## Plans Continue For New Holy Trinity Parish Center

Members of Holy Trinity parish in Kewaskum continue to move forward with plans to build a parish center.

Last Thursday, volunteers who are working on the building project gathered in the church basement to view the new building plans and map out the next steps. So far, 65 people have volunteered to serve on committees for the \$2 million project, said Joel Fleischman, co-chair for the parish's building committee.

After being revised several times, the building plans call for a 13,400 square-foot parish center which will house a gymnasium, cafeteria and parish

offices.

"Some of this may change as we work on budget elements, but the basic concept is here, so we can get a basic feel for what is proposed for the building," said Joe Clarke, architect with Groth Design Group, Inc.

The new building will be located between the existing church and school, which are located on Main Street in Kewaskum, and will stretch back toward Prospect Street, taking over a portion of the current parking lot.

"There have been a number of things discussed for where we replace that parking. There are options on the table for that," Clarke said.

A prominent entrance with a lobby will be placed

directly off the parking lot behind the church. Two other entrances will be in the front of the building, one going into the parish offices and the other providing access into the school.

The building will be connected to the school, but will be configured so that the parish center's gymnasium can operate independently of the school. That way, the school and parish offices can be locked while people are in the parish center.

"We really are looking at a lot of security needs and a lot of multipurpose function, getting as much bang as we can for every square foot that we build," Clarke said.




Dear Editor,

While attending the October 12th Kewaskum School Board's regular monthly meeting, I was most concerned about two issues that occurred: 1 - Board use of cell phones during the meeting and 2 - modifications to the public comment agenda element.

For cell phone use, I simply believe the practice is unprofessional, disrespectful, and a distraction from the agenda and the board's purpose for being there. Phones should be off during official meetings, period!

Public comments for three to five minutes at regular board meetings has been policy and practice for decades, a reflection of representative process and freedom of speech, our First Amendment right. Yes, within parliamentary guidelines and State Statute, board's can choose to run their meetings as they essentially wish.

They (Kewaskum School Board) did so in March of 2014 when they

unanimously approved public comments at all board meetings. This action expanded the public's ability to communicate directly with the board, our (supposed) representatives. What this board (majority?) wants to do now is limit topics to only what is on the current agenda. Nothing else will apparently be allowed, including questions or requests. I believe the purpose of having public comments is lost with this dictatorial

approach, as is our First Amendment right.

It is understandable to me why only a handful of the public shows up for Kewaskum School Board meetings. The people say, "What's the point, they do what they want anyway," and these two concerns validate that public sentiment. Collectively, I believe the board majority is indifferent of the public by not representing the people as their role requires, the board's function is going backwards, and personnel change is definitely needed.



# Sheriff's Office Responds To Residential Fire In Town Of Polk

On Oct. 26 at 9:28 p.m., the homeowner of the residence at 4419 Arthur Road in the Town of Polk called the Washington County Sheriff's Office to report a fire in a tool shed which was located behind their residence. The Slinger Fire Department was assisted by the Allenton, St. Lawrence, Hartford, Jackson, Richfield, West Bend and Kewaskum fire departments and Life Star Rescue.

When the deputies and firefighters arrived on the scene, the tool shed, which was approximately 9 by 14 feet in size and located approximately 13 feet from the residence, was fully engulfed in flames. Flames from the tool shed had caused the residence to start on fire, with the fire entering the attic area of the residence. The homeowners were able to evacuate from the residence without injury.

The tool shed was a total loss, and although the fire was primarily contained to the attic, most of the resi- dential structure will be a loss. Several contents from inside the residence maybe recovered.

The Slinger Fire Department was assisted by the Allenton, St. Lawrence, Hartford, Jackson, Richfield, West Bend and Kewaskum fire departments and Life Star Rescue.

During firefighting, over- haul and clean-up opera- tions a section of Arthur Road near the residence was closed for approx- imately three hours. The exact cause of the fire, which originated in the tool shed, is currently unknown, but is not believed to be suspicious. This incident remains under investigation by Sheriff's Office fire investi- gators.

## County Health Department Encourages Women To Take Action To Improve Their Odds In The Fight Against Breast Cancer

Washington County Health Department (WCHD) is working with women in both Washington and Ozaukee Counties to improve breast cancer statistics.

