Village Of Kewaskum Approves Special Event Permit

– Party On The Pavement Is Only Annual Event Affected By New Ordinance

After months of discussion about requiring a permit for special events, the Kewaskum Village Board on December 14 approved an ordinance that requires a permit for events that serve alcohol, occur after 6 p.m. and have at least 200 people present.

The permit allows the village to be reimbursed for any village personnel, services, equipment and facilities provided for that special event. Under the ordinance, the village will recoup the wages and overtime costs associated with having a police presence at the event.

Special events include activities that occur on public property that affect the ordinary use of public streets, rights-of-way or sidewalks.

Funerals, school events and events sponsored by the village or a village

agency are exempt from the new ordinance.

The only happening that occurred in 2015 that would have required a special event permit under the new ordinance was Party on the Pavement, which is sponsored by the Kewaskum Area Chamber of Commerce.

The Chamber of Commerce agreed to reimburse the village for the cost of having an officer at Party on the Pavement, even if the ordinance was not in place, Kewaskum Police Chief Thomas Bishop said.

However, board members decided that it would be best for the time being if an ordinance was in place in case another group decides to hold a similar event.

Farmington Town Board Wants Different Assessor

The Farmington Town Board decided not to sign a contract with Accurate Appraisal LLC because it learned that the four-year agreement that was offered was illegal.

Instead, the town board will seek advice from the town's attorney to find out how it can move forward to go with a different company to provide the town's assessments.

"I hear a lot of things from a lot of different places that Accurate Assessment is just not good," Town Board Chairman Chris Elbe said. "It is my opinion that whatever the cost, and I don't have those numbers right now, but Accurate Appraisal is not someone that the Town of Farmington wants to do business with long term."

On November 10, the

town board had voted to continue using Accurate Appraisal LLC to provide the town's assessments. At that time, board members agreed to sign a four-year contract with Accurate Appraisal at a cost of \$14,500 a year, which would include a market revaluation during one of those years and regular maintenance the other three years.

However, when the Wisconsin Department of Revenue found out that the town was preparing to enter into a four-year contract with Accurate Appraisal, the state waved a warning flag. It is against state statute to have a contract with an appraisal firm for longer than three years.

"It's hard for me to understand that Accurate would offer a four-year contract because it is not even legal to have a four-

year contract with an assessor," Elbe said.

The state Department of Revenue sent a letter to the town outlining the three-year rule.

"Reality is that this letter was addressed to the company, and they have not reached out to us whatsoever. I would have thought that they would have contacted us," Town Clerk Chris Schellinger said.

On November 10, the town board questioned whether Accurate Appraisal LLC had correctly classified all of the properties. When a property is inaccurately assessed, other property owners in the township make up for the lost revenue.

Energy And The Free Market

There is an issue in the mid-section of the 59th Assembly District, through the Eden and Mt. Calvary area, that has been causing consternation for many constituents over the past few weeks. The topic relates to wind energy and my philosophy regarding government subsidies. This must be addressed.

Last fall, while I was running for office, I made it perfectly clear that I believe in the free market, devoid of government intervention. This included minimum wage and energy subsidies. My personal belief is that we all suffer when the government intrudes where it does not belong by falsely manipulating the marketplace.

Do I appreciate windmills dotting the skyline? You can most assuredly ask my family when we roll into the Town of Marshfield or drive down Highway 33 in Dodge County that the answer is a resounding "no."

That being said, if the market supports them as a viable source of energy, then by all means, let's consider using them. I

have no problem with private energy companies working closely with energy consumers to erect windmills, bio-digesters or solar panels on their land, but that must not be at the expense of the taxpayers or cause any risk to the utility's neighbors. Unfortunately, this is not what has been occurring. In 2013, according to the federal Energy Information Administration (EIA), government subsidies per megawatt hour for coal and natural gas were well under \$1; nuclear was \$2.10, wind \$35.33 and solar a whopping \$231.22!

It is no wonder that politicians have sold out their constituents when they have a personal and financial conflict of interest regarding renewable energy. This may be hard to believe, but because of the federal crackdown on coal, rather than improving and upgrading existing coal plants, Wisconsin power companies have been shuttering them so that we can purchase more renewables from other states and Canada.

What is even more dis-

concerting is that the generators used in those power plants are being dismantled and shipped to China so that they can install them in their own, less ecologically friendly power plants. This will allow China to produce cheaper energy than Wisconsin and the rest of the U.S. so that they can slash costs and compete directly with Wisconsin manufacturers and hard-working Wisconsin laborers. If President Obama's philosophy is to level the playing field worldwide, then he is doing one outstanding job of dismantling the nation piece by piece.

