## Kewaskum Middle School Students To Present "Peter Pan"

Twin sisters Madison and Taylor Brezinski get along well with each other.

But for Kewaskum Middle School's production of "Peter Pan," the two are pulling out their acting skills to play arch rivals Peter Pan and Captain Hook.

"It's really cool," said Madison, who portrays Peter Pan.

"And exciting," Taylor added.

As the two talked about the show, they finished each other's sentences, as if they were finishing each other's lines. The camaraderie has helped them rehearse for shows since they were in third grade.

"They are very talented girls," Director Nick Brettingen said.

The two are excited about the opportunity to act together.

"It's super great...It's so cool. I always watched Peter Pan growing up, and I never would have predicted I was going to be Peter Pan," Madison said.

"I never would have guessed I was going to be Hook," Taylor said. "It's a really great show, and I hope many people get to come see it as they can."

The show will be presented on Friday, Feb. 19, at 7 p.m.; Saturday, Feb. 20, at 7 p.m.; and Sunday, Feb. 21, at 2 p.m. in the Kewaskum High School theater. Tickets are available at Geidel's Piggly Wiggly or at the door and cost \$10 for adults and \$5 for ages 12 and younger.

The play is based on the classic tale by Scottish novelist and playwright J. M. Barrie, and follows the traditional production format.

Peter Pan is often played by a girl in productions, but the middle school is doing things slightly out of the ordinary by having a girl portray Hook as well.

"And we named her a little different. She's actually

named after my wife, Capt. Jamie L. Hook," Brettingen said.

Students from Kewaskum High School's Drama Club help direct the play and serve on the show's stage crew.

"I've been with Mr. Brettingen probably since I was in fourth grade, and I've always been up there acting, so I'm finally seeing the other side of it, and I'm directing for once. It's different, but I think I've learned a lot from being with it for so long, so I'm prepared for what I'm doing," assistant director Brandon Fischer said.

It has been rewarding, Brandon said.

"I think it's awesome to put your ideas in, and watching your ideas happen," he said.

Alex Verdien, a senior who is co-directing the show, said that the middle school students follow directions well.

"I like watching them learn. You give them notes and they take what you tell them and they listen and they learn," she said.

Last week, the stage crew was working on developing the show's special effects.

"We are doing something that not a lot of people have done before. It's a lot of new things. So I think it's very interesting. It's good. We are doing a lot of spotlight stuff and we are doing a lot of sound effects. The transitions are all going to look very nice," Kewaskum High School student Austin Fischer said.

Because the theater is not capable of creating flight for any of the actors, the stage crew is toying with the idea of a trampoline to create the illusion of flight, said Brettingen, who heads up the high school drama club as well as teaches seventh- and eighth-grade language arts.

## WE Energies Replaces Electrical Poles And Lines In Area

For the next several months, WE Energies will conduct work on electric lines and poles on State Road 28 east of Kewaskum.

WE Energies workers are replacing about 11 miles of overhead electrical lines along Highway 28 in the Kewaskum and Farmington areas. Some of the poles are being replaced, as well as some underground cable, according to Cathy Schulze, spokesperson with WE Energies.

"It's a system improvement project that we are doing in the area. It's basically upgrading our infrastructure," Schulze said.

Some of the poles and wires date back a few decades, so routine work is being done to upgrade the electric company's infrastructure.

Typically, workers first set up new poles. Next, they will string new wire to

the new poles. Finally, they will take down the old lines and poles after the new ones are up and working.

The company's timetable projects that

work should wrap up sometime in May, Schulze said.

"It's normal system improvement work that we are doing, and of course, the effort is to continue

providing the reliable service that our customers that have come to know and expect from us. That's what the goal is," Schulze said.

## Weekly HEALTH TIP

### EAT A HEART-HEALTHY DIET

A heart-healthy diet may lower the risk of heart attack or stroke by 30% by reducing cardiovascular risk factors, according to a new British study. Half the randomized group of men and women ages 40-70 were told to follow basic British dietary guidelines (similar to those in the US): eat more fruits and vegetables, fatty fish, whole grains and nuts, and less salt, saturated fat and added sugars. The other half of the group just ate a traditional diet. After three months, the healthy diet group reduced bad cholesterol and triglycerides by 10%, systolic blood pressure (top number) by 4 points, waist size by ½ inch and weight by 3 lbs. compared to the control group.

## Kewaskum Schools To Hold Driven To Better Health Night

The Kewaskum School District will host its second annual Driven to Better Health Night on Thursday, March 10, from 5:30 to 8:30 p.m.

The event includes a Wellness Fair from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m., a cooking competition 5:30 p.m., judging and tasting at 6:30 p.m., and half-court shot and raffles at 7:30 p.m.

The purpose of the event is to: continue the message of health and wellness, keep the schools' garden growing; and to provide a chance to win a visit from Donald Driver.

One of Kewaskum School District's ongoing goals is to create a culture of health and wellness within its district, for both students and staff. The district also builds relations with organizations within the Kewaskum Community, such as Best yoU Food Force (BUFF) and Piggly Wiggly, to work together to continue that message of health and wellness.

Some of the initiatives the school district is a part of already is Fuel Up To Play 60 (FUTP60), which is an in-school nutrition and physical activity program launched by National Dairy Council (NDC) and National Football League, in collaboration with the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA). Through FUTP60, the schools have held tastings of fruits, vegetables, dairy products and whole grains. The schools have also held pre-class runs, brain breaks throughout the day, and the 100 mile club.

Another initiative the school district has is its School Garden. The garden is planted, maintained, and harvested by Kewaskum Elementary School fourth-grade class, Kewaskum Middle School Garden Club and the Boys and Girls Club. All the veggies harvested are then utilized in the Kewaskum School District Nutrition Services. Nutrition Services offers taste testing of these veggies and also has garden bars at Kewaskum High School and Kewaskum Middle School. The consumption of fruits and vegetables are on the rise due to this great initiative.

Kewaskum Schools have a Veggie of the Month program through Nutrition Services. The first week of the month, there is a taste testing held for that vegetable.

After everyone has had a chance to sample, the vegetable is placed on the menu every week for the rest of the month. The Veggie of the Month is also featured at the local Piggly Wiggly. A recipe utilizing the vegetable is offered to help parents know how to store, clean, and prepare that particular vegetable.

During the Driven to Better Health Night, there will be a cooking competition featuring the Veggie of the Month: spinach. There are five student teams and two adult teams that will create their best spinach recipe. Their recipe will be judged by a group of individuals, and the winning recipe will be placed on the lunch menu at school and also offered at the local Piggly Wiggly's deli department.

The community will be able to watch as these spinach recipes are prepared and judged. At the end, they will get to try these recipes and place their vote for the best recipe. This winner will receive the People's Choice Award.

Along with the cook-off, a wellness fair will be held in the gym to get families active and eating healthy. The focus will be 543218 - five servings of Fruits and Vegetables, four glasses of water, three servings of dairy, two or less hours of screen time, one hour of physical activity and eight hours of sleep. There will be obstacle courses set up by the FUTP60 elementary school student ambassadors, stations from Finish Line Training, infused water stations, smoothie stations, information about sleep, a massage chair, Isogenix and more.

The other part of the night will include a raffle to raise money to "Keep Our Garden Growing." The schools have run out of funding to keep the complete education of the garden going. The Middle School FACE Class, KES fourth-grade class, the Garden Club, and Boys and Girls Club get hands-on experience with planting a garden, learn the education behind it and go on field trips to Wellspring Organic Farms. These activities help students appreciate and understand where their food comes from.

A half-court shot challenge will be held at the end of the evening, and the night will conclude with raffle drawings.

# After A Slow Start, Flu Cases Are Increasing In Wisconsin

– Health Officials Say It's Not Too Late To Get A Flu Vaccine

The influenza season got off to a slow start in Wisconsin in 2015, but officials with the Department of Health Services (DHS) have noticed an increase in cases in the first weeks of 2016, and want to remind state residents that it's not too late to get a flu vaccine and take other actions to avoid illness.

"We suspect with the late start of the season some people may have delayed getting vaccinated against the flu, but with cases on the rise, it's very important to get vaccinated now," said State Health Officer Karen McKeown. "This is important for everyone, including young and middle-aged adults, since health officials nationwide are reporting severe respiratory illness-

es and even deaths among this age group."

The flu vaccine is safe and effective for everyone 6 months old and older, and is especially important for people who are 65 years old and older, young children, pregnant women, and people with chronic health conditions such as heart disease and diabetes.

Health officials also encourage people who feel they may be getting the flu to contact their health care provider regarding the need for an anti-viral medication. Anti-viral medication is most effective if taken within 48 hours of the first signs of symptoms.

In addition to the vaccine, here are some steps we can all take to avoid illness:

-Wash hands often with soap and water, or use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer.

-Cover a cough or sneeze with your upper sleeve, and try to avoid touching your face with your hand. If you use a tissue, throw it away after one use.

-Use your own drinking cups and straws.

-Avoid being exposed to people who are sick with flu-like symptoms.

-Eat nutritious meals, get plenty of rest, and do not smoke.

-Frequently clean commonly touched surfaces, such as doorknobs, refrigerator handle, telephone and faucets.

