

Kids Need to Read 'Grow Your Library' Project coming to Kewaskum

Jump and Relay Events at EWC Relays

Kids Need to Read (KNTR) has teamed with Board Member Gary Mlodzik and his wife Tina to launch a revolutionary library donation project. Inspired by the Mlodzik's shared love of reading, family, and public libraries, this partnership will deliver free books and story time to local libraries during the couple's travels.

"I developed the Grow Your Library program to introduce a giving culture in the youth we meet at literacy events," said Mlodzik, a native of Kewaskum. "Putting a book in the hands of a child and allowing them to

expand their horizons is magical. Allowing that child to make a small effort in order to share that magic for future generations is a priceless lesson. It is my hope that the children will be proud of the book donations made in their name and tell their friends, thereby further encouraging both literacy and philanthropy."

The Grow Your Library program will be visiting Kewaskum at 10:30 a.m. and 6:15 p.m. on June 24, with a large donation of books and to participate in story time at the Kewaskum Library, 206 1st Street. Each child in

attendance will receive a free book and a *Highlights* magazine courtesy of KNTR. They will also learn how they can use their own love of reading to help the Kewaskum Library earn even more free books in the future. When asked about the motive behind the new project, KNTR Executive Director Denise Gary stated, "The importance of reading extends far beyond the mechanics. Its greatest power is determined by how each person uses reading to shape their lives. Inspiring children to read at an early age allows that vital, lifelong process to begin."

It wasn't the best of nights weather wise, still there were some good performances and plenty of competition for the titles in the annual Eastern Wisconsin Conference Relays hosted by Kewaskum last Tuesday afternoon.

Only one team scored more than 100 points in the boys' competition. That was Kiel, who won with 101. There was an exciting battle for second with Two Rivers edging Wau-pun and Plymouth, 85 to 84 to 82. Kewaskum finished fifth with 65.96.

Plymouth, in the midst of another successful year, won the girls title with 88.96 points, 14 more than Sheboygan Falls' 84.96. Kewaskum placed sixth with 66.

"Running was tough on Tuesday. Windy and cold are tough conditions to run in, especially at this point in the season when we have been teased with nicer weather," KHS coach Jason Meinen said. "The kids put in really good efforts, it was just hard to run fast times in those conditions."

The lone jump for the KHS boys came in the high jump where the Hanson brothers, Jason and Brady, and Tony Steger, combined for 17 feet, 4 inches (17-4), four more inches than Wau-pun.

Jason Hanson had the best jump of the day, clearing 6-4. He has made this height several times and appears poised to add another couple inches to what was his personal best a year ago when he qualified for the D-2 State Meet.

Brady Hanson, making his first outdoor appearance, cleared 5-10, while Steger made 5-2. When asked why Hanson missed all the other outdoor meets, Meinen said, "He had some eligibility issues. Let's leave it at that."

The high jump win was definitely a highlight, along with the girls' wins in the long jump and pole vault, according to Meinen.

In the long jump where junior Ellie Debelak had the best jump of the day, going 16-04.50. Haley Kleinhans jumped 14-00.50 and Sara Butschlick 13-05.50 for a total of 43-10.50.

The KHS girls also won the pole vault with a combined effort of 20-06. Sarah Kosternan cleared 8-0, while Beth Dinerna and Amanda Plachinski made 6-06 and 6-0 respectively. Wau-pun was the only other team to have three vaulters.

The Indians trio of Kyle Pamperin, Miguel Gonzalez and Tony Leister tied for second with Plymouth in the pole vault with a total of 29-0. Pam

The day the calendar makers forgot

No matter how diligently I search, I cannot find a secular calendar hanging on any wall or sitting on any desk that will tell me on which date Pentecost falls. As a result of this omission, many people have no understanding about the existence or significance of this celebration. A look at Wikipedia gives us several substantive reasons for Pentecost. Initially, Pentecost commemorated the giving of the Law to the Hebrew people after they came out of Egypt (think "The Ten Commandments" movie). For four hundred years the Hebrew people had lived as slaves, following Egyptian laws. Then God sent a deliverer by the name of Moses who led them across the Red Sea to freedom.

