Never Forgotten

-Benches Memorialize Washington County Law Enforcement Officers Killed In The Line Of Duty

17 years ago, on Sept. 7, 1998.

Schmitt has not been forgotten.

John "Spike" Schmitt, a deputy for the Washington County Sheriff's Office, died in a car crash on U.S. Highway 45 near Sandy Ridge Road while on duty. He was 31.

Schmitt had been training an officer, and the two were headed north on U.S. Highway 45 when they received a call for assistance in Kewaskum. The vehicle in front of them wouldn't pull over, so the other officer, who was driving, pulled out to pass and hit an oncoming vehicle. A total of seven others were injured, and Schmitt's rookie partner was admitted to a local hospital for observation.

A bench was recently installed along the Eisenbahn State Trail near the accident site. Schmitt's name, along with the words "never forgotten," are engraved on the bench. Abbreviations documenting the date of Schmitt's "End of Watch" with the Washington County Sheriff's Office.

Further south along the trail are two more memorial benches that honor two other Washington County law enforcement officers who died in the line of duty.

School Board Prepares To Hire New Kewaskum High School Principal

Scott Stier will be brought before the school board on Monday, Aug. 24, to be approved as the new Kewaskum High School principal.

Stier has been in the West Bend School District for 19 years. He spent the last seven years as the athletic director for West High School and Badger Middle School. Prior to this, Stier was a science teacher for 12 years.

"We feel very fortunate to have attracted such a qualified candidate," School Superintendent James Smasal said.

Over the last two weeks, a number of options were

discussed as to how to best meet the leadership needs of the district, Smasal said.

"With Scott's arrival, we will be able to keep the same administrative structure as last year," Smasal said.

William Loss resigned from the position as the Kewaskum High School principal at the Aug. 10 school board meeting. Loss accepted a position in the Watertown school district to better meet the needs of his family.

"We wish him well as he moves to his new position," Smasal said.

Kewaskum Man Injured In Dodge County Accident

On Wednesday, Aug. 12, at 12:48 p.m., the Dodge County Sheriff's Office responded to a motor vehicle crash on US Highway 151, south of Forest Road in the Township of Calamus, Dodge County.

Preliminary investigation shows that Charles Scheuerell (87 and from Nashotah) was operating a 2007 Buick south on US Highway 151 in the left/inside lane and was

slowing to make a left turn at the median crossover. Mark DeHeck (47 and from Kewaskum) was operating a 2005 Envoy south on US Highway 151 behind the Buick.

The Envoy failed to slow for the Buick and both vehicles collided. There were no passengers in either vehicle.

Scheuerell was severely injured in the crash and transported to Beaver Dam Hospital, but was

immediately flown by MedFlight helicopter to UW Hospital in Madison. DeHeck sustained minor injuries in the crash and was not transported to a hospital.

Assisting at the scene were MedFlight helicopter, Beaver Dam Fire Department and EMS.

The crash remains under investigation by the Dodge County Crash Investigation Team.

\$2,138,776 Available For Housing Repairs

The Wisconsin Department of Administration (DOA) Division of Housing awarded \$2,138,776 in Phase 2 funds to the Southern Housing Region for the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Housing Program.

The Southern Housing Region is represented by the counties of Columbia, Dodge, Jefferson, Kenosha, Ozaukee, Racine, Rock, Sauk, Walworth and Washington. The following entitlement communities are not eligible for the Southern Housing Region: Racine, Beloit, Janesville and Kenosha.

These funds provide resources across Wisconsin to address affordable housing and community development. The funds are available for the following types of projects:

•Owner occupied households. These funds will be lent to income eligible

households for eligible home repairs. The loan is a zero percent interest, deferred payment loan — you do not pay it back until you sell the house, no longer live there or 30 years from the date of the note.

•Homebuyer assistance. These funds will be lent to income eligible tenants for down payment and closing cost assistance. There may also be funds available to make repairs to the home that is purchased. The loan is a zero percent interest, deferred payment loan — you do not pay it back until you sell the house, no longer live there or 30 years from the date of the note.

•Landlords. Installment loans are available for landlords who rent to tenants that are low- to mod-


erate- income. The loan is a zero percent interest loan.

The funds can be used for handicap accessibility, windows, doors, siding, roofing, electrical, plumbing and heating.

Funding for these competitive biannual awards is provided by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development. Grants were awarded based upon the age of housing in the area, the low-to-moderate income population, unemployment rate and affordability.

