## From Kewaskum To The World

### – Kewaskum Graduate Becomes International Student

When Nichole Springer attended Kewaskum High School, she went to Spain for two weeks with Spanish Travelers with four other students and two teachers.

"I think that kind of got me hooked [on international travel]. I always kind of wanted to go abroad and travel, but that was my first big trip," said

Springer, who graduated from KHS in 2012.

Springer is now majoring in international business and marketing, with certificates in professional Chinese communication and South Asian studies, at the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

While in college, she has studied in China, Thailand, the Dominican Republic and Cuba. Next year, she plans to finish up

her degrees by studying in India.

"I am an international business major, specializing in Asia, but I really would like to be able to get the perspectives of everywhere around the world. I'm interested in everywhere, so if I can either learn about it or get there, I will," Springer said.

Springer returned on March 26 from a 10-day trip in Cuba for an interna-

tional business course she took this semester. To prepare for the field study, the group read six books and countless articles for the seminar-based class. Students met for three hours every week since January.

## Kewaskum Middle School Suffers Loss

### – Teacher Elizabeth Johnson Dies Unexpectedly From Heart Complications

Counselors, psychologists, teachers and other support personnel were on hand as students returned from spring break to Kewaskum Middle School on Tuesday, March 29.

All was not as it had been before the vacation. The students came back to school missing Elizabeth Johnson, a sixth-grade English teacher at the school, who died unexpectedly from heart complications on

Tuesday, March 22, while in Aruba with her husband, Corey Johnson.

"We are very saddened here to lose one of our people, one of our family. It is always difficult," Kewaskum School District Superintendent James Smasal said.

Johnson, 40, who was originally from West Bend, earned a bachelor's degree in business. For the next 10 years, Johnson helped run her family's business, Weiland's FUN Center,

which is now renamed King Pin.

In 2006, the family sold

the business, and Johnson spent a year traveling around the country and the world with her family. A little over a year after selling the family business, Johnson's mother, Nancy Clark, was diagnosed with Lou Gehrig's Disease. Johnson cared for Clark until her mother's death in 2009.

## Kewaskum Resident Convicted Of Vehicular Homicide After Texting While Driving

Kewaskum resident Heather Cleveland, 27, was convicted by a jury on Thursday, March 24, after being accused of texting moments before a fatal crash.

The Fond du Lac County jury found Cleveland guilty of homicide by negligent operation of a motor vehicle.

Cleveland now faces up to 10 years in prison. Sentencing is set for June 24.


The fatal crash occurred at 2:30 p.m. on June 25, 2014. Cleveland was traveling about 70 mph west on State 23 from Fond du Lac to Ripon when her Chevy Trailblazer rear-ended a Ford pickup truck stopped to make a left turn onto Willow Road, according to the criminal complaint.

The force of the collision thrust the truck into the path of an eastbound vehicle driven by Linda Trotter of Ripon. Trotter, 63, was pronounced dead at the scene.

Phone records show that Cleveland was sending and receiving texts moments before the crash.

This was not Cleveland's first case involving inattentive driving.

On Feb. 14, 2014, about a month before the fatal crash, Cleveland was cited for traveling 81 mph in a 65 mph. During the traffic stop, Cleveland told a Fond du Lac County sheriff's deputy that she

"wasn't paying attention" and thought she was traveling 75 mph, according to the complaint.

In 2010, Cleveland lost control of her vehicle and side-swiped a tree in Juneau County. According to the criminal complaint, Cleveland "flat out lied" about how the crash happened, and Cleveland was convicted of inattentive driving and operating a vehicle with a suspended license.

Toxicology reports indicate that Cleveland had no illegal drugs or alcohol in her system at the time of the 2014 fatal crash. However, she tested positive for methadone, for which she had a medical prescription.

Methadone is a drug commonly used to treat heroin addiction. Fond du Lac County Medical Examiner Dr. Doug Kelley said the level of methadone in Cleveland's system was "within therapeutic range" and that Cleveland was not impaired by the drug at the time of the crash, according to the criminal complaint.



# Washington County Sheriff's Office Reports

## Pursuit

On Monday, March 28, at 10:07 p.m. a deputy was monitoring traffic on Interstate 41, south of Allenton, and observed a vehicle northbound at 91 mph. The deputy initiated a traffic stop on the vehicle just north of Highway 33 for that violation. The suspect vehicle increased speeds to 110-120 mph after the deputy activated his emergency lights and siren. The suspect vehicle veered off at the County Road D off-ramp, and then abruptly stopped east of Interstate 41.

After the deputy started the protocol for a high-risk stop, the driver fled a second time eastbound on County Road D into Kohlsville. After the vehicle failed to stop at the four-way intersection and proceeded south on County Road WW at excessive speeds, the deputy terminated the pursuit. The total length of the pursuit was about eight miles.

The vehicle in question was a 2016 Kia with Kentucky license plates. The plates came back to a nationally known car rental company and the vehicle was rented at Louisville International Airport. The rental company has been cooperative with the investigation.

Deputies may pursue as expeditiously and safely as possible any person in a vehicle who the officer has reasonable suspicion to believe is eluding apprehension after having committed a traffic ordinance violation. Officers are required by department policy and state statute to drive with due regard for the safety of all persons and take multiple factors into account in the decision making process whether to continue a pursuit. In this case a deputy with less than one year experience made the veteran decision, with supervisory input, that the risks to life and property outweighed the benefit derived from the immediate apprehension or continued pursuit of the vehicle.

## OWI Accident

On March 26 at 1:42 a.m., the Sheriff's Office received a report from a passerby of a vehicle partially submerged in a pond on the southeast corner of County Road E and Powder Hill Road in the Town of Hartford. Upon

arrival deputies located a soaking wet 22-year-old Town of Erin man outside of the vehicle that had the front half submerged in the pond.

