Town Of Farmington To Address Assessment Discrepancies

The Farmington Town Board decided on Nov. 10 to continue using Accurate Appraisal, LLC, to provide the town's assessments, even though the board questioned whether the firm had correctly classified all of the properties.

If one property in the township is assessed incorrectly, the rest of the property owners pay more to cover the entire tax levy.

"Last month we had an issue come in where there was this five-acre lot where a person is paying \$14 or \$17 a year property tax on it because it still shows up as ag, like it's part of a big 80-acre field, and it's not," said Town Supervisor Duane Wollner. "It's not really fair to the rest of the town residents."

Lee De Groot, owner of Accurate Appraisal, LLC, said on Nov. 17 if a property was inaccurately assessed under agricultural use, the issue will be

addressed.

"I am not sure what property the Town Board is speaking of or even that it is incorrectly assessed. We will be going through all classifications this year and speaking with the town board to make sure that whatever concerns they may have about this particular parcel are addressed," De Groot said.

Even though a property may be zoned agricultural, only properties that are being farmed should be classified as agricultural use when they are assessed, Farmington Town Clerk Chris Schellinger said.

Under the agreement that the board approved, Accurate Appraisal will be doing yearly maintenance, as it has been doing since 2013. One of the things the yearly maintenance should be doing is making sure parcels are properly assessed by their use.

"When a neighbor is paying \$1,000 for a lot,

and this person is paying \$14 because the lot was developed 10 years later, regular maintenance should be catching that," Wollner said.

"Right, depending on when the aerial was taken. Correct," said Jim Danielson, who represented Accurate Appraisal at the meeting.

On Nov. 1, Danielson voluntarily relinquished his assessor's license for six months after being involved in a similar situation in Germantown.

"One of the things we had asked Danielson to explain to us was how he had determined some agricultural and underdeveloped property classifications. That was one thing we were looking at, how he was classifying land," said Stephanie Marquis, spokesperson for the Wisconsin Department of Revenue.

Village Of Kewaskum Struggles With Budget

Faced with a \$171,849 shortfall from the village's Tax Incremental Financing District 2 (TID 2), the Kewaskum Village Board did not adopt a 2016 budget at its meeting on Monday, Nov. 16.

Instead, the board decided to reconvene on Wednesday, Nov. 18, in an effort to cut the proposed budget by about \$78,000.

The proposed budget included a tax levy increase of about 8 percent, or \$156,737.

Village trustees Richard Knoebel and Dave Zehren voted to approve the budget as is, citing needs for street improvements and capital expenditures.

The Kewaskum Statesman goes press on Tuesday, so results from the November 18 meeting will be in next week's paper.

On November 2, the village board discussed charging undeveloped properties within Utility District 3 (UD3), which is part of the village's TID 2, with an additional mill rate

of about \$80.62 per \$1,000 of assessed value to generate the TIF's \$171,849 shortfall.

At a special meeting on Thursday, Nov. 12, the board voted 6-0 to create UD3 within TID 2.

However, rather than having UD3 help cover this year's TID shortfall, the village will not be able to levy a special tax on any undeveloped property until January 1, 2016. Any UD3 properties that are undeveloped as of January 1, 2016, could incur an extra tax in 2017.

Village Trustee Dave Zehren was not at the November 12 meeting.

Since undeveloped property within the utility district will not be penalized this year, the burden falls on all of the taxpayers within the village to make up for the deficit.

At the November 12 special meeting, the village's attorney, Timothy Fenner, said that in order for UD3 to go on this year's taxes, the village would have had to have signed that order by April 1. According to Wisconsin

Statute 66.0827, revenue requirements for utility districts must be determined by October 1.

"The order provides for the levy only against undeveloped property in this TIF district. Why undeveloped property? Well, because the other property has increment. The people who have built homes, the businesses that have built structures, the industries that have made improvements, they are paying that increment," Fenner said.

The tax on UD3 could have a negative long-term impact on the village, said village resident Joel Fleischman. Rather than building \$250,000 homes, the developers will build \$85,000 houses in order to avoid the special assessment.

"That is a huge concern for me. My property value is going to go down, my income is going to go down. The quality of the village is going to go down," Fleischman said.

Kewaskum Library Loses Two Librarians

Kewaskum Public Library Director Steev Baker will be leaving his position in Kewaskum to become a librarian at the Sun Prairie Public Library. Baker has been the head librarian at the Kewaskum Library for 15

years. His last day at the Kewaskum Library will be Jan. 2.

Krista Mullinnix, who started working 30 hours a week as Kewaskum Library's youth services librarian/assistant director on Sept. 1, also has resigned from her position at the library. Mullinnix's

last day on the job here will be Friday, Nov. 20. Mullinnix plans to return to her hometown in Indiana.

The Library Board may meet as early as Monday, Nov. 23, to review and plan out the next course of action, Village Trustee Dave Spenner said.

Washington County Sheriff's Office Reports

Motor Vehicle Crash

On Nov. 15, at 6:55 a.m., the Washington County Sheriff's Office was notified of a single vehicle roll over crash with injuries, on Interstate 41, south of Highway D in the Town of Wayne.

Sheriff's Deputies and rescue personnel from the Kohlsville and Allenton Fire Departments were dispatched to the scene and located the vehicle upside down in traffic with the female driver trapped with a serious leg injury. A paramedic intercept from West Bend Fire Department and Flight for Life were also requested to the scene.