According to national statistics from the American Cancer Society (<http://www.cancer.org/research/cancerfactsstatistics/index>), one in every eight women will be diagnosed with breast cancer, one woman is diagnosed every two minutes and one woman dies every 13 minutes.

In their 2015 Community Profile, Susan G. Komen® Southeast Wisconsin (<http://komensoutheastwi.org>) noted breast cancer incidence rates higher than the state and national averages for both Washington and Ozaukee Counties. Washington County was also found to have the highest breast cancer death rate in the Southeast region of the state.

WCHD encourages women to understand their personal risk factors and to talk to their health care providers about appropriate screening based on their histories. For most women, getting a mammogram regularly is recommended around age 40. All women are encouraged to know what is normal for their breasts and to consult with their health-care providers immediately

if they notice any persistent changes.

Women are not able to control certain risk factors like gender, age and family history. However, there are steps like breastfeeding, avoiding use of hormones, maintaining a healthy lifestyle and decreasing or eliminating alcoholic beverage consumption that may reduce the risk of breast cancer.

WCHD was a recipient of one of the Susan G. Komen® Southeast Wisconsin 2015 Community Grants and coordinates the Wisconsin Well Woman Program (WWWP) for both Washington and Ozaukee County women. With funding provided by the grant, WCHD has been reaching out to educate women about screening and risk reduction through their Pathways to Breast Health program.

WWWP offers free breast and cervical screenings to low-income women ages 45-64 who are uninsured or underinsured. For women who are ages 35-44, screening services are also available if there are breast or cervical concerns who meet the program income and insurance eligibility requirements.

Wilson has been a communication specialist with Flight For Life since 2011. She is licensed in the State of Wisconsin as an EMT-Intermediate and a

NAACS Certified Flight Communicator. She is a single mother of a 5-year-old son, but on many occasions has gone above and beyond to ensure there is adequate staff in the Flight For Life Communications Center, even though that means taking time away from her family life.

As a Flight For Life Communication Specialist, Wilson brings professionalism, compassion and dedication to the job every day. She places tremendous importance on the safety of the flight crews. This emphasis on safety was highlighted in the nomination letter that detailed an occurrence last year where one of the Flight For Life aircraft was struck by a bird during a flight. Steph dealt with this stressful situation in a calm professional manner. She immediately located an alternate landing site for the aircraft and flight crew, resulting in a safe, uneventful landing. This incident earned her a FFL

Safety Award and was a major factor in the NAACS Board of Directors decision to select her for this award.

Wilson’s passion and dedication for her job as communication specialist, while always keeping the safety of the Flight Crews a priority, has earned her the respect of her colleagues. She was nominated for this award by one of her co-workers, Cory Lund, who stated, “If not for Steph’s compassion for the job as communication specialist and her dedication to safety, who knows where the Flight For Life’s Communication Center would be today.”

## Long Range Planning Committee Meets

The Kewaskum School District Long Range Planning Committee met for the second time on Tuesday, Oct. 20. The purpose of the committee is to identify needs and determine possible solutions to facility and ground needs within the school district. At the first meeting in September members toured the middle school to view the varying concerns this facility poses.

Forty-four people were in attendance. The meeting started with a financial presentation from Michele Wiberg, vice president of PMA Financial Network. She provided a financial background summary explaining revenue limits and how they relate to state aid and the tax levy.

Wiberg acknowledged that the district has a good credit rating which allows us opportunities for good interest rate potentials in the future. Jim Smasal,

superintendent for Kewaskum schools, stated the district is in the best financial state it has been in since the 1980s.

A 2014-2015 population study was shared with the committee. The survey showed that our student enrollment is projected to decrease slightly over the next 10 years. With this information, the committee can focus on the structure of future building needs without needing to enlarge them. Members were given a tour of the high school and were presented with the facts about the aging HVAC units, the age of different sections of the school and the layout of various classrooms.

Upon conclusion of the meeting, members agreed that there is a need to find solutions to the existing issues within both the middle and high school facilities.