The man admitted to driving and losing control of his vehicle. The subject failed field sobriety testing and was arrested for first offense OWI. The investigation revealed the operator turned southbound onto Powder Hill Road from County Road E at a high rate of speed causing him to lose control and enter the pond. He was not injured.

## Drugs

On March 27 at 7:08 a.m. the Sheriff's Office was contacted by a parent of a 17-year-old Town of Hartford male youth reporting he located marijuana, a pipe and grinder in his son's vehicle. The parent indicated he has seen a change of behavior/attitude of his son and decided to search his son's vehicle after the youth was at a party the previous evening.

The parent requested that the Sheriff's Office pick up the drugs and wanted to have the issue addressed with his son. The office responded and the youth admitted the items were his. He will face charges for the possession of the drugs and paraphernalia.

## Drugs

On March 27 at 6:31 a.m. the Sheriff's Office was dispatched to the area of Interstate 41 southbound near Interstate 45 in the Village of Richfield for a report of a vehicle in the ditch and possibly some type of domestic dispute occurring between a male and female outside the vehicle.

Upon deputies arrival, they located the vehicle in the ditch with a 45-year-old Lomira woman and a 37-year-old Easton, Penn., man arguing. After investigating, deputies determined that the incident did not rise to the level of a mandatory domestic abuse arrest. While speaking with the female on the shoulder of the road, the deputy could hear the sound of glass rolling on the highway. The deputy retrieved the item and discovered it was a glass crack pipe.

While standing next to the vehicle the deputy saw a syringe on the passenger side floorboard of the

vehicle and rolling papers on the back seat. The odor of marijuana was also present. A search of the vehicle resulted in additional paraphernalia and personal use level marijuana in the female's pink backpack. Prior to arrest, the female also pulled out an additional syringe from her pocket. She was arrested for possession of drug paraphernalia and possession of marijuana.

## Welfare Investigations

The Sheriff's Office does not normally release specific cases involving individuals that harm or threaten to harm themselves, but during this past weekend the Sheriff's Office investigated five different cases involving subjects that have either threatened to kill themselves or overtly committed acts to end their lives. Two of the cases involved threats that were made to family members or while the subjects were online. Two cases involved subject's taking lethal amounts of prescription medication. One case involved a subject jumping into a 21 foot well. These cases involve both genders and range in ages from 12 years old to 65 years old. No one died as a result of any of these incidents.

The Sheriff's Office want to remind everyone to remain attentive to family and friends that are struggling with emotional issues. We would also like to remind people that early intervention with mental health professionals, monitoring loved ones social media for potential mental health issues and keeping prescription medications inaccessible is much more preferred to having law enforcement take people into emergency protective custody when the threat is imminent.

## Fatal Accident

On Thursday, March 24, at 1:22 p.m. the Washington County

Sheriff's Office responded to County Highway K, 0.2 miles south of Hall Road in the Town of Hartford after a report of a two-car vehicular crash with injury. Upon deputies arrival it was determined serious injury was suffered by one of the operators. Hartford Fire and Rescue Department responded for medical triage of both vehicle operators. Rescue determined one operator to be deceased and the second sustaining minor injury.

The deceased operator (sole occupant) was southbound on County Highway K leaving the City of Hartford. While negotiating a curve in the roadway south of Hall Road, the operator lost control of the vehicle, crossing the center line sliding sideways in to the northbound lane of travel. There it was struck on the passenger side by a northbound vehicle in a 'T' bone manner resulting in the southbound operator's death. The northbound operator (sole occupant) suffered minor injury and was treated and released a short time later from Aurora Medical Center in Hartford.

The Washington County Sheriff's Office Crash Reconstruction Unit is assisting with the investigation. Weather and snowy road conditions appear to be contributing factors in the crash. County Highway K was closed to traffic for approximately 2.5 hours.

The deceased operator (southbound) is a 23-year-old man from Menomonee Falls. The injured operator (northbound) is a 71-year-old woman from Hartford.

This was Washington County's third traffic fatality today and sixth traffic fatality in 2016.

## Fatal Crash

Washington County Sheriff's Office received calls at 11:12 a.m. on March 24 about a head-on crash involving a southbound semi-tractor trailer

and a northbound passenger van that had crossed over the median on Interstate 41 just north of County Highway K in the Town of Hartford.

Authorities were able to determine that the van was driven by a 24-year-old Oshkosh woman who had her 15-year-old sister, also of Oshkosh, as a passenger. Both of these young women were killed as a result of the collision and were pronounced dead at the scene. These were the county's fourth and fifth traffic fatalities this year.

Investigators believe that the northbound van was traveling too fast for the road conditions which had snow and scattered slippery spots throughout the county. The van crossed over the median being struck by the semi and the vehicles became entangled and entered the west ditch of the highway.

The 61-year-old driver of the semi was from Ontario, Canada, and was not injured but was transported to an area hospital as a precaution.

Authorities needed to close one of the two southbound lanes for over six hours but were able to allow passage at reduced speed during the extensive cleanup.

## Assist Fond Du Lac County Sheriff's Office

On Monday, March 21, at 9:35 p.m. the Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Office contacted the Washington County Sheriff's Office to request assistance with an officer involved death investigation pursuant to §175.47. That statute requires the primary ensuing investigation of an individual's death as a result of an action or inaction by law enforcement must be completed by an investigative team from an independent agency.

The preliminary investigation reveals that during the early evening hours on Monday, March 21, the Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Office was inves-

tigating a report of a suicidal subject. The subject, an 18-year-old Campbellsport man, had been posting suicidal statements on social media and texting acquaintances several hours prior to the incident.

