Little Folks And Bigger Folks Form Ageless Bonds

For St. Patrick's Day, Everett Tye and Carolyn Butz did not find a pot of gold at the end of a rainbow.

Instead, they found something more priceless: a friendship that spans several generations.

Everett is one of the preschoolers at Little Folks School House in Kewaskum who visited Kettle Moraine Gardens last week.

The group of four- and five-year-olds have been visiting the assisted living center once a month since last fall.

"The residents just love the little kids. They just get so much happiness from them because they are so excitable and they are so full of energy. And I think that the children get something out of it, too. They learn not to be afraid of the elderly, or maybe they don't have any grandparents in their close proximity. It's a nice reciprocating relationship," said Donna Gajewski, activity director at Kettle Moraine Gardens.

"I think it's an awesome program. I love how it's evolved," said Dodie Sargent, administrator at

Little Folks School House.

The Partnership

The partnership started after Tina Thull, director of Kettle Moraine Gardens, watched a video about intergenerational programs.

According to Generations United, a nonprofit intergenerational advocacy group, intergenerational programs help children learn that they can give to others in need, while older adults benefit because it helps expand social roles and increases emotional support, both in giving and receiving.

"The children, they're understanding the aging process a little more. They are developing some of their softer skills such as manners," Sargent said.

In addition, the children are developing another relationship outside their families, Sargent said.

"As for the older people, the bigger folks, it is giving them a new sense of worth," Sargent said.

Because of the benefits of the intergenerational programs, there are some nursing homes across the country that house day care centers.

Before the program started in Kewaskum,

Sargent and Gajewski were not sure how well it would work.

"In the beginning, I didn't know how the kids were going to react when they met residents in wheelchairs or who use walkers," Gajewski said.

"We talked to the children at the beginning that this is what we were going to be doing. We are Little Folks, and we are going to go visit the Bigger Folks," Sargent said.

The children took it all in stride.

"They came in, sat right down, and just started interacting and playing and talking. It's just so sweet," Gajewski said.

Gajewski hopes that it will help the children in the future.

"I think they will have more compassion for the elderly and learn that they are not so different," she said.

And the bigger folks enjoyed spending time with their little visitors.

Since fall, the assisted living center and the day care center have alternated planning activities each month.

Farmington Elementary School Receives Award At State Capitol

Representatives for Farmington Elementary School visited the state capitol to receive an award Monday for being one of 11 schools across the state to have met the criteria to be a Title I High-Achieving and High-Progress School.

"The community, our Board of Education and our parents at FES have been able to grow together and reach this wonderful achievement," second-grade teacher Suzanne Gruett said. "It wouldn't be possible without everyone involved."

School Principal Tom Fischer reiterated the importance of the support from the school board, staff parents, family members and students.

"This simply affirms our

hard work, high expectations and high goals," Fischer said.

Farmington Elementary was one of 169 Wisconsin Title I School of Recognition recipients.

The Wisconsin Title I School of Recognition awards highlight schools that have demonstrated success in educating students from low-income families. To be eligible, schools must receive federal Title I funding to provide services to large numbers or high percentages of economically disadvantaged children and meet other achievement criteria.

Representatives from the schools gathered in Madison for an awards ceremony in the State Capitol Rotunda on Monday.

At the awards ceremony, the Easterners Honors

Choir from Appleton East High School, under the direction of Dan Van Sickle, performed.

Each school received a plaque, and 12 schools that have earned School of Recognition awards for five consecutive years received a special flag to mark their achievement.

"Congratulations to Wisconsin's Title I Schools of Recognition. This award recognizes the work of students and their parents along with teachers, school administrators, and school staff members to break the link between poverty and low academic achievement. These efforts will help us ensure that every student graduates college and career ready." State Superintendent Tony Evers said.

The Washington County Sheriff's Office has started a town liaison program, which provides a point of contact for each township in the county.

"The goal is of kind of establish more of a professional partnership with the town officials, more formal

than what we have in place right now," said Capt. Martin Schulteis.

A deputy will be assigned to each township, and that deputy will attend the town's monthly board meetings.

At those meetings, deputies will be able to report Sheriff's Office activities and brief the

town boards on any pertinent investigations. Likewise, the board will be able to inform the assigned deputy of any issues there may be in that township, Schulteis said.

i4Learning Community School Receives \$2,500 Grant

i4Learning Community School received a \$2,500 Monsanto America's Farmers Grow Communities Grant.