# Little Folks Celebrate Fall

**-Little Folks School House Is Kewaskum's Only Nationally Accredited Day Care Facility**

With humor, movement and stories, David Stokes mesmerized the crowd of children as he taught them about his collection of live insects and reptiles.

The presentation was part of the Fall Family Fun Night that Little Folks School House held earlier this month in the Kewaskum Annex building.

The evening gave parents an opportunity to get to know one another, other than the brief times they see each other at the day care center.

"When parents are dropping off their children, they've got to get to work, and then when they pick them up, they've got to get home and get dinner going, so it is a little bit rushed. When we have these events, it is nice because they can come in and can actually interact with other parents and watch their children interact with peers," said Dodie Sargent, administrator and owner of Little Folks School House.

Parents travel from across the area to bring their children to Little Folks. In addition to Kewaskum natives, the center cares for children who live in West Bend, Cedarburg, Campbellsport, Mayville and Fond du Lac.

With 101 children ages 6 weeks to 12 years old, the center is filled, and several classrooms have waiting lists to get into.

Sargent thinks the staff has a lot to do with the center's popularity. Many of the 23 teachers have either an associate's or a bachelor's degree in education.

"Our staff is very nurturing. I think because there is low turnover, parents and kids get to know the teachers," Sargent said. "We are big on teamwork, everybody gets along."

In addition, parents are drawn to Little Folks

because the center is constantly upgrading the facilities, Sargent said. To keep the building secure, there is a coded entry and classrooms are camera-monitored.

"We keep the building clean and in good repair," she said. "I think being accredited and being a five-star center helps. It just shows that we are a high-quality center."

### Accreditation

Little Folks became nationally accredited in April with the Association for Early Learning Leaders, a nonprofit organization based in Texas. The status gives the center a five-star rating.

Becoming a nationally accredited day care center is a rigorous process and can take anywhere between six months and two years to complete, Sargent said.

"They look at your policies on sanitation, medication, nutrition and safety, and they look at your compliance with licensing standards. They go through your budget with a fine-tooth comb," Sargent said.

The first step to becoming nationally accredited is for a center to complete a self study, in which the center's administration evaluates the program as they apply to the commission's standards. At Little Folks, policies and procedures were reviewed, classroom practices were assessed, and parent and staff surveys were completed.

"Then we do a formal evaluation, and we come up with a plan on where we can make improvements," Sargent said.

Once the self study was completed, a validator stopped in unannounced to review children's files, the staff files and parent studies. The validator spent time observing each classroom and then conducted an exit interview

with the Sargent.

The validator's report was then reviewed by the national commission, which awarded the accreditation status.

"The national accreditation is for three years, but the commission can stop in unannounced to make visits to kind of check up on things, so if they find something on one of their unannounced visits before your three years is up, they can pull your accreditation," Sargent said.

Little Folks previously had been rated a four-star day care facility, with accreditation through YoungStar, a program the state of Wisconsin started four years ago. The national accreditation status holds the center to higher standards, Sargent said.

### Love Of Children

Sargent has been working in the childcare field for 33 years.

"I love my job," she said. "I love interacting with the kids, and I love watching the teachers interacting with the kids. That's a real treat."

Sargent opened a group center in 1997 in the Town of Wayne. After about nine years, the center outgrew that building, so a new, larger building was built at 1040 Milan Drive in Kewaskum.

In addition to providing day care at the new location, Little Folks offers before-and after-school care at Kewaskum Elementary School.

Although most days are rewarding for Sargent and the staff, there are some difficult days.

Last Thursday was one of those days, when they had to bid farewell to a 4-year-old girl who had been coming to the center since she was an infant.

"It's really difficult to say goodbye to a child when they move away," Sargent said.

## Continued From... Plans Continue For New Holy Trinity Parish Center

The plans call for a fully equipped kitchen with service counters to serve both the gymnasium and the cafeteria. A lobby and restrooms will serve both these areas.

Depending on funding, the new main entrance off the back parking lot could potentially have a covered walkway between the church and the parish center.

Although the school and parish center would be connected, a slot of land would remain between the two buildings to maintain the existing windows to the school and meet fire safety requirements.

The blueprints allow for future enhancements, such as creating a second church narthex that would provide a direct connection to the new parish addition. This would enable people to use an elevator to have a direct connection to the parish center, without going outside.