-If you're sick, stay home, get rest, drink plenty of liquids, and avoid using alcohol and tobacco.



Recently, the Washington County Sheriff's Office has taken calls from citizens who say they have received suspicious calls from people claiming to be the IRS.

During this call, the suspect tells the victim that money is owed to the IRS for back taxes and pay-

ment must be made immediately or risk being jailed.

These are false claims made by scammers. The IRS will not call citizens informing them that money is owed for back taxes. If you received a call from such a person, hang up and don't speak to them. Remember, the IRS will not call you about a tax issue. Do not give out per-

sonal identification to these callers.

Also, recently there have been a few cases where victims receive a call from persons that claim that their grandchild was involved in an accident and are now in trouble unless money is sent immediately.


Do not send anyone money that tells you this on a phone. The majority of the time, these scammers prey on older residents that believe they are doing the right thing for their loved ones.

## 135 Private Schools Register For Wisconsin Parental Choice Program

One-hundred-thirty-five private nonsectarian and religious schools and school systems registered with the Department of Public Instruction by the January 10 deadline to accept students for the 2016-2017 school year through the Wisconsin Parental Choice Program (WPCP).

Twenty-three schools that previously participated in either the Milwaukee or Racine Parental Choice programs or both are registering to join the WPCP for the first time in 2016-2017. In addition, there are 31 new private schools applying to participate in the statewide voucher program.

The WPCP allows students who reside outside of the Milwaukee and Racine Unified school districts to use a taxpayer-funded subsidy to attend participating private or religious schools. To qualify for the program in the 2016-2017 school year, a new student must have a family income equal to or less than 185 percent of the federal poverty level, which is \$45,263 for a family of four or \$52,263 if the child's parents or guardians are married.

In addition, all students applying for the WPCP must meet one of the following attendance requirements for 2016-2017: (1) have attended a public school in Wisconsin in the prior school year; (2) not have been enrolled in school in the prior school year; (3) applying to attend kindergarten, first, or ninth grades for the coming school year; or (4) participated in the WPCP or Racine Parental Choice Program (RCP) in the 2015-2016 school year.

Eligible students in grades kindergarten through eight may attend the private school with no charge for tuition. Eligible students continuing in grades nine through 12 may be charged tuition if their family income exceeds 220 percent of the federal poverty level (\$53,826 for a family of

four or \$60,826 if the child's parents or guardians are married).

The private school, on behalf of each student's parent or guardian, under current law, receives a state aid payment for each eligible choice student. The amount of the voucher for 2016-2017 is estimated to be \$7,323 (for pupils in grades K-8) or \$7,969 (for pupils in grades 9-12).

A private choice school is not required to provide transportation to choice students. According to state law, the resident public school district may be required to provide transportation under certain circumstances. More information is available at <http://dpi.wi.gov/sms/trans> portation.

Parents who wish to enroll their children in a private or religious school participating in the statewide voucher program for the 2016-2017 school year must complete the online application between February 1 and April 20, 2016, on the following web site: <http://dpi.wi.gov/SMS/choice-programs/student-applications>. After completing the online application, parents must provide residency and income (if applicable) documentation to the school(s) they apply to before the close of the application period at 4 p.m. on April 20.

A change to state law in 2015 eliminated the previous WPCP cap of 1,000 full-time equivalent (FTE) students. Enrollment in the WPCP voucher program in 2016-2017 remains limited to one percent of a given school district's student population. The 2015-2017 state budget (2015 Wisconsin Act 55) changed the manner in which the WPCP is funded. Students who participated in the program prior to the 2015-2016 school year will continue to be fully funded from state general purpose revenue.

Pupils who begin attending a private school under the WPCP in the

2015-2016 school year and thereafter are funded with a reduction to each public school district's state general aid. If the public school district does not receive an equalization aid payment sufficient to cover the aid reduction, the balance would be reduced from other state aid received by the district.

Incoming pupils in the WPCP are included in the resident public school district's membership for state general aid purposes, but the resident district may not levy to backfill the aid reduction. School districts will receive an annual adjustment equivalent to the number of resident choice pupils for revenue limit purposes.

For the current school year's third Friday in September enrollment count, the statewide voucher program had 2,514 students (2,472.5 FTE). The WPCP began in the 2013-2014 school year. Taxpayer costs for the 2014-2015 school year were \$7.3 million. Since inception and through last school year, payments to private and religious schools in Wisconsin for the statewide voucher program total \$10,557,520.

Schools planning to participate in the WPCP for the 2016-2017 school year are St. Mary's Springs High School, Fond du Lac; Winnebago Lutheran Academy, Fond du Lac; and Kettle Moraine Lutheran High School, Jackson.

Schools new to the program for fall must obtain pre-accreditation by August 1, 2016 (if they are not already fully accredited). Prior to being eligible to receive voucher payments from the state, schools must, by May 1, submit information regarding their budget. They must also submit, by August 1, documentation of their insurance coverage and certain school policies.

# BBB Offers Tips For Hearts And Wallets This Valentine's Day

Valentine's Day is around the corner and if you're like many Americans, you're planning on purchasing flowers, candy, or perhaps you're planning on spoiling a loved one with a special night out to a restaurant or other experience.

According to the National Retail Federation (NRF), a person celebrating Valentine's Day this year will spend an average of \$146.84 this year (up from \$142.31 last year) with total spending expected to reach \$19.7 billion, a survey high.

So whether you're planning a purchase, or are simply looking to meet someone special, BBB offers the following tips.


**Florists** — Valentine's Day is a busy holiday for florists. Unfortunately, not all florists are created equal. In 2015, BBB received 3,908 complaints against florists regarding flowers that weren't delivered as promised (wrong flowers or arrangements); flowers were delivered in poor condition, or not delivered at all.

Before ordering an arrangement, check with bbb.org.

**BBB Tip:** When you place your flower order — whether in-store or through an online shop — be sure you allow enough time for shipping and verify with the florist that the date and time is guaranteed. Obtain a receipt for the order and ask about the businesses' refund policy if delivered late, in poor condition, or if it doesn't arrive at all.

Confirm that the florist you contact is actually the florist fulfilling the order, too. At this time of year it's not uncommon for a third party to be involved. If ordering online be sure you know the florist's actual street address and phone number — and confirm it is located where it says it is.

**Jewelers** — In 2015, BBB received 2,909 complaints against jewelry stores and reported over 733,841 inquiries from consumers searching for trustworthy jewelers on bbb.org. NRF reports \$4.4



billion will be spent on jewelry this year, with nearly one in five planning to make a special purchase.

**BBB Tip:** Research the jewelry store or jeweler and the type of jewelry piece before making a purchase. Knowing more about the industry will help ensure your venture to be successful. Be sure to always ask for the store's refund and return policy before you buy.

**E-mails and E-cards** — Cyber crooks use this time of year to trick consumers into divulging personal and financial information through false alerts from fake greeting card websites, or through email messages stating there was a problem with the consumer's gift order or credit card. These messages may actually download computer viruses to steal personal information.

**BBB Tip:** Only open emails, attachments, and links from people you know. Enhance email filters to block any such threats. Watch out for unsolicited emails with subject lines such as, "Someone just sent you an e-card" or "Send your loved one a Valentine's Day card today." If you ordered flowers and receive an email indicating a problem, contact the florist directly to ensure the email is legitimate — chances are it is not.

The BBB Serving Wisconsin also warns consumers to be wary of romance scams and scammers devoted to "catfishing" unsuspecting singles. These con artists often break hearts through dating apps and websites. BBB warns of anyone who:

- Asks to talk or chat on

an outside email or messaging service. Oftentimes, this allows fraudsters to carry out scams without the dating site having a record of the encounter. Remember that scammers play on emotion. And romance is a strong emotion. Any time people are vulnerable, scammers will find opportunity.

- Claims to be from this country but is currently traveling, living, or working abroad. Scammers come up with all kinds of excuses why they can't meet in person just yet. Be cautious of online daters who claim to be called away suddenly, or to be in the military and living overseas.

- Asks you for money or credit card information. In some cases the scammer will claim an emergency like a sick relative or stolen wallet, and will ask you to wire money. The first wire transfer is small but the requests keep coming and growing. Or they may ask for airfare to come for a visit. The payback promises are empty. The money is gone, and so are they.

- Sends you emails containing questionable links to third-party websites. Third-party links can contain malware that's designed to steal personal information off your computer. Scammers may use third-party links that look credible, but in reality, they only link to viruses that can lead to identity theft.





Dear Community of Believers,

## Seven Tips For A Luxury Custom Closet

A customized walk-in closet is a luxurious touch to any bedroom. Not only does it serve a purpose for organized storage, but it also creates a pleasant retreat and a calming way to start and end each day.

**Customized storage:** Organizing clothing items

"Use valet rods, hanging rods in multiple heights, pull-out hooks for ties, belt racks, shoe shelves that are tilted with a stop on front so they don't fall, pull-down closet rods for easy access to items stored higher up, and jewelry drawers with organizational dividers and velvet liners," Owens said.

**Island:** Nothing says custom like having an island for additional storage and a place to set items such as your purse or briefcase, and having a handy spot for folding clothes. Just like kitchen islands, a closet island should have a high-end top like granite or marble.

