Sheriff Deputy From Kewaskum Runs Marathon In Full Uniform

Beres, Kewaskum resident and Deputy Sheriff Sergeant of Washington

On May 17, 2015, Chad

County suited up in his officer's uniform like any other day. Only on this day, Beres was running a marathon. Along with seven other Wisconsin police officers, Beres and his team ran the 26 miles in the 2015 Cellcom Marathon in Green Bay, Wisconsin, while carrying the weight of a small child, approximately 20 pounds, on their backs.

Beres cited many reasons behind the run, including fundraising efforts for the national organization, Concerns of Police Survivors, (C.O.P.S.).

"The reason behind wearing the uniform was because it was police week and so we wanted to bring attention to law enforcement, and specifically to law enforcement officers that are killed in

the line of duty," Beres said. "Then, also the tail-end was the fundraiser for C.O.P.S."

Collectively, the team raised over \$10,000 through the fundraising site, <http://www.crowdfunder.com>. Beres exceeded his personal goal of \$1,500 by raising an extra \$50. The organization, C.O.P.S. provides countless resources to survivors, peers, and relatives of fallen officers, including counseling options, peer support, and camps for children of fallen law enforcement.

According to the Director of Public Relations for C.O.P.S., Sara Slone, the efforts of Beres and his group are highly commended by the organization.

We are working to set up an office in Kewaskum. Our goal is to have it open on a part-time basis sometime this summer and then on a full-time basis later this fall.


referred to him as their "favorite uncle" and most important to him was the time he spent with his daughters and grandson.

Every Wednesday morning, my two boys barrel into the Kewaskum Library. They are boys who love to fish, play with toy guns, get dirty, but also love sitting at the feet of a very certain librarian every week. This librarian is the sweet Mrs. Gilles.

She has made an undeniable impact on the love of reading for all three of my children. My family and so many others are so grateful for our children's lives to be touched by such a giving person.

Several years ago, I heard about this librarian at the Kewaskum library who you just have to see to believe. She sounded almost like a character in a children's book and I had to take my own children there to check it out for myself. I was a mom with a toddler and a newborn and very cautious about any adventure that required my children to be quiet or silent.

We walked into the library that I remembered from my own childhood and I loved that instant feeling of returning to that small hometown memory. We barely walked through the doors and we were welcomed by the legendary librarian. She beamed with excitement as soon as we walked through the doors and

Debelak, Lepp, Watzig, Hanson Earn Trips To La Crosse

Season best efforts helped secure spots in the Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association's State Track and Field Meet for three Kewaskum High athletes, including Ellie Debelak, Krystina Lepp and Ben Watzig. Also, Jason Hanson will move on to the competition in La Crosse this coming weekend because his high jump effort was among the top four in the May 29 D-2 sectional in East Troy.

Friday's meet certainly brought out the best for Debelak, who placed third in a fast field of 400 runners with her sizzling time of 59 and .59 seconds. This was her first time breaking the 1:00 mark, which is pretty amazing considering she just ran in the event five times.

Debelak was fourth at East Troy with Milwaukee North's Shatara Mitchell winning the race in 58.27.

Later in the meet Debelak took fourth in the 200, qualifying with a personal-best 26.06, .05 out of third place. Again, Mitchell was the winner after hitting the finish line in 25.79.

This is Debelak's second trip to state. In 2014 she placed in the fifth in the long jump after leaping 16-10.5. Friday she had to settle for sixth place in the event with a jump of 16-02.50 and missed advancing by two places.

"The 200 finals was quite the race," KHS coach Jason Meinen said, reporting several girls were very close at the tape. "Her best time ever, and it was good to see her come back" after the disappointment of not qualifying in the long jump.

Lepp had jumped 4 feet, 10 inches (4-10) in most of the Indians' major meets this spring, and she certainly picked a great time to explode to a new personal best of 5-2.

"It was her day. She looked very good," Meinen said, indicating there were five girls left at 5-1 and Lepp had to make 5-2 or she wouldn't have qualified based on misses. "I believe it was her second try," the coach said.

With the 5-2, Lepp placed fourth. Defending state champion Martin Luther sophomore Brooke Blazie won the event with a 5-06.

And then there was Watzig, who had won the EWC competition with a toss of 138-07. Less than two weeks later, he came up with a 146 on his final throw in the regional and three days after that, added nine feet to that number for a 155-01, giving him a third place finish. East Troy's Miles Kilpin was the winner at 168-01.