At Mt. Sinai, God called Moses to the top of the mountain to receive the Ten Commandments, the Law His people were to follow in their new land. This event, known as Pentecost, occurred fifty days after the Passover (when they left Egypt, which is celebrated these days on the Roman calendar as Easter).

In ancient Israel, the time of Pentecost was also celebrated as the first month of the year because it began a new era of history for the Hebrews. This month also coincided with the first harvest of grain. Therefore, throughout history, Israel honored the gift of the Law and the first harvest at the feast of Pentecost.

Fast forward to the time of Jesus, following his death, burial and resurrection: for forty days He walked the earth, ate with His disciples, taught them and encouraged them to go out and train up other disciples. Then, on the fortieth day, He left them; rising up into heaven to take His seat beside God the Father, having completed His assignment on earth. On that last day, He instructed His followers to go back to Jerusalem and wait there for the promised Holy Spirit, the third part of the Godhead, who would be with them to lead and guide them.

In the early chapters of the book of Acts in the Bible's New Testament, we learn those disciples obeyed Jesus' directive. One hundred twenty men and women gathered in Jerusalem fasting, praying and appealing to heaven for ten days. They had no insight into how Holy Spirit would come or how long it would take.

The disciples' period of waiting for the Holy Spirit coincided with the beginning of the harvest celebration, or Pentecost, one of three feasts during the year when Jews were commanded to come to the Temple in Jerusalem to honor God. Thus, on the tenth day after Jesus' ascension to heaven, there were many Jewish foreigners from many nations congregated in the city for the festival. Suddenly, at about 6AM the sound of a mighty rushing wind was heard throughout the

house where the 120 were gathered. Soon, flames of fire, which were the form the promised Holy Spirit took at this time, could be seen lighting on each one. They all burst out speaking in languages they did not know. By 9AM the 120 disciples were spilling out into the streets, continuing to speak in those foreign languages.

People from all around the city ran to see what they were hearing. When they arrived, fifteen of those 120 were declaring the wondrous works of God in the native languages of those gathered. The listeners were amazed! How could these people know the languages of all those in attendance and be saying the same thing about God in those very different languages?

This spontaneous gathering of the crowd gave Peter, one of the leaders of the 120, the opportunity to enlighten the festival goers that the works of Jesus were the fulfillment of promises they all knew from hundreds of years ago. Holy Spirit's presence gave Peter the ability to testify about Jesus when, just a few days beforehand, he'd been cowering in fear that the Jews were coming for him, just like they did for Jesus.

To the church, Pentecost is the celebration of the outpouring of Holy Spirit to help believers live a life that demonstrates their faith in Jesus as Savior. In a way, it is also the celebration of the first harvest of grain; grain symbolizing the souls of the





Tournament provides Indians with a few important lessons

Fast-pitch teams from Waupun (14-0) and Kewaskum (9-2) are 1-2 in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference, but that fact didn't intimidate Oakfield, Laconia and Winneconne, which all held their own in the Waupun Tournament held May 16. Two of them went 2-1 while Winneconne was a perfect 3-0 on the day.

Waupun had to settle for just one win in the event, and the Indians also went 1-2, losing a tough, 4-3 decision to Winneconne, then getting roughed up by the Oaks in a 12-2 game before topping Wisconsin Lutheran 4-1.

There is no overall winner in the tournament, according to KHS coach Jeff Gosse, who said, "It's a great tournament going into the state tournament series. All the teams were just beating on each other."

In the loss to Winneconne, KHS had five hits but uncharacteristically had a couple key

mental lapses in the game, and they were costly.

Abbey Weinert had a pair of doubles for the Indians, while McKenzie Rosenthal had two singles, and Breana Trepes delivered a clutch 2-run homer in the sixth inning, and, "That cut it to a one-run lead," Gosse said. Unfortunately, the Indians failed to score again.

Jenna Koglin pitched the entire game, giving up just three hits, while striking out three and walking just one.

In the game against Oakfield, KHS had the bases loaded with two outs and managed to get just one run in the first inning.

