## Former Teacher Sues Kewaskum School District For FICA Reimbursement

The Kewaskum School District is once again in the courts with Linda Kiser, a former middle school special education teacher for the district.

Kiser won a case against the district in 2013 because the district ignored an arbitrator's order to re-hire her.

Kiser filed papers on July 31 with Washington County Circuit Court, claiming that the school district still owes her \$11,946.32 in FICA taxes (social security and

Medicare programs) for the \$180,000 she was awarded in 2014 for back pay.

On Oct. 30, the district filed papers with the court, maintaining that the district had paid Kiser the full amount the court had ordered it to pay.

In addition, the school district countered that Kiser broke a settlement agreement that she would not sue the district again for anything that occurred prior to 2014.

"We feel that we have in good faith, done what we have been expected to do

by the courts, and fulfilled our obligation as it was agreed upon, and it's time to move on," Kewaskum School District Superintendent James Smasal said.

The case dates back to 2010, when Kiser was fired for using physical force against four students with disabilities. The district claimed that the students had been pinched in the neck and shoulder area, pulled by the arm or pushed into chairs.

## Logging Equipment Catches Fire In Mauthe Lake Recreation Area

Logging machinery that was being used to clear trees from the Mauthe Lake Recreation Area caught fire on Wednesday, Nov. 4.

The estimated loss of the vehicle, which is owned by a logging company out of Hancock, was around \$100,000, said Kewaskum Fire Chief Mark Groeschel.

The fire did not spread to the woods.

The Kewaskum Fire Department was dispatched to the scene at 11:50 a.m. for an off-road vehicle fire, Groeschel said.

Beechwood, Campbellsport and Boltonville fire departments also responded.

Called a logging forwarder, the piece of equipment that was damaged is an eight-wheel vehicle that has a crane on it. The crane is used to pick up logs and place them on the vehicle's bed, and then the forwarder is used to transport the logs out of the woods.

"The operator of the piece of equipment stated he smelled smoke. Then he saw smoke, and when he opened the engine compartment up, he saw a small fire. He tried to use an extinguisher to put it out, but by that time, hot materials were melting," Groeschel said.

The burning materials dripped below the engine to where the hydraulic components are located,

and oily residue caught fire.

"The operator used the full extinguisher, to no avail, and by that time, the unit was totally involved," Groeschel said.

Six or seven of the vehicle's eight tires blew up during the incident, Groeschel said.

"It was a difficult fire to attack because it was about 500 yards off the road, so we couldn't access it with the vehicle. We hand laid 600 feet of hose into the fire, and then commenced our fire attack," Groeschel said.

Kewaskum firefighters returned to the village fire station by 2:26 p.m., Groeschel said.

## Sheriff's Office Responds To Rollover Crash

On Nov. 6 at 5:54 p.m. the Washington County Sheriff's Office was notified of a single vehicle roll over crash, with injuries, on State Highway 175 at Caroline's Way in the Town of Addison.

Sheriff's deputies and rescue personnel from the St. Lawrence and Allenton Fire Departments were subsequently dispatched to the scene. A paramedic intercept from Lifestar Ambulance was also requested to the scene.

An on-scene investigation revealed that an automobile, operated by a 58-year-old Town of Addison man, was northbound on State Highway 175 when witnesses observed the vehicle leave the roadway just north of Caroline's Way and enter the east

ditch.

The vehicle struck a driveway culvert causing it to roll at least one time. The operator (and sole occupant) was ejected. It was determined that he was not wearing his seatbelt.

The driver was transported from the scene by ambulance to Aurora Medical Center in Hartford, and then flown to Aurora Medical Center in Summit via Flight For Life, where he is listed in critical


condition.

State Highway 175 between County Road K and County Road W was intermittently closed for approximately one hour to facilitate rescue, investigative and clean-up efforts. A Wisconsin State patrol trooper also assisted at the scene.

Alcohol does not appear to be a contributing factor, and the accident remains under investigation by the Washington County Sheriff's Office.