"The second throw is the one he got the 155," Meinen said about Watzig. "Again the top discus throws (in the state field) come from our sectional."

Hanson had been flirting with 6-5 in the EWC Relays, jumping 6-4, but in the rainy regional, coach Meinen decided to have him bow out after clearing 6-2, indicating he should save a big effort for the sectional. That big effort may still be out there, as Hanson placed second with a jump of 6-2, an inch out of first place.

"He was pretty steady," Meinen said, indicating now without the 800 and the relay to worry about, Hanson can focus just on jumping.

No other Indians placed among the top six in events. Lakeside Lutheran won the girls competition with an even 100 points, with Kewaskum finishing 14th with 18 points. The KHS boys also had 18 points, which put them in 17th place. The winning team was Milwaukee Lutheran with 95.

Watzig will throw the discus Friday at approximately 11 a.m. (after the competition of the D-3 boys) while Lepp will high jump in the West Pit at 9:30 a.m., immediately after the opening ceremonies.

Qualifying for the D-2 400 and 200 will take place Friday, with the top finishers moving on to the finals.

Hanson will jump Saturday morning. His event gets started in the East Pit at 10:30 a.m.

On May 26, six KHS boys qualified in 10 individual events along with

four relays, while Debelak qualified in three events, Lepp in two and Kosterman in the pole vault, with three girls' relays making the top four to advance.

Watzig won the discus with a personal best toss of 146-0 and took second in the shot put with an effort of 43-04.25. The 146-0 came on his last throw of the finals after fouling on his first two efforts.

So what did he do better on the final try? "I released a lot better," Watzig said, adding, "I've been working on my quickness this year."

Concerning his goal for the sectional, Watzig said, "Hopefully 150."

Jason Hanson was hoping to go 6-5 or better in the high jump but after clearing 6-2, "He (coach Meinen) told me to stop to save it for sectional."

When asked if running on the wet runway affected him, Hanson said, "Not really. It's only a few steps to the pit and you jump."

Hanson also advanced in the 800, finishing second with a time of 2:04.38.

Sophomore Derrek Brock also advanced in the two hurdle races, taking third in the 110 highs (16-94) and coming back with a 43.35 to win the 300 lows.

Debelak decided to compete in just three events rather than try four, and the decision was a good one as she won the 400 (1:00.17), the 200 (27.30) and placed fourth in the long jump (15-00.25).

In the 400, Debelak was booking the final 100 meters, running away from the field (which is quite amazing because she only ran the event two or three times this spring). "I always save it for the end," she said.

Lepp placed third in the 300 hurdles (52.47) and second in the high jump (4-10), while Sarah Kosterman placed fourth in the pole vault (8-0), Emily Krier was fourth in the 3,200 (13:02.83) and the 4x200, 4x400 and 4x800 relays were all fourth.

Other qualifiers included Brandon Thull, who won the long jump at 19-09.75 and then placed fourth in the 100 (11.74); Tony Steger, Steven Nurkala, Gavin Schreier, and Thull, who won the 4x100 in 45.10; Jake Hrica, Michael Anderson, Kyle Pamperin and Cade Peterson, who won the 4x200 relay in 1:36.26; Brock, Peterson, Jason Hanson and Thull, who were second in the 4x400 relay; and Miguel Gonzales and Tony Leister, who finished 3-4 in the pole vault at 11-03 and 11-0.

Hard-hitting Hawks Knock Kewaskum Out Of The Tournament

GRAFTON — The top four girls in Grafton's order were potent Monday afternoon.

Together, they pounded out nine hits in Monday's D-2 regional fast-pitch game, leading the Blackhawks to an 11-5 victory over Kewaskum and ending the Indians' dream season.

Try as they might, KHS had no answer for the 4x4 plate effort of pitcher Ally Parsons and 3x4 her sister and battery mate, Amanda Parsons, who went 3x4. There was also cleanup hitter, Kate Hunt, whose 2RBI double in the second inning gave the Blackhawks a 5-0 lead, which was increased to 6-0 before the inning ended after a single by Ally Parsons.

"We can't seem to beat Grafton. They've got our number," KHS coach Jeff Gosse said afterward, referring to the fact his team was knocked out of the tournament a year ago by the Blackhawks.

Kewaskum had reached two season goals, getting to 20 victories — they finished at 21-6 — and they defeated Mayville, but early errors and a lack of hitting kept them from getting to number three.

"We could have gotten out of that inning clean," Gosse said, referring to the first inning when Grafton rallied after two

outs.