The investigation revealed that the vehicle, operated by a 38-year-old Wautoma woman, was northbound on I-41 when she removed her seat belt to reach for an item inside the vehicle. The vehicle then left the roadway, striking a mile marker post, and continued into the median where it began to roll, coming to rest in the southbound lanes of traffic on its roof.

Northbound and southbound traffic on Interstate 41 was closed for approximately 20 minutes to assist in rescue efforts and the landing of Flight for Life. A single lane of southbound I41 remained closed for approximately two hours during the crash investigation.

Alcohol does not appear to be a contributing factor, and the accident remains under investigation by the Washington County Sheriff's Office.

Bicycle Accident

On Nov. 14, at 11:13 a.m., the Washington County Sheriff's Office received a 911 call report-

ing a teenager had fallen off her bicycle on Kings Way in the Town of Hartford and was unresponsive.

Deputies, along with members of the Hartford and St. Lawrence Fire Departments, arrived a short time later and determined that the teenager had sustained a significant head injury while biking in the roadway. The female was then transported by Hartford Rescue to Aurora Medical Center, and then to Froedert Trauma Center by Flight for Life.

Due to the head injury, the female was unable to identify herself. The Washington County Sheriff's Office requested the assistance of the St. Lawrence Fire Department for a door to door canvas of the neighborhood in an attempt to identify the female. Members of the St. Lawrence Fire Department, and Wisconsin State Patrol assisted in the neighborhood canvas and were able to identify the 19 year old female as a Town of Hartford resident and notify her family.

The investigation into the bicycle accident revealed that the female was riding a home built bicycle made of various bicycle parts, without a helmet, on Kings Way when she struck her head on the pavement, causing injuries. The incident remains under investigation by the Washington County Sheriff's Office.

Second OWI

On Nov. 9 at 5:40 p.m., a 30-year-old Town of Addison man put his vehicle into a cornfield in the area of K/Wildlife Road.

He had been driving southbound on Wildlife Road and failed to stop for the stop sign at County Trunk K. The driver indicated he was texting and did not see the "T" intersection.

He was arrested for second offense after he failed sobriety testing. There will also likely be a penalty enhancer to the case, as the driver had his 2 year-old child in the vehicle. There was some damage to the vehicle, but neither occupant sustained any injuries from the incident.

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

"I bought 13 lots in 2005 for \$900,000. I paid about \$100,000 in taxes on the vacant land, not to mention the taxes on the condominiums that I held due to the recession," said Dan Gish. "And now you are going to motivate me by taxing me on these lots. I am not in agreement with this."

"I don't think a utility district is intended to go back after the fact... If the village proceeds on this today, it may very well be making new law," said Jeremy Vanderloop, an attorney for Madden Vanderloop Law Firm in West Bend, who represented Serwe Revocable Trust at last Thursday's meeting. "I think this is thinking far too far out of the box."

"I am comfortable with the mechanism that is established," Fenner said. "It is being used in a number of communities. The state is well aware of it."

However, Stephanie Marquis, spokesperson for the Wisconsin Department of Revenue said she did not have any information on utility districts within TIDs.

"Utility districts are not taxation districts, so we don't have data on them," Marquis said.

The Village of Warrens is one municipality that created a Utility District to help recover costs from a distressed TID. However, the Warrens utility district does not levy an extra tax for undeveloped property. Instead, Warrens uses its utility district as a special assessment that is used specifically to pay for the cost of utilities within the district, Warrens Village Board President Jason Krultz said.

"We kind of use it in a similar fashion, where the village water and sewer lines that were installed out there. Those are for the benefit of those property owners, and so they should bear the expense of that, not the rest of the village," Krultz said.

Vanderloop questioned whether Kewaskum had held a public hearing as required before creating UD3.

"I am not aware of any-

thing resembling a recent public hearing. The only thing I can come up with happened last August," Vanderloop said, referring to a public hearing that was held on August 18, 2014. "The resolution has changed."

"We did have a public hearing on the creation of the district, and we have satisfied that requirement," Fenner said.

The village wants to

work with developers, Fenner said.

"We are only limited by a lack of imagination in terms of what kind of development agreement. The village is very interested in seeing development occur, and invites working with developers to see if we can come up with appropriate development plan that is truly a win-win-win," Fenner said.

Background On Kewaskum's Utility District 3

In 2005, the Village of Kewaskum created a tax incremental district (TID 2) to encourage growth.

The village invested \$8 million to extend sewer and water services into TID 2, which is located west of U.S. Highway 45. The commercial part of the TID is between Badger and Hillcrest roads, and the residential part is the Nature Haven Estates subdivision west of Prospect Drive.

TIDs encourage development by freezing the values of their land for all entities except the municipality to which they belong.

To spur development in Kewaskum, land values within TID 2 have remained at the 2005 level for all entities except the Village of Kewaskum. Other jurisdictions (the Kewaskum School District, Washington County and Moraine Park Technical College) have taxed that land at the 2005 base level, and the village has received the tax increment, which is the difference between the base tax and the tax following improvements.

In 2008, the nation went

into a recession, and building stopped in Kewaskum. Like many other municipalities across the state, Kewaskum's TID was declared distressed in 2012.