### 75 Years

#### November 15, 1940

Extensive damage in the village and all parts of this section resulted from the first blast of winter which started Monday afternoon and continued unabated during the night in one of the worst late fall storms in local history. Thousands of dollars of damage was suffered in this area and hundreds of thousands throughout the state and middlewest. A windstorm out of the southwest which at times touched more than 70 miles an hour, brought with it snow and bitter cold. Rain fell over the weekend and continued Monday when the temperature stood at close to 60 degrees. In the afternoon a high wind sprung up and reached a velocity of 60 miles an hour. The mercury dropped from 52 degrees to 24 degrees between 2 and 4 a.m. The temperature continued to drop throughout the night and early Tuesday fell to 11 degrees. Wisconsin Gas and Electric officials estimate that between 200 and 300 poles carrying electric lines in every direction out of West Bend were snapped off in the fierce wind. The largest amount of damage in the village was to Schaefer Bros' new garage and service station where the wind blew down the chimney which stood about 25 feet high above the building. The chimney crashed down onto the garage roof with such force as to bend the steel beam under the roof. Large plate glass windows were also blown out in the local post office, Joe Mayer shoe shop and Holy Trinity Church. A cross was bent on top of the Holy Trinity school.

Several Wisconsin Freeway Segments To Be Posted At 70 mph

Beginning this week, county highway crews will install 70 mph speed limit signs on several multi-lane, non-Interstate freeway segments where Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT) analysis has determined the higher speed is appropriate. The change applies to nine freeway segments totaling about 161 miles.

Included will be the Washington County portion of Highway 45 between Interstate 41 and the County Highway D interchange.

WisDOT has these important reminders for motorists: •The higher speed limit takes effect once a freeway is officially posted. Also, speed limits apply to ideal travel conditions. Weather and other factors often require reduced speeds.

•Be alert for all roadside workers, including county maintenance crews, and adhere to the state's Move Over Law (<http://wisconsin.gov>)

State legislation (2015 Wisconsin Act 19) increased the speed limit to 70 mph along Interstate segments previously posted at 65 mph. The law also provides WisDOT the authority to post certain multi-lane freeways at 70 mph where motor vehicle access is limited to ramps and interchanges (no at-grade access). Much of the work is expected to be completed this week, except areas where construction activity is wrapping up and will be completed soon.

For the safety of all travelers, WisDOT discourages people from stopping along freeways to take photos or videos of the new signs or crews installing them. Stopped vehicles can present a traffic hazard and state law prohibits all but emergency vehicles from stopping along the freeway system.

## Continued From... Former Teacher Sues Kewaskum School District For FICA Reimbursement

Kiser is a member of the Kewaskum Education Association, and after Kiser lost her job, the association filed a grievance on Kiser's behalf. The collective bargaining agreement that existed between the school district and the association in 2010 deemed that disputes would be submitted to an arbitrator for a final, binding decision.

On May 3, 2012, the arbitrator determined that there was insufficient evidence for many of the allegations of inappropriate force and some of the physical contact had been incidental. The arbitrator found three incidents that warranted discipline of Kiser, but said they were not just-cause for dismissal. The arbitrator ordered the district to re-hire Kiser with back pay, except for a 30-day suspension.

Meanwhile, in June 2011, Act 10 went into effect in Wisconsin, and binding arbitration was eliminated for the state's public schools.

Because the arbitrator's order came after Act 10 had passed, the Kewaskum School District took the case to circuit court, claiming that Act 10 made the arbitrator's decision invalid.

The circuit court ruled in favor of Kiser, and the school district brought the case to the appellate court.

On Oct. 23, 2013, the Wisconsin Court of Appeals also ruled in Kiser's favor, stating that the arbitration was done when an existing contract was in force, so the arbitrator's decision was legally binding.

Kiser and representatives for the Kewaskum School District signed a settlement agreement in 2014. The agree-

ment states that Kiser was reinstated to her employment with the district on March 31, 2014, and that the district would accept her resignation effective the end of the 2013-2014 school year.

The district agreed to pay Kiser \$180,000, inclusive of all back wages and benefits through the end of the 2013-2014 academic year.

The settlement agreement spells out that Kiser's back wages and benefits "will be subject to standard payroll taxes or deductions, income withholding taxes, social security taxes (employee's share only), or any other taxes (if any) which customarily are deducted and paid with respect to wages, as well as the deduction of the employee's contribution to the Wisconsin Retirement System (WRS)." The payment will include an offset for the employer's WRS contribution, the settlement states.

The district paid the employer's contribution to FICA, as specified in the settlement.