**Mirrors:** A full-length mirror is a must-have, but consider one that gives a 360-degree view or a custom mirrored wall.

**Matching hangers:** Even

the smallest of closets look tidier when all hangers are the same.

**Ironing board:** A discreetly hidden ironing board that you can pull out is more necessity than luxury when you need to touch up a few wrinkles.

**Work with a designer:** Designers know how to work with difficult spaces and can imagine storage solutions you may not have thought of. "We'll ask questions about your style, whether you have a shoe or purse collection, whether you need space for long dresses or formal wear, whether you like to see everything at once or prefer to have items behind doors and drawers," Owens said. "Don't think you have to have a 10 x 10 room to create a walk-in. Even small spaces can be customized to maximize organization."

## Appliance Gallery Offers Tips For Laundry Room Maintenance

Main floor laundry rooms are more the norm than the exception now and many new-build or remodeled spaces have given the workhorse washer and dryer exceptional settings with adequate shelving and storage, drying racks, and high-end countertops, faucets, and sinks. The washer and dryer themselves are now designed to be not only more functional and energy efficient, but also aesthetically pleasing.

Appliances are so user-friendly that homeowners often forget that washers and dryers need regular maintenance. Appliance Gallery, Wisconsin's premier appliance store, offers some tips to make sure your laundry room remains in tip-top shape.

"After your washer has washed a load, allow the interior of the machine to air out by leaving the door partially open," said Stephen Erb, appliance manager. "This will allow air to circulate and help dry out any remaining moisture in the drum or on the gasket. To clean the washer's drum, use a

mild, non-abrasive, chlorine-free cleaning agent. Rinse and then dry with a soft cloth. Do not use steel wool or any other abrasive cleaning agents. Wipe the gasket with a soft cloth to remove residual water or any detergent."

If your washer emits a bad odor, which can happen as residue from detergent and fabric softeners accumulates, run the empty washer with a cup of white vinegar, or liquid chlorine bleach.

"The existence of any residual detergent can be a sign that too much detergent is being used," Erb said. "For high-efficiency washers, use only HE detergents to prevent over-sudsing."

Your washer's exterior can be a magnet for dust, fingerprints, and spilled detergents. Clean with a soft cloth using hot soapy water or a mild, non-abrasive cleaning agent. The control panel can be cleaned with just a damp soft cloth.

"Clean your detergent dispenser too," Erb said. "Remove the dispenser from the washer according to the manufacturers use

and care guide and place the dispenser under warm, running water. Lightly wipe away any remaining detergent residue and reinsert the dispenser."

Ensure that all drains have strainers to keep hair, soap, and debris from entering and clogging the drain lines. Use a strainer on your washing machine hose. Hardware stores have strainers specially designed to fit laundry hoses.

Erb also advises to install a flood alarm to warn of water from the washing machine or water heater leaking from the appliance or overflowing sinks.

He added that it's very important to clean your dryer vent and ducts to remove lint build-up. "If the ducts get clogged, it can be a fire hazard. If your dryer vent hose is old-school vinyl accordion type, upgrade to metal duct work."

Lastly, Erb said to consider replacing a worn out washing machine with a more efficient front-load model.

# East Central/Select Sires Celebrates 75 Years

Back in 1940, when four county agents and various breeders began efforts to create what was then called East Central Breeders Association Cooperative, not much was known about artificial insemination (A.I.).

Over the years, though, East Central became a leader in the industry. A few more than 5,800 cows were bred in the first year of East Central's existence. Last year, in 2015, East Central/Select Sires recorded 348,000 A.I. services in their southern-Wisconsin territory.

Today, they're celebrating 75 years as a successful cooperative.

The four county agents at the first meeting were A.D. Carew, Green Lake County; George Massey, Fond du Lac County; Earl Stallard, Dodge County; and Earl Skalitsky, Washington County. Comments from Stallard, left behind in a notebook he maintained, note various details from the meeting.

"In our preliminary meetings, there was some opposition from some of the registered herd owners in the area," Stallard said in the notebook. "They thought it would hurt the sale of young bulls from their herds, that it would increase the danger of spreading disease, that it might not be conducive to developing uniformly good type in the offspring, and some other uncertainties."

"It did not take long for everyone to realize these concerns were not founded on science, and the decisions made by this group were in the best interest of dairy producers in the counties they served," said Al Deming, current East Central general manager.

The very first East Central board members were Erwin Fehling, Dodge County; Martin Knickel and George Landaal, Fond du Lac County; Arthur Lichtenwalner and Louis Oppenorth, Washington County, and V.S. Kutchin. Carl Deaken and Victor Mayer are also mentioned as possible board members in early notes. Landaal was the first president and Kutchin was the first secretary.

In the early days of A.I., inseminators had to be veterinarians, but soon after, lay technicians were authorized. "The first ones for East Central were George McGilvra, Syd Warner, and Cyril Westerman, all of whom served for many years," commented Stallard in his notebook.

Home base for East Central was a rented barn outside of Waupun. "The day of the first semen collection was quite an event. It took place in the barnyard of the bull stud with the use of a dummy cow. The news had gotten around downtown, and the barnyard fence was lined with quite a few doubting spectators. After the suc-

cessful collection, some went away still doubting." Ten years later, in 1951, East Central built a new bull barn and office building in a different rural-Waupun location. Thirty years after East Central incorporated, Stallard pointed out some improvements in cow-production numbers from the first days of A.I. at East Central.

"Thirty years ago, when East Central started, all cows on D.H.I.A. test in the state averaged 8,416 pounds of milk and 324 pounds of fat. Today (1971), the production has been increased by 4,867 pounds of milk and 182 pounds of fat... A recent (early '70s) comparison of all A.I. daughters showed an increase of more than 42 pounds of fat."

"Today, average production in Wisconsin is near 22,000 pounds per cow," noted Deming. "There are several herds over 30,000 pounds, and production continues to climb each year due to advancements in genetics, nutrition, management, and cow comfort."

In 1976, the general manager of East Central announced his resignation, causing leaders within the cooperative to explore options for the cooperative's future. At the time, they needed new leadership and more avenues for finding additional bull power.

A lot of the membership kept discussing 7H58 ELEVATION, the breed-leading bull available from Select Sires. President of the East Central board at the time, Clarence Boyke, Fond du Lac, made it clear ELEVATION was the biggest driver in East Central's desire to join the Select Sires family.

An invitation from Select Sires President Dick Chichester to East Central's leadership to come to Ohio in early 1977 led to what eventually became East Central's membership in Select Sires as a member cooperative. May 1, 1977, was the historic day East Central joined the Select Sires family. East Central's bulls left for Ohio while the Waupun facilities were converted to homes for young bulls in waiting. In 1984 East Central Breeders Association Cooperative voted to change their name to East Central/Select Sires.

During the late '80s, all remaining bulls at East Central were moved to Ohio. In 1991, East Central's 50th year, the board of directors named Alan R. Deming as the new general manager, and shortly after that, a warehouse was created at the Waupun facilities to hold an inventory of various cow-management products.

In 2000, when Select Sires and Sire Power joined forces to form the largest A.I. organization in the United States, East Central was able to hire five new Sire Power

employees and grow annual unit sales by 50,000.

"Today," commented Deming, "East Central/Select Sires covers the southern 28 counties in Wisconsin with headquarters on the same property where facilities in 1951. Since we have the smallest geographic area compared to the other eight members of Select Sires, we can operate our cooperative in a way unique to other Select Sires federation members. The high-density cow population in our southern-Wisconsin area allows us to pursue innovations quickly and prove ground for new technologies and techniques that can benefit the rest of the Select Sires federation."

"The technique of tail chalking, along with the entire full-service program of heat detection, semen, and service, has been a strong contributor to the growth at East Central/Select Sires," noted Deming. "In 1999, we started the program with less than 40 technicians and relief staff. Growing from zero services in 1999 to 290,765 services in 2015 has resulted in the expansion of our technician staff, adding more than 20 A.I. technicians and four relief technicians."

Another technology prospering in East Central's area is cow-monitoring systems for detecting estrus, temperature, activity, rumination, eating time, resting time, and cow location. "Again, a high-density customer area coupled with employees that really understand the technology and software, has allowed us to become a leader in the number of systems placed and serviced," added Deming.

After almost 75 years of business, total unit sales in 2015 at East Central was 537,369 units, and their A.I.-technician group had 347,802 services. Operating revenue was documented at \$14,800,168. Construction is underway to add warehouse and office space to their existing facilities in Waupun.

"As in the past, the future of the A.I. industry will see plenty of change and growth," commented Deming. "New methods may change some practices we use now. There will be more genetic improvement with even more accurate genomic predictions. There will be an increased use of gender-selected semen on top-end genetic animals causing more rapid genetic progress."



## Citizens With 65+ Years Can Now Get Non-Expiring IDs

### —New Online Service Streamlines Process

Wisconsin now allows its residents who are U.S. citizens age 65 and over to obtain an ID card which never needs to be renewed. The new non-expiring ID card carries the same appearance and security features as traditional eight-year cards, with the words "Non-expiring" appearing in place of the typical expiration date.