Meanwhile, the village's debt payments on the \$8 million the village had invested have been increasing every year. Starting around 2011, the increment (revenue) earned by TID 2 has not been able to cover the debt payment, so the village's taxpayers have been lending the district money.

To remove the burden from the general taxpayers, last year the Village of Kewaskum began the process of creating Utility District 3 (UD3) within TID 2.

UD3 contains 54 of the TID's 88 properties.

On Thursday, Nov. 12, the village board passed a resolution to create UD3.

"Under Wisconsin law, the village is able to create a utility district for purposes of recovering certain costs in a defined geographic area of the village," Kewaskum Village Attorney Timothy Fenner said.

The state found that Danielson had not been performing uniform assessments, validating sales or reviewing classifications annually, Marquis said.

Town board members could not be reached for comment on whether they knew about the Germantown assessments.

While Danielson is in the relinquishment period, he can continue day-to-day operations at Accurate Appraisal, but cannot sign a roll book, De Groot said.

Barb Wroblewski has been and will continue to be the statutory assessor for the Town of Farmington, De Groot said.

The Farmington Town Board received bids from three different appraisal agencies.

The board agreed last

week to sign a four-year contract with Accurate Appraisal, LLC, at a cost of \$14,500 a year, which would include a market revaluation during one of those years and regular maintenance the other three years.

The Town of Farmington is currently out of compliance with the state's assessment value, at about 16 percent higher than what the state says is current market value.

"Everything is going to get looked at, reclassified if necessary," Danielson said.

"The board of review has been uneventful, versus when the previous one was here. The cost is down. The one thing I'm kind of disappointed is that this regular maintenance didn't catch some of these properties," Wollner said.

Moraine Park is excited to announce its fourth class of students from the Information Technology (IT) Interface grant recently completed the Content Management Certificate program.

The completion ceremony was a true testimonial of the skills learned by students in the program. The graduates worked on website projects with several area companies, including: Lemke Consulting LLC, Pizzaville, New Automotive Concepts, and Lo Energy Heating and

Cooling.

In spring 2016, Moraine Park will offer iOS and Android Web Application Development Certificates, with evening courses at their Fond du Lac and West Bend campuses. In all, Moraine Park expects to enroll 90 students in the IT Careers program over the three-year grant period.

The IT Careers program was implemented as part of a three-year, \$995,662, TAACCCT 3 grant awarded by the U.S. Department of Labor to address emerging needs in the IT sector.

This grant, which awarded a total of \$23.1 million to 16 colleges in the Wisconsin Technical College System, is backing the statewide INTER-FACE project, which has been established to help develop, improve and expand adult educational training pathways to careers in information technology-related occupations in business, information technology, health-care, logistics, automation and manufacturing.

In collaboration with workforce development boards, job centers, advisory boards and local

employers, the grant has allowed Moraine Park the resources to develop a new IT Careers program that provides specific training to adult learners, veterans and dislocated workers. Four short-term, targeted certificates are offered within this program, including Content Management, Android Web Application Development, iOS Web Application Development and Website Security. Students that complete these short-term certificates will have an opportunity to use those courses to ladder into an associate degree in IT-Web Development and Design Specialist or a technical diploma in IT-Mobile Applications Designer/Developer, both created through the grant.

Information sessions for upcoming IT certificates will be held on Moraine Park's Fond du Lac campus on Monday, Nov. 16, at 1:30 p.m. and 5:30 p.m., and on Thursday, Nov. 19, at 8:30 a.m. and 5:30 p.m. Preregistration for sessions is recommended through morainepark.edu/itcareers.

Disability Employment Awareness Month is celebrated in October to promote employment opportunities for job seekers with disabilities and encourage businesses to learn how hiring people with disabilities can improve the company's bottom line.

But perhaps the most important reason for hiring people with disabilities is to provide dignity, a sense of community, self-respect and pride in a job well done. Regal Ware partners with The Threshold, Inc. of West Bend, that serves as a resource for recruiting talented candidates with disabilities. The Threshold also provides coaching for employees with disabilities as they integrate into new work environments.

Most people have some connection to family or friends affected by disabilities. They could be veterans coming home with physical or emotional scars from the battlefield or the proud parents of a child with autism who wants their child included in school and community life.

Protect Yourself From Scams During Medicare Open Enrollment

Medicare beneficiaries may change their Medicare health and prescription drug plans during the annual Open Enrollment Period, which is from October 15 to December 7. However, beneficiaries should be aware that Medicare fraud scams are common during this period, and you should know what to watch for to avoid becoming a victim.

As Yogi Berra said, "You can observe a lot by watching."

One scheme to be on the lookout for is the following: A person claiming to be from Medicare, your health plan, or another organization contacts you to inform you about some new benefits. The scammer then states that all you need to do to receive these "benefits" is to confirm your Medicare number for them so that they can send you a new Medicare card. Never give your Social Security, Medicare, or health plan numbers to someone you don't know.

Another common scam is a caller offering you a special discount on your Medicare plan. The fraudster claims that you could save a lot of money but only if you "act now." Then, the caller pressures you for your Social Security number and bank information to sign you up for this "great deal." Do not give this information out and hang up the phone!

Marketing and enrollment violations also occur during Open Enrollment when some Medicare health plans do not follow the strict rules set by Medicare. Medicare plans

may not:

- Sell Medicare coverage door-to-door or leave leaflets, flyers, or door hangers at your home.

- Call you unless you have given them permission.