At approximately 9:11 p.m. on March 21, Fond du Lac deputies located the man driving on Town Hall Road in the Town of Auburn and attempted to stop him to check his welfare. The man continued driving at low speeds for about 0.5 mile with two deputies following in separate squad cars. At the intersection of County Road SSS and N. River Road the man turned his vehicle around and drove toward the deputies at a low to moderate speed. At this point the squads partially blocked the road and the man's vehicle and one of the squad cars collided. The man's vehicle continued off road and struck a tree. At that point, it appears the man shot himself with a handgun. Deputies did not fire their weapons. Deputies extricated the man from the car and provided life-saving measures until relieved by a rescue squad. The man later died at a regional trauma center.

The Fond du Lac County Deputies involved are ages 50 and 30 and have 27 and four years of law enforcement experience respectively.

Washington County detectives and accident reconstruction personnel were on the scene and are investigating the incident. Squad video has captured some of the incident. The incident remains under investigation by the Washington County Sheriff's Office and no further details can be released at this time. The Washington County Sheriff's Office anticipates forwarding the complete investigation to the Fond du Lac County District Attorney's Office for review upon completion.

COGNITIVE  
DECLINE**

Sleep apnea is a common breathing disorder in which breathing is obstructed for a period of time and sleep is disrupted. Researchers analyzed data on 2,400 people, and those who reported having sleep apnea (but weren't treated for it) showed signs of mild cognitive impairment (problems with memory and thinking skills) about ten years earlier than those who slept well. The good news is that those who reported having sleep apnea but who used a CPAP (continuous positive air pressure) machine didn't exhibit earlier cognitive decline; their onset was identical to those without the condition.

The award was presented by Flight For Life (FFL) Safety Officer Matt Reinhart, Chris Forncrook, Lead Communication Specialist of our Flight Communication Center; Jim Singer, FFL Transport System Director; and the FFL duty crew. Accepting the award were Paul Farrow, Waukesha County executive; Chris Petterson radio services administrator; and Steve Milner, radio communications specialist.

This award was developed in 2015 as a way to acknowledge a specific facility, organization, or department's dedication to safety and “above and beyond” efforts to ensure the continued safety of FFL's patients, crew and aircraft.

Flight For Life formed a strong partnership with Radio Services after moving to the Waukesha hangar facility in 2008. They have kept the safety of the FFL aircraft, crew and patients in the forefront by communicating any changes, pertinent information, or new tower construction to FFL on an ongoing basis. Whenever they are made aware of a non-functional tower light,

they notify FFL immediately.

Recently they contacted FFL regarding the construction of two new 265 foot towers. The lighting systems on the towers are LED based which are difficult to see when FFL utilizes Night Vision Goggles (NVG). They ordered the lighting on the towers to be configured with infrared light emitters so that they are NVG visible.

It is for these reasons and many more that the FFL Safety Committee chose to recognize Waukesha County Radio Services with its Partners In Safety Award.

### Notes From The Desk Of Washington County Administrator Joshua Schoemann

## Seeking Opportunities For Shared Services With Public And Private Partners - A Well Administered County



In my first column, I talked about the need to set clear priorities for our county and the county board's recent commitment to results that will govern the way that we do business throughout the county. Our county board has defined the phrase “providing a well governed and administered county” to specifically include “seeking opportunities for collaboration and shared services with public and private partners.” Sounds great....right? Except, the rules and structure of government often complicate these types of initiatives, making commitment from officials at all levels much more important.

Take our recent initiative to merge public health departments with neighboring Ozaukee County, a project set to save Washington County taxpayers \$250,000 in 2016 and continue to effectively deliver services to our citizens. At first, the project seems relatively straight forward: combine administrative functions, cross train resources and save dollars. However, without significant efforts to cut through bureaucracy at multiple levels of government, this project may have never been able to get off the ground.

In short, a great amount of collaboration was required to change statutes governing the creation of multi-jurisdictional health depart-

ments. Thankfully we had willing partners with Sen. Stroebel, Rep. Rob Brooks and many others, who made it possible to make this opportunity a reality. The legislation needed for this change was finally signed into law by Gov. Walker on February 29, over a year after discussion first began about the potential opportunity.

Let's take another initiative, this one more local, a public-private partnership to build a new stage at Washington County Fair Park. This time by virtue of a generous donation by our corporate citizens at West Bend Mutual Insurance Company we found ourselves with an opportunity to replace an aged platform which was beginning to show the signs of aging. This time the elongated approval timeline was self-inflicted. Due to tedious internal governance rules, the matter came before four different committees beginning in August 2015 before receiving final approval at the December county board meeting.

So, it's our process, what are we doing to improve it you might ask? Great question. Thanks to the hard work of County Board Chairman Tennes and a number of dedicated Staff and Supervisors appointed to a committee aimed at solving the bureaucratic grind in Washington County, this April will mark the beginning of a

number significant changes in our governance structure. First, on Tuesday, April 5 the citizens of Washington County will be electing 26 Supervisors rather than the historic 30 Supervisors. Second, on Tuesday, April 19 the newly elected Supervisors will begin to organize into six “standing committees”, down from the historic ten. Finally, rather than navigating business through numerous committees, in most instances we will take business to one committee and then straight to the county board. It will most certainly be a work in progress, but it is an innovation that will no doubt expedite the flow of county business.

Johnson then went on to earn her master's degree in education. While student teaching, one of Johnson's teachers set her up on a blind date with Corey Johnson, and the couple were married 15 months later, on April 13, 2013.

Johnson enjoyed bowling, tennis and traveling. She enjoyed spending time with her family and her two dogs, Otis and Buck.

Johnson also enjoyed working with her students.

"I have to say that I am blessed, because I love my job," Johnson wrote in an online newsletter to her

students and parents.