In late December 2014 or early January 2015, Kiser notified the district that she felt there had been an error in the amount the district had paid her, according to papers filed in the county circuit court.

Kiser formally filed charges in July. When she signed the 2014 settlement, Kiser agreed to not sue the district for anything that occurred prior to the date that the settlement was signed. Kiser signed the agreement on July 14, 2014, and school board representatives signed the agreement on Aug. 25, 2014.

The case is currently in Washington County Circuit Court, Branch 2.

## BBB Tips For Seasonal Employment

If you are looking for a part-time holiday job, the Better Business Bureau serving Wisconsin recommends starting your search now, with the reminder that a part-time position can possibly become full-time employment.

Stores both large and small need to hire extra help for the holidays, however, last year some companies found they were short-handed because of a strategy that saw many retail sales beginning after Halloween and continuing through December 31st.

There are a number of reasons to begin your job search early, even before the "Help Wanted" signs go up. Aside from getting your foot in the door, it also may give you the opportunity to speak directly with the store's manager.

As a result, they may hire you to fill a position before the hiring blitz begins. In a matter of weeks, managers will be going through dozens of resumes. By then, getting to see the people who hire will be much more difficult if not impossible.

at malls, local businesses, branches of national chains, florists, caterers, delivery services and retail stores, on the floor, at the cash register, and behind the scenes.

Beware of employment scams — These begin with an email or a phone call from someone who claims they saw your resume online, and that you're the perfect candidate for a particular job. The position likely doesn't match any of your skills or experience or may be entirely fake. Some require applicants to pay upfront costs for background checks or training, and provide personal information including a Social Security and bank account numbers, even before they make a formal job offer. Legitimate employers will never do any of those.

Dress the part — If you are approaching this seriously, ditch the yoga pants, jeans and t-shirts.

Dress as you would for any professional interview. Always have some extra resumes on hand or in your car.

Apply where you shop — We shop at many stores where we know the products. If you know a given store's merchandise or corporate culture, that may give you an edge over applicants who don't shop there.

Go social for opportunities — Social, as in social media. A growing number of employers use social media because they get good results without having to lay out a bundle for advertising.

Wow them with research — A company's website is always a good place to learn about job opportunities and corporate culture. Show that you have researched the company. It indicates that you care and have taken the time to prepare and learn about their business.

While retailers are looking at ways to prepare for the holiday rush, the fact is that they will need help. If you are prepared and apply early, there is a better chance you will land the job sooner, rather than not at all.

# Local Christmas Tree Farm Grows Christmas Spirit

Thanksgiving is approaching, and that means Dean and Jackie Fechter are preparing their Christmas wonderland, a Christmas tree farm that has been dubbed "Christmas on Indian Lore."

The Fechters want to provide a Christmas oasis for families. Beginning the day after Thanksgiving, when visitors come to the farm to get a Christmas tree, they are also able to sit around a campfire and make s'mores, go on a hayride, visit a shop and enjoy holiday treats.

"We try to make it more of a family event. Our mentality is you come out to get a tree, but you walk away with a tree and memories," Dean said.

The farm is a family affair when it comes to running it as well. The Fechters' three children, Kara, Alex and Sam Fechter, all grew up helping out on the tree farm.

Kara, who is 23, helps Jackie bake holiday treats for the shop.

Among the goodies are chocolates, blueberry muffins, pumpkin bars, English toffee, hot chocolate and apple cider.

Dean's mother, Joyce Fechter, makes doll clothes to be sold in the shop, and his sisters create wreaths and crafts.

Sam, who is a senior at Kewaskum High School, will once again bring patrons on a 20-minute free hayride around the farm's nearly 60 acres. The visitors will listen to Christmas music and munch on peanuts, as the wagon meanders through the farm's rolling hills.

"I don't care how old you are, we're all kids. Everybody enjoys a wagon ride," Dean said.

With more than 2,000 feet of underground wiring on the farm, Christmas lights sparkle in the fields each evening, and

Christmas decorations are scattered throughout the property.

"We try to make it really feel warm and fuzzy," Jackie said.

Tree varieties include Fraser fir, Canaan fir, Balsam fir, white spruce, blue spruce and Concolor fir. Saws are available for families to cut down their own tree, or they can purchase a pre-cut one.