"This new feature is a great option for any senior adults who no longer wish to drive or who already hold a Wisconsin ID card. Once they obtain the non-expiring card, they'll never need to return to a DMV service center," said Corey Kleist, Qualifications and Issuance section chief.

The ID card is free if used for voting purposes and, once issued, the card never needs to be renewed. While there is no such thing as a "Voter ID," many Wisconsin residents present their DMV-issued driver license or ID card as their form of identification.

Senior drivers who wish to obtain this non-expiring ID card must surrender their license and driving privileges. An individual cannot hold both an ID and a driver license. Note, surrendering of a driver license will make the individual ineligible to operate a motor vehicle in any state.

In support of this new feature, Wisconsin DMV will now permit individuals who are eligible for this card to exchange their existing ID card or surrender their driver license for the non-expiring ID card without visiting a DMV Service Center. To take advantage of this option, visit [wisconsinidmv.gov](http://wisconsinidmv.gov), then go to Online ID Card Application.

For individuals using this new online service, the most current photo on file will be used on the ID and the final product will be mailed.

Customers whose DL/ID has been expired for more

than two years, who have never held a Wisconsin DL/ID, or who wish to have a new photo taken, must visit a DMV service center to obtain this new ID product.

Individuals holding a REAL ID-compliant driver license or ID must surrender that feature from their card. REAL ID compliant cards will continue to follow the eight-year renewal cycle which requires a visit to the DMV to renew and update the individual's photo.

## Injuries Sideline Several Starters – KHS Wrestlers Are Fifth In EC Tourney

After losing to Campbellsport 39-29 in the first dual meet of the season, KHS wrestling coach Scott Rhoads stated his team would definitely beat the Cougars when the tournament rolled around.

Rhoads could not know at that time, however, he would be without four regulars for the first East Central Conference Wrestling Tournament. That was the case last Saturday at Ripon, as the Indians had no entrants at 106, 113, 126 and 138 and slipped all the way down to fifth place in the seven-team event.

Campbellsport did win the tournament, piling up 232.5 points, 28 points ahead of runner-up Ripon (204.5). Plymouth, the team Kewaskum shut out 76-0 in a dual meet, surged into third place with 163 points, while Winneconne was fourth at 158, followed by Kewaskum, 145; Waupun, 126; and Berlin, 65.

Using a combination of points from the dual meets and the tournament, Campbellsport finished first with 11 points (five from duals and six from the tournament, while Ripon was second with 10 (five and five), then came Kewaskum in third (five and two) with seven. Winneconne was fourth with 6 total points, followed by Plymouth, 4; Waupun, 3; and Berlin, 1.

This was the Cougars' first conference title since the 2009-10 season. (Two Rivers had won the last four Eastern Wisconsin Conference titles, and they won it again on Saturday.) Campbellsport had eight wrestlers in the finals and took home five individual titles.

"For the wrestlers that were there, it went well," KHS coach Scott Rhoads said. As for the team score, "We couldn't do anything with 10 wrestlers."

Kewaskum claimed three titles, two that were expected and one a bit of an upset. Freshman Eric Bauer rolled through the 120-pound bracket with ease, while senior Ben Watzig successfully defended his title, although moving up one class.

Bauer only got to wrestle twice on the day, receiving a bye in the first round. In the semis and finals, he needed just

three minutes and 17 seconds total to pin his opponents. First, he pinned Plymouth's Will Birkholz in 2:34 and followed that up with a pin in 0:43 over Cade Heisdorf of Campbellsport in the finals. Heisdorf is the son of Campbellsport assistant coach, Dan Heisdorf, who wrestled for Kewaskum High and was a state runner-up.

"The first time they wrestled, he (Bauer) couldn't pin him. This time he pinned him in 43 seconds," Rhoads said about Bauer, who is now 41-1 on the year.

"Just an arm bar," Bauer said about what he used on Heisdorf, and when asked how it felt to be a conference champ, answered, "It's all right."

Looking ahead at who might be in his path toward a trip to state, Bauer said, "I'll have Cody Vogel (of East Troy). It should be a close match."

Watzig also had an easy route to the finals, with a first-round bye and a 0:56 pin over Zach Zills of Campbellsport in the semis. His opponent in the finals was Winneconne junior, Jake Buyeske, who led once 3-2 but could not fend off Watzig, who won the match 6-3.

"It was an OK day. The finals was a little bit of a sweat," Watzig said, reporting "I defended his shots well," and then used an arm drag to take Buyeske down, but then fell behind 3-2 before "I took him down and I had a reversal ... I ended up getting a 6-3 lead on him" and never let the Winneconne athlete score again.

Watzig, now 21-1, said he has high hopes of winning the regional and then placing high enough in the sectionals to go to state. "My toughest guy down the line will probably be Dustin Setzer of Sheboygan Falls."

The surprise was provided by senior Cole Rahlf, who won the title at 145 and did so impressively. Rahlf came into the tournament with a 3-0 record and kept that perfect mark going with a 0:28 pin over Tanner Messerschmidt of Winneconne and a 17-7 major decision over Campbellsport's Dominick Wetzel in the semes.

In the finals, Rahlf squared off against Ripon's Nick Retzlaff, and the KHS senior pinned him in 4:49. "I used the spladle ... I was down 8-1,"

Rahlf, now 20-8, said, noting Retzlaff had taken him down three or four teams before pulling off the big pin.

The 145-pound weight class was one of just five which had a full field of seven wrestlers. (Kettle Moraine Lutheran dropped the sport after just one year, so the EC Conference has just seven teams.)

"He (Rahlf) got pinned by that guy at Laconia," Rhoad said, noting Rahlf tried the move three times before securing it for the victory.

Kewaskum had one other finalist, Danny Seitz, who had a good senior year after winning just 12 of 32 matches as a junior.

Seitz didn't make weight for the first match vs. Campbellsport, so he came in as the number two seed. He had a bye in the first round, then polished off Ripon freshman, Joseph Kain, in a brief 1:17 for the right to wrestle in the finals where he lost to Levi Feucht of Campbellsport via a pin in 5:09.


"Danny was on the edge," Rhoads said about Seitz, noting he had Feucht on his back a couple times with his infamous cradle."

Down by one point with 20 seconds to go, Seitz went for a lateral drop, according to Rhoads, who said, "He got caught and went right to his back."

Places earned by the other KHS athletes were as follows: Tanner Goeman, fifth at 132; Sam Larson, sixth at 160; Eric Doll, sixth at 170; Eduardo Padilla, who wrestled up one weight class and finished sixth at 182; Mike Bryngelson, third at 220; Riley Donovan at 285.

Kewaskum was missing Nathaniel Droese at 106, Adam Bruss at 113, Alex Deheck at 126 and Zach Heberer at 138, and Eric Doll injured his ankle in the tournament. Rhoads is confident a couple of these injured wrestlers will be back this week but said, "I highly doubt we'll get all of them back."

Kewaskum is at Campbellsport Saturday for a D-2 regional, along with Lomira, North Fond du Lac/St. Mary's Springs, Mayville and Waupun. The first session will begin at 10 a.m. The first- and second-place finishers from the regional move on to the Milwaukee Lutheran Sectional on February 20.

## Big Runs Spoil Indians' Plans For A Win

The Kewaskum High girls basketball team will have to wait another year for a chance to beat Plymouth. On February 4, the host Panthers used three big scoring runs to win the game 60-39 and complete a two-game sweep over the Indians in East Central Conference play.

With the win, Plymouth improved to 8-3 in the EC, good for sole possession of third place, while the Indians, hampered by injuries, turnovers and cold shooting, have dropped to 2-8 in the EC and 6-11 overall.

"We need to put together a full game," KHS coach Russ Thull said. "We had chances to beat a Plymouth team that Kewaskum has not beaten in many years. (It's) Hard to overcome four big runs by the Panthers."

The first big spurt gave Plymouth an 11-0 start, but the Indians didn't fold, battling back with a rally of their own before a buzzer-beater by guard Lydia Rhude put Plymouth ahead 30-21 at intermission.

"That shot really hurt us because we had just recovered from the 11-0 run to pull within six," Thull said.

The second half started well for the Indians, according to Thull, who said his team pulled to within five points, but, "That was as close as it got, as the Panthers went on another 7-0 run and a 12-0 run. Suddenly we were down 20."

The scoring leaders for Plymouth were Rhude, Emily Majerus and Kalei Hering with 16, 11 and 10, respectively. The Panthers hit six of the 17 three-pointers they took for a 35 percent clip.

For Kewaskum, five-foot, eight-inch junior Hailey Herriges had a great all-around game, scoring 12 points on 4x8 shooting on two-pointers and 1x3 on three-point attempts, hauling down a team-high seven rebounds, dishing two

assists and coming up with one steal.

"Hailey played a solid overall game. Hailey is a kid that puts in a lot of hours," Thull said. "She is so valuable in everything that we do in all aspects."

Sammie Wiskirchen also scored in double figures, tossing in a dozen points and hauling down seven rebounds.



# Tentative Indians Get Overpowered By Waupun Warriors

It's easy to see why the Waupun boys basketball team is currently ranked fourth in the state among Division 3 teams.

The Warriors have talent, experience, height, plenty of depth, and oh yes, good shooters, too. They showed all of the above last Friday night, topping visiting Kewaskum 67 to 28 to run their string of season victories to 16.