"We have had fun putting together the floor plan. Some of what we do will depend on the budget, what we have to spend. We are going to start out with at least bare bones, with potential to add a lot more character and interest, if the budget comes in such that we can do those extra fun things inside," Clarke said.

The final plan is different

than what was presented to the village board in June.

"We started out thinking that the gym might fit to the north of the school, but it really doesn't as we lay out the floor plan," Clark said. "That would really go all the way to the edge of the street, and then block a lot of your views of the church. This layout keeps this front area open so we are not blocking the views of the church building."

Plans for the project began this past spring, after anonymous donors pledged \$750,000 for the project.

Because Holy Trinity parish is part of the Archdiocese of Milwaukee, it must follow a set of procedures that the archdiocese has established for building projects. In April, Archbishop Jerome Listecki gave the parish approval to start the process by conducting a feasibility study.

For that study, inter-

views and focus groups were held to survey nearly 120 parishioners, said Mark Filipis, president of VisionWorks Fundraising in Omaha, Neb.

About 91 percent of those surveyed supported the plan for the parish center. The feasibility report showed that there should be enough support to raise between \$1.8 and \$2 million, said Jim Wessing, a Holy Trinity parishioner and one of the campaign co-chairs.

On Aug. 13, the archdiocesan building commission granted approval for the parish to hire an architect. On Oct. 8, the commission approved the architectural plans. The next meeting with the commission is scheduled for Feb. 11.

"That is the meeting where we have to present all of our final documents for the building, the itemized list of all the things going into it, down to the number of light bulbs and

the cost of it. All those details have to be submitted to them, including how we've done on our capital campaign," Holy Trinity Pastoral Council Chair Brian Wildt said.

The goal is for the new center to serve the entire parish community center, Wessing said. Input has been sought from the greater community, and St. Michael parish has agreed to join the "We Believe" campaign.

"We are getting more and more excited about this project every day. It is so great to see so many people involved here,"

said Campaign Co-Chair Tony Fleischman.

The hope is that construction will begin in the spring, Wildt said.

Holy Trinity parish was founded in 1861, and Holy Trinity School was established in 1880. With some 800 members today, parish membership is currently growing, parish leaders report. School enrollment has increased from 92 students in the 2013-14 school year to 113 students this year. Religious education enrollment has grown from 250 students in the 2013-14 school year to more than

300 students this year.

In April, as the parish neared the end of its fiscal year, parish leaders reported that Holy Trinity was debt-free, but had a \$50,000 operating deficit for the past several years.

To help pay for operating costs of the new parish center, an anonymous donor has pledged to give up to \$25,000 a year for 10 years.

The budget is coming in where we need it to be," Joel Fleischman said. "We can never do this project again, and we want to do it right. It is going to outlive us all."



## Prepare To “Fall Back” By Checking Home Detectors

Daylight Saving Time ends this Sunday, Nov. 1, as we “fall back” and set clocks back one hour. This is also a great time to check the things that keep us safe and ready for emergencies such as smoke and carbon monoxide detectors.

“This fall, we’ve already seen reports of people taken to hospitals after suffering from carbon monoxide poisoning,” said Brian Satula, Wisconsin Emergency Management administrator. “In many cases, the source of the carbon monoxide is a malfunctioning home furnace.”

According to the Wisconsin Department of Health Services, about 450 people each year in Wisconsin are taken to hospital emergency rooms for symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning. At high levels, carbon monoxide can cause death within minutes.

Symptoms of overexposure to carbon monoxide include headaches, fatigue, dizziness, shortness of breath, nausea, and confusion. If you suspect you may be experiencing carbon monoxide poisoning, or your detector sounds an alarm, head outside immediately for fresh air and call 911.

“As we turn back the clocks, it’s important to also check home devices that protect our families from carbon monoxide poisoning,” said Karen McKeown, state health officer. “To prepare for winter weather, Wisconsin residents should ensure their source of heat and their carbon monoxide detectors are in good working order.”