The grant funds will be used to purchase project-based learning and STEM (science, technology, engineering and math) curriculum materials to provide hands-on educational opportunities for the students.

Local farmer Terry Volm, whose grandson attends i4Learning Community

School, nominated the school to receive the grant.

"We are appreciative of the grant and we are looking forward to hands-on experiences for our kids. It helps go along with our mission, providing hands-on, integrated experiences for kids," School Principal Joel Dziedzic said.

The i4Learning Community School is Kewaskum's only charter school. The school provides project-based, multi-age learning.

The grant will be used to purchase additional Project Lead the Way materials for the kindergarten through second grade cohort, as well as the third- through fifth-grade classroom.

Dziedzic anticipates that the students will begin using the new materials this spring.

For six years, America's Farmers Grow Communities has collaborated with farmers to donate over \$22 million to more than 8,000 community organizations across rural America.





Some townships are taking the relationship one step further. The Town of Farmington is considering passing a resolution which would allow sheriff's deputies to enforce town ordinances. The item has been placed on the town's agenda for next month's meeting.

"The town thinks it's great. We are really looking forward to working with the Sheriff's office on handling ordinance violations," Farmington Chairman Chris Elbe said.

Unless a town board gives the Sheriff's Office the power to enforce town ordinances, deputies are unable to help with such efforts in a township. Sheriff's deputies have the power to enforce state laws, federal laws and

county ordinances only. About eight years ago, the Village of Richfield began contracting services with the Sheriff's Office to enforce local ordinances.

That prompted the idea of extending services to townships, Schulteis said. "Since we already have the infrastructure in place - we have marked squad cars driving around, we have the deputies in uniform driving around - the sheriff thought we could assist the townships with their ordinance enforcement if they wanted," Schulteis said.

In 2012, the towns of Polk and Wayne adopted ordinances that gave the Sheriff's Office power to enforce their town ordinances.

"It gives the townships another tool to use, and the sheriff does that at no cost. Town ordinances are already paying property taxes and are already receiving patrol services, so we just incorporated that into our general patrol," Schulteis said.

Since Wayne passed its ordinance to utilize sheriff's deputies to enforce town ordinances, deputies

have not issued any tickets in Wayne, Schulteis said.

In the Town of Polk, on the other hand, sheriff's deputies have written two or three tickets, but have done exponentially more investigations, Schulteis said. That has resulted in deputies being able to get compliance without having to issue tickets, he said.

The Sheriff's Office began meeting with individual town boards last week to implement the new town liaison program throughout the county.

"It's really just a point of contact, so if the town has concerns, they can contact somebody directly, and vice versa. This way we have a direct link to the townships, Schulteis said. "I can't say we are going to be assigning more people to patrol on a routine basis, but certainly if there are problem areas, we are going to make sure they get addressed."

Elbe expressed appreciation for having a specific deputy assigned to the Town of Farmington. Deputy Morgan Dombrowski, who grew up in Farmington, will be that town's point of contact.

Washington County Sheriff's Office Report

Vehicle Crash

On March 9, a single vehicle, minor injury crash caused power and cable television outages near the City of West Bend. The driver was examined by West Bend Rescue and released at the scene. The vehicle sustained heavy damage and was towed from the scene.

The crash was reported at 11:39 a.m. and happened on State Highway 144 near Lakeridge Court in the Town of Barton.

A southbound vehicle driven by a 73-year-old Sheboygan Falls woman went off the road, striking a power pole. The pole was snapped off and held wires belonging to WE energies, Charter Communications and AT&T and included fiber optic lines. Multiple repair crews were on scene attempting to restore services.

State Highway 144 was initially closed for a short period of time and was reopened after the area was deemed safe. The crash was caused by the lone occupant or driver's lapse of attention to her driving. Authorities anticipate the issuance of an inattentive driving citation to the driver.

Rehabilitation Project On I-41/US 45 In Washington County To Resume - Traffic Impacts May Occur During Off-Peak Times

Beginning Monday, March 14, the Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT) is scheduled to recommence major work on a rehabilitation project on I-41/US 45. The project limits extend from the Washington/Waukesha County Line (County Q) to the US 41/45 split, in Washington County, a distance of roughly six-and-a-half miles.

During peak hours, all travel lanes on the freeway mainline will remain open. In off-peak hours, single and double lane closures will be in effect, which may cause congestion.

