Indians are perfect behind power hitting, pitching

If there were weekly power ratings for girls fast-pitch in the state of Wisconsin, the Kewaskum High team would be right at the top of the list for the week of May 4-9.

Consider these numbers ... a perfect 6-0 record, (including a 3-0 mark at the West Bend Tournament on May 9) ... outscoring their opponents 85-6 ... hitting 11 home runs and more hits than many teams get in an entire season.

"They were on a little roll this weekend," KHS coach Jeff Gosse said on Sunday, reporting the Lady Indians defeated Howards Grove 19-0, West Bend East 15-0 and Port Washington 12-2 in tournament action. None of the games went more than five innings as the "10-run mercy rule" came into effect in all three, and one amazing statistic was provided by the three respective winning pitchers, Maura Roberts, Jenna Koglin and Breana Trepes.

"Three games ... three different pitchers and no walks. I thought that was so impressive!" Gosse said, reporting the Port Washington coach remarked to him how nice it must be to have three good pitchers.

Roberts has been limited in mound action this spring but came through with a four-hitter and struck out two. "This was her second start," Gosse said.

Offensively, Roberts had plenty of support, with four Indians smashing home runs and McKenzie Rosenthal going a perfect 4x4, with three singles and a home run. The others who provided homers were Abbey Weinert, Trepes and Koglin.

"They didn't have a fence, but it didn't matter," Gosse said. "There were some shots ... They (girls) just teed off."

The East Suns didn't have much luck against Kewaskum, which came up with at least five extra base hits. Rosenthal added another home run, with Lindsay Winkler getting into the power act with a home run and a double, and Trepes pounded a pair of triples.

Koglin gave up just two hits, while striking out five, and the Indians were heading for Game 3 with a good head of steam.

Port Washington was the best of the three teams the Indians faced, but the Pirates didn't have much luck

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Army stint took Strack to famous and unusual places

Roger Strack can remember as a young boy, seeing the flag flying at the McLane Elementary School he attended in West Bend.

"I always saluted that flag," Strack, a long-standing member of the Robert G. Romaine American Legion Post 38, said last week. "From little on, I learned to respect the flag and our Country."

With this in mind, it was no surprise Strack enlisted in the service less than a year after graduating from West Bend High School and starting a job at the Ford garage on the property which now belongs to Tennes Hardware in West Bend.

Strack was in the U.S. Army but ended up with assignments more apt to be handled by men in the Navy.

"I ran a landing craft," Strack said, indicating he started out in basic training at Fort

ship and go ashore for their work. At first, Strack said, the accommodations, aboard the Navy attack cruiser were very nice with only 81 aboard, then they changed to a troop ship, with many more men, and things got a bit crowded.

While Strack was on this mission, the men received a certificate for crossing the Arctic Circle. "It was a celebration when we did it," he said, reporting it was called "The Dominion of the Polar Bears."

Strack also was on a mission to France where he and the others unloaded ships. Several months ago, when the American Legion magazine included a feature and pictures of the Thule base, Strack said he looked at the picture and said, "I know that place."

The pictures came from a 1952 cover story in *Life* magazine, and Strack not only had taken the same picture with his camera but was able to say, "I was on that boat."

Among his many service-related stories is the fact he bunked together the entire time with a man who was his friend since fifth grade, Harold Roecker. "He was the engineer (of the boat), and I was the one who ran it ... the boat coxswain," Strack said, reporting later Roecker married his sister, so they became brothers-in-law.

While Strack and Roecker were in Europe, they had the opportunity to visit London, Paris, Germany and parts of Italy. "I've got some pretty neat pictures," he said.

Another story centers around how the two men got back to Washington County after their enlistment was nearly over and arrived here with \$300 in their pockets. Strack and Roecker were slated to take a train ride from New Jersey to the West Coast, but after the train got going, they jumped off with their gear, hitchhiked to Washington D.C. (where they nearly got put under arrest), then took a "Air Hop" to St. Louis, a commercial flight to Chicago and hitchhiked home the rest of the way.

"We took Harry's motorcy-

Worden in the state of Washington, then went to California, including time near Catalina Island, to train on boats. Additional training followed in New Jersey before Strack and his outfit were sent on missions to the North Pole and to France.

"We had a secret mission to the North Pole," specifically Thule, Greenland, Strack said about the place that is affectionately called "the airbase at the top of the world." It was suppose to take two weeks to get there, but Strack said it took a lot longer because of ice the ship had to cut through.

