Community Remembers Boys' Lives

A year has gone by since the tragic car accident that claimed the lives of Brent Schultz and Travis Trapp.

But the Kewaskum community has not forgotten the two.

Travis, 16, of Cascade and Brent, 16, of Kewaskum were Kewaskum High School students who died in a car crash on June 18, 2014.

On Friday evening, about 150 people gathered at KT Organic Farms on Highway 28 to remember the boys.

People signed tributes onto 105 helium balloons, and after a few words of remembrance they released the balloons.

Many tears were shed by classmates, friends and family members as the

balloons drifted off into the sky.

They stood in silence, some with arms around each other, as "Drink A Beer," by Luke Bryan, played from a boom box.

The event drew more people than what the families had expected.

"It started out as a small group of about 10 people, but then it blossomed into more than a hundred people," Kevin Thull said.

"There are so many blessed people out there supporting these families," said Anne Raskiewicz, a family friend. "I want the families to know that the whole entire community supports them in everything they are going through. The support of the whole local community is amazing."

Flight Of Honor

—Kewaskum Resident Goes On Stars And Stripes Honor Flight

There was little fanfare for Richard Herriges when he returned to the United States after serving in the Korean War in 1953.

However, on June 6, Herriges went on a Stars and Stripes Honor Flight to Washington, D.C., and was recognized for his service everywhere he went.

"Everybody was shaking his hand and thanking him for his service. Little kids, everybody. There was patriotism everywhere. It was awesome," his daughter Jean Herriges said.

Herriges, 86, was part of a group of about 141 Wisconsin veterans who had served in the military during the Korean War or World War II who went on the Honor Flight.

Police escorted the veterans to numerous landmarks and memorials in the nation's capital, includ-

ing the Korean Veterans Memorial.

"This was a very, very great day. We toured all over the area," Herriges said.

Line Of Duty

When Herriges was in his 20s, he was drafted into the military. He vividly remembers reading the notice that said, "You have been selected."

After completing his basic training at Camp Chaffee, Arkansas, Herriges and the other soldiers stood, waiting to learn their assignments. One by one, names were called as young men were told they would be sent to Germany or somewhere in Europe.

Then the officer said, "Herriges: Korea."

Herriges was sent to serve in the 145th heavy artillery Army battalion.



In order to safely and quickly assist traffic out of the Village at the conclusion of the fireworks, the Kewaskum Police Department will be directing traffic as shown on the map above. Anyone parked in the grass lot or on the west side of the Milwaukee River will be directed west on Highway 28 to Highway 45. At that point, cars can travel north or south. If parked on the east side of the Milwaukee River, vehicles will be directed to travel out of town east on Highway 28 or north on Highway S. We will also have officers on Highway 45 at Highway H West (by the Dairy Queen). Vehicles coming off of Highway H onto Highway 45 will only be allowed southbound on Highway 45. Northbound vehicles on Highway 45 will not be allowed west on Highway H at that location. Enforcement of these traffic routes is expected to last for approximately one hour after the conclusion of the fireworks.

Remember, lighting off fireworks is illegal and will result in a citation being issued. Sparklers are not allowed in Riverhill Park for the safety of those in the park.

All members of the Kewaskum Police Department will be wearing bright colored vests in order to be visible. Officers will be on foot patrol, bike patrol and automobile patrol. Stop an officer at anytime if you need help. Have fun and please drink responsibly.

Outdoor recreational fires are allowed in the village, however you are not allowed to burn any yard waste or any kind of rubbish. You can only burn natural wood or a manufactured fire log and it must be in a fire pit or in a commercially sold outdoor fire place.

Fires are allowed until 2 a.m., but please be mindful of your neighbors. Being allowed to have a fire until 2 a.m. does not mean you can be loud

and create a disturbance.

Some of the specific skills include remaining calm in a crowd or around other animals and reaction to distractions and loud noises. Chris also had to pass a test provided by Pet Partners. Pet Partners are required to be re-evaluated every two years.

Over the past year, many of the boys' classmates have been there for the families, Thull said. That friendship has helped the families survive the year, he said.