"To you students....thank you! It makes me so proud that you just go with the flow. You are ALL so wide-eyed and available to flow with me!" she wrote in another edition of the newsletter. "I LOVE coming to school and teaching you! You challenge me to be better, be funnier (like that's possible;) and to really step up my game. You are all uniquely bright, different...but together are like a great big hug. Thank you for making my life fun every day and putting up with my wacky...and sometimes unorganized

ideas daily!"

In addition to working as a teacher, Johnson had served on the Boys and Girls Club Executive Board of Directors.

"She was very well respected," Smasal said. "She will be missed. It will be difficult for the children in her class and for the staff at the middle school." Smasal encourages parents to talk with their children, who may deal with the loss in a variety of ways. Children may become quiet, ask a lot of questions, be frightened, be agitated, become withdrawn or try extra hard to be good.

"Please listen to your child. If they seem to need to talk, answer their questions simply, honestly and possibly over and over again," Smasal said.

"It's important for people to talk about their memories. Everybody kind of grieves and reacts differently, and it is all OK," added Janis Chapman, pupil services director for the Kewaskum School District.

Overall, students were doing well at the middle school Tuesday morning, according to Janis Chapman, pupil services director for the Kewaskum School District.

"We've lost one of Kewaskum family members, which is hard for staff and students to struggle with," Chapman said. "But we were very cognizant of knowing

when the teachers, staff and students came back across the district, so we had preparations having counselors and our school psychologists and our district crisis response team on hand at the middle school as well as branches out to the other schools to help students and staff deal with the death of Mrs. Johnson."

Johnson was in her third year of teaching at the middle school. Last week marked the first time in at least seven or eight years that the district has had a current working staff member pass, Chapman said.

Johnson's survivors include her husband, Corey; her father, David Clark of The Villages, Florida; a brother, Skip (Cindy) Clark of West Bend; two sisters, Kim Schmidt of West Bend and Chris (Matt) Uelmen of the town of Wayne; a grandmother, BooBoo Stuart of Whitewater; her mother-in-law, Patricia Johnson of Wautoma; a brother-in-law, Kurt (Dawn) Johnson of Oshkosh; nine nieces and nephews, DJ, Matthew, and Alyssa Clark, Hannah and Bennett Schmidt and JJ Braatz, Ruth and Ella Uelmen, and Jade Johnson.

She was preceded in death by her mother, Nancy Clark; her father-in-law, Earl Johnson; her grandparents, James "Jim" Stuart, Donald Clark, William Weiland, and Ruth Clark-Weiland.

Funeral services will be at 5 p.m. on Wednesday, March 30, at Good Shepherd Lutheran Church in West Bend with Pastor Robert Hein officiating. Visitation will be held at the church prior to the service, beginning at 2 p.m.




Connie Ramthun and



"We have discussed everything about Cuba, like the education, what's been happening over the history, the healthcare system, business in Cuba, practically anything you can think of," Springer said.

During the trip, the class was able to see firsthand aspects of what they have been studying.

"We had a lot of site visits, a lot of briefings from people who are in different industries in Cuba, so we will get to learn more about what we have been learning about this past semester, but from a firsthand perspective," Springer said.

Springer was one of 20 students who went with Professor Randall Dunham and a co-facilitator on the trip who traveled to the Communist country through an education license.

The group of students were in Cuba at the same time that President Barack Obama traveled there. This is the first sitting president who has been to Cuba since 1928.

On July 20, 2015, the Embassy of the United States of America re-opened in Havana and the Cuban Embassy re-opened in Washington, D.C. which gave U.S. diplomats greater freedom of movement in Cuba.

"It is such a historical time in Cuba right now. They have free education and health care, and free access to housing, so it's just really interesting to see how the system is there," Springer said.

Springer saw Obama in Cuba when she attended the historic baseball game in Havana between Major League Baseball's Tampa Bay Rays and the Cuban national team. Springer and the students looked across the field to see Obama sitting with his family, beside Cuban President Raúl Castro. They passed the wave around the stadium to Obama numerous times, Springer said.

With Obama being in Cuba at the same time, the students' schedule got shifted slightly, Springer said.

Still, the students learned about the cigar, tobacco, rum, sugar and tourism industries in Cuba. They also learned about the country's healthcare and housing systems.

"The infrastructure of the housing has to be revamped, but everything is so beautiful in a sense there as well," Springer said. "Maybe one day the embargo will be gone and that will open up a lot of opportunities."

Springer was not nervous to travel to the communist country.

"I would definitely go back," Springer said. "Cuba is relatively safe. Our professor had been there before. He took a trip to Cuba with students last year, so before there was an embassy there, before all these relations opened. I think the worst that could happen is someone gets sick from drinking the water."

So, Springer drank bottled water while in Cuba. And she tried not to think too much about flying, which makes her somewhat anxious.

Her parents, Keith and Elaine Springer, are getting accustomed to their daughter traveling, but remain concerned about her welfare whenever she is away.

"They are always going to be a little nervous because that is just what parents do," Springer said. "But they are proud as well, and they kind of know I want to go everywhere, that is not really going to stop me too much. I'm going to be smart, I'm not going to be doing dangerous things."

Although Springer is not fluent in Spanish, she was not nervous about communicating with people in Cuba. She has a basic knowledge of the Spanish language, after her high school trip to Spain and a college service trip to the Dominican Republic three years ago.

Plus, some of the students in her group spoke Spanish and their tour guide spoke both English and Spanish. In addition, many Cubans speak English, Springer said.

In contrast, Springer's three-month stint to China during the summer of 2014 focused on learning the Chinese language.

"I went there on a program for intensive Chinese language, because freshman year I began studying Mandarin Chinese. I took my second year of Mandarin Chinese my sophomore year, so when I was there I took an equivalent of third year Chinese and business Chinese," Springer said.