Athletic Groups Come Together To Discuss Kiwanis Park Issues

Kiwanis Park in Kewaskum is home to many athletic groups.

There are youth leagues, club sports, high school athletics and adult leagues that use the park.

Last week, those groups came together to discuss how well the park meets their needs and any possible changes.

The group included representatives from the village as well as youth soccer, tee-ball, baseball and softball leagues. People representing the high school baseball and softball teams attended the meeting. The men's baseball league also gave input.

"They all share the same facilities, the same diamonds," Village Administrator Matt Heiser said.

And they share some of the same concerns.

"They talked about the

issues they are having, and make sure they have their space in the park," Heiser said.

Besides an overall lack of space, there's a contention that the hardball diamond, which is diamond number 4, located on the south side of the creek, is a poor place to play baseball.

"There are drainage issues, so if it rains, the field is really, really wet. There are grading issues, so the right field is 8 feet higher than left field. There are sun issues because the home plate is in the northwest corner when it should be in the southwest corner, so the sun is in the players' eyes more than it should be," Heiser said.

Part of the discussion at the meeting was also about what kind of investment needs to happen to fix up the diamonds and dugouts.

Heiser formed the group after parents who have

children in the high school baseball program came to the village last month requesting that changes be made to the fields.

"It kind of got people asking, 'What are the plans? Where did you see this thing going?' I've coordinated a group of stakeholders to meet and talk about the future of the park, what facility needs they have and what coordination issues we have," Heiser said.

The group will meet again in September.

Once they come to a consensus, the joint group will make a recommendation to the village board.

"The village doesn't have any user of the diamonds. All the diamonds are outside groups and school groups, so if they decide that something needs to be done, and they come up with the money, the village doesn't really mind," Heiser said.

Village Struggles With Maintenance Issues Of Foreclosed Home

Last week, David and Carole Zehren received a beautification award from the village and the Kewaskum Women's Club for their property on Washington Avenue.

Next door to the Zehrens' home, at 639 Washington Ave., a foreclosed house sits vacant and in disrepair.

"We are just looking in through the windows. We can see mold all over the walls, all over the ceilings, and there appear to be mushrooms growing on the floor. It's nasty," Village Administrator Matt Heiser said.

The property at 639 Washington Ave. was foreclosed about 18 months ago. The person who had the mortgage was evicted, and Deutsche Bank out of Pennsylvania repossessed the house, Heiser said.

Deutsche Bank hired a property maintenance company to care for the property, Heiser said.

"There are third party companies that are hired to make sure the grass is cut or whatever. This property maintenance company has not been very responsive, and the village has essentially taken over the grass cutting because they won't do it," Heiser said.

The maintenance company's office is located in Georgia, so it is difficult to pursue them with a police

citation, Heiser said.

Instead, the village has been maintaining the lawn at the property and levying the cost onto the property's tax bill. That way, other taxpayers do not have to foot the bill, Heiser said.

To make matters worse, earlier this year, there was a water leak in the house.

"We had told them [the bank] if there isn't anybody living in the house, the house is cold in the winter, you risk having frozen pipes. We had to badger them to do this," Heiser said.

The village must get permission to turn off water. In addition to turning the water off at the valve by the street, village officials always go into a house to test to make sure the valve is completely closed, Heiser said.

"These valves don't get turned every day. Some of them have never been turned, so they may not work entirely," Heiser said. "So we always enter the house and then turn on the faucet to see if any water comes out."

The bank would not give the village permission to enter the house, and it turned out the water wasn't shut off completely.

"They had a burst pipe over the winter, and to my knowledge, they have not even been back to look at the house. I've been sending them tons of emails, begging them to come take a look at this place, and they won't respond,"

Heiser said.

So, last winter, there was water all over the interior of the house. That water has now turned to mold. The blades of the ceiling fans are drooping from absorbing moisture from the air.

"The kitchen cupboards are falling off the wall," said David Zehren, who is afraid the house is a health hazard. "We've got to live next to that."

Another issue is that there is an above-ground pool in the back yard. The liner is currently ripped and nonexistent in parts, and paint is peeling from the exterior.

"I reviewed the situation with the village attorney on Tuesday [Aug. 11], and we do have a plan of attack to get rid of the pool and get our inspectors in the building to assess the damage," Heiser said.

The village has to request inspection because it is private property, Heiser said. If the bank doesn't grant permission for the inspection, the village can go to court and get a court-ordered inspection, Heiser said.