When they arrived and were assigned to work in shifts, "It was 24 hours of sunshine (at that time of year)," Strack said. "The sun was actually chasing the moon around," and sometimes the men would get confused about the time so they would take a photograph "to determine whether it was night or day."

The men would live on the

cle out to the state of Washington," did some sightseeing and then came back to Wisconsin. The money came from turning in the train tickets.

When Strack returned to civilian life, he said he joined the V.F.W. (Veterans of Foreign War) in West Bend, and "When I moved to Kewaskum, I joined

the Legion." He and others have received plaques for being in the organization so long. In Strack's case, his tenure has reached 57 years. "I was really surprised I had that many years in," he said, noting a special pride in being honored by the group.

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Chief's Corner

In 1962, President John F. Kennedy signed a proclamation marking May 15th as National Peace Officers' Day. During the week of May 15th, many locations will be holding memorial services in honor of those officers who gave the ultimate sacrifice. The largest event will take place in Washington D.C. with memorials, candlelight vigils, and other events throughout the week and will draw between 25,000 – 40,000 attendees (policeweek.org).

However, you don't need to go all the way to Washington D.C. to show your support for our fallen officers. The Washington County Law Enforcement Memorial Service will be held tonight, Thursday, May 14th, 2015, at the Washington County Fair Park. This memorial is an opportunity to gather and remember the three officers from our county who paid the ultimate sacrifice.

Marshal Leonard Scherger, of the Hartford Police Department, was shot and killed on May 21, 1904 when he stopped to question three suspicious men in a rail yard. Scherger was only 33 years old at the time of his murder.

Police Officer Robert D. Backes of the Germantown Police Department was killed in the line of duty on March 21st, 1981. Officer Backes was attempting to arrest a subject who had been operating a vehicle and a struggle ensued with the subject on the roadway. Both men were struck and killed by a passing motor vehicle. Officer Backes was 34 years old and was survived by his wife, son and two daughters.

Thirty-one year old Deputy Sheriff John Schmitt was killed in the line of duty due to an automobile accident on September 7th,

1998. Deputy Schmitt was responding to assist another officer who was requesting immediate assistance. Deputy Schmitt was currently training a new officer who was with him at the time of the crash which occurred just south of Kewaskum. Deputy Schmitt was a member of our community and served on the Kewaskum Fire Department as well. I didn't have the pleasure of knowing John, as this occurred long before my career here in Kewaskum started, but speaking to those who worked with him and knew him well, our community lost a true hero that day.

I am thankful that there are only three people on the list of those from the Washington County law enforcement community who were killed in the line of duty. However, it saddens me that anyone makes the list at all.

Ideally, there would be no need for a memorial – but the reality is that as long as there is evil in the world looking to prey on innocent, law abiding individuals, there will be a need for brave people willing to answer the call for help – just as these three officers did.

If you are able to attend the Washington County Law Enforcement Memorial Service tonight, please do so to show your appreciation for those who are currently serving, and those who served to the greatest extent possible.

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
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


Gruber returns home to coach basketball

Kewaskum has a new varsity boys basketball coach. Don Gruber, a 1976 KHS grad and the co-owner of a West Bend tool and die business, was approved at Monday night's School Board meeting to replace Keith Traska, who resigned the post several weeks after the end of the 2014-15 season.

Gruber, a standout in football and basketball at Kewaskum, had been the varsity coach of the West Bend East girls for the past six years. According to an article in the *West Bend Daily News*, he was fired at the end of the 2014-15 season for what the East athletic director said came down to wins and losses. A controversy arose after the firing, and later an apology was issued to Gruber by the superintendent of schools, who offered the job back to Gruber. Because of how the situation was handled, he declined.

"Mr. Gruber has been involved in basketball for many, many years ... involved with summer leagues and camps and also at the high school level for the past nine years, including six years of head coach-

ing experience," KHS Athletic Director Jason Piittmann said Monday in answer to an inquiry from the Statesman.

"We had over a dozen applicants," Piittmann said Monday, indicating three individuals were interviewed and noting, "One was a current faculty member."

The interview committee included KHS girls basketball coach Russell Thull, one student athlete and a representative from the youth basketball organization, the high school principal and Piittmann, who said the vice principal was also scheduled to sit in on the interviews but was ill that day.

