

## Netters miss out on EWC title

No longer is the Kewaskum High tennis team a doormat in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference.

After struggling in past years to score 10 to 15 points in league play, the "David" Indians toppled several of the Goliaths this season, including Plymouth and Kohler, and posted its best-ever finish in the league, taking third place with 39 points. Kohler and Plymouth tied for the top spot with 41.

The Indians had a chance to claim the EWC title but needed to win all seven points in their finale (May 21) against Howards Grove to do so. The Indians came up a bit short of that goal but still ended up beating the Tigers 4-3 with a near sweep in singles and a win by the unbeaten duo of Hunter Demmon and Noel Bindrich to finish with a 7-1 mark in dual meets in the conference and 8-3 overall.

"They've come a long way. I'm pleased," Andrew Dahlberg, one of the team's co-coaches along with Julia Duquaine, said after the match, indicating depth and experience and were keys to this year's march to the upper division of the nine-team league (Kewaskum did not have enough players for a team this spring or there would have been 10.)

Looking at the total of 39 points, Dahlberg said, "That's a lot of points, but there were some (points) we left out there."

"A lot of teams don't have the depth we have," Dahlberg went on about having 31 candidates, including 11 seniors, many of whom were varsity regulars from two to four years.

Kewaskum got off on the right foot Thursday, with Bille Lehmann and Taylor Nelson winning in straight sets at Nos. 1 and 2 singles.

After going through a rough stretch where he lost three conference matches in a row, Lehmann won the last five vs. Sheboygan Falls, Chilton, Two Rivers, Waupun and Howards

## Medical issue may be cause of Village accident

On May 24, 2015 at approximately 8:43 p.m., the Kewaskum Police Department was dispatched to Kewaskum Citgo, 1149 Fond du Lac Ave., for a traffic accident involving one vehicle with two passengers. The vehicle had left the roadway and struck a sign for the business.

Upon arrival, the driver of the vehicle was unresponsive. CPR was started by the responding officer who was assisted by the Kewaskum Fire

Department. Life saving efforts for the 22-year-old Kewaskum female driver was unsuccessful. A 22-year-old Campbellsport female passenger was transported to St. Joseph's Hospital via Kewaskum Ambulance. She was treated for her injuries and released.

According to a press release, a medical issue with the driver led to the accident. The release further concluded neither alcohol nor drugs are believed to be a factor in the crash. It

also appeared that the driver was not wearing a seat belt at the time of the crash.

The Kewaskum Police Department was assisted by the Kewaskum Fire Department, Washington County Sheriff's Office and Washington County Sheriff's Office Accident Reconstruction Team.

## Village of Kewaskum prepares for summer fun

2015 swim passes will be on sale at the Municipal Building from March 1 through May 31 during regular office hours. Season passes will be sold for a 15% discount off the regular price.

From June 1 thru June 3, season passes will be sold at the Kiwanis Bath House at a 10% discount between the hours of 11 a.m. and 3 p.m.

From June 4 through June 7 season passes will be sold at the Kiwanis Bath House at a 5% discount during the hours of 11 a.m. and 3 p.m.

### Swim Lessons

A special discount will be given to all persons signing up for swim lessons during the week of June 8 through June 13. Registration will be held from 11 a.m. through 3 p.m. at the Kiwanis Bath House on each day, June 8 through June 13.

In order to sign up for swimming lessons, all participants must have a season pass, either individual or included with a family pass. A season pass receipt will need to be shown at the time of registration.

There will be one five-week session beginning Monday, July 13 and ending Friday, August 14.

Swim lessons will be held Monday, Wednesday and Friday. Make-up days will be held Tuesday and Thursday.

Swim lessons are offered only to season pass holders. In addition, resident season pass holders will pay a fee of \$12 per child for swim lessons and non-resident season pass holders will pay a fee of \$20 per child.



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
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## Indians set for next step, second goal

Kewaskum's bats were red hot in its final three Eastern Wisconsin Conference games. Pitching and defense also graded high in the victories that gave the Indians a 12-2 EWC mark, good for second place behind undefeated Waupun.

The perfect week helped the Indians reach the first of their season goals. "Yup, 20 wins," coach Jeff Gosse said of the team's 20-5 regular-season record. The 20 wins is the most ever by an Indians fast-pitch team in the decade and a half he's coached at KHS.

In a twin bill vs. Kiel, Kewaskum won Game 1 20-5 and the nightcap 15-0 in a game that ended after three innings. The Indians had started off the final week of the regular season with a 15-7 victory over Campbellsport.

Gosse used Breana Trepes

and Jenna Koglin to pitch in the first game. Trepes went three innings, giving up four hits and no walks, while striking out seven. Koglin finished up, striking out five, walking one and giving four hits.

Switching to the offense, Gosse said, "We had a bunch of young ladies who had two hits" or more, reporting Lindsay Winkler and McKenzie Rosenthal each had three hits, while Abby Weinert and Melanie Juech each had two. Weinert's hits produced four runs batted in (RBIs), according to Gosse, who said, "Everybody was hitting. Everybody had a hit, even the subs."