KHS got the two outs on a nifty double play, with Kenzie Lehn snaring a line drive and going to first for the force out. Lehn had trouble handling a ground ball just after that, however, and Grafton was off to a 3-0 lead and just kept adding runs until they were up 11-2 after six.

"We didn't hit tonight. We didn't hit until the last inning," Gosse said. Kewaskum had just three singles to that point (by Lehn, Brittany Williams and Melanie Juech), but with two outs in the seventh, Hailey Plachinski hit a pinch hit double that sparked a three-run rally, thanks to a Grafton error and back-to-back RBI singles by Lindsay Winkler and Juech.

Ally Parsons picked up the win, giving up six hits while walking four and striking out three. Brea Trepes pitched all seven for KHS, giving up 12 hits, striking out one and walking three.

"It was a tough way to go out, but you went out fighting," Gosse said to his tearful players, some of whom had played varsity softball for three and even four years, helping KHS to its most successful season.

Grafton, 20-7, moved on to play Waupun on June 2.

On May 28, the Indians hooked up in a seesaw battle with Mayville, and it took a thrilling 4-run rally in

the bottom of the sixth for them to erase a 5-3 deficit and pick up a 7-5 victory.

Abby Weinert, the lead-off batter, was a huge part of Kewaskum's offense, pounding out two triples, including one down the right field line to open the game. She quickly scored on Lehn's sacrifice bunt.

Weinert's second triple came in the third, scoring Emma Debelak, who had singled. After Lehn struck out, Trepes hit a grounder to short, which drove in Weinert, giving KHS a 3-2 lead.

Trepes ran into trouble in the top of the fifth when she gave up a 2-run double by Hannah Herbeck. A couple of mental miscues on bunts allowed the Cardinals to load the bases, and the first run scored on a ground out just before Herbeck's blast.

For a couple of minutes, thoughts of Kewaskum's 2014 opening round loss to Grafton came to mind, but the Indians could have no part of an early exit from the tournament.

In their half of the sixth, Kewaskum started off with a single and after McKenzie Rosenthal struck out, Winkler bunted for a base hit, but Maddy Kreis, pinch running for Trepes was called out, trying to go to third base.

The Indians were down to their final out, and they responded, starting with an RBI double off the left fielder's glove by Juech, followed by an RBI single by Maddy Lehmann, a single by Williams and a clutch double by Emma Debelak, scoring Lehmann, putting the Indians up 6-5.

Freshman Skylar Donath, pinch running for Williams, advanced to third and alertly scored when the catcher made a bad throw back to the pitcher after a pitch.

"Everything after two outs," Gosse said.

Trepes gave up seven hits, struck out three and walked a pair. The loser, Libby Schellpfeffer, struck out five and walked one.

Changes Are Coming For Area Baseball Teams

The face of the Eastern Wisconsin Conference baseball league is going to be changing. All the current teams in that league had agreed to stay together for baseball even though four are moving to the Eastern Central Conference next fall.

But then ... earlier this year, Two Rivers made a decision to go to spring baseball, beginning in 2016, and according to Campbellsport Athletic Director Tom Griesmer, his school will leave the baseball conference next summer to play spring ball in the new conference. The School Board made the decision on the move.

Griesmer said they are trying to accommodate families who have been asking school officials for free time in the summer and this will allow athletes to participate in summer camps in other sports.

"We need multiple sport athletes at Campbellsport," Griesmer said, reporting this year he had difficulty filling out the schedule for summer baseball.

It was also announced recently, Kewaskum has been accepted as a member of the North Shore baseball conference,

which has teams from the Wisconsin Little Ten and the North Shore Leagues, including Germantown, Whitefish Bay, Cedarburg, Homestead, West Bend East and West, Nicolet, Port Washington and Grafton.

Germantown is the largest of the schools, at 1,400, while Homestead has 1,300 students, and four more are between 1,000-2,000. Kewaskum's enrollment is currently at 585, according to the WIAA web site.

Kewaskum Athletic Director Jason Piittmann said the move will be made for the 2016 season and this was an administrative decision, made after communications with the coaches.

"We ended up making it a 10-team league," Piittmann said Monday, indicating the JV-2 team (mostly freshmen) have been playing in this league for a couple of seasons and, "This will put all of our teams in the same conference."

Had KHS gone with Campbellsport into the new league for baseball, as well as most all of the other sports, there would have been seven as Waupun is moving from the Little Ten in spring to the EC.