When asked if Gruber will be able to choose his own assistants, as was the case in Jason Meinen taking the head track position this year, Piittmann said, "Mr. Gruber will have an opportunity to select his assistants, and our prior assistants are definitely welcome to apply."

The salary for the head boys basketball coaching position is \$3,500.

The Statesman was unsuccessful in attempts to contact Gruber for comments on his appointment as coach.

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Another big win for KHS net team

Host Sheboygan Falls had the upper hand in the singles events, but the Kewaskum High tennis team went a perfect three-for-three in doubles and got a clutch win from Bille Lehmann at No. 1 singles for a 4-3 victory in an Eastern Wisconsin Conference match played on May 7.

"Bille Lehmann won a nail-biter," Andrew Dahlberg, one of the team's co-coaches, said about the pivotal match, which went down to the tie breaker after Lehmann lost his first set to his opponent, Jake Zehr, 4-6, then won the second 6-3. In the pivotal third set, the two went back and forth to a two-way score, and in the tie-breaker, Lehmann said he was down 5-6, then "flipped him" to go up 7-6. "When I was going to the net, I had been hitting it long or wide, so I played back," Lehmann said, for over the two volleyed for a minute when Zehr made the mistake and hit the ball in the net for match point.

With the win, Lehmann broke a string of three conference losses and is currently 1-3 in EWC action. Overall, he is 5-5.

All the other KHS singles players, Taylor Nelson, Chas Moede and Josh Limbach, were beaten, but the doubles teams of Michael Prochnow and Garrett Buth at No. 1 and Brady Weinert and Alex Strack won in straight sets. Prochnow and Buth posted their first win in the EWC with a convincing 6-2, 6-2 victory, while Strack and Weinert survived a close competition with a 7-5, 7-5 effort.

The No. 3 doubles team of Noel Bindrich and Hunter Demmon played their match at Rochester Park, so the others were not sure how they were doing. When the bus returned to the high school courts, the rest of the Indians found out they had won 6-1, 2-6 and 6-4, setting the stage to get the team victory with Lehmann's win. Demmon and Bindrich are now 4-0 in EWC action and 7-2 overall.

This is the third EWC perennial power the Indians have beaten this spring, and it gives them a 3-1 mark in team play but more important 14 points for their individual single and doubles wins, which determines the final standings in the conference.

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Kewaskum graduation rate exceeds state average

The Kewaskum four year graduation rate for the 2013-2014 school year was 91.4 percent and the five year graduation rate was 98.1 percent, both above the state average.

The four-year graduation rate, based on a uniform federal standard, includes all students who earned a regular public high school diploma. Wisconsin also calculates five-year and six-year graduation rates to account for students who, by state and federal law, have additional time to complete their high school educa-

tion. Although most students earn their high school diploma in four years, the Kewaskum School District offers a continuum of services for students who do not. Curriculum Director Mark Bazata said, "Three of the students who did not graduate in the 2013-2014 school year have already graduated, and three more are currently on track to graduate by the end of the year thanks to the Kewaskum Career Academy. We pride ourselves that as a school district we do

not give up on students even if it takes longer than four years for them to graduate."

The Kewaskum Career Academy (KCA) is an alternative education program that meets the needs of students who benefit from a non-traditional school environment. Superintendent Jim Smasal said, "The KCA is another example of the Kewaskum Difference. We equip all students to be successful in a global society while still giving students and parents personalized attention."

The KCA offers more than just a high school diploma. "There are a lot of alternative programs that just put students in front of computers to complete their graduation requirements, but at the KCA they are getting personalized learning from highly qualified teachers. Building strong relationships is a large part of the process. We create an individual learning plan with each student to help ensure their success," said KCA Director Scott Jorlin.

This is the second year the

Department of Public Instruction is reporting graduation rates through the Wisconsin Information System for Education Dashboard Public Portal (WISEdash). Under the federal graduation rate definition, each student is assigned to a cohort when entering high school, the 2010-11 school year for the class of 2014. The cohort is then adjusted to reflect the actual enrollment as students enter or leave the district. The graduation rate is based on students who earn a regular high school diploma.



3. The board of review may not hear an objection to the amount or valuation of property unless, at least 48 hours before the board's first scheduled meeting, the objector provides to the board's clerk written or oral notice of an intent to file an objection, except that upon a showing of good cause and the submission of a written objection, the board shall waive that requirement during the first 2 hours of the board's first scheduled meeting, and the

board may waive that requirement up to the end of the 5th day of the session or up to the end of the final day of the session if the session is less than 5 days with proof of extraordinary circumstances for failure to meet the 48-hour notice requirement and failure to appear before the board of review during the first 2 hours of the first scheduled meeting.