If inspectors deem the property fixable, the village can force the bank to rehab the place. If inspectors don't feel it is fixable, the village can issue a raze order, Heiser said.

All of the options can be put on the tax bill for that property so other taxpayers will not be affected, Heiser said.

Bookies Discuss Books At Library – Local Book Club Accepting New Members

Long before Oprah ever started her national book club, there was a book club in Kewaskum that was going strong.

The group, which now calls itself “The Bookies,” was first formed about 60 years ago by Phyllis Bade and Ruth Behnke. The book club is still going strong.

“It is just a nice time to get together with different people,” Bookie member Connie Zemlicka said. “We enjoy getting together and talking about different things that we got out of the story.”

The Bookies meet on the fourth Tuesday of the month, except for November, when readers gather on the third Tuesday. The group meets at 9:30 a.m. in the Kewaskum Public Library for a 60- to 90-minute book discussion.

The group currently has four or five members, but welcomes new members, Zemlicka said.

“We are always looking for new members,” she said.

Book Club History

Book clubs have been around for a long time, said Bade, who is a former chairperson for the Kewaskum book club.

“I was always a reader,” said Bade, 89, from her home at Kettle Moraine Gardens. “My mother was too, and she belonged to book clubs. Maybe it was a little more unusual then because she was born in 1903.”

The thing that is the most different about book clubs today is that they often now meet at night

rather than during the day, Bade said.

“There are a lot more working women now. That’s the new angle to it,” Bade said. “Some of them worked back then, too. It just was a different era.”

Bade, who has a liberal arts degree from the University of Wisconsin-Madison, stayed home to raise her five children while her husband went to work as a teacher in Kewaskum. During the summers, he worked for the Department of Natural Resources.

“In those days, in the olden days, as my kids say, a lot of the women were more apt to stay home. It was all right with me. I enjoyed my children, not that he didn’t, but he taught all day. It’s just how we worked it out,” Bade said.

The arrangement allowed Bade to do a lot of community and church work. And to participate in the book club.

Over the years, the book club read a variety of books, mostly novels, Bade said. The avid readers finished some historical fiction books, but shied away from the heavier, nonfiction works.

“We didn’t tilt toward the mysteries like everybody does now. But that may be because there are more mysteries being written now, and they are better written. Times have kind of changed in that respect,” Bade said.

Choosing Books


One of the benefits of belonging to The Bookies is being exposed to different books.

“Probably most of us

would agree that it gets us to read different books that we wouldn’t normally have chosen on our own,” said Zemlicka, who has been part of the group since she retired from teaching in 1999.

Some years, the club has tried to pick one classic book or one biography to read, but this year’s list contains no such books.

To compile the current list, participants read book reviews. They chose some chartbusters, such as Pulitzer-Prize winner “All the Light We Cannot See,” by Anthony Doerr, and New York Times bestseller “Bettyville,” by George Hodgman.



In the past, some books were chosen because one of the members recommended a certain book.

“A couple of us had daughters or daughters-in-law who were avid readers, and they would send recommendations,” Zemlicka said.

Sometimes the club read books based on current events at the time.

“For a couple years, we were reading quite a few books about the Middle East. They weren’t factual; they were novels. But we were interested in them because there was so much about that kind of thing in the news, about Iraq and Muslim women and how they were handicapped by all the rules,” Zemlicka said.

The group discusses things such as the writing style and the characters. They talk about whether the story is plausible or not, and whether they liked the book.

“Sometimes it is interesting to discuss the author. It kind of influences the way you think of how he or she wrote or the style that they used,” Zemlicka said. “It’s just interesting to talk about a book with somebody.”

Call Of The Wild Continues To Serve Food While On The Market

The Call of the Wild Bar & Grill, a popular eatery located on the corner of State Road 28 and Forest View Road in St. Michael’s, is up for sale, but it will continue to serve food while it waits for a new owner.

“We are going ahead like it’s any other day, except we are scaling back the menu,” said owner Barb Sowin, who has accepted a fulltime job in Waukesha despite the restaurant’s success.

The new, scaled-back menu is still relatively expansive compared to country bars in the area, said Barb Sowin, who owns the business with her husband, Greg Sowin.

The menu no longer offers specialty dinners, but it still has appetizers, wraps, salads, soups, burgers, chicken sandwich, Mexican entrees, homemade desserts and a Friday fish fry with baked cod and perch options.