## Farm History

The whole idea for the Christmas tree farm came years ago when Jackie and Dean were first dating.

"We went to an old farm up north to cut a Christmas tree. There were old couches around a campfire, and soup and sandwiches. They really made it an event. We said we should try to make something like that down here," Dean said.

So, the couple still had that in mind when they started selling Christmas trees from their property on Indian Lore in 1999.

"We sold 60-some trees that first year. We would be in the house watching the Packer game and could see everybody coming in. We saw we had something," Dean said.

Then the property next door went up for sale. Developers wanted to convert the hay fields there into four residential lots.

"Our house was kind of on the edge of that. We decided that either we sit back and watch these four houses going up, and we lose all our atmosphere, or we say, 'Let's go crazy and make this a big business,'" Jackie said.

So the Fechters purchased the land and started planting Christmas trees. While they planted in rows, they strategically placed the trees to maintain a natural feel.

"We really put a lot of thought and time into it, because we really want

people to come here and feel that ultimate Christmas spirit," Jackie said.

The business has grown every year, and the couple now plant 1,500 new trees every year.

## Christmas Work

Running a Christmas tree farm is a year-round job.

"You plant trees in the spring. Some years you are watering all summer, and some years you are cutting grass nonstop during the summer. Then you get ready in the fall for the Christmas business," Dean said.

It takes a lot of work to get the trees ready for Christmas, he said.

"Trees don't simply grow. A lot of people don't realize how long it takes to grow trees. They're not like a pumpkin, where you put in the ground, you wait six months and you have a product. Here, it's seven to 10 years before you get something," Dean said.

Weather can wreak havoc on the business, he said.

In 1988, the Fechters lost 9,000 trees because of a drought, Dean said.

"And then, four or five years ago, we had that drought we lost a lot of trees. That year I spent a week with the hose trying to drain the ponds down, just trying to keep them all alive," Dean said.

Winter can be harsh on the trees as well. Two years ago, the cold winter killed a lot of the Fechters' trees.

"It's not a guarantee every year. It's a farm. If Mother Nature is not on your side, you're going to battle," Dean said. "You've got to watch the weather, you've got to be watching everything in advance. A lot of things can happen."

Still, Dean, who works full time at Pace Industries in Grafton as a die cast manager, doesn't mind the work.

"I enjoy doing it. So I got a day of vacation to mess around on it or after work or on weekends. It is probably one of the funnest businesses that we ever could want to do," he said.

Seeing the same customers enjoying a Christmas tradition year after year is what makes the job rewarding for the Fechter family.

"You know everybody by face, you don't always know their names, but it's

so neat when they come and see you every year. We have some that came when they were little kids, and now 16 years later, they're bringing their kids. Holy cow, now they're bringing girlfriends, boyfriends, and little ones, so we are fortunate that way," Dean said.

Jackie also looks forward to seeing repeat customers.

"We have become friends," Jackie said.

"There is one lady who comes in and she always gives me a hug. It's the coolest thing that you have made so many friendships. I love it."

"Everyone is in a good mood that time of year," Dean said.

# Chief's Corner

As a department administrator, budget season is often stressful. Transparency in any public office is of utmost importance, especially when entrusted with using hard working taxpayer dollars. Although there is a debate on the transparency of federal officials, I want to continue to be transparent with our community. Through this article, our Facebook page and other news stories, I have tried to increase our community's involvement and understanding of our department.

In this article, I want to be transparent on my budget proposal for the 2016 budget cycle. As you may have read in the paper, the proposed budget will involve some changes in the personnel structure of our department.

The Kewaskum Police Department proudly provides service and provides protection 24 hours per day, 365 days per year with only seven full-time officers, consisting of one chief, one lieutenant, and five patrol officers. One of our patrol officers is assigned as a school resource officer and is assigned to handle the Kewaskum High School, Middle School and Elementary School.

Our officers work on a rotating shift schedule. Throughout the year, the situation of unfilled shifts arise for a variety of reasons; such as off days, vacation days, training days, sick days and medical leave.

Currently, in order to fill all of our shifts, I cover patrol duties as well as utilizing part-time officers. At this time, we only have one part-time officer.

In lieu of hiring two more part-time officers in 2016, I have proposed eliminating our part-time officer positions and promoting Officer Anthony Schlice from part-time to full-time. This proposal does increase the overall police department budget because a full-time officer will receive benefits whereas part-time officers do not receive benefits.