4. Objections to the amount or valuation of property shall first be made in writing and filed with the clerk of the board of review within the first 2 hours of the board's first scheduled meeting, except that, upon evidence of extraordinary circumstances, the board may waive that requirement up to the end of the 5th day of the session or up to the end of the final day of the session if the session is less than 5 days. The board may require such objections to be submitted on forms approved by the department of revenue, and the board shall require that any forms include stated valuations of the property in question. Persons who owe land and improvements to that land may object to the aggregate valuation of that land and improvements to that land, but no person who owns land and improvements to that land. No person shall be allowed in any action or proceedings to question the amount or valuation of property unless the written objection has been filed and that person in good faith presented evidence to the board in support of the objections and made full disclosure before the board, under oath of all of that person's property liable to assessment in the district and the value of that property. The requirement that objections be in writing may be waived by express action of the board.

5. When appearing before the board of review, the objecting person shall specify in writing, the person's estimate of the value of the land and of the improvements that are the subject of the person's objection and specify the information that the person used to arrive at that estimate.

6. No person may appear before the board of review, testify to the board, or by telephone, or object to a valuation if that

valuation was made by the assessor or the objector using the income method of valuation, unless the person supplies the assessor all the information about income and expenses, as specified in the assessor's manual under s 73.02 (2a), Wis stats., that the assessor requests. The Town of Wayne has an ordinance for the confidentiality of information about income and expenses that is provided to the assessor under this paragraph, which provides exceptions for person using information in the discharge of duties imposed by law or the duties of their officer or by order of a court. 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
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Still looking to get in high gear quickly

Coach Luke Piwoni is at a little bit of a loss as to why his Kewaskum High soccer team continues to experience slow starts against Eastern Wisconsin Conference opponents.

In three games last week, the Indians managed only one draw, a 3-3 decision vs. New Holstein. Sandwiched around the tie were a 4-1 loss to Campbellsport on May 8 and a 7-1 loss to Sheboygan Falls. In both those games, the opponents jumped out to quick leads, and the Indians never recovered.

With results from the three games, Kewaskum is currently 0-4-1 in EWC action and 5-7-1 overall.

In the makeup game against their arch rival, KHS was quickly down 1-0 as Campbellsport scored in the first two minutes and added a second goal at 25:00.

"We really struggled in the first half," Piwoni said. "Our communication was not where it needed to be, and we were disconnected as a team. We were not in sync."

Molly Schulteis got Kewaskum on the board with a goal at 46:00. "She crashed hard

and was able to finish off a pass from the left side of the field from Becca Strigenz," Piwoni said about the goal that made the score 2-1.

While the Indians played with more energy the rest of the way, unfortunately, they never got any closer as the Cougars scored at 68:00 and 77:00.

As far as any good individual efforts, Piwoni said, "Abbey Hardy was fantastic. She disrupted a lot with her speed and hustle. It was great to see. She really has some wheels."

Kewaskum 3, New Holstein 3: In the game against New Holstein, "Both teams came out with a lot of energy," with New Holstein taking the lead at 25:00.

Jeray Riffel, who has been quiet of late, came to the rescue with the tying goal on a shot that "came down perfectly between the crossbar and the goalie's hands. She was way outside of the 18 (yard) line. It was a tremendous shot!"

Riffel scored again on a penalty kick at 51:00 to give the Indians a 2-1 lead, and she got her third goal, for a "hat trick" at 83:00 on a corner kick. Three minutes the Huskies tied the game again, and that's how it ended because, according to Pi-

woni, with new rules, there are no more overtime periods.

"This was a great soccer game. I am very proud of the girls for playing their hearts out for 90 minutes. They never flinched and really worked together well as a team. Everyone played well and stepped up. Just a great team effort," Piwoni said. "Emily Koller was in goal and had an awesome game. She ended up with 14 saves."

Sheboygan Falls 7, Kewaskum 1: The Falcons scored at 7:00 and just kept rolling, leading 5-0 at halftime.

Schulteis kept the Indians from being shut out when she converted a penalty kick around the 70-minute mark.