The project began in August 2015. During the winter months, operations suspended except for traffic signal work at the County Q and Lannon Road interchanges. The contractor, Payne &

Dolan, is planning on completing the project in fall of 2016. The schedule is weather dependent and subject to change.

2015 Work

- Completed reconstruction of the southbound bridge at the I-41/US 45 split

- Finished base patching of corridor

- Completed realignment and widening of ramps at the County Q and Lannon interchanges

- Began signal work at the County Q and Lannon Road interchanges

2016 Work

- Milling and overlaying, along with installing new asphalt

- Upgrading the cable guard system

- Installing a high friction surface treatment from

- Friedstadt Road to Holy Hill Road

- Building up the curve banking from Friedstadt Road to Holy Hill Road

- Adding lighting at the Lannon Road Interchange Completing signal work at the County Q and Lannon Road interchanges

The project will also provide upgrades to the Freeway Traffic Management System, with new fiber optic cables and microwave detectors, allowing WisDOT to better compute travel times used by the public via 511 Wisconsin.

For the past year, I have been involved with the Kewaskum School District's transition of Wayne Elementary School to the project based and multiage 14 Learning Community School. Education continues to change and the Kewaskum District is managing change for the benefit of our students. Working with the 14 Learning Community School has been a true learning experience, very rewarding, and a very positive process.

This was not a planned activity as I retired, but it did not take long to identify two major 'wow' moments in education today: 1) how technology is a critical component and enhances the learning environment today; and 2) the reality that today's schools operate in a competitive marketplace. If a parent isn't happy with our school district, they can 'open enroll' their children in any district and the state shared revenue funding follows the student.

With that in mind, I firmly believe our school board leadership is on the right

Kewaskum Elementary School Receives Funds For Fuel Up To Play 60

-Wisconsin Dairy Farmers and Green Bay Packers Support School Wellness Program

Kewaskum Elementary School has been chosen to receive \$1,000 to support its Fuel Up to Play 60 initiative.

Kewaskum Elementary School (KES) was selected from several schools that applied for funding across the state to help them jump-start and sustain healthy nutrition and physical activity improvements. Wisconsin schools are eligible to receive up to \$1,000 to help them increase awareness of and access to nutrient-rich foods and physical activity opportunities for students. Funding for this competitive program is provided

"Fuel Up to Play 60 has really taken off in Wisconsin. Wellness champions and students in more than 1,700 schools have embraced the program, and these funds will help many of the participating schools to do even more," said Laura Wilford, Director Wisconsin Dairy Council.

Currently, about 10 children visit the assisted living center at a time. Because the program is going so well, the frequency of visits may increase in the future, Sargent said.

Monthly Gatherings

Last week, Kettle Moraine Gardens resident Diane Sleger helped preschooler Bryce Shirley count the dots he rolled on two dice. Together, they looked for the number on the St. Patrick's Day game board.

It was one of their favorite games: Banga.

In addition to playing the game, the pair worked together to create St.

Patrick's Day crowns and edible necklaces during their hour-long visit.

Each month, the children and residents do different activities together.

"They have played Bingo and they have done little arts and crafts things, something the residents can do, as well as the little ones," Sargent said.

At Christmastime, the Little Folks performed for the Bigger Folks by singing Christmas songs. In February, the two generations decorated heart-shaped cookies together.

Before each Little Folks visit, Gajewski puts the event on the Kettle Moraine Gardens calen-

dar.

Muckerheide Is Lone Champion In KIWC Tourney

Only one local wrestler, Kannon Muckerheide, took first place in the annual Kewaskum Youth Wrestling Tournament sponsored by the Kewaskum Indian Wrestling Club that took place on Sunday, March 13.

There were 60 different age group/weight classes in five- or four-man brackets contested in the tournament, which drew wrestlers from at least 15 different clubs.

Muckerheide went 4-0 on the day to claim the title in the 160-175 weight class for those born in 2001-02.

First, Muckerheide won by a 15-0 tech fall over Jacob Earle of Xavier, and in the second round, he pinned Zach Harebo of West Allis/West Milwaukee in 1:35. In Round 4, he had his toughest match of the day, nipping Evan Smith of the West Bend Wildcats by a score of 1-0.

In the final round, Casey Bierter did not appear for the match, so Muckerheide won by forfeit.