"I think Waupun is an extremely good team, but we made them look better," KHS coach Don Gruber said, noting in the early stages of the game, "We missed five layups," including several attempts that were blocked. The coach went on that his players started out tentatively, and, "That set the tone."

In the first half, the Warriors hit 14 of 18 shots from the floor and connected on eight of 10 free throws to take a 37-18

advantage.

The Indians looked ready to play but had trouble connecting on any shots early, making just one of their first eight shots. Senior Michael Prochnow scored on a short jumper 2:36 into the game and needed 14 minutes to get into double figures.

There were a few bright spots, namely back-to-back baskets by senior Jason Hanson, who was fouled on the first one and successfully made his free throw. Hanson blocked Waupun's next attempt, moved up the court and banked in a turnaround jumper for five straight KHS points.

Reserve Trent Griesemer also gave Gruber some good minutes, hitting Charlie Witek and Devyn Zillmer with good passes that produced baskets. Griesemer also grabbed a couple of rebounds during that stretch.

After Charlie Witek's

three-point play with 2:12 remaining, the Indians' offense shut down until halftime, and it sputtered after the break. KHS managed just 11 points in the second half, showing how tough the Warriors are defensively.

In a man-to-man defense, "They pack it in and challenge every shot," Gruber said, indicating his team seemed to do better vs. the press than against the Warriors' man defense. "Trent made some great passes in there," Gruber said.

Witek led the Indians with 11 players, and reserve Jason Hanson was next with seven. For the Warriors, sophomore Owen Theune was tops with 18, while freshman Marcus Domask and six-foot, eight-inch Colton Homan chipped in with 14 and 13, respectively.

Kewaskum is now 3-6 in East Central play and 7-9 overall. After a game at

New London on February 9, the Indians return home tonight (Thursday) to entertain Kettle Moraine Lutheran, a team it lost to in overtime earlier this year.

## Bowling For Perfection

### — Kewaskum Native Scores 842 In Three-Game Bowling Series

Jeff Scannell, a 49-year-old Kewaskum native, bowled 842 in a three-game series during league bowling at King Pin in West Bend on February 3.

The accomplishment earned him a lifetime achievement ring for bowling an 800 series from the United States Bowling

Congress.

Scannell, who started bowling about nine years ago, knew he had bowled well. But he didn't fully realize how good of a score it was until after he had left the bowling alley.

"I didn't take a picture of the screen. I looked at it and went home," Scannell said.

#### The Game

Scannell bowls every Tuesday in a league at King Pin in West Bend.

For the past five weeks, Scannell had been filling in as a sub for a coed league that plays on Wednesdays at King Pin. The league is a handicapped league, with a base score of 220. However, with his high scores, Scannell gets no handicap in the league.

"It's not a high pressure league or anything," Scannell said. "There are some pretty crack teams out there, but we're not that team. We are a good team, but we're not that far out there."

On Wednesday, Feb. 3, Scannell may have changed that.

"Now my average in that league, only based on 15 games, is 242, which is out of my own league," Scannell said. "It's crazy."

Scannell was prepared to start bowling with his usual go-to bowling ball, one that gets traction on oily lanes during tournaments.

"I didn't feel it was working that well for me that day, so I went to a ball I usually never use, and it seemed like it was working pretty good, so I decided to go with that ball," Scannell said.

During the first game, using that high-gloss, grape-scented bowling ball, Scannell scored four straight strikes, and then a nine-count spare.

Scannell said to himself, "OK, that's a good game," but didn't put too much more thought into it. He went on and threw seven more strikes to end the game with 279 points.

The next game, Scannell bowled eight strikes in a row, and then got a nine-count spare. In the last frame, Scannell's ball hooked too much, and he got a six-count after

two strikes, for a total of 265.

"That's fine," Scannell thought to himself.

But then he realized that he just needed a 246 in the final game to get to the elusive 800, but it was doable. His teammates recognized what was at stake.

"Everyone was kind of quiet. They knew that you don't want to jinx it," Scannell said.

The team was bowling on lanes 23 and 24, the last two lanes on the far right side of the alley, so the rest of the league didn't realize what was brewing.

"I'm thinking I have a chance for 800," Scannell said. "I was not fluttered or shaky, but inside I was just bubbling with the heart rate."

Scannell calmly sat down and relaxed to get his heartbeat back in the normal range.

"By the time I got to bowl, I was relaxed, and I threw the first one was a nine-count," Scannell said.

He spared it, but he knew he could only have three nines in the game.

"Just do what you can," Scannell told himself.

Then he went up and rolled a strike. Then another strike. And another.

"If I was on a line, that was the day I was on a line. Every shot was right there," Scannell said.

He continued to throw all strikes, and he secured the 800 in the ninth frame.

But he still had the 10th frame to go. He rolled two strikes and one eight-count, and ended with a score of 842.

#### Becoming A Bowler

Scannell, who works as a toolmaker in Brown Deer, typically bowls just once a week.

When Scannell bowls, he looks down the lane,

past the arrows, to the area on the wood where he wants to throw the ball. And he throws the ball fast, spinning it like a top.

To improve his game, Scannell had gone to Dwight Albrecht at Albrecht's Spare Time Pro Shop in New Berlin to get the holes in his bowling balls drilled. Scannell told Albrecht he would take lessons as well.

But after watching Scannell bowl, Albrecht said, "I can't make you better. I can't teach people to do what you do. I recognize talent, and you've got it."

At the time, Scannell bemoaned the fact that he had not yet hit 300.

"You're pretty good. You're going to do bigger things than that," Albrecht told him.

#### Bowling Records

Albrecht may have been on to something.

Last May, Scannell, who graduated from Kewaskum High School in 1984, bowled a 300 at a tournament in Milwaukee and won the tournament.

In January, Scannell placed second in an open invitational in West Bend.

Scannell was told that his score of 842 was the second highest score in the 65-year history of the West Bend bowling alley. The highest was 857, Scannell said.

According to the U.S. Bowling Congress website, there are three people who have bowled a perfect 900 series in Wisconsin: Tony Roventini in Greenfield, 1999; Mark Wukoman in Greenfield, 2006; and P.J. Giesfeldt in Milwaukee, 2007.

In addition to getting a ring for achieving an 800 game, Scannell is being cited by the Bowling Congress for bowling 11 strikes in a row at a tournament in Sheboygan several weeks ago.

Scannell's next goal is to bowl a 300 game during sanctioned league play.

"I've done it in practice, I've done it in tournaments, but I've not done it in league. That would be the goal, to finish up the one-two punch," Scannell said.

If a voter is not registered to vote, a voter may register to vote at the polling place serving his or her residence, if the voter presents proof of residence in a form specified by law. Where ballots are distributed to electors, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot. Upon being permitted to vote, the voter shall retire alone to a voting booth and cast his or her ballot except that a voter who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the voter's minor child or minor ward. An election official may inform the voter of the proper manner for casting a vote, but the official may not in any manner advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

Where Optical Scan Voting is Used

The voter shall fill in the oval next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall write in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote, and fill in the oval next to the write-in line.

The vote should not be cast in any other manner. Not more than five minutes' time shall be allowed inside a voting booth. Sample ballots or other materials to assist the voter in casting his or her vote may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

If the voter spoils an optical scan ballot, he or she shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one elector. If the ballot has not been initialed by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the voter shall return it to the election official, who shall issue a proper ballot in its place.

After Voting the Ballot

After an official optical scan ballot is marked, it shall be inserted in the security sleeve so the marks do not show. The voter shall insert the ballot in the voting device and discard the sleeve, or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. The voter shall leave the polling place promptly.

A voter may select an individual to assist in casting his or her vote if the voter declares to the presiding official that he or she is unable to read, has difficulty reading, writing or understanding English or that due to disability is unable to cast his or her ballot. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the voter's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the voter.

## HOW TO FIND THE RIGHT WEDDING VENDORS

Weddings are a careful balance of many elements that culminate on one special day. Making all of the components of a wedding come together seamlessly requires a well-organized bride and groom and the cooperation of professional wedding vendors who understand their unique roles.

Vendors, including florists, transportation companies, musicians, and dressmakers are essential to a successful wedding. Competent wedding vendors will remove much of the worry and work from a couple's shoulders.

But not every couple ends up with top-notch wedding vendors. Research, planning and verifying references are some ways to ensure your vendors make your wedding day that much more enjoyable.

\* Seek recommendations from trusted friends and family members. Talk to friends and family members whose insight you value about which wedding vendors they used. If you attend a wedding or another party and find the florists or the music particularly well done, ask for the name of the florist or band. Word-of-mouth advertisement is a great way to find quality wedding vendors who will help make your dream wedding a reality.

\* Consult with a wedding planner. If budget allows, work with a wedding planner. He or she will have an extensive list of wedding vendors

you can contact. A wedding planner wants the job to get done right and efficiently, and many wedding planners have already vetted and verified certain vendors as quality workers.

\* Always ask for references and don't ignore them. Busy wedding vendors should provide you with a list of names of satisfied customers. Talk with couples who used the vendors' services in the past and ask the questions that are most important to your decision-making process. Unbiased feedback also may be available through online review sites, but direct contact with references may make you feel more comfortable. If a vendor fails to provide references, this should raise suspicions about the person's reliability.