To protect your family from carbon monoxide, follow these safety tips:

- Make sure you have working carbon monoxide detectors. All homes and duplexes in Wisconsin are required to have detectors on every level, including the basement, but not the attic or storage areas. Detectors can be purchased at most hardware stores.

- Have your furnace or wood-burning stove

inspected annually. Hire a professional to make sure it is functionally sound and vents properly outside the home.

- Never run a gasoline or propane heater or a grill (gas or charcoal) inside your home or in an unventilated garage. Any heating system that burns fuel produces carbon monoxide. Use a battery-powered detector where you have fuel burning devices but no electric outlets, such as in tents, cabins, RVs, and boats with enclosed cabins.

- Never run a car in an enclosed space. If a vehicle is running, you must have a door open to the outside.

- Generators should be run a safe distance from the home. Never run a generator in the home or garage, or right next to windows or doors.

**Smoke Detectors** — Three out of five home fire deaths happen from fires in homes with no smoke alarms or no working smoke alarms. Check and replace batteries if needed and make sure the devices around your house are working properly. The U.S. Consumer Products Safety Commission estimates that about 16 million homes in the nation have smoke alarms that do not work, due, in most cases, to dead or missing batteries.

**Emergency Kits** — Everyone should have a basic emergency kit in their home with supplies such as food and water to last you and your family for at least three days. Other items like a battery powered or crank radio, flashlights, first aid kit should also be included. Daylight Savings Time is a perfect time to get a kit and if you already have a kit, check it to make sure food and other items are not near or past their expiration dates.

## Washington County Health Department Gets The Ninth Car Seat Grant Year Award From The Bureau Of Transportation

The Washington County Health Department continues to serve Washington County with a grant from the Bureau of Transportation to purchase car seats for low income families. Families are eligible for reduced-cost car seats if they are 185% or below the federal poverty level.

Lori Loof, Public Health Nurse and Coordinator of the Car Seat Grants states, “The Health Department is partnering with agencies who serve low income families in Washington County. Families are screened for car seats and provided a voucher by our partners. Then, families can redeem

their vouchers for car seats at the Health Department.”

Families receive education, assistance with installation and evaluate the service. Forty-five clients redeemed vouchers for car seats at the Permanent Fitting Station at the Washington County Health Department during the 2014/2015 grant period. One hundred and twenty seven car seats were checked at the Permanent Fitting Station.

Safe Kids USA and the National Traffic Safety Administration states, “Children are less likely to be in the correct child safety seats as they get older and 73 percent of child safety seats are

installed incorrectly.”

In 2016 the Permanent Fitting Station will continue to check car seats and provide education free of charge to the public and is open from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. every Thursday. All services at the Permanent Fitting Station

are by appointment.

# Indians Open Playoffs With Convincing 44-14 Victory

Taking care of business on both sides of the ball, the Kewaskum High football team was impressive in its 44-14 win over Delavan-Darien Friday night in one of the No. 1 vs. 8 matchups in the first weekend of the D-3 playoffs.

The win boosts Kewaskum's season record to 10-0 and into Level 2 of the playoffs. The Indians will host Friday's game against Whitnall, the No. 5 seed, which knocked No. 4 St. Francis out of the running, 21-19.

"We played pretty well," KHS coach Jason Piittmann said.

Senior running back Brandon Thull had another big game, rushing for 274 yards and three touchdowns in 20 carries. He reeled off touchdown runs of 63, 45 and 11 yards, leaving the Comets reeling from his dazzling display of speed and power ... and sometimes the ability to keep his footing on the field, which was slippery from a steady rain which started an hour before game time.

With the added 274 yards, Thull has 1,932 for the year, which puts him third in the state behind Toren Young of Monona Grove (2,318 yards) and Evander Craft of St. Francis (2,207).

What is even more impressive is Thull's career rushing mark eclipsed 5,000 yards, according to Piittmann, who reported the exact total at 5,060.

Thull's three touchdowns boost his season total to 32, two more than he scored a year ago.

The game was close for only the first six minutes. The Indians scored on their first drive, with Thull breaking loose for the 63-yard scamper.

The Comets moved right down the field and scored on a 15-yard run by Jake Benzing, but the point after touchdown try (PAT) by Pablo Comez-Castro

was no good, giving Kewaskum a 7-6 lead.