"That was probably the highlight of the day," Justin Rhoads, one of the main KIWC coaches, said about Muckerheide. "He beat some big kids."

Kewaskum had four others, including James Racer, Xane Kleinke, Mason Pomeroy and Jadon Rhoads, finish second on the day.

Racer, who was in the 59-62 pound weight class for those born in 2007-08, posted three pins and lost a 7-4 decision for his second place, while Kleinke, competing in a three-man weight class for those boys in '07-'08 for those weighing 79-87 pounds, won by pin and lost an 8-2 decision, while Pomeroy, in a four-man bracket for those born in 2001-02

weighing 120-132 pounds, won a pair of decisions by scores of 6-3 and 5-0 and losing a 4-0 decision.

Wrestling at 107-115 ('03-'04), Jadon Rhoads (3-1) placed second with a pin, and two shutout decisions and a loss by pin.

Other members of the Kewaskum club who placed among the top four in their weight classes included: Warren Korth, fourth at 69-72 ('07-'08), Brent Krejcarek, 2-2 record for third at 57-60 ('05-'06); Nick Stautz, 2-2 record for third at 66-70 ('05-'06); Mitchell Becker, fourth at 71-75 ('05-'06); Stone Pomeroy, 2-2 for third at 83-90 ('05-'06); Nick Deheck, fourth at 72-78 for ('03-'04); Brandon Schreffler, 2-2 for third at 115-118 ('01-'02).

Others who participated but did not win any matches included: Eric Jungers, Elijah McChain, Eli Ogi, Seth Schwai, Jayce Rhoads and Josh Vogt.

"It went really well, smooth actually," Justin Rhoads said about the tournament, which drew close to 300 athletes, but not very many in the older classes. The KIWC might have had a couple more champions but several athletes wrestled "up" in other divisions to prepare for the Wisconsin Wrestling Federation Kids Folkstyle Qualifier that will take place at Lakeland College on March 19.

The Lakeland event is one of eight regionals in the state. Winners and second place finishers at the regionals advance to the Wisconsin Wrestling Federation State Kids Folkstyle Tournament at the Alliance Center in Madison March.

Rhoads reported the club went with TrackWrestling for scoring/results this year, so the results "are all done that day."

Wiskerchen Receives Honorable Mention In EC Voting

In the voting on the first-ever East Central All-Conference Girls Basketball team, Berlin's Julia Silloway was the only unanimous pick, while champion Kettle Moraine Lutheran and second place Waupun each had two players on the seven-person, first team.

Silloway, a five-foot, eight-inch senior guard, was the leading scorer in the conference, pouring in 21.1 points per game for the Berlin Indians, who finished sixth in the league with a 4-10 record.

From the 14-0 undefeated KML squad, Lyndsey Soderbeck and Alyssa Shipley were selected the first until along with the Warriors fine scorers, Danielle Hopp and Maiah Domask. Soderbeck, a junior, averaged 10.1 points per game, hauled down 7.1 rebounds and chipped in with 2.2 assists while her senior teammate, Shipley, scored 9.2 points per game and had 7.6 rebounds.

The two juniors Domask and Hopp combined for 26.2 points per game for the Warriors, who ended up 11-3 in conference play. Domask was also a good rebounder, with her 8.9

boards per game.

Both teams also were represented on the second team, Sharla Boehkle and Payton Schneider from KML and Sydney Flier from Waupun.

Rounding out the first team were Plymouth's Gwen Streblov, a 5-9 junior guard who averaged 14.5 points per game, and Ripon's Marissa Bunge, a 5-10 senior guard, who topped the 1,000-point mark for the Tigers late in the season.

Kewaskum, which was hampered by injuries to two of its post players and a top reserve guard, ended up in seventh place with a 2-12 record. Only Sammie Wiskerchen, a 5-10 senior, received any attention in the voting. She was among the six girls given honorable mention.

"I think it was a well-earned award for Sammie," Kewaskum coach Russ Thull said. "She put together a great season, averaging 14 points and nine rebounds per game. That led our team in both categories. I am a very proud to have been able to coach her the past two seasons."

Wiskerchen's nine rebounds per game tied her for top EC honors with Domask in that category.







The Kewaskum Village Board, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First Street.

Kevin Scheunemann presided and called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. Board members present were Richard Laubach, Richard Knoebel, Dave Zehren, Kevin Scheunemann, David Spenner, James Wright and Jim Hovland. DPW Working Foreman Dennis Aupperle reported on the DPW activity:

Salting and snow plowing has been completed with the different snow events.