While in China, Springer was able to tour Beijing and Hong Kong.

"It was really cool to experience all the places in China," Springer said.

Last year, Springer studied for five months in Bangkok, Thailand, even though she did not know the Thai language.

"Thai is more similar to Chinese because it is tonal, so if you say something differently, with a different intonation, you could be saying a different word. I love tonal languages just for that fact because it adds another challenge to them," Springer said.

Springer also has taken college courses to learn the Hindi and Bengali languages. She also has learned any languages she can study on her own through online resources, such as French and Italian.

"I'm kind of a language nerd," Springer explained.

Springer plans to study in India before graduating from UW-Madison in spring 2017.

All of the travel can be expensive, but fortunately Springer has obtained scholarships to cover some of the costs. For the \$4,500 Cuba trip, Springer was awarded a \$2,000 scholarship.

"A lot of people have donated to this class, so I am really thankful for that. I don't think I could have afforded it otherwise, so it means a lot," Springer said.

The biggest lesson Springer has learned while studying abroad is to have flexible plans.

"You have to be ready for anything to happen," Springer said. "Always go with an open mind. If you have a plan, it could change. And you never know, it could change for the better."

Of all of the places she has been, where is Springer's place?

"That is like asking me to pick between two favorite children," Springer said.


She likes experiencing the food, culture, surroundings and people everywhere.



## Village Of Kewaskum May Convert Wildlife Park Into Dog Park

Last July, a large cottonwood tree fell on the playground at Wildlife Park in Kewaskum, demolishing the playground equipment.

Rather than replacing that playground, the village's park and recreation committee is proposing converting it into a dog park.

"We don't really have a dog park in the village. That would be an asset for people who have dogs," Village Trustee Jim Wright said.

Instead, some people bring their dogs to a park in West Bend, committee members said at their meeting on Monday, March 28.

"It might keep people here. Isn't that our goal to try and keep everything in the village and our community?" Wright asked.

The proposal will go the village board on Monday, April 4.

The committee is proposing that the village consider converting the park at a minimum expense to the village taxpayers.

When West Bend created its dog park, it came at little cost to city residents, Village Trustee Dave

Zehren said.

"It didn't cost the city anything except the property, I believe. They got donations from elsewhere," Zehren said.

Committee members also voted to ask Washington County officials to authorize a path and signage if the dog park comes to fruition.

Wildlife Park consists of approximately two acres that are situated on the north side of Kewaskum on Wildlife Drive north of the old Regal Ware plant, near the Eisenbahn Trail.

The village board questioned the future of the park at its visioning session last month because the recreational area is one of the lesser used village parks, Village Administrator Matt Heiser said.

"We hear from the DPW crew that it is not used enough for foot traffic to beat down the weeds [under the playground]," Heiser said.

The village received about \$30,000 in insurance money after the cottonwood tree fell on the playground last summer. Village trustees have not yet decided how that money should be used.

## Village Of Kewaskum Looks At Offering Kiwanis Pool Specials

Kewaskum village residents who want to swim at Kiwanis Park will be able to get a 10-day swimming pass for \$10 this year.

The Kewaskum Village Park and Recreation Committee approved the new offer at its meeting on Monday, March 28.

The village will once again offer daily swim passes as well as season passes for individuals and families.

The cost of season passes may be less than it was last year. The committee voted to bring a recommendation to decrease the cost of season passes by 15 percent to the full village board on Monday, April 4.

If the board approves the motion, individuals season passes for residents would go from \$35 to \$29.75 and family passes for residents would go from \$60 to \$51.

"Don't get me wrong, I'm

not trying to take money away from the pool and rec committee, I'm just trying to get more interest in that facility," Village Trustee Jim Wright said. "I'm just looking at trying to get momentum up and usership up for what we are looking at doing."

A pool committee was formed several months ago to determine the need for building a new pool at Kiwanis Park. The committee met on March 8 to determine the community's needs and to start the process of creating a feasibility study.

Wright said that leaving the discount at a flat 15 percent might help provide feedback from the community for a new facility.

"That might spark more interest going forward, as we are looking at the new facility. You have to build up that momentum in order for the community to get on board," Wright said.



## Two Kewaskum Wrestlers Reach The Podium In State Kids Test

After posting three straight wins by decision to reach the finals, Kewaskum eighth grader Braden Maertz put the finishing touches on a solid performance in the WWF Kids Folkstyle Championships, pinning Jake Skrundz of the Burlington Wrestling Club in 4:00 in a thrilling match to win the 120-pound title for boys born in 2001-02.

The event was held at the Alliant Center in Madison, with boys in the older groups wrestling twice on Friday night and then continuing Saturday until they were eliminated.

Maertz opened with an 11-3 major decision over Hunter Anderson of the GET Blue Demons and followed that match with a much closer 3-1 win over Issac Ortego of the Fondy Club team.

In Saturday's semi finals, it was Maertz posting a 5-3 decision over Gavin Model of the Stoughton Wrestling Club, giving him a shot at the title.

Maertz was wrestling for Domination, owned by

Scott Rhoads, the Kewaskum High varsity coach, but according to a family member, also is a member of the Kewaskum Indian Wrestling Club and Ringers of Germantown.

The finals was a lot closer than was indicated by the pin, according to Justin Rhoads, one of the team's coaches along with Mark Deheck.

"That match was very close until the final seconds," Rhoads said, reporting Maertz was leading 1-0 and the two were locked in double cradles several times before Maertz got Skrundz's head, was awarded control and put him to his back.

Rhoads indicated Maertz lost to Skrundz twice previously, once after leading 8-0, so this was a big victory for him.