Trepes pitched all three innings in the second game to pick up her second win of the day. Once again, she issued no walks, striking out four while giving up four hits.

Weinert, the team's center fielder, continued her tear at the plate, pounding out three hits, including a pair of triples

for five RBIs, while Trepes aided her own cause with a home run and a double.

Kewaskum scored all 15 of its runs in the final inning just before the rain picked up.

Gosse went with his ace, Trepes, against the Cougars on May 19, and while she gave up six hits and six earned runs, she had more than enough offensive support to get the victory. The win was Trepes' 12th against two losses this season, and she should easily win all-conference honors again this spring.

Again, Weinert starred at the plate, stroking two hits which produced three KHS runs, while Kenzie Lehn drove in three runs and freshman right fielder, Emma Debelak, chipped in with three hits. Trepes and Winkler both had two hits.

In the three games, KHS committed just one error, and Gosse said, "That was an em-

phasis this year, to "play clean ball" and not to give up walks. Mission accomplished.

The Indians were scheduled to open tournament play in a D-2 regional game on May 27 at Kewaskum Kiwanis Park against the winner of the Mayville-Brown Deer game, and that brings up Goal No.

2, making a deep run into the tournament.

"We have to get past Mayville to get to (Goal) No. 2," Gosse said. "Mayville's got a good team. They have some great pitching."

Should rain delay any of the games, they will be pushed back an extra day.

Grove to finish 5-3 in the EWC and 9-5 overall.

Dahlberg said Nelson ran into many No. 2s who were "unbelievable," certainly good enough to be 1s on most teams. He also finished at 5-3, not bad for someone who didn't have any experience playing tennis before high school and looks ready to do well in sub-sectional play (May 26).

Nelson said he played one varsity match as a freshman, then played at Nos. 3 and 2 his junior and senior years. "Sad that it's over," Nelson said, "I picked up a racquet my freshman year ...barely joined (the team), and (then said to himself), "Oh I'll try it."

Chas Moede also played well, winning his match over Travis Stanczyk 6-1, 6-2. One

game stood out especially for Moede because it took 15 minutes to determine which of the two would survive.

"It was twenty one times at deuce ... something like that," Moede said.

All three of the winning singles players were regulars a year ago, but Demmon and Bindrich just hooked up this spring, and once they got going, there was no stopping them. "It seems like they are always winning," Dahlberg said. Demmon, a senior, and Bindrich, one of only two junior starters, finished a perfect 8-0 in league play and 11-2 overall.


"I think the kids felt they accomplished something," Dahlberg said, and equally important to the coach is what kind of individuals they are.

"They are nice kids," he said, indicating playing a game like tennis, which is on the honor code, demands discipline.

Kewaskum competed in a D-2 subsectional at the Kohler Sports Core on May 26. Survivors advance to the sectional, which will be played in East Troy today.



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# KHS teams take fifths in last EWC test

Cold temperatures greeted athletes competing in the (May 19) Eastern Wisconsin Conference meet, and while it hampered the efforts by those in the pursuit of meet records, it didn't deter the Plymouth boys and Two Rivers girls in their quest for team titles.

Plymouth, behind some excellent finishes in the sprint races, successfully defended its 2,013 title, piling up 147 points, nine more than Two Rivers (138), while Waupun was third with 121.5, followed in order by Kiel, 100; Kewaskum, 84.5; host Sheboygan Falls, 67; New Holstein, 30; and Campbellsport, 9.

The TR girls, behind their powerhouse distance runners, amassed 157 points for its victory with Kiel in the runner-up spot with 138.5 and Plymouth close behind with 132. Waupun was fourth, with 96, followed by Kewaskum, 77; Sheboygan Falls, 64.5; New Holstein, 20; and Campbellsport, 16.

This was the final EWC meet because Plymouth, Kewaskum, Campbellsport and Waupun will be going to the new Eastern Central Conference beginning in the fall.

"Conditions were tough

again," KHS coach Jason Meinen said, but, "All in all, I was pleased with everyone's efforts."

Kewaskum's boys had a pair of victories. Jason Hanson cleared 6 feet, 4 inches (6-4) to take the high jump, while Ben Watzig threw the discus 138-07, winning by nearly seven feet.

"Jason looked good in the high jump ... had some nice attempts at 6-5," Meinen said. "We will make that soon with some nicer conditions."

About Watzig, "Meinen said, 'Ben did what he had to do. He set the pace early on, and no one could catch him.'"

The high jump was a good event for the Indians as Hanson's younger brother, Brady, cleared 5-10 for third place, giving the team 18 of its 84.5 points.

Kewaskum also had a second-place finish in the 4x100-meter relay with Tony Steger, Steven Nurkala, Gavin Schreier and Brandon Thull clicking for a time of 45 and .84 seconds (45.84), and sophomore Derrek Brock took a second in the 110 high hurdles with a season-best time of 15.86 and added a third in the 300 hurdles, hitting the finish line in 43.21.