“Hopefully people will want to come in for that. We are hoping we won’t lose too many people,” Barb Sowin said. “I wasn’t real keen on the idea of closing.”

The Sowins put the restaurant on the market last month because Barb Sowin accepted a fulltime job at Retail Data Services in Waukesha. The company sells the point of sale system that she has in Call of the Wild.

“Hopefully, eventually, the game plan is to give me a more normal life, where I work during the days and have off during the nights and weekends. That is what I hope to achieve, to be able to spend more time with my grandchildren and my kids and my husband,” Barb Sowin said.

Barb Sowin announced that the eatery was going up for sale on the restaurant’s facebook page on July 15.

“The post went viral. It reached over 22,000 people within 24 hours,” Barb Sowin said.

The response was a

tribute to the business.

The restaurant has become a destination point. People travel from Milwaukee, Fond du Lac and Appleton to eat at the locale.

“We have a pretty good draw and a very good reputation. Even people on Google reviews and Trip Advisor, for the most part, give a pretty positive review. I’m pretty proud of what we have accomplished so far,” Barb Sowin said.

The restaurant has been profitable, she said.

“Just what we do in gross sales is pretty impressive for being a little bar out in the country,” Barb Sowin said. “I’m definitely not selling because we are not financially making it. That’s not the case.”

The fact of the matter is that a job opportunity came along that she did not want to pass up.

“It’s hard to not start thinking about slowing things down a little. I’ve been doing this my entire adult life, being in the restaurant business, and it wears on you. I’ve had two replacements already. It’s just time to start slowing down,” Barb Sowin said.

The Sowins originally opened the Call of the Wild in February 2009 on Long Lake. They moved the restaurant to its current location in July 2010.

The Sowins worked hard to fix up the new building. After purchasing the property, they completely gutted the building, and then remodeled and

redecorated the restaurant.

In 2012, they completed the outdoor patio.

Today, the restaurant is no longer leasing the adjacent gravel parking lot because of the reduced business. Customers can still park in front of the restaurant and in the lot behind the building. Employees will park in the church parking lot across the street, Barb Sowin said.

“We know that people will wind up parking along the street like they used to before we leased the parking lot in the first place. We do realize that we will lose some people because there will be a parking issue, but we are going to try to leave it where we have as much parking as possible,” Barb Sowin said.

Reflecting the business’s health, the Call of the Wild is currently looking to hire servers, bartenders and a cook to replace the college help that is leaving in the next couple of weeks.

If the business sells, the new owner would likely keep the staff in place, Barb Sowin said.

The Call of the Wild is open from 4 to 9 p.m. Wednesdays through Fridays and from 11 a.m. to 9 p.m. on Saturdays and Sundays. During the winter months, the restaurant closes at 7 p.m. on Sundays. Reservations are taken every day except Fridays.

St. Michael's Catholic Church Rededicates Chapel

Distraught, a woman stopped at St. Michael's Catholic Church to pray.

Her daughter was dying at a hospital in Milwaukee, and the woman wanted to light a votive candle.

The church was locked, and the distressed mother went home.

That happened several months ago. Now, there is a chapel that will remain open so that people can come to light a candle and pray.

On Sunday, the congregation at St. Michael's gathered around a tiny brick building in the church's cemetery.

The Rev. Edwin Kornath stood before the crowd of several dozen people and rededicated the chapel.

"First, I would like to thank those who love St. Michael's and take care of the cemetery and saw to it that this little oratory was so nicely redecorated," Kornath said.

Recently refurbished by parishioners, the modest building contains an altar, statues, pictures, candles and a kneeler.

Several parishioners who want to remain anonymous painstakingly repaired and painted the contents in order to bring the chapel to its former glory.

"It is a real treasure for all of us," Deacon Ralph Horner told the congregation on Sunday.

Chapel History

What is now known as St. Michael's Chapel was originally built for practical purposes.

St. Michael's parish dates back to 1846. In those early days, family

members cared for one another as they battled various hardships and illnesses.

The people, most of whom were German immigrants, continued to care for one another as family members died from small pox and cholera epidemics. They made their own caskets from wood, painting the caskets dark brown and lining the interiors.

They then dug graves for their deceased relatives in the parish cemetery.

During the winter months, the ground was too difficult to dig with a shovel.

So, parishioners built the small brick building to store the caskets and bodies in until spring. The small shrine could hold three caskets.

The altar that is in the chapel is original to the shrine.