"We did not match their energy early in the game, and it showed on the scoreboard," Piwoni said, reporting his girls picked it up in the second half but not enough to make a dent in the Falcons' lead. "We are still searching for consistency from game to game. When we play with good energy, every game is competitive. We will keep searching and working until we get to where we want to be."

Piwoni cited Jensen Kapla for a good game at midfield.

Key hits missing; Indians come up short at Waupun

It was showdown time for the undefeated Kewaskum and Waupun girls fast-pitch teams on April 30, and unfortunately the host Warriors had a little more firepower than the Indians and came out on top in both ends of the Eastern Wisconsin Conference double header, winning 1-0 and 8-1.

"We had a couple of opportunities but couldn't come up with the clutch hit," KHS coach Jeff Gosse said about Game 1 when the Indians had six base runners but were limited to just three hits.

Breana Trepes took the loss but pitched very well, giving up just three hits while walking only one and striking out three. Unfortunately two of the hits came in one inning, the sixth, when Danielle Hopp (the starting pitcher) doubled and scored on a single by McKenna Keach.

The Indians came close to scoring in the fourth when McKenzie Rosenthal singled off the wall. "It missed going out by a couple of feet," Gosse said. Then Lindsay Winkler drew a walk, and Melanie Juech bunted them to second and third for catcher Brittany Williams, who "hit one into the gap, and their center fielder made a great play on it... She's very good."

After the tough loss, the Indians had to come right back to play in Game 2. "Conference rules said you have to play within 10 minutes after the first game... It's difficult, You've got to fight a lot of emotion," Gosse said, indicating he was pleased

with the way his girls tried to battle back and played error-free ball.

"They did well," he said of his Indians, reporting the Warriors just came up with "a combination of good hits and bloopers."

Kewaskum managed just two hits off Megan Van Ruiswyk, who was the winning pitcher in both games. Kenzie Lehn and Trepes had the hits for Kewaskum, which is now 5-2 in EWC action ad 9-3 overall.

On April 28, the Indians finally got to play at home and in front of a good-sized partisan crowd topped Sheboygan Falls 15-5 in six innings.

Leading 3-0 going into the third, Rosenthal socked an 0-and-2 pitch out of the park for a 6-0 advantage before Trepes ran into some trouble in the fourth, giving up a triple that allowed the Falcons to climb within four runs, 8-4.

Kewaskum's potent offense scored seven runs in the final two innings. Key hits included a triple to right field by Maddy Lehmann, and in the bottom of the sixth, Lehn drove in the 14th and 15th runs with a single to end the game.

Trepes picked up the win, going all six innings, giving up five hits, striking out 12 and walking just one.

Kewaskum had another big week on tap. After hosting Plymouth on May 5, the Indians will entertain Two Rivers on May 8 (Friday) and then compete in the West Bend Tournament on Saturday.

Taking a big step vs. 2 of the top dogs

Normally Eastern Wisconsin Conference matches against Kohler and Plymouth would end up as losses for the Kewaskum High tennis team, but this year the tide has turned.

The Indians defeated both by 4-3 scores, and in the April 30 match vs. the visiting Plymouth Panthers, they came back from an 0-2 start after the No. 1 singles and doubles matches.

Kewaskum's Taylor Nelson and Chad Moede posted wins at Nos. 2 and 3 singles in straight sets, while Alex Strack and Brady Weinert and Hunter Demmon and Noel Bindrich took third sets to give their team the win in a couple of long matches.

"(This was) the toughest stretch of our season," Andrew Dahlberg, one of the team's co-coaches said. "This is the first time in memory that both teams have suffered losses to the Indians in the same season."

With the win, KHS is 2-1 vs. EWC teams, but what really counts to determine the final standings is individual singles and doubles match wins, and currently the Indians have 10 of them in the three meets, which is a great start against the three perennial powerhouses.

Debelak won four ... yes four events in the meet held last Friday, leading the Indians to a second place finish with 97 points. Plymouth was the landslide champion, piling up 186.5 points in the event.

Debelak started by winning the 100-meter dash in 13 and .29 seconds (13.29) and just kept rolling, with wins in the 200 (27.78) and the 400 (1:00.07), running the latter event for the second time this season.

Victory No. 4 came in the long jump where she had a jump of 16 feet, 3.50 inches (16-03.50).

Debelak is starting to peak at the right time as the Eastern Wisconsin Conference meet is coming up May 19 at Plymouth and a D-2 regional is at Kewaskum on May 26.