- Conduct marketing events in your doctor's office, at the pharmacy counter, or in other places that deliver healthcare services.

- Make you meet face-to-face with a plan representative or have you undergo a health screening in order to receive coverage.

- Require you to provide your email address or other contact information, Medicare number, or Social Security number at a marketing event.

If you encounter any of these things, please report the plan to the CMS NBI MEDIC at 1-877-772-3379. If you have questions about Medicare fraud, you can contact Wisconsin SMP (Senior Medicare Patrol) at 1-800-448-2596, extension 317.

Wisconsin offers a variety of resources to help Medicare beneficiaries during Open Enrollment and throughout the year. If you need help selecting a Medicare Advantage plan, call the Medigap Hotline at 1-800-242-1060.

For assistance choosing a Medicare prescription drug plan, call 1-855-677-2783. "There is no other turkey trot in Washington County, so we are the premier turkey trot for the county," said Terri Bodden owner of Finish Line Training in Kewaskum.

When Bodden started the Turkey Trot in 2013, she wasn't sure how many participants to expect.

"The first year we thought we would get 50 of our friends, but we ended up getting over 150 people," Bodden said.

That number grew last year to 300 people.

"It's really awesome to see the families that come out and where they all come from. Last year we were just so impressed. People drove down from Plymouth and even further. They had just Googled Turkey Trots and wanted something early enough that they could get home, and have their Thanksgiving," Bodden said.

Both years, the weather was not on their side, and people had to run in snow and ice.

"Last year it snowed the night before, the sidewalks were icy, it was really, really cold and we still had 48 people come in the morning of to register," Bodden said.

Because it is a fast course, elite runners travel to participate in the race as well as families, Bodden said.

"This is a course made for everybody," Bodden said. "It is a small town, with a family feel, but it is a great, fast course."

To run in the slick conditions, many participants wore trail-running shoes or Yaktrax metal cleats.

This year will feature a new course. The race will begin and end across the

street from Finish Line Training, which is located at 1010 Fond du Lac Ave., and will wind around the residential area east of Fond du Lac Avenue.

It will be chip timed so each participant will know their exact time.

Half of the run's proceeds will go to the Kewaskum Elementary School physical education department, and the other half will go to the "We Believe" capital campaign for a parish center and gymnasium at Holy Trinity Church.

"My kids go to the public school, but my kids will benefit from that. Every family really needs to be aware of what that really stands for, what that's going to mean to have another gym in the com-

munity. Right now we are overflowing everywhere," Bodden said.

The race begins at 8 a.m. on Thanksgiving Day, Nov. 26.

Online registration is available at finishlinetrainingllc.com or active.com. Cost is \$30.

Race-day registration is also available, from 6:30 to 7:45 a.m. Packet pickup will be at that same time.

After the race, water and pumpkin pie will be available. People are also welcome to come to the Finish Line Training studio for hot coffee and cider.

Trophies will be awarded to the top three overall male, female and youth finishers, and medals will be presented to top finishers in each age group.

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Principal To Leave Farmington Elementary At End Of School Year

After 11 years in the Kewaskum School District, Tom Fischer will be leaving his position as Farmington Elementary School principal at the end of this school year.

Fischer announced his resignation on Monday, Nov. 9.

"In the summer I felt this is going to be my last year. It's just time to do something different. There's a lot of things I want to do, and I'm going to have some opportunities at the end of the school year," Fischer said.

Fischer, 40, did not want to say what his employment options are for next year.

"I'm just focusing on what we are doing here [at Farmington], and enjoying the kids, the whole staff and the community," Fischer said. "Come May, when I finally decide what I'm going to do, I'll put more out about that Wednesday, December 2 - Cantata practice at St. Matthew's Church, 6:30 p.m.-8 p.m. All denominations welcome to participate in the Greater Campbellsport Ecumenical Area Christmas Cantata."

Fischer said it was a relief telling people this early in the year that he would be leaving.

"I wanted everyone to know that I wanted to pursue other things, just to be

on the up and up. I wanted the district to have plenty of time to figure out how they want to adjust things. That was important to me," Fischer said.

Farmington Elementary has found a special place in Fischer's heart.

"I love Farmington. If I was just going to be a principal for the rest of my life, I probably would want to be just right here," he said.

Fischer started thinking about a change in careers after being diagnosed with advanced non-Hodgkin lymphoma in 2011.

Fischer underwent five months of chemo in 2011 and 2012, and has been in remission since.

"That was rough. To be honest, I feel like I'm getting my feet back under me just recently," Fischer said. "[Cancer] changes you. It opens up your eyes and you realize you can do things differently. As much as I love being here at Farmington, I'd like to experience something else."

The school district has been supportive of Fischer's decision to leave, he said.

"The superintendent has been very understanding, and the school board has been great. There is no negative here at all," Fischer said.

Fischer, who is from Kenosha, earned his bachelor's degree in

English from the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point. He then worked as a high school English teacher at Indian Trail Academy in Kenosha for two and a half years before becoming an alternative education teacher at Wilmot High School.

Fischer then pursued his administrative degree and returned to Indian Trail Academy as dean of students for two years.

Then, 11 years ago, Fischer began his tenure at Kewaskum Schools. He was associate principal at Kewaskum High School for two years, principal at Kewaskum Elementary School for three years and principal at Kewaskum High School for two and a half years. He has been principal at Farmington Elementary since the 2012-13 school year.