In summary, I believe wholeheartedly that if the energy source cannot stand on its own and if it is not an efficient and economical source of power, then we should not be using it. At the same time, we should not let Washington dictate the types of energy that we as a state are required to utilize in our homes and places of employment.

Avoid These Holiday Scams

Santa isn't the only one keeping track of who is naughty and who is nice! Better Business Bureau is warning consumers to beware of these common holiday scams:

Look-alike websites: When shopping online, make sure to use only legitimate websites. Watch out for URLs that use the names of well-known brands along with extra words.

Fake shipping notifications: These can have

attachments or links to sites that will download malware on your computer to steal your identity and your passwords. Don't be fooled by a holiday phishing scam.

E-cards: Electronic cards can be great fun, but be careful. Two red flags to watch out for are: the sender's name is not apparent; you are required to share additional information to get the card.

Letters from Santa: Several trusted companies offer charming and personalized letters from Santa, but scammers mimic them to get personal information from unsuspecting parents. Check with bbb.org to find out which ones are legitimate.

Grandparents scam: Seniors should be cautious if they get a call from a grandchild claiming to be in an accident, arrested or hospitalized while traveling in another country. Never send money unless you confirm with another family member that it's true.

Phony charities: Everyone is in a generous mood at the holidays, so scammers take advantage of that with fake charity solicitations in email, on

social media sites, and even by text. Check out charities at give.org before donating.

Temporary holiday jobs: Retailers and delivery services need extra help at the holidays, but beware of solicitations that require you to share personal information online or pay for a job lead. Apply in person or go to retailers' main websites to find out who is hiring.

Unusual forms of payment: Be wary of anyone who asks you to pay for holiday purchases using prepaid debit cards, gift cards, wire transfers, third parties, etc. These payments cannot be traced and cannot be undone. Use a credit card on a secure website; look for https in the address (the extra "s" is for "secure") and the lock symbol.

Free gift cards: Pop-up ads or email offering free gift cards are often just a ploy to get your personal information that can later be used for identity theft.

Social media gift exchange: It sounds like a great deal; buy one gift and get 36 in return. But it's just a variation on a pyramid scheme and it's illegal.

Washington County And City Of West Bend Collaborate On Ridge Run Park Transfer

Ridge Run County Park ownership is scheduled to be transferred to the City of West Bend on Monday, Jan. 4.

Ridge Run was the original park in the Washington County Park System after land was purchased from the Pick family in 1965. Washington County park staff have cared for, improved and maintained this land for the past 50 years.

Jay Shambeau,

Washington County Planning & Parks Administrator, recently stated, "Our county park employees have invested a lot of time, energy and passion in Ridge Run over the years. We take comfort in knowing that the City of West Bend is equally committed to and has a great track record of quality park maintenance."

Ridge Run Park was part of a multifaceted intergovernmental agreement approved by both

municipalities earlier this year. The designations of "Ridge Run" and "Rettler Recreation Area" will remain.

Also, the issue of allowing dogs on a leash has been recently resolved with the Common Council's approval which will be reviewed within one year. All six shelters located within Ridge Run Park will continue to be available to rent through the City of West Bend beginning on January 4th.

Craig Hoepfner, West Bend park, recreation and forestry director, expressed his appreciation to the county staff for their help in making this a very smooth transition for our staff. 



A postcard of the view looking north in Wayne dates back to around the 1890s.





So how did they do it? They were able to do it because they had a rock-solid faith and they sacrificed!



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Clergy, Schools And Village Band Together To Offer Winter Coat Drive

Winter coats, hats and gloves were piled high in the Kewaskum Middle School cafeteria on December 8 for a coat exchange organized by the Clergy Coalition for Coats.

In all, more than 170 coats for men, women and children were collected. The compilation of winter gear also included 13

The collection was a result of a Clergy Coalition meeting between area clergy and representatives from the Kewaskum School District and the Village of Kewaskum.

"Through the meeting we had on November 10, it kind of came out of the

conversations that we have a need for hats, coats, mittens and gloves, especially for our middle and high school students," Kewaskum Schools Superintendent James Smasal said.

The goal was to provide a coat exchange so that parents could turn in their child's outgrown winter coat and exchange it for a larger size. In addition, any child, teen or adult

who was in need was able to pick up a coat at the event.

Community members donated many of the gently used coats, hats and mittens. The winter wear was collected at Holy Trinity Church, Kettlebrook Church, Kewaskum Schools, Kewaskum Village Hall, New Horizon Church, Peace United Church, St. Lucas Church and St. Michael's Church.