As time went on, there was no longer a need for storing caskets.

The shrine eventually became a gardener's shed.

Restoration

The shrine-turned-garden shed became filled with garden tools.

The bricks on the floor had green moss growing on them and were falling apart. The altar was eaten up by mice.

A year or two ago, the parish's building and grounds committee put a new roof and door on the building. Recently, the committee poured a cement floor to cover the old brick bed.

Then, earlier this summer, several parishioners took the altar home and painted it. They repaired a broken leg and replaced a

missing hand on the original statue of Jesus.

They patched the cracks in the walls of the building and painted the walls. They painted the ceiling a light blue with white clouds. Picture subtitles are painted in old German script.

The chapel will be open 24 hours a day from April 1 until the end of November.

"It is now a working chapel for people that come to the cemetery. Anyone who comes to the cemetery can go in there and pray," parishioner Jean van Vorshelan said. "Let's say your great-grandfather is in there, you could go there now. Maybe you are Lutheran and did not know that this chapel is there. If you go there, stop in."

"It is a real treasure for all of us," said Deacon Ralph Horner.

Church History

St. Michael's Church went through several changes.

The first church building, made of logs, was completed in 1847. By 1855, the parish had outgrown the building, and a larger fieldstone church, located in the north section of the cemetery, as well as a school and rectory were built.

The parish quickly outgrew that church, and a new brick church was built in 1884 to hold 250 adults.

Then, on Jan. 4, 1971, at 2:40 a.m. during a snowstorm, lightning struck the church tower, and the church burned down.

A new church, which is now standing, was completed on April 7, 1972.



This Should Be A Big Year For KHS Football

It's not difficult to see why coach Jason Piittmann is excited about the 2015 Kewaskum High football season.

Piittmann, starting his 13th season as the school's head coach, has over 4,000 yards of offense returning, and one young man, ace running back Brand Thull was responsible for 2,255 of them, including 2,136 rushing yards, which he parlayed into 30 touchdowns and a spot on the Wisconsin Football Coaches Association's all-state team.

Thull wasn't the Indians' lone weapon a year ago when they finished second (6-1) in the old Eastern Wisconsin Conference and pounded up on Milwaukee Pius XI 37-14 in the first round of the WIAA Division 3 playoffs before being eliminated by Catholic Memorial 27-21.

The passing combo of quarterback Michael Prochnow and Charlie Witek return for their senior campaigns after connecting on 45 passes, which covered 759 yards and 13 TDs in the 11 games the Indians played in 2014.

Even defending EWC champion Plymouth, which is also moving to the new East Central Conference with Kewaskum, Waupun and Campbellsport, may be shuttering looking at the Indian returnees.

Thull was a unanimous pick on the all-EWC team a year ago, while Witek made the second unit along with tackle Sam Fechter and defensive back Josh Baker.

Along with those already named, senior Steven Nurkala is a threat every time he runs with the ball or comes out of the backfield to catch a pass. Nurkala, who, like Thull, has power and speed, rushed for 124 yards and one touchdown in 17 carries and caught 23 passes for 342 yards and two TDs.

"We are senior dominated ... have experience at skill positions and overall depth," Piittmann said in previewing his squad, and then there's the overall success of the program, which has ignited a passion for the game.

Other returning lettermen include: seniors —

Ben Watzig, OL/LB; Eric Doll, WR/LB; Jason Hanson, WR/DL; Cole Rahlf, defensive back; Zach Thull, LB; Nate Jung, DB; Berat Elmazi, RB/LB; Ben Gonnering, OL/DL and Branden Brzowoski, WR/DB; and juniors — Dalton Espitia, OL/DL; and Brady Hanson, WR/DB.

Among the top newcomers are: seniors — Danny Seitz, OL/DL; Zach Ehmer, OL/DL; and Dakota Lawrenz, OL/DL; juniors — Tommy Strom, DL; Alex Vogt, RB/DB; Dylan May, OL/DL; Michael Boettcher, LB; Jack Felten, OL/DL; Scott Hiltunen, DB; Kyle Pamperin, RB/LB; Mitchell Tietz, OL/DL; Seth Bartelt, RB/DB; and sophomores — Riley Donovan, a transfer from Michigan, OL/DL; and Danny Kreis, DB.

The only question marks appear to be the special teams and replacements in the offensive and defensive lines.

There should be no problem keeping the play-off string in tact. KHS has qualified for 10 consecutive playoffs, although last year's win over Pius was its first Level 1 win since 2011.