"The boys never liked school, but obviously they made an impact on others," Thull said.

The families have been especially amazed by the show of support from the students who have not forgotten Brent or Travis.

"Everyone still remembers Travis and Brent, so out of something so tragic, something good comes. A lot of these kids I never would have known," Jessica Trapp said.

"They bring my wife flowers and come to visit," Thull said. "We have a strong faith, and that really makes a difference."

Friday's event added to the occasions that have helped the families cope.

"Every event helps," Randy Trapp said.

"These families have been supported by so very many friends and family, the loss they are enduring can only be complemented by the knowledge that their sons have touched

so very many in their brief time, truly young lives lost that will never be forgotten," Raskiewicz said. "If a loss like this accident has any meaning, it truly shows the resilience of the human spirit and the compassion that binds our community. The Trapps, Thulls and Shultzes are blessed in a very paradoxical way."

Friday evening ended with fireworks at the farm. People gathered in the dark, looking up at the bright fireworks display.

In the sky, above the fireworks, two stars were visible.

A fund has been set up in the boys' names to help raise funds for a greenhouse at Kewaskum High School. In addition, scholarship money has been raised in their memory.

Connie Marks had never organized a flash mob dance before.

But she never had more of a reason to celebrate than she did on Saturday, when she wanted to surprise her sister Debbie Bath Duenkel for her 50th birthday.

"She has been going through a lot with her cancer. She is Stage 4, and we've had a really tough time the last couple months, so I want to do something special," Marks said.

Duenkel was successfully surprised by the flash mob scene.

"Shocked would be more like it," Duenkel said. "It totally took me off guard."

When Duenkel and her husband, Ray Duenkel, drove into Kiwanis Park in Kewaskum in their brown Mazda CX-5, the only unusual thing Duenkel noticed was that the parking lot was lined with pink balloons.

Duenkel was slightly suspicious at first.

"Are those for me? No, don't even think that," Duenkel thought to herself.

Then she saw a sign for a graduation party, so she figured they were graduation balloons. But as she got closer, Duenkel could see that they said "Happy Birthday," so she deduced they might be for her.

When she saw her sister, niece and daughter dressed in pink T-shirts and the big 5-0 on the basketball court, she knew the balloons were for her.

"I didn't at all notice the other people. But then the music and the dance started. All of a sudden, these people started popping up from the ditches and stuff. It was really cool, it really was," Duenkel said.

Every time Duenkel saw another person, she said, "Oh my gosh! They came too!"

Duenkel, who lives in Kewaskum, sat on a lawn chair with her great niece, five-year-old Desi Keys, on her lap.

"Debbie, why are you crying and laughing at the same time?" Desi asked.

"I thought it was amaz-

ing. I mean, it totally blew my mind. My sister and my daughter and those guys got people together to learn this dance, and people came from Random Lake and West Bend just to do this dance for me. I was very touched," Duenkel said.

In all, a couple dozen friends and family came from across the area to celebrate Duenkel's birthday.

Duenkel was first diagnosed with Stage 2 breast cancer in April 2010. She underwent surgeries and chemotherapy treatments. She was cancer-free for about 18 months, until the cancer spread to her liver in August 2012. Since then, she has been treated with a variety of chemotherapy drugs in an effort to keep the disease at bay.

To create the flash mob dance, Marks met with Duenkel's daughter, Missy Healy, and niece, Stephanie Keys. Together, they developed the choreography and practiced the moves together.

Then, to publicize the event, they took an ad out in the Kewaskum Statesman and put the event up on Facebook.

"It's been hard to keep it a surprise," Healy said.

Duenkel's family had to hide the newspaper from her, and the event had to stay private on Facebook.

The crowd arrived at the park a couple hours early so they could practice the dance before Duenkel arrived at the party. The group performed to the song "Overcomer" by Mandisa.

"We all overcome things daily," said Duenkel's friend Lisa Streets, who came from her home in Slinger to surprise Duenkel.

Saturday's party is evidence of how family and friends have helped Duenkel overcome her frustrations with cancer, Duenkel said.

"It's just amazing the amount of support I have from my family and friends," she said. "My husband has been my rock through all of this cancer...My friends are all always there for me."