The Clergy Coalition meets quarterly throughout the year.

"The focus is helping our youth in this community. The whole emphasis is to find what we can partner together to do to help our children. And is there is a message that we can both be sending at the same time so they hear it on Sunday morning and

Tuesday afternoon from different folks, but the same message. And so we are always trying ways to help each other out," Smasal said.

"It's really cool watching them work together," said Julie Thoreson, business manager for the Kewaskum School District.

Kewaskum Native Named Sailor Of The Quarter

A Kewaskum native, Petty Officer First Class Shane Harlacher, was named Sailor of the Quarter.

Harlacher, 29, is currently serving in the U.S. Navy with Carrier Strike Group 4 on Naval Station Norfolk in Norfolk, Va.

Carrier Strike Group 4 is a team of experienced sailors, Marines, government civilians and reservists, who mentor, train and assess Atlantic Fleet combat forces to forward deploy in support and defense of national interests.

"Petty Officer Harlacher is doing a lot of really good things and is extremely humble," said Lt. Commander Patrick Evans, the public affairs officer for Carrier Strike Group 4.

Carrier Strike Group 4 is made up of experts who shape the readiness of Atlantic Fleet Carrier Strike Groups, Expeditionary Strike Groups, Amphibious Readiness Groups and Independent Deploying ships through live, at sea and synthetic training, as well as through academic instruction.

That is Harlacher's favorite part of his job.

"I get to train and certify the people that are actually going out and doing the job, so it's enjoyable for me. I like teaching and training," Harlacher said.

In fact, Harlacher enjoys that aspect of the job so much that he is currently working toward an education degree from Ashford University. He hopes to one day teach middle school science.

"I'm not sure if I will transition directly from the military to teaching, but that is the eventual goal," Harlacher said.

Harlacher moved to Kewaskum when he was in eighth grade and attended Kewaskum Middle School. He joined the U.S. Navy shortly after he graduated from

Kewaskum High School in 2004.

Harlacher went through boot camp at the Great Lakes Navy Training Center in Illinois. From there, he was assigned to the USS Monterey (CG-61) until 2010.

He then went through training and was transferred to Norfolk, Va.

The most difficult part of being in the military for Harlacher is being separated from his family. His two children, 8-year-old twins Micah and Shaylee Harlacher, also are learning to cope when Harlacher goes to sea.

Harlacher is deployed two to three times a year for about a month at a time. When he was stationed on the ship, he was deployed more frequently, he said.

Harlacher makes it back to Wisconsin about once a year to visit his mother and stepfather, Julie and Ralph Lohse, who live in West Bend.

"My mom does like to come and visit, especially if it's cold there. She likes

to come out where it's a little warmer," Harlacher said.

Harlacher was one of five first class petty officers nominated for Sailor of the Quarter. There are a total of 17 first class petty officers in his command. Four of the people at the command are from Wisconsin.

Carrier Strike Group 4 recommends readiness certification to U.S. Fleet Forces Command / CTF 80 and the Commanding General, Second Marine Expeditionary Force (II MEF). The group serves as the immediate supervisor in command and has administrative control over Tactical Training Group Atlantic and Expeditionary Warfare Training Group Atlantic.

Harlacher's command mentors, trains and assesses Atlantic Fleet combat forces to forward deploy. The organization also encourages the personal and professional development of its sailors, Marines and civilians with in the command.

Farmington Town Board Wants Different Assessor

In October, the town board became aware of a property that had been taxed as agricultural land rather than residential. That property had been taxed at \$14 or \$17 a year while other town residents paid more than \$1,000 for similar properties, Town Supervisor Duane Wollner said at the November meeting.

Jim Danielson, who represented Accurate Appraisal at the November town board meeting, voluntarily relinquished his assessor's license on November 1 after being involved in a similar situation in Germantown.

Danielson had not accurately classified agricultural and underdeveloped properties, according to said Stephanie Marquis, spokesperson for the

Wisconsin Department of Revenue. The state found that Danielson had not been performing uniform assessments, validating sales or reviewing classifications annually, Marquis said.

While Danielson is in the relinquishment period, he can continue day-to-day operations at Accurate Appraisal, but cannot sign a roll book.

"The state Department of Revenue has never suspended a license for any appraiser in the state other than one of the owners of Accurate Appraisals," Elbe said.

Elbe said that he recently learned about a town in Kenosha County that had to re-negotiate with an appraiser because Accurate Appraisal did not complete its work for the town.