\* Deposits should be a fraction of the total price. Avoid wedding vendors who insist on hefty deposits. A deposit is a good-faith agreement to hold the date of the wedding, and it should be a small percentage of the overall cost of the services.

\* Do not pay balances too far in advance. Many wedding vendors require the balance be paid on the day of the wedding or shortly before. Good vendors realize couples will not want to pay the tally until they have received the products or services they signed up for. A photographer may ask for the final payment when albums are

delivered. The exception may be a caterer or reception site that needs the funds to order food and beverages a few weeks in advance. Paying off a vendor too early means you run the risk of that vendor having your money and then not coming through on the wedding day. It's difficult to track down a person for a refund, plus you're left with finding a replacement at the last minute.

\* Contracts are your friends. Every agreement should be in writing. You have a better chance of fighting for a refund or restitution in court when you have a contract in writing.

\* Consider wedding insurance. Even the best-laid plans can go awry on a wedding day. Anything from freak weather events to illness to vendor absences can wreak havoc. The Better Business Bureau advises purchasing wedding insurance to protect yourself when weddings are especially costly. Such insurance may cover vendors who fail to show up, cancellations, inclement weather, military deployment, medical emergencies, and travel delays. With wedding insurance, you won't lose money if plans change. A basic insurance policy that covers loss of photos, videos, attire, presents, rings, and deposits usually costs between \$155 and \$550, depending on the amount of coverage you want.







## GETTING A MARRIAGE LICENSE IN DODGE COUNTY

Application cannot be started until a wedding date has been scheduled, even if the ceremony is taking place at the courthouse. The County Clerk's Office suggests application for a marriage license be made two - three weeks prior to the ceremony.

### Where To Apply:

Wisconsin residents must apply before the County Clerk of the county in which one or both have resided at least 30 days prior to the date of application. Marriage may be performed in any county in Wisconsin.

If both applicants are out-of-state residents, the license must be issued in the county where the ceremony will be performed.

### Waiting Period:

Application must be made at least 6 days before a license is issued. Ceremony may take place on date license is issued or any time within 30 days thereafter. In some instances, a waiver may be granted for the waiting period, due to unusual circumstances. If granted, the cost of the waiver is \$10.00. If you are getting married on a Saturday, you must apply prior to the Friday of the week before.

*Physical Examination and/or Blood Tests: Not required.*

### Requirements:

Certified birth certificates are required. A certified birth certificate must bear the official embossed seal, and a signature of the state registrar, register of deeds, or city health officer. The seal of a notary public does not suffice for a certified copy of a vital record. If you were born in Wisconsin, you may obtain a State Certified birth certificate from the Register of Deeds in the county in which you were born, or the State of Wisconsin - Vital Records. For individuals born in Dodge County, please contact the Register of Deeds at (920) 386-3720. The souvenir birth document given by a hospital is not a legal document and is unacceptable.

Be prepared to provide accurate and complete names of parents. Persons under the age

of 16 may not marry.

Persons age 16 and age 17 are required to provide both parent's or legal guardian's notarized written consent to marry. The consent forms are available in the County Clerk's office and must be signed by both parents or guardians in front of the County Clerk. For more information, contact the County Clerk.

### Proof Of Identity:

Unexpired Driver's License or State ID with your correct name is the best form of proof of identity.

### Proof Of Residence:

A current driver's license with a current address is the best proof. If this is not available, proof of residency such as a checkbook, utility bill, income tax record, payroll record, military papers, student record, medical and/or dental bills must be provided. Each applicant must provide a document that contains his/her correct name and address.

### Divorced Persons:

It is not lawful for any person, who is or has been a party to an action for divorce in any court in this state, or elsewhere, to marry again until 6 months after judgment of divorce is granted. A signed Judgment of Divorce from the last previous marriage must be presented to the County Clerk.

### Death Certificates:

A certified copy of a death certificate must be presented to the County Clerk if your last previous marriage was terminated by death.

### Location, Date of Marriage and Officiant:

Applicants should be prepared to provide the date of the marriage, and the correct spelling of the officiant's name, as well as his/her business address, phone number and e-mail address. The applicants should also know the name of the county and municipality (city, village or town) where the ceremony will take place.

### Social Security Numbers:

Applicants must provide their social security numbers if one has been assigned to them.

We do not need to see your social security card.

### Translator:

If one of the parties to the marriage does not understand or speak English, they must bring a translator with them. Any documents not in English must be translated.

### License Fee:

The license fee is \$70.00. If a waiver to the waiting period is granted, there will be an additional \$10.00 fee. These fees are payable, in CASH ONLY, on the day you come to apply for the license. (We do not accept checks or credit cards) No refunds given.

### Hours:

Marriage license applications are taken in the County Clerk's office, located on the first floor of the Administration Building, Monday through Friday from 8:00am - 12:00pm, 12:30pm - 4:00pm. Both applicants must come to the office to apply. Appointments are not required.

Courthouse Wedding:

If you would like to get married at the Dodge County Justice Facility, please contact Court Commissioner, Steve Seim, at 920-386-3543 or Clerk of Courts at 920-386-3570 to schedule the ceremony prior to applying for the license. The fee to get married at the Dodge County Justice Facility is \$25.00.

### How to Obtain a Certified Copy of your Marriage License:

After you are married, you may contact the Register of Deeds in the County you were married in to obtain a certified copy of your marriage license. If you were married in Dodge County, you may contact the Register of Deeds at (920) 386-3720 or click here for their web page.

Outdoor weddings are romantic when done right, and a growing number of couples are exchanging vows amid an expansive garden or with the splendor of the pounding surf providing a picturesque backdrop. If Mother Nature cooperates, outdoor weddings can go smoothly. But even if the weather does not cooperate, there still are ways couples can enjoy a memorable ceremony.

Preparation and planning help keep outdoor weddings moving along. Weather can be unpredictable and unforgiving, so it is always best to account for various scenarios. The following are some tips to consider.

\* Be mindful of hot weather. Many outdoor weddings occur when temperatures are at their warmest. As anyone who has had to sit outdoors in the blazing sun for an extended period of time can attest, it can grow quite uncomfortable, especially when everyone is dressed to the nines. Advise guests in advance that the wedding will be taking place outdoors and to dress accordingly. Arrange to have shaded areas for guests who may struggle with the heat. Keep chilled bottled water nearby so guests can stay cool and refreshed. Ask the officiant to keep the ceremony brief so that guests are not melting away in their seats.

\* Keep wind in mind. A stiff breeze can upset tents and wreak havoc on hairstyles. Be sure everything outdoors is properly secured and weighted down. Avoid light fabrics on a wedding gown that will get swept away by wind. A short, blusher veil may be more appropriate than a sweeping train. Couples

should advise their hairstylists that they will be getting married outdoors, and looks should be well secured by bobby pins and gel to keep hair in place. Stick to real dishes for food service, as plastic or lightweight materials may get blown away.

\* Check for power sources. Choose a wedding location with easily accessible power outlets. Guests will certainly want to hear the vows, and that may require the use of microphones and a sound system. Having power available also makes it easier for bands and musicians to set up their equipment for an outdoor reception. If the wedding will be stretching into the evening hours, electricity will be needed to power supplemental lighting that illuminates the festivities.

\* Ensure accessibility. Outdoor terrain can prove tricky, especially for older guests or those with mobility issues. When scouting locations, select a wheelchair-accessible spot that can be easily traversed. Understand that turf can become water-logged and challenging to walk over should it rain the day of the wedding or prior. Plastic or fabric runners may make things easier. Also, choose a location that isn't too far off the beaten path. It should be close enough to a parking lot and not require guests to have to take an extended hike through nature.

\* Face away from the sun. Glares can make it difficult for guests to see the ceremony. Be sure to arrange seats so that guests do not have to look into the sun. This is best achieved by having the sun behind everyone for the ceremony. It also ensures that you won't end up with washed-out

photos or pictures of everyone squinting.

\* Ensure food is properly chilled or heated. Dining outdoors means keeping food safety in mind. Food that is supposed to be kept cool should remain on ice or be refrigerated until served. Hot foods should remain hot. Food in chafing dishes or served buffet-style also should be protected from insects. Improper handling of food can result in foodborne illnesses. No one wants to remember a wedding for intestinal discomfort.

\* Use fresh flowers in potted plants. Cut flowers tend to wilt prematurely in hot weather. Rather than waste money and beautiful flowers, choose potted plants that will thrive if well-tended. Guests can then take the plants home and continue to cherish the wedding long after it is over.

\* Budget for a tent. It is always better to have a contingency plan. Even if you have your heart set on an outdoor wedding, have a backup plan in place if the weather is uncooperative. A tent with surrounding sidewalls may be sufficient. Otherwise, determine if there is an indoor location that can be kept on standby.

\* Mix up the candles. Intersperse citronella candles with the decorative ones to help keep bugs at bay. You can also consider placing small bottles of insect repellent on the tables. Guests will appreciate the gesture when biting flies or mosquitoes want to join in the fun.

Make sure Mother Nature doesn't rain on your outdoor wedding. Plan for all the possibilities so that an outdoor ceremony or reception goes as smoothly as possible.






something with more pizzazz to change into for the wedding night.