I personally want to explain why I believe this is the right direction for our department and for our community.

The Kewaskum Police Department last added a new full-time officer position 15 years ago in January of 2001. Since then, our population has increased by 730 residents. We have added six new subdivisions and the amount of traffic in town has dramatically increased as well.

Naturally the number of calls for service has increased with that growth. To be more specific, the increase in technology has led to different types of crimes we investigate today which take a significant amount of investigative time. We are investigating more social, media, financial and internet based crimes.

We find ourselves having to obtain search warrants and subpoe-

nas for companies such as Facebook, Twitter, Google, Pay-Pal, credit card companies and banks, as well as for phones, computers, cars or homes of supposed drug dealers and users. Our department doesn't have any detectives or investigators, so the assigned patrol officer is spending an increased amount of time in the office and less time on patrol to complete these investigations.

Furthermore, we currently rely on the Washington County Sheriff's Office to provide back-up officers when necessary. Since we generally only have one patrol officer on per shift, the number of calls requiring assistance from the Sheriff's office to date was 115. The Sheriff's office has always been great to work with, but they've had their own number of calls for service increase as well. By adding more of our own patrol coverage during the busier times will allow our department to decrease the reliance on their assistance.

The operational reasons with this proposal will increase efficiency and productivity as a department, but I think one of the biggest reasons for this proposal is how law enforcement has changed in the last couple of years. In terms of required training, the State of Wisconsin has increased the required entry level training hours from 520 to 700. This means for someone to become a police officer, they are required to have 700 hours of academy training, on top of other educational requirements.

The days of finding individuals with the desire and commitment to work long-term as part-time officers are no longer prevalent. Studies have shown that younger generations, i.e. Millennials and Generation Z, value their off-time more than past generations and would be less likely to work part time in addition to full time employment elsewhere.

I believe that the change in societal priorities coupled with continuing increase in training standards, will significantly decrease our applicant pool for part-time officers. In fact, the last hiring process we conducted, we didn't have any applicants who had full-time employment and were looking to fill our part-time openings only. All the applicants were looking for full-time opportunities.

I fear we will continuously be hiring new part-time officers and become merely a stepping stone for officers to find full time employment. The cost associated with purchasing equipment, uniforms, and having these officers complete our 14-week field training program costs our department about \$14,700 per new officer. The process further removes our field training officer from performing routine patrol duties and moves his attention to teaching and training. And I predict we will be doing this

at least once a year... if not more.

Creating this revolving door of hiring will begin what's called an "escalation of commitment," commonly known as "throwing good money after bad." It keeps our department in a perpetual state of instability. The public may never truly know who their part-time police officers are because they will come and go unexpectedly and are generally not as involved or committed to the community. Rarely are they involved in off-duty community events nor will they most likely be living in Kewaskum. Plus having a pattern of new and inexperienced officers can increase our liability exposure and decrease the service received by the public.

I believe eliminating our part-time positions and hiring a full-time officer will result in a better return on our investment. We have already invested good money into an officer who is committed to our community and to our department. Officer Schlice grew up in Kewaskum, currently lives in Kewaskum and desires to continue to serve his hometown in this capacity. Understandably he wants to obtain full time employment and unfortunately if it isn't here... it will be on another department.

The difference in the police department budget between hiring two part-time officers, or hiring one full-time officer is approximately \$13,000; however the current budget proposal only increases the public safety budget as a whole by \$2,332, or 0.2 percent, over 2015 budgetary numbers. There was spending in parts of the 2015 public safety budget that will not be a part of the 2016 budget, which is why this proposal has nearly no effect on the overall 2016 budget.

I do consider myself fiscally conservative when it comes to budgeting. Clearly this is an increase in police department spending, but I believe this is an example of wisely spending money versus so many government programs that wastefully spend money. Government does cost money and public safety is, in my opinion, the most important service provided to citizens by any level of government.

The goal of all administrators is doing it wisely. I believe moving forward with a full time officer will have positive long term effects on our department, the community and ultimately on future budgets. Continuing our "escalation of commitment" by hiring part time officers is, in my opinion, not sound policy. Hopefully, after reading this, our community understands and supports this proposal.