"It is just not a good situation," Elbe said.

The Farmington Town Board received bids from three different appraisal agencies. Two of the three bids included four-year terms.

Associated Appraisal Consultants, Inc., also offered a four-year contract at the November town board meeting.

"It is strange that two of the three would have had a four-year contract when it's not even a possibility to have a four-year contract," Wollner said.

Elbe apologized at the December 8 meeting for not taking time to review the proposals prior to the board's November meeting.

Farmington has a contract with Accurate Appraisal LLC through the end of this year.

With 27 participants, Kewaskum had the most donors of the three school districts. In total, Kewaskum raised \$535.

The West Bend School District raised the most, with 25 participants raising \$1,223.22. Slinger had 22 participants and raised \$440.

"West Bend High School Tech Ed teacher Mike Bentdahl raised \$349.22 and allowed his classes to decide what type of groomed beard he should have....Mike is now sporting a very Amish beard, but has not traded in his car for a horse and buggy," said Amy Swanson Kieser, public relations coordinator for the West Bend School District.

To participate in "Manvember," students paid a \$10 registration fee while staff and community members had a \$20 registration fee. Participants then collected additional pledges.

Panthers Top Kewaskum On A Second-Half Run

The Kewaskum boys basketball team threw a scare in host Plymouth last Tuesday night, but after leading for all but five minutes of the first half, the Indians were unable to keep the pace, losing 67-54 in the East Central opener for both clubs.

"I thought the guys played really well," KHS coach Don Gruber said, noting the Indians showed good mental toughness, which is something he stressed to them in his pre-game message.

Deadeye Sam Schlosser hit three long-range threes in the opening 18:00 when the Indians were up from five to seven points until Gage Nischke gave the Panthers their first lead (18-16) on a three-point basket. After that, the two teams exchanged lead and were tied at 22 before winding up deadlocked at 26-26 as the first-half buzzer sounded.

It was definitely a good half of basketball for Kewaskum, and from all indications early in the second half, it looked like the Indians were going to stay right with Plymouth.

After the Panthers took a 30-26 lead, Kewaskum came back with back-to-back buckets by Charlie Witek and Schlosser to tie the game, and the score was also tied at 34-all and at 36 with 11 and a half minutes remaining.

Here's where the undefeated Panthers began to slowly pull away, using quickness at the guard spot and good passing to take off on a 14-2 run within a matter of two minutes.

Kewaskum managed

just two free throws by Witek during that stretch while Will Hunter hit two free throws, Nischke had a 3-point play, Cody Kuhn had a successful drive to the basket, Tyler Moegenberger hit an open three and Derek Schweiger powered his way inside for a layup to a 50-36 advantage.

The rest of the way, the closest the Indians got was within 10 points twice, at 50-40 and 54-44.

"I'm glad the guys didn't give up," Gruber said. "I thought it was a good stepping stone for us."

There was no question depth played a role in the outcome as Plymouth coach Tim Schultz had the luxury of shuffling in 10-12 players while Gruber's options were a bit more limited. Witek, Schlosser, Michael Prochnow and Brady Hanson barely came out of the game, and perhaps they tired a bit after battling so hard in the first half.

In the past, Hanson has had difficulty with foul trouble early, but this time he stayed on the floor and showed what a force he can be on both ends of the court. Hanson scored eight points in the first half and exploded for 13 after the break, hitting one-three pointer, driving hard to the basket and rebounding with authority. He had a team high 21 points.

"That was a great game for Brady. What I liked about Brady is he let the game come to him," Gruber said of the six-foot, six-inch junior, who chipped in with three assists.

Witek, who is drawing a great deal of defensive attention this year

because of his junior statistics, wound up with 15 points, while Schlosser ended with 11 and had probably double that number in bruises as he was knocked to the floor on several occasions in what could be described as a very physical game.

Prochnow quietly scored seven points, while leading the team in rebounding and chipping in with five big assists. "For the game, we had 13 assists," Gruber said. "I'd like that figure to be a little higher."

Kewaskum shot 54 percent on two-point attempts and 35 percent (5x14) on three-pointers, which indicated to Gruber the Indians were working the ball around and taking good shots.

"The thing that killed us was we had 26 turnovers," the coach said, reporting he counts charges as turnovers, and Kewaskum was called for four or five of them, some on the questionable side.

Plymouth (1-0, 3-0) got big games from two of its juniors. Kuhn popped in a game-high 23 points while Alex Shutter added 16. Next high was Nischke with eight. The Panthers hit 20x23 free throws for a sizzling 87 percent.