Over the years, Fischer has made a positive impact on the Kewaskum Schools.

He volunteered 11 years ago to start the district's new teacher program, and it is still going today.

"We run a new teacher orientation at the beginning of the year. Everyone is assigned a mentor for two years. Not everyone does that. Some places are lucky to have them for one," Fischer said about the program.

Fischer also helped found the Boys and Girls

Club in Kewaskum eight years ago. The program started when the schools had early release Wednesdays to provide professional development time for teachers. The program has grown tremendously and now offers before- and after-school care five days a week and programming during recess at Kewaskum Elementary School.

"It was a whirlwind," Fischer said. "We started out that first October with 25 kids, and now we have hundreds of kids there. We have the highest rate of attendance in the county."

While the early release schedule was in place, Fischer started a Big Brothers Big Sisters program at Kewaskum

Elementary School. The program earned the school an award for being the community partner of the year.

While Fischer has been principal at Farmington, the school's reading and writing test scores are among the highest in the county.

"It's a great school. Great students, great parents, great staff. I love it," Fischer said.

Whatever his future holds, Fischer wants to spend time with his four children, ages 8, 10, 13 and 16.

"I like to be with my children," he said. "We are outside a lot, with sports, hiking, camping, fishing. I like hunting, fly fishing and reading, and I dabble in writing. And my kids. We

usually do it all together."

What is the thing Fischer will miss the most about his job at Farmington? "When I go down this hallway and see kids' smiles. Seeing them learning, seeing them engaged, seeing them happy to be here. That's my favorite part," Fischer said.

Fischer is excited to see what the next chapter of his life holds.

"Really, the opportunities are endless, so I just have to figure out what I want to do," Fischer said. "We should teach our kids to try new things. So this is for them, too. If you want to do something else, do something else. There are so many opportunities out there."

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Village Awaits Cost Estimate To Repair Foreclosed Home

The vacant house at 639 Washington Ave. in Kewaskum is locked and entry is prohibited as the village awaits repair costs.

The house has been unoccupied and in disrepair since it was foreclosed nearly two years ago. The house had a burst pipe last winter, and the interior of the house is

now covered with mold.

At the end of October, mold mitigation personnel came to inspect the house to determine repair cost estimates. However, they had only masks to protect them, and they felt they were not sufficiently protected. The inspectors returned on Nov. 4 wearing full hazmat suits, Village Administrator Matt Heiser said.

If the estimated repair

costs are greater than 50 percent of the assessed value, the village could pursue a raze order, Heiser said.

If inspectors deem the property fixable, the village can force the bank to rehab the place.

All of the options can be put on the tax bill for that property so other taxpayers will not be affected, Heiser said.

Fillmore And Boltonville Fire Departments Plan To Work Together

"When I heard over the summer that my aunt was going out to schools, I thought that would be a great opportunity for KES to give back to our community," Megan Grisolono said.

So, on Friday, Nov. 13, Tinker visited Kewaskum Elementary School. The Takacs' tiny papillon dog, named Ta-Lu-La, joined Tinker, and together, the two pint-sized pets pre-

sent a show for the children.

The furry duo waved flags, played basketball and pushed strollers.

Carol Takacs, who runs a trick horse show in Allenton, explained to the students that several hundred years ago, miniature horses were used by nobility as royal pets. As time went on, miniature horses became work animals to work in coal mines.

"They were the perfect size to go into the mines," Carol Takacs said.

Today, miniature horses are fun family pets, she said.

When the show ended, the students presented Tinker with \$489.01 that they collected for the Salvation Army.

"Thank you so much for what you have done in donating to the Salvation Army," Carol Takacs said. "Because of you, many people are going to have a much better holiday season than they ever would have had. Just remember, kids, it's all about giving. We need to take care of each other."

Hunters, Landowners Must Heed Trespass Law

The Wisconsin Farm Bureau Federation wants to make sure hunters and rural landowners are aware of Wisconsin's trespass law for the upcoming deer hunting season.

"Good communication between hunters and rural landowners can help ensure a safe and enjoyable hunting season," said Paul Zimmerman, Farm Bureau's Executive Director of Governmental Relations.

"Wisconsin's trespass law states that you must have permission to hunt on someone's land," Zimmerman explained. "Some people still think that landowners must post a sign to prevent hunting on their land, but that law was changed in 1995. Today, you simply must

have written or verbal permission to hunt on someone's land."

"If landowners are having issues with trespassers, they are to call their county sheriff's office," Zimmerman said. "DNR wardens do not have the authority to investigate trespassing complaints."

Zimmerman also noted that although hunters are required to make a reasonable effort to retrieve game they have killed or injured, hunters may not trespass to retrieve such game.

There are two exceptions to when permission is needed to enter private land:

Land enrolled as 'open' in the Managed Forest Law program; however,

land enrolled in the 'closed' Managed Forest Law program does require permission.

Land considered 'inholdings', which is private land that is surrounded by public land. Landowners must post a sign to prevent hunting by the public on such land. This is primarily found in northern Wisconsin.

"Farmers wish hunters a successful hunting season because they are the best tool we have to manage our state's deer herd," Zimmerman said. "Rural landowners also have property rights that need to be respected. Adherence to the trespass law and open lines of communication will result in a successful hunt for all parties involved."