She has always had a competitive drive.

"Any time I get up to the lanes, I want to win. That is what I expect of myself, nothing less," Muench said.

When she learned that she could get a college scholarship through bowling, she signed up to be coached by Ben and Geri Hoefs. The couple lived in West Bend at the time and have since moved to Alabama, Muench said.

Muench is now coached by Jason Guest in Des

Moines, Iowa.

But Muench credits most of her success to her parents, Scott and Karen Muench.



"I wouldn't be where I am today if it wasn't for my parents and all of their support throughout the years," she said.

Her parents have enjoyed watching Muench compete.

"It's been a great experience, not just for her, but for us as parents, because we get to go out and enjoy all this, meet new people, and see a lot of different parts of the country," Scott Muench said.

In college, Muench is majoring in business management, marketing and human resources. She currently has an internship at the Ronald McDonald House in Des Moines and works as a server at a Des Moines restaurant.

She hopes to one day own her own business, perhaps a fitness facility or a bridal shop.

Muench said that bowling helps her keep focused in school.

"It definitely helps the time management. And I stay motivated because when you are in school and you are a student athlete, you have to maintain a certain GPA in order to be eligible. That pushes me. And I just like to have good grades. If I don't have at least a 3.8 or higher, I'm usually disappointed, unless I have an

extremely tough class," Muench said.

Last semester, Muench was named to the President's List at Grand View University for maintaining a 4.0 grade point average throughout the spring semester. Her overall GPA is 3.78.

Muench served as her college bowling team's captain this past year. The team came in 10th in United States Bowling Congress, fifth in the National Athletic Independent Association and seventh at the national competition in Wichita, KS, in April.

Muench is ranked 37th in the country's collegiate bowlers, with a 189.16 average. She came in first place with a 224.5 average at the V-Hawk Tournament in La Crosse.

"Right now bowling is the fastest growing sport in collegiate level, and it's actually a sport that anybody can do," Scott Muench said.

The professional women's bowling tour was dropped 12 years ago, but was brought back this year, Scott Muench said.

Muench said one thing she likes about bowling is that it is something she can do for many years to come.

"It's not something that you stop after college," Muench said. "Sometimes with baseball or football, you have your one or two chances, and if you don't get those, you can't go any further, whereas with bowling you can keep working at it until you get there."

Muench is also grateful for the opportunities bowling has given her.

"I met a lot of people through bowling, including my fiancé," Muench said. "I would definitely recommend it. There is not a profile for it as far as being athletic. It's very fun."

Comeback Comes Up Short Against West Bend



1. The siding on the Kiwanis Bathhouse has been completed.

2. Water service repair areas were cleaned-up.

3. Repairs to the ball diamonds are being completed.

4. There were two water main breaks on Roseland Drive.

Administrator Heiser:

1. Reported on the property maintenance issues. Currently there are 17 grass violations and 8 junk violations. Certified letters are being sent and property owners will have 5 days to comply with the Municipal Code and then the village will perform the lawn maintenance issues. Consensus of the Board was to review and possibly increase the charge for work done by the village at the next Village Board meeting.

Clerk Stephanie Justmann reported on the May 13, 2015 Board of Review. An objection was heard on 100, 102 and 104 Badger Road. The 2015 Assessment summary was also reviewed and is down overall from 291,122,800 in 2014 to 290,945,700 in 2015. This is mostly due to a shift in classification from commercial to manufacturing. The manufacturing assessments are completed by the State and will be received in October.

The next Plan Commission meeting is scheduled for May 26, 2015.

Dave Zehren, Chairman for the Park and Recreation Committee reported on the May 14, 2015 meeting. Various organizations were present at the meeting and a list of maintenance items for the Kiwanis Park ball diamonds were reviewed. A joint effort will continue between the village, school and various athletic associations to complete the needed upkeep and improvements.

Dave Spenner, representative for the Library Board reported on the May 11, 2015 meetings. Circulation and overall usage has remained at an average level. The Library Foundation is continuing their efforts toward fund raising to expand the library.

