indians a 2-0 record in Eastern Wisconsin Conference play, 4-1 overall.

According to head coach Jeff Gosse, Trepas limited Plymouth to four hits, struck out five and only walked one in picking up the victory.

Not only did she pitch well, the sophomore standout came up with two hits, and is currently batting .474 with six RBIs (runs batted in) for the Indians.

Two KHS players, senior McKenzie Rosenthal and sophomore Kenzie Lehn, had three hits, while Abby Weinert, and Brittany Williams both chipped in with two.

Kewaskum was ahead 3-0 after the first three innings, then added a single run in the fourth and five more in the sixth for a 9-0 lead. There was still more excitement to come in the top of the seventh as Williams drilled a ball over the right-field fence for a home run, the first of her career.

"She (Williams) thought it hit the wall, so she took off digging for three (a triple)," Gosse said, noting her teammates let her know the ball cleared the fence.

"We scored a lot of runs using our

## Kewaskum School District shows gains on WKCE scores

The Wisconsin Department of Instruction has released test scores for the Wisconsin Knowledge and Concepts Examination (WKCE), and the Kewaskum School District students improved their scores in all tested subjects.

In the area of science KSD raised the number of students testing at a proficient or advanced level by five percent. In social studies the number of students in the proficient or advanced range improved by six percent.

"We are pleased with the results, but we know we have room to grow" said Superintendent Jim Smasal. "Our students and staff are working

hard to improve the student learning in our district, and this is just one indication that we are preparing students to be ready for the rigors of the workforce and post-secondary education."

Literacy has been a major focus for the Kewaskum School District this year. "There is a lot of reading involved in the science and social studies WKCE test. Over the past year we have worked on improving our literacy on a district level which could account for some of the best scores in recent years, and I think this is good evidence that our students are becoming more effective readers and writers in all content ar-

reas," said Curriculum Director Mark Bazata.

This year public students in grades 4, 8 and 10 were tested in the areas of science and social studies. The result of the WKCE for all school districts can be found on the Wisconsin Information System for Education Data Dashboard (WISEdash).

This year marks a change in the Wisconsin Student Assessment System. In the past, students in grades 3 through 8 and 10 were also tested in English, math, and language arts on the WKCE. These subjects are now tested in the spring with the new Badger Exam.

## Guest Editorial

Two particularly controversial topics of late have been the Governor's proposed changes to two very popular aging and long-term care programs; Senior Care and IRIS (Include, Respect, I-Self Direct). Senior Care provides prescription drug assistance to qualifying seniors, while IRIS, as the name implies, is a self-directed, long-term care option for Medicaid eligible, elderly or disabled adults. With our burgeoning senior population, I feel the Governor's proposed changes need to be re-evaluated in the spirit of maintaining quality care while also reducing state spending.

As a legislature, we must focus on passing proposals with

plans, not just ideas. While it is unlikely that the elimination of the IRIS program from state statute will pass the muster of the Legislature's Joint Finance Committee, I want to be clear in my support for the continuation of this program. Direction and control over one's own care is vitally important for individuals who wish to remain as independent as possible despite their physical or mental limitations.

While I understand the need to tighten the state's financial belt, I am in support of continuing programs like Senior Care and IRIS so that the vital independence and quality of life supports these pro-

grams provide will continue for those who need them most. A necessary evil for Senior Care, however, may be the need to increase premiums or co-pays in order for the program to remain solvent - a compromise that I feel is fair.

I, along with my Democrat and Republican legislative colleagues, respect the unique needs of these individuals and realize the immense value these programs provide to our aging and disabled constituents. It is my goal as your state representative to serve as your voice, and to stand up for those among us that may not have a voice. Please be assured that I will continue to do whatever is necessary to ensure appropriate care for all Wisconsinites - today, and for generations to come.

## Soccer team goes on scoring spree, wins two

Three, first-half goals helped the Kewaskum High girls soccer team to a hard-fought 4-3 victory over Waupun on April 16 in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference opener for both teams.

"It was a very physical game," KHS coach Luke Piwoni said early this week, and that seems to be par for the course when the Indians face the Warriors.

Kewaskum opened the game with a bang, scoring at two minutes on a goal by sophomore Lizzy Bauer with the assist coming from Becca Strigenz.

The lead lasted 11 minutes, then Waupun got a ball past the Indian goalie, but Kewaskum scored twice in the final nine minutes, an unassisted goal by Jeray Riffel at 36:00 and the other, also unassisted, by Molly Schulties at 41:00.

The 3-1 lead looked fairly comfortable, and 4-1 felt even better as Strigenz got into the scoring act (Bauer assist) at 73:00. Waupun didn't throw in any white towels, however, and scored two late goals to make the game a lot closer.

"The girls hung tough and played a nice game" Piwoni said. "The girls played well as a team, and we look forward to great teamwork as the season progresses."

On April 14, the Indians used Molly Schulties' three-goal hat trick and some strong play in the second half to post a 5-1 victory over Brown Deer.

"She (Schulties) brought a lot of energy and really gave us great scoring opportunities," Piwoni said about his sophomore front-liner. After spotting the Lady Falcons an early goal at 9:00, Schulties charged toward the Falcon goal and with one swift boot, tied the game one minute later.

From then on it was all Kewaskum, with Schulties scoring again at 38:00 for a 2-1 lead at half, then Riffel scored unassisted at 46:00, Schulties tallied goal No. 3 off a pass from Riffel at 48:00, and Bauer finished off the scoring on an assist by Schulties from a corner kick.

"A nice game offensively, and the defense only allowed one shot on goal," Schulties said. "The girls played hard and did not let up the entire 90 minutes."

Kewaskum, currently 1-0 in the EWC and 3-2 overall, was scheduled to play arch rival Campbellsport on April 20 but the game was postponed by rain. That game will be made up on Friday, May 8.





Conference mini-tour event, with its low four golfers combining for a 198.