Brock was also part of the fourth place finish in the

4x400 relay. He lead off the event and combined with the two Hansons and Cade Peterson for a 3:39.26. Jason Hanson came into the meet with one of the best times in the 800 but struggled in the event with his 2:07.21, taking fourth place.

Another top effort was the third by Thull in the 100, with his season-best 11.36. Thull finished behind Plymouth's Sam Stehling and Jake Schneider, and the three will probably be battling each other again next year as they are all juniors. Thull had been expected to get a place in the long jump but slipped a bit and did not make the top eight.

Another sprint relay that did well with the 4x200, with Jake Hrica, Michael Anderson, Kyle Pamper and Peterson turning in a third place with a time of 1:35.87. This was their best time of the year.

Other top-five efforts included: Thull, 5th in the 200 (23.36); Watzig, 5th in the shot put (41-09); and Tony Leister, 5th in the pole vault, 10-0.

Sarah Kosterman was the lone KHS female to take first. By clearing 8-0, she was the champion in the pole vault. "Sarah won by having less misses than the Plymouth girl, something that will be very

important as we head into the tournament season," Meinen said.

Ellie Debelak, who had won two or three events in many meets this spring, had to settle a second, third, fourth and sixth place on this day. The talented junior athlete placed second in the long jump with a 15-06, which was below her normal efforts. Debelak placed third in the 100 (13.16), fourth in the 400 (1:02.65) and sixth in the 200 (28.39) for 22 team points.

Kewaskum hosted a D-2 regional on May 26, and those finishing among the top four in each event move on to the East Troy sectional this afternoon.

"You can tell from early on it was going to be a very close game," Piwoni said about the game against Eastern Wisconsin Conference foe Kiel, which had beaten the Indians 5-1 in their first meeting. Kewaskum came out "a little flat" in the second half but the defense held together and kept them (Raiders) out of the goal."

## Back nine woes are costly

Third place was there for the taking, but the Kewaskum High team was unable to match the numbers put up by Campbellsport and Plymouth in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference Tournament and had to settle for fifth place in the final standings.

As expected, Sheboygan Falls won the competition, but the Falcons had to come from behind to top an upstart CHS team, to take top honors by 11 strokes, 321 to 332 on the Whispering Springs course near Fond du Lac.

Waupun maintained some consistency to finish third at 334, with Plymouth rounding out the upper division with a 341.

Kewaskum turned in a 351, starting with a 168 on the front nine, then fading on the back with a 183. The final three teams were Two Rivers, 389; New Holstein, 390; and Kiel, 405.

"We were in decent position at the turn," KHS coach Glenn Eischstedt said afterward "It was disappointing because we were capable of doing better."

Falls won its fourth straight and final EWC title, finishing with 11 points from the tournament and mini-tour

events, while Waupun was second at 23 and Plymouth third with 30. Campbellsport jumped past KHS and took fourth with 33, while the Indians were next with 38.

Matt Bachmann and Tyler Beech, both of Sheboygan Falls, finished with 6-over-par 78s to tie for medalist honors. Three others, including Ty Schmidt of Campbellsport, tied for third with 80s.

Kewaskum was led by junior Sam Schlosser, "Mr. Reliable," who fired 41s on both sides for an 82, putting him in a tie for ninth place. After starting with a double bogey six, Schlosser had five pars and a birdie on the front side, and five pars on the back.

Sean Murray was next at 44-40-84, putting him 12th overall, while Andrew Otto shot a 42-48-90, and the final counter was Trent Griesemer, who started off with a sizzling 41, then ran into problems on the back nine for a 54 and a 95.

Andrew Carlton's 47 on the back nine counted in the Indians' total. He shot 50 on the front side for a 97.

For the third year in a row, Bachman was the Golfer of the Year, winning the medal in all but one event.

Schlosser earned second team honors with 36 points, while Murray, Otto and Griesemer all were on the 12-player,

honorable mention unit.

"He's been right there," Eischstedt said about Schlosser, who came in tied for fourth overall as an individual but slid back a few spots to the second team.

On May 18, the EWC schools competed in the mini-tour events of the season the Fox Hills National course, hosted by Two Rivers and Kiel.

Sheboygan Falls tightened its grip on first place by winning the first event with 169 total and taking second in the nightcap, with a 166, a single stroke behind Plymouth.

Kewaskum struggled a bit, taking fifth place with a 181 in the opener and fifth in the second round with a 180, losing a tie-breaker to Campbellsport.

In match No. 1, Schlosser and Otto finished in tied for sixth and ninth with respective scores of 43 and 44. The other two counters were Murray and Carlton with 45 and 49.

Murray's 43 and a tie for ninth was the best score by an Indian. Schlosser was one shot back, while Otto shot 44 and James Banks came in with a 48. Most of the Indians struggled on the par 5, 18th hole, with two bogeys, a double bogey and a triple bogey.