Sidewalk maintenance has been completed according to the list supplied by the police department

One curb box had to be thawed and the water is being run at the location to prevent it from freezing again. Cross-connection inspection is being completed at local businesses.

The proposed price to abandon the water main along Hwy H by Memorial Drive is approximately \$12,000 to \$15,000 or the water main in the area could be increased from an 8 inch to a 12 inch for a minimal increase in cost. There is currently an insurance claim pending with the damage that occurred when the water tower was being tested and there was a surge in pressure in the particular area. Also it is being determined the specific amount that could be contributed from impact fee money toward the cost to increase the water main size.

Administrator Heiser reported: The Assembly Bill AB-582 has passed the Assembly and will be voted on by the Senate this week. The Bill would decrease the assessed value for vacant parcels in half. The Bill does not cover any Tax Incremental District vacant parcels. The effective date would be January 1, 2018.

Ehlers Associates are reviewing the Sewer Utility debt structure. There is nothing that can be changed with the Clean Water Fund financing but there are some additional funds that could be restructured. Ehlers Associates will be invited to present some options for restructuring this debt at the March 21, 2016 meeting.
Clerk Stephanie Justmann re-

ported the Spring Primary will take place on February 16, 2016. The polls are open from 7:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. The newly appointed Library Director, Emily Goad introduced herself. She has replaced Steve Baker.

Jim Hovland, Representative for the Plan Commission, reported the February 23, 2016 meeting has been cancelled due to a lack of agenda items. David Spenner, Representative for the Library Board, reported on the February 15, 2016 meeting. E-circulation has seen an increase in items checked out and ordinary materials checked out has decreased. The new library consortium system make-up will be decided by the County Library Board.

The Kewaskum Village Board, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in special session in the Community Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First Street.

Kevin Scheunemann presided and called the meeting to order at 9:00 a.m. Board members present were Richard Laubach, Richard Knoebel, Dave Zehren, Kevin Scheunemann, David Spenner, James Wright and Jim Hovland. Staff members present were: Matt Heiser and Stephanie Justmann. Notice of the meeting had been posted at the PNC Bank, Kewaskum Post Office and at the Municipal Building on February 18, 2016. Notice was also forwarded to the Village Board, Village Attorney, Village Engineer and the News Media.

Administrator Heiser led the discussion on the Visioning Session. The agenda for the strategic planning included the financial plan, services, our identity and community needs. The overall financial commitment for capital projects included funds for street projects, equipment purchases for the fire department and the DPW. The Water and Sewer Utilities debt structure comparison to the user fee schedule. The Sewer Utility operating revenue does not cover the principal payment on debt. Other areas that could be included as a revenue source in the future include energy saving efforts at the WWTP and out-

side waste haulers. The TID shortfall and increase in increment due to additional building agreements was discussed. Additional input was received on the pool feasibility study, sewer debt and capital needs.

The services that are offered by the village were reviewed. The building inspection is contracted through the City of West Bend. The police department has taken on the zoning code enforcement for sidewalk and lawn maintenance. The fire department has changed to a volunteer department. The DPW has seen a reduction in the number of employees from five to three and is able to handle all tasks. The Wastewater Department helps the DPW during snow fall events and water main breaks. The new Library Director is Emily Goad. The Wastewater Treatment Plant is currently under the old regulation for their permit. The new phosphorus levels will be implemented with the next permit cycle. The Storm Water regulations are covered under the TMDL (total maximum daily loads) along with the MS4 permit. Looking forward some consideration could be to create a recreation department, engineering department, planning and economic department or zoning administration.

The general overview of the village financial picture. The current debt is \$9,120,000 of the \$13,975,045 limit which is approximately 65.3%. This is in the normal range. The assets to liabilities in the utilities equates to 1.24 for the Water Utility and .39 in the Sewer Utility. A good range is around 1. The debt load for each citizen in the village is approximately, \$2,000. A mission statement was created in 2008 for the village. A vision statement should be created at the same time the mission statement is updated. The Comprehensive Plan will also need to be updated. The Economic Profile created in 2011 was reviewed and updated. The branding item discussed was using a coordinated color scheme on village facilities. Additional partnering ideas and the wants of the community were expressed. President Scheunemann presented a list of goals he will be working toward within the different departments.