The KIWC had one other place winner, Nicholas Deheck, who took fourth at 78 pounds (2005-06). Deheck finished 3-2 in the competition, starting with a 4-2 decision over Daylin Hanel of LAW and then edging Gage Ludovix of NGL in a sudden victory by a score

of 3-1 to move him into the semis.

In his third match, Deheck was beaten in sudden victory, 4-2, by the eventual champion, Brett Back of Wisconsin Rapids. The loss sent him to the wrestleback bracket where he first defeated Jayden Glasbrenner of Boscobel Youth Wrestling before losing an 8-1 decision of Tanner Halopka of Crass Trained.

"He's got some heart," Rhoads said about Deheck, adding he and his brother, Alex, who had a very good freshman year at Kewaskum High, "are really into the sport."

Wrestling at 130 pounds (2001-02), Mason Pomeroy won his first match, a 3-1 decision over Tristin Grant of Cashton Eagles, before losing his next two matches by pin, eliminating him from the competition.

"Mason beat an eighth grader," Rhoads said. "I think he would be a good high school wrestler. He's a strong kid."

Young James Racer gained some experience for the future, going 1-2 in the 63-pound division (2007-08). He lost his first match, 6-0, bounded back with an 8-2 victory over Brett Sladky of St. Croix Falls Wrestling before being eliminated via a 10-1 major decision.

"Everyone won a match. That's a good thing," Rhoads said.

The KIWC Club will host its year-end banquet at the Amerahn on Saturday, April 9, starting at 6 p.m.

## New And Veteran Officials Are Enjoying The Experience

Love him or not, Dick Vitale is an exuberant, knowledgeable, high profile and sometimes over-the-top basketball analyst, and now he has taken his well known catchphrase "Baby" to invite young men and women to become officials.

Griesemer also knows he doesn't have to be perfect in his officiating. "I see plenty of stuff that goes on during games in high school. They (officials) miss plenty of stuff," Griesemer said.

When asked about the challenge of being an official, Griesemer said, "The most difficult thing is trying to see everything. I just try to look for the things that are the most obvious."

And is Griesemer glad he went into officiating? "Yes, for sure," he said, indicating he hopes to do freshman and JV games next year and will study more and work more games before he tries varsity competitions.

Griesemer is done with basketball for the year, "and now I'm going to be umpiring (baseball) in the summer."

When asked why he took up the call, Prochnow said, "because they needed more refs at the youth level ... so I could give back to the community and help out."

Was it easier officiating girls games or boys games? "It doesn't really matter," Prochnow said, noting the biggest challenge is not blowing the whistle too many times in a game with young players. "If you called everything in the book, it would be 0-0 at the end of the game," he said. "There are always little infractions in the game."

Prochnow started by taking a basketball test online, and then it was a matter of getting some games under his belt. "With more games, it got easier ... like anything in life," he said, indicating it helps to play basketball. "It helps to know the ins and outs before you take the test. It's easier to understand."

Concerning whether he will move up to JV and varsity games in the future, Prochnow said, "I'm not sure yet, how far I'm going to go."

And did he enjoy the two years he has been an official? "Yeah, I liked it,"

Prochnow said, planning to also umpire baseball games this summer.

Wrestling was Wade Roberts' sport when he was in high school in Illinois, but he didn't get into officiating until years later.

"I had my (electrician) apprenticeship after high school," Roberts said, indicating, "This is my seventh year. I didn't start until (son) Cole was out of high school because I coached (Kids Wrestling) for 11 years."

And why did he start? "I absolutely love the sport, and it was a way for me to give back," Roberts said.

Roberts said he was very lucky to hook up with two veteran wrestling refs in the area, Pete Schultz and Bob Logdin, who mentored him during the early years. Roberts watched them and asked questions, and then they watched him, offering constructive observations to help him improve.

Roberts started with Kids wrestling and then moved up to high school JV matches and varsity matches to a point where he has been selected to officiate at regionals the past couple of years.

While they may have not seen Vitale's video, a couple Kewaskum High seniors, Trent Griesemer and Michael Prochnow, have already started officiating games at the grade school level, preparing themselves to become certified high school basketball officials.

Griesemer's dad, Tom, the vice principal and athletic director at Campbellsport High School, urged his son to try officiating. "My dad kind of got me involved," Griesemer said, indicating one reason was to use officiating to earn a little money.

"This is my second year (in officiating)," Griesemer, who has played basketball since third grade, said, indicating he's been doing mostly third to sixth grade games at Kewaskum for girls and boys, and, "I did do a JV scrimmage at the beginning of the season."

As an official for Kewaskum, Griesemer said he has different partners, including Prochnow. The two have been teammates on the Kewaskum High varsity team for the last two years.

To prepare for his first year, Griesemer said he took an open book test, went to rules meetings and studied the rules. Griesemer said he is confident on calling most of the rules except "sometimes



WADE ROBERTS

As far as the biggest challenge he faces, Roberts said, "The biggest challenges are the coaches and the parents," adding further, "I've never met a kid who was pinned."

While basketball requires a lot of running, wrestling officials have to be quick to get from one side of the athletes to the other, looking for violations or near falls, and sometimes they are flat on their stomachs on the mat to call pins.

It goes with the territory and so does making definitive calls. When asked what suggestion he would make to young men or women going into wrestling officiating, Roberts said, "Be strong in your calls. You will learn to make the right calls."

## Kewaskum Gridiron Club Receives Donation - Club Donates To Others

The Kewaskum Gridiron Club recently received a donation of \$2,500 for its youth football and cheer-leading/dance program from the Sandpiper Inn and Modern Woodmen of America.

The Sandpiper Inn held its ninth annual Ice Golf Tournament at Lake Bernice on Saturday, Jan. 30, and donated \$1,250 of the money raised to the Gridiron Club. Modern Woodmen matched that amount to make the total donation \$2,500.