Kewaskum High School Girls Basketball Kicks Off Season

Ready or not, the Kewaskum High is kicking off the '15-'16 girls basketball season.

With just five practices, plus a scrimmage at Milwaukee University School, coach Russ Thull's Indians played Wednesday, Nov. 18 at Random Lake after opening the season against Ozaukee earlier in the week.

The season opens with five veterans and lots of newcomers and with a major rule change that will be immediately obvious to the fans — that being the fact high school teams are playing two halves this year instead of four quarters which has been the standard since girls basketball began.

And what impact does Thull think the change to two, 18-minute halves (16 for the JV and freshman games) will have on the game?

"One less break and four more minutes," Thull said about the change, adding, "We'll see how it goes. We'll be playing a little deeper that's for sure," and depth is something the Indians should have this season.

Thull is working with a squad of 13, and his first order of business was to find a couple of guards. Gone are Thull's backcourt duo of Marissa Stahl and Maddie Kreis, who scored 211 and 144 points, respectively.

Thull does have three veterans returning. Junior Hailey Herriges, a 5-foot, 8-inch, who finished second on the team in scoring a year ago with 167 points and also contributed 91 rebounds. To help her conditioning for the sport, Herriges went out for cross country this fall and was the number two run-

ner until she was slowed by some tendonitis in her ankle.

One big question early was whether Herriges sufficiently healed from the injury? "She's doing great," Thull said, reporting Herriges took it slow the first couple of days but now, "She's been full go for the last few days of practice, which is good to see."

Also back are letter winners Sammie Wiskirchen, a 5-11 forward, who scored 75 points and 91 rebounds, 5-8 point guard Mikalya Dogs, who scored 59 points and hauled down 29 rebounds and senior Karla Kirst, a 5-1 guard, who played in the team's first six games before suffering an injury.

Thull said there is no question Dogs will have "a bigger role" this year, and others will have to step up offensively because Stahl, Kreis and Erin Matusinec, who also graduated in June, scored two-thirds of the team's points

"Someone who has been surprising this year so far is Kaila Kirst," Thull said, expecting she will see plenty of action.

When it comes to newcomers, Thull said, "We've got eight juniors," indicating Bre Trepes, a star on the KHS fast-pitch team, is out for the sport this year.

"Rachel Holt is definitely going to help us under the basket," Thull said, noting Sydney Rosenthal, Molly Trepes, 5-8, F; Missy Schneider, 5-9, F; Molly Schulties, 5-7, G; Adrienne Adornato, 5-6, G/F; Hailey Herriges, 5-8, F/G; Rachel Holt, 5-10, F

Rosenthal also ran cross country and plays softball, while Schulties and Bauer are excellent soccer players.

In answer to a question of improving on last year's 10-13 mark, Thull said, "I don't set record goals. I tell the girls every day we've got to get better," and if they do that, he

feels records will take care of themselves.

This will be the Lady Indians' first season in the new East Central Conference, and Thull said he did not have the opportunity to see Berlin or Winneconne last season. The Indians did play Ripon twice.

When it comes to picking contenders for this year's title, Thull said, "Waupun, Kettle Moraine Lutheran and Plymouth will be the top three."

Thull was optimistic his girls would do well against Ozaukee and Random Lake. "We had a great first week of practice," he said.

The Indians open EC play on Tuesday, Dec. 1 when they host Ripon, the team that knocked them out of the D-3 regionals a year ago. This year Kewaskum moved up to Division 3 for tournament action. The Indians will be in the same regional with Cedarburg, Grafton, Beaver Dam, the two West Bend schools, Menasha, Plymouth, and Slinger.

Indians Have A Near Monopoly In All-EC Football Voting

Led by its two-way selectees, Sam Fechter and Ben Watzig, and Offensive Player of the Year Brandon Thull, the Kewaskum High football team cleaned house in the recent all-East Central balloting.

Kewaskum, undefeated in league play, dominated the first unit with eight players selected to 10 of the 28 spots.

Fechter was a unanimous first-team choice as an offensive and defensive lineman this year and last year, according to coach Jason Piittmann, who said the six-foot-three, 235 pounder, started all four years and "was a dominant player on the line on both sides of the ball. He and Ben Watzig were key to our rushing attack."

Thull didn't rush for 2,161 yards without some great blockers up front, and Fechter opened many holes for him.

Defensively, Fechter played just six games and wound up with eight solo tackles and eight team tackles (16 total) and two sacks.

Watzig also was unanimous both offensively, and defensively where he stood out from his inside linebacker spot.

"On offense, he and Sam really controlled their side of the line of scrimmage and is where we went most of the time when we needed key yards," Piittmann said.

Defensively, "Ben was all over the place. He flowed from sideline to sideline and filled the gaps very well," Piittmann said. "He likely would have had better stats for tackles and interceptions had he not had his hand clubbed for a few weeks due to having broken bones in it."

Watzig finished ninth in tackles in the conference, with a total of 51, including nine for losses and one forced fumble.

Thull's repeat selection was a no-brainer. He was head and shoulders the best and most exciting running back in the conference, and he has the stats to prove it.

In the seven conference games, Thull rushed for 1,324 yards in 123 carries for a 10.8 yard per carry average and caught three passes for an additional 103 yards. He had 24 touchdowns in the EC and only fumbled twice in league play.

