

## Lady kickers bring home the gold

Dust off a spot in the front of the trophy case. The Kewaskum High girls soccer team earned some new hardware to put on display after winning the Oostburg Tournament last Saturday.

"It was great to see them continue to compete and to rebound from the Kiel game," KHS coach Luke Piwoni said, referring to Thursday's disappointing loss to Kiel. "The girls stayed positive and worked hard. It was great to see them come together and play some great soccer."

In the opening round, the Indi-

ans edged Oostburg 1-0, and they defeated Palmyra-Eagle 4-2 in the title game.

The Oostburg win was very satisfying because of the soccer history between the two schools, which had been dominated by the Dutchmen.

This time it was the Indians' turn to celebrate after Becca Strigenz broke the scoreless deadlock with a goal at 36:00 off what Piwoni called "a beautiful cross by Jeray Riffel."

"The girls played an intense, high-energy game and kept pushing," Piwoni went on, reporting Courtney Aker played a great game in the goal for all 60:00 (two 30:00 halves for tournaments), stopping all six shots Oost-

burg had.

Also cited for her great play at sweeper was Kaila Kirst, and Piwoni said, "The entire defense played well, covered the middle and worked well as a unit to keep them out of the goal."

In the win over Palmyra-Eagle, the Indians started a little sluggish, falling behind 1-0 before Riffel tied the game on a penalty kick just before the intermission.

"In the second half, we came out on the attack," Piwoni said. "The girls were very aggressive and took advantage of the space they were given."

Down 2-1, Lizzy Bauer tied the game with "a great shot outside the 18 (yard) line)," according to Piwoni,

who indicated Riffel gave the Indians their first lead at 52:00, and then three minutes later, "Molly Schulteis finished off the scoring with a hard crash up the middle off a nice pass from Becca Strigenz."

Including results from the tournament, Schulteis now has nine goals this season. She is taking some of the pressure off Riffel and providing potent offense for the Indians.



## First Buelow, now Rosenthal has an academy appointment



McKenzie Rosenthal has been accepted to the Air Force Academy in Colorado.

Several weeks after her June graduation, McKenzie Rosenthal will be leaving Kewaskum for "new heights" ... 7,300 feet above sea level to be exact.

Rosenthal, one of the top seniors in Kewaskum High School's class of 2015, has been accepted at the Air Force Academy near Colorado Springs, Colorado. She is the first female from Kewaskum High School to receive an appointment to one of the military academies. She will report there on June 25 for six weeks of basic training and then begins her educational studies in late August or early September.

"I think it's just a cool opportunity at an amazing place," Rosenthal said recently. "To be the first girl, I'm honored."

The whole idea of applying to the Air Force Academy really never entered Rosenthal's mind until she was a junior and

Buelow's going to West Point last year and after her fast-pitch coach, Jeff Gosse "said something about me going there."

There were no worries over Rosenthal's record at KHS. Her academic and co-curricular resumes are impeccable. "I'm tied for No. 1 (in the senior class) right now," Rosenthal said, indicating she took two Advanced Placement (AP) classes last year, and, "This year I took four (Calculus, Chemistry, English and History) along with Physics," a load that would be difficult for anyone to match.

Rosenthal was involved in three sports each of her four years in high school, starting with basketball and fast-pitch. She also played volleyball for three years, but this year decided to switch to tennis where she played at No. 4 singles and earned honorable mention in the All-Eastern Wisconsin Conference balloting. She also earned honorable mention in fast-pitch for the past two seasons.

A secretary might have been a big help in Rosenthal's keeping track of meetings she needed to attend in her role as class president, president of the National Honor Society, co-president of the KEY Club, co-vice president of the Student Government, being a member of the Mock Trial group, Peers for Peers, and a freshman mentor. She also was on the Show Choir as a junior, this year switching to the stage crew for Show Choir, and out of school she participated in the Catholic Heart Work Camp.

Rosenthal's involvement in these activities helped her earn a trip to the Senior Diversity program in November when she and her family got to check out the Air Force Academy.

"It's really pretty there," Rosenthal said, indicating there are about 1,000 per class

or about 4,000 total at the Air Force Academy, with a split of about 70-30 percent men to women.

While Rosenthal is convinced she made a good decision to go to the Air Force, it wasn't an easy one because she was also accepted at the University of Notre Dame in South Bend, Indiana. "That was a real hard decision because I wanted to go to Notre Dame ever since I was in like fifth grade," Rosenthal said, noting that year she went to see a women's basketball game between Marquette and Notre Dame. She recalls watching Irish guard Natalie Novacek "being super aggressive, diving for every ball ... Ever since then I've been a big fan of Notre Dame."

In order to get ready for her basic training, Rosenthal and

some of her softball teammates have started a special workout program. "We're trying a 30-day ab program. We just started the other day," she said.

Concerning her field of study, Rosenthal said, "There are 40 different majors I could choose from. I'm undecided right now."

Rosenthal said her family, parents Scott and Cammie and sister Sydney plan to take her to Colorado. "They'll take me there and drive back," she said, indicating this will be the start of a 12-year stint with the Air Force, including four years at the Academy, five years of active duty and another three in the reserves.

"That's the plan," she said, enthused about the challenge ahead.

represented KHS at the annual Badger Girls State Government and Leadership Conference. During the conference, a group from the American Legion talked about what their participation in the military meant to them.