Never fear Kewaskum fans. Your team scored twice more in the first quarter, first on a 45-yard Thull run and then on a one-yard run by Michael Prochnow on a quarterback sneak with 1:39 left in the period. Cade Peterson made his third straight PAT kick, giving his team a 21-0 lead.

In the latter drive, the Indians were facing a third and 14 situation before Thull burst through the line for a run to the one-yard line.

The Comets, mainly a passing team this fall, had difficulty trying to gain yards vs. the Indians on the ground. In their next drive, they were held to short gains on three straight downs, and faced a punting situation. Piittmann wisely called a time out, forcing the Comets to kick into the wind, and the ball only made it to the DD 35-yard line.

After picking up one first down, the Indians crossed Delavan-Darien up by going to the pass, and Prochnow's strike hit Charlie Witek in stride for another KHS touchdown, their fourth in four possessions.

Fumbles dominated the next several minutes. The Comets had trouble with an exchange and fumbled, and after getting a first down, Thull coughed up the ball. Kewaskum then stopped DD on three plays but on the ensuing punt, Thull fumbled again, and the Comets fell on it.

For the game, Kewaskum had eight fumbles, more than the total it had in the nine games it played previously.

The Indians ended the half on a high note, however, going 81 yards in eight plays with Prochnow scoring his second touchdown on a one-yard run.

Nurkala had a big run in the drive, going 27 yards on a counter play to take the ball into Comet territory. Then Thull ripped off a 24-yarder, Prochnow hit

Eric Doll for an eight-yard pass, and Nurkala gained nine yards to the Comets' one.

In the second half, Thull added his third touchdown, for a 42-6 lead which meant a running clock for the rest of the contest.

The defense got into the act when Ben Watzig got credit for a safety. "We had them pinned deep, had them back on the one-yard line," Piittmann said. On the next play, "He (Watzig) just buried him a couple of yards deep."

Reserves played much of the fourth quarter and gave up a touchdown to Zach Gidcumb, who broke free for a 43-yard run.

Watzig seemed to be everywhere for Kewaskum on defense. He wound up with four solo tackles and eight team tackles for an even dozen. Defensive halfback Brady Hanson had four solos and one team tackle.

"Ben had a phenomenal game, from sideline to sideline, literally," Piittmann said, adding Nurkala was solid on defense, and the Indians had good line play and coverage in the secondary and pressure on the quarterback.

Cited for their good blocking were Sam Fechter and Watzig. "They were excellent again," Piittmann said.

DD managed just 69 yard rushing and 65 passing for 134 total. The Comets ended the year at 4-6.

KHS wound up with 341 yards rushing and 65 passing as Prochnow completed four of seven passes with the one touchdown and no interceptions.

About the Indians' next opponent, Piittmann said, "They like to wing it if they have the choice." "They're big," he went on, but, "It looks like we should be able to run the ball."

## Hilly Course Makes Sectional Run Tougher; Krier Just Misses Going To State

Running in the talent-laden D-2 Cedar Grove Sectional was a tall order for the Kewaskum High cross country teams, especially considering a key runner was missing from the girls team and neither team had many senior runners.

The Lady Indians finished 10th with 290 points in the 14-team field in Saturday's test, while the boys were 12th with 300.

The teams that qualified for state — it took a first or second to advance — were head and shoulders above the rest of the competition.

Two East Central teams were 1-2 in the girls' competition. The Plymouth girls blazed to the title with an impressive 47 points, seven ahead of Berlin (52). Cedar Grove finished a distant third with 99.

For the boys, the host Rockets nipped Omro, 61-65, and then came Plymouth and Grafton third and fourth with 98 points. Plymouth won the tie-breaker because its No. 6 runner had a better finish than Grafton's.

Times were a little higher than in other invitationals, and with good reason. The course was "pretty much nothing but hills," first-year head coach Kris Evans said.

KHS senior Emily Krier had hoped to push for a top-10 finish but had to settle for 16th place. She covered the 5,000 meters in a time of 21 minutes and 22.36 (21:22.36), a little over four seconds out of 13th place.