The money will go toward scholarships that the Kewaskum Gridiron Club offers to Kewaskum High School students, as well as help defray the costs for parents with children in the club, according to Kelly Nerat, Kewaskum Gridiron Board secretary.

Each year the Gridiron gives away two \$1,000 scholarships to graduating seniors who have played football all four years in high school and who also played Gridiron football. Applications for this year's scholarships are being accepted until the beginning of April.

The club has given more than \$24,000 in scholarships for 16 years now, according to Jason Piittmann, athletic director for the Kewaskum School District.

The Gridiron Club, which was started about

19 years ago, typically has 100 to 120 boys and girls in the program, Nerat said. Boys and girls in grades five through eight are eligible to participate in the youth football or the cheerleading/dance team. "It is a volunteer-run organization, so we are always looking for volunteers and coaches to help out," Nerat said.

Registration for this year's Gridiron Club will begin April 1.

"It is a very great opportunity for kids in the Kewaskum district," Nerat said.

The Gridiron Club was just one of several area youth sporting groups that received funds raised at the Sandpiper Inn Ice Golf Tournament. Hundreds of people came out to participate in the annual event.

Jeff Limbach, owner of the Sandpiper Inn, started the ice golf benefit nine years ago.

In the first four years, the event raised money for prostate cancer awareness through local newspaper and radio ads. Jeff Limbach, owner of the Sandpiper Inn, is a prostate cancer survivor who will be 10 years cancer-free this July. Limbach said many people have thanked him for helping them catch cancer at an early state because of seeing his ads.

The following two years, the annual ice golf event benefited the Kewaskum

and Campbellsport food pantries. People who golfed brought in nonperishable food items for a free beverage the day of the event, and more than \$5,000 was raised at the events for the food pantries.

The seventh year of the event, Jim Freiburg, executive president of the Campbellsport Athletic Association, mentioned to Limbach that the athletic programs for kids needed money for all the different events. Limbach decided to give most of the money raised to the C.A.A. and some to the Campbellsport Wildcat Football League.

Last year's event raised \$6,200, and Limbach decided to include the Kewaskum Gridiron, which received a check for \$2,500. The rest of the money was split between the C.A.A., the Wildcat Football League and other charities throughout the year.

"The ice golf outing is just tremendous. Jeff Limbach does a ton of work to benefit these youth programs. It's pretty amazing," Nerat said.

## Evans Is Eager To See How Track Team Develops

With 24 sophomores and freshmen on the team, good things might be ahead for the Kewaskum High track program, but as far as this year goes, new head coach Kris Evans says "It's going to be a building year."

"I think both the boys team and the girls team are going to be young," Evans said after the recent opening indoor invitational in Oshkosh.

Seeing as how he is new, Evans isn't 100 percent certain of who won letters a year ago, but he does know he has several talented returnees, starting with seniors Jason Hanson and Ben Watzig.

Hanson has qualified for the D-2 State Track and Field Meet twice, last year jumping six feet, two inches (6-2) in La Crosse, which was good enough for a three-way tie for sixth place.

Hanson also began running the 800 last season and improved to a point where he was running under two minutes and 10 seconds (2:10) consistently, times that should mean more points for the Indians.

Watzig will definitely anchor the weight department. He took a big jump in the sectional last season, throwing the discus a personal best 155-01, which earned him a trip to state where he wound up ninth with a toss of 145-3. He also was a consistent place winner in the shot put event.

Watzig started his season hoping to go to state competitions in three sports, football, wrestling and track. Goals toward the first two fell short, but he still has a chance to reach the state podium in track.

Another good area for the Indians will be the 110 meter high hurdles and the 300 lows where junior letter winner Derek Brock is back to contend for titles in the new East Center Conference. Brock finished

second in the 110 highs (15.86) and third in the 300 lows (43.21) in the last year of the Eastern Wisconsin Conference. Whether new conference schools, Ripon, Berlin, Winneconne and Kettle Moraine Lutheran, have good hurdlers is still unknown, still Brock should be up to the task.

Kewaskum's pole vaulters, seniors Miguel Rodriguez and Tony Leister, along with junior Kyle Pamperin, should be consistent place winners for the Indians.

In addition to these events, Evans said, "I think we are going to have some strengths in the 4x100 and 4x200 (meter) relays, with junior Jake Hrica and sophomore Cade Peterson competing in one or both and representing KHS in the open 200.

Three other sprinters/relay runners are Pamperin and sophomores John May and Tony Steger. Steger is also being tried as a high jumper, according to Evans.

The team did suffer a crushing blow when senior Brandon Thull tore his ACL in the Indians' final football game against Catholic Memorial. Thull underwent surgery in January to repair the knee and will miss the entire season. With a season best 11.36, Thull finished third in the open 100 a year ago behind Plymouth's aces, Sam Stehling and Jake Schneider. He also anchored the third place by the 4x200 relay quartet.

When it comes to the distance events, Evans said, "I think Justin Reck can get his times way down," referring to the sophomore who was the leading runner for the cross country team last fall.

Evans said freshman James Villanueva is show-

ing potential in the 400 and 4x400 relay, while sophomore Riley

Donovan and freshman Jon Leister could develop in the weights. Evans said Donovan has "some size and some commitment."

The jumping events might be a weak point with Brock the only triple jumper and senior Christian Bocher, out for the sport for the first time, just learning the long jump.

Evans doesn't know much about the track programs in the EC conference, but at Oshkosh he was quickly impressed with one of them — Berlin. "I got to see a kid (Jacob Caswell) turn in a 1:58 in the 800 "They've got some talent in their long races," he said.

Kewaskum is scheduled to be at the Oostburg Invitational on April 8 and will host an EC Quad meet with Berlin, Campbellsport and Winneconne on Tuesday, April 12. The EC Conference Meet will be hosted by Ripon on May 17.