Oakfield was much more opportunistic, taking advantage of Indian errors to put seven runs on the board in the second inning. After two innings, the score was 9-1, and Kewaskum never recovered.

Trepes started but was relieved by Maura Roberts in the third.

Again Weinert hit the ball well, getting two hits, while

Trepes had three but only one other Indian had one hit.

"Oakfield is a very, very good team. They're a very disciplined team, and they hit the ball well," Gosse said. "Any weakness we had, they found."

Two of the three Ryan girls on the team, Maddy and McKaela, combined for six hits and four RBIs (runs batted in).

Next the Indians had to face Wisconsin Lutheran with ace pitcher Kate Grunert, who, is "by far, the best pitcher we have seen all year," according to Gosse, who reported she fanned 11 in the seven innings.

"We were scrambling all game long, and we finally broke through in the sixth," Gosse said, reporting Melanie Juech came through with a thrilling 2-run homer to put his team up by three runs. "She hit it to left field. It was her first home run," Gosse said.

Trepes pitched for the Indians, striking out four, walking none and giving up right hits.

While Gosse would have preferred to win all the games, he said, "This tournament has real good competition," and, "We now know what some of our weaknesses are. We know what to work on for the (WIAA) tournament."

In their game against Campbellsport on May 14, it was Kewaskum 8, Cougars 2, with Trepes getting the win. She struck out six, walked none and gave up six hits.

Juech had a real good day at the plate, going a perfect 4x4, while Trepes helped her own cause with three hits. Kewaskum got two runs in the fourth and another six in the fifth.

Zoe Albert took the loss for Campbellsport. She gave up 11 hits, but only two of the Indians' runs were earned, according to Gosse.

In EWC play, Brittany Williams leads the team in batting with a .500 average, while Trepes is batting .492 and Rosenthal .444.

KHS, 17-5 overall, is already one win over last year's

total of 16, but the Indians still want more. "One of our goals is a 20-win season, and he is confident they can reach that mark before the regional gets started."





With a renewed energy from the opening kick right down to the final seconds, the Kewaskum High soccer team played one of its best games of the season last Thursday, shutting out visiting Waupun 4-0.

KHS coach Luke Piwoni had been waiting for a game like this, and the Indians responded, also ensuring a successful Parents Day, especially for seniors Becca Strigenz, Ana Gerhartz, Brooke Enright, Heather May, Rachel Fedorski, Emily Koller and Caley McClyman, who switched from track this spring and is contributing to the effort in her first year out for the sport.

"(Tonight) we just kept pushing toward the goal," Piwoni said. "It was real nice to get a W (win) back. We had to keep our confidence up."

Kewaskum won the Oostburg Tournament, then went into a bit of a scoring slump, going 0-4-1, and Piwoni said, "We just didn't have that consistency" from start to finish, and, "Then we went up against some of the better

teams in the (Eastern Wisconsin) conference."

Waupun found out, however, just how strong the Indians can be, getting "at least 30" shots on goal, while limiting the Warriors to two. One produced a spectacular save by sophomore Courtney Aker, who grabbed a bullet off the toe of Warrior keeper, Jenna Hilton, on a direct kick around the 75-Minute mark.

"That one she took off a laser was fantastic," Piwoni said about Aker's grab. "She's got some nice hands."

The start of the prep basketball season may be five and a half months away, but Don Gruber is already making plans for his first year as the boys varsity coach at his alma mater, Kewaskum High School.

If he's not at Gruber Tool, working out at the Kettle Moraine YMCA or finding time for a round of golf, Gruber is probably at his home going over the tapes of the Indians' game from the 2014-'15 season.

Gruber said, Athletic Director Jason Piittmann gave him tapes from all 23 of the Indians' games, and, "I'm through about half of them," including games vs. Waupun, Plymouth and the heart-breaking 45-39 overtime D-2 regional loss to Campbellsport. That tape, he said, ended before the final seconds of regulation.

"There are some great athletes at Kewaskum," Gruber remarked, noting he could see how close the Indians were to be a good team.

When asked about switching from girls basketball to boys, Gruber said, "I'm really excited about that," but, "It's a lot faster game."

Making another comparison, Gruber said, "Probably