"Miss Krier had a good meet," Evans said. "She was happy with how she did" until she found out she finished seventh among those not from the qualifying teams, meaning she missed going to state by two places.

Junior Hailey Herriges was unable to run because of tendonitis, and she was sorely missed because she probably would have finished anywhere from 25th to 35th. Evans said he, Herriges'

parents and the trainer decided it was best for her not to run and to rest until the start of basketball season.

Junior Haley Plachinski had a good run, finishing 40th in 23:09.47, while Melissa Schneider placed 63rd in 24:44.06. Ellie Debelak struggled a bit and had to settle for 80th (26:50.85), and the final counter, Sydney Rosenthal, was 91st (30:16.29).

The winner of the girls race was Plymouth's senior Sophie Bolish, who hit the finish line in 20:13.03.

As expected, soph Justin Reck led the boys team but he had a bit of an off day, taking 30th overall with a time of 19:02.30.

"I think he had a hard race," with the size of the field and the pressure involved, Evans said, adding, "He was disappointed, but he has two more years."

Freshman Kyle Toth was

next, covering the course in 20:12.66, good for 59th, then came Blake Miller in 65th (20:41.02), Anthony Leister in 73rd (21:09.90) and Jacob Loehr two places back with a time of 21:16.63.

Sheboygan Falls' fine junior, Clark Otte, led the field of 98 to the finish line. His time was a sizzling 16:44.99, 15 seconds in front of the next fastest runner.

About his first year, Evans said, "I really enjoyed this year. The Kewaskum teams had some great kids."

Concerning next year, Evans first wants to increase the number of participants, which in turn can make the Indians more competitive. "There are some middle school kids coming up who are exciting," Evans said, adding he will be trying to recruit more participants and get them interested in more summer training.

"It was getting dark," Kenworthy said, but the game went on with a shootout, and the Milwaukee school scored first after Nate Heniadis missed. Then J.J. Heberer

and Sandborn scored, and KHS keeper Conner Enright stopped two straight shots, and the Indians took the upper hand. Hayden Koralewski was the next man up, and when he scored, the Indians won the game.

"One of the highlights ... Conner Enright played a whale of a game" in the nets, according to Kenworthy, who said he had better hand control in this game after working on that facet in practice.

About the game vs. Grafton, Kenworthy said, "Grafton is a quality team. There's a good reason they are rated No. 2 in the state."

Grafton, which is currently 18-3-2 on the year, scored eight goals in the first half and added two more after the break.

The KHS coach noted the Blackhawks' top player, Jake Demerath, who had three goals and one assist against the Indians, has been offered a D-1 scholarship. "He was phenomenal," Kenworthy said, reporting the Indians were missing Dylan Baertschy (illness) and Christian Bocher (concussion), which hurt the defensive effort.

Still, Kenworthy was proud his team played hard right to the end. "We hung in there once again. We never gave up."


With the loss, the Indians finished the year at 2-19-5, and three of the five ties came in tournaments so they were like victories.

## Nuernberg, Pointers Come Up Just Short

After making cameo appearances in his team's six previous games, quarterback Cody Nuernberg finally got an opportunity to play extensively for the UW-Stevens Point's football team and nearly led the Pointers to an upset win last Saturday over defending NCAA 3 national champion UW-Whitewater.

The Kewaskum High grad threw for 332 yards and three touchdowns but also had three interceptions in a game that went right down to the wire with the Warhawks, currently ranked sixth in NCAA 3, leaving with a 35-27 victory.

Nuernberg got the call in first quarter when the Pointers starting quarterback Kyle Larson went out with an injury. At that point, Whitewater was up 14-0 and added another touchdown with 4:31 left in the second quarter for a 21-0 lead.

The Pointers came roaring back with a three-play scoring drive, with Nuernberg hitting Matt Sosinsky for an 86-yard TD strike and after the PAT kick, it was 21-7.

Whitewater needed just over a minute to come back with its fourth touchdown of the game, but the Pointers' Aaron Karlen had a strip sack late in the second quarter, and the Pointers quickly moved 29

yards in nine plays to set up a 29-yard Jesse Vervelde field goal on the last play of the first half, making the score 28-10.