## Jeff Scannell Strikes Again

### – Kewaskum Native Bowls Perfect 300

Jeff Scannell had three lifetime bowling goals.

He wanted to bowl an 800 for a three-game series, he wanted to bowl 11 strikes in a row and he wanted to bowl a perfect 300 game.

In less than a year, Scannell, a 49-year-old Kewaskum native, bowled 842 in a three-game series during league bowling and he had bowled 11 strikes in a row during a tournament in Sheboygan.

On Tuesday, March 22, Scannell achieved his trifecta when he bowled a perfect 300 game during league play at King Pin in West Bend.

"That was the one piece of the puzzle that never got finished over the last years, and now it's been done," Scannell said.

Scannell had bowled a 300 game before a couple times previously. However, even though one of those games had been in a tournament, Scannell had never scored a 300 during sanctioned league play until last week, a feat that the United States Bowling Congress will recognize with a "300" ring.

#### The Perfect Game

When Scannell arrived at the bowling alley on March 22 for his normal Tuesday night league, he felt good.

He had just had his grape-smelling bowling ball re-polished and was wearing his new bowling shoes.

As Scannell warmed up, he threw a couple balls for practice, and one of his teammates told him, "Jeff you've got game."

The words helped boost Scannell's confidence, and when he started bowling, his ball went down the center of the alley, bull's-eye perfect, resulting in a strike each time.

Scannell sat down between each frame and didn't get nervous.

"I've got a good game going here," Scannell told himself, but added, "I've been here before too many times."

After Scannell rolled a strike for the first part of the 10th frame, his team-

mates asked if he wanted to sit down.

"No, I want to keep bowling like normal," Scannell said.

He wanted to keep going.

For the next shot, one pin was a little lazy going down, but it fell.

"And then I didn't put much time worrying about the last frame of the 10th, I just went up there and bowled it and it went right down the middle," Scannell said.

The final strike brought Scannell's score to 300.

#### Tools For The Trade

Scannell credits the ball with his success. After all, it was that same ball that Scannell had used to bowl an 842 series.

"My throwing and that ball are matched really well," Scannell said of his favorite purple bowling ball.

Scannell admits that his news shoes may have helped as well. Several professionals had advised Scannell to purchase new shoes.

"They can make the game more stable. You are going to still throw a good game, but this might keep you in the game," the professionals said.

So Scannell spent a couple weeks trying to break in his new shoes before his perfect game.

Still, Scannell thinks that

having his bowling ball refinished made the biggest difference.

"I could see it made a difference and that the ball was reacting better. With that, me and my confidence got better," Scannell said.

Actually, Scannell had been bowling well two weeks earlier as well. That was when he bowled 18 consecutive strikes over the course of two games.

Scannell, who works as a toolmaker in Brown Deer, started bowling about nine years ago.

He said his 14-year-old daughter, Lily, does not really bowl. But Scannell enjoys bowling on Friday evenings with his 17-year-old son, Hunter.

"He is actually very good for the little he's been bowling. He's probably got a 175 or 180 average," Scannell said.

Although Scannell has now achieved his personal goals, he plans to continue his league bowling. And now he's made some new goals.

He hopes to do well when he bowls in the state tournament in Madison on April 8 and 9, but he is looking beyond that as well.

"Truly, I would like to win some big tournaments like I did last year. And I'd like to repeat the 800 and 300 again," Scannell said.

Notice is hereby given of a spring election and a Presidential Preference Vote to be held in Washington County on April 5, 2016, at which the officers named below shall be chosen. The names of the candidates for each office to be voted for, whose nominations have been certified to or filed in this office, are given under the title of the office, each in its proper column, in the sample ballot below.

#### INFORMATION TO VOTERS

Upon entering the polling place, a voter shall state his or her name and address, show an acceptable form of photo identification and sign the poll book before being permitted to vote. If a voter is not registered to vote, a voter may register to vote at the polling place serving his or her residence, if the voter presents proof of residence in a form specified by law. Where ballots are distributed to voters, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot. Upon being permitted to vote, the voter shall retire alone to a voting booth and cast his or her ballot, except that a voter who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the voter's minor child or minor ward. An election official may inform the voter of the proper manner for casting a vote, but the official may not in any manner advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

#### AT THE SPRING ELECTION

The voter shall fill in the oval next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall write in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided, and fill in the oval next to the write-in line.

#### AT THE PRESIDENTIAL PREFERENCE VOTE

Within the party of his or her choice, the voter shall fill in the oval next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice or shall, in the alternative, fill in the oval next to the words "Uninstructed Delegation," or write in the name of a person of his or her choice for a candidate in the space provided for a write-in vote and fill in the oval next to the write-in line.

#### A voter may cast only one vote in the presidential preference primary.

The vote shall not be cast in any other manner. Not more than five minutes' time shall be allowed inside a voting booth. Sample ballots or other materials to assist the voter in marking his or her ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

If a voter spoils an optical scan ballot, he or she shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one voter. If the ballot has not been initialed by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the voter shall return it to the election official who shall issue a proper ballot in its place.

#### After Voting the Ballot

After an official optical scan ballot is marked, it shall be inserted in the security sleeve so the marks do not show. After casting his or her vote, the voter shall insert the ballot in the voting device and discard the sleeve. After casting his or her vote, the voter shall insert the ballot in the ballot box and discard the sleeve or deliver it to an inspector for deposit. The voter shall leave the polling place promptly.

A voter may select an individual to assist in casting his or her vote if the voter declares to the presiding official that he or she is unable to read, has difficulty reading, writing, or understanding English, or that due to disability is unable to cast his or her ballot. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the voter's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the voter.