Bras and other shapewear can make a world of difference in how wedding attire looks and feels. Invest in some quality pieces that will highlight wardrobes to their fullest.

## TAME WEDDING DAY NERVES

When couples tie the knot, many changes are in store, many compromises will be made and many lasting memories will be created. Weddings are huge undertakings, so it's no surprise that couples sometimes feel overwhelmed. Ask reliable relatives or friends to double-check all of the last-minute details. This way you don't feel it is all on your shoulders.

Wedding days nerves are to be expected and often have little to do with the decision to get married. Planning such a big event can be nerve-racking, but there are ways to combat any anxiety that builds up as the big day draws near.

## WEDDING VEILS COMPLETE BRIDAL LOOK

The perfect dress is on the wish list of many a bride-to-be, but no bridal ensemble is truly complete until the bride chooses her veil.

Veils have been worn by brides at their weddings for centuries. Veils can be traced back to the Middle East, where veils helped protect against the weather while also preserving the modesty of the bride. In Ancient Greece and An-

cient Rome, veils were used as protection against evil spirits.

According to popular wedding website The Knot.com, until Vatican II, all Catholic women were required to have their heads covered in church, including during their wedding ceremonies. Veils were worn for this purpose, but they also symbolized trust in the groom and his love and companionship.

Some Christians also see the veil as a visual representation of submission to the Church and to God. Others think of the veil as another beautiful accompaniment to their bridal gown, without attaching any additional meaning to the veil itself.

Veils come in various lengths and can complement the style of a wedding gown. They also tend to add glamour to

brides' looks. Here are the types of veils from shortest to longest.

- Blusher: Blushers cover the face, though some extend only to mid-cheek on the bride.

- Flyaway: Flyaways cover just the back of the head. Shorter veils may work better on petite women.

- Shoulder: Shoulder veils are about 20 inches in length and will hit at the bride's shoulders or

just below.

- Waist: Waist-length veils cascade down to the middle of the bride's waist.

- Fingertip: These veils extend down 38 to 42 inches, brushing against the bride's fingertips.

- Waltz/Knee: For a dramatic look, many brides may opt for waltz-length veils, which fall to the back of the knees.

- Chapel/Floor: Veils

that extend to the floor may be referred to as "chapel" or "floor-length" veils. Such veils cascade slightly behind the bride.

Veils can complete brides' wedding day looks. Shorter veils may be comfortable to wear throughout the day and evening, but brides may want to consider detachable veils if they are selecting lengthier options.




## CHANGING YOUR LAST NAME

While many brides opt to take their husbands' surnames upon tying the knot, over the years the popularity of such a decision has ebbed and flowed. Recent years have suggested the practice is once again gaining steam.

A 2011 study published in *Names: A Journal of Onomastics* indicates that younger brides are more likely to embrace the tradition of

taking their husbands' names in marriage. According to the study, women who married between the ages of 35 and 39 were 6.4 times more likely to keep their maiden names than those who married between the ages of 20 and 24.

Many brides view taking their spouse's name as the natural transition from being a singleton to being a married woman. Other brides prefer they

share the same last name as their future children, making the choice to take their husband's name a logical decision. Some brides feel having the same last name as their husbands helps them feel more like a family.

Changing one's name also may make it easier to deal with various issues. Finances, travel and even parenting concerns may be easier when women take their

husbands' last names than when they don't.

But some brides still prefer to keep their maiden names or hyphenate those names with their husbands' surnames. Some may view changing their names as sacrificing their personal identities, while others may want to hold on to a family name they are proud of. Interesting names also can be hard to give up. Brides who find taking their hus-

band's name would be a tongue-twister may prefer to forego this tradition.

Very often women who occupy positions of prominence in their professions keep their maiden names, feeling that taking their husbands' names will affect the cache they have built up thus far. Women uncertain of what to do in such situations can keep their maiden names professionally and still

change their names legally.

Changing one's last name is a personal preference and a decision that couples should discuss together. Discuss the decision well in advance of the wedding so that both parties are aware of each other's feelings on the subject before tying the knot.

## HOW TO HANDLE GUESTS WHO DON'T RSVP

Wedding invitations are often a great source of information for guests. While wedding websites also provide a great opportunity for couples to get the word out about their weddings and share pertinent details like the date and location of the wedding, many people are still unfamiliar with the concept of a wedding website, and therefore they rely on invitations as their primary source of information about a wedding.

One of the most important bits of information couples must include on their wedding invitations is the RSVP date. The RSVP, which stands for "repondez s'il

vous plait," is a couple's request for a response to their invitation. The RSVP is typically a specific date by which guests must let the couple tying the knot know whether or not they plan to attend the wedding.

There are no rules that govern how far in advance of the wedding couples should ask their guests to RSVP, but some venues might want a final headcount or at least a close estimate of the final count-down three to four weeks before the big day. As a result, it's best to ask guests to RSVP at least three weeks before the wedding and preferably four to five weeks

before the festivities commence.

If invitations are mailed two to three months prior to the wedding, that gives guests ample time to determine whether they can or cannot join in the celebration. While many guests will respond immediately or in plenty of time for couples to arrange seating and notify their reception venue, nearly every bride and groom has been forced to deal with guests who simply failed to respond to their invitations, a potentially precarious position for couples to find themselves in as their wedding day quickly approaches.

When guests fail to respond on time, couples should maintain their composure and not take it as a sign of disrespect or indifference. Guests might not be planning a wedding, but chances are they're busy, too, and their failure to respond is likely just a mistake. Before contacting those who failed to provide a timely response, wait a few extra days so responses that were mailed at the last minute can be counted among those that were received on time.

Once the deadline and subsequent extension has passed, couples can begin to contact those

guests who have not responded to their invitations. If it's a close friend or family member who hasn't responded, simply call them on the telephone and politely ask if they plan on coming to the wedding. They won't need to mail the RSVP at this point, so just jot down their response and thank them before moving on to the next person.

When a person who hasn't responded is less familiar to the bride and groom, such as a parent's distant cousin or professional colleague, then it's perfectly reasonable to ask for help. For example, if a parent's neighbor has yet to

reply, ask Mom or Dad to drop by their house or call them on the phone to determine if they plan to attend.

The majority of invitees, if not all of them, who fail to respond on time will understand when contacted directly and asked if they plan to attend, so couples need not be nervous or confrontational when making phone calls or writing emails. Keep things short and sweet and let guests know their attendance is appreciated or their absence will be felt if they cannot make it.

## THINGS TO CONSIDER WHEN MULLING A DESTINATION WEDDING

According to a study from XO Group Inc., creator of wedding websites TheKnot.com and WeddingChannel.com, 350,000 destination weddings take place annually. Such figures reflect a growing trend of couples who want to tailor their weddings to their own personalities, even if that means tying the knot in exotic or unusual locales.

But as popular as destination weddings have become, couples who have had such weddings can attest that planning a destination wedding is not necessarily easier than planning a more traditional ceremony close to home. Though destination weddings can make for memorable affairs, there are some factors couples must consider when mulling whether or not to have a destination wedding.

### Guest list

The XO Group study found that destination weddings have an average of 86 guests. When sitting down to organize their guest lists, many couples realize they have well over 100 guests on their lists. Such couples may find a destination wedding especially difficult to pull off, as resorts may or may not be able to accommodate such a substantial number of guests. In addition, couples who hope to invite children to their weddings might want to reconsider a destination affair, as those youngsters' parents will have to foot the bill for additional airfare and accommodations and, depending on when the wedding takes place, pull the kids out of school for an extended period of time. Couples with smaller guest lists might find a destination wedding much more

manageable than those whose guest lists crack triple digits.

Another thing to consider is that the larger the guest list, the more likely many of those guests will not be able to afford to attend or get enough time off from work to make it to a destination wedding. Couples who want to ensure all of their loved ones can be there with them on their big days might be better off avoiding destination weddings.

### Accessibility

Accessibility is a common concern for couples considering destination weddings. Destination weddings typically ask guests to travel far to attend the ceremony and reception, but there are ways to make that travel less of an ordeal. When choosing a location for their destination weddings, couples should consider the cost and convenience of travel.

Remote islands are not very accessible, and as a result guests will likely have to pay a pretty penny for their flights and lodging. In addition, the more remote a destination wedding locale is, the less convenient getting there figures to be. Nonstop flights likely won't be a possibility. Before choosing a locale for a destination wedding, research flights, making sure that affordable flights are available within spitting distance of loved ones' homes and that they won't have to suffer through multiple connecting flights when traveling to and from the wedding.

### Weather

Weather is another factor couples must consider before choosing to have a destination wedding. The XO Group study found that 30 percent of American couples who have destination weddings

choose to tie the knot outside of the continental United States. That's a distinct disadvantage for couples who likely are not very familiar with weather patterns overseas. Couples who choose outdoor weddings close to home are often familiar enough with local weather patterns to choose a wedding date that likely won't be interrupted by harsh weather. But choosing an overseas or distant locale erases that comfort level, and couples may find themselves worrying about storms or other inclement weather conditions as their wedding days draw nearer. Before choosing a locale for their destination weddings, couples should thoroughly research each potential destination's weather patterns. Brides, grooms and guests alike don't want to do all of that traveling only to end up indoors

because it just so happens to be tropical storm season.