"Brandon is an outstanding football player,"

Piittmann said. "The other coaches in the conference told me that I didn't have to say anything when it came to his nomination, because it was automatic that he was the top running back and offensive player in the league."

The other KHS unanimous picks were senior defensive back Josh Baker and senior linebacker Zach Thull.

Thull led the Eastern Wisconsin Conference in picks a year ago and came up with two this fall.

"Josh was one of the top cornerbacks in the conference, with great coverage skills and being a really good tackler in the open field," Piittmann said of Baker, who was credited with 25 tackles, including 14 solos.

Thull had "an outstanding year," according to Piittmann, who said, "He really took to his role on the defense and did a super job in every facet of it." Thull came up with 26 total tackles, including three for losses, three quarterback sacks and he had one interception.

Kewaskum continued its monopoly at linebacker as Steven Nurkala also made the first team.

"Steven was really good on the strong side of our defense, being stretched by pass coverages and having to fill hard on the run," Piittmann said of the spark plug 200-pound Nurkala, who put some crunching hits on opposing running backs.

Nurkala wound up with 36 tackles, including 18 solos.

Switching to the offense, Kewaskum was a much better team this fall thanks to the development and leadership of senior Michael Prochnow, and the EC coaches voted him as the first team quarterback after he received honorable mention his junior year.

"He really upped his game this year. He provided outstanding leadership, and with his knowledge of the offense he was able to direct a number of things and make some changes to play calls," Piittmann said, adding, "He became a more efficient passer which made our offense have a great passing game in addition to our running threat."

Prochnow led the conference in passing with 975 yards, completing 64 percent of his passes for nine touchdown passes and only three interceptions.

Also honored on the first team was Berat Elmazi, who was picked for a new position, fullback/tight end. Elmazi had no touchdowns, rushed for 43 yards in six carries and gained 118 yards on six receptions.

Piittmann said the EC coaches followed the lead of the state association to add this position because of the way offenses have changed in the last five or 10 years and fullbacks and ends were getting overlooked.

"Berat benefited from that change," Piittmann said, noting he was an excellent blocker for Thull and in pass protection and "was a threat in our screen passing game."

Those receiving second-team acclaim were defensive lineman Jason Hanson, defensive halfback Cole Rahlf and offensive lineman Dalton Espitia.

Piittmann said Hanson "had a great year adopting to defensive end" and was "able to use his long arms to keep blockers at bay."

About Rahlf, the coach said, "He got better and better as the year went on, to where teams really had a tough choice to make as which way they were going to go with their passing game - toward Cole or Josh."

Espitia in his second year as a starter, "really stepped up in his leadership to take control of the tight side of the offensive line. He was a big part of the success of our offense."

Receiving honorable mention were offense — wide receivers Charlie Witek and Nurkala; center Riley Donovan; kicker Cade Peterson; linebacker Patrick Krier; and defensive back Brady Hanson.

***Piittmann received word last week that six of his players were selected to the All-Northeast Region team. They are: Fechter on offense and defense; Watzig and Zach Tull on defense; Brandon Thull as a running back, Nurkala as a utility player and Elmazi on offense.

A total of 20 players received letters at the recent Awards Night, and 13 of those players will be back along with candidates from a good crop of eighth graders. The six seniors included Joey Sanborn, Nate Heniadas, Hayden Koralewski, Noel Bindrich, Christian Bocher and Sean Brockman.

The junior letterwinners are Conner Enright, Cayden Dwyer, Alek Gerhartz, J.J. Heberer, Keaton Flanders, Jakob Hrica, Michael Anderson and Devin Buck, and letters were also given to sophomores Luke Bindrich and Gavin Curtain.

"I had a criteria set up for earning a letter. They had to play the equivalent of three games," Kenworthy said, indicating no one asked about it during the season, which showed him the boys were playing because of their love for the game and not just to win a letter.

"There were 34 times during the season when a player or players missed entire games because of injuries," Kenworthy said about one of the hurdles he had to face. The other was the team lost 10 seniors after the 2014 season.

"We have a lot returning and that's great," Kenworthy said, but, "You've got to work on it (skills). It's not going to be handed to you."

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



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Are You Ready For Winter?



—Time To Remember Your Survival Tips

Governor Scott Walker has declared November 9-13, 2015 as Wisconsin's Winter Awareness Week. The annual campaign, sponsored by Wisconsin Emergency Management (WEM), Wisconsin Department of Transportation (DOT), and the National Weather Service (NWS), reminds us now is the time to get ready before the snow and cold hit.

"Make sure you have an emergency supply kit in your car — it could save your life," says Major General Don Dunbar, Adjutant General and Wisconsin's Homeland Security Advisor. "If you slide off into a ditch and are stranded during a storm, food and other items in your kit could help keep you and your family safe until emergency help arrives."

The emergency vehicle kit should contain items such as flashlight, first aid kit, booster cables, emergency flares, water and snack food along with extra gloves, hats, scarves and blankets. In addition, make sure you have a shovel and a bag of sand or kitty litter to help provide traction if you get stuck.

Every winter in Wisconsin, officials say approximately 45 people

are killed and more than 4,700 are injured in accidents on icy or snow-covered roads. Many of those accidents are caused by driving too fast in winter conditions.