Vervelde's 22-yard field goal was the only score in the third quarter, then Nuernberg led the Pointers 76 yards in 10 plays for a touchdown, which came on a 31-yard pass to Logan Taylor, making the score 28-20.

Stevens Point's defense held Whitewater to just 115 yards in the second half but did give up a score with 2:21 left in the game, which came on a 10-yard run by Jordan Ratliffe, for a 35-20 Whitewater lead.

Nuernberg and company rallied once again, moving 62 yards in five plays for a 22-yard Nuernberg to Jerod Pankow touchdown with 1:01 left of the clock.

With the score now 35-27, understandably the Pointers went for the onside kick and came up with the football. Unfortunately, Nuernberg's fourth down pass at the SP 30-yard line was picked off by Ryan Winske, ending the upset bid.

This was the second year in a row Nuernberg led the Pointers to near wins over UW-Whitewater. A year ago, he also threw for over 300 yard against the Warhawks.

Junior wide receiver Nate Krupp, another KHS grad, was listed as a par-

ticipant in the game but did not have any catches.

UW-Stevens Point, currently 1-3 in the Wisconsin Intercollegiate Athletic Conference and 3-4 overall, has its final home game of the season Saturday when it entertains UW- La Crosse.

# Annual Operation Deer Watch Survey Period Comes To An End

Operation Deer Watch, the annual citizen-science survey that tracks the numbers of bucks, does and fawns concluded on September 30.

It is not too late to submit your observations. Each year outdoor enthusiasts submit hundreds of observations which contribute to monitoring

white-tailed deer population trends in Wisconsin.

"The summer months are an important time to collect data the department uses to assess deer populations around the state," says Jes Rees Lohr, research scientist with the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources.

Sightings from Operation Deer Watch supplement the department's existing summer deer observation database. These surveys provide fawn to doe ratios; a parameter for deer population estimates.

Participants may submit their observations online by going to

dnr.wi.gov and searching keyword "deer watch," or by mailing their tally sheets to Wildlife Surveys, Attn: Brian Dhuey, 2801 Progress Road, Madison, WI 53716. Participants can also find more information on the site including videos and results of previous year's surveys.

## Continued From... Open For Songs

Steev Baker, director of the Kewaskum Library, has been organizing open mic events in Kewaskum for at least six years.

It started at the library with an open mic-style poetry reading as part of National Poetry Month. The Fireside Poets of West Bend took part in that first event, and have been coming to open mic nights in Kewaskum ever since.

Then, when Kewaskum hosted the first Gateway to the Arts Festival in May 2010, Baker approached the Coffee Corner in Kewaskum to see if an open mic event could be held there as part of the festival. The event drew poets and musicians.

"We had a great turnout. A lot of people wanted to play and perform, and we had a very good audience," Baker said.

The open mic night concept took hold, and Baker started organizing them to be held twice a year through the library. That quickly grew to four times a year.

Kewaskum's open mic nights, which are offered free of charge, draw crowds of all ages, with people traveling from across the area to perform.

Poets, songwriters, musicians, jugglers, beat-boxers, tap dancers, rappers, magicians, storytellers, and interpretive dancers are all welcome to attend, as well as audience members.

Last week was the first time Kewaskum has held Open Mic Night at the

Annex building. This time, musicians were the only ones who took the stage, performing popular music, as well as original compositions. They sang and played both electric and acoustic guitars.

Baker, who provided the audio equipment for the show, took a turn on stage as well, playing guitar and singing music he had written. As Baker's alternative, folk music, filled the room, it was evident what drew people to the laid-back, open-mic atmosphere.

Baker has been performing music most of his life. He grew up in a musical family and sang in his church. Baker's mother has played piano for church for as long as Baker can remember, and his father sang in a men's

group. "So I always grew up around music and singing. I guess from there, it led to this," Baker said.

Baker, who now records his own music, took piano lessons for a while when he was young, and was in the middle school band.

"But then I taught myself guitar when I was in high school, and then there was no turning back," Baker said. "Since then, I've been in bands for years, put groups together. I always wrote my own music, so it's different to be in a band where you write everything. All originals is a different experience."

Kewaskum's next Open Mic Night has not yet been scheduled, but most likely will be sometime this winter, Baker said.