"We know the competition will be tough," Piittmann went on. "We know it will be a tall task."

A year ago, Kewaskum's JV2 team won a couple games in the North Shore, while the KHS varsity was 8-10 in the EWC.

When to play baseball, spring or summer has long been debated by the Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association (WIAA), which still conducts state tournaments for both but has trimmed the field of the summer tournament to just four teams because there have been just over 50 competing in summer baseball.

Slinger and Arrowhead switched to spring this year, and now with other moves, only four Eastern Wisconsin Conference teams, Plymouth, Kiel, New Holstein and Sheboygan Falls remain.

Piittmann said he heard those teams might explore combining with the Central Lakeshore Conference, but he didn't know any specifics.

And what will happen if the Indians have difficulty competing against the larger schools? Piittmann said, "It's something we will be keeping tabs on but will give it at least a couple years to determine."



Credit Score Vs. Credit Report: Which Is More Important To Check Regularly?

—UW-Extension Campaign Highlights Simple Way To Check Your Free Credit Reports

UW-Extension's ongoing "Check Your Free Credit Report Campaign: 2/2, 6/6, 10/10" points out that it is much more important to check your credit report regularly than to know your credit score.

Your credit score is calculated using information in your credit report, and it is up to you up to make sure the information in your report is accurate and up-to-date. About one in five adults may have errors in their reports (www.ftc.gov/os/2013/02/130211factareport.pdf).

These errors could affect how much you pay for a loan or insurance, whether you are offered a job, or whether you can rent a house or an apartment. Checking your report is also a way to detect identify theft.

Federal law lets you check your credit reports for free once a year from each of the three credit reporting agencies: Equifax, Experian, and TransUnion. The free credit reports you are entitled to by law are only available through AnnualCreditReport.com and its associated mailing address and phone number. There are some other circumstances that allow you to obtain additional free reports (see www.fyi.uwex.edu/credireport).

To make it easier for people to monitor their free credit reports, UW-Extension's "Check Your Free Credit Report Campaign:

2/2, 6/6, 10/10," encourages people to view their three free credit reports each year on February 2, June 6 and October 10.

"2/2, 6/6, 10/10 is an easy-to-remember set of three dates," says Shelley Tidemann, Fond du Lac County UW Extension family living educator. "Each represents a day to set aside a few minutes to request one of your free credit reports."

The campaign's website www.fyi.uwex.edu/credireport explains why it's important to check your credit reports, walks you through the process of getting and reading your reports, explains what to do if you find errors, and provides more information about the differences between credit reports and credit scores.

Your credit report is a collection of all of your credit activities within the past seven to 10 years, such as your payment history for a credit card or auto loan. This information is used to calculate your credit scores. Everybody has several credit scores — different companies calculate your credit score in different ways.

Your scores change constantly based on your payment history, amount of current debt, length of credit history, amount of new credit, and types of credit used. Because the information in your credit report determines your score, it is critical to check your report

regularly.

Although your credit score is now available for free through AnnualCreditReport.com, an increasing number of credit card companies provide credit scores to their customers. Financial counseling organizations may also provide free scores to clients (go.wisc.edu/56fsua).

Tidemann emphasizes that there is only one legitimate source for a free credit report, and there are many imposters. "AnnualCreditReport.com (www.annualcreditreport.com) along with its phone number and mailing address are the only truly no-cost ways to obtain the free credit reports everybody is entitled to by law," she said.

Other websites claim to offer free reports, scores or monitoring, but they often charge significant one-time or ongoing fees. Unsolicited e-mails, pop-ups or phone calls offering free scores or reports are not official.

"Much like campaigns that promote healthy eating and physical activity, our goal is to help people save money and improve their financial health," says Tidemann. #Because of UWEX



"The efforts of these officers shows how they not only serve and protect their community through their daily tasks of law enforcement, it also shows how the law enforcement community goes above and beyond to protect each other and their families even after the ultimate sacrifice is made," Slone said. "The entire C.O.P.S. membership is proud of them and their contribution will help surviving families and co-workers continue to rebuild their shattered lives."

Although Beres himself has not lost a personal friend in law enforcement, his motivation is in honor of a former member of his department — Deputy Sheriff John Mark Schmitt, who died September 7, 1998.

"Everything I do is with him in mind," Beres said. "I

do another event, which was actually before the marathon — the Police Unity Tour and I always ride in honor of him."

As for the competitive nature that many running events have, for the team of eight, Beres said winning was not the goal.