"They spoke about how proud they are of their Country ... their patriotism," Rosenthal, who was extremely impressed with the presentation, said. After that, one thing led to another. Rosenthal received an appointment from State Senator Tammy Baldwin, then turned in her application and learned in mid-December that she had been accepted.

"I could have applied to all of them (academies), but I only applied to the Air Force," Rosenthal said recently, indicating other factors in her decision toward a military education and career included Andy

## UWWC to host summer rocketry and engineering camps

Interested in building a rocket this summer? UW-Washington County is offering a new rocketry camp for students in grades 6-12. The week long camp which runs June 22-26 (noon - 2pm) will teach physics principles involved in model rocketry. Students will build, test and launch model rockets, while also learning about real world rockets and space travel. UW-WC Physics and Astronomy Professor, Dr. Swapnil Tripathi, who teaches the camp, definitely knows about rockets. Tripathi's team of UW-WC and UW-Sheboygan students took first place in WSGC (Wisconsin Space Rocket Competition) collegiate rocket competition last year. The cost of the rocketry camp is \$100.

Returning this summer is an engineering camp for high school juniors and seniors. The week long camp "provides an opportunity to learn about the field of engineering

and give students a feel for the wide range of things that an engineer might do," according to Guy Campbell, Collaborative Mechanical Engineering lecturer at the West Bend campus. After studying real-world examples at Glenroy, Regal Ware, Signicast, Weasler Engineering, and Creative Design Network, students return to campus and participate in experiments and activities related to the various types of engineering that they learned about out in the field. The course fee is \$425, which in-

cludes daily lunch and program materials. Early registration is advised as enrollment is limited.






## WES holds Spaghetti Dinner and Gallery Night





## Weather shortens Indian Invite; KHS teams finish second

Since there are no mulligans in high school track, the Indian Invitational show started as scheduled on last Friday afternoon, but the chilly temperatures, rain and even a few snow showers prompted officials to call the meet with several events to go.

"(Athletic Director Jason) Piitt (mann) called all the head coaches together during the 300 hurdles, and it was decided we would finish the boys high jump, run the 800 and call the meet," KHS coach Jason Meinen said. "Everyone was wet, and the temperature was getting even colder and no one wanted to see someone get hurt, especially the athletes coming up in the 200-meter dash or 1,600 meter relay."

Despite the less-than-ideal conditions, there were some good efforts turned in by athletes from the 10 schools and good competition for the boys team titles won by the Ripon boys, which scored 99 points, nine more than the host Indians (90).

In the girls race for the crown, Winnebago Lutheran

came out on top, amassing 95 points. Kewaskum was second with 75.

"There were 14, top-3 places and many PRS (personal records)," Meinen said about the efforts by the Indians athletes.

Kewaskum's boys had five first places, including two from sophomore Derek Brock, who looked very smooth in the two hurdle races. Brock won the 110-meter high hurdles in a sizzling 16 and .04 (16.04) seconds and the 300 intermediates in 43.39 for 20 of Kewaskum's points.

"Derek has really matured and has started to figure out the hurdle races," Meinen said of Brock. "You can see his confidence growing each meet."

Ben Watzig made his outdoor debut on a good note, taking the shot put with a toss of 42 feet, 3.50 inches (43-3.50). Watzig and teammate Eric Doll earned a third (127-01) and third (113-01) in the discus.

"Ben had some nice throws in the shot and discus and is starting to round back into form," Meinen said.

Another field event win came in the high jump where Jason Hanson cleared 6-2, his best jump of the year. "He just

missed some really good attempts at 6-3," the coach said.

The Indians also won the 4x100 relay behind the efforts of Steven Nurkala, Tony Steger, Gavin Schreier and Brandon Thull. Their winning time was 46.16. What helped were "some really nice handoffs," according to Meinen.

The junior speedster Thull also contributed two solid individual efforts, taking second behind Ripon's Evan Long, in the 100 with a clocking of 11.51 seconds and fourth in the long jump (18-11.0).

Another top-three finish was a third in the 4x200 relay with Jake Hrica, Steger, John May and Cade Peterson carrying the baton for a time of 1:40.23.

On the girls' side of the ledger, junior Ellie Debelak was a standout, taking the 100 in 13.33, .10 of a second ahead of Living Word's Sophie Hoelz (13.43), winning the long jump with an effort of 15-11 and leading off the first-place 4x200 relay, which was clocked in 1:55.87. Other members of the victorious unit were Haley Kleinhans, freshman Sarah Butschlick and Krystina Lepp.

"Ellie is our leader on the

girls' side," Meinen said. "She's determined to get back to state in the long jump" and is running well in the 100, 200 and relays, when needed."

Kewaskum showed it has several solid distance runners this spring, with the quartet of Amanda Plachinski, Rebecca Meltz, Breanna Rice and Emily Krier winning the 4x800 relay in 11:00.37. "I don't remember when we've had four girls running that fast," Meinen said.

The high jump was a good event for KHS, with Lepp taking third at 4-8 and Ellie Landreville in fifth place after clearing 4-4.

KHS was scheduled to host the Washington County Meet on April 28, and the Indians are


at Pewaukee for the annual Altheimer Invitational tomorrow (May 1st).