### Competition

As destination weddings have grown in popularity, the competition for idyllic locales and top-notch venues has increased. That competition is great for venue owners' bottom lines, but it might not be so great for couples looking to keep their wedding costs down. Costs might be considerably less in the off-season, but that's also when storms and inclement weather tend to take hold. Booking a venue early can help couples mitigate some of the costs of a destination wedding, but the growing popularity of destination weddings might make them out of reach for couples working on tight budgets.

## HOW TO FIND THE RIGHT WEDDING PHOTOGRAPHER

Long after the final toast has been made or the last couple has left the dance floor, wedding photos will help couples relive the wonderful memories of their ceremonies and receptions.

Wedding photographers realize the important role photography plays in a wedding. Photos are how couples document their nuptials, and the right photographer can make all the difference. The following tips can help guarantee a successful wedding shoot and beautiful photos to recall the best moments of the day.

\* Seek referrals. There are scores of wedding photographers, and some are better than others. Word of mouth from other couples can help. Referrals can offer insight into a photographer's personality and his or her abilities to work with the wedding party and guests throughout the day.

\* Communication is key. An important component of wedding photography actually starts well before the wedding day. The way a photographer communicates with you about your wishes and desired shots is very important, as this is when to discuss specific shots you want taken during the ceremony, such as whether the bride wants to be seen and pose with the groom prior to tying the knot. In addition,

this is a great time for the photographer to get familiar with each venue's rules regarding vendors.

\* Choose a photographer who is confident and firm. A good photographer will be able to direct photo subjects and get everyone to participate and in line. Brides and grooms likely won't want to handle such tasks on their own, so a confident and firm yet cordial photographer can be an invaluable asset.

\* Prepare a shoot list. Meet with the photographer before the wedding and provide a list of all the shots you absolutely need to get. This way the photographer can plan for these as well as capture the candid moments throughout the day.

\* Discuss a backup plan with the photographer. Mishaps happen, even on the most carefully planned wedding day. Discuss what the photographer does to safeguard your digital photo files. Are they backed-up to a cloud or a secured offsite server? Does the photographer bring along a second camera in case the primary one has a malfunction? What happens if he or she is ill on the day of the wedding? How is a replacement chosen? Understanding how the photographer adapts to unforeseen situations can make you feel more confident in

choosing one photographer instead of another. The camera gear should also have adequate memory to store all of the photos, and a few backup batteries can't hurt, either.

\* Consider hiring a photographer's assistant or second shooter. The photographer is less likely to miss a shot or fail to capture various perspectives of the wedding if he or she works with a partner. While one photographer is doing close-up portraits, the other may be capturing candid moments from onlookers from another angle.

\* Know what each package includes. The photographer should clearly spell out which items and services are included as part of the contract. There should be no surprises when it's time to pay the balance of the photographer's fees, so go over each itemized detail to be sure the package in your contract is the one you really want.

\* Get to know the photographer as a person. It can be difficult to loosen up in front of the lens, particularly if you do not have a good rapport with the photographer. Do not judge the photographer on his or her body of work alone. You will likely grow more comfortable with the photographer if you get to know him or her in the months leading up to your wedding.



## RESPONSIBILITIES OF BRIDAL PARTY MEMBERS

Being asked to join a bridal party is both an honor and a responsibility. When asked to take on such significant and meaningful roles, men and women may recognize the honor but be unsure of what their responsibilities are as couples move forward with their wedding plans. Bridal party roles can vary depending on certain circumstances, but many couples still want their bridesmaids and groomsmen to perform many of the more traditional tasks associated with their roles. The following are some of the tasks bridesmaids and groomsmen can expect to perform in the months leading up to the wedding and during the wedding itself.

### Maid of Honor

The maid of honor serves as the bride-to-be's right-hand woman as she plans her wedding and gets ready on her big day. Maids of honor typically go gown shopping with the bride and may even choose or offer suggestions about the color and style of the bridesmaids' dresses. Once a dress style and color has been chosen, the maid of honor will make sure everyone is fitted on time.

A maid of honor will also plan the bridal shower, sending invitations and arranging for lodging for out-of-town guests if necessary. Many brides want the details of their bridal showers to be a surprise, and maids of honor should honor those sentiments when possible. A maid of

honor also plans the bachelorette party, though many brides do not mind being involved in the planning of such parties.

The maid of honor may be asked to help address save-the-date cards and envelopes as well.

Come the day of the wedding, the maid of honor will ensure the bride's day is as stress-free as possible, helping to address any last-minute issues that may arise. Maids of honor may be asked to serve as the legal witness to the wedding and sign the wedding license before the reception. At the reception, the maid of honor will toast the bride.

• **Best man:** The best man is the maid of honor's counterpart, helping to plan the bachelor party and toasting the groom at the reception. The best man also tends to hold the rings during the wedding ceremony, and during the day of the wedding, he will coordinate the groomsmen to make sure everyone is ready to go on time. The best man may arrange transportation for the groom and groomsmen on the day of the wedding and may also return the groom and groomsmen's attire the following day if the newlyweds are departing on their honeymoons.

### Bridesmaids/Groomsmen:

The bridesmaids and groomsmen serve similar functions, acting as sources of support as couples plan their weddings. Bridesmaids and

groomsmen help to plan the bachelorette and bachelor parties and may also be asked their opinions as couples make decisions regarding their weddings. Bridesmaids and groomsmen must be prepared to take pictures once couples have officially tied the knot. They also must help the brides and grooms with any issues that may arise in the hours before couples become husband and wife.

### Flower girl/Ring bearer

Flower girls and ring bearers are often young relatives of the couple, whether they are a young brother or sister or a niece or nephew. The responsibilities of the flower girl and ring bearer are typically limited to the ceremony, during which they will walk down the aisle, either together or individually, before the father of the bride escorts his daughter to the altar or stage.

### Father of the bride

The father of the bride walks his daughter down the aisle during the ceremony, and, along with his wife, may pay for the wedding, though many couples now finance their own nuptials. The father of the bride will dance with his daughter during the reception, and some fathers may even share a special toast for the newlyweds during the reception, though such a toast is not traditionally required.


Bridal parties play a big role on couples' wedding days, and those roles are both an honor and a responsibility.



## SIMPLIFY AND SAVE ON YOUR WEDDING

Planning a wedding is complicated. Once couples choose a date and location for their ceremony, they can then get down to the nuts and bolts of the big day.

When planning a wedding, many couples are governed by a budget. Budgets often get stretched, but even those brides- and grooms-to-be who spend more than they had initially hoped often find themselves not going too far over budget. Couples can save a substantial amount of money by simplifying the alcoholic offerings at their reception. Instead of a full top-shelf bar, offer guests one or two choices of popular liquors such as whiskey, rum and vodka and steer clear of especially expensive brands. The majority of guests likely won't even notice, but couples will notice how much money they save.

\* Choose a classic cake. Elaborate cakes may be de rigueur, but the cost of an especially elaborate wedding cake can make a cost-conscious couple's collective

jaw drop. Instead of a specially designed, labor-intensive cake, choose a classic cake that won't break the bank. Classic cakes can add an elegant touch to a wedding without extending a couple's budget.

\* Trim the guest list. Trimming the guest list is arguably the most effective way to simplify a wedding while simultaneously saving some money. Once you have compiled a list of potential invitees, peruse that list to determine if there are any people who can be trimmed from the list. This is easier for couples paying for their own wedding, as they won't feel pressured to invite any friends or colleagues of their parents whom they don't know personally. But even couples splitting the cost of their weddings with their parents should speak with their parents about trimming the guest list to make the affair a little less expensive.

Traditional weddings are anything but simple. But there are ways for couples to make planning their wedding less complicated while saving some money at the same time.

\* Book well in advance. The sooner you choose your destination, the faster you can begin the process of applying for passports, visas or other necessary documents. Booking early also guarantees you better seats on the flight and the ability to negotiate pricing.

\* Give yourself a full day between the wedding and embarking on your trip. Scenes of couples being whisked away to the airport right after the reception dwindles down are commonplace. But that doesn't mean you need to leave right after the final dance. Allow some breathing room to pack, deposit wedding gifts, return

tuxedos, and tackle any other post-wedding tasks. Save the romantic "first night" as a couple for the honeymoon and enjoy a well-deserved night's sleep.

\* Purchase travel insurance. One way to alleviate the stress of planning a wedding is to ensure your honeymoon investment is protected in the event of bad weather or other unforeseen circumstances. Travel insurance is a safety net that can come in handy. Speak with a travel agent or insurance agent about how to secure travel insurance for the honeymoon.

\* Pack light. Don't burden yourself down with a lot of belongings. Chances are you'll pick up new things and mementos on the trip, and packing light makes traversing airports that much easier.

"The film crew was super fun. I am the only daughter and my mom and I got very emotional during the filming. There was a lot of crying."


The dress fit really well, except it had to be shortened and a few other alterations done. Vera, who appears in most episodes, was there to check on the proper fitting of Katie's dress.

"Will's really excited about the show, but he has no idea what I've gotten him into. He thinks it's a girlie thing," Katie said with a big smile on her face.