The Indians scrimmaged New Berlin West, Brown Deer and Sheboygan Falls last Friday, and Piittmann was pleased with what he saw.

"Overall, I thought we did a nice job," Piittmann said. "Each team gave us something different to look at. The kids had to adjust and learn. It was good."

Concerning Thull, Piittmann said, "He had a couple long runs," and went over the 100-yard mark, something he did 10 times during the 2014 season. His high for the year was the 430 yards rushing against Kiel in the 43-42 overtime win, and his low was 70 yards in 20 carries against Catholic Memorial.

About the passing game, the coach said, "We had a couple dropped balls" which can be expected in an early scrimmage.

When asked if anyone stood out or there were surprises in the scrimmage, Piittmann said, "I was really impressed with Patrick Krier at linebacker, and Jason Hanson made a nice adjustment to his new position in the defensive line."

Piittmann listed the fol-

lowing players as starters for Friday night's game at West Bend East. On offense, it will be Fechter and Watzig at left tackle and guard, Donovan at center, Espitia and Gonnering at right guard and tackle, with Prochnow at quarterback, Thull at tailback and Elmazi at fullback.

The "bulldozers" up front average about 235 pounds and should open some nice holes for Thull, who has bulked up to 190 without losing any speed.

The wideout spots will be shared by Doll, Witek, Nurkala, Baker and Brzowoski. Piittmann feels all of them can contribute to the passing game.

Defensively in the 3-4 defense, it will be Strom at nose guard, Fechter at tackle and Jason Hanson at end; with four linebackers, including Watzig and Krier on the inside and Thull and Nurkala on the outside. All are seniors, except for Krier, who is a sophomore.

The corners will be senior Cole Rahlf and sophomore Dan Kreis, and the safeties are veterans Baker and Brady Hanson.

The new East Central Conference opens play on Friday, September 4, with the Indians hosting arch rival Campbellsport. The following weekend KHS will host Winneconne.

Not much is known about the three schools (Ripon, Berlin and Winneconne) coming from the Eastern Valley, except none of them finished above .500. Freedom and Appleton Xavier were 1-2 with records of 8-0 and 7-1, while Berlin was fifth at 4-4; Winneconne, sixth at 3-5; and Ripon, eighth at 1-7.

Berlin did make the playoffs and upset Plymouth in the first round of action.

Kettle Moraine Lutheran came from the smaller Flyway Conference to join the new Eastern Valley. The Chargers tied for second in that league with a 5-2 mark.

When asked how many years in a row the Indians have beaten East, Piittmann said, "I took over in '03, and that's the last time we lost to them, so it's been 11 years."

Friday night (7 p.m.) that number should reach an even dozen.

Wilde Is Among The Leaders In First Golf Event

Veteran Leah Wilde was the lone Kewaskum High golfer to play in the Watertown Tournament last Friday, but coach Amy Uhlig is hoping in a couple of weeks the three others out for the sport will be ready for varsity action.

Wilde carded a 41-47—88 in Friday's season opener and finished fourth overall in the field of 47 players. Wilde had a rough start, going five over par on the first two holes but she battled back and was impressive on the final four, going even par from holes number six to number nine.

"She had two birdies and three pars on the front nine, which really gave her some momentum," Uhlig said about Wilde's season debut.

Host Watertown won the meet with a 373 from its low four scorers, seven ahead of Arrowhead, which sent a team of reserves as its top players were compet-

Naturally Uhlig is excited about having the senior Wilde back. Playing alone most of last year,

New CC Coach Loves To Run, Hopes To Inspire Others

Kris Evans, a Minnesota native who has competed in several marathons, has accepted the task of trying to revive the Kewaskum High School cross country program.

Evans, who grew up in Stillwater, MN. and ran on the cross country team there, held his first practice on August 17, along with assistant coaches Lois Volesky and Clarissa Bahn, who will direct the middle school runners.

"For the high school, it looks like we're right around 10 (runners)," Evans said after the workout, indicating he asked his runners to look for others who might be interested in joining the team and he plans to do some recruiting when school opens.

"You need seven for a full team. Even to get points you need five," Evans, who will teach English at Kewaskum High School.

Concerning his background, Evans said, "I've been a runner since eighth grade, either on a sports team or on my own. Evans was a member of the

Stillwater High School cross county team. Stillwater was a AAA team, the largest division in Minnesota. After high school, he ran one year at UW-Rivers Falls but figured it took too much time away from his studies and didn't go out for the sport after that.