"No matter how many Wisconsin winters you've experienced, the inescapable onslaught of ice, snow, and limited visibility will make driving extremely challenging and at times impossible," says David Pabst, director of the Wisconsin Department of Transportation's Bureau of Transportation Safety. "The posted speed limits, which are set for dry pavement, may be too fast for conditions when roads are snow covered and slippery."

In addition to getting your vehicles winterized and putting together an emergency vehicle supply kit, now is also good time to get your home ready for the cold months ahead. Put together an emergency preparedness kit for your home that contains a three-day supply of non-perishable food and water in case there is no power during a winter storm. Also make sure your flashlights have new batteries and you have a NOAA Weather Radio to receive any emergency alerts.

Driving Tips

- In the last five years, Wisconsin has averaged 18,000 motor vehicle crashes during the winter months when roads are covered with ice, snow or slush.
- On average, 45 people are killed and more than 4,700 injured in Wisconsin each winter season in accidents when roads are covered in ice, snow and slush.
- Many crashes are caused by "driving too fast for current conditions." Also, when the first blast of winter arrives, motorists often need to "re-learn" how to drive in slippery conditions.
- Be gentle with both the accelerator and brake. Don't use cruise control in wintry conditions. Don't be overconfident in your four-wheel drive vehicle. You may get going quicker than others but you can't stop faster. Four-wheel drive vehicles can lose traction as quickly as two wheel drive.
- Always wear your safety belt. You and your passengers absolutely need this protection even in low-speed "fender-bender" crashes that frequently occur on slick roads.
- Leave plenty of room for snowplows. By law,

you must stay back at least 200 feet from the rear of a snowplow.

- Obey the "Move Over" Law, which requires drivers to shift lanes or slow down in order to provide a safety zone for a law enforcement vehicle, tow truck, ambulance, fire truck, highway maintenance vehicle, or utility vehicle that is stopped on the side of a road with its warning lights flashing.
- If your vehicle slides off the road, gets stuck, or becomes disabled, stay inside it if at all possible with your seat belt fastened until a tow truck or other help arrives. If you're inside your vehicle and buckled up, you have protection against out-of-control vehicles. There's no protection outside your vehicle.

Keep A Winter Emergency Kit In Your Vehicle That Includes

- Blankets or sleeping bags
- Extra hats, socks and mittens
- Flashlight with extra batteries
- First-aid kit
- Shovel, booster cables and windshield scraper
- Water and high-calorie non-perishable food (raisins, candy bars, energy/protein bars)
- Sand or cat litter to use

for traction

- Cell phone adapter

911 Tips

- If possible, call 911 on your cell phone. Provide your location, condition of everyone in the vehicle and the problem you're experiencing.
- Follow instructions: you may be told to stay where you are until help arrives.
- Do not hang up until you know who you have spoken with and what will happen next.
- If you must leave the vehicle, write down your name, address, phone number and destination. Place the piece of paper inside the front windshield for someone to see.

Survival Tips

- Be easy to find: Tell someone where you are going and the route you will take.
- If stuck: Tie a florescent flag (from your kit) on your antenna or hang it out the window. At night, keep your dome light on. Rescue crews can see a small glow at a distance. To reduce battery drain, use emergency flashers only if you hear approaching vehicles. If you're with someone else, make sure at least one person is awake and keeping watch for help at all times.
- Stay in your vehicle:

Walking in a storm can be very dangerous. You might become lost or exhausted. Your vehicle is a good shelter.

- Avoid Overexertion: Shoveling snow or pushing your car takes a lot of effort in storm conditions. Don't risk a heart attack or injury. That work can also make you hot and sweaty. Wet clothing loses insulation value, making you susceptible to hypothermia.
- Fresh Air: It's better to be cold and awake than comfortably warm and sleepy. Snow can plug your vehicle's exhaust system and cause deadly carbon monoxide gas to enter your car. Only run the engine for 10 minutes an hour and make sure the exhaust pipe is free of snow. Keeping a window open a crack while running the engine is also a good idea.

It is also important to check and winterize your vehicles before the winter season begins.

Make sure your car's battery is in good shape — cold temperatures can reduce the effectiveness of a battery by 50 percent.

Make sure your tires are suitable for winter driving conditions.

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Kewaskum School District Improves Debt To Equity Ratio

The Kewaskum School District is in better shape with its debt to equity ratio than it was last year, according to an audit presented to the school board on Nov. 9.

"When it comes to the debt ratio, I would say there is significant improvement over last year," said Carrie Gindt of Reilly, Penner, Benton LLP, the firm that performed the audit.

At the end of 2014, the debt to equity ratio was \$1 to \$1, where basically every dollar that the school district had available, it owed a dollar, Gindt said.

In contrast, this year that ratio was 66 cents, said

Julie Thoreson, business manager for the Kewaskum School District. That means that for every dollar of available resources, the district owed 66 cents.

The reduction of 34 percent on the debt to equity ratio was mainly due to the reducing debt and the decrease in short-term borrowing, Thoreson said.

During the 2014-2015 academic year, the school district's revenues came in at \$20,780,157, or 99.06 percent of the budgeted

\$20,584,938. In contrast, expenditures were \$20,780,157, just 97.06 percent of the \$20,169,290 that had been budgeted, Thoreson said.

The cost per pupil went down from \$10,650 in 2014 to \$10,627 in 2015.

The total levy for the district this year is \$11,122,982, up from \$11,037,896 last year. Still, the total levy this year is lower than the \$11,750,048 that was levied in 2013-14.