# Crusaders Knock Kewaskum Out Of The Playoffs

## – Thull Suffers Knee Injury On First Offensive Play

A lot of Kewaskum football fans left Friday night's game against Waukesha Catholic Memorial with one question on their minds. "What if?"

What if the Indians' all-state halfback Brandon Thull hadn't gotten injured on the first play from scrimmage? Would he have been able to reverse the outcome of the Level 3 game which ended up 17-14 in the Crusaders' favor?

Thull, who had rushed for 2,161 yards in Kewaskum's previous 11 games and undoubtedly will be the East Central's Player of the Year, gained three yards on his first carry, then limped off the field. Several minutes later, he returned and gained four yards only to go down again, and this time he could not leave the field under his own power.

"(He took) A helmet to the knee," KHS coach Jason Piittmann said afterward, obviously dejected with the outcome but proud of the way the Indians played on after losing their star player. "He tried to go, but it just wasn't going to be."

Step in Steven Nurkala, who looked right at home as the feature back, gaining 128 yards in 25 carries. He scored the Indians' first touchdown on their first series, a 13-play drive that chewed up over six minutes on the clock and ended when the 5'8", 200-pound senior plowed over the goal line from the four-yard line, giving the Indians a 7-0 lead.

"He has the heart of a lion. That's the best way to put it," Piittmann said about Nurkala, agreeing he ran with authority Friday night. "He was not going to be denied."

Key in the drive were Nurkala's runs and a couple of Michael Prochnow passes to Eric Doll for 14 and 11 yards, both for first downs.

After watching his team score on the first drive, Piittmann said he felt pretty good. "We thought we could run right at them, and we did."

After Memorial went three and out, the Indians were back in business at their own 25 yard line and quickly picked up two first downs, moving to midfield behind a couple nifty runs by Nurkala.

Then the Indians shot themselves in the foot, with back-to-back illegal formation penalties, and the drive stalled. The two five-yard walkoffs turned out to be the only penalties the Indians had in the game except for a personal foul call on Charlie Witek, who got tangled up with a Crusader defender, and both were whistled for their actions in the play.

In their first series of the second quarter, the Indians moved to Memorial's 48 before having to punt the ball, which wound up hitting one of the Crusaders in the back of the foot. He recovered in time to fall on the loose ball.

"Field position worked in our favor," Piittmann said, referring to the fact CM had to start at its own 13, but, "Two or three plays later, they hit the short pass (to Max Cooper)" and he ran (87 yards) for the touchdown. That changed the momentum of the game."

With the score now 7-7, the Indians' offense would have one more series before the half but after picking up one first down, two passes fell incomplete and a Nurkala run only netted one yard, and it was time to punt again.

With just 2:35 left on the clock, the Crusaders used a 12-yard pass to Josh Karfonta and a 25-yard run by Jaylen Campbell to move to the KHS 31. Bray then hit Fletcher Metz for nine yards, and Farfonta picked up three yards for another first down at the KHS 17.

Here the KHS defense stiffened, and with 13.9 seconds remaining, Eric Fridl nailed a 31-yard field goal. That was a key to the Crusader win, according to veteran coach Bill Young, who said, "The fact we responded and got that field goal" was so important, especially considering Memorial now had the lead and would get the ball to start the second half.

The Crusaders took advantage of the opportunity, going 65 yards in nine plays, and again it was Bray finding Cooper alone in the right side of the end zone for the touchdown, giving Memorial a 17-7 lead.

With a great surge of energy coming from the large home crowd, the Indians came right back with a thrilling 70-yard

scoring march, culminating when Witek made a leaping grab of a Prochnow pass that covered 13 yards.

"He just got his feet in bounds. It was a beautiful catch," Piittmann said. "Michael put it in the right spot."

This drive had another exciting moment just to keep the drive alive. Facing a fourth down and 10 at the CM 30, Prochnow found Josh Baker for a 14-yard pass and a first down at the Memorial 16.

After Cade Peterson's second successful PAT, the margin was now just three points, 17-14, and there was still an entire quarter remaining.

Unfortunately the Indians were unable to sustain a drive in the fourth quarter. On their first drive, starting at the KHS 18, the Indians went three-and-out.

Memorial took over with 8:21 left and mixed rushing and an 18-yard reception by Metz to move into KHS territory, but the Indians caught a break when the Crusader center had a bad snap, and Bray finally fell on the ball at midfield.