Stillwater cross country teams normally drew 80 participants, according to Evans, who said, "I ran a time of 16:45 for five k (kilometers), and I was seventh on the varsity."

"I think I've run in four marathons," Evans went on, noting his favorite is "Grandma's Marathon in Duluth, MN. "It's right along the (Lake Superior) lakeshore. It's beautiful," he said, indicating while Duluth isn't a huge city, the marathon, which is held in June, is "one of the largest marathons in the world. There are 10,000 runners ... and the whole city turns out."

Concerning his best time, Evans said he once hit 3 hours and 17 minutes, which was two minutes off the qualifying time for his age group for the Boston Marathon. He had no plans to run at Boston

but felt it would have been nice knowing he reached the qualifying mark.

Evans' previous coaching experience includes being an assistant coach at Madison West after being the head coach at Oakland High School in Minnesota for two years.

And what lured Evans to want to coach? "You get to see students in a different light," he said, adding, "It (participating in athletics) helps bolster their attitude in the classroom."

After the opening workout and cool down, Evans talked to his athletes about proper equipment, and preventing shinsplints. "Sometimes they try to go to fast too soon. That can hurt them," he said.

Kewaskum opens its 2015 campaign on August 27 at Sheboygan Falls.

Writer's Note: Randy Backhaus had been the cross country coach for the past three years. When asked why he did not return, Athletic Director Jason Piittmann said, "We decided to make a change," and originally Katie O'Rourke took the job but she resigned recently to take a new post.

Gun Deer Hunt For Hunters With Disabilities

Eligible hunters interested in participating in the 2015 gun deer hunt for hunters with disabilities are reminded that this year's hunt will take place October 3-11. As of the June 1 land sponsor application deadline, more than 74,132 acres of land across 46 counties were enrolled for this year's deer hunt.

Hunters should contact sponsors directly and be prepared to provide their name, contact information and DNR customer ID number. To be eligible, hunters must possess a valid Class A, Class B long-term permit that allows shooting from a

vehicle or Class C or D disabled hunting permit. As in the past, eligible hunters must also possess a gun deer license.

Bonus Antlerless Tags

Bonus antlerless deer carcass tags are available for purchase. Antlerless tags will be sold at a rate of one per person per day. Sales will continue until sold out or until the 2015 deer hunting season ends.

- August 17, 10 a.m. - Northern and Central Forest Zones;
- August 18, 10 a.m. - Central Farmland Zone;

- August 20, 10 a.m. - remaining bonus antlerless permits (all zones).

Aquatic Invasive Species Bridge Snapshot Day: Volunteers Needed For Unique Citizen Monitoring Event

On Saturday, Aug. 29, Washington County Land and Water Conservation Division, Ozaukee Washington Land Trust (OWLTL), and River Alliance of Wisconsin will team up for the second annual statewide aquatic invasive species monitoring event.

Nearly 200 volunteers will help search for invasive species, including escaped or intentionally released water garden and aquarium species that could choke out our rivers and streams.

"Volunteers play a key role in early detection on their local waters and with their help we have more eyes on the water to prevent the spread of invasive species around the state," explained Jeremy Jones, River Alliance of Wisconsin's invasive species program director. "At the 2014 Snapshot Day, volunteers found invasive species including faucet snails in the Lake Michigan basin. Faucet snails have the potential to kill hundreds of thou-

sands of waterfowl each year. This information discovered by citizens helps researchers respond to the threats on our waters."

The event will begin at 9 a.m. at Homestead Hollow County Park (N120 W19809 Freistadt Rd, Germantown, WI 53022). Following a brief identification training, teams of two to three volunteers will disperse to rivers and streams to help look for species of concern.

OWLTL and Washington County have selected monitoring sites where invasive species are likely to have been introduced. After exploring and evaluating, volunteers will reconvene at Homestead Hollow County Park around 12 p.m. to report what they have found.

According to Dr. Michael Alfieri, associate professor and biology chair at Viterbo University and volunteer at the 2014 AIS Bridge Snapshot Day in La Crosse, "Snapshot Day was a great way for me to spend time with my students outside of the class-

room learning about aquatic invasive species while also meeting local residents who share a passion for protecting and preserving Wisconsin's waters."

There will be 20 monitoring sites within the county, all within 10 miles from the rendezvous point at Homestead Hollow County Park.