The next Mid-Moraine Dinner meeting is scheduled for May 27, 2015 and will be hosted by the Village of Belgium.

Administrator Heiser reported on the follow-up on the 2014 Audit. A meeting was held between the Auditor, Administrator, Treasurer and Clerk to address internal controls. The areas reviewed were payroll, taxes, utility billing and receipting, financial reporting and technology.

Some areas of internal control cannot be resolved due to staff size. However, most of the concerns regarding internal controls can be corrected by implementing new and current operating standards. This will achieve a higher level of reliability.

Josh Layer, from Burbach Aquatic, Inc., was on hand to present the Agreement for Professional Services to perform the first step of a feasibility study for the Kiwanis Pool. The agreement for \$2,400 will provide up to three concept plans and a study of the current facility as to maintenance, probable operating cost impacts, the quality of the aquatic environment and serviceability. Motion by David Spenner to accept the Agreement for Professional Service from Burbach Aquatics, Inc. and to have item (17) read as follows: The undersigned certifies that they have been authorized to enter into this Agreement, which is for three (3) phases of professional service if occurring within two years, second by James Wright. The evaluation forms for the Administrator performance evaluation were distributed and should be returned to the Village Treasurer before June 1st.

Continued From... Flight Of Honor

—Kewaskum Resident Goes On Stars And Stripes Honor Flight

It took 18 days for Herriges to get to Korea by sailing across the ocean. Then he spent one night traveling by train.

"Finally we got to where we were supposed to be, and then they split us up," Herriges said. "I didn't know anybody. Not a soul."

He has acute memories of his first night in Korea.

"It was a total blackout that night. You better not have any lights on whatsoever, not even to light a match. Not to give up your position at night," Herriges said.

He remembers how he didn't have a sleeping bag.

"I didn't have nothing except an empty flat canvas cot. A couple men had some extra blankets, so they gave me those," Herriges said.

Herriges didn't know the layout of the land, so he stayed put all night.

"You didn't dare go off site, you probably wouldn't

find your way back, until you got used to the place," Herriges said. "But we made it."

After Herriges completed his two-year tour of duty with the military, he returned to Wisconsin and married his wife, Audrey. The two live in Kewaskum and celebrated their 59th wedding anniversary on June 23. They have eight children, 18 grandchildren and 13 great-grandchildren.

The Honor Flight

The Honor Flight dates back to 2004, when Earl Morse, a physician assistant and retired Air Force Captain in Ohio, started the volunteer program in an effort to help World War II veterans visit the World War II Memorial.

The program, which is run completely by volunteers, is now open to anyone who has served in the military during World War II or the Korean War.

Veterans each have a volunteer "guardian" to care for them during the trip. Guardians pay for their trip, but there is no charge for veterans.

Herriges traveled with his daughter, Jean Herriges, who sent in the application for her father to go on the Honor Flight two years ago. It was well worth the wait, she said.

"It was a great group," Jean Herriges said.

The trip was well organized, with lots of volunteers keeping everyone in order, Jean Herriges said.

"You couldn't take a wrong step if you tried," Jean Herriges said.

It was a long day, with the flight leaving Milwaukee at 5 a.m. and returning around 11 p.m.

The group visited the World War II, Lincoln, Vietnam, Iwo Jima and Air Force memorials. But the Arlington National Cemetery and the Korean War Memorial are what stood out most to Herriges.

"They claim that no matter where you stand, there's one of these guys looking at you," Herriges said, recalling the Korean War Memorial.

"It gives you goose bumps thinking about it," Jean Herriges said.

When the group returned to the Milwaukee airport, more than 50 family members, friends and neighbors were there to welcome Herriges home.

"I can't express the appreciation I have for everyone that came down," Herriges said.

Herriges also is grateful to the Honor Flight organization for the experience.

"It was quite a day," Herriges said. "It was a super, super trip."

"Hopefully all veterans get to experience it. It's an amazing experience," Jean Herriges said.

The Honor Flight helped Herriges' family understand and appreciate what Herriges had gone through during the war.

"It really opens your eyes," Herriges' son Kevin Herriges said. "It has been called 'the forgotten war,' but now it is forgotten no more."