Fridl's punt was gathered in by Nurkala, who made a fair catch at the KHS 15. On first down, Baker was tackled after a two-yard gain, then Memorial nearly came up with an interception and Prochnow's third down pass fell incomplete.

Because they were deep in their own territory, the Indians decided to punt with 3:26 left on the clock, and a steady dose of Campbell and Farfonta followed, with Memorial moving from its 48 to the KHS 15. The Indians took three straight timeouts after stopping Memorial for six, - one and two yards, but Campbell's four-yard gain on fourth down, gave the Crusaders a first down, and they ran out the clock.

Campbell, a 188-pound junior, wound up with 121 yards rushing in 19 carries, with Karfonta adding 56 yards. Bray completed seven of 11 passes for 172 yards and two touchdowns and had a quarterback rat-

ing of 146.8.

Prochnow was 10x23 for 80 yards, one touchdown and a 67.3 rating for the night. Baker led the team in catches with three, while Witek, who was double teamed most of the night, Doll and Nurkala each had two.

"We're fortunate to win and move on," Young, who has 310 wins to his credit, said, indicating he's been on both sides of game like this one and knows how difficult it is to lose, especially with a player like Thull on the sideline.

"It was just a great high school football game," Young said. "Coach Piittmann is a great coach, and Kewaskum has a great program."

"The defense played really well," Piittmann said, citing lineman Sam Fechter, linebackers Ben Watzig and Patrick Krier, and halfback Brady Hanson. Watzig was in on 15 tackles, including five solos, while Hanson had four solos and seven assists, and Baker had five solos and five assists. "It was a battle, physical as all get out."

About the 19 seniors who leave the program, the coach said, "It was a wonderful group to work with. They really drove this team."


There were plenty of tears and hugs after the game. The Indians had hoped their season would end at Camp Randall Stadium in Madison, but they fell two wins short of getting there, ending the year at 11-1.

The Crusaders will travel to Middleton on Friday to play Reedsburg, which knocked Mt. Horeb-Barneveld out of the playoffs, 38-12.

## Milwaukee Baseball Group Honors Gonring, Four Others

The batting cage in the front yard is a dead give-away.

Those who drive by the property just east of Kewaskum on Hwy. 28 probably think, the person living there must love baseball. And they would be correct.

Doug Gonring loves baseball ... has since he was a kid, and he played the game giving 100 percent right up to the time he decided to hang up the cleats.

This past weekend, Gonring's career earned him another honor as the Old Time Ballplayers Association of Wisconsin inducted him and three others in their Hall of Fame. The ceremony was held after a dinner at Serb Hall in Milwaukee, and it included lots of baseball chatter from past and perhaps some from this year's World Series which concluded recently.

The Old Time Baseball Players group was formed in 1932, and this was the organization's 35th Hall of Fame dinner, which honors those baseball players who had illustrious careers in the Milwaukee area.

"I think I played about five years in Milwaukee for Wolf Cleaners," Gonring said last week, indicating he didn't think he would be considered for the award because he didn't think he played there long enough.

Gonring must have made enough of an impression on the Hall of Fame committee to add him to the group, joining former Milwaukee Brewer Gorman Thomas, former University of Wisconsin shortstop Jim Barwick and Russ Mueller. Also honored at the dinner was Bob Groth, who won the Ray Schuster Lifetime Achievement Award.

About his playing days in Milwaukee, Gonring said, The Wolf team played in the Langsdorf League, which, he said, "was the best league in Milwaukee." One year the team won the State League championship, which qualified Wolf to play in the NBC tournament against winners from the other states, but the team didn't go.

"We couldn't get enough guys off of work to go," Gonring said, so Wisconsin did not have a

representative that year.

Gonring played against Barwick in high school when the Hartland native starred for Arrowhead, which beat Gonring's West Bend East team in the WIAA state finals in 1979 by a score of 4-3.

After high school, Gonring went to the University of Arkansas to play baseball until he needed a second surgery, then he transferred to Indians Hills Community College for one year and ended his collegiate career at Florida Atlantic in Boca Raton, Florida.

Gonring was drafted by the Milwaukee Brewers in the 20th round in 1984, but they never offered him a contract. Later, he was drafted in the 36th round by the Toronto Blue Jays, and he signed a professional contract with them.