'Move Over Law' Expands From Wisconsin Highways To Waterways

Wisconsin's "move over law" to protect roadside emergency responders expands to the state's waters this summer under revisions to the boating rules and regulations code, also known as chapter NR 5 of the Wisconsin Administrative Code.

Warden Roy Zellmer, Department of Natural Resources' boating administrator, says the law's expansion to add a slow-no-wake buffer around emergency vessels was in response to concerns about officer and public safety.

"The purpose is to create a safety buffer for emergency responders to work without risking being struck or maneuvering in big wakes by boats passing too close to an emergency site," Zellmer said. "The DNR asked for the law change out of concern

for public safety and law enforcement officer safety."

The law's revision adds a slow-no-wake within 100 feet of patrol boats displaying emergency lights. The revisions took effect on June 1 and the DNR efforts this summer will be to inform and educate boaters on the change.

The motor vehicle Move Over Laws are in all states and require drivers to move by at least one lane away from emergency vehicles with activated sirens and-or flashing lights. If moving away by at least one lane is impossible, drivers are required to slow speeds to reasonable speeds or a set limit below the speed limit as determined by local authorities.

More Changes To NR 5

Other changes to the state's boating rules and regulations affect the use of blue lights and noise levels.

Zellmer says boaters can no longer display blue colored lights. "The blue LED lighting had been mistaken for law enforcement lights at night and was causing some confusion to the public," he said.

Noise level testing requirements have been revised to meet Society of Automotive Engineers practices and does not link minimum distances to tests.

Continued from . . . Never Forgotten

One bench honors Leonard Scherger, a marshal for the Hartford Police Department, who was shot and killed while questioning three suspicious men in a railroad yard on June 18, 1904. He was 33.

The other bench remembers Robert Backes, who was an officer for the Germantown Police Department. Backes' End of Watch was on Saturday, March 21, 1981, when Backes was struggling with a man he was attempting to arrest for drunken driving. Both Backes and the man were struck by a vehicle and killed. Backes was 34 and left behind a wife, son and two daughters.

The benches were a touching surprise for family members of the fallen officers.

"It will be 17 years on Labor Day since John died, and I just love that people still remember him and people still honor his memory and keep his memory alive. It makes me so happy because that is my biggest thing...that people never forget him," said Schmitt's widow, Carla Schmitt.

Heroes' Alley

Tina Beres, whose husband is a Washington County sheriff's deputy, has dubbed the stretch of the Esienbahn Trail where

the memorial benches are located "Heroes' Alley."

"The purpose of these memorial benches is to honor these brave men. I want their families to know that they are never forgotten. I also want the law enforcement officers serving our communities to know that if something happens to them, we will be there for their families and never forget their sacrifice," Beres said.

Beres came up with the idea of the benches while running on the path.

"I'm training for my first marathon, and I often call on the guys when I'm running. I was running like 18 miles out here, and I was like, OK, I could use a little wind behind my back," Beres said.

Beres wanted to do something for the men and their families.

"It makes me sad to think about these people who were just trying to do something good," Beres said. "I thought it would be really cool to have something at the accident site."

Beres reached out to other officers, as well as the police unions and the Fraternal Order of Police.

"Literally, money was just pouring in. I only needed \$195 for a bench, and I had over \$400 in three days," Beres said.

In total, police officers from across Washington

County donated \$900 to the cause. The remaining money will be used to plant trees around the benches.

Giving Support

When Beres met Schmitt's family for the first time on Monday night at the Schmitt memorial bench, they greeted one another with hugs and words of thanks.

"This a nice path. This is a nice idea, very nice," Kathy Schmitt, John Schmitt's mother, said.

Beres wants everyone to make it clear that the benches are not about her.

"I didn't do it for me. I did it for the families. That is why it is there," Beres said.

Family members appreciate the effort.

Beres, who worked for 12 years as a corrections officer herself, was able to talk with Scherger's great niece, who was a dispatcher for Hartford Police Department for 22 years, about the memorial benches.

"It was just neat to chat with her," Beres said. "She was floored, she didn't know what to say. She was like, 'Really?'"

"Yes," Beres told her. "We don't forget."

The great niece was touched that 111 years later, people are still remembering, Beres said.

The sentiment was echoed by John Schmitt's family as they gathered

along Heroes' Alley and reminisced about how John's gregarious personality and how he liked to talk on the phone.

"It warms my heart that John is still in other people's hearts and minds. He will always be in mine," Carla Schmitt said.