Taking advantage of Berlin's overall lack of height and getting Hailey Herriges back in the lineup were two keys in Kewaskum's convincing 55-35 victory over the (other) Indians in the December 10 matchup.

Kewaskum scored 27 points in the first half and didn't let up in the second, cruising to the win.

"We played our best game of the year in terms of execution," KHS coach Russ Thull said afterward about his team's first victory in the new East Central Conference. With the win, the Indians moved to 1-1 in conference action and 3-3 overall.

Berlin has one very talented player in Julia Silloway, who has been averaging 18.5 points per game, and it was an easy decision for Thull to have Herriges guarding her.

"Hailey Herriges matched up on her and played a great game," Thull said, understandably excited to have her back after hitting her head on the floor in the game against Ripon.

Point guard Mikayla Dogs also chipped in with 14, and Herriges added an even dozen. The Indians shot very well in this game, hitting 19 of 33 shots for a sizzling 57 percent clip, the same mark they had at the free throw line, while converting on 11x19.

Dogs and Herriges were solid," Thull said, referring to the fact the two had four and five assists, respectively, while Herriges and Holt led the team in rebounds with 10 and eight.

Thull also got good efforts from Sammie Brown and Molly Schulties off the bench, which was very important.

"(I am) very excited

about the different girls that are stepping up," Thull said. "We have a fun team that has great team attitudes. We will continue to get better."

One area of concern had been handling the press, but Thull said improvement was made in that department, too. "We still had 10 turnovers, but I felt like we ball faked more, and our turnovers didn't hurt us as much as in previous games."

On Friday night, the Indians will host Plymouth in another EC battle.

With his win, Bauer improved to 7-0 on the season, while Deheck is 6-1.


The Indians' other wins came at 138 where Zach Heberer improved to 5-2 with a pin over David Flynn and at 152 where Danny Seitz opened the

Despite Free Throw Woes, Indians Notch First EC Victory

There certainly were some anxious moments for the Kewaskum boys basketball team in Friday's game against visiting Winneconne. "The toughest games to win are the conference games, and this was no different. It went down to the wire," Gruber said. "I think it (the win) helped the players develop some mental toughness."

The Indians missed nine of 10 free throws in the final three minutes but still held on to win the game 52-49. It was their first in East Central play.

"We were up by eight at half," coach Don Gruber said, reporting the Wolves came back to make the game close the final four minutes.

The 1-2 scoring punch of Charlie Witek and Brady Hanson was more than the Wolves could overcome. "When Charlie hit the second free throw to go up by three, I felt we were in good position," Gruber said. Witek poured in a game-high 25 points while Hanson contributed 16 points.

Only four Kewaskum players scored in this game. Michael Prochnow and Sam Schlosser chipped in with seven and

four points, respectively, as the Indians improved to 1-1 in the EC and 2-3 overall.

"I think everyone played good offensive basketball," Gruber said, adding, "Charlie was the recipient of some great passes from his teammates," and he repaid the favor with good passes, including one to Michael Prochnow in the corner, which resulted in a three. Once again, Prochnow was a force on the boards, hauling down a team-high seven.

Winneconne was led by Scott Kramer, who had 22 points.

The Indians have three games before the Christmas break, and all three are at home, starting with tonight's game against high-scoring Waupun, which is 2-0 in conference action. About the contest with Waupun, Gruber said, "Waupun is a conference contender, and we will need to be able to handle three or four defenses they will throw at us." Other keys will be keeping the turnover total under 15 and keeping the Warriors' rebounders in check. The Indians host St. Mary's Springs at 2 p.m. on Saturday and then host random Lake on December 22.

Organizations must apply for the special event permit 45 days before the event takes place. They must have proof of liability insurance and will be required to submit a \$200 daily cleaning/damage deposit two weeks prior to the event.

"We will revisit it next year if it isn't working," Village Board President Kevin Scheunemann said.

A village police pres-

ence, as opposed to auxiliary police, is generally needed at large events that serve alcohol in the evening, Bishop said.

"We don't seem to have a lot of issues during the day. Usually it's the late night people who have been drinking for quite a while," Bishop said.

Other events will not need a special event permit.

Any event that serves

beer or alcohol requires a picnic license, which costs \$10.

Annual events that are routinely held in Kewaskum that require a picnic license but not a special event permit include Social Fest, Early Farm Days, Car Show, Fireworks Band, Music in the Park, Water Fights, Mike Farchione, Porkchop Dinner, Soup Sampler and Murder Mystery Dinner.