"I made it up to AA (ball)," Gonring said, indicating the last place he played was Columbus, Georgia with the Astros of the South League.

In his three seasons of pro ball, Gonring had 136 hits in 514 trips to the plate for a .265 average with 21 doubles, one triple, six home runs and 68 RBIs. His fielding average was .987 at first base and .966 behind the plate.

Gonring later played with the Wolf team and the West Bend Lithias, and after marrying Karen Volm, the two made their home in Kewaskum, so he began playing for the Athletics until leaving the game with two close teammates, Dave Donath and Terry Koth, in '97. "I was 35 years old ... the last game we played was at Horicon," Gonring said. "I left my shoes in Horicon."

Gonring is the fourth player from the West Bend area to be named to the Hall, and he had close associations with two of them, Bob Neja (2,011) and Willie Mueller (2,012), and heard many good things about the third, Fred Mollwitz (2,002 posthumously).

Gonring recalls as a young player receiving advice from Neja, a long-time coach at Milwaukee Messmer, who moved to West Bend where he was a coach at West Bend East for many years.

"He touched a lot of kids," Gonring said about Neja, who steered him to having the proper attitude as a young athlete. "He

was one of the most influential people in my life. He was real good to me."

Mueller was a pioneer of sorts for baseball players in West Bend, showing them it was possible to have a shot at making the major leagues even though Wisconsin kids don't have the opportunity to play as many games as those from California, Texas or other warm weather states.

The two never played together in baseball, but Gonring said they did play softball together, and had Mueller been a little more persuasive, the two would both have had roles in the movie Major League, which starred Corbin Bensen, Wesley Snipes, Charlie Sheen, Tom Berenger and Wisconsin's own Bob Uecker

Gonring said Mueller, who played the "Duke," called him after filming had just gotten underway, asking him to come catch for him because the others playing the role of catcher "couldn't catch him."

"I declined it," Gonring said, recalling how the film shoots, which sometimes lasted until three in the morning, didn't appeal to him.

Since then, Gonring regretted his decision, noting, 26 years later, "It's one of the best baseball movies ever made."

Gonring was familiar with Mollwitz through his son. In 1919, Fred Mollwitz "played with Babe Ruth," he said, indicating the son would send him notes each week, suggesting words he should have his players use in sentences.

"The last word he gave me was extrapolate," Gonring said, indicating he became a member of the Old Time Ballplayers association when Mollwitz inducted his dad.

Attending Sunday's dinner with Gonring were Karen, daughter Lauren and her boyfriend, his mother and dad, Dave and Joyce Gonring, other family and friends.

And was Gonring, who still spends a lot of time on the ball diamond as the coach of Kewaskum High's team, excited about this new honor? As he put it, "To go in with Jim Barwick and Gorman Thomas, what can you say!"

Scoles dropped a weight class this season to help the Rangers' lineup, which includes two excellent wrestlers at 165 and



## New Deer Registration Rules In Effect For The 2015 Season

With the launch of the GameReg system and electronic registration, hunters now have until 5 p.m. the day after harvest to register a deer. This rule applies for all deer hunting seasons.

"Previously, hunters could register their deer by 5 p.m. the day after harvest," said Matt O'Brien, Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources administrative warden. "The new regis-

tration deadline is a bit of a change for 2015, so hunters should make sure they are up to speed before the nine-day gun deer hunt."

After tagging a harvested deer, hunters can visit [gamereg.wi.gov](http://gamereg.wi.gov) or call 1-844-426-3734 to access the game registration system. Hunters may also register their deer electronically at a participating registration station. Upon completion, hunters will receive a 10-character confirmation number to

write on the carcass tag as proof of registration. This tag should remain with the deer until the meat is consumed.

To help make sure hunters are ready for another nine-day deer hunt, the department will host a chat November 16 at noon. Questions related to harvest registration, safety, regulations or any other deer season topic are welcome. To participate or view the transcripts for previous chats, visit [dnr.wi.gov](http://dnr.wi.gov) and search

keyword "chat."

Hunters may also find a variety of deer season materials, including season structure maps, frequently asked questions and helpful links at [dnr.wi.gov](http://dnr.wi.gov), keyword "deer." To learn more about GameReg and electronic registration, search keywords "electronic registration."
